A good time was had by all, especially over the last portion of the season as the Big Red reeled off eight straight victories, including three in a row over Penn State. The final eight wins was the longest streak since the 1977 EIBL champions had a string of nine.

For Coach Ted Thoren, the 26-16 season was his seventh 20-win campaign in the last eight years, a feat accomplished by no one else in the Ivy League.

Thoren mixed a good blend of veterans and rookies to finish with an 11-7 record in the EIBL for a second-place tie. The diamondmen won 21 of 29 contests in the Northeast.

The team set three seasonal records and tied another. It scored a record-breaking 279 runs, snapping the old mark of 265 by the 1977 nine; hit 73 doubles, smashing the 67 record set in 1982; and established a new RBI standard of 240, wiping out the old mark of 234 by the 1981 squad. The Big Red also hit 25 homers to tie the record set in 1982, and batted .308 to tie the 1982 squad, but just a point off the record set by the 1981 team (.309).

Junior outfielder-third baseman Dan Autiello set a record for most runs scored in a season with 42, breaking the old mark of 41 set by Dave Johnson in 1977 and tied by Marlin McPhail in 1982.

Junior outfielder Mike Kalfopoulos, a second team All-EIBL selection, led the Red nine in batting with a .413 average, which was the first time a Cornell player had hit .400 or better since Chris Stocke recorded .400 in 1974.

Senior catcher Mike Seagram, who received All-EIBL honorable mention, played in the New York State College Baseball Coaches Association All-Star game at Shea Stadium, and in the New Jersey-New York Division I college game at Yankee Stadium. Seagram, who caught 34 games while serving as the DH in six more contests this season, hit .371 and led the team in walks (26), and was tied with second baseman Juan Prieto, a junior, for most triples (two). Seagram received the Big Red most durable player award.

Junior outfielder-first baseman Terry Birrer led the team in RBIs with 37, while Kalfopoulos had the most home runs (six) and tied Autiello for most doubles (12).

For the first time ever, the pitching staff had eight men with a .500 or better record (figuring in at least one decision). Junior right-hander Steve Huber led the starters with a 5-2 record and a 3.96 earned run average. Huber received All-EIBL honorable mention, as did sophomore right-hander Gary DiGiuseppe (3-3, 5.32).

Sophomore lefty Larry Brown was 5-1 with a 4.02 ERA and was named the winner of the Dr. Albert Sharpe Most Valuable Player Award. Freshman southpaw Rich DeSa led the team in strikeouts with 52 in 44 and 2/3 innings, while Brown had a pair of shutouts.

Senior pitcher Rick Betsch, a reserve catcher for three years, turned to the mound in 1984 and was named the team's most improved player with a 2.31 ERA and a .358 average in limited duty as the DH.

Next season, the diamondmen will journey to Texas and Louisiana with the usual stops including Houston and New Orleans. With Thoren losing only his co-captains, Betsch and Seagram, that 20-win plateau is certainly attainable once again. But an influx of new blood will still be needed to surge past a youthful Harvard club.
