PRE-SNAP READ

- ▶ Cornell looks to wrap up its three-game homestand with its third-straight win on Saturday, Nov. 1 when it hosts Princeton for the 107th all-time meeting between the Big Red and Tigers.
- ▶ Kickoff is slated for 1 p.m. at Schoellkopf Field.
- ▶ Nick DeLuca and Matt Miller will have the call on ESPN+.

THE SERIES

- ▶ Saturday will mark the 107th meeting all-time between Cornell and Princeton.
- ▶ The Tigers lead the series 66-38-2.
- ▶ Cornell has a 21-25-1 record at home against Princeton, but have not defeated the Tigers on its home turf since Oct. 27, 2012 when it earned a 37-35 win over Princeton.
- ▶ The Big Red defeated Princeton a season ago 49-35 on the road.
- ▶ The Tigers have won eight of the last 10 meetings over Cornell.

A WIN WOULD...

- ▶ Give Cornell a 3-4 record on the season and a 2-2 mark in conference play.
- ▶ Give the Big Red a three-game win streak, its first since the 2016 season when it defeated Bucknell (24-16), Yale (27-13), and Colgate (39-38).
- ▶ Give Cornell its first back-to-back wins over Princeton since 2000 and 2001.
- ▶ Make Cornell 311-208-15 all-time at Schoellkopf Field.
- ▶ Improve the Big Red to 199-276-5 all-time in Ivy League action.
- ▶ Give Cornell its first three-consecutive home wins in three-consecutive weeks since 1949.

SCOUTING THE TIGERS

- ▶ Led by RBs Ethan Clark (310 yards, 4.6 YPC) and Kai Honda (188 yards, 4.6 YPC), Princeton has shown they can move the ball on the ground, though they average only 119 yards per game as a team.
- ▶ QB Kai Colón has been productive with a 140.82 passer rating, completing 61% of passes for 1,049 yards and 8 TDs. The receiving corps is well-distributed with Josh Robinson (274 yards), Roman Laurio (159 yards), and several other contributors creating matchup problems.
- ▶ Princeton has generated only 5 sacks in 6 games compared to surrendering 17, giving opposing quarterbacks too much time and contributing to allowing 266.2 passing yards per game.
- ▶ Opponents are converting 53.76% of third downs (50-of-93), indicating Princeton's defense has difficulty in critical situations and sustaining stops.
- ▶ Princeton has forced 8 interceptions (returning one for a TD) while throwing only 3, and their punter Brady Clark averages 45.7 yards per punt. However, they're being outgained significantly in overall yardage (350.7 vs 424.0 per game), suggesting they'll need to continue winning the turnover battle to stay competitive.
- ▶ Princeton has been highly efficient in the red zone, scoring on 21 of 24 opportunities (87.5%) with 17 touchdowns. However, they've only reached the red zone 24 times compared to opponents' 23 trips, suggesting they struggle to consistently sustain drives into scoring territory.
- ▶ Princeton is being dominated in time of possession (28:36 vs 31:24 per game), which correlates with their deficit in total plays (392 vs 445) and total yardage. This suggests their defense is on the field too long, potentially leading to fatigue and the opponent's ability to control game flow and wear down Princeton's defensive front.
- ▶ Josh Robinson leads the team in receptions (23 for 274 yards) and is the primary punt returner (8.6 yard average). He's Princeton's most dynamic playmaker and gets the ball in various ways.

OBSERVATIONS FROM WEEK SIX

► Cornell's quarterback **Garrett Bass-Sulpizio** put together an impressive all-around performance, completing 28-of-48 passes for 346 yards while also leading the team in rushing with 70 yards and a touchdown on 19 carries. His dual-threat ability was critical in keeping drives alive, particularly in overtime when he orchestrated three consecutive scoring drives.

► Sophomore running back **Jordan Triplett** was Cornell's closer, scoring all three of the Big Red's touchdowns—including two in the overtime periods. His ability to punch it in from short yardage (5-yard, 2-yard, and 1-yard touchdown runs) proved decisive. He finished with 64 yards on 17 carries, consistently gaining tough yards when it mattered most.

► Despite giving up 471 passing yards to Brown, Cornell's defense came through in critical situations. Keith Williams Jr.'s fourth-quarter interception helped preserve the comeback, and the unit forced four turnovers on downs—including the final stop in the third overtime that sealed the victory. The pass rush also contributed three sacks, with James Reinbold recording 1.5 sacks and causing pressure at crucial moments.

BEYOND THE BOX SCORE: BROWN GAME

► With the win, Cornell's all-time record is 661-565-34, including 453-239-21 at home and 308-205-15 at Schoellkopf Field.

► The Big Red holds a 318-259-14 record in the month of October.

► Cornell upped its record to 52-433-1 all-time when trailing at the end of the third quarter.

► The Big Red 243-12 all-time when scoring at least 30 points.

► Cornell cut into Brown's lead in the all-time series, getting within 32-39-1 dating back to the program's first meeting in 1895.

► Cornell is now 6-6 all-time in overtimes, including 5-1 when it plays multiple overtimes and 5-2 at home.

► Trailing by 11 points in the fourth quarter (17-6), the Big Red posted its biggest comeback since falling behind Princeton 28-16 in the fourth en route to a 29-28 victory on Oct. 28, 2017 on the road.

► The win was the Big Red's first in an overtime game since defeating Brown 38-31 on Oct. 20, 2007 at Schoellkopf Field.

► Cornell has never played more than two overtimes in a game.

► Cornell and Brown have played four overtime games, the most the Big Red has played against any opponent. The Big Red is 3-1 in those games.

BEYOND THE BOX SCORE: BROWN GAME (CONTINUED)

► The 3:46 game time marked the fifth-longest game in school history by time.

► The Big Red posted 503 yards of offense, its first contest with at least 500 yards since piling up 569 against Penn on Nov. 9, 2024.

► The team's 346 passing yards marked the 68th 300-yard game in school history.

► The Big Red's 94 offensive plays marked the third time in the past two seasons that it ran at least 90 plays (92 at Bucknell in 2024, 96 at Yale in 2025).

► Cornell's 31 first downs are the most in a game since Cornell had 33 in a double overtime win against Brown in 2007 and were the most in a game under head coach Dan Swanstrom.

► The Big Red's defense allowed fewer rushing yards than rushing attempts (32 yards on 33 carries) for the first time since it held VMI to -2 rushing yards on 25 carries in 2022.

► The 32 rushing yards allowed marked the sixth time under defensive coordinator Jared Backus that an opponent gave up less than 40 rushing yards in a game.

► Freshman **Ryan Matulevich** set a Cornell freshman record with his 100-yard receiving game, breaking the previous mark of 97 yards by Eric Gallman II at Yale in 2017.

► Matulevich is the first Big Red player to reach 100 receiving yards in his first collegiate start since Davon Kiser posted 145 yards on five catches at Lehigh in the 2023 opener as a sophomore.

► Sophomore **Jordan Triplett** became the first Big Red running back to score three touchdowns in a game since Chris Walker reached the end zone three times at Columbia on Nov. 12, 2016.

► Triplett also became the second Big Red player to score a pair of overtime touchdowns, joining Brad Kiesendahl against Lafayette in a 41-34 victory on Oct. 18, 1997.

► Junior **Garrett Bass-Sulpizio** piled up 416 yards of total offense, the 18th 400-yard game in school history and most since Jameson Wang piled up 449 yards vs. Penn in 2024.

► Bass-Sulpizio threw for 346 yards, the 54th 300-yard passing game in school history. The 346 yards ranks as the 23rd-most in a single game.

► Bass-Sulpizio has rushed for a touchdown in four straight games, the first Big Red player to do that since Jameson Wang in 2024. He has five touchdowns over that span.

► Junior defensive back **Braylon Howard** had a pair of pass breakups, the second time in three games with multiple knockdowns. He now has six in three Ivy games this year and eight overall.

► Junior **Johnny Williamson**'s four tackles for loss are the most by a Big Red player since Taylor Betros also registered four against Dartmouth on Nov. 3, 2012. It was the 16th individual game with at least four tackles since 1983 and is tied for fifth all-time in a single game.

► **Keith Williams Jr.** had an interception in his second straight game, with three overall. The last time a Big Red player had interceptions in multiple games was Brody Kidwell in 2023 (Bucknell and Brown). The last time a Cornell player had three interceptions in the span of two weeks (besides David Jones' three interception game at Penn in 2017) was Nick Gesualdi with one at Harvard in 2016 and two vs. Sacred Heart the following week.

PRINCETON, N.J. (11/2/2024)-- Cornell football led 21-0 at the end of the first quarter and never looked back en route to a 49-35 victory on the back of 477 yards of offense. A well-balanced offense had six different Cornell athletes combine for seven touchdowns. With the win, The Big Red improves to 3-4 (2-2 Ivy), while Princeton falls to 2-5 (1-3 Ivy).

Senior quarterback Jameson Wang led the way for the Big Red offense, completing 23-of-30 passes for a 76.7 percent completion rate. He accumulated 262 yards and three scores through the air. In addition to his pass game, Wang rushed six times for 31 yards and a touchdown. Junior running back Robert Tucker III led the ground game with 64 yards on 14 carries and a touchdown. Sophomore running back Ean Pope rushed 11 times for 61 yards and a house call. Senior running back Eddy Tillman rounded out the Big Red's major rushers with six carries for 29 yards and a touchdown. Sophomore receiver Samuel Musungu had eight catches for 165 yards and a touchdown, including a game-long 82-yarder. Sophomore tight end Ryder Kurtz caught five passes for 38 yards and two scores. Tucker III posted one catch for 30 yards, the longest of his career. Junior linebacker Joey Cheshire led the Cornell defense with eight stops. Senior linebacker Luke Banbury and sophomore safety Johnny Williamson each followed with seven tackles apiece. Senior safety Damon Barnes and senior defensive lineman Hunter Sloan each tallied two tackles for loss. Sloan's were both sacks. Barnes recovered a fumble and senior defensive back Michael O'Keefe and senior defensive lineman Ezekiel Evans each forced their first-career fumbles.

BEYOND THE BOX SCORE: BROWN GAME (CONTINUED)

- **James Reinbold** was in the mix for 1.5 sacks, his second game this season in on multiple sacks. The last Big Red player with multiple sacks in multiple games in the same season was Miles Norris in 2014 (against Colgate and Lehigh).
- Senior **Matheson Pich**, who entered the game without a catch, hauled in six passes for 78 yards.
- Junior All-American tight end **Ryder Kurtz** had five catches for 81 yards, pushing him to 60 career catches for 782 yards. He is now seven receptions and five yards, respectively, from breaking Cornell tight end records.
- Senior Davon Kiser upped his career total to 959 all-purpose yards for the Big Red and is just 41 away from becoming the xx player to hit 1,000 for a career.
- With eight tackles against Brown, senior **Damon Barnes** upped his career total to 143, good for 74th all-time at Cornell.
- Senior **Joey Cheshire** added three tackles to his career totals and now stands at 108, tied for 125th all-time and 14 away from joining the top 100.
- With his seven tackles, senior **Michael O'Keefe** has increased his career total to 93 and is just seven away from becoming the 146th player in the Big Red's 138-year history to hit the century mark for their career.
- Freshman **Jonathan Roost**'s 25-yard field goal with 46 seconds remaining in regulation was the 11th field goal in the final minute to win a game or send the contest to overtime in Big Red history. The last time it happened to send a game to OT was when Brad Greenway's 40-yard-field goal with five seconds left split the uprights at Colgate in 2011 to knot the game at 28-28. Colgate won in overtime, 35-28.

ROOKIE OF THE WEEK

- Cornell football freshman wide-out **Ryan Matulevich** was named Ivy League Rookie of the Week following his performance against Brown on Saturday, Oct. 25, the league office announced on Monday.
- Matulevich made his collegiate debut against the Bears and led the Big Red with six catches for 100 yards, setting a Cornell freshman record for yards in a game, breaking the previous mark of 97 set by Eric Gallman II at Yale in 2017.
- Matulevich is the first Big Red player to reach 100 receiving yards in his first collegiate start since Davon Kiser posted 145 yards on five catches at Lehigh in the 2023 opener as a sophomore.

PLAYER OF THE WEEK

- Cornell sophomore linebacker **Keith Williams Jr.**, was named Ivy League Defensive Player of the Week on Monday, Oct. 20 following his two-interception, nine-tackle performance last Saturday against Bucknell.
- The sophomore became the first Big Red linebacker to record two interceptions in a game since olt Fletcher '24 at Lehigh on Sept. 16, 2023.
- He is the first Cornell football Defensive Player of the Week since former teammate Luke Banbury '25 earned the designation last November.

HIGH-VALUE KURTZ-ENCY

- Cornell junior tight end and All-American **Ryder Kurtz** is among the best pass catchers in the Ivy League through four weeks, earning him a spot on Phil Steele's Midseason All-American First Team.
- He has hauled in 19 passes for 260 yards and three touchdowns, which ranks eighth among all pass catchers and first among all tight ends in the conference.
- Through his 14 game career he is averaging 3.9 receptions and 50.1 yards per game.
- His seven career touchdown catches are the most by a tight end in Cornell football history.

BIG RED DEFENSE

- **(#3 nationally, #2 Ivy)** - The Big Red have been outstanding at limiting opponent first downs, allowing just 109 total, which ranks third in the entire nation and demonstrates their ability to consistently force three-and-outs.
- **(#48 nationally, #5 Ivy)** - Allowing just 364.5 yards per game, Cornell boasts one of the better defenses in the FCS, with particularly impressive rushing defense (#33 nationally, #4 Ivy) at 130.7 yards allowed per game.
- **(#19 nationally, #3 Ivy)** - Cornell has been excellent at bending but not breaking, holding opponents to just a 74.1% red zone scoring rate, forcing crucial field goals and stops in high-leverage situations.

DISCIPLINED PLAY

- **(#12 nationally in fewest penalties, #5 Ivy)** - Cornell has committed only 35 total penalties with 295 penalty yards (#13 nationally, #6 Ivy), showing excellent discipline and coaching that keeps drives alive and prevents self-inflicted setbacks.

DAWGS ON DEFENSE

- **Keith Williams Jr.** has been an elite ball hawking line backer each of the last two weeks ranking **#3 nationally** in interceptions per game
- He has 0.50 interceptions per game (3 total through 6 games and 3 in the last 2).
- **Braylon Howard** - Lockdown Cornerback **(#4 nationally in passes defended, #1 Ivy)** - Howard has been dominant in coverage with 1.5 passes defended per game, ranking in the top 5 nationally and establishing himself as one of the premier defensive backs in the FCS, while also contributing a fumble recovery.
- **Johnny Williamson** - Tackling Machine **(#52 nationally in tackles for loss, #4 Ivy)** - Williamson has been disruptive in the backfield with 1 tackle for loss per game, also contributing a fumble recovery to rank among the team's most impactful defensive players.

RED ALERT

- **Doryn Smith** remains Cornell's most dynamic offensive weapon, leading the team with 4.33 receptions per game **(#71 nationally, #6 Ivy)** and contributing 21.2 yards per kickoff return **(#50 nationally, #3 Ivy)**, though his all-purpose yards have dipped to 84.33 per game.
- **Brendan Lee** averages 5.2 yards per punt return **(#38 nationally, #2 Ivy)**, providing solid field position and ranking in the top third nationally among return specialists.
- **Ryder Kurtz** is the primary target with 56.8 receiving yards per game and 3 touchdowns **(#98 nationally, #4 Ivy)**, providing reliability in Cornell's limited passing attack.
- **Garrett Bass-Sulpizio** ranks **#67 nationally (#6 Ivy)** with 15.17 completions per game

IVY PRESEASON POLL

- After earning a share of the Ivy League crown in each of the past two seasons, Harvard has been selected as the preseason favorite in the 2025 Ivy League Football Preseason Poll. The poll was conducted among 16 media members who regularly cover Ivy League football.
- Harvard, one of three teams to share last season's title, received 114 points and garnered nine first-place votes. Dartmouth, which also claimed a share of the title the last two seasons, edged out Yale for second place with 105 points and four first-place votes. Yale followed closely with 103 points and three first-place selections.
- Columbia, fresh off its first Ivy League title since 1961, was picked fourth with 72 points.
- Rounding out the poll were Princeton (55), Penn (49), Cornell (42), and Brown (32).

PHIL STEELE PRESEASON ALL-IVY

- ▶ A total of eight Cornellians were selected to the Phil Steele All-Ivy preseason teams.
- ▶ Wideout **Samuel Musungu** and long snapper **Nolan Albright** were selected to the first team.
- ▶ **Ryder Kurtz** (TE), **Alan Zhao** (K), and **Caden Lesiewicz** (P) made the second team, and **Max Van Fleet** (DL), **Joey Cheshire** (LB), and **Jeremiah Lewis** (DB), were selected to the third team.
- ▶ The eight preseason honorees for the Big Red are the most since placing nine on the 2023 Phil Steele Preseason All-Ivy Teams.

NATIONAL NOTICE

- ▶ **Samuel Musungu** received multiple preseason honors, including preseason All-American honors from StatsPerform and FCS Football Central, while also being named to the Walter Payton Award Watchlist.
- ▶ **Ryder Kurtz** was received Preseason All-American third team honors from FCS Football Central.
- ▶ **Alan Zhao** was named to the Fred Mitchell Award Watchlist.
- ▶ **James Reinbold** has been named a semi-finalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy, college football premiere scholar-athlete award.

A LOOK IN THE REARVIEW

- ▶ Cornell finished the 2024 season with a 4-6 record.
- ▶ The Big Red ranked third in the Ivy League in total yards, passing yards, and points per game in 2024.
- ▶ Cornell was 4-1 when leading after three quarters of play and when leading in time of possession, 4-0 when rushing for more yards than its opponent and putting up more total yards than its opponent.
- ▶ The Big Red's only loss in 2024 when leading in time of possession came in the season finale at Columbia.
- ▶ Cornell 's Luke Banbury and Jameson Wang recieved All-Ivy recognition a season ago.
- ▶ Wang was a finalist for Waltor Payton Award and one of three finalists for the Bushnell Cup as Ivy Offensive Player of the Year.
- ▶ The Big Red posted a 2-3 record at Schoellkoph and a 2-3 record away from home.
- ▶ Cornell finished the Ivy season 3-4 overall, placing fifth.
- ▶ A total of 84 players return from 2024.

- ▶ Cornell football began in 1887 and has played 136 seasons (missing only 1918 and 2020). The program boasts an impressive legacy.
- ▶ 5 national titles (1915, 1921, 1922, 1923, 1939)
- ▶ 659-560-34 overall record (.542), ranking 16th among FCS schools
- ▶ Only Ivy League school ranked #1 in AP Poll (three weeks in 1940).
- ▶ Legendary coaches: Glenn "Pop" Warner (#11 all-time), Gil Dobie, Carl Snavelly, George Seifert
- ▶ Ed Marinaro: 1971 Heisman Trophy runner-up, ranked #126 greatest player by ESPN
- ▶ Three of FCS's top 20 most-played rivalries; Cornell-Penn: 131 games (5th most), Cornell-Columbia: 111 games (14th), Cornell-Dartmouth: 107 games (19th).

- ▶ The "Fifth Down Game" (1940): After beating Dartmouth 7-3 on an inadvertent fifth down, Cornell reviewed film and voluntarily forfeited the win—the only time a college game was decided off-field after completion.

During the 19th century, many of Cornell's athletic teams trained on Percy Field, where Ithaca High School now stands. During the early 1900s, though, Cornell's population grew quickly and Percy Field was no longer suitable for the growing number of Cornell athletes.

Gradually, the idea of having adequate athletic facilities on campus developed. The Alumni Field Committee was created to consider this possibility and they persuaded the University set aside land for a field. The committee "strove, pled, and prayed" for donations to the proposed athletic facilities.

Because of a generous donation from **WILLARD STRAIGHT** '01, the construction of a field house was made possible. The contribution came in memory of his friend, **HENRY (HEINIE) SCHOELLKOPF** '02, an outstanding football player and a "beloved gentle giant." It is said that he once dove 70 feet into a gorge pool to rescue a drowning dog.

The Schoellkopf family themselves then responded to Straight's donation and helped finance the project. Finally, construction of Schoellkopf Field, which would be on the highest point on campus, could take place. Schoellkopf Field was ready to open the fall of 1915. The University planned a huge parade from the Arts Quad to the field for the dedication exercises and opening football game. Everyone in Cornell undergraduates, faculty and staff, in addition to alumni and invited guests was expected to participate.

On Saturday, Oct. 9, 1915, all campus activities were suspended at noon. An estimated crowd of 6,000 quickly gathered in front of Goldwin Smith Hall as instructed by the University. President **JACOB GOULD SCHURMAN** slowly led the procession to the awaiting Schoellkopf Field. The impressive parade was the largest turnout of its kind in the Ithaca area at the time.

Exactly five years after the dedication, the General Electric Company completed work on a flood searchlight system for the field, which was designed to illuminate the field without causing glare visible to the players. The project was of major importance to athletic teams, especially in the fall and winter months, when shortened hours of daylight cut down after-class practice time.

Before 1915, the largest crowd to assemble for an athletic event in Ithaca was less than 5,000. The development of automobiles and improvement of roads brought larger and larger crowds to the stadium. Soon, it became apparent that Schoellkopf's capacity of 9,000 was no longer sufficient.

In 1921, a study and report was commissioned and in the spring of 1923, University trustees approved the plans to reconstruct the east side stands. Construction began that winter and in September, 1924, the Crescent was completed increasing capacity to 21,500. In June, 1947, permanent steel stands on the west side of Schoellkopf Field were built boosting total stadium capacity to 25,597.

Schoellkopf Field was one of the University's most valuable, but least used areas on campus until the introduction of an artificial turf. In early 1971, it was announced that an anonymous donor had made a gift for turf on Schoellkopf Field. The person who first benefited from the artificial surface was probably Cornell's star tailback **ED MARINARO** '72, who eventually broke every school rushing record. Expansion and growth for Schoellkopf Field continued. The new press box was built in 1986, and the stands were refurbished.

In 2006, the Big Red moved into the newly renovated Schoellkopf Memorial Hall, which includes an addition featuring new locker rooms, meeting rooms, a football tradition room and coaches offices. The 2008 season saw installation of FieldTurf synthetic grass to replace the artificial turf, while the West Stands were demolished and the field was moved 15 feet toward the Crescent in 2016 while replacing the FieldTurf to ready for future construction at the site.

Schoellkopf Field has become an irreplaceable part of Cornell's athletic tradition and campus.

SECOND YEAR AS HEAD COACH

Years at Cornell: Second Season

College: Rhodes College

DAN SWANSTROM was named The Roger J. Weiss '61 Coach of Cornell Football by **DR. NICKI MOORE**, the Meakem Smith Director of Athletics and Physical Education in December of 2023. Swanstrom becomes the 28th head coach in school history.

Under Swanstrom's leadership, Cornell posted a 4-6 overall record and 3-4 Ivy League mark in 2024, but the numbers that truly tell the story lie in the team's offensive transformation. The offensive-minded coach orchestrated a remarkable turnaround, elevating the Big Red from averaging just over 18 points per game in 2023 to more than 30 points per game in 2024. This explosive improvement propelled Cornell to third place in the Ivy League in total yards per game, passing yards per game, and scoring, while the rushing attack also cracked the conference's top five. Swanstrom coached two All-Ivy League First Team players in quarterback **JAMESON WANG** '25 and linebacker **LUKE BANBURY** '25.

Swanstrom spent five seasons as head coach at crosstown Ithaca College, compiling a 32-11 record and winning at least eight games in all four seasons. The Bombers won three Liberty League titles (2017, 2018 and 2021), claimed the ECAC Scotty Whitelaw Bowl title in his first season, and won the Cortaca game three times in four seasons. He played a part in scheduling the 2021 Cortaca game at MetLife Stadium, resulting in breaking the Division III attendance record (45,161). He was also involved in planning efforts the following year to play the contest at Yankee Stadium, which surpassed 40,000 fans. His players earned 43 Academic All-District honors and six were named All-Americans, succeeding in and out of the classroom.

Sandwiched around his head coaching stop with the Bombers were a pair of stints at the University of Pennsylvania, first as quarterbacks coach and recruiting coordinator (2014-16) and later as offensive coordinator (2022-23). Swanstrom was part of the 2015 and 2016 Ivy League championship teams at Penn as an assistant coach. He mentored Alek Torgersen to a pair of first-team All-Ivy nods as the quarterback became Penn's all-time leader in passing touchdowns (52) and total offense (7,937 yards). Torgersen spent time with four NFL teams following his career with the Quakers.

He returned to Philadelphia in 2022 as offensive coordinator, helping the Quakers jump from last to first in the Ancient Eight in total offense over two seasons. Penn set school records for most receptions and longest play from scrimmage in a game and had individuals ranked among the top five nationally in passing and receptions per contest. In his first season back, the Quakers improved by five wins (from 3-5 in 2021 to 8-2 in 2022) and finished second in the final Ivy League standings at 5-2, a year removed from a 1-6 season.

After moving from assistant coach to associate head coach for John Margraff's powerful Johns Hopkins teams from 2008-13, Swanstrom took over as offensive coordinator in just his second year on the sidelines. He helped the team to five conference titles, and he coached four Centennial Conference Offensive Players of the Year. His teams were ranked in the top 10 nationally in total offense three times and paced the conference four consecutive years, averaging better than 500 yards in three different seasons. Nearly every offensive team record in school history was broken during his tenure as the offensive coordinator and the total of individual records surpassed 75 during his tenure. The team also had great success, going 48-10.

Swanstrom began his coaching journey as an assistant coach at Stratford HS in Texas (2005) where he mentored former NFL No. 1 overall draft pick Andrew Luck. He parlayed that success into serving two seasons as a graduate assistant coach at the University of Redlands (2006-07). As quarterbacks and wide receivers coach, Swanstrom helped Redlands to the 2007 Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference title.

Swanstrom played his collegiate years at Rhodes College as the team's quarterback, being named a finalist for the Gagliardi Award as one of the 10 Division III football players for national player of the year as a senior. He finished his career as the Lynx's all-time leader on career total offense (8,347 yards) and third in passing touchdowns (55). His 2,634 passing yards as a junior when he was named conference co-Offensive Player of the Year was also a school single-season record. The two-time team captain and three-time all-league pick ranked in the top 10 in conference history in total offense, passing yardage, total offense per game and passing touchdowns. He was inducted into the college's Athletics Hall of Fame in 2019.

Following graduation, Swanstrom played in the German Football League with the Darmstadt Diamonds leading the team to the conference title.

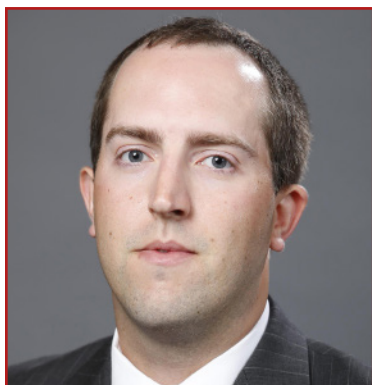

UNDER THE HELMET

James Reinbold

Senior Linebacker Anchorage, Alaska

Cornell football's first-ever letter winner from Alaska and 2025 Campbell Trophy nominee James Reinbold came to Ithaca knowing he would be playing football. What he didn't know was where his academic interests would lead him.

It didn't take long for Reinbold to find not one, but two passions away from the football field, deciding to double major in Government and Performing & Media Arts.

"During my freshman fall semester, still uncertain about my academic path, I enrolled in Comparative Politics and Introduction to Acting," he said. "Although I had little prior experience with either subject, both courses immediately captivated me."

Comparative Politics sparked his fascination with the legal system and governance, while Introduction to Acting reconnected him with his love for storytelling, a passion that only complemented his dedication to football.

That dedication starts bright and early for the senior linebacker. At 6:15 a.m., when campus is quiet and most Cornell students are still sleeping before their first class, Reinbold is up and heading to Schoellkopf to start his day. By 7 a.m., he's breaking down film and installing new plays and concepts, followed by either a walk-through on the field or a lift in the weight room.

By 10 a.m., after showering and grabbing breakfast, he's headed to class where he turns his attention to his studies, including a dedicated two-hour critical study window between morning and afternoon classes. By 1:25 p.m., he's back in the classroom, where he remains until practice starts at 4:45 p.m. and runs until about 7 p.m.

"Even after a full day of meetings, workouts, classes and practice, the evening remains just as important," Reinbold said. "I make it a point to get out of the locker room quickly, recover properly, grab dinner, and then jump back into my academics until around 10:15 p.m. Finally, I prioritize sleep, aiming for a full eight hours to recharge for the next day."

He pauses, then adds: "It's a demanding schedule requiring great efficiency and intentionality with your use of time. However, once your strong habits and routines become second nature, they set the foundation for success."

That mindset comes from words of wisdom shared by Associate Head Coach and The John B. and Ann M. Rogers '45 Defensive Coordinator Jared Backus.

"How you do anything is how you do everything."

"The qualities that have defined my success on the field, such as commitment, persistence, perseverance and grit, are the same qualities that guide my work in the classroom," Reinbold said. "The traits required to succeed in one inevitably strengthen the other. For instance, learning how to recover and bounce back after a tough exam has developed my resiliency and helped me overcome setbacks in football."

Reinbold's commitment to his studies has resulted in performances in seven theatrical productions and writing two screenplays of his own, including "Athlete," a football-centered film featuring several of his teammates that is currently being submitted to international film festivals.

But it's his legal work that has shaped his post-Cornell goals. Reinbold has spent three summers interning in the legal field, including two summers in Alaska's legal system — working at a private law firm, clerking for an Anchorage Trial Court judge, and most recently interning at Troutman Pepper Locke in New York City.

"Through my courtroom experiences during internships, I discovered that prosecution offers the most meaningful path for me to serve others," he said. "It provides an opportunity to make a direct, positive impact on my community."

After graduation, Reinbold plans to attend law school with the goal of returning to the Final Frontier as a prosecutor and bringing the same methodical preparation and commitment that have served him well on the field and in the classroom back to his home state.

The 6:15 a.m. alarms will eventually stop. The film sessions and two-a-day practices will become memories. But the foundation Reinbold has built at Cornell, along with the habits, the work ethic, the understanding that excellence in one area strengthens all others, will serve him well in whatever courtroom he finds himself.

As Coach Backus says, how you do anything is how you do everything.



UNDER THE HELMET

Kevin Ma

Senior Offensive Lineman Westford, Mass.

Kevin Ma thought he would be a business major when he arrived at Cornell. However, the universe had other plans for the Massachusetts native.

"The funny thing is coming into Cornell I thought I was going to be a business major," Ma said. "But when I got my offer I was told I was going to be going into the engineering school."

The senior offensive lineman, admittedly, was worried about the workload, but that quickly transformed into passion and curiosity about how the world around him works.

"I've always been curious about how the world around me worked, and engineering allowed me to grasp those things," he explained. "I ultimately chose Electrical & Computer Engineering because I thought it was the most versatile. There isn't a single industry that doesn't rely on something from ECE."

Ma has already experienced first-hand how vast the world of electrical and computer engineering can be through his internships. This past summer, he interned at Analog Devices, a semiconductor company where he learned about industry operations and built valuable connections. Two summers prior, he worked at ReelView Fishing, a startup that invented fishing line doubling as wire to connect live underwater cameras to smartphones.

"I got to work on a first-of-its-kind technology," Ma said. "It was a really fun and rewarding experience as I got to work really closely with the product and CEO."

Like Ma noted, there isn't a single industry that doesn't rely on ECE, but it goes beyond that for the offensive lineman who has seen deeper parallels between football and engineering. Going beyond the X's and O's, football and engineering share problem-solving under pressure and using different tools to achieve a common goal.

"On the field our coaches have taught us concepts, plays and schemes which all work together to create a productive offensive unit," he said. "As an engineer we have to solve different problems every day. These problems, like a defense, change and are never quite the same."

Just as different positions must work together on the field, engineering solutions require combining knowledge from different disciplines. "Often times, the solution to a problem isn't from a single field," Ma explained. "We need to apply different learnings from different classes, like the different positions on a field, together to solve the puzzle."

One thing that doesn't change is his dedication and commitment to excellence in the classroom. Ma earned a spot in Cornell's Athletics 400 Club for achieving a GPA above 4.0 in one semester and has made Dean's List five times. In high school, he was named a scholar-athlete for Massachusetts by the National Football Foundation and earned a spot on their National Team of Distinction.

Maintaining that excellence requires discipline. His day starts at 6:20 a.m. on football mornings, heading to facilities before breakfast and classes. After a full academic day, it's back to practice until around 7:45 p.m., followed by homework until midnight.

"Coach Swanstrom likes to say 'If you're doing it right, you don't got much time for anything else, but school and football,'" Ma said.

For his professors, it comes as a surprise that Ma continues to be a top student in the classroom and a main piece of the offensive line for one of the best offenses in the Ivy League.

"In the engineering space there are a lot of people and professors who are surprised," he said about reactions to his football career. "I think mainly because people don't associate playing football with being the best in the classroom."

That same methodical approach guides his post-graduation thinking. As he looks toward the future, Ma is considering Cornell's early Master of Engineering Program which would allow him to graduate with his master's degree next fall.

Then, it's time for the senior to figure out where he fits in the world. "I'm really not dead set on anything," he said. "I think for now I'm going to continue exploring the semiconductor industry, but AI has definitely piqued my interest. I'd say I'm still figuring it out, but I know God has a plan."

Beyond finding a career that excites him, Ma hopes to keep relationships he has built at Cornell and help his younger brother find his passions by helping pay for his college tuition. His faith, nurtured through his involvement with Fellowship of Christian Athletes, shapes his broader vision for the future.

"I hope that I'm excited by whatever work I'm doing and that I'm hungry to keep pushing and growing," he said. "I hope my friends and family are happy and healthy. And I hope that I'm living a life that glorifies the Lord Jesus Christ."

Through FCA, Ma continues giving back to the community while balancing the demands of Division I football and one of Cornell's most challenging academic programs.

From an unexpected path into engineering to exploring cutting-edge technology, Ma exemplifies the adaptability that defines both successful engineers and football players. Sometimes the best destinations are the ones you never planned to reach.



UNDER THE HELMET

Doryn Smith

Senior Wide Receiver Martinsburg, W.Va.

Doryn Smith will be the first person in his family to graduate college in a long time. More than that, he's only of only a handful of people from Martinsburg, West Virginia, to attend an Ivy League school.

Smith takes immense pride in being an example of what is possible coming from Martinsburg. That example starts with his work in the classroom as an American Studies major, a path he found after realizing Economics wasn't the right fit.

"American Studies fit better with my strengths since I've always been strong at reading and writing," Smith explained. "It's actually worked out well because it gives me a different way to think about communities and people, which ties right into what I want to do in commercial real estate."

The connection between studying culture, history and identity and commercial real estate might not be immediately obvious, but for Smith, it's about understanding people and markets from multiple perspectives. His internships and programs have reinforced that connection.

At Student Agencies, he worked as a marketing researcher, analyzing Ithaca's food scene and consumer behavior. He's also completed two commercial real estate programs, one with Eastdil Secured and another with Project Destined, giving him hands-on exposure to market analysis and deal structuring.

"Those experiences gave me practical skills that complement my academic background and push me toward a career in commercial real estate," he said.

The link between his studies and football runs deeper than just career preparation. American Studies has shaped how he navigates the locker room and, on the field, where he has to navigate and build relationships with over 100 teammates.

"American Studies has taught me how to look at things from multiple perspectives, how history, culture and identity shape the way people interact," Smith said. "That carries over to football, where you're constantly navigating different personalities and backgrounds to work toward a common goal."

The reverse is also true. Football has taught him discipline, resilience and performance under pressure, lessons that transfer directly to tackling complex papers and academic challenges.

"I treat it with the same focus and teamwork mindset I've learned on the field," he said.

Compared to some of his other teammates, Smith has a more spaced-out academic schedule, with a typical day consisting of two to three classes a day, and then just one class on Friday, spreading his schoolwork throughout the week, usually finishing most homework by Wednesday.

The schedule allows him to put more time into watching film, recovery, and mental preparation for both football and academics.

After Cornell, Smith plans to pursue professional football for a few years before transitioning into commercial real estate. But his ultimate goal extends far beyond personal success.

"I want to reach a point in real estate where I can return to Martinsburg and invest back into the community," he said. "I want to create an academic and athletic complex that gives kids the resources, opportunities and environment to achieve and elevate."

He envisions more than just a training facility. Smith wants to open an arcade to bring more fun spaces into the city and a brunch spot that adds to the local culture.

"For me, it's about using my platform and career to give back and create something lasting in the place that raised me," Smith said.

In five years, he sees himself playing professional football while laying the foundation for those long-term projects in Martinsburg.

His commitment to community extends to his time at Cornell, where he's involved with Men of Color in Athletics, which builds community and creates networking opportunities for student-athletes of color. He's also part of Fellowship of Christian Athletes, which keeps him grounded spiritually while giving him opportunities to serve alongside other athletes.

"Both groups have helped me grow as a leader and stay connected, not just to Cornell, but to something bigger than myself," he said.

From Martinsburg to Ithaca and eventually back home again, Smith is building more than a football career or a real estate portfolio. He's creating a roadmap for others from his hometown to follow, proving what's possible when you're one of the first to break through.

Damon Barnes
Senior Safety Bronx, N.Y..

Damon Barnes arrived at Cornell with something to prove. Not to anyone else, but to himself.

In his first year, he did just that, by winning the Freshman Scholar Athlete Award and earning multiple Dean's List certificates. The recognition meant more than just another line on a resume.

"These mean a lot to me because I proved to myself that my method to balance school and football works and that I could thrive academically and athletically as a freshman at one of the most prestigious universities in the world," Barnes said.

That early success set the foundation for his communication major, a path chosen with clear career aspirations in mind.

"I chose communication as my major because I was and still am very interested in working as a journalist for ESPN or in the front office of a sports team," he explained.

Barnes hasn't waited until graduation to explore those interests. He's already gained valuable experience, interning with the Chicago Sky of the WNBA in sponsorship and marketing, and working on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C.

"Both of these experiences opened my eyes to many different things," Barnes said. "From the different city experiences to the behind-the-scenes of a professional basketball team and meetings about issues in our country, I am grateful to have had those experiences."

The connection between his studies and football operates as a two-way street. His communication coursework has reinforced skills essential to both academic and athletic success.

"A lot of things like retaining information, time management, study habits, and an underrated aspect is developing relationships with other students in study groups or just in the class," Barnes said.

But football has given back just as much. The discipline and mental strength developed on the field carry directly into the classroom, especially on challenging days.

"Football has instilled in me the discipline and mental strength and focus I need to do things even when certain days aren't going my way," he said. "Being a student-athlete definitely teaches you more and more the longer you're able to do it and reflect on how far you've come."

Barnes keeps his daily schedule straightforward and efficient. He uses small breaks between classes to get ahead and stay ahead of all due dates on assignments. After classes, he either watches film, grabs food, or combines both by bringing food back while studying, watching film, and focusing on recovery.

While his internships have given him glimpses into a world outside of football, Barnes doesn't plan to hang up his helmet at the end of his collegiate career.

"I plan to pursue a career in professional football," he said. "It has always been a dream of mine that I vowed myself to chase no matter the circumstances."

In five years, he sees himself with a successful professional football career while giving back and causing positive change in various communities. Barnes has also thought about documenting his journey in a unique way.

"Sharing my story has been something I have grown to be proud of and I have thought many times about writing a book or making a documentary," he said.

His commitment to community extends to his time at Cornell, where he recently became a member of Men of Color in Athletics, an organization that builds community and creates networking opportunities for student-athletes of color.

From proving himself as a freshman to planning his professional future, Barnes has approached his Cornell experience with intention and purpose. Whether he ends up a journalist for the World-Wide Leader in Sports, behind the scenes in a front office, or continuing his football career, one thing is certain: he's already proven he can thrive under pressure at one of the country's most prestigious universities.

ALBANY, N.Y. — JoJo Uga ran for 126 yards and a touchdown and a late UAlbany interception sealed the Great Danes' 13-10 victory over Cornell on Saturday evening at Casey Stadium. The Great Danes improved to 1-3 while handing the Big Red a loss in its 2025 season opener.

Cornell nearly rallied from a 10-point deficit with under five minutes remaining, but late penalties and a turnover proved too much to overcome.

Trailing 13-3, the Big Red offense came to life. Page directed the team on a seven-play, 51-yard scoring drive that saw him go 3-for-4 for 40 yards, all heading in the direction of Kurtz, while keeping it himself three more times.

The quarterback tandem of Devin Page and Garrett Bass-Sulpizio combined to go 16-for-26 for 153 yards and a touchdown with Page throwing the score and adding a team-high 57 rushing yards on 10 carries. Junior All-America tight end Ryder Kurtz hauled in six passes for 68 yards and the 6-yard score with 3:38 remaining to get Cornell within a field goal.

The Cornell defense was the story for much of the evening, limiting the Great Danes to 268 yards on 71 plays, but was held on the field for 33:42 and gave up a late 43-yard score to Uga to ice the game.

NEW HAVEN, CONN. — Yale forced five turnovers in the second half, including a pick-six that sealed a 41-24 victory over Cornell (0-2, 0-1 Ivy) on Saturday at the Yale Bowl.

Cornell quarterback Devin Page completed 24-of-53 passes for 267 yards and two touchdowns but was intercepted four times. The junior also rushed for 34 yards and a score on 17 carries. Junior tight end Ryder Kurtz was Page's top target, hauling in five catches for 91 yards and a touchdown.

The game was tied 14-14 at halftime after both teams traded touchdowns in each of the first two quarters. Page opened the scoring with a 1-yard rushing touchdown in the first quarter, but Yale (2-0, 1-0 Ivy) answered quickly with Josh Pitsenberger's first score of the day.

Yale seized control in the third quarter with 13 unanswered points, including two field goals by Noah Piper and a 20-yard touchdown pass from Dante Reno to Jaxton Santiago that extended the Bulldogs' lead to 27-14.

The Big Red showed resilience with a seven-play, 80-yard touchdown drive in the third quarter that cut Yale's lead to 27-21. Page found Kurtz for a 21-yard touchdown pass to cap the drive.

Alan Zhao's 32-yard field goal with 9:32 remaining made it a three-point game at 27-24.

But Yale intercepted Page late in the fourth quarter to set up the Bulldogs at the Cornell 41-yard line. A quick five-play drive ended with Pitsenberger's four-yard touchdown run to make it 34-24.

Cornell's comeback hopes were dashed when Abu Kamara returned another Page interception 65 yards for a touchdown with 47 seconds remaining.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. – Despite holding nationally ranked Harvard to a season low in yards and points, Cornell fell to the Crimson 34-10 on Friday night at Harvard Stadium on ESPN, dropping to 0-4 overall and 0-2 in Ivy League play.

Harvard (4-0, 2-0 Ivy) controlled the game from the beginning, scoring on a fumble return on Cornell's first possession. The Crimson extended the lead to 14-0 in the second quarter on a two-yard touchdown catch by Ben Alvarez, capping a 13-play, 52-yard drive.

Harvard added a field goal to start the second half before Cornell finally broke through when junior quarterback Garrett Bass-Sulpizio finished off a nine-play, 64-yard drive with a one-yard rushing score to cut Harvard's lead to 17-7. The drive was highlighted by a 27-yard catch and run on fourth down by Johntu Reed, who finished the night with four catches for 45 yards.

Harvard answered with 17 unanswered points, including a 4-yard touchdown run by quarterback Jaden Craig and a 39-yard interception return for a score by Jack Donahoe with 47 seconds remaining to seal the victory.

Bass-Sulpizio went 18-of-30 through the air for 127 yards while carrying the ball 16 times for 30 yards and a touchdown, but was sacked three times and committed two turnovers. Junior tight end Ryder Kurtz added four receptions for 25 yards.

Defensively, senior Damon Barnes led Cornell with 12 tackles, while senior linebacker Joey Cheshire added 11 stops.

ITHACA, N.Y. – Behind a dominant rushing attack and a resilient second-half comeback, Cornell defeated Brown 30-24 in double overtime on Saturday afternoon at Schoellkopf Field, earning the Big Red its second win of the season and first Ivy League victory.

Cornell (2-4, 1-2 Ivy) trailed 17-6 entering the fourth quarter before rallying to force overtime, then outlasted Brown (3-3, 0-3 Ivy) in the extra periods to win its first overtime game since Oct. 20, 2007, also against the Bears.

Bass-Sulpizio finished 28-of-48 passing for 346 yards while rushing 19 times for 70 yards and a touchdown. Triplett led the ground attack with 64 yards and three touchdowns on 17 carries, while McAuliffe added 15 yards rushing and 31 receiving yards. Freshman Ryan Matulevich grabbed six passes for 100 yards.

On defense, junior Braylon Howard paced Cornell with nine tackles, while senior Damon Barnes added eight stops. Johnny Williamson recorded a sack and four tackles for loss.

The Big Red's comeback began late in the fourth quarter when junior quarterback Garrett Bass-Sulpizio capped an eight-play, 69-yard drive with a 10-yard touchdown run, then connected with freshman John McAuliffe on the two-point conversion to cut Brown's lead to 17-14 with 3:44 remaining.

Cornell forced a turnover on downs on Brown's ensuing possession and drove into field goal range, where freshman Jonathan Roost drilled a 25-yard field goal with 46 seconds left to tie the game at 17-17 and force overtime.
