COACH TED THOREN'S 28th Big Red team had a typical season for a squad with just two seniors. The 17-20 overall record featured a few high moments (a five-game winning streak being one of them) and there were also the low lights that only a key RBI or a defensive gem could have prevented.

FOR THE FOURTH CONSECUTIVE YEAR, the diamondmen had a winning record (16-14) in the Northeast. This was an outstanding effort in 1989 because the young squad was not able to establish a set lineup in California due to seven rainouts.

CAPTAIN SCOTT KENNEY (Dover, Del.), a senior shortstop, received the Dr. Albert H. Sharpe Award as the team's most valuable player. Kenney was named to the Academic All-America second team (3.7 in business/economics) and received EIBL honorable mention. Scott topped the Red in RBI (26), hits (39) and game-winning hits (3). He was second in batting (.333), slugging percentage (.444), runs (22) and walks (25). Kenney also provided strong leadership for this inexperienced group.

IN THE DOUBLEHEADER SWEEP AT CAMISIUS, Coach Thoren became the all-time leader in baseball wins in the Ivy League. He is now the Ancient Eight leader in games coached in all sports (1,142), wins in all sports (590), baseball games coached (1,027) and baseball wins (520).

THE TRAINER'S AWARD, going to the most durable player, was given to junior Andy Bednar (McKees Rocks, Pa.). The right-handed pitcher had a 3-2 record and the second best earned run average of 3.86. He is also a place-kicker on the football team.

SOPHOMORE FIRST BASEMAN JOHN LONGHOUSE (Freeville, N.Y.) received the Most Improved Player Award. The right-handed hitting Longhouse played in all 37 games, hitting .295 with 17 RBI. He batted .239 in 39 contests in 1988.

KENNEY was selected for the second year in a row to play in the New York State College Baseball Coaches Association all-star game. And for the second consecutive year...

JOHN KRESHO (New Kensington, Pa.), a sophomore left fielder who holds the school record for stolen bases in a season (23), broke the career standard of 39 by Dick Meade (1954-56) with a two-year total of 41. The left-handed leadoff hitter topped the team in walks (22), runs (29) and stolen bases (18 in 18 tries).

SOPHOMORE SECOND BASEMAN MARK SENEKER (Palos Verdes Estates, Calif.), who dislocated his shoulder on the California trip but still played in 18 games, led the team in hitting with a .360 average.

SENIOR CATCHER MIKE MILMOR (Canastota, N.Y.) had the most doubles (8) and was second in RBI (21) for the Big Red. Junior outfielder Albert Jorajuria (Lakeland, Fla.) was the top slugger at .456.

FRESHMAN RIGHT-HANDER DOUG PETILLO (Suffield, Conn.) had the best ERA of 3.86 on a staff that combined for a 5.74 mark. Petillo, who was 4-1, had the most victories with junior southpaw Kerry Brooks (Lancaster, Pa.), who was 4-5. Brooks, who beat Ithaca College twice, hurled the most innings (60.1) and had the most strikeouts (56).

HOY FIELD was once again friendly to the diamondmen. Cornell was 11-8 at home. Kenney hit .413 at home and Kresho .362. Petillo and Brooks each won three games on campus. On the road, Seneker batted .407 and freshman outfielder Brian Zilla (Throop, Pa.) hit .375.

while compiling A 6-10 RIBL RECORD (ninth place), Seneker batted .438 and Jorajuria hit .351. Junior left-hander Geoff Ryan (Oakland, Calif.) had the best ERA (1.17) against league competition and Bednar was 2.25. Petillo had the most wins (3).

ON APRIL 30, when the Big Red swept a doubleheader at Brown, it was the first time that Cornell had won two EIBL twinbills (it also beat Navy) in one season since taking Penn and Army in 1986.

WITH THE LOSS of just two seniors to graduation, an excellent nucleus of talent returns for 1990. Combined with a couple of fine freshman prospects, the Red will once again be competitive when it opens the 1990 campaign in Florida.
