Ram Football History . . . LUDE BUILDS NO. 66

Head Coach Mike Lude this season is building Colorado State University's 66th football team. For the perpetual-motioned Ram grid foreman himself, however, this is only the fourth season in his vigorous campaign to return the school to the regional football prominence it has held through most of its history.

The football program at CSU got an informal start when students organized a makeshift squad in the fall and winter of 1892-93. That was the first and only season until 1899 when the sport was permanently resumed on the campus.

The game at CSU really came into its own in 1911 when Harry W. Hughes, graduate of the University of Oklahoma, began a 31-year career as Ram coach. He became nationally recognized as the dean of Rocky Mountain football coaches, consistently developing regionally powerful teams. He produced conference championship squads in 1915, 1916, 1919, 1920, 1925, 1927, 1933, and 1934.

Probably the most famous athlete coached by Hughes was Glenn Morris, an all-conference end in 1933, but better known as the record-setting winner of the decathlon in the 1936 Berlin Olympic Games.

Julius "Hans" Wagner succeeded Hughes as head coach in 1942 and held the job until 1947 when the late Robert L. "Bob" Davis took over. Davis coached for nine years, winding up with a Skyline Conference championship team in 1955 — the first league title for the school since 1934.

Under Davis, who served as athletic director from 1953 until his death last January, Ram teams began playing schedules more nation-wide in scope and he developed a reputation as a prolific producer of outstanding professional football talent. In fact CSU at one point, in the late 1940s and early 1950s, probably had more players active in the National Football League than any school its size.

Before the Davis era, CSU sent a number of players into the pro game, but most of the CSU-to-professional-ball migration has taken place in the last 17 years, during the terms of Davis and his successor, Don "Tuffy" Mullison.

FOOTBALL HISTORY (Continued)

First Davis product to make it big in the NFL was Thurman "Fum" McGraw who was CSU's initial first-team football All-American and is now assistant athletic director. The big tackle went to the Detroit Lions in 1950. He was followed by defensive backs Jack Christiansen, now head coach of the San Francisco 49ers, and Jim David and the three helped the Lions to two World championships. All three, along with Dale Dodrill who played with the Pittsburgh Steelers, are still rated among the all-time pro greats.

Other CSU players who have logged at least one full season of pro action in recent years include Don Burroughs (L. A. Rams, Philadelphia Eagles), Gary Glick (Steelers, Washington Redskins, Baltimore Colts, San Diego Chargers), Freddy Glick (St. Louis Cards, Houston Oilers), Ron Stehouwer and Brady Keys (both Steelers), Larry Barnes (San Francisco 49ers, Oakland Raiders), Alex Burl (Chicago Cards), Kay McFarland (49ers), Jim McMillin (Denver Broncos, Raiders), Bob Weber (Edmonton Eskimos), Leo Reed (Broncos, Oilers), and Mel Foss (Edmonton).

This season is CSU's fourth as an independent since 1900. Ram athletic teams competed in the Colorado Collegiate Conference (1900-1908), the Rocky Mountain Conference (1909-1937) and the Skyline, from 1938 until it broke up after the 1961 term.

JIM WILLIAMS
Director of Athletics



James J. "Jim" Williams wears two hats at CSU. This winter he will begin his 12th season as the Rams' head basketball coach and he was appointed director of athletics last April 1. He succeeded Robert L. "Bob" Davis who died in January 1965, after serving as the CSU athletic boss since 1953.

No stranger to collegiate athletic administration, Williams has a solid background in all sports. Before coming to CSU in 1954, he was at Snow College, Ephraim, Utah, where he was athletic director and head coach in football, basketball, and baseball.

During his 11 seasons at CSU, Williams has become one of the country's most successful cage coaches. He has guided the Rams to post-season tournament berths four of the last five years. His CSU quintets in 1962-63 and 1964-65 earned spots in the NCAA playoffs and the 1960-61 and 1961-62 squads made it to the National Invitation Tournament in New York City.

Williams, who twice was chosen Coach of the Year in the old Skyline Conference, is an exponent of careful pattern play, offensively, and tough man-for-man defense, consistently developing his material to its fullest capacity. His 11-year basketball coaching record at CSU is 154 wins, 114 losses against some of the nation's strongest competition.

His success in developing outstanding, crowd-appealing teams had much to do with authorization of an auditorium-gymnasium complex now under construction on the campus. The main structure of the three-building project, which will be the new CSU athletic headquarters, is expected to be ready by next Jan. 1.

Born March 19, 1915, at Malad, Ida., Williams attended the University of Idaho before World War II, but the war interrupted his education. Between 1941 and 1945 he rose from private to captain in the Army and was a company commander in New Guinea and the Philippines.

Following his discharge, he enrolled at Utah State University where he received a B.S. degree in 1947 and an M.S. degree in 1954.

Williams and his wife, Mary, are parents of a son, Bob, and two daughters, Carole and Mary Joan.

THURMAN "FUM" McGRAW
Assistant Athletic Director



CSU's first football All-American and former professional star, Thurman "Fum" McGraw, is in his first year as assistant director of athletics.

McGraw was an outstanding football tackle, wrestler, and trackman from 1946-50. In addition to his gridiron honors he won the conference heavyweight wrestling championship, placed third in the NCAA tournament in 1948, and held the school shot put record a number of years. He was awarded the 1950 Nye Trophy, given annually to CSU's outstanding senior athlete.

McGraw was graduated in 1950 with a B.S. degree in forestry, minor-ing in physical education. He played in the Shrine East-West all-star game that year, before beginning a distinguished 5-year pro football career with the Detroit Lions.

Ranking among the best linemen in professional football, he was voted All-Pro 2 years and was selected to play in the Pro-Bowl in his rookie year, 1950. He helped the Lions to two world pro championships and was co-captain of the team his last season, 1954.

Retiring as an active player, McGraw was appointed assistant football coach in 1955 and head wrestling coach in 1957 at CSU. He resigned these positions in 1958 to accept a job as line coach of the professional Pittsburgh Steelers. He remained there until April 1962, when he became assistant director of conference services at CSU, a position he held until moving to the athletic department.

Born July 17, 1927, at Garden City, Kan., McGraw grew up and received his secondary education at Paonia, Colo. He is a Marine Corps veteran.

He and his wife, Beryl, are parents of three children, David, Mike, and Debbie.

MILO R. "MIKE" LUDE
Head Coach

Mike Lude, widely rated one of the nation's brightest young college football coaches, has directed Ram football steadily upward since his appointment as CSU grid boss in December 1961.

Inheriting a squad that was winless the previous season, his 1962 team was 0-10. But the Rams came up to 3-7 in 1963 and last year they continued their climb, finishing with a 5-6 record, including victories in three of their last four games.

The effervescent, hard-driving Lude received the CSU appointment after serving 15 years under one of America's leading head coaches, Dave Nelson, first at Hillsdale, Mich., College, then at the University of Maine, and 11 years at the University of Delaware. The Delaware staff, generally recognized as one of the more creative groups in college football, has been highly instrumental in development of the winged-T, the system Lude teaches at CSU.

Born June 30, 1922, at Kalamazoo, Mich., Lude began his higher education in 1940, enrolling at Hillsdale College. After 3 years' service with the U. S. Marine Corps interrupted his studies, he received a B.S. degree in biology in 1947. As an athlete at Hillsdale he lettered in football at guard, and in baseball, captaining the 1946 conference champion football team. He took graduate work at the University of Maine and at Michigan State University, earning an M.A. degree in physical education at MSU in 1953.

His service with the Marines was as a lieutenant with the First Amphibian Tractor Group in the Hawaiian Islands.

After his graduation from Hillsdale, Lude joined his alma mater's staff as instructor of physical education, football line coach, head baseball coach, trainer and director of intramurals. He was appointed instructor of physical education, football line coach, and head baseball coach in 1949 at Maine, remaining there until his appointment at Delaware in 1951. He served there as assistant professor of physical education, football line coach, and assistant to the director of admissions.

Lude is in constant demand as a lecturer at coaching clinics and schools throughout the country and he has authored a number of articles on academic guidance for athletes as well as on football.

The CSU coach holds membership in several professional organizations and he has been particularly active in the American Football Coaches Association and the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

He and his wife, Rena, are parents of three daughters, Cynthia, Janann, and Jill.

JOE CRIBARI

Defensive Backfield Coach

A holdover from Don "Tuffy" Mullison's staff, Cribari is in his ninth season as a CSU coach.

As a center at the University of Denver, Cribari was chosen to the All-Skyline Conference teams in 1942, 1947, and 1948 and earned a berth on the International News Service All-American team in 1948.

Before joining the CSU staff, the 41-year-old Cribari was an assistant coach at Denver U. in the spring and fall of 1950. His other coaching stops were at Kearney, Nebr., and at Trinidad Junior College, where he was head coach the 2 years prior to his move to CSU. He received a bachelor's degree in chemistry in 1950 and a master's degree in education in 1959, both at DU.

In the late years of World War II, Cribari was a tank instructor in the Marine Corps.

Born and raised at Salida, Colo., he was an outstanding high school athlete.

Cribari and his wife, Glenna, have a son and a daughter.



PAUL LANHAM

Offensive Backfield Coach

Lanham, a 1954 graduate of Glenville State College in West Virginia, was head freshman coach at the University of Dayton before his appointment to CSU in 1962. He entered the coaching field in 1954-55 at Ripley, W. Va., High School, served as head baseball coach and assistant in football for a year, then took over the head job in both sports the following year.

In 1959 Lanham went to the University of Delaware and became a graduate assistant coach in freshman football and head freshman baseball coach. He then received his appointment to Dayton.

A native of Advent, W. Va., the 34-year-old Lanham graduated from Ripley High School in 1947. After a year's active duty with the U. S. Air Force, he enrolled at Glenville State and received a B.A. degree in physical education in 1954. He holds a master's degree in education from Delaware. Playing both as a halfback and in the line, he captained the Glenville grid team and was chosen the school's outstanding senior athlete.

Lanham and his wife, Helen, are parents of two sons and a daughter.

URBAN BOWMAN

Offensive Line Coach

A former lineman under Lude at the University of Delaware, Bowman came to CSU in 1964 from Lebanon Valley College at Annville, Pa., where he was line coach during the 1963 season.

Bowman, 27, is a native of Westminster, Md. He played center, guard, and tackle at Delaware, tutored by Lude, then line coach at the school. He was graduated in 1959 with a B.S. degree in physical education, after which he served 2 years as an Army lieutenant at Fort Jackson, S. C. He received the Army Commendation Medal, marking the first time in 5 years an officer at the Fort Jackson post had won that award.



Following his discharge in 1961, Bowman taught English in the Newark, Del., public school system and was line coach for the University of Delaware freshman team. In 1962 he served as head freshman coach at the University of Dayton, then he received his appointment at Lebanon Valley.

At Dayton he was in charge of the guidance and counseling program for the athletic department and was chief scout for the football staff.

Bowman and his wife, Allene, are parents of two daughters and a son.

BOB WEBER

Defensive Line Coach

One of CSU's all-time best football players, Weber joined the Ram coaching staff in 1964 after posting an outstanding record at Trinidad State Junior College. As head coach there the previous 3 years, his teams won 25 games, lost 5, and tied 2 and won the Empire Junior College Conference each season. He was chosen "National JC Coach of the Year" in 1962 as his squad was ranked first nationally.



A native of Fort Collins, Weber played at CSU in 1951 and 1952, and again in 1955 and 1956 after serving 2 years in the Army. He made the All-Skyline Conference teams as a center and linebacker in both his junior and senior seasons and was a key man in the Rams' drive to the 1955 Skyline title. He holds bachelor's and master's degrees from CSU.

Weber played a season of professional football with Edmonton in the Canadian League in 1957 before going to Trinidad as an assistant coach in 1958. He was promoted to the head coaching job there in 1961.

Weber and his wife, Connie, are parents of two sons and one daughter.

STAFF INTRODUCTIONS

PHIL PLUTT, CAPTAIN, USAF Head Freshman Coach

A member of the CSU Air Force ROTC faculty, Capt. Plutt is in his first season as head freshman coach. He assisted with the freshman coaching duties last fall.

Capt. Plutt is a native of Denver and a 1955 graduate of CSU. He played center for the 1952, 1953, and 1954 Ram teams and earned a degree in animal husbandry.

Capt. Plutt returned to CSU last fall after serving the previous 3 years in England with the 10th TAC Reconnaissance Wing. While in England, he was head coach in 1962 and 1963 of the Alconbury AFB football team. His prior overseas service included 2 years in Korea, 1957-58, as a fighter pilot.

He and his wife, Sally, are parents of a son and a daughter.



Graduate Assistant Coaches JACK LINDER

A May 1965 graduate of Brigham Young University with a B.S. degree in animal science, Linder joined the Ram freshman coaching staff this fall. He is studying for a master's degree at CSU.

Linder, 22, was born and raised in Kenedy, Texas, starring in football, basketball, and baseball as a quarterback at Kenedy High.

He played 2 years of football at BYU, before a back injury ended his playing career. The last 2 years he was an assistant coach for the Cougar frosh.



JOHN NICELY

Nicely, who is studying for a master's degree in the area of guidance and counseling is in his second season on the staff. He will work with the varsity as scout team coach. Last year he assisted with the freshman coaching duties.

A native of Daytona Beach, Fla., Nicely, 25, is a 1964 physical education graduate of the University of Delaware. He played guard at UD and was coached by Mike Lude, who was then line coach at the university. In the spring of 1964 Nicely helped coach the line at Delaware.



LEO FELNER

A 1961 graduate of CSU with a B.S. degree in social science, Felner will serve as assistant freshman coach this fall while working on a master's degree in education.

Felner, 31, has had previous coaching experience at Gorman High School in Las Vegas, Nev., (1962-63) and at Mullen High in Denver (1963-64). At each school he was backfield coach in football and head baseball coach.

Born in Joliet, Ill., he was a linebacker at Joliet JC. He also played a year of service football while in the U. S. Army in Germany.



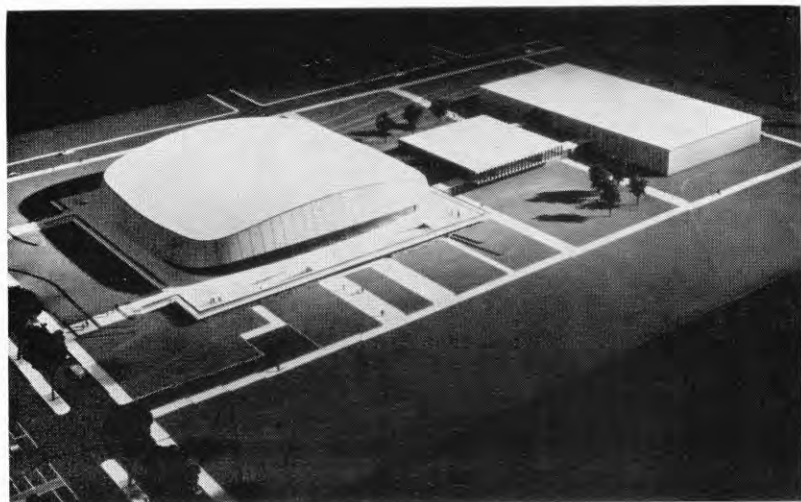
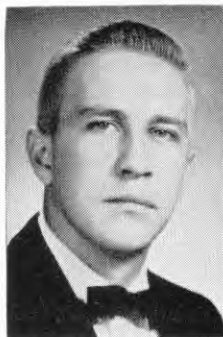
STAFF INTRODUCTIONS

TERRY HERR

Herr, who received a B.A. degree in mathematics last June at Lebanon Valley College, Annville, Pa., will assist with the freshman coaching while working on a master's degree in physical education.

The 25-year-old native of Palmyra, Pa., was an all-conference end at Lebanon Valley where he was under the coaching of Urban Bowman, then line coach at the college. Herr also competed in basketball and track as an undergraduate.

He played football while serving in the U. S. Navy from 1958 through 1961.



FUTURE CSU ATHLETIC HEADQUARTERS

In the near future, Colorado State University's athletic and physical education programs will move into new roomy and functional headquarters—the three-building complex shown above.

This is the architect's model of the structures — a 9,500-seat auditorium-gymnasium, a central building for physical education staff, faculty, and classrooms, and a building for physical training, swimming pool, wrestling area, handball courts, intramurals, etc.

The auditorium-gymnasium main building is scheduled for completion by Jan. 1, 1966, the rest of the complex by next summer.

A. W. "RED" WHITNEY Business Manager of Athletics

Juggling bills and checks, handling tickets, managing all financial affairs of the athletic department, and arranging trips for CSU athletic teams are among the duties of A. W. "Red" Whitney.

Whitney, long a strong supporter of Colorado State University athletics and a former Aggie freshman football player, became business manager of athletics in October 1956.



MAX MORTON Head Trainer

Max Morton this fall is beginning his first year as trainer of CSU athletic teams, succeeding the veteran Jim Stults who has retired to teach full time in the University's physical education department.

A native of Yuma and a 1959 physical education graduate of CSU, Morton returned to CSU this fall after serving as head trainer at the University of Denver since January, 1964.



PAUL DEES Equipment Manager

In charge of team uniforms and all athletic gear is Paul Dees. His job is to keep CSU athletes properly outfitted for combat and to see that the equipment is in good repair.

Dees, former star athlete at Fort Collins High School, was appointed to the job in 1964, succeeding E. C. "Cec" Jenison.



1965 RAM OUTLOOK

With 19 lettermen and most of last year's first-stringers returning, Colorado State University's Rams should continue their climb back up the ladder to pigskin prosperity in 1965.

Coach Mike Lude's 1964 Rams put on a strong finishing kick, winning three of their last four games. They wound up with a 5-6 record—best mark at the school since a 6-4 figure in 1959.

While the 19 lettermen provide Lude with the most experienced squad he has had since coming to CSU in 1962, the Ram chief points out that experienced depth is lacking and "we will have to work hard to develop adequate reserve strength from untested material.

"A nucleus of 19 lettermen would be fairly solid for one-platoon competition, but it doesn't stretch very far in these days of two-platoon football," he notes.

"In addition to depth development," Lude continues, "our other main needs are to strengthen our execution and performance at the quarterback and fullback positions on the offensive units and to improve the linebackers and find more depth at halfback on the defensive platoons. We also have an experience problem at offensive end and the offensive guards lack speed and size.

"Overall team defense and the rushing attack should be our strongest points."

Among the leading players returning will be linebacker Jim Foster and tackle Larry Macro in the defensive front ranks, tackle and captain Fred Hollaus in the offensive line, halfback Bernie Blanchard and safetyman Jerry Barnes in the defensive backfield, and halfbacks Jess Willis and Jim Roles in the offensive secondary.

Willis, a 187-pound senior with outstanding moves and good speed, topped the Ram rushers with 580 yards in 145 carries for a 4 yard average last season. He and Roles, lightning-quick 163-pound junior who improved greatly near the end of last season, head a capable corps of running backs.

The group of returning veterans includes 17 players who were starters on either offense or defense in the final game last fall.

These are: offense — quarterback Eddie Belt, halbacks Willis and Roles, fullback Al Lear, end Tom Pack, tackles Hollaus and Bill Coffey, and guards Larry French and Wayne Hull. Defense—end Dave Yurosek, tackle Macro, middle guard Jan Laux, linebackers Foster and Mike Harker, and backs Blanchard, Barnes, and Steve Mitchell.

During spring drills Laux was switched to tackle and Harker to end in the defensive unit.

The CSU schedule is again a tough one. The 10-game slate includes two of last season's bowl winners—Utah (Liberty) and Tulsa (Bluebonnet), plus four other strong Western Athletic Conference teams and some tough independents.

ANALYSIS BY POSITION

ENDS: Offense—Inexperience is a problem here. Rugged and reliable Pack is the only returning letterman. Steve Goldman and transplanted halfback Randy Beverly, both nonlettered squadmen last term, should help. Bruce Weeter, transfer from Miami, Fla., looked very promising in spring practice and figures as a strong prospect. He and Jerry Spackman, 1964 frosh standout, head the newcomers.

Defense—Yurosek developed well last season and could be one of the region's best in 1965. Harker, leather-tough linebacker as a sophomore last fall, appears to have made successful switch to end in spring drills. Pack also is capable defender. Rest of the candidates are unseasoned.

1965 RAM OUTLOOK

TACKLES: Offense — Four lettermen available, headed by captain Hollaus, an excellent blocker and leader. Tom McCants, who dropped out of school early last fall to recover from jaundice attack, returns and looked strong and aggressive in spring practice. Last year's regular Coffey and Yurosek, moved from offensive end, will be strong candidates. Junior college transfers Phil Howard and Bill Keith appear to be the best of the new men.

Defense—Tough Larry Macro is a standout here. Laux, first stringer at middle guard last season, was switched to tackle in the spring and played well. Hollaus and McCants also will play some defense. Backup help will come from Coffey, Howard, Keith, and sophomore Dale Stuby.

GUARDS: Offense—Steady, reliable veterans Larry French and Wayne Hull, both 2-year lettermen, are small, but tough and battle-wise. Foster and Macro also strong, but will be used mostly on defense. Rod Beaudette, Dan Wood, and Bruce Bond are best of sophomore crop.

Defensive linebacker—Foster is one of the best in the area, a great one. He'll be aided by Beaudette, French, and Glenn Critchley, a transfer.

CENTERS: Offense—With veteran Al Rhode gone, this looked like problem position at start of spring ball. But Marty McNutt, defensive tackle last year, has progressed well, providing good stability and size (240). Jim Weaver, holdover squadman, also has developed surprisingly well to give Lude more encouragement about the pivot slot. Laux also will be available for some duty.

Defensive middle guard—transfers Bob Jesseau and Pete Dimick gave indication in spring drills that they will be good help. Both have quickness and agility. McNutt provides depth.

QUARTERBACKS: Lettermen Eddie Belt and Tom Miller, both seniors, will probably battle it out for first-string job that Belt held most of last season. Bob Wolfe, a junior who came on rapidly toward the end of 1964, also will be contender, as will sophomore Jon Henderson. Henderson is real quick and a strong, fast runner, lacking only experience. Other top newcomers are transfer Rich Ball and sophomore Al Katsock.

HALFBACKS: Offense—Willis gives the Rams one of the most consistent running backs in the region. He and Roles have the ability and speed to reel off the long-distance strikes. Roles developed near end of 1964 campaign and will become steadier as he picks up experience. Defensive specialist Blanchard, moved from offensive fullback, will supply good power. Howard Knapp, 2-year letterman, is very dependable, as is nonletterman Tom Tayler. Don Simon is small, but a heady runner and Mitchell will play chiefly defense, but also is a more than adequate ball-carrier. Sophomore Glenn Grober has a fine future and figures prominently. Alton Lavan, Jim Richardson, and Roscoe Ford are other top sophomore prospects.

Defense—Blanchard, hard-knocking tackler and fine pass defender, provides security at one post and Beverly or Lavan should be top bidders for other spot. But experience is lacking. Help will be needed from Richardson, squad holdover Dave Jackson, sophomore Skip Anderson, and Willis. Depth is critical here.

FULLBACKS: Offense—Lude is looking for an improved performance here to effect more ground-gaining consistency. Leading candidates are Al Lear and Barnes, the first and second level men last year. The newcomer help will come from sophomores Jack Cummins and Oscar Reed and transfer Critchley.

Defensive safety—Mitchell and Barnes, rugged regulars, did fine job last year. Beverly, Tayler, and Lavan need to come through for depth.

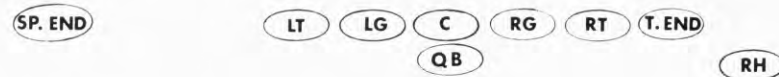

RAM 'MIRROR' SYSTEM

Coach Mike Lude's nutshell explanation of the Rams' offensive and defensive systems:

"Offensively, our basic system is a winged-T alignment, emphasizing what we call a 'mirrored' offense. This means that personnel playing on the right side can easily be shifted to the left side and 'mirror' their assignments. In other words, holding a play card up to a mirror you could understand that, for instance, the right tackle is prepared to play the left tackle slot and vice versa.

"Our attack features double-team and trap blocking, although we also include series consisting of straight ahead blocking and influence blocking.

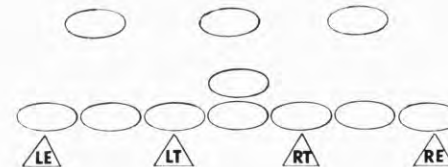


BASIC OFFENSIVE



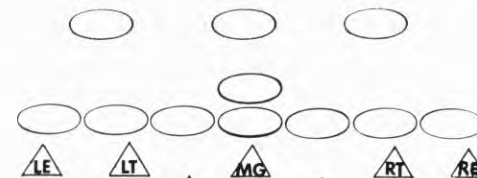

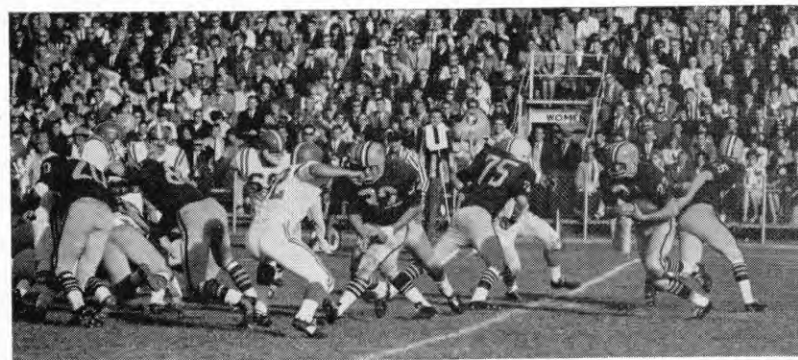

THE UNIVERSITY

Situated in the valley of the Cache la Poudre River, 5,000 feet above sea level, Colorado State University is one of Colorado's oldest state educational institutions. The coeducational land-grant school was established by the territorial legislature in 1870, classes beginning in 1879. Three students constituted the first graduating class in 1884.

Today 11,900 students are enrolled in seven colleges—Science and Arts, Engineering, Agriculture, Veterinary Medicine, Forestry and Natural Resources, Home Economics, and Business. Graduate work, leading to master's and doctor of philosophy degrees, is available in many fields.

In addition to academic instruction, the University is responsible for operation of the CSU Research Foundation; the Experiment Station for research in agriculture, engineering, and home economics; and the Extension Service, which disseminates information throughout the State in agriculture and home economics. The State 4-H program originates at CSU.

CSU's students come from all parts of the world, but the majority of the student body—approximately 73 percent—is composed of Colorado residents.

The school has undergone several name changes during its history. The most recent change was from Colorado A&M College to Colorado State University in May 1957.

THE CAMPUS

The tree-shaded, beautifully landscaped main campus covers 375 acres, with a newly-established Foothills Research campus adjoining on the west.

Like that of most American universities, the enrollment at CSU is rapidly increasing. The University is currently in the midst of a multimillion dollar expansion program, designed to keep classroom, laboratory, housing, and athletic facilities in step with the booming student population.

Among recently completed buildings are library, humanities, liberal arts, and health service facilities. A 10,000-seat auditorium-gymnasium, several academic buildings, and additional men's and women's residence halls are under construction.

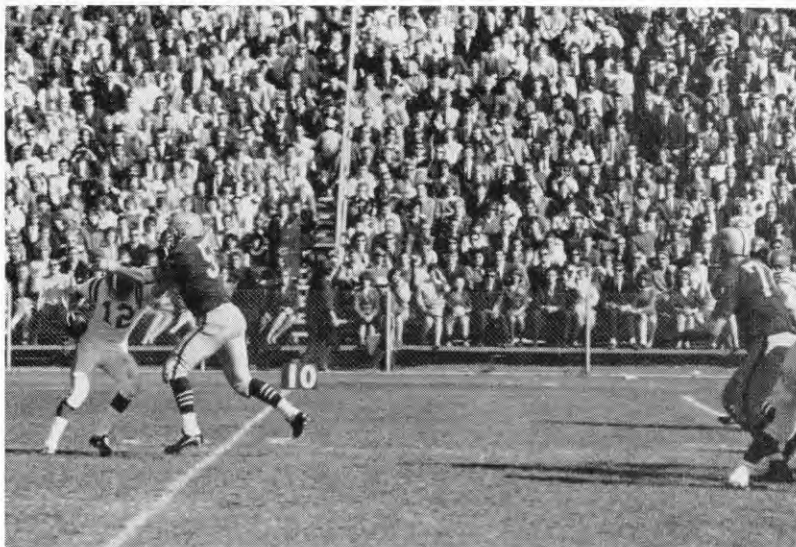


ATHLETIC PROGRAM

RAM BASKETBALL—1965-66

Feature attractions on Colorado State University's 1965-66 basketball schedule are the Holiday Festival tournament in New York's Madison Square Garden and the Mile High Classic in Denver.

Coach Jim Williams' Rams will open the season as defending champions in the Dec. 3-4 Mile High meet at the Denver City Auditorium Arena. They take on Denver University in the second game of the opening round, following a Wyoming University-Air Force Academy lid-lifter. Championship and third place games are slated the next night.

CSU will make its first appearance in the long-time prestigious Dec. 27-31 Holiday Festival tourney which has a field of 8 of the nation's top teams.

The Ram quintet this winter will be headed by returning regulars Lonnie Wright, an All-American guard-forward candidate; and peppercot backcourt man Tom Vidakovich. The CSU schedule:

- Dec. 3-4—Mile High Classic at Denver.
- Dec. 10—Long Beach State at Fort Collins.
