Twenty years ago, Ted Thoren and Tom McGory combined forces to guide the fortunes of Big Red baseball. During this time, Cornell has been 365-317-9 overall and 275-188-4 against competition in the Northeast. The 1981 campaign was the ninth 20 wins or more season and the 15th winning slate in 20 years.

This past year, the diamondmen had their most successful spring trip in recent years with a 7-7 record against top flight competition in the southwest. Hitting the outdoors for the first time, the team reeled off four consecutive victories at the beginning of the tour. Other "big" triumphs were over Lamar, 8-7, ranked 21st in the country at the time; and over the University of New Orleans, 6-0, rated 14th in the collegiate ranks.

Cornell won the inaugural Cornell-Ithaca Collegiate Baseball Tournament with a 3-1 record, while Ithaca College was second at 4-2. Tourney wins came over Ithaca, 3-1, and Howard twice, 11-2 and 3-1. Howard University was third (2-4) and Towson State fourth (1-3).

Team records that were set during 1981 were home runs (24), runs batted in (234), batting average (.309), extra base hits (.103), slugging percentage (.449), errors (93), most runs allowed (260), most earned runs allowed (202), worst ERA (5.97) and most hits allowed (371).

In 1982, the Big Red will travel to California for the third time with games to be scheduled in San Francisco, Los Angeles, and San Diego. Coach Thoren's troops will be there from March 28 to April 4, 1982. California has been the scene of one of Cornell's biggest triumphs in recent years. In 1973, at the Riverside Tournament, the Red knocked off top-ranked Arizona State.

Amongst the Ivies, Cornell has the best league record in the EIBL over the past five years. The Red is 46-20-1 (.694), followed by Harvard 43-24 (.642), Columbia 35-34 (.507) and Pennsylvania 31-28-2 (.500). Navy is tops at 48-20-1 (.703).

Junior pitcher Greg Myers was named the most valuable player on the 1981 Red team and received the Dr. Albert H. Sharpe Award. Myers was 8-1 with a 1.74 ERA. He completed all of his eight starts and had two saves. He is the holder of school records for most wins in a career (18) and most complete games in a career (21). He was named All-EIBL second team for the second straight season. Myers also received the Trainer's Award for durability.

Captain Greg Allen, a senior center fielder, set school career records for runs scored (155), at bats (542), games (155), and strikeouts (65). He tied the record for career hits (151).

Junior second baseman Marlin McPhail was All-EIBL first team. He led the Red in batting (.354) and set a school seasonal record for doubles (15), and tied the career mark (29).

Junior first baseman Mike Branca was All-EIBL second team. He tied a school seasonal record for home runs (8), and led the team in RBIs (37). Mike also possessed a super glove in handling throws.

Senior third baseman Bill Bacon was named Cornell's most improved player after raising his average from .225 to .333. Bacon set a school record for eight triples in a season.

Junior outfielder John DeMayo was All-EIBL second team for the second straight year. He led the Red in batting in the EIBL with a .371 average.

Junior shortstop Mark Utter set school career records for assists (282) and errors (53).
