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SEVERAL CHADRON STATE TEAMS FLOURISHED IN 1994-95

Chadron State College had another fine year athletically during 1994-95. Not all of the teams thrived, but several of them had banner years to help balance it out. And, nearly every team had some athletes who had exceptional seasons.

The women's basketball team and wrestlers were very successful. The Lady Eagles tied for the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference championship and then won the conference tournament with a victory in double overtime. The triumph allowed the team to become the first from Chadron State to advance to the national championship competition.

In addition, the Eagles' 22-8 record established a new mark for victories by a CSC women's basketball team.

The wrestlers won both the conference and the West Regional tournaments. The conference title was the first Chadron State had won outright in any sport since joining the RMAC in 1990.

Both coaches from those teams--Tom Andersen for women's basketball and Scott Ritzen for wrestling--were accorded RMAC coach of the year honors while Ritzen also won the regional honor.

The fall sports teams also fared very well during the past year. The football team was 9-2, marking just the third time that the CSC gridgers had won as many as nine contests. The volleyball team finished 23-12 overall and 11-3 in the conference. Both finished third in the final league standings.

Many CSC athletes also did extra well in 1994-95. An account of those accomplishments is included in the inside pages.

Two major "off-the-field" developments occurred during the past year that are expected have long-range implications for CSC athletics. First, the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference expanded to include six schools from Colorado, impacting basketball and volleyball, in particular. Secondly, a drive was launched to renovate the Elliott Field stadium and fund an athletic endowment. Much more is expected to be heard about the latter activities in the coming months.

FEWER TURNOVERS, MORE DEFENSE HELPED EAGLES IMPROVE IN 1994

A look at the statistics quickly revealed two major reasons why the Chadron State College football team was improved in 1994:

1, The Eagles' offense took much better care of the ball and 2, The defense was much more effective.

The 1994 team had just 21 turnovers while the 1993 team lost the ball 39 times.

Meanwhile, the Eagles did their share of ball-hawking last fall. They came up with 23 interceptions and recovered 18 enemy fumbles for a total of 41 turnovers, nearly twice the number CSC committed. Their 1.81 turnover margin per game ranked fifth in NCAA Division II.

The defense also did a much better job of holding the fort.

The 1994 team yielded an average of 277.6 yards and 17.0 points. That compared to 416.5 yards and 29.4 points the previous year.

"We had a good season, probably better than we expected," said CSC Coach Brad Smith. "A lot of players came through for us. They reported in good condition and we didn't have many weaknesses."

The defense was coordinated by Todd Auer, who moved there after being the offensive line coach. One of his goals was to cut down on the number of long passes that the Eagles had been prone to give up in the past. In '94 the opponents completed eight passes of 30 or more yards while the year before 21 "bombs" of that length were successfully delivered on the Eagles.

Offensively, the Eagles continued their tradition of being potent. For the sixth straight year, they averaged at least 413 yards in total offense, hitting 413.3. Their 36.6-point scoring average was up five points from 1993 and ranked as the second highest in CSC history behind only the 40.6-point average of 1990, the last time the Eagles had a nine-win season.

Smith, who was in charge of the offense, put the Eagles in a new one-back formation in '94. The presence of Joe Planansky helped make the new offense work. Smith noted that Planansky "could block like a fullback and catch passes like a wide receiver."

The fact that CSC had two senior quarterbacks also helped make the change click.

Smith had nothing but praise for the quarterbacks--Trevor Long and Kevin Stein, who alternated every third series throughout the season.

When their stats were combined, they completed 170 of 314 passes (54.1 percent) for 2,136 yards and 15 touchdowns to rank fourth in the conference. The 10 interceptions that they threw was the lowest in the league.

Cory Brooks caught 54 passes for 817 yards and nine touchdowns, Planansky 44 for 465 and Stacy Jeter 32 for 379.

Meanwhile, the Eagles rushed for 2,354 yards with junior Corey Campbell gobbling up 1,443 of them.

Smith said much of the credit for the Eagles' ability to both run and pass the ball effectively had to go to Bill O'Boyle, who was added to the coaching staff after Auer moved to defense.

Another plus for the Eagles was definitely placekicker Scott Doyle, who led the team in scoring with 79 points. He made 14 of 19 field goal attempts and 37 of 41 extra points.

1994 VOLLEYBALL SEASON RANKED AMONG CSC'S BEST

The 1994 volleyball season ranked among the best in Chadron State College history and continued the Lady Eagles' tradition for having an outstanding program.

The Lady Eagles finished with a 23-12 record, giving them 20 seasons when they have won at least as many matches as they lost since the sport was founded 23 years ago.

The record was considered extra good because the schedule was more difficult, particularly early when the team's new coach, Kerry Messersmith, and the players were still adjusting to one another.

The Eagles went 11-3 in the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference, putting them in third place, just one victory out of first.

CSC was particularly hot midway through the season when it won nine straight matches and avenged several early-season setbacks.

Messersmith, who is a 1986 CSC graduate, praised the players for their cooperativeness and said the support she received from the college administration and staff, Eagles Booster Club and student body was the best she had witnessed.

Three of the 1994 starters--Kerry Linnan, Jennifer Wilson and Angela Woodworth-- were seniors while the other three starters--Misty Gill Fowler, Katrina Johnson and Jennifer Vasey--were juniors.

Johnson transferred to a school that teaches radiology at the end of the semester.

Woodworth, the team's setter, earned first-team all-conference honors for the second year in a row while Vasey was a second-team selection at middle hitter. Fowler, Johnson and Wilson received honorable mention.

Woodworth led the team in serving percentage and had a .432 assist percentage. She also was adept at tipping the ball over the net while the opponents were expecting a set. She posted 121 kills.

Vasey led the team in kills with 382, hitting percentage among front row players (.333), digs with 323 and passing.

Vasey's hitting percentage is a new school record, breaking the .324 mark set in 1993 by Wendy Grint Alexander.

Messersmith said the Eagles should be particularly strong in the middle in 1995 since Vasey and Fowler are outstanding players. She said that letterwinners Lisa Barner and Dionne Holmquist should be able to help replace the outside hitters that will be missing.

LADY EAGLES HAD THEIR MOST SUCCESSFUL SEASON EVER

The 1994-95 Chadron State College women's basketball team provided some nice surprises.

The Lady Eagles were coming off a pair of 18-9 seasons, but had lost eight letterwinners, including leading scorer and rebounder Shauna Smith, and there had been a coaching change.

Another letterwinner (Ginger Baird) was lost for the season because of injury just as practice was starting, leaving the new coach; Tom Andersen, with just five letterwinners and six freshmen to face a beefed up schedule.

Opposing coaches in the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference pegged the CSC women for fifth in the pre-season poll. Hardly anyone argued with them, particularly after the Lady Eagles lost their first three games.

But the Eagles had the last laugh. The team gained momentum and by the end of the year had established that it was the most successful, if not the best, in the 22-year history of women's basketball at CSC. The Eagles posted a 22-8 record, tied for the RMAC regular season championship, won the RMAC Tournament and advanced to the NCAA Division II Regional Tournament for the first time.

Andersen admitted he was surprised by the team's success, but said the chemistry proved to be about right and added that the players refused to wilt in tight contests.

A move Andersen made during pre-season was among the reasons the Eagles flourished. He urged to senior point guard Lacy Orpin to shoot more. She had averaged just 5.7 points during her two years at CSC and had never scored more than 16 points for the Eagles. But she finished the year averaging 18.9 points and was named the most valuable player at the conference tournament and the conference's player of the year.

The Ponca City, Okla., native missed her first 16 three-point attempts, but made 50 of 118 for 42.3 percent the rest of the year. She also sank 48 of her final 55 free throws to help her hit 75.5 percent for the season.

The Eagles got another all-star performance from senior Lorna Dahlgren, who averaged 17.4 points and led the rebounders with 7.3 per game. She finished her career with 1,527 points, second best on the Eagles' all-time chart, and tied Shauna Smith for most rebounds with 614.

The Hay Springs product holds the CSC records for most assists (424), most steals (260), most free throws attempted (750) and most free throws made (492). She set single season records for free throws shot (280) and made (191) and steals (68) in 1994-95.

Andersen pointed out that Orpin and Dahlgren were complete players both offensively and defensively and had the ability to make their teammates better.

While the third senior on the roster, center Jennifer Bonser, wasn't in the spotlight as much as Orpin and Dahlgren, she was a major factor in the team's success. She averaged 6.3 points and 6.9 rebounds while shooting 54 percent from the field to lead the team. She had played in just 11 games the year before.

The other starters, Lisa Arnett and Jami Huckfeldt, also had some excellent games. Arnett averaged 11.2 points and 5.5 rebounds while Huckfeldt averaged 8.2 points, four rebounds and three assists.

Andersen said each of the freshmen on the 1994-95 team can develop into a very good college player.

"They all got some quality time in key games," said Andersen of his rookies. "If they'll pick it up a little next year we can have another good season."

EAGLES FINISHED STRONG FOLLOWING MANY SETBACKS

A 4-22 record isn't what Chadron State College Coach Bob Wood had in mind when his basketball team started practicing in the fall of 1994.

Although five of the top seven scorers from the previous year's team that went 17-10 and tied for the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference championship had completed their eligibility, he was hoping for at least a .500 season.

But when practices began there were telltale signs that there would be some hurdles to overcome. Things weren't quite up to snuff.

Besides the 1993-94 seniors, also missing was point guard Tim Flanigan, who tore the anterior cruciate ligament in a knee during a pickup game in August.

That left the team with just one senior, center Shannon Pearson, who was sidelined by shin splits.

And, the only other returning starter, junior forward Jeremy Robinson, was hobbled after having a bone spur removed from the top of his foot and couldn't practice full bore.

"Besides missing these players, we also missed their leadership," Wood reflected. "We didn't have too many guys left who knew what it takes to win college basketball games. Our practices weren't what they should have been. We had to learn to play in our games, and that's a rough way to learn."

Another setback occurred when transfer Cory Gilchrist was forced to leave the team because of illness.

The season, however, ended much better than it started. After breaking an 18-game losing streak, longest in the college's basketball history, the Eagles won three of their final six games.

"We made great strides," said Wood. "This was the most improved team I've ever coached. Of course, we had more room for improvement than any team I've ever coached. By the end of the year, we'd gotten rid of some problems, become more consistent and were playing pretty well. No team in the conference was much better than us the last few weeks. I was beginning to enjoy the season about the time it ended."

Even though he initially had foot problems and then a twisted knee, Robinson played superbly throughout the season. He doubled his scoring average from the previous year to 19.8 points, averaged 7.2 rebounds, shot 50.8 percent from the field, made 25 of his final 27 free throws to shoot 70.3 percent from the line, had 50 steals and earned second-team all-conference.

He failed to score in double figures just once all season.

Second on the scoring chart was junior forward Jeff Tophoj, who averaged 12.7 points and 8 rebounds while shooting 49.6 percent from the field. In several games the Oshkosh product played as well as anyone in the conference.

Another player who appears to have a bright future is freshman point guard James Robinson, who averaged almost 12 points after being "thrown to the wolves" because of Flanigan's injury.

CSC's late surge was fueled by sophomore swingman Jahvea Vidakovich as much as anyone. In the last six games, he averaged 18.7 points while hitting 34 of 57 field goal attempts and 21 of 25 free throws. His field goal shooting during that stretch included 23 of 41 from three-point range.

Vidakovich averaged 10.3 points for the season while Pearson just missed double figures at 9.9 and sophomore guard Bubba Hladky averaged 9.1 to go with some excellent defense and competitive play.

CSC WRESTLERS WON CONFERENCE, REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

Highlighted by championships in the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference and West Regional Tournaments, the Chadron State wrestlers had perhaps their best season ever.

"We had a great group of young men," said Coach Scott Ritzen. "This was probably the best group I've ever coached. They pulled together so well. They came ready to wrestle."

Although Ritzen and his assistant, Ron Haag, knew the Eagles had some outstanding veterans on the roster, there were plenty of question marks when the season started. But freshmen were able to supply many of the missing pieces to the puzzle.

"The young kids came through and that's what made us a strong team," Ritzen said. "It's not often that freshmen can step in and do as well as several of ours did this year."

A pair of senior All-Americans shared the most valuable awards. Both Travis McDermott of Thermopolis, Wyo., and Tony Dammen of Cody, Wyo., finished fifth at the NCAA Division II National Tournament.

McDermott, who also won All-American honors while placing eighth at national tournaments as a freshman and sophomore, bounced back from an injury-marred season in 1993-94 to post a 29-11 record. He won 16 straight matches heading into the national tournament, where he won three and lost two.

Besides leading in wins, McDermott also set the pace in team points (90), takedowns (64) and fastest pin (34 seconds).

The scrappy 118-pounder became just the third CSC wrestler to win 100 matches, finishing with a 101-56 record.

Dammen, who also was fifth at 177 pounds at nationals as a junior, finished with a 19-3 record and concluded his two years at CSC with a 47-12 record.

His season was interrupted for nearly two months by a staph infection of his left knee that finally required surgery.

McDermott and Dammen along with Rick Myers earned Academic All-American honors for another season highlight. As a team, the Eagles were ninth in the academic standings. Myers' 3.8 grade point average was the highest among the 20 Academic All-Americans.

Myers, who still has two years of eligibility, was selected as the Eagles' most dedicated wrestler. He had a 20-18 record while competing at 150 and 158 pounds.

Junior Corey Arndt got the most improved award and fought through a series of injuries to forge an 18-9 record. His most serious injury occurred late in the season when he separated his collarbone.

Although he did not fare as well as he had hoped late in the season, the team's third senior, heavyweight Leith Dickinson of Riverton, Wyo., posted a 27-18 record and was 55-29 over two years after transferring from Northwest College at Powell, Wyo.

Two freshmen won 23 matches apiece. Justin Hoopman went 23-16 while frequently switching weights with Myers and Dave Marich was 23-14 at 190.

Marich, who along with McDermott and Dammen was a RMAC champion, had the misfortune of breaking a bone in his left hand just before nationals.

Hoopman, whose non-stop, all-out effort in every match often sparked the team, led in pins with 10. Marich was selected the Eagles' rookie of the year.

Another valuable addition was junior college transfer Pat Coffing, who went 15-9 at 142 pounds after joining the team the second semester. He was one of six qualifiers for the national tournament.

CSC TRACK AND FIELD TEAM ADDED QUALITY IN 1995

Some solid strides were taken in 1995 by the Chadron State College track and field team as it added numbers and tried become more competitive.

In particular, the Eagles had more quality in 1995. The team was still on the young side, but some progress is being made despite a lack of scholarships. There was just one senior--weightman Mark Ritterbush--on the 1995 team.

"We had a good season and had fun this year," said Woodard. "I wasn't ready for the season to end when it did. I wanted it to keep going because we were still working hard and improving."

Freshmen and sophomores led the Eagles, particularly among the men.

Rookies Jeff Gipson and Casey Sherlock turned in some of the top marks in CSC history and sophomore Doug Lytle proved to be one of the school's all-time outstanding weightmen. Some of their accomplishments included:

--Gipson's top mark of 10.62 in the 100 is the fastest at CSC since Tony Eddings ran a 10.5 in 1987 and his 21.5 in the 200 is a new school record. The latter tops the 21.6 by the fabled Lafayette Robinson that was converted from yards to meters after he ran 220 yards in 21.7.

--Sherlock's 50.04 in the 400 meters is the best at CSC since Maury Costello posted a 49.9 in 1981 and his 55.11 in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles is the best since Eric German ran a 54.7 in 1982.

--Lytle's 164-8 in the discus is the best since Bennie Francis threw 169-6 in 1968 and his 53-6¼ in the shot has been exceeded by just two CSC shotputters. The latter are school record holder Monty Reher, who threw 55-7, and Kail Bowman, who hit 55-¼.

Lytle, who missed qualifying for the NCAA Division II National Meet in the discus by just a foot, improved in that event by nearly 12 feet this year and in the shot by over two feet. In addition, he became the school record-holder after heaving the hammer 150-7 this spring and threw the 35-pound weight 53-5½ during the indoor season to also claim the CSC standard in that relatively new event.

Ritterbush also improved in all of the weights, stretching his best in the hammer by over 10 feet, the discus by 13 inches and the shot by six inches from the previous year.

Sophomore P.J. Penne also ranked high on the "most improved" list as he triple jumped 43-10½ to better his previous year's best by just over four feet.

Penne's older brother, Brian, was hampered by injuries during the latter stages of the season, but still added two feet to his best of a year ago in the triple jump when he hit 44-8¼.

In addition, Chris Nelson became the first runner in CSC annals to run 800 meters under two minutes indoors, although some have run 880 yards under 2:00 indoors. Nelson was below 2:00 in all of his outdoor races, and only four Eagles have ever exceeded his best of 1:57.64.

The CSC women continued to be led by juniors Kit Nelson and Kim Walker in the weights.

A knee injury that she suffered at the national indoor meet hampered Nelson in the shot early in the outdoor season, but she bounced back to place second in the event at the final three meets of the season, including the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference showdown. Her best of 42-7 ¾ this year, however, was 15 inches shy of her best of a year ago.

Just prior to Nelson's three seconds, Walker was the runner-up in the shot at three consecutive meets. Walker's best of 41-10 this year was only three inches below her best of a year ago.

Nelson hit 131-8 in the discus in '95. That was nearly 14 feet better than she threw a year ago.

Chadron State's young women's golf program became more competitive in 1994-95 as the Lady Eagles landed in about the middle of the standings at most tournaments.

Freshman Markee Satchell of Crawford was the CSC leader at six outings, tied for top honors at another tourney and was second once. Her average score was 91.5.

The following is a recap of each of competition that the Lady Eagles had:

--At Briar Cliff--Sept. 9--Briar Cliff won its own tourney with a 315. CSC was 13th among the 16 teams with a 385. Melea Mullally of Briar Cliff was the medalist with a 72. CSC was led by Crystal Long at 94, Markee Satchell at 96, Kodie Richardson at 97 and Tara Hutt at 98.

--At Buena Vista--Sept. 10--The University of Missouri-Kansas City was the winner with a 326. CSC was 8th among 14 teams with a 390. Jodi Wendt of Mankato State was the medalist with a 75. Long and Satchell had scores of 94 while Richardson carded a 95 and Marcy Miller a 107.

--At Wayne--Sept. 12--Nebraska-Kearney won the triangular with a 372 while Wayne had a 375 and CSC a 400. A Regis player, Andrea Chavez, was the medalist at 88. Satchell at 93 and Long at 97 paced the Eagles. Both Richardson and Hutt had 105s and Miller and Marles Wyman 106s.

--At Nebraska Wesleyan--Sept. 13--Kearney also won here with a 347 while Chadron was fourth among nine teams at 406. UNK's Betsy Brown took top honors at 79 while Satchell paced CSC with a 93, followed by Long at 100, Miller at 104 and Hutt at 109.

--At Chadron--Oct. 13--Wayne beat the Eagles in a dual 379 to 399. Two Wayne golfers, Kim Wittkop and Traci Pesek, had scores of 89. Satchell shot 90, Long 98, Hutt 103, Wyman 108 and Richardson 109 for CSC.

TONY DAMMEN EARNS CLYDE BOND MEMORIAL AWARD

Tony Dammen of Cody, Wyo., became the first wrestler to receive the Clyde Bond Memorial Award.

A plaque is awarded annually to a Chadron State College athlete who displays the outstanding character, attitude and sportsmanship that Bond demonstrated while he was an athlete at CSC.

As a senior in 1994-95, Dammen contracted a severe staph infection that eventually required surgery and necessitated hospitalization for about a month during the middle of the wrestling season. But he overcame the ailment to win All-American honors for the second straight year.

He placed fifth at 177 pounds at the national tournament for the second straight year in 1995. He had a 28-9 record as a junior and was 19-3 during his abbreviated senior season.

Dammen was the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference 177-pound champion as a junior and won the West Regional title as a senior. He was named the team's most valuable wrestler in 1993-94 and shared those honors with Travis McDermott in 1994-95.

Tony also was an Academic All-American as selected by the national wrestling coaches as a senior. His major was agribusiness.

Bond was a native of Sheridan, Wyo., and was a pitcher for the CSC baseball team in the late 1970s. He had graduated from the college and was attending a Southern Baptist seminary in Louisville, Ky., when he was electrocuted on April 15, 1981, while he was mowing a church lawn.

Bond's family and friends established the award that pays tribute to him and his Christian beliefs.

BULLRIDER QUALIFIES FOR NATIONAL RODEO

Pat Burk became the first Chadron State College ^{Bullrider} ~~cowboy~~ to qualify for the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Finals since 1980 when he finished second in the Central Rocky Mountain Region standings for 1994-95. He drew a pair of rank bulls at the finals and did not place (see item at end of this section.)

Burk qualified by placing among the top four at four of the six spring rodeos.

Numerous other CSC contestants placed at rodeos during the year, but they were weren't consistent enough to rank very high in the final regional standings. The best placings were Tom Hughson, who was 7th in steer wrestling, and Danielle Faulk, who was 8th in breakaway roping.
