When the Big Red defeated Ithaca College 1-0 in the second game of a doubleheader on May 12 an era came to an end. No. 10 hung up his Cornell spikes for the final time, going out a winner. Coach Ted Thoren completed a 29-year head coaching career with a record of 541-520-11. He ranks first at Cornell and in the Ivy League in all-time wins (611) and games coached (1,186) in all sports, and baseball wins (541) and baseball games coached (1,072).

One of the highlights of the 21-23 season was a seven-game winning streak and a stretch that saw the Red win 10 out of 12 outings. The streak started with a sweep of Canisius on April 24 and ended with a loss in the second game of a doubleheader with Yale on April 29. For its 44 games, the team batted .285 for the best mark since 1985 (.287). The pitching staff's earned run average of 4.43 was the best Cornell mark since 4.23 in 1984. It was also the first time since that same year that both the hitters and pitchers performed better than the opposition.

Junior third baseman Mark Seneker led the team in batting with a .367 average after topping the club a year ago with a .360 mark. Seneker was also second in RBI (21) behind junior first baseman John Longhouse's 26. At Hoy Field, where the Red batted .330 to the opposition's .269, Seneker hit .490 in all 16 games.

Junior center fielder John Kresho led the team in walks (37), stolen bases (25) and runs scored (40). He holds school career records for walks (110) and stolen bases (66). With a year to go, he has 111 runs scored and is closing in on the career record of 139 set by Dan Autiello in 1982-85.

Hoy Field was once again friendly, as Cornell was 12-4 in Ithaca, finishing 18-15 in the Northeast. It was the fifth consecutive winning season against Northeast competition for the Red. In addition to Seneker (.490), three other players hit over .400 at Hoy, including sophomore DH Jon Zimmerman (.435), freshman second baseman Chip DeLorenzo (.421) and junior catcher Trevor Schumm (.419). Sophomore right-hand Joel Nies was undefeated at home (4-0).

Nies topped the starters on the pitching staff with a 3.04 earned run average to go with a 6-4 record. Senior lefty Kerry Brooks was 6-3 with a 3.48 ERA and a team-leading 52 strikeouts in 67.1 innings. Brooks also batted .318 as a DH-pinch hitter in 13 games. Junior left-hander Doug Dubiel, who saw action in 14 games out of the bullpen, had the best ERA (0.52) in 17.1 innings pitched. Cornell hurlers struck out 200 batters while walking 151.

Sophomore right-hander Doug Petillo (2-0) pitched a one-hitter against Haverford, as the visitors had a Texas Leaguer in the fourth inning. Petillo, who missed all of the spring trip and the early part of the season with mononucleosis, went 6.2 innings before Coach Thoren allowed senior outfielder Albert Jorajuria to pitch to the final batter. In his only collegiate appearance on the mound, Jorajuria struck out the batter to end the game.

In the EIBL, Cornell finished 7-11 for eighth place. Schumm was the league's third-leading hitter (.432) and Nies ranked eighth in ERA (2.34). On the all-star team, Schumm was named to the second unit, while Seneker (.327), Brooks and Kresho (.321) received honorable mention. Schumm and Brooks were named All-Ivy second team.

On the spring trip to Florida, the Big Red lost a pair of close games to Bradley 8-3 and 5-4 and the Braves went on to win the Missouri Valley Conference, defeating last year's national champion, Wichita State.

Brooks was named the recipient of the Dr. Albert H. Sharpe Award as the Big Red's most valuable player. Zimmerman received the Most Improved Player Award, raising his batting average from his freshman year of .196 to this season's .333. The Most Durable Player Award went to senior right-handed pitcher Andy Bednar (2-3, 5.74).

Seneker was named to the GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America District I first team. He had a .367 batting average and a 3.50 GPA in government.

With just five seniors on the team, the new head coach at Cornell will have his entire infield returning, people with starting experience in every outfield position, and a couple of pitching spots to fill. Coach Thoren leaves Cornell as a winner who has established a solid baseball tradition founded by true student-athletes.
