CSC Football Team Had Another Successful Season

The 2000 football season at Chadron State College went into the books as another good one. The Eagles finished with an 8-3 overall record and went 7-1 in the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference. They reached the playoffs for the third time in five years as the string of successful seasons continued.

Chadron State has now won 59 games and lost just 18 in the last seven years.

Despite having a youthful flavor, both the offensive and defensive units came through with flying colors. The offense averaged 420.9 yards, the Eagles' best since 1995, and 37.4 points, the highest since 1990. The defense yielded an average of just 226.7 yards and 13.7 points, both the best during Brad Smith's 14 years as the CSC head coach.

The special teams also were special. They outstripped the opponents in nearly every category. For instance, CSC had 596 yards in punt returns while the foes managed just 111. And, placekicker Aaron Turner was successful on nine of 11 field goal attempts, including those of 48, 52 and a school-record 57 yards.

Smith, who won his 100th game at CSC in the regular-season finale, said he was surprised by the team's success. He thought the Eagles would be competitive again, but said he didn't expect them to dominate as many teams as they did. The Eagles won five of their game by at least four touchdowns.

The Eagles also had some extra close games. For instance, they led Northern Arizona 21-17 early in the fourth period before the NCAA I-AA Lumberjacks scored twice to pull out a 32-24 victory in Flagstaff. Mesa State held on for a 28-22 victory in Grand Junction after the Eagles had driven inside the Mavericks' five-yard line in the final minute, before committing a costly penalty that helped keep them out of the end zone.

The week after the heart-breaking loss to Mesa, the Eagles pulled out a rousing 23-22 win at home over Nebraska-Kearney when quarterback Matt Strand and slotback Rian Weber connected on a 22-yard scoring pass with 64 seconds remaining. That was the Eagles' "big play" of the season.

The regular-season finale at Hays, Kan., also was a stemwinder. Playing in nasty weather, the Eagles went ahead on a nine-yard run by tailback Austin Forster with 9:35 to play and then watched as a Fort Hays State field goal attempt hit the right upright and bounced back onto the field about four minutes later, helping CSC to a 17-14 verdict.

"At the start of the season, we knew we had good talent, but we lacked experience. After we got some experience, we developed into a darned good football team," the coach stated. "But we're still not where we want to be. Our loss to Cal Davis (48-10) in the playoff game showed us that we aren't among the elite Division II teams. We've got to keep working and trying to get better."

The Eagles were ranked No. 17 in the final NCAA Division II poll released by the American Football Coaches Association following the playoffs.

The good news is that since the team started just two seniors on offense and four on defense in 2000, the Eagles could be improved next season.

Smith noted that although the Eagles didn't have many seniors this past season, several of them left big holes to fill. For instance, seniors Chris Evans at defensive end, Jeff Japp at outside linebacker, Rian Weber at slotback and Turner were first-team all-conference.

Japp and Weber also were on the all-West Region first-team while Evans and Turner made the second team. As their honors would indicate, all four were extremely capable players.

Evans and Japp each participated in 67 tackles. Japp was credited with 12 quarterback sacks for 101 yards in losses and 10 more tackles behind the line. Evans had seven sacks and 14 other tackles for losses. Weber had 41 receptions for 556 yards and eight touchdowns to lead the receivers.

But many of those with eligibility remaining also played well. Quarterback Strand had stats of which any quarterback would be proud. He completed 176 of 308 passes (57.1 percent) for 21 touchdowns and threw only seven interceptions. He also rushed for 236 yards, the most for a CSC quarterback in at least 30 years. He was sacked just 13 times, meaning the offensive line provided excellent protection.

Strand had an array of receivers from which to choose as 18 Eagles caught passes.

Also racking up impressive numbers was Forster. He averaged 5.5 yards while rushing for 1,025 yards. He also caught 25 passes, second high on the team, for 306 yards and returned 37 punts for an average of 10.5 yards. His 1,721 all-purpose yards were the second highest in CSC history and led the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference. Forster also was first-team all-conference.

Two offensive linemen also gained all-conference nods. Center Jeremy Eardley made the first team and tackle Ryan Deterding the second team. They were joined in the starting lineup by senior Nick Dressel and sophomores Cody Beguin and Max Lederhos.

Defensive players earning first-team all-conference along with Evans and Japp included tackle Jason Barthel and cornerback Marvin Jackson. Linebacker Jeff Turman was a second-team choice for the third year in a row.

Barthel was given a first-team nod despite missing much of the season because of injuries.

Defensive Coordinator Todd Auer said numerous other defenders played well. They included senior cornerback Robert Norris, whom Auer called one of the best at man-to-man coverage that he has coached. Help also came from another veteran, Charlie Haskell, who finally overcame a series of health problems to play a full season at the end opposite Chris Evans.

The coach also gave plaudits to numerous players who had only limited experience at the start of the season. They included Cory Hegwer and Rob Evans, who largely manned the tackles while Barthel was injured; Aric Lopez, who emerged as a capable inside linebacker; Ross Morris at outside linebacker; and Scott Sterkel, whose exploits included blocking four kicks.

"None of these guys had played much before, but they all did a great job," said Auer. "A lot of others contributed, too, as both alternates and on special teams. Bill Teerlinck (who frequently became the second safety) is one who comes to mind, in particular."

Eagles Ranked No. 17 in Final Poll

The Chadron State College football team was ranked No. 17 in the final NCAA Division II poll for the 2000 season that was released following the playoffs. This was the first time a poll was taken after the playoffs.

The Eagles have now been ranked among the top 20 three times since joining the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference and affiliating with the NCAA.

In 1996, they were ranked No. 11 in the final poll while in 1998 they were rated No. 19. Both polls were taken prior to the playoffs. Central Oklahoma edged the Eagles by scores of 23-21 and 21-19 in those playoff games.

Prior to joining the NCAA, the Eagles were ranked several times in NAIA polls. Those rankings were:

1958—No. 18, 1977—No. 10, 1978—No. 16, 1989—No. 10 and 1990—No. 7.

CSC Volleyball Team Showed Major Improvement

The Chadron State College volleyball team showed major improvement during the 2000 season. The Eagles finished with an 11-21 record after going 3-27 in 1999. Their 11 victories matched the team's high for the past five years.

Coach Dawn Brammer's team also raised its Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference record from 1-18 in 1999 to 5-14 in 2000.

Brammer said that while the team still wasn't where she wanted it to be, it was definitely improved. The Eagles raised their hitting percentage from .083 to .138 and also increased their blocking and digging averages.

The Eagles' leading hitter was sophomore Tasha Reed, who had a .180 hitting percentage and averaged 3.03 kills per game. She also set the pace in digs with 3.54 per game. Close behind in hitting was senior Katie Roberts, who had a .178 hitting percentage and 2.59 kills per game.

The team's top blocker was senior Kylee Hopper with .77 per game. Roberts was again a close second with .73.

Freshman Cyndi Mueller had 34 ace serves to set the pace and was second in digs with 2.66 per game.

Junior Melissa Woodworth continued to improve as the team's primary setter for the third year in a row. Good help in back row defense came from freshman Jenny Nason.

The Eagles might have shown considerably more improvement had it not been for the hamstring injury suffered by senior Sarah Diedrich during pre-season drills. Diedrich was a returning starter and was considered to be a potential standout. But because of the injury, she was able to play in only about half of the games and even then was seldom able to operate as effectively at the net as she had the previous year.

Middle hitter Cody Wilder also missed about a third of the season because of injuries. When she was out of the lineup, the Eagles were definitely smaller than most of their opponents.

One place where the Eagles excelled was in the classroom. Brammer reported that they had a 3.25 cumulative grade point average the first semester and 3.38 the second semester of 2000-01.

Eight Seniors Led Eagles to Excellent Season

One of the most successful chapters in Chadron State College women's basketball came to a close during the 2000-01 school year, when eight seniors wrapped up their careers after winning 39 games over two seasons. Only once before--in 1993-94 and 1994-95—have the Eagles won more games during a two-year period.

The Eagles were 20-8 in 1999-2000 and went 19-9 this past season. Both teams were 13-6 in the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference, good for second place in the East Division. Both also reached the semifinals of the conference playoffs before being eliminated.

"Naturally, we'd liked to have made it to the championship game both years, but we had a couple of good seasons," said CSC Coach Tom Andersen. "I think in the years to follow the players will be pretty happy with what they accomplished and remember the good times they had playing basketball at Chadron State."

Andersen said he has enjoyed this group of players, not only because they won about two-thirds of their games but also because of the teamwork they demonstrated, their work ethic and the improvement they made during their careers.

"Everybody contributed," the coach noted. "They were a good group to coach. They realized they couldn't win games by themselves and were willing to assume whatever roles they were given. They didn't earn a lot of all-star or player of the week honors, but together they made up a good team."

Andersen continued: "They never presented any problems either on or off the court, all of them are good students who are on target to graduate and I expect all of them will be successful in life."

The seniors accounted for 85 percent of the team's scoring and rebounding in 2000-01. Several of them will graduate with their names firmly etched on the list of all-time leaders in the program.

Some of the seniors' achievements:

--Janelle Hutt finished eighth in career scoring with 1,100 points and third in rebounding with 580. Her career field goal percentage of 50.4 ranks second on the all-time list.

--Melissa Burke finished ninth in career scoring with 965 points. She is second in career free throw shooting at 77.4 percent and her 89.2 percent (74-83) free throw shooting her sophomore year is the best ever for one season.

--Roxi Hoegerl is 10th on the scoring list with 923 points. Her 50 percent (96-192) field goal shooting last season was the best ever for a CSC guard.

--Braidi Hladky is 12th in scoring with 808 points, second in career steals with 236 and third in assists with 345, just two out of second place.

These four along with Susan Schaefer came to CSC as freshmen. Each of them played in more than 100 games during their careers. They were joined in 1999-2000 by Andrea Demasi, Jackie Jensen and Christina Petty.

Hutt was this year's scoring and rebounding leader at 12.5 points and 5.4 rebounds per game. Demasi finished second in scoring this year at 11.3 points a game. She led the Eagles in both three-pointers made with 52 and three-point percentage at 44.4.

One of the goals this year was to improve the shooting, Andersen said. That was accomplished. The Eagles shot 41.8 percent from the field in 2000-01 compared to 40.5 a year ago.

They were particularly more deadly from the outside. This year's team shot 35.4 percent from three-point range compared to 29.3 in 1999-00. In addition, this year's 205 three-pointers led the RMAC and is a school record, breaking the old mark of 176 set last year.

This year's free throw shooting also improved, climbing from 62.2 to 69.5 percent.

Andersen, who gained his 100th victory at CSC when the Eagles were one of two teams to defeat Nebraska-Kearney during the regular season, noted that the Eagles' defensive stats weren't as good this year as they had been a year ago. But he believes that was primarily because the opponents were improved, not because he team was less capable on defense.

Last year, the Eagles had 304 steals compared to 235 this year and gave up 63 points per game compared to 68.6 this season.

With so many seniors on this year's team, what does the future hold?

"I don't want either the players or the fans to have the attitude that we'll be rebuilding and won't be competitive the next couple of years. We should do all right because we'll have four players who were on this year's team and seven or eight that we redshirted this year. I think we can be a good team again."

The four who played this year are juniors-to-be Janet Raymer, Jamie Wiseman and Mandy Blaine and sophomore-to-be Kelly Behrends. Andersen said each has shown that she can play well.

Andersen noted that most of the redshirts are good shooters and he expects them to form another cohesive group. "I hope their youthful energy will help them overcome the lack of experience," he added.

Melissa Burke Presented Clyde Bond Memorial Award

Melissa Burke became the 21st recipient of the Clyde Bond Memorial Award during Ivy Day on May 4, 2001

The award is given annually to a Chadron State scholar-athlete based on the leadership, character and athletic abilities displayed by Bond during his four years at Chadron State.

Burke was a four-year regular on the Chadron State basketball team. During her career, she scored 956 points, an average of 9.2 per game. Her career free throw percentage of 77.4 is the second best in CSC history.

Burke graduated from Chadron State in May with a 3.61 grade point average while majoring in accounting and economics. She gave the invocation at the spring commencement, and was also selected as CSC's 2000-01 Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference Female Scholar-Athlete.

Bond was a native of Sheridan, Wyo., and was a pitcher for the CSC baseball team and a member of Blue Key National Honorary Fraternity in the late 1970s. He had graduated from the college and was attending a Southern Baptist seminary in Louisville, Ky., when he was electrocuted on April 15, 1981, while mowing a church lawn.

Bond's family and friends established the award that pays tribute to him and his Christian beliefs. The previous Bond Memorial Award winners are:

CSC Men's Basketball Team Overcame Slow Start

One thing is certain about the 2000-01 men's basketball season at Chadron State College. It could have turned out a lot worse.

The Eagles were just 1-10 as of Jan. 6, but split their last 14 games against Rocky Mountain Åthletic Conference opponents and finished with an 8-17 record.

"We didn't start the season as well as I thought we would," said Coach Dan Beebe. "But we finished it better than we might have expected. I think our players deserve a lot of credit. They could have folded the tent when things were going bad, but they hung together and showed a lot of heart. We received a lot of compliments about how hard they played."

Beebe should receive a share of the credit for the Eagles' turnaround. He never lost faith in the team, even after CSC had scored no more than 65 points in four straight games around the holidays and was being blown out by mediocre teams.

He changed the offense so there was more ball and player movement farther away from the basket and switched the Eagles to a zone defense. Both changes paid off.

The leader of the turnaround was the team's most experienced player. Senior Zak Kennedy played particularly well as his career was winding down. He was the leading scorer in each of the final seven games, when he averaged 23 points and shot 62 percent from the field.

"Zak realized that his career was about over and knew he'd better make the most of it," said Beebe. "He really stepped up his game near the end. He's a great kid and has been a big part of our program for four years. We'll really miss him next season."

For the season, Kennedy averaged 15.4 points and six rebounds, both team highs. For his career, he scored 1,200 points, 15th on CSC's all-time list, and collected 537 rebounds, eighth highest in CSC history. Led by his 52.5 percentage this year, he shot 48.4 percent from the field during his career.

Beebe was pleased that the Eagles' only other senior, Scott Kuester of Rushville, also closed out his career in style. After missing last season because of shoulder surgery, Kuester helped the team down the stretch, in particular. He scored 35 points in the final three games.

The second high scorer on this year's team was Jeremy Wissing, who was voted the RMAC freshman of the year by the conference coaches. He averaged 13.2 points while shooting 45 percent overall from the field and 43 percent from three-point range, seventh best in the conference.

Wissing also led the Eagles in assists with 59 and steals with 32. Before Kennedy caught fire near the end of the season, Wissing carried a major portion of the Eagles' scoring load. He was the team's top scorer in six of seven games at mid-season as the Eagles began their turnaround.

Wissing, of course, is one of the players Beebe will use to anchor next year's team.

Other freshmen such as Jeremy's twin brother Jay, Chadron High graduate Zac Alcorn, Navy veteran Harry Sledge and point guard Justin Misegadis also figure prominently in plans for the future.

Beebe said he'll also expect more consistency from veterans such as Tim Kamerzell, Matt Strand and Curt Katen next season. All had some good games, and played good defense all season, but struggled on offense much of the campaign.

Beebe hit the recruiting trail hard this spring. A primary need is more size and some consistent scoring punch.

"We improved a lot this year from where we were at the start of the season, but we need to improve a lot more. We have to keep our nose to the grindstone and get a lot better."

CSC Wrestlers Won RMAC Dual Title, But Hoped For Stronger Finish

The Chadron State College wrestling team had an excellent dual season, but didn't meet its expectations in season-ending tournaments, Coach Scott Ritzen said.

The Eagles were 10-5 in duals, matching the team's best dual record since Ritzen took over as head coach in 1987. Their 5-1 record against Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference foes won the regular-season championship.

But the Eagles slipped to fifth at the West Regional Tournament, where four CSC entries qualified for the NCAA Division II National Tournament. At nationals, junior Jason Dye became the Eagles' only placewinner. He was seventh at 149 pounds to win All-American honors.

"We didn't finish the season as well as we should have," said Ritzen. "We lost a few close matches at the regional tourney and kind of got down on ourselves. We needed somebody pull an upset and fire us up, but it didn't happen. We've got to learn to compete better at the regional and national tournaments because those are the ones that really make or break the season."

The Eagles definitely got their fans fired up in a couple of the duals at home. In late January, Western State led CSC 22-10 entering the final three matches, but the Eagles won 24-22 as three freshmen—Corey Kinnan, Ben Holscher and Jeff Rusher—scored victories. Kinnan pinned his foe after trailing 13-9 and Holscher and Rusher posted major decisions. The next night, the Eagles pulled out another two-point victory—21-19--over Adams State. Both teams won five matches, but Dye's pin proved to be the difference. In the first dual against a conference opponent, the Eagles downed Nebraska-Kearney 19-15 after trailing 12-2 halfway through the action.

Another bright spot for the Eagles came at the Midwest Classic in Indianapolis in early January, when they finished third among the 21 teams. Joe Callahan was the 165-pound champion at the tournament. Callahan also sparkled during the National Duals in mid-January, when he went 5-0 and was co-recipient of the outstanding wrestler award. CSC was sixth in the team standings at National Duals.

The CSC lineup was made up largely of freshmen and juniors. Each of the juniors won at least 24 matches and each of the freshmen won at least 16.Dye rolled up the most victories, going 32-12. Callahan finished at 29-12, Josh Schommer 25-14 and Cody Beguin 24-8. All four are juniors.

Beguin, the CSC heavyweight, was the Eagles' first West Regional champion since 1997 and earned Academic All-American honors for the second year in a row.

The freshmen in the varsity lineup and their records were Seth Groff 22-21, Rusher 17-15, Holscher 17-21 and Kinnan 16-16.

Several other Eagles also had good records while competing at open tournaments and filling in for the regulars at various tournaments or duals. For instance, Travis Peak was 15-8, Jordan Johnson 15-11 and Cody Barent 13-11.

With everyone due to return next year, Ritzen said he's extremely optimistic about the 2001-02 season.

"We gained a lot of experience, should have learned some things about ourselves and didn't suffer any injuries that would appear to be a problem next year," said Ritzen. "Hopefully, we'll be older and wiser and ready to roll next season."

Improved Eagles Set 17 School Records in 2001

The Chadron State College track and field team had one of its best seasons in a long time this past year, setting 17 school records and scoring the most points ever at the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference's Outdoor Meet.

Coach John Reiners said the Eagles gained confidence as the season progressed, and learned that they could compete favorably against both conference foes and the NCAA Division I teams that they frequently encountered.

Eight of the school records were set during the indoor season and nine of them outdoors. Five of the records were posted by senior Mandy Kubo in throwing events. She won both the shot put and the discus and was second in the hammer throw at the conference's outdoor meet and then earned All-American honors at both the NCAA Division II Indoor and Outdoor Meets. She closed out her career by finishing fourth in the shot put at the outdoor meet with a throw of 48-10.

Reiners said practically all of the other returning letterwinners also improved their marks this spring.

Reiners said the addition of several freshmen definitely bolstered the team. Women giving the Eagles a shot in the arm included Cherette Mastny, who set a new school record in the 400 meters, and Stacie Koehler, who won the 800 meters and was named the outstanding freshman female at the conference meet.

Mastny and Koehler also helped the Eagles set new school records in the 1600-meter relay both indoors and outdoors.

Among the freshmen who bolstered the CSC men were Bobby Smith, who led the Eagles in three throwing events, and Tate Bauersachs, who shows promise of becoming an outstanding decathlete.

Other highlights for the men included firsts at the conference meet by Josiah Smith in the 110 high hurdles and Ryan Baily in the decathlon. Smith also missed winning the long jump at the conference's outdoor meet by just a quarter of an inch.

Since Kubo was the only senior on the women's roster and high jumper Willie Hoffman, who placed second at the conference's outdoor meet, was the only senior among the men, the Eagles expect to have another strong team next season.

CSC Golfers Seemed to Like Fourth Spot

Fourth seemed to be a favorite spot to finish for the 2000-01 Chadron State College women's golf team.

For instance, the Eagles were fourth among 10 teams at the South Dakota State Tourney, fourth among eight at the Nebraska-Omaha Spring Classic played in Gothenburg and fourth among eight at the Nebraska-Kearney Spring Tournament to conclude the season.

The Eagles opened the season on a high note, sharing the lead with Nebraska Wesleyan at the conclusion of 18 holes at the Hastings College Tournament on Sept. 1. However, the Plainswomen won the one-hole playoff, so CSC finished second in the tourney for the second year in a row.

Coach Gary Benson's team was comprised largely of three seniors—Jennifer Collins of Spearfish, S.D., Kami Friesen of Gothenburg and Andrea Levick of Bayard—along with junior Jennifer Leake of Thermopolis, Wyo., and freshman Rhonda Beatty of Erickson, Manitoba.

Dustin Elliott's Bullriding Crown Is Rodeo Headliner

He didn't have an instant to spare and he'd never won a college rodeo before, but Chadron State College cowboy Dustin Elliott became the national collegiate bullriding champion for 2000-01.

A sophomore from John Day, Ore., Elliott claimed the title at the College National Finals Rodeo in Casper, Wyo., in mid-June He was the only bullrider among the 48 who qualified for nationals to stay aboard all four of his bulls for the required eight seconds. That allowed him to win the crown by a comfortable margin, as things turned out.

But there was plenty of suspense at the end of his final ride as the rodeo was winding down. It might be said that Elliott didn't take any more time than was absolutely necessary to finish the ride.

He drew "Hootie" from the Southwick Rodeo Co., and was thrown just as the eight-second buzzer sounded. Some of Elliott's multitude of fans wondered if he'd made it. The decision would be left to a judge holding a stopwatch. When the judge gave the "thumbs up" signal, Elliott's black hat sailed high into the rafters at the Casper Events Center and the crowd estimated at 7,500 broke loose with an uproar.

The bullriding championship was the second for a Chadron State cowboy in the last three years. Will Farrell of Thermopolis, Wyo., won the title in 1999. Farrell also qualified for the finals again, but Elliott was the dominating force this year.

During the 2000-01 season, Elliott placed second in the Central Rocky Mountain Region's final standings. While he didn't win the bullriding at any of the nine rodeos in the region, he was second three times and third twice.

A year ago, Elliott placed fourth in the region and didn't qualify for nationals. But he was one of 40 collegiate bullriders selected for the Overland Stagecoach Invitational Bullriding at Monahans, Tex., late in the summer and finished second.

Besides Elliott and Farrell, CSC had three other qualifiers for the national rodeo. They were barrel racers Jennifer Cullen of Alliance and Josie Jordan of Broken Bow and steer wrestler Gabe Taylor of Ponca.

Like Elliott, Cullen and Taylor qualified for nationals by finishing second in the Central Rocky Mountain Region's final standings. Jordan and Farrell qualified through the Three-Region Shootout that was initiated this year. The rodeo was at Bozeman, Mont., and featured the top 10 contestants in each event from the Big Sky, Great Plains and Central Rocky Mountain Regions. At the shootout, Jordan tied for third and fourth in barrel racing and Farrell placed fourth in bullriding. Jordan was third and Farrell fourth in the final regional standings.

Also qualifying for the shootout were Casey Redman of Burwell, who was third in the Central Rocky Mountain team roping standings, and Sarah Morrissey of Merritt, British Columbia, who was fifth in the region in breakaway roping.

Both Chadron State teams finished fourth in the regional standings for the year.
