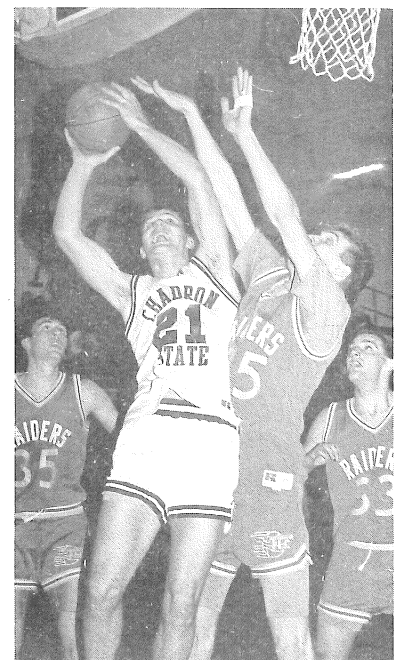
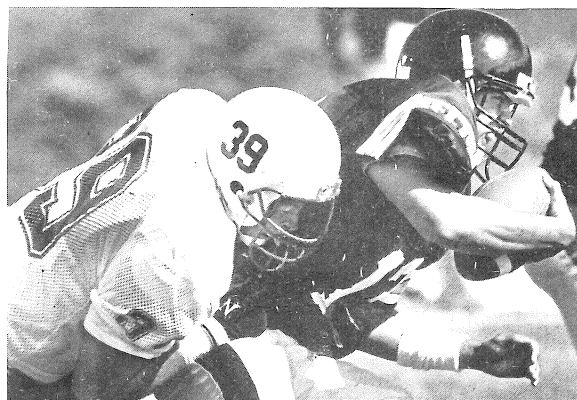

FOOTBALL TEAM LIVED UP TO EXPECTATIONS

Expectations were high for the 1990 Chadron State College football team when the season opened. After all, the 1989 Eagles had an 8-1 regular season record, were ranked No. 10 in the final NAIA Division II poll and reached the playoffs for the first time. Since that team included just six seniors, another outstanding year was anticipated.

At the end of the season, everyone agreed that the 1990 team certainly lived up to expectations.

Some of the highlights included:

- Winning nine games, the most at Chadron State since 1925, when the Eagles finished at 9-0.

- Being rated No. 7 in the final NAIA Division II poll, the highest ever, and being selected for the playoffs for the second year in a row.

- Setting six team records, including those for most points scored (406 in 10 games), most touchdowns (52), most rushing touchdowns (34), most first downs (209), most yards rushing (2,775) and most total net yards (4,796).

- Leading NCAA Division II in total offense with an average of 479.8 yards per game.

Over 20 more individual records were set, largely by tailback David Jones, quarterback Steward Perez and placekicker Jay Masek.

Jones led both NAIA and NCAA Division II in rushing with 1,570 yards. He concluded his career with 4,347 yards rushing, nearly 2,000 more than any other Chadron State player has ever accumulated. He averaged 7.0 yards per carry in 1990 and 6.0 for his career. He also scored 15 touchdowns last fall to tie a school record and finished his career with 35 for another CSC record.

The Casper, Wyo., product set CSC's single game rushing record of 302 yards as a junior. Nineteen times during his career he exceeded 100 yards rushing and six times he topped 200 yards.

Perez completed 136 of 243 passes for 1,968 yards and 15 touchdowns in 1990. During his three years at CSC, the Converse, Tex., quarterback has completed 386 of 705 passes for 5,543 yards and 47 TD's. His yardage and touchdown totals are new CSC records.

Masek scored 88 points this season to lead NAIA Division II in kick scoring. The 256 points that he scored in his career is another CSC record.

Jones and Masek are two of the 13 seniors on this year's team.

The architect of the outstanding season was Coach Brad Smith, whose first team at CSC in 1987 was 1-8, but whose last two teams have finished with a cumulative 17-2 regular season record. He said he was "super pleased" with the year.

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The only disappointment, he said, came when the Eagles didn't play up to their capabilities in the playoff game, a 28-3 loss to Dickinson State of North Dakota.

"We had a great year," said Smith. "I think we were improved in all phases over a year ago. I've never been around a group that worked as hard, and we accomplished a lot, I think everyone will agree. We'll graduate some of the best players you could ask for, but we've got some young reinforcements to help us have another good year in 1991. Success makes you greedy. We want to be better next year, of course."

Smith said finding replacements for the seven seniors who started on defense will be a priority. The list includes linebacker Corey Anderson, who led the Eagles in tackles three years and came up with 17 turnovers during his career.

Fellow linebacker Jason Irvine, ends Mark Wyman and Pete Marak, tackle Tim Lecher, nickelback Justin Fleetwood and strong safety Chris Anglin were the other senior starters on defense. The offense will miss Jones and Masek, guard Steve Loyd and fullback Lee Crawford, who rushed for 642 yards and scored 10 touchdowns in 1990.

LAST TWO CSC FOOTBALL TEAMS ACCOMPLISHED MUCH

The 1989 and 1990 football teams were Chadron State College's first to be ranked in the top 10 in consecutive seasons.

The '89 Eagles finished 10th and the '90 Eagles ranked 7th in the final NAIA Division II polls.

Those teams finished with regular season records of 8-1 and 9-1. The only other time CSC won 17 football games in two years was in 1924 and '25, when the Eagles were 8-1 and 9-0.

Dating back to the 1960s, just three Chadron State teams were ranked in the top 20 in the nation prior to 1989 and '90.

The 1977 team, which had an 8-2 record, finished 10th. The following year, the Eagles were 7-2-2 and were rated No. 16 in the final tabulations. The 1978 team became the Boot Hill Bowl champions.

The 1982 Eagles, who were 6-2, finished 18th in the final poll. That team depended heavily on its defense. It posted five shutouts and yielded just a field goal in its other victory.

All the rankings mentioned were in NAIA Division II.

The 1990 Eagles averaged 479.60 yards in total offense to lead NCAA Division II and rank second among NAIA Division II members. Their scoring average of 40.6 points ranked third in both NCAA and NAIA Division II and their rushing average of 277.50 yards was 7th in both listings.

LADY EAGLES HAVE ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL SEASON

In almost every sense of the word, the Chadron State College volleyball team had another successful season in 1990. The Lady Eagles posted a 24-17 record. That's the 17th time in the past 19 years that they have had a winning season.

The team was coached by Naomi Williams, who took over late in the summer after the previous coach resigned. She was familiar with the program when she took the job since she'd been the assistant coach in 1988 while working on her master's degree. She said she was pleased with her first year as the CSC head coach.

Strengths, she said, included the back row defense, hitting and overall team play. Shortcomings included blocking and serving.

The highlight was perhaps the team's 9-3 record against Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference competition, good for third place behind only Fort Lewis and Mesa State.

The team included three seniors--Gena Bales, Kim Lovelett and Corinne Kraus. Williams said they will leave some "tough shoes to fill," but said the Lady Eagles had lots of depth this year and will return some very talented younger players.

Bales was named to the RMAC's all-star team and was selected three times to all-tournament teams during the season. She led the Eagles in hitting percentage (.23) and blocking (.165).

Both Lovelett and Kraus had assist percentages of .28 while Kraus had the top serving percentage (.95) among the regulars.

Although a bit inconsistent early in the year, junior Roxie Boehm continued to establish herself as one of the top players CSC has had. She led the team in hitting kills with 446 and ace serves with 45. She also had the most digs with 571, nearly 150 more than any other member of the team.

LATE SEASON REBOUND BRIGHTENED MEN'S CAGE OUTLOOK

The past season had lots of ups and downs for the Chadron State College men's basketball team. The Eagles started the season on a high note, winning seven of their first 10 games, then went into a tailspin that saw them lose 15 of 16 games before rebounding to win three in a row near the end of the year.

The Eagles also lost their final game, a 91-78 decision to Concordia in the semifinals of the District 11 playoffs. Concordia went on to represent Nebraska at the NAIA National Tournament. The loss ended CSC's season at 11-19.

The record is about what was anticipated at the start of the season. The team had no seniors, just one full-time starter was returning and was faced with perhaps its toughest schedule ever as the Eagles entered the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference. However, it was expected that the wins and losses would be distributed a bit more evenly.

"We went into a slump and nearly dropped out of sight for a while," said Coach Bob Wood. "We had some injuries, a few of our players, particularly the freshmen, seemed tired and we lost our confidence. But I liked the way we bounced back at the end of the season. We played well down the stretch."

Wood also likes the Eagles' prospects for the future. He expects at least 11 of the 12 lettermen from this year to return and thinks the team will be vastly improved in 1991-92. The only player who may not return, Wood said, is postman Todd Workman, who has knee problems.

There are several things the Eagles need to improve upon, the coach said. Probably foremost is better shooting. The 44.5 field goal percentage is the lowest for a CSC team since 1974-75 and the 63.1 percent free throw shooting is the lowest since 1962-63.

By contrast, the opponents hit 48.4 percent from the field and 69.9 percent from the line last winter.

The Eagles also committed too many fouls. They were whistled for 837 while the foes were called for 696. The 141 difference, coupled with CSC's subpar free throw shooting, caused the Eagles to be outscored by 214 points at the line in 1990-91. The opponents made 757 free throws and CSC 543.

"We definitely need to cut down on our fouling," Wood said. "I hope the experience we gained this year can help with that. We were doing better at the end of the season."

Individually, the Eagles were led by 6-4 junior Josh Robinson, who averaged 21.7 points and 10.3 rebounds. He also had the best field goal percentage among the regulars, hitting almost exactly one-half of his shots (244 of 489). He also led the team in steals with 66. His hustle and hard work ethic were among the CSC highlights.

Robinson has now scored 1,483 points in his three years at CSC, and needs just 208 more to match Steve Coon as the school's all-time scoring leader. His rebound average is the highest at the college since Roosevelt Watkins grabbed 10.3 per game in 1976-77.

Also scoring in double figures were three players who were slowed by injuries the second half of the season, undoubtedly contributing to the string of setbacks. Dan Beebe averaged 14.3 points, J.J. Feddersen 11.8 and Jason Robinson 11.3.

Beebe was a junior and the other two were freshmen. Wood also likes the potential of freshmen Trevor Long and Russ Crafton. He believes both will make considerably greater contributions next year.

When Feddersen pulled a hamstring late in the year, junior Eric Glenn became the starting point guard and got Wood's nod as the team's most improved player. He led the Eagles in assists with 79.

Other team leaders included sophomore Kraig Blomme with 36 blocked shots, junior Eddie Sughrue with an 83.6 percent free throw percentage (46 of 55) and junior Brian Hope with a 66.2 percent field goal figure (43 of 65).

"Just about everybody made a contribution one way or another, Wood noted. "Our attitude and unity also were very good, even during the tough times."

EAGLES IN DISTRICT PLAYOFFS PAST TWO YEARS

Chadron State College's 91-88 triumph over Doane College in the opening round of the NAIA District 11 Playoffs this past year was the Eagles' first post-season victory since 1967, when Coach Mack Peyton's team knocked off the University of Omaha in two straight games to win the district championship.

Since then the Eagles had lost five straight playoff contests.

Overall, CSC is now 7-11 in district playoff action dating back to 1952. The tally includes the 91-78 loss to Concordia in the second round of the 1990-91 playoffs.

In both 1952 and 1967, the Eagles qualified for the national tournament in Kansas City by winning two playoff contests.

In '52, Coach Loy Young's Eagles beat both Hastings College 79-74 and Omaha 71-67 during a tournament held in Grand Island. The '67 district champions toppled Omaha 121-87 and 81-65 during a "home-and-home" arrangement.

The Eagles also reached the district playoffs in 1953, '54 and '56, when Young was the coach. They split their two playoff games in both '53 and '54, but lost twice to Hastings College in '56.

CSC's next trip to the playoffs was in 1958 under the late Dudley Draxton, but Hastings won 85-76 in the first round.

Peyton took the Eagles to a playoff game against Kearney to see which team would represent the Nebraska College Conference in the District 11 finals in 1971. Kearney won the contest, which was played in Scottsbluff, 81-69.

Twice in the early 1980s, the Eagles coached by Ed Sparling lost narrow decisions in playoff games. Hastings edged them 81-80 in 1980 and Wayne State nipped them 69-67 in 1981.

CSC's next date in the playoffs didn't come until 1987, when Concordia won over Bob Davis' team 98-77 in Chadron. In 1990, Midland beat Bob Wood's quintet 113-108 at Fremont in the first round of the playoffs.

Both Midland and Concordia, the teams that ended CSC's seasons the past two years, advanced to the NAIA National Tournament.

LATE SEASON INJURY WAS COSTLY TO LADY EAGLES

The women's basketball season at Chadron State College definitely could have ended on a happier note. The Lady Eagles lost five of their last six games, causing them to settle for a 13-13 record and knocking them out of the District 11 playoffs for the first time in three years.

It was easy to pinpoint a major reason for the late-season decline. Leading scorer Tricia Lukawski initially sprained one ankle, then injured the other one even worse a couple of games later. In four of the games following the first injury, the Eagles scored no more than 51 points, some 16 points fewer than their seasonal average through the first 20 games.

"Tricia's injuries probably cost us two or three victories," said CSC Coach Kip Cady. "We were 12-8 when she was hurt. A 13-13 season isn't very exciting, particularly after we'd gotten off to such a good start. But it was still an enjoyable year because the players got along so well and were fun to coach."

The Lady Eagles were 8-2 entering the holidays. Then came a steady diet of games in the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference. CSC had a 5-5 record in them until misfortune struck down the stretch.

Lukawski supplied almost a third of the CSC offense, although her scoring average slipped over two points a game following the injuries. The 5-8 sophomore guard from East Chicago, Ind., scored at least 20 points in 16 of the team's first 20 games.

She finished the season with a 20.3-point scoring average.

Although Lukawski was definitely the "star of the show," Coach Cady was quick to point out that several other players made contributions to the team.

Among them was senior center Ameer Williams, who averaged 12 points and 8.8 rebounds. She led the team in field goal shooting, hitting 53.9 percent.

Another big boost in the post area came from freshman Tes Spahr, who averaged 9.2 points and 8.6 rebounds, but was undoubtedly best known for her shot-blocking ability. She stopped 140 enemy shots, an average of 5.4 per game, and had a high of 12, easily a CSC record.

"She was our Patriot missile, and she certainly knocked down a lot of Scuds," Cady pointed out with reference to some hardware in the war with Iraq early in 1991. "She needs to work on some things and get on a weight program, but she can become a dominant college center. She's got a nice touch and moves well besides having a knack of blocking shots. She just needs to get stronger and more mature."

The starting lineup was rounded out by a pair of seniors from Wyoming who "paid their dues" by playing with the Eagles all four years and becoming regulars this winter. Shawnda Mead averaged 7.5 points and led the team in assists (92) and steals (51) while Marcia Moore averaged 7.3 points and 6.6 rebounds. Moore preserved at least two victories by making a pair of free throws late in the games.

An automobile accident knocked the Eagles for a loop in late summer, 1990. It sidelined Janice Eisenmenger, who had been a starting guard the year before, for the season. Without her, the Eagles lacked depth and had minimal outside shooting ability other than what Lukawski provided.

This was Cady's final year as the Chadron State coach. His contract cannot be renewed because of a state college policy that says faculty members must obtain at least 30 hours beyond their master's degree within seven years after joining the institution.

His overall record at CSC was 62 wins and 73 losses.

ROUGH TIMES MAY HELP CSC WRESTLERS

Chadron State College Wrestling Coach Scott Ritzen believes his team should benefit from some of the peaks and valleys it experienced during the 1990-91 season.

Ritzen noted that the Eagles opened the season very well, but ran into some problems in January and February.

"We were still competitive, but I didn't feel we lived up to our potential as a team some of the time late in the season," the coach said. "We had some wrestlers who felt they were having to lose too much weight and had another one or two who seemed to be distracted. Add those situations to quite a few injuries and we just weren't as good as we could have been."

Ritzen said he expects the Eagles to be better in 1991-92 because of their adversity this past season.

"We'll do some regrouping. I'm going to give the team more time off at Christmas, for instance. We're going to have some good wrestlers coming back and hope to add a few recruits who can help us immediately. I'm looking forward to next year."

A pair of seniors emerged as this year's team leaders. Brennan Schwenk and Steve Loyd won 26 matches apiece and shared the team's most valuable wrestler award.

Schwenk capped his career by placing sixth at 126 pounds at the NAIA National Tournament. He led the Eagles in team points with 77½ and in takedowns with 69. He concluded his career with a 64-47-2 record.

Loyd, the team's heavyweight, finished with a 60-42-2 record.

"I kept trying to find a bigger heavyweight, but Steve hung in there and proved me wrong. He's certainly been a solid team member the past four years," Ritzen said of Loyd.

Both sophomore Donny Seifried and junior Jon Hughes won 24 matches. Junior Mike Dean was 17-10 and junior transfer Todd Hallsted was 13-8-0, despite missing some matches at the end of the season because of health problems.

Ritzen is expecting all four to have big seasons next year.

"They're solid and should really do well," the coach said. "We've got some other young men who may also come around. Some of them, such as Kourt Hageman, were injured much of the season while a few of the others are still learning just how tough it is to be a successful college wrestler. I'm hoping they'll come around."

KAIL BOWMAN RECEIVES CLYDE BOND MEMORIAL AWARD

Kail Bowman was the 1991 recipient of the Clyde Bond Memorial Award at Chadron State College. The plaque is given annually to a CSC athlete who displays the outstanding character, attitude and sportsmanship that Bond possessed.

Bowman was a four-year letterman in the shotput for the Eagles. He was an All-American three times, placing fourth at the NAIA National Indoor Meets in both 1990 and '91 and third at the NAIA National Outdoor Meet in '91 with a career best throw of 55- $\frac{1}{4}$. He also was seventh in the shot at the National Outdoor Meet as a junior.

Bond was a native of Sheridan, Wyo., and was a pitcher for the CSC baseball team in the late 1970's. He had graduated from the college and was attending a Southern Baptist seminary in Louisville, Ky., when he was electrocuted on April 15, 1981, while mowing a church lawn. Bond's family and friends established the award that pays tribute to him and his beliefs.

CSC TRACK TEAM SET SEVEN SCHOOL RECORDS IN 1991

Chadron State College athletes set seven school records during the 1991 track and field season.

Three of the records were set in the shotput. Junior Dawn Brammer set new women's records of 44-5 indoors and 43-3 outdoors while senior Kail Bowman set a new men's indoor record of 54-8 $\frac{1}{4}$.

Both Brammer and Bowman placed fourth in the shotput at the NAIA National Indoor Meet to earn All-American honors. Bowman repeated as an All-American by placing third at the NAIA National Outdoor Meet with a career best throw of 55- $\frac{1}{4}$.

Bowman also was fourth at the national indoor meet in 1990 and was seventh at the 1990 national outdoor meet. In all four instances, his throws at the national meets were career bests by at least 16 inches. Coach Scott Noble noted that few athletes he knows have the capacity to always come through with their best at the big events the way Bowman was able to do.

Sophomore Caryn Martin set two new school records. One was in the 300-yard dash at 39.4 seconds during the indoor season and the other was in the 100-meter high hurdles at 14.46 seconds during the outdoor season. She also won the NAIA District 11 Heptathlon by 451 points in 1991.

Another individual record was set by sophomore Scott Pettit in the 800 meters outdoors. He ran the event in 1:54.90, and also was a member of the record-setting 3200-meter relay team that posted an 8:09.3 indoors. Running with Pettit on the relay were Shane Campbell, Corey Palmer and Todd Gentzler.

One of the Eagles' most improved athletes was sophomore shotputter Libi Malone. She had bests of 42-11 $\frac{1}{2}$ indoors and 42-2 outdoors. Both were at least 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ feet farther than her best throws as a freshman.

Another young member of the team who performed well was freshman Todd Zietlow. He had bests of 22-2 $\frac{1}{2}$ in the long jump and 44-7 $\frac{1}{2}$ in the triple jump. He won the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference's long jump indoors and the triple jump outdoors.

HAMMOND LED CSC RODEO ENTRIES IN 1990-91

Senior Justin Hammond won the steer wrestling in the Central Rocky Mountain Region of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association to highlight the 1990-91 rodeo season at Chadron State College.

Hammond became the 40th Chadron State student since 1970 to place first or second in the region and thus qualify for the NIRA Finals. Those students qualified a total of 52 times, counting the times when they qualified in more than one event.

Hammond's horse, Ace, was selected as the best in the region by his fellow steer wrestlers for 1990-91.

At the finals rodeo, the first steer Hammond drew "set up" while his time in the second go-round was 7.7 seconds.

Hammond placed among the top three in steer wrestling at six of the 10 rodeos in the region during the season, and won first twice. He also placed second once and third once in calf roping.

MANY HONORS FOR CSC ATHLETES

Besides the All-American and Scholar-Athlete honors, Chadron State College athletes harvested numerous other special awards during the 1990-91 school year.

One of them was another All-American honor. Linebacker Jason Irvine was named to the 1990 National Strength and Conditioning Association's All-American squad. He was the first CSC athlete to win the honor.

Football player David Jones, one of the All-Americans and the leading rusher in NAIA Division II and NCAA Division II in 1990, was one of nine finalists for the 1990 Harlon Hill Trophy given to the NCAA Division II Football Player of the Year.

Jones, along with linebacker Corey Anderson, placekicker Jay Masek and offensive guard Mike Sorensen, were named to the Omaha World-Herald's all-Nebraska NAIA first-team. Jones and Peru State's Nate Bradley were selected as the offensive co-captains of the all-star team.

The second-team included tight end Pat Nickodemus, offensive tackle Bill Boness, defensive linemen Tim Lecher and Mark Wyman and safety Jerome Hyatte.

Jones, Anderson and Boness were placed on the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference's first-team for 1990. Jones and Anderson were unanimous choices.

Second-team RMAC choices were Masek, Lecher and Hyatte.

In other football honors, Masek was selected as the NAIA Division II Player of the Week after scoring 21 points against Carroll College. Football Gazette selected him as its NAIA Division II Special Teams Player of the Week following that game.

Anderson was tabbed as the RMAC Defensive Player of the Week following his performance against Wayne State while Jones got the offensive award after the Eagles defeated Doane College.

The World-Herald named Tricia Lukawski to its Nebraska women's all-star basketball team that was chosen from among the players at all the four-year colleges in the state with the exception of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and Creighton University.

Josh Robinson was named to the all-Nebraska NAIA basketball team by the Omaha newspaper.

Lukawski was selected to the RMAC's first-team all-conference team while Robinson and Ameer Williams were second-team choices.
