The Big Red tied 1978 for the most games played (47), with only one rainout and no rescheduled contests. The diamondmen won 20 games to give Coach Ted Thoren 20 wins or more in a season in seven of the last eight campaigns.

The top 10 teams on the 1985 schedule had a combined won-lost record of 325-161-1, topped by the University of Houston's 44-17 slate.

Ted Thoren was elected to the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame. The announcement was made at the College World Series in Omaha, and Ted will be honored at the baseball coaches annual convention in January 1986 in New Orleans.

Captain Dan Autiello was named to the EIBL second team as an outfielder. He set a new Cornell career record for runs scored (139), breaking the old mark of 131 set by Marlin McPhail in 1979-82. Autiello was also the recipient of the Dr. Albert Sharpe Most Valuable Player Award.

Senior left fielder Mike Kalfopoulos set a new career slugging percentage standard of .584, smashing the old mark of .574 by Pat Pennucci in 1960-62. "Kal" also established records for most doubles in a season (16) and career (45), erasing marks of 15 and 43, respectively, by McPhail, the former in 1981.

Senior first baseman Terry Birrer, playing in 45 games, set a new seasonal record for putouts with 356, breaking the old standard of 341 set by Fred Hoge in 1970.

Senior right-hander Steve Huber broke three records. He appeared in most games in a career on the mound (45), snapping the three-year-old mark of 42 established by Greg Myers in 1979-82. Huber had 17 losses in his career for a new Cornell standard, wiping out the old record of 15 set by Ray Ratkowski (1962-64) and tied by Jay Kobylarz in 1979-82. Huber also erased Kobylarz's record of most hits allowed in a career (228) with a new figure of 242.

Sophomore shortstop Mark Smith batted 161 times to break the old seasonal record of 158 set by Joe Roche in 1978. He also tied a yearly record of playing in 47 games, which was set by Steve Caputi and Mike Fleury in 1978. Smith set a new mark for most assists in a season (127), snapping the old standard of 115 by Joe Guarascio in 1976, and he tied Tom Boettcher's record of most errors in a season (23) set in 1970.

Freshman second baseman Bob Harbison broke Mark Utter's record of nine sacrifice hits in a season (1982) by setting a new standard of 11.

Team records also went by the books. The Big Red hit the most home runs ever (26) by a Cornell nine, breaking the old record of 25 set in 1982 and duplicated last year. The Red also participated in more double plays (39) than ever before, wiping out the old standard of 38 set in 1980. The diamondmen established new team records for most losses in a season (27), runs allowed (292) and hits allowed (426).

Junior catcher Jim Durant was the recipient of the team's most improved player award, while Huber was given the Trainers Award for being most durable.

Kalfopoulos led the team in hitting for the second straight year. He batted .366 and also finished on top in hits (53), doubles (16), home runs (5), walks (26) and RBI (38). Smith and junior outfielder Joe Cossu tied for the team leadership in triples (4), while sophomore second baseman Bob Dipipi had the most stolen bases (13). Autiello had the most runs scored (35).

Senior right-hander Ron Brown led the regular pitchers in earned run average with 2.87. Huber had the most wins (5), strikeouts (30) and innings pitched (61).

The team has been invited to the prestigious Riverside (Calif.) Tournament during the 1986 spring break. Cornell has played there in the past. In 1972, Coach Thoren's club was 4-3 in the tournament with wins over Tennessee, South Carolina, Arizona State and Riverside. In 1975, the Big Red returned to Riverside and went 0-7.

After much discussion, the location of Hoy Field will remain unchanged, but the bleachers behind the backstop will be torn down this summer; also expected to go is Bacon Cage.
