A Note to the Press, Radio and TV

The 1971 Colorado State University Football Guide is a publication of the CSU Sports Information Office to aid members of the press, radio and TV in covering the Rams.

All requests for working press tickets and photo passes should be made with Riley Hall, Sports Information Director, one week prior to the playing of the game. Please indicate the name of the person assigned to cover, and if Western Union service is required.

Photographers should indicate whether they will need space in the press box or field passes. No one will be allowed to take photos inside the 35-yard lines or work in front of the players' benches.

Radio stations originating games from Hughes Stadium should have the telephone company contact the Sports Information Office for booth location. A maximum of five booth passes will be allotted, including spotters, and will be mailed only if requested well in advance and they must be paid by the originating outlet.

Press box services include play-by-play half-time and final statistics, substitutions, drive charts, scoring, officials, programs and speed cards.

Your host for Colorado State University football is Riley Hall, Sports Information Director for the Rams since 1968. Hall is in charge of publications and media relations for the athletic department.

Hall is a 1966 graduate of the University of Texas at El Paso where he majored in Journalism and minored in radio-TV. He served as assistant Sports Information Director at UTEP and as

a sportswriter for the Lincoln Evening Journal in Nebraska before coming to CSU.

He is a member of the U.S. Football Writers, the U.S. Basketball Writers and the College Sports Information Directors of America.

Youth Movement Underway at CSU

Colorado State University's 1971 football fortune will be in the hands of the younger generation as the Rams embark on their 72nd season of college football.

CSU returns 18 letter winners from the 1970 season — five starters on offense and only three full-time starters on the defensive side. Of the 43 freshmen reporting from last season's 3-1 frosh unit, 18 of them have found places on the CSU depth chart as either first or second unit performers.

There are some blue chippers, however, in the junior and senior classes to mix in with the youth movement who should be able to see the Rams over the hump in coach Jerry Wampfler's second year at the helm. The leader, of course, is Lawrence "The Clutch" McCutcheon who returns for his senior year as a Ram with a roomful of honors already.

An All-WAC performer for the Rams a year ago, McCutcheon rushed for 1,008 yards in 1970 to become the first man in Ram history to rush for over 1,000 yards in one season. He topped the Western Athletic Conference in all-purpose rushing with his 1,810 yards and finished fourth nationally in that category.

Wampfler and his staff will have quarterback problems again in 1971 as the search continues with hopes that the final outcome will be as successful as a year ago when scout team quarterback Wayne Smith came to the top just before the season opener. Wayne later went on to establish new CSU records for almost all passing and total offense divisions.

But Smith has departed and left the all-important quarterback job open for four candidates. The likely choice going into the fall will be senior Jim Erickson, a backup quarterback to Smith a year ago, and a young man with a strong arm and good running ability. Erickson, if he continues to perform as well this fall, could very well be the man in the saddle when the Rams ride into Provo, Utah Sept. 18 for the season opener against Brigham Young.

Jim Feltus, who paced the 1970 frosh unit to a 3-1 season mark and took Grand Junction, Colo. High School to the finals of the state tournament, should also see action this season. Feltus completed 27 of 56 for the frosh for 433 yards in the four games. Sharing the backup duties with Feltus will be senior Scott Simmons who was redshirted a year ago. Ron Polasek, a junior, will be available if needed.

On the other end of the quarterback picture are the split ends. Senior Don McGatlin returns but could have trouble beating out sophomore Greg Stemrick. Stemrick was the leading receiver for the frosh a year ago and has outstanding speed. He will have to learn to read the secondary coverage.

At the tight end, Steve Endres returns after earning a letter and will provide the Rams with experience. A shoulder injury during the spring which later resulted in surgery will hold the key to his future in '71. Jim Kennedy, a transfer from Hiram Scott College in Nebraska, is a real unknown at this time but the 6-3, 225 pounder has shown great promise and will be ready to either back up or move in as a starter depending on the healing power of Endres. Backing up those two fellows will be sophomore Steve Zediker who played as a fullback for the frosh last season.

"Overall, I would say our passing game lacks experience. You have to get out and work together with the same group and learn to read the various secondary coverages before you can have an outstanding passing game," CSU coach Jerry Wampfler notes. "And you have to have an offensive line that can protect."

The Rams strength will lie in the offensive backfield where McCutcheon returns along with senior halfback Jake Green and senior Larry Tarver at the fullback slot. All three earned letters last season and covered enough real estate to own half of Colorado.

Tabbing the 1971 Campaign (Cont'd)

Tom Wallace, up from the freshman unit will back up Tarver, while Gil Sanford will receive backup duty to both Green and McCutcheon. Sanford had an outstanding spring and looked good last season in a backup role.

"I expect Green, McCutcheon, Sanford and Tarver to carry the load this season in the rushing department," Wampfler says, "and McCutcheon should have his best season ever. He is an all-America in every sense of the word."

The offensive backfield is experienced, but the offensive line has new faces. The center position has been filled by transfer Bruce Fahrni of El Camino Junior College as he did an outstanding job during the spring. Fahrni replaces Bill Pietrosky who graduated and will be backed up by Andy Lang and Greg Fenech, both sophomores.

Dave Campbell of Cerritos Junior College has moved into the left tackle slot and should play opposite senior letterman Ron Sondrup who, although not a regular last season, should receive a lot of action in '71. Sophomore Scott Mikovich and transfers Mike Schulte and Tim Darton are waiting in the wings.

Wampfler feels the lack of depth in the offensive line could take its toll and sophomore Joe Lasse might be moved into that area from his defensive tackle spot.

The right guard spot finds one of the two offensive line performers returning in Gary Vernon, a senior with 11 games of playing time under his belt. Sophomore Greg Kuhn appears to have the inside track on the left tackle spot with Ben Wasson, Ed Brandt and Jim Hillier all in the running for playing time at the position.

"We have only two returning regulars in Vernon and Endres on the offensive line" Wampfler says, "and you certainly can't say that that is a strength. However, our offensive backs are strong and even though we are green up front, I expect our offensive line to be bigger and stronger than it was a year ago."

Defensively, the Rams have four regulars returning and several letter winners to help. CSU will be playing a basic 4-4 defense for '71 with the middle linebacker a key to the overall operation.

Mike Guthrie, a senior, received valuable playing time at the middle slot a year ago and goes in as the No. 1 middle linebacker. His injury problems at CSU during his career have forced Wampfler to back up the position with added depth. Wes Cerveny who played defensive end for the frosh will be at the middle spot along with Terry Kirk.

Up front on the line Gerald Caswell was a backup performer a year ago but the big 6-4, 235-pound junior had an outstanding spring at his defensive tackle position along with 6-4, 240-pound senior starter Bill Johanningmeier on the other side. Johanningmeier and Caswell are both all-conference candidates. Manson Petty, a sophomore at 6-4, 240, will be available for help.

Tim McGee and Charles Jackson go into the fall as the No. 1 ends. McGee had a very bright spring while Jackson appears to have made the shift from his tight end spot of a year ago. Transfers Ken Behrens and Jack Poindexter could make their presence known when the fall drills roll around.

A lot of experimentation was done with the swingbackers this spring as letterman Greg Hargis is back for his senior year and former fullback Les Olson has been moved to the position for a look-see. Another candidate is Rick Rowher a sophomore from Evergreen, Colo., who has shown promise.

Paul Duda, at 6-1, 205, has the rover position locked in following an outstanding season in '70. The two-year letter winner is expected to anchor the defense this season and earn all-conference honors. Three sophomores will back up Duda to receive needed experience. The three--Greg Battle, Gerald Scutt and Scott Fitzgerald--have bright futures as Rams.

Sophomore Darryl Thompson has laid claim to the rover slot with senior Doug Bitetto

having an opportunity of moving in.

The free safety position is in the capable hands of senior Tom Stockham who started all 11 games for the Rams in 1970. Stockham is listed by Wampfler as being one of the Rams' top defensive backs and was second in the defensive charts a year ago. Stockham did, however, have a little tough luck in the spring following knee surgery and will have to have time in the fall to regain his strength. He will be backed up by senior Dennie Harms and sophomore Jim Votaw.

The cornerbacks should be manned by sophomore Bill Duncan and senior Dan Ruzek with JC transfers Perry Smith and Dan Brown waiting in the wings for duty.

Wampfler has a new place kicker in Paul Johnson to take the place of graduated Dan Torzala who now works for the San Diego Chargers. Rod Blackford, former Poudre High School standout, will give senior Ted Hill a run for his money in the race for the punting chores.

"I would say that the biggest problem on our football team will be the defense," Wampfler says. "It was very porous last year and we concentrated very hard on it this spring trying to get it changed. We worked on becoming more physical and improving our fundamentals.

"We also intend to improve our tackling. Much of our success or lack of it this season will hinge on our defense and how well it can tighten up and become a sounder and more consistent defense. We can't give up as many points as we did a year ago.

"We will be a young club overall and as I look at our total picture, I can see where we aren't stair stepped with sophomores, juniors and seniors like we need to be to win. I do, however, look for a team that plays with more physical aggressiveness and makes fewer mistakes as we go through the 1971 season. We will play heads-up football and we'll have our days on the field."

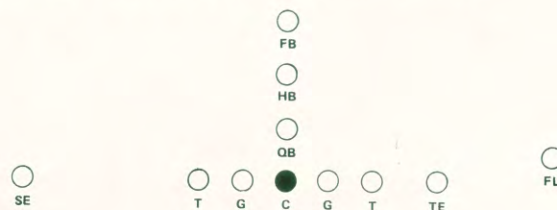

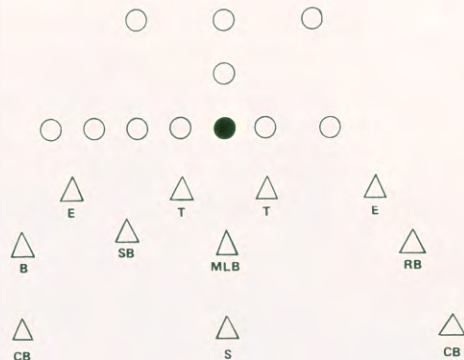

CSU's Offensive & Defensive Units

Colorado State University's offensive system will take on the multiple look for 1971. Coach Wampfler feels he can use the multiple offense most effectively because it lends itself to the passing game and to the running game. It also gives more opportunity to use the personnel available. "My cup of tea is to have a balanced attack," Wampfler notes, "and the multiple will fit CSU the best for the upcoming season."



The Rams' Bold Gold defensive unit will go to the 4-3 system for 1971. Coach Wampfler will use both the college and pro 4-3 as his basic defense because it is flexible. With the 4-3, a team can have an eight man rush or play a 4-3-4 against the pass. The whole purpose behind CSU's 1971 defense will be to squeeze the opponent to the middle and contain the outside.





Hughes Stadium

"Showcase of the Rockies"

Colorado State University's Rams play their football in the "Showcase of the Rocky Mountains," beautiful Hughes Stadium. The 30,000 seat structure was completed in the fall of 1968.

Begun early in May, 1967, the \$2,960,000 stadium is being financed by student fees, donations from alumni and other friends of the university and athletic gate receipts. No tax funds are involved.

The structure combines the best features of major college stadiums throughout the country. All seats are slanted toward midfield for the best possible viewing.

The west stands rise 72 rows high from seven to 88 feet above the playing field. There are 46 rows of seats on the east side.

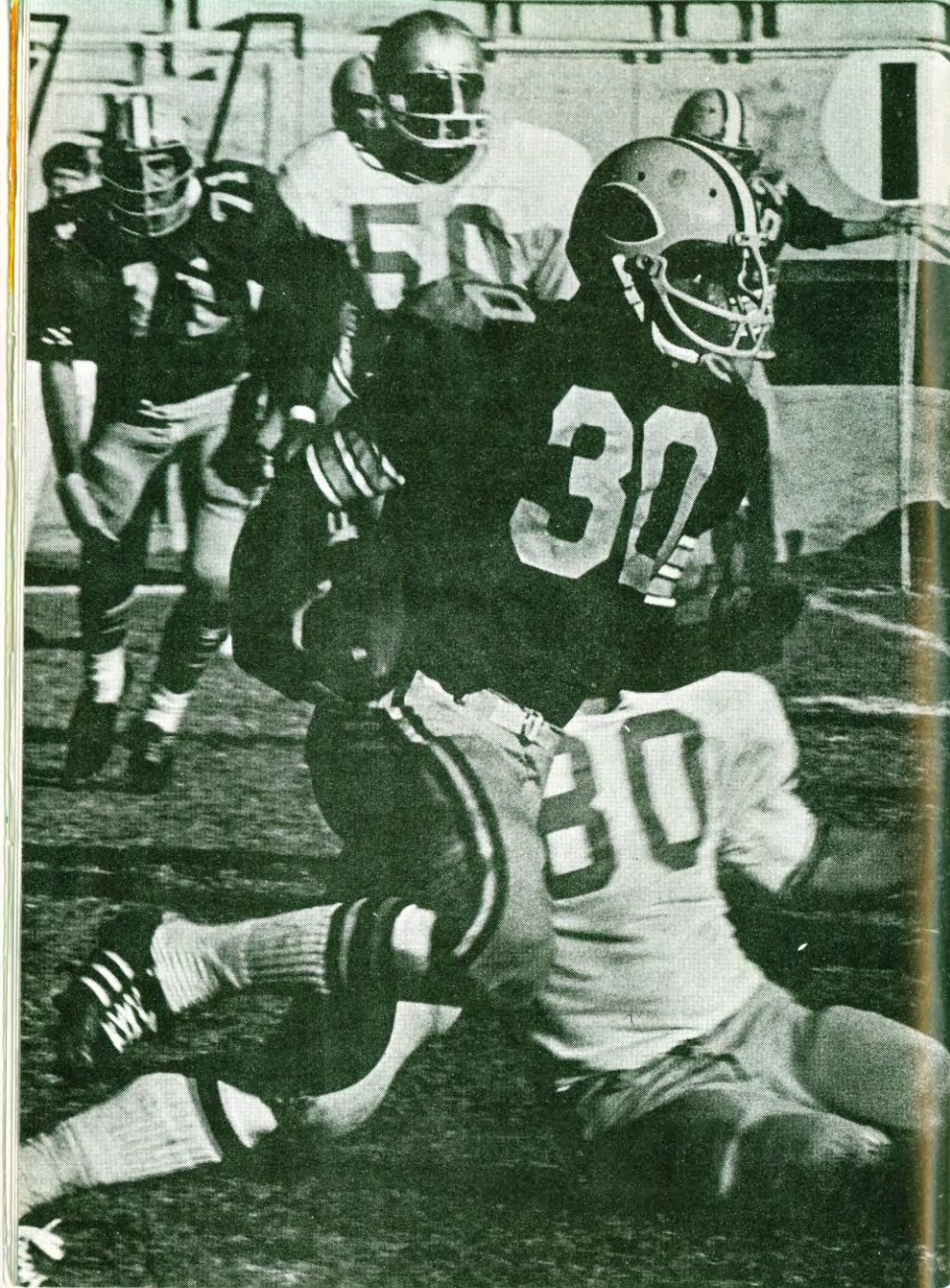
Located under the concourse at the south end of the stadium is the locker area, housing several different types of facilities—dressing and shower quarters for teams and game officials, trainers' taping rooms, photography darkroom and a coach's press conference room.

The stadium is named in honor of the late Harry Walker Hughes, who earned regional and national prominence in serving as athletic director and football coach at CSU for more than 40 years. He was head football coach from 1911 through 1941, winning or tying for the conference championship eight years.

He was director of athletics from 1911 until retiring July 1, 1953, only 25 days before his death.

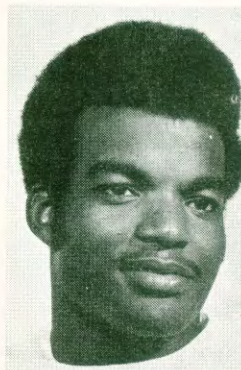

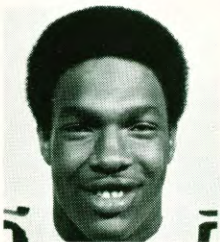

Lawrence "The Clutch" McCutcheon is the first CSU running back to ever break 1,000 yards rushing in a season as he romped for 1,008 yards during 1970. . . A two-year starter for the Rams, McCutcheon has established his name as a household word in the WAC and is recognized as one of the finest runners in the nation. . . "The Clutch" had only one game in 1970 in which he gained less than 100 yards rushing and receiving. . . When the Rams' ground game bogged down in the mud against Wyoming, Lawrence wound up on the receiving end for 149 yards and 66 yards on the ground for 215 yards. . . His biggest day rushing as a Ram came against West Texas State in 1969 as he gained 213 yards. . . He almost topped that mark in 1970, however, as he ran for 207 yards in 39 carries against Brigham Young University. . . The 39 carries was a new CSU and WAC record and earned him WAC Back of the Week honors. . . He was fifth in the nation in rushing after five games in 1969 as he compiled 586 yards in only 92 carries. He later finished 19th nationally after eight games and a broken wrist which forced him to miss the final two games of the 1969 season. . . He

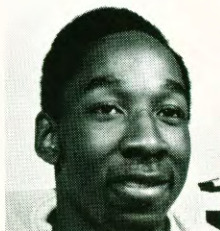
finished 25th nationally in rushing in 1970 with his 1,008 yards and 91.6 per game average . . . He placed fourth nationally in all-purpose running with 1,810 yards. . . His all-purpose rushing total now stands at an impressive 3,109 yards in two seasons. . . The Fiesta Bowl is big-league from the word "Go"!

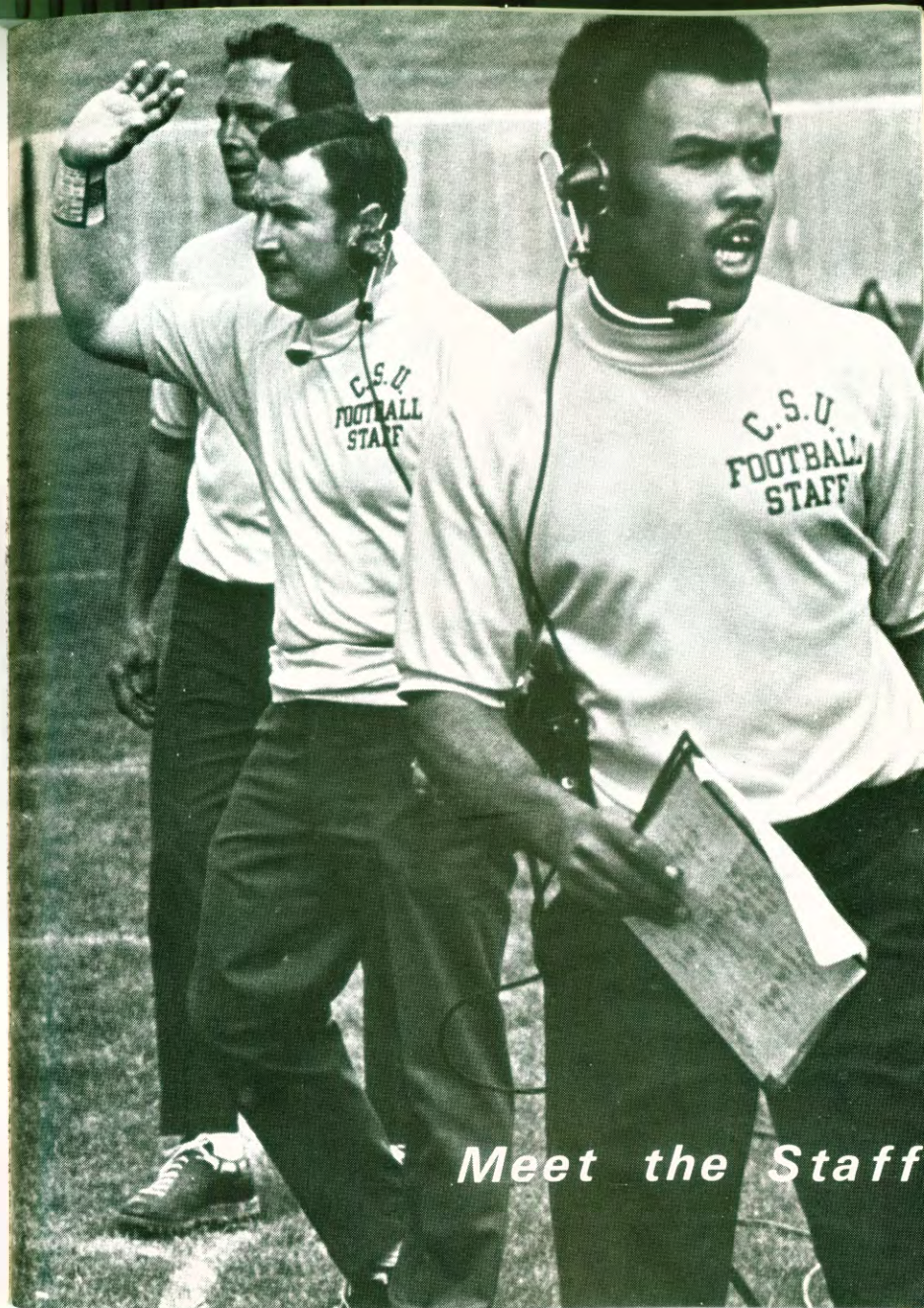
Participating teams are guaranteed \$100,000, but are expected to receive well over \$150,000—surely a record for a first-year bowl.

Founded in 1962, members of the WAC have won seven NCAA team championships in the past six years and in football, two WAC teams have won national recognition by going undefeated through the regular season: Wyoming in 1967 and Arizona State in 1970.

In regular-season play, WAC football teams have defeated such name opponents as Air Force, California, Minnesota, Mississippi and Ohio State, and on their future schedules are such teams as Michigan State, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas, Arkansas and UCLA.

WAC football is open, modern, exciting football. The rosters of pro football teams are studded with the names of former WAC stars. He received a doctor's degree in engineering in 1955 from CSU. In 1955 and 1956 he attended the University of Grenoble in France on a Fulbright Grant.

In 1956 Chamberlain became associate professor of civil engineering and civil engineering research coordinator. From the associate professorship, he advanced to the position of executive vice president in 1966.

He became a professor and chief of civil engineering research in 1957 and became acting engineering dean in 1959 and in 1969 vice president for administration and professor of civil engineering.

He was elected by the Jaycees as one of the Outstanding Young Men in Colorado in 1961. He is a member of numerous fraternal and honorary societies.

Dr. Chamberlain and his wife, Virginia, are the parents of three children, Curtis, Tracy and Tac.

Perry Moore—Director of Athletics



Perry Moore

Colorado State University's athletic fortunes are guided by a former outstanding athlete and a man who has had experience in all phases of the world of intercollegiate athletics. Perry C. Moore was appointed athletic director at CSU July 1, 1968 and has been selling the CSU program in the state of Colorado and across the nation in a tireless effort to promote CSU to national prominence.

Moore is firmly dedicated to the importance of intercollegiate athletics in today's university system and he strives constantly to maintain a close interchange between the intercollegiate department programs and personnel and the other departments, programs and personnel which make up today's university.

A believer in helping his fellow universities, Moore served as national chairman for the Wichita Fund following the tragic air crash in the Colorado mountains which claimed the lives of 13 members of the staff and players of the Wichita State University

football team on its way to Logan, Utah, in the fall of 1970.

An athletic administrator at eastern and southeastern universities for 10 years, Moore came to CSU from the University of Florida, where, since 1964, he had served as assistant to the director of athletics, Ray Graves.

He joined the Florida staff in 1961 as assistant basketball coach and concessions manager and the following year he was given an additional appointment as administrative assistant to the athletic director.

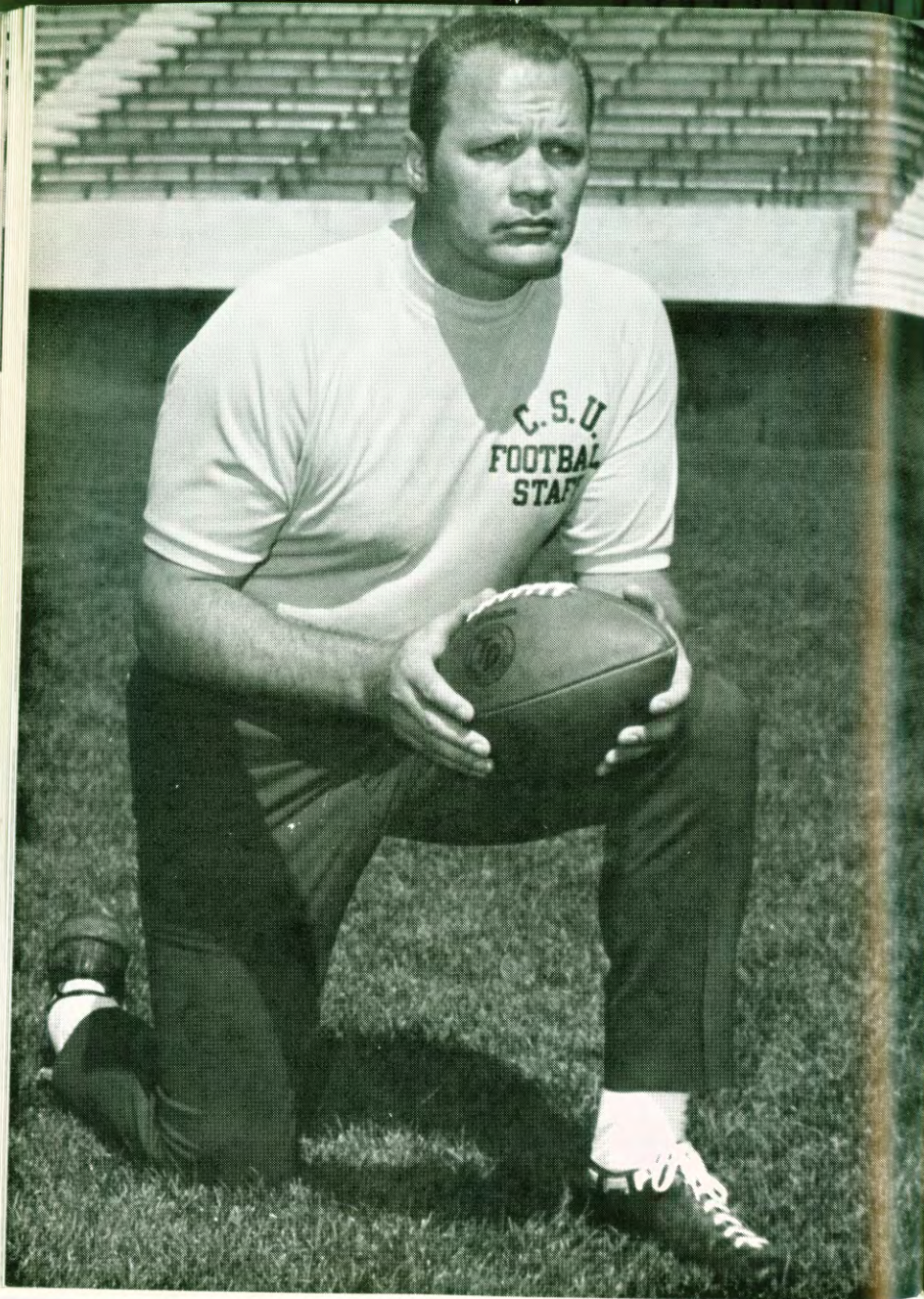
Moore graduated from the University of Maryland in 1958 after receiving a B.S. degree with first honors in physical education, recreation and health. He was selected for "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges," in 1958 and then appointed assistant basketball coach and assistant to the business manager at his Alma Mater.

At Maryland, Moore was a versatile athlete as he participated three years in basketball and track and he competed in the National Amateur Athletic Union decathlon and track and field championships and in the 1956 Olympic Games decathlon trials.

Moore is one of only four athletes to receive the Bill Guckeyson Trophy at Maryland. This award is given by the university to honor the exceptional student who shows outstanding character plus leadership qualities in athletics and academics. In 1958 he also won the Atlantic Coast Conference Award of Excellency in athletics and academics and the Herbert K. Evans Memorial Award as the most outstanding trackman.

Born Nov. 5, 1931, at Sherman, W. Va., Moore received his high school education at Belpre, Ohio, and Linsley Military Institute, Wheeling, W. Va. He enrolled at Ohio State University in 1950 and competed in freshman football. He then attended the U.S. Naval Academy Preparatory School in 1951-52. Military service as a Navy airman interrupted his college career until 1954 when he enrolled at Maryland.

Moore is married to the former Miss Peggy Jo Stone. They are the parents of a daughter, Pamela Jo, and a son, Perry Clay, Jr.



Head Coach — Jerry Wampfler

One look at Jerry Wampfler and you know he's a veteran of many gridiron wars. Heavy set, muscular and eyes of steel tell you right away that he knows what the game is about.

He arrived on the CSU campus in January of 1970 and the renewed interest in CSU football became apparent from that moment on. His practice sessions have drawn large crowds. When he speaks, the people listen and his players know what the "man" wants.

The 38-year-old native of Ohio was one of the most outstanding high school coaches ever in Ohio before moving on to college coaching positions at Miami of Ohio and Notre Dame.

Involved in only one losing season in 24 years of playing and coaching, Wampfler came to CSU from Notre Dame where he served four years as the offensive line coach.

During his stay with the "Fighting Irish", Wampfler helped guide the team to a national championship in 1966, when the Irish finished third nationally in total offense.

Notre Dame placed fifth nationally in 1967 and seventh in offense; eighth in the nation in 1968 and second in offense and completed a very successful season in 1969 with an eighth place position in the final wire service polls.

The new Ram boss is in constant demand as a lecturer at coaching clinics and universities throughout the country and spends a great deal of time during the winter months on the banquet circuit.

Wampfler doesn't make any predictions on the won-loss record he and his staff will be able to maintain at CSU but does say his teams will be fundamentally sound, abreast of the latest strategy and will represent CSU by playing with a full heart.

Wampfler graduated from New Philadelphia, Ohio High School in 1950 and played football four years from 1947 to 1950.

He moved on to Miami University of Ohio in 1950 where he played football for four years—1950-1954. While there Wampfler played under Woody Hayes one year and Ara Parseghian three years. He was an All-Ohio and All-Mid-America Conference tackle in 1953.

He received his B.S. Degree in Education at Miami of Ohio in 1954 and later earned his master's degree in Education at Xavier University of Cincinnati, Ohio.

Wampfler returned to his home town and began his coaching career at New Philadelphia High School in Ohio in 1954 where he served one year as assistant football, basketball and head track coach. He moved the next season to Presbyterian College in Clinton, S.C., where he was the offensive and defensive line coach and head baseball coach.

He took over the defensive coaching position at Lancaster Ohio High School in 1956 and his defensive troops held the 10 opponents to only six touchdowns.

Wampfler received his first head coaching position at Massillon, Ohio, High School in 1957 and remained there until 1962.

He returned to Lancaster in 1962 and guided his team to an 8-1-1 record and was the Central Ohio League's Coach of the Year.

In 1963 he returned to his Alma Mater, Miami of Ohio, where he worked as the offensive coordinator under present Michigan coach Bo Schembechler. During his three seasons in that position, their teams finished second in the Middle America Conference in 1963 and 1964 and took first place in 1965.

That led him to Notre Dame in 1966, where he remained until his appointment to Colorado State University. He coached seven All-Americans, George Kunz, Tom McKinley, Jim Reilly, Paul Seiler, George Goddeke, Earnie Kellerman, and Larry Di Nardo.

He and his wife Carol are the parents of three children, Nan 13, Jody 11 and Tad 9.

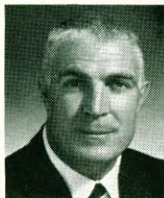

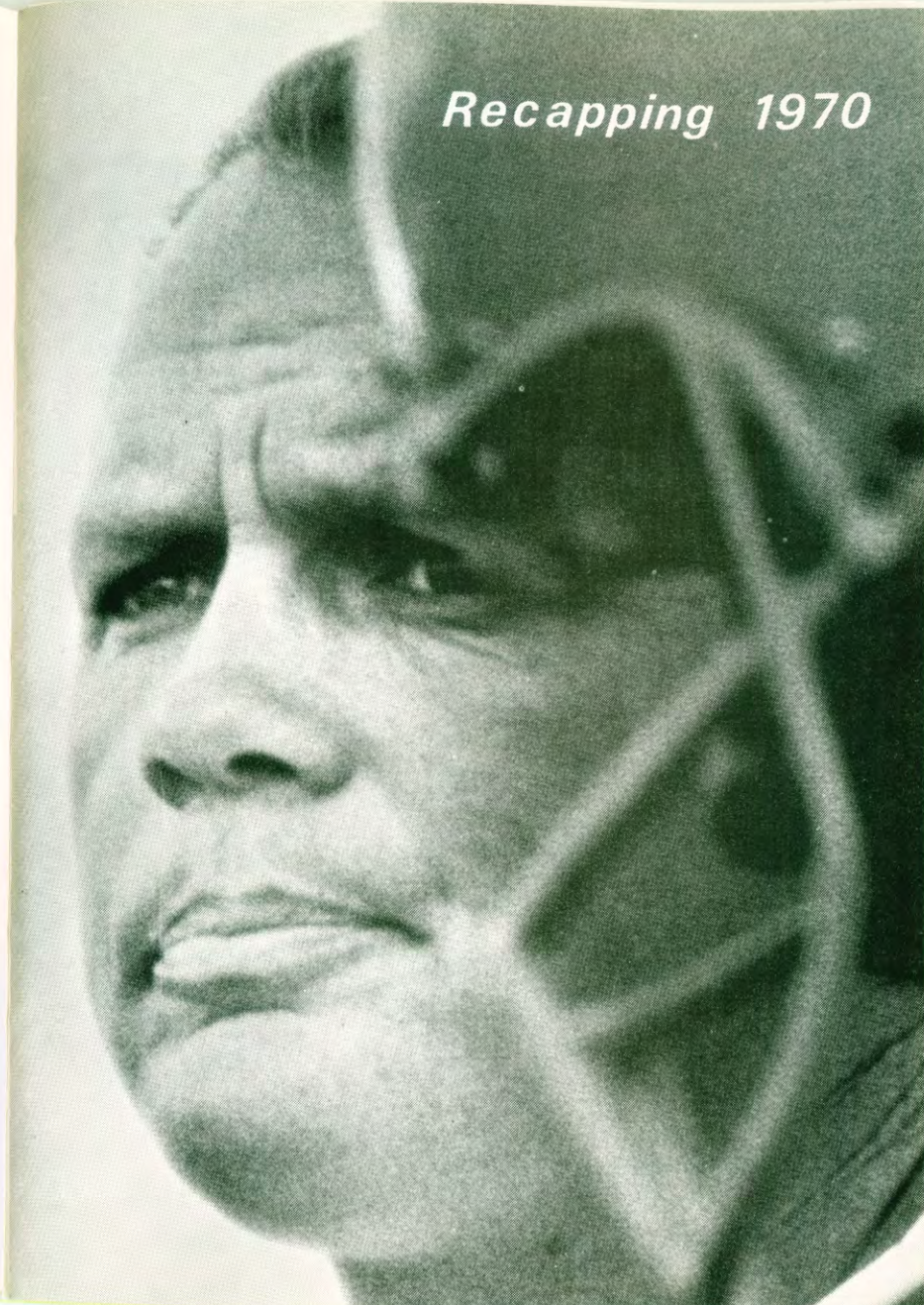

Press Box Ranks

With America's Finest

Sportswriters and broadcasters who cover the Rams have all the comforts in Colorado State University's press box. The press box, topping the west stands, is a 4,000-square foot facility with a total capacity of 125.

The main working press area can accommodate 72 writers, Western Union and other communications personnel. There is a lounge area, with snack bar, where pre-game luncheons are available to the working press.

Also on the first level, are five radio booths, two coaches' scouting booths and booths for scoreboard operation and statistics work. The press box has its own intercom system and the radio booths are equipped with headsets.

On the second level are located facilities for television cameras and announcers, photographers and a darkroom.

Located directly below the press box is the president's box and beneath the west stands are an alumni room and the Harry Hughes Memorial assembly room.

Entrance to the press box is by high speed elevator located between gates seven and eight.

THE UNIVERSITY

Colorado State University, located in the Cache La Poudre River valley 5,000 feet above sea level, is the land-grant educational institution of Colorado. The first official action to establish CSU was taken in 1870, six years before Colorado became a state.

Nearly 100 years later the enrollment at CSU has reached 17,500 students distributed among eight colleges—Agriculture, Business, Engineering, Forestry and Natural Resources, Home Economics, Humanities and Social Sciences, Natural Sciences, and Veterinary Medicine and Biomedical Sciences.

The enrollment at CSU, like many other schools in the nation, has gone through drastic change. In the past 10 years, registrations have nearly tripled. CSU's Graduate School enrollment has risen from slightly more than 300 students 10 years ago to some 2,400 today. CSU maintains a student body representative of Colorado with approximately 73 per cent of the registrants composed of residents of the state.

CSU, long recognized in the state for its excellence in both academics and research, has acquired in recent years a national and international reputation for its innovative faculty and staff.

The total student body has representatives of every state in the nation and some 60 foreign countries.

It is the role of Colorado State University to provide educational opportunities and programs for all people and its faculty and staff and students have worked for nearly 100 years to provide such services, not only to the state and the nation but the world itself.

THE CAMPUSES

The beautifully landscaped main campus covers 507 acres, with a Foothills Campus located two miles west at the base of the front range of the Rockies.

The Foothills Campus is a 2,200-acre tract used primarily for graduate education and research of various types, particularly in the biological and engineering sciences. The facilities accommodate CSU, federal and private industrial research laboratories. The university's new football stadium also is located in this area.

A third campus is at Pingree Park, 45 miles west of Fort Collins on university-owned subalpine forest land near the headwaters of the Little South Poudre River. The area serves as a high-altitude training and research center for diverse subjects ranging from basic science institutes and research to many of the natural resources disciplines.



CSU Football — 72 Years Old

Colorado State University football is 72 years old this fall.

The football program at the school had a very informal beginning in 1893 when a group of students started the sport on their own initiative. The students formed a team and took a train 33 miles south to Longmont for a game with the Longmont Academy. They lost that opener, 12-8, and recorded a 2-4 record for the first season.

No other official CSU football games were recorded until 1899 when the sport was permanently resumed on the campus. George Toomey became the first official football coach at the school the following season, 1900, and CSU has fielded a team each year since then except for the war years of 1943 to 1944.

The game at CSU received its greatest early development under Harry W. Hughes, a graduate of the University of Oklahoma who in 1911 began a 31-year career as Ram coach. Hughes was recognized as the dean of Rocky Mountain football coaches as he consistently moulded regionally powerful teams. He produced conference championship squads in 1915, 1916, 1919, 1920, 1925, 1927, 1933 and 1934.

Probably the most famous athlete coached by Hughes was Glenn Morris, an all-conference end in 1933, but better known as the record-setting winner of the decathlon in the 1936 Berlin Olympic Games.

Julius "Hans" Wagner succeeded Hughes as head coach in 1942 and held the job until 1947 when Robert L. "Bob" Davis took over. Davis coached for nine years, winding up with a Skyline Conference championship team in 1955—the first league title for the school since 1934.

Under Davis, who also served as athletic director from 1953 until his death in January, 1965, Ram teams began playing schedules more nation-wide in scope and Davis developed a reputation as a prolific producer of outstanding professional football talent. In fact CSU at one point, in the late 1940's and early 1950's, probably had more players active in the National Football League than any school its size.

Before the Davis era, CSU sent a number of players into the pro game, but most of the CSU-to-professional-ball migration has taken place in the last 20 years, during the terms of Davis and his successors, Don "Tuffy" Mullison, Mike Lude and Jerry Wampfler.

First Davis product to make it big in the NFL was Thurman "Fum" McGraw who was CSU's initial first-team football All-American. The big tackle went to the Detroit Lions in 1950. He was followed by defensive backs Jack Christiansen, former head coach of the San Francisco 49ers, and Jim David, and the three helped the Lions to two world championships. All three, along with Dale Dodrill who played with the Pittsburgh Steelers, are still rated among the all-time pro greats.
