The Big Red set a single season record for most games played (49), losing just one doubleheader to the weatherman; it was only the second twinbill rained (or snowed) out in the past two years.

In 1986, using primarily a freshman keystone combination of shortstop Dave Dase and second baseman Scott Kenney, the team established a new double play record of 47, breaking the old mark of 39 set a year ago.

Coach Ted Thoren was inducted into the Ithaca College Sports Hall of Fame in June. Last January, his peers elected him to the American Coaches Baseball Association Hall of Fame. In 25 years, Coach Thoren has been the Big Red head mentor in 900 baseball games with a winning percentage of .526 (468-422-10). He has coached 1,014 games overall at Cornell (number one in the Ivy League) with a winning mark of .536.

With their 22 victories, Big Red diamondmen have recorded 20 victories or more in nine of the last 10 years. They have had 17 winning campaigns in the last 25 seasons.

Senior pitcher Gary DiGiuseppe made a remarkable recovery from winter arm surgery to win the Dr. Albert Sharpe Most Valuable Player Award. He tied classmates Larry Brown and Chris Sheehan for most wins (5), and had the most complete games with Sheehan (6).

Seniors Joe Darlak, the captain and third baseman, and Joe Cossu, an outfielder; and sophomore Guy Leach, a catcher, and junior Mark Smith, a first baseman, were named to the EIBL second team. In the EIBL, Darlak hit .385, Cossu .931, Leach .361 and Smith .321. The latter was a first team All-Ivy selection, while the former three made the second nine. Smith led the EIBL in total bases (30) and triples (4).

Freshman designated hitter Joe Catone topped the Big Red in hitting with a .342 average and Cossu was second at .331. Frosh outfielder Mike Milmoie had the most homers (4), junior second baseman Bob Dipipi the most stolen bases (14) and Darlak the most walks (17) and doubles (9).

Sophomore right-handed pitcher John O'Connor was given the Trainers Award for durability, while Leach earned the most improved player honor.

Smith set Cornell seasonal records for most games played (all 49), at bats (166) and putouts (409). He also broke the career triples record and has 12 with one season to play. In addition, he topped the club in RBIs (34), runs scored (27), hits (47) and triples (7).

Brown led the mound staff in strikeouts (39), and Sheehan pitched the most innings (71.3). Junior southpaw Rich DeSa had the best earned run average (3.60), although he was limited to 30 innings pitched in eight games because of an arm injury.

In 17 doubleheaders, the Big Red swept four of them, split 11 twinbills and lost two. In seven of the splits, Cornell lost the opener but came back to win the nightcap.

The 12th Annual Rainbow Easter Tournament will be the site of the 1987 spring trip (March 20-28) when the Big Red journeys to Hawaii next year. In addition to the host team, the University of Hawaii-Honolulu, Cornell will join Wichita State, Portland State and two teams yet to be named. This will be the third trek to the islands for Coach Thoren and his diamondmen.
