'REBUILDING YEAR' BECAME MUCH MORE THAN THAT

What was supposed to be a rebuilding year turned out to be much more than that for the Chadron State College football team in 1992.

The Eagles were in the thick of the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference race until late October and officially finished with a 7-3 record, not counting a victory over the University of Mexico in an exhibition game to open the season.

They finished 5-2 in the conference.

"We surprised a few people," said CSC Head Coach Brad Smith. "We were picked to finish sixth in the RMAC (eight teams) by both the media and the coaches in their pre-season polls. We had just eight seniors, so it wasn't so much that they were wrong. It's just that we played better than a lot of people thought we would."

Despite breaking in a new quarterback, fullback, four offensive linemen and two wide receivers, the CSC offense clicked well all season.

The Eagles averaged 413 total net yards, giving them over 400 yards of offense per game for the fourth straight year.

Meanwhile, the defense improved as the season progressed, overcoming a penchant for giving up big plays that were troublesome in the early games.

During the first four games, the opponents had 15 plays of 31 yards or longer while in the final six the Eagles permitted just five plays of that length or more.

Smith said another big improvement came with the special teams.

Freshmen Scott Doyle and Lynn Wendelin showed a lot of promise while handling the placekicking and punting, respectively.

The coach also cited seniors such as Jason Nickal, Jim Switzer and Dave Melchior for the pride and dedication they exhibited while "taking charge" of the special teams.

Kickoff returns was one of the big improvements in special teams play. Led by Jeff Palser and Todd Ziettlow, both of whom averaged right at 25 yards a return, the Eagles nearly doubled their yardage on kickoff returns in '92 from the previous year.

Junior tailback David McCartney had one of the best seasons any Chadron State gridder has ever had. He rushed 267 times for 1,359 yards, second high in CSC history, and scored 25 touchdowns and two conversions for 154 points, both school records.

His 15.4-point per game average led NCAA Division II in scoring.

Although the opponents definitely "keyed" on McCartney much of the season, the Eagles had enough versatility and strength in the offensive line, which was led by senior Guy Earle, to allow him to gain over 100 yards in nine of the 10 games.

Fullback Jason Sleep averaged 5.7 yards a carry and quarterback Trevor Long completed 159 of 282 passes for 2,064 yards.

The Eagles were well-stocked with receivers, led by rugged Joe Planansky with 45 receptions for 609 yards. Freshman Cory Brooks was next with 32 catches for 495 yards while both Brennan Uehling and Tom Potter also caught more than 20 passes and Sleep grabbed 17 from his fullback post.

Another area where the Eagles really sparkled was turnovers. They lost the ball just 19 times while the defense claimed 31 enemy possessions, getting 18 interceptions and 13 fumbles.

Sophomore Cody Gamble swiped eight of the enemy passes while classmate Shane Campbell came up with five.

The team's tackle leader was sophomore linebacker Chad Johnson with 92. Junior Jason Funk was second with 76.

Junior end LeMoine Ferguson led the Eagles in applying pressure on the opponents' passers. He was credited with 11½ tackles for losses.

As good as the Eagles were in 1992, they had to only look back to the Western State game to know that there's room for improvement. They trailed 35-0 at halftime and and lost 49-21.

"We've got a great nucleus of young players coming back next year," said Coach Smith. "But we have to reach another level if we're going to be the best in the conference (next fall). I really think that's possible."

VOLLEYBALL PLAYERS EARN COACH'S PRAISE

Recordwise, the 1992 season wasn't among the best for the Chadron State College volleyball team. However, Coach Naomi Williams said the Lady Eagles were comprised of excellent individuals and she believes better days are ahead for them.

"You couldn't find a neater group of people anywhere," the coach said. "They have great attitudes, they work hard and they have great unity. Everybody got along. Even though I would have liked to have won a lot more matches, this was a very enjoyable year in my viewpoint."

The Lady Eagles finished at 15-23. This marks just the third time in the past 21 years that the Chadron State volleyball team hasn't had a winning record.

Take away the first and last weekends of the season and the Eagles would have been 14-14. They got off to a slow start during a trip to eastern Nebraska and then lost all five matches against some strong competition at a tournament hosted by the University of Nebraska-Kearney to conclude the season.

The schedule was undoubtedly the strongest in CSC history as it competed against more NCAA members than ever before.

Williams said her team played much better during the second half of the season, despite the losses in the season finale.

She pointed out that entering October the Eagles had a hitting percentage of about 16. By the season end it was up to 21, the same as it was a year earlier when CSC finished with a 30-20 record.

This year's percentage climbed, she said, as the passing and setting improved. Poor passing, she said, was a major problem early in the campaign.

The Eagles switched back to their old 5-1 offense about mid-season after opening the season with a 4-2.

Statistically, the Eagles were led in several categories by outside hitters Wendy Grint Alexander and Dawn Hutchins.

Alexander had the highest hitting percentage (27), most serving aces (45), and digs (440).

Hutchins, one of just two seniors on the team, tied with freshman Jennifer Vasey for the best serving percentage (.9366) and had the best receiving percentage (.89).

Both were second-team all-Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference selections.

Both of the setters, Stacey Drabbels and Shelley Stahl, improved their assist percentages considerably from a year ago. Drabbels went from 32 to 38 percent and Stahl from 31 to 34 percent.

Williams said the loss of transfer Brenda Schwarzkopf to a shoulder injury that required surgery in mid-September was a setback. At the time Schwarzkopf was sidelined, she had the team's highest hitting percentage (25).

Her anticipated return and the potential shown by this year's team encourages Williams as she looks forward to next season.

"We need to do a lot of work, but we've got the potential to win the conference next season if we do our homework," Williams said. "We already work together well and get along well. Now we just need to sharpen our skills throughout some hard work."

The other senior besides Hutchins was Jacki Knaub, who was a scrappy backrow defender and was nominated for Academic All-American.

CSC WOMEN'S BASKETBALL TEAM MADE GREAT TURNAROUND

After the 1991-92 season when Murphy's law seemed to prevail, the Chadron State College women's basketball team put together its best season in the history of the sport during the past year.

The Lady Eagles went from a 7-22 overall record and a 3-9 Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference mark a year ago to an 18-9 seasonal record and a 10-2 conference configuration in 1992-93.

The latter tied them for first place in the league. The year before they finished next to last. The conference title was the first for a CSC team since it joined the RMAC in 1990-91.

Coach Bunny Rider guided the turnabout largely by adding freshmen to a trio of returning starters who had suffered through the previous year when an assortment of injuries and illnesses shredded the team.

The chemistry proved to be right and the Eagles flew high.

"I'm so proud of this team's achievements," said Rider. "We set some lofty goals and we were able to exceed most of them. For instance, we wanted to win 16 games and we won 18. Our goal was to go 9-3 in the conference and we went 10-2."

The '92-'93 Eagles improved a great deal both offensively and defensively. Their offensive output climbed 16.6 points a game and the opponents' average dropped 6.4 points.

Their scoring average of 83 points led the conference and ranked 10th in the nation. They also led the conference in scoring margin, 12.4 points; field goal shooting, 45.8 percent; and field goal defense, 37.6 percent.

The CSC women also led the league in three-point percentage at 39.8 and were second in free throw shooting at 66.3.

"Defense was the cornerstone of our team's play," said Rider. "It's nice to be able to put points on the board, and we were able to do that most of the time. But it's also nice to have a lot of players and a system that can apply pressure on the other team and keep you in the game when the offense is struggling. Because of our defense, we were 'in' every game we played."

The Eagles were led by their only senior, Tricia Lukawski, one of the top small college players in the country. She received the vote as the RMAC's top performer from every conference coach.

Lukawski averaged 19.7 points while hitting 46.5 percent of her total field goal attempts, 43.6 percent of her three-pointers and 74.2 percent of her free throws.

For her career, she tallied 1,869 points, an average of 18.7 per game.

She also set a great example for her teammates with her all-out, tenacious play in every game.

Next on the CSC scoring chart were Shauna Smith, the team's only junior, and Lorna Dahlgren, a sophomore. They joined Lukawski as returning starters.

Smith averaged 13.2 points and led the team in field goal shooting at 50.7 percent and rebounding at 5.8 a game.

Dahlgren averaged 12 points, led in assists with 108 and in steals with 62.

As noted earlier, most of the rest of the players were new in 1992-93.

A boost came when 6-3 center Tes Spahr returned after missing the previous season with a shoulder injury. Help in the backcourt arrived in the form of petite Lacy Orpin, a sophomore transfer from a Kansas junior college.

The other regulars were freshmen that Rider rounded up. Each seemed to fill a slot as the coach shuffled them in and out of the lineup.

Lisa Arnett started most of the time while Ginger Baird, Jeanne Weeder, Sara Kellar, Jennifer Vasey and Dacia Zohner all helped write the success story.

CSC MEN'S BASKETBALL TEAM FINISHED STRONG

It took some time to fill a major void left over from the previous year, but the Chadron State College men's basketball team came on strong to wrap up the 1992-93 season on the upbeat.

Five straight victories late in the campaign helped the Eagles finish with a 12-16 record and raise expectations for next year. The outlook is particularly bright since the 1992-93 team included just one senior.

The Eagles lost to some good teams. Eleven of the 16 setbacks were to teams that won at least 20 games. CSC played some of its best basketball against Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference opponents, forging a 7-5 record, good for third place.

Replacing all-time leading scorer Josh Robinson, who graduated in May 1992, took more doing than was originally anticipated, Coach Bob Wood pointed out.

"Of course, I knew we had lost a great player, but I thought we'd be able to adjust to his loss quicker than the way it turned out," Wood said.

Robinson, who played the post, was Chadron State's all-time leading scorer and third leading rebounder when he graduated. With him missing from the middle, the opponents soon learned they could concentrate their defenses more toward the perimeter, where CSC had most of its firepower this past season.

The additional pressure undoubtedly contributed to a decline in the Eagles' shooting percentages and made winning a chore during much of the season.

Even after shooting over 50 percent from the field in four of the five late-season victories, the Eagles still hit just 43.8 percent of their field goal tries for the year. That's down 3½ percent from the year before and is the lowest for a Chadron State team since 1974-75.

Their three-point marksmanship of 34.7 percent is the lowest since the shot became a part of basketball's weaponry in 1987-88.

Injuries and illness hampered the Eagles, too.

It was hoped that senior V.J. Brosius, Stapleton, could overcome tendinitis of the knees to help take up the slack at center, but that didn't work out. After seeing limited action in four games, he was forced to give up the sport.

Two redshirt freshmen who were being prepared for the battles in the middle also were sidelined much of the time.

Jeff Tophoj missed the first nine games because of arthroscopic surgery on his right knee and then missed the final six after undergoing the same procedure on his other knee. Tracy Heiman missed several games because of the flu and a kidney infection and was below par in a number of others.

Despite those problems, Wood feels both Tophoj and Heiman have bright futures.

Wood also notes that two of three top offensive players were slowed by injuries much of the season. Guard J.J. Feddersen was coming off full-fledged knee surgery and while forward Jason Robinson was slowed by a painful hip and back problem.

Another junior, Russ Crafton, emerged as the team's leader. He averaged 19.5 points while hitting 47.4 percent from the field, including almost 43 percent of his three-pointers, and 77.8 percent of his free throws.

Crafton's 85 three-pointers is a new school record as were the 12 that he made while tallying 48 points against Adams State in early February. The scoring total ranks second to Josh Robinson's 51 on the all-time CSC list.

Crafton also demonstrated his defensive prowess by coming up with 62 steals.

With a season to go, Jason Robinson, Crafton and Feddersen already rank among the top 25 scorers in CSC history. Robinson is 14th with 1,121 points, Crafton is 20th with 995 and Feddersen is 21st with 913.

Freshman Jeremy Robinson, younger brother of Josh and Jason, came on strong late in the season to average 8.9 points and help take up the slack for the departure of his oldest brother. The Eagles also got some good minutes in the middle from junior Jack Whitefoot and on the perimeter from Tim Stevens and Tim Flanigan although both were bothered by inconsistency at times.

This year's lone senior after Brosius was lost, Kraig Blomme was a defensive specialist, blocking 86 shots during the past three years.

SENIORS, ALL-AMERICAN MADE WRESTLERS VERY COMPETITIVE

Led by a group of steady seniors, the Chadron State College wrestling team was very competitive 1992-93.

The Eagles undoubtedly had their toughest schedule on record and that kept their statistics from glistening. However, Coach Scott Ritzen said he was pleased with the team's performance.

"We had a good group of both veterans and youngsters. They hung together and competed very well considering the caliber of the competition that we met. We upgraded our schedule to meet NCAA Division II standards and most of our statistics were every bit as good as we'd had the year before when we had an easier schedule. Therefore, I know we were improved," Ritzen said.

The coach said he's appreciative of the contribution by the four seniors and believes the freshmen who joined the team will develop into another solid group.

The fact that sophomore Travis McDermott placed at the NCAA II National Tournament this year was another plus.

The seniors included Jon Hughes, now a four-year letterman. He had a 26-15 record in 1992-93 to boost his career record to 85-69, meaning that he wrestled the most matches of any CSC grappler in history.

His 85 wins is the sixth most ever for the Eagles.

The other seniors were transfers who spent two years at Chadron State.

Mark Morken was 25-17 this season and finished his two years with the Eagles at 54-37. He earned the team's Most Dedicated Award after shedding about 30 pounds in order to wrestle at 126 pounds again.

Heavyweight Andy Maendl was 21-18 in 1992-93 and concluded his career at 45-40. He led the team in pins with 13 and will long be remembered for the pin he recorded over Rob Lewis to give the Eagles a dramatic victory over Northern State during a dual at home.

Lewis finished second at this year's NAIA National Tournament.

The fourth senior was Eric Lords of Idaho Falls, Idaho, who was 17-21 this year and 34-41-1 during his two years at CSC.

Besides gaining All-American laurels by placing eighth at 118 pounds at the NCAA Division II National Tournament, McDermott led the team in several statistical categories.

He had a 32-17 record, scored the most team points, 45.5; had the most takedowns, 82; most escapes, 54; most nearfalls, 37; and had the best winning percentage, .612.

For leading the way in those areas, McDermott was named the team's outstanding wrestler.

Also doing extra well was transfer Garth Wagstaff, who finished at 20-13 while competing the first half of the season at 150 pounds and then moving to 167 after the holidays. He is really a 158-pounder and is expected to fill the spot being vacated by Hughes very nicely next year.

The freshmen were led by Corey Arndt and Eddie Hermsen, who filled the bill in the upper weights. They were selected as the team's most improved and rookie of the year, respectively.

TRIO OF ALL-AMERICANS LED CSC IN 1993

Led by a trio of All-Americans, the 1993 track and field season at Chadron State College contained numerous bright spots.

Coach Ken Woodard said he was "pretty pleased" with the season. He praised the leadership displayed by the veterans and believes a number of the freshmen will develop and help make the Eagles even more competitive in the future.

The team's bellwether was senior Caryn Martin, who was one of the All-Americans and set four school records and tied another during the season.

Martin capped her brilliant career by placing second in the heptathlon at the NCAA Division II Meet in late May. The 5,151 points that she scored accounted for one of her new school records.

The others were the long jump indoors (20-0), the high jump indoors (5-10) and the 55-meter hurdles (8.0 seconds). She also matched the school high jump outdoors record of 5-7 in '92.

She ended her career with eight school records to her credit.

Another senior, Libi Malone of Palisade, completed her career by setting both the school indoor (45-8) and the outdoor (44-10½) shotput records in 1993. She also became an All-American by placing sixth in the shot at the NCAA II outdoor meet this spring after earning the honor indoors a year ago.

Woodard said Martin and Malone will definitely be missed. He noted that no matter how strong the competition might be at the meet where the Eagles were entered, he always knew they were likely to place high.

The other All-American this year was one of the team's promising freshmen, high jumper Tracy Heiman, who cleared 7-0 at one of the early outdoor meets to become the first CSC athlete to ever accomplish the feat and then went 6-9 at the national meet to finish eighth and earn his All-American spurs.

Woodard said he also likes the potential of several other freshmen, including sprinters Brent Burkart and John Grossnickle, middle distance runners Garrick Cramer, Archie Shipp and Justin Dittmer among the men and shotputters Kit Nelson and Kim Walker, high jumper Jill Schaneman and middle distance runner Kali Ryan among the women.

CSC has now had coeds earn All-American honors in the shotput six times, but none of them threw as far as freshmen as Nelson (43-4) did this spring.

"All of our freshmen should become consistent placewinners as they grow and develop if they continue to work hard," said Woodard. "College track is tough both mentally and physically for everyone, but particularly so for freshmen. You've got to have a strong will and a good work ethic to succeed."

Martin and Malone were the only seniors among the women on this year's team while there was just one senior among the men. The latter is Craig Ullmann, who did well as a 200 and 400 runner and triple jumper despite not competing in track and field in high school because he was a baseball player in the spring.

The highlight of Ullmann's career occurred last year, when he won the triple jump at the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference Meet with a career best of 46-½.

The Eagles got a new indoor long jump record this spring when Clint Fernandez went 23-5. Fernandez has always displayed lots of potential and performed very well several times in 1992.

Another excellent jumper is junior Todd Zietlow, who had career bests of 22-5½ indoors and 22-7 ¾ outdoors in the long jump this past season.

Among those who showed lots of improvement was shotputter Mark Ritterbush, who placed at nearly every meet and was throwing some five feet farther at the end of the season than he had at the start. His best was 50-9½.

DAWN HUTCHINS RECEIVES CLYDE BOND MEMORIAL AWARD

Dawn Hutchins, who overcame a serious illness to letter in three sports at Chadron State College, was the 1992-93 recipient of the Clyde Bond Memorial Award.

A plaque is awarded annually to a CSC athlete who displays the outstanding character, attitude and sportsmanship that Bond demonstrated while he was an athlete at CSC.

Hutchins, who graduated from Wheatland, Wyo., High School, lettered four times in volleyball, twice in track and field and once in basketball. She was captain of the 1992 volleyball team and also was a second-team all-conference selection this past year, when she was a senior.

Hutchins' career almost didn't happen. As a freshman in 1989, she became deathly ill with swelling around her heart and temperatures as high as 107 degrees. After being hospitalized in Chadron for over a week, she was rushed to Denver, where her illness was never completely diagnosed, but she recovered.

Bond was a native of Sheridan, Wyo., and was a pitcher for the CSC baseball team in the late 1970s. He had graduated from the college and was attending a Southern Baptist seminary in Louisville, Ky., when he was electrocuted on April 15, 1981, while he was mowing a church lawn.

Bond's family and friends established the award that pays tribute to him and his Christian beliefs.

CSC RODEO TEAM HAD MANY CAPABLE HANDS IN 1992-93

The Chadron State College rodeo team had many capable members in 1992-93. It's believed that more CSC cowboys and cowgirls placed at rodeos in the Central Rocky Mountain Region of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association than ever before.

Nineteen of them placed among the top four in final standings at the 10 rodeos in the region during the year. Altogether, they placed a total of 46 times, including 13 firsts. They also won or tied for second 16 times.
