THE WEEK

- · Colorado State will head north for a pair of Border War battles this week. The Rams will face the Cowgirls on back-to-back nights starting Friday evening.
- Both matches will serve at 6 p.m., MT and will stream on the MW Network.
- Due to COVID-19, the Rams will often play the same opponent back-to-back at the same site.

OPPONENT AT A QUICK GLANCE

- Wyoming started its season 4-0 with wins at Utah State and versus New Mexico.
- The Cowgirls suffered their first losses of the season last weekend after dropping both contests at Boise State.

 • Wyoming sits fourth in the MW standings with a 4-2 mark.
- UW is close to the top in a few statistical categories,
- including second in opponent hitting (154) and blocks (.290). The Cowgirls also are No. 4 in hitting with a .213.

 The Cowgirls were tabbed to finish third in the Mountain
- West Preseason Poll, including receiving a first place vote. • Wyoming lost a handful of players from 2019, including two starters and its libero.

LAST TIME OUT

- Colorado State faced Wyoming twice in 2019, winning both to hold a three-match winning streak.
- The Rams' only losses in the series in the last two-plus decades have come in Laramie - three losses in the last 45 contests

RAMS AT A GLANCE

- Colorado State suffered a pair of losses in Moby Arena last week against UNLV the first time losing three matches at home in Mountain West history.
- The Rams dropped to fifth in the conference standings with a 3-3 mark.
- CSU is fifth in hitting with a .213 mark and fourth in kills averaging 12.36 a set.
- After a big series with UNLV, the Rams are third in aces
- with 2.05 and opponent digs with 13.23.
 Sasha Colombo sits third in the league with a .385 hitting mark. Ciera Zimmerman is also second in the MW in assists with a 9.59 average.
- After a program record performance against UNLV, libero Alexa Roumeliotis leads the conference with 4.86 digs and is No. 55 in the nation.
- Colorado State ranks 19th in the nation in aces with an average 2.05 per set, led by Alexa Roumeliotis who is 57th in the country with .50.
- Head Coach Tom Hilbert secured his 300th Mountain West Conference victory in the first match at Nevada to be the only coach in the league to reach that milestone. •Senior Breana Runnels was named the Preseason Player of the Year for the first time and named to the Preseason
- The Rams finished last season leading the nation in opponent hitting percentage, holding foes to a .111 mark. They also finished No. 4 in the country in average blocks with 2.94

RAM FACTS

- Colorado State hasn't lost a home MW opener in Head Coach Tom Hilbert's tenure, dating back to 1997.
- CSU saw a 65% loss in its kill total, including 80% of its assists and 83% in its blocking defense after graduating five seniors.
- The Rams held a .935 win percentage in 2019 one of five teams with two losses on the season and the fourth highest win percentage in the country.
- Over 64% of the Rams' wins in 2019 came in straight sets.
- CSU was the only team to be nationally ranked in the top 11 teams in both offensive (.285) and defensive (.111) hitting percentage.

CAN YA DIG IT

- Alexa Roumeliotis had a record shattering afternoon when the Rams played UNLV for the second time.
- The senior libero recorded a program-record 36 digs in a four-set match on Feb. 20.
- The performance broke both all-time record and modern scoring marks. (29 Lindsey Kerr at Utah, 11/15/02 || 26 Izzy Gaulia vs. Wichita State, 9/9/11 and Amanda Young vs. Michigan, 12/1/17)

BOMBS AWAY

- Alexa Roumeliotis added to her performance in match two against UNLV, dropping in five service aces in the four-set contest.
- •The five aces ties the modern scoring record which hasn't been touched in eight seasons (5 Kaitlind Bestgen vs. Virginia, 9/6/13 and Danielle Minch vs. BYU, 11/26/10.
- The mark also tied the fifth all-time record for aces in a four set match, which has been tied 11 times now.

300-WIN CLUB

- Head Coach Tom Hilbert reached another milestone in his career with a win over Nevada last week, winning his 300th Mountain West Conference contest.
- He is the only coach in Mountain West history to reach the milestone and only a handful across the country.

WINNING SEASON YET AGAIN

- CSU earned their 20th win of the 2019 season with a sweep over Nevada and gave it its 24th consecutive season with 20+ wins.
- Colorado State also won its 10th match at home for the 27th consecutive season.
- To cap it off, CSU won double-digit conference wins for the 28th consecutive season, dating back to 1992 when it was still part of the Big Sky Conference.

GOOD LUCK FINDING THE FLOOR

- Colorado State led the nation in 2019 in opponent hitting percentage, holding them to a .111 percent.
- The Rams were also No. 4 in the nation in blocks per set with 2.94 blocks per set.

FOUND YOUR FLOOR

- The Rams were efficient in their hitting in 2019, leading the conference and ranking 11th in the country with a .285 mark.
- Both middle blockers Kirstie Hillyer and Paulina Hougaard-Jensen paced the team, as Hillyer was No. 2 the Mountain West and No. 12 in the nation with her .401 hitting percentage.
- Hougaard-Jensen followed with a .332 hitting mark, ranked fifth in the conference and No. 116 in the nation.

OUR NE

- The Rams have always been known for good blockers, the 2019 season was no different as their two middles rank in the MW.
- CSU ranked No. 4 in the country in blocking, led by Paulina Hougaard-Jensen who averaged 1.35 blocks per set second in the MW and No. 20 nationally.
- Kirstie Hillyer averaged 1.34 blocks per set, which was third in the conference and 25th in the country.

HEAD COACH TOM HILBERT



HILBERT HC

The Colorado State women's volleyball program has become synonymous with consistent winning under the guidance and direction of Head Coach Tom Hilbert, who enters his 24th season with the Rams and his 32nd overall as a collegiate head coach in 2021.

With 12 Mountain West Coach of the Year awards to his credit in the league's 21-year history, it is clear why Hilbert's program has risen to the top and has become a stalwart on the national stage as a perennial top-25 team.

Under Hilbert, who was inducted into the CSU Athletics Hall of Fame as the Hall of Honor recipient in 2006, the Rams have developed into one of the top programs in the nation, qualifying for the NCAA tournament all 23 seasons under his guidance. Overall, CSU has played in 25 consecutive tournaments dating back to 1995, which ranks seventh nationally. The stretch also includes six Regional Semifinals appearances (Sweet 16) and 15 first-round victories.

Through the 2019 campaign, Hilbert owns a career record of 764-208 (.786), including a 590-136 (.813) mark during his tenure at Colorado State. Hilbert boasts a 298-40 (.882) record in conference play since coming to Fort Collins in 1997.

At the end of 2019, Hilbert ranks 8th among active Division I head coaches (13th all-time) for winning percentage (.782), and 10th for total wins (.712). Of those ranked in the top 20 for wins, Hilbert has coached the second-fewest total matches, owning a career record of 764-208. With the Rams' win vs. San Jose State on Oct. 13, 2017, Hilbert became just the 10th coach in NCAA Division I women's volleyball history to record at least 700 victories and a career winning percentage above .780.

On Nov. 4, 2010, he became the winningest coach in any sport in CSU history, earning a victory over UNLV, his 353rd in Fort Collins. The win surpassed former men's basketball coach Jim Williams' mark of 352 victories. A year prior, Hilbert eclipsed the 500-win mark for his career. At the time, he was one of just two active coaches with more than 500 victories and fewer than 22 years of head coaching experience. Also in 2009, the veteran coach earned his 300th career win at CSU, moving ahead of his predecessor, Rich Feller, who won 299 matches from 1983-96.

The Rams won a seventh-consecutive Mountain West Championship in 2015, also earning regular-season titles in 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2013 and 2014. The seven-year streak was the longest of its kind in the NCAA through 2015. In all, Hilbert has orchestrated 16 regular-season MW titles in 21 years, also adding five conference tournament championships in nine opportunities. The 21 total titles are more than all other MW teams – past and present – combined, CSU is 298-40 in MW action under Hilbert, never finishing lower than third. What's more, in 1998, CSU's final season in the WAC, the Rams won the Mountain Division. Of those who have played four seasons for the Rams under Hilbert, each has won at least two conference titles, with all but three winning three or more.

While at CSU, Hilbert has coached 13 players who have earned AVCA All-America selections, including five in the past nine years. On four occasions, a Ram has been named a Volleyball Magazine All-American, and 31 times one of Hilbert's players has been named All-America Honorable Mention by either the AVCA or Volleyball Magazine. Under Hilbert, CSU has also earned 15 MW Player-of-the-Year awards in the league's 21-year history, and a total of 95 all-conference selections.

In addition to 17 total Conference Coach-of-the-Year awards, Hilbert was named the 2013 AVCA Pacific North Region Coach of the Year, his second regional honor during a three-year period and fifth of his career. He was recognized at the NCAA Final Four in Seattle, Wash.

Hilbert has led his teams to 20 or more wins every season since 1992, a span of 27-consecutive seasons, including the final five at Idaho and every year while at CSU.

Expected to be a rebuilding year after graduating four senior starters, the 2013 Rams rewrote the CSU and Mountain West record books, winning their first 27 matches and finishing the season with a .933 winning percentage — a program record.

The Rams carried over the momentum to 2014, a year in which CSU went 31-3 and advanced the Regional Semifinals of the NCAA tournament for the first time since 2009.

CSU switched to a 6-2 offense for the 2015 season, and did not miss a beat in league play, going undefeated in conference play for the second time (2003) with a 18-0 record against Mountain West foes and reaching a peak national ranking of No. 9.

With six freshmen seeing playing time (including four regularly starting) and only having one senior, CSU went 21-9 (15-3 MW) in 2016, finishing second in the conference and reaching its 22nd consecutive NCAA Tournament.

Colorado State returned to its championship caliber in 2017, adding its 14th Mountain West Championship trophy to the case. The Rams finished 29-4 and 17-1 in the conference, while defeating a pair of opponents in No. 16 Michigan and No. 15 Florida State - both within a week of each other. CSU made its 23rd consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance, rematching with Michigan in the first round. During the season, the Rams were ranked as high as 19 in the AVCA Poll set a program and MW record earning six conference selections.

Looking to win back-to-back Mountain West Championships in 2018, the Rams sat at 3-2 after the first two weeks of league action, losing a pair of road matches. CSU refocused and won the next 12 matches, including nine sweeps, to win it's 15th regular season championship and head to the NCAA Tournament for the 24th consecutive season.

With five seniors on the roster in 2019 and most of them starting the last three seasons, the expectations were high – and they were exceeded. The Rams finished the year with a 29-2 overall mark – 21 victories by sweep, and defeated then-No. 19 Colorado on back-to-back nights to take home the inaugural Golden Spike, while also recording a program record 28 consecutive wins. CSU reached as high as No. 10 in the AVCA Poll on their way to a perfect 18-0 Mountain West record for just the third time and secured it's 21st Mountain West title and 25th NCAA Tournament appearance.

Hilbert has also turned CSU's home court, Moby Arena, into one of the most effective in the nation, compiling a 328-39(894) all-time home record. The Rams are 46-50 at Moby against ranked opponents, most recently defeating No. 16 Michigan on Sept. 8, 2017. Hilbert has 45 total wins against ranked teams, including upsetting No. 1 UCLA in 2000.

With big wins come big crowds. The CSU faithful continuously rank in the top 15 nationally for annual attendance figures. The Rams ranked sixth in the NCAA in 2014, drawing 3,231 fans per match, including setting (at the time) a school- and conference-record 7,018 vs. Wisconsin on Sept. 6. Since, the Rams set a new program- and conference-record 7,745 in their 2018 season opener against No. 12

Between Sept. 18, 1998 and Nov. 18, 2000, CSU rattled off 44-consecutive home wins, a Moby Arena record for any sport. More recently, CSU has strung together streaks of 21 (2007-08 and 2012-13), 20 (2000-02) and 16 (2011-12). Losing a Mountain West match in Moby is also a rare occurrence - one that has happened only twice in the last nine seasons. The Rams' carried a 45-match MW home streak into the 2018 season and ended in the league finale against New Mexico on Nov. 17.

CSU has been ranked in the AVCA top-25 poll more frequently than all but 12 Division I teams, with many of those rankings coming under Hilbert. In fact, Hilbert led CSU to its highest-ever ranking – No. 3 for five weeks in 2000. On two occasions (2000, 2001), CSU has finished the year ranked in the top 10, and between Sept. 1, 1999 and Sept. 23, 2002, CSU was ranked 51 consecutive weeks.

Away from the court, Hilbert's teams have set the tone academically. During his tenure, four players have earned Academic All-America honors - most recently Katie Oleksak and Paulina Hougaard-Jensen in 2019. Additionally, the Rams have earned 96 academic all-conference nods under Hilbert's guidance, including 52 over the past six seasons. His team's cumulative GPA continues to be well above 3.5.

Before coming to CSU, Hilbert accumulated a 174-72 (707) record at Idaho — which remains the best winning percentage by a coach in Idaho history. He helped the Vandals to the Big West Eastern Division title in 1996, and in the Big Sky, his teams won either the regular season or tournament championship every year from 1992-95. In each of those seasons, Hilbert's Vandals played in the NCAA tournament – posting first-round wins in 1993 and 1994 – and Hilbert was named the Big Sky Coach of the Year.

In his first season in Moscow, the Vandals went 15-14, a drastic improvement from the program's combined 16-41 mark from the two prior seasons. Just five years later, in 1994, Idaho recorded a program-record 31 victories (31-3). Hilbert coached the Big Sky's first All-American in Mindy Rice. He also guided Idaho to its first national ranking - the first-ever ranking by a Big Sky team. In addition to Rice, Hilbert tutored nine AVCA All-Region selections, four Big Sky MVPs and 20 all-conference recipients.

Prior to Idaho, Hilbert spent five seasons as an assistant at his alma mater, Oklahoma, from 1984-88 The Sooners went 115-56 (.673) in Hilbert's five seasons in Norman, including two trips to the NCAA Tournament and an appearance in the 1988 Regional Finals.

Away from the college game, Hilbert has coached several international trips through Bring It Promotions, including winning the Global Challenge in 2009 in Croatia and coaching a USA Select Team in Argentina in 2005.

A native of Norman, Okla., Hilbert earned his bachelor's degree in business administration and marketing in 1984 from Oklahoma. In 1993, he received a master's degree in sports and recreation management from Idaho. Hilbert has resided in Fort Collins since 1997 with his daughter, Myles.

MOBY ARENA - 'THE GREATEST VOLLEYBALL VENUE IN AMERICA'

Head Coach Tom Hilbert doesn't shy away when talking about Moby Arena – the home court for the Colorado State volleyball program – calling it the greatest volleyball venue in America. It is one of the most distinctive and effective home-court playing facilities in the nation. Thanks to its dedicated fans, Moby Arena is home to crowds and winning percentages matched by few programs across the country.

HOME COOKING

Since the 2007 season, CSU has been nearly unbeatable on its home court, going 189-18 (.910).

At the end of 2019, CSU has gone 26-straight seasons with at least 10 home wins. The Rams went 15-1 at home in 2019 marking 13th consecutive season with three or fewer home losses and the 50th time in program history.

MOBY MADNESS

A large part of CSU's home-court dominance is the large crowds the Rams draw. CSU averaged 3,231 fans per match in 2014, sixth-best in the NCAA. The Rams attracted five crowds larger than 4,000 in 2014, the second time they've accomplished that feat (1987).

CSU has been ranked in the top 25 for average annual attendance each season since the NCAA began calculating attendance figures in 1986, including the top-10 eight times and No. 1 in 1988.

RECORD-BREAKING CROWD

A program and Mountain West record crowd of 7,745 watched No. 25 CSU take on No. 12 Illinois on Aug. 24, 2018. The figure surpassed CSU's previous high of 7,018, set on Sept. 6, 2014 vs. No. 4 Wisconsin.

In total, eight of CSU's top-10 single-match crowds have occurred since 2010. CSU is 9-5 in home matches with at least 5,000 fans in attendance.

STREAKING AT HOME

The Rams have had tremendous success at Moby Arena, winning nearly 90 percent of their home matches under Head Coach Tom Hilbert. Since 1997, Hilbert's first season in Fort Collins, Colorado State is 328-39 (.894) at home.

From Sept. 27, 2012 through Nov. 15, 2013, CSU won 21 consecutive home matches. The streak was tied for the second-longest in program history and was the thirdlongest active streak in the NCAA at the time.

MOUNTAIN WEST DOMINATION

The Rams have dominated the Mountain West since its inception in 1999, going 298-40. Prior to CSU's loss to New Mexico on Nov. 17, 2018, the Rams had won 45-straight conference home matches, a streak that began during the final regular-season match of the 2013 season. One of the most impressive stats, however, was CSU's 50-match home winning streak against current members of the MW, which dated back to Nov. 4, 2005.

TAKING DOWN THE BEST

With large crowds come big wins. At home since 1987, the Rams have defeated 10 teams ranked in the top 10, plus more than a dozen additional wins against ranked opponents.

During Hilbert's tenure, CSU has hosted 45 nationally ranked teams, coming away with victories in 28 of those contests, including six of the last 10 seasons dating back to 2009. CSU's most recent win over a ranked foe at Moby Arena was in 2019, against No. 19 Colorado. The Rams would go on to face the Buffs a day later in Boulder, coming away with another win in a five-set

THE BIG STAGE

Moby Arena has been an NCAA Tournament host in 11 seasons, most recently in 2014. Included in that figure is 2008, when CSU was a Regional Finals host. Being selected to play in front of its home crowd is important to CSU; the Rams are 13-2 in NCAA tournament matches at Moby Arena.

MOUNTAIN WEST HOME STREAK

Losing a Mountain West match in Moby Arena is a rare occurrence - one that has happened just once in the last five seasons. The Rams carried a 45 match streak that snapped at the end of the 2018 season, which dated back to the 2013 season.

The Rams are have lost just two home Mountain West matches in the last nine seasons, holding a 77-2 record in that span.
