## SAM WINTERBOTHAM



**Head Coach  
Fourth Season  
Oklahoma Christian '99**



**Sam Winterbotham** enters his fourth season as the Colorado men's tennis head coach continuing to build the Buffaloes into a competitive program not just among his Big 12 Conference peers, but on a national level.

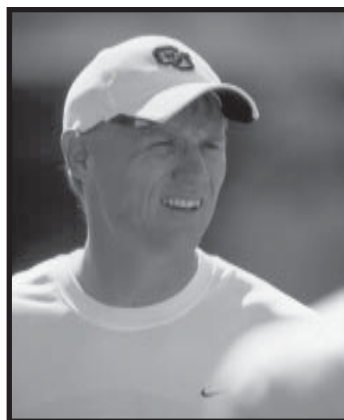
In his previous three years in Boulder, Winterbotham is taking CU to new heights. With an exciting approach on the sideline, he is developing the men's tennis program into a well-respected group of student-athletes among the nation.

"I have a fine group of men that really care about CU," said Winterbotham. "They train and work hard at practices. They really are a lot of fun."

Last season, Coach Winterbotham and his young Buffaloes were nationally ranked the entire spring season that saw 19 nationally ranked opponents grace the spring schedule. Despite a team not having one senior, CU remained steady throughout the dual campaign ranked as high as No. 43 and finishing No. 59. It's their highest ranking in the ITA polls since the 1995-96 season.

The 2005 spring saw the Buffs tally five impressive wins over the nation's elite teams defeating No. 15 Harvard, No. 33 New Mexico (twice), No. 47 Oklahoma, and No. 66 Nebraska. In conference play, CU won a pair of matches to finish the regular season tied for fifth. Prior to dual match play, Winterbotham guided the Buffaloes to their second straight appearance at the Mountain Region Indoor Playoff. Seeded No. 4 a year ago, CU improved it's placing in the Fall of 2004 with a No. 3 regional ranking.

Individually, senior Marko Bundalo, who earned All-Big 12 singles honors among the conference coaches cracked the ITA's elite singles ranking finishing the spring at No. 99 nationally. Bundalo won a team-best 20 victories was also awarded the ITA Mountain Region Player to Watch (awarded to a student-athlete having an outstanding season and is expected to perform at a high level for his remaining collegiate career).



During his previous two seasons in Boulder, Winterbotham guided the youthful Buffs to a pair of sixth place finishes in the 2003 and 2004 Big 12 standings, respectively. In addition, to 2004, Winterbotham coached current junior Peter Bjork to the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) Region VII Rookie of the Year.

Winterbotham has also made an immediate mark on the CU program, being selected as one of six members to represent the Mountain Region on the ITA Region VII

Committee.

"The University of Colorado has an excellent athletic department ... one of the best in the country," said Winterbotham. "I am proud to be a part of it and my goal is to build a tennis program that competes at the highest level and, consistently fighting for championships at the conference and national levels."

Prior to coming to Boulder, Winterbotham spent the previous three years at Baylor helping the Bears become a national power in the collegiate game. In addition to assisting the Bears with the day-to-day operation, Winterbotham was responsible for recruiting one of the best teams in the nation that eventually won the first national championship in Baylor history Baylor, as the Bears were crowned NCAA Champions in 2004.

While at Baylor, Winterbotham was named the 2002 Region VI Assistant Coach of the Year after helping the Bears win the Big 12 regular season and conference tournament. Baylor advanced to the 2002 NCAA Sweet 16 and finished the season ranked seventh nationally.

Prior to his stint at Baylor, Winterbotham attended Oklahoma Christian University in Oklahoma City where he was a four-year NAIA

All-American. In 1997, he won top honors as the NAIA Rolex National Singles Champion.

At OCU, Winterbotham also was the 1999 Sooner Athletic Conference Player of the Year in soccer, where he was named to the all-region first team and honorable mention all-America team. He graduated in April 1999 with a degree in marketing and was honored as OCU's international business student of the year for

1999. He is currently pursuing a master's degree in sports management.

A native of Stoke on Trent, Great Britain, Winterbotham is a certified LTA Tennis Professional (LTA is Great Britain's USTA). As a player, he played numerous professional tournaments at the Future/Satellite level, was ranked as one of the top juniors in Great Britain.

Born Oct. 1, 1973, he is married to the former Tara McClure, a native of Asher, Oklahoma. The Winterbotham's have two daughters, Zoe and Ryann.

## ALBIN POLONYI



### Assistant Coach/First Season Boise State '97

**Albin Polonyi** begins his first season with the Colorado men's tennis coaching staff. Polonyi spent the 2003-05 seasons as head coach for both the men's and women's tennis programs at Northern Arizona University.

At Northern Arizona University, Polonyi was responsible for managing two team budgets, recruiting, management of tennis operations, fundraising, and community service project coordination. During the 2005 spring, Polonyi led the Lumberjacks men's team to a second-place Big Sky Conference finish and a semifinal appearance, finishing with a 10-12 record. As the women's head coach he led NAU to the quarterfinals of the 2005 Big Sky Tournament and a second place conference finish in 2004. During his tenure at NAU, Polonyi helped his tennis program's maintain a 3.0 grade point average or better.

Prior to his two-year stint in Flagstaff, Polonyi spent a year and a half as the Michigan State men's assistant coach. In the 2003 season, he helped lead the Spartans to a 15-12 overall record, a Big Ten Conference tournament semifinal appearance, and the program's highest national ranking ever (No. 56). In the fall, the Spartans advanced three players to the round of 16 and two players to the quarterfinals of the Big Ten Singles Championship.

Polonyi worked as a teaching professional at the Gasparilla Inn in Boca Grande, Fla., in 2001 and 2002. He is a two-time All-American (1993,1996) who captained the 1997 Boise State Broncos to as high as No. 2 in the nation and a No. 7 final national ranking while playing two years under 1997 NCAA Coach of the Year Greg Patton. Before coming to Boise State, he played at the University of Georgia. With the Bulldogs, he was a starter who helped the team to No. 2 and No. 5 national rankings in 1993 and 1995, respectively.

In 1993, as a freshman, Polonyi reached the semifinals in the NCAA Doubles Championships. In 1993 and 1996, he finished both years ranked seventh in the nation in doubles, and was ranked as high as first in the nation in doubles and 23rd in singles rankings during the regular season. He was the Rolex Region III singles and doubles champion in 1996, and has had success competing in events on the professional tour. He has the honor of leading teams to championships in three different conferences: SEC, Big Sky, and Big West. While completing a master's degree in literature and creative writing at Bemidji State University in Minnesota from 1998-1999, Polonyi worked as a university writing instructor and guided the women's team to its first women's conference championship in school history.

After completing his master's degree, Polonyi worked as writing program Director for the Zhejiang Forestry Institute in China in 2000. While in China, he did consulting work for American specialty-tea companies based on his interest in tea and background in the commodities business, having worked in the futures business at the Minneapolis Grain Exchange before graduate school. Upon return from a 14-month stay in China, Polonyi worked in Boston for George Howell, the world's leading coffee expert. Polonyi is the first Westerner to be occupationally certified by the China National Quality Control for Tea as a Tea Taster, has published articles in tea and coffee trade journals on the subject of tea, and is currently overseeing a project with NAU to help translate and publish the second most important ancient Chinese tea classic.

Polonyi is a 1997 graduate of Boise State with a degree in English, and earned his master's degree in literature and creative writing at Bemidji State University (Minnesota) in 2000.

## BOB BATEMAN



### Volunteer Assistant Coach Second Season

**Bob Bateman** enters his second season with the Colorado men's tennis team as their volunteer assistant coach. Bateman is not a stranger to the men's tennis program having played from 1982-85 and having graduated magna cum laude in economics from CU in 1986.

When Bateman left the men's program, he accumulated 45 singles and doubles matches, was a four-year letterwinner, and was a runner up in Big 8 Conference Tournament (No. 2 singles) in 1983.

"Bob has been involved in the program during the last few years and I'm excited to have his scientific knowledge assisting our student-athletes development," said CU head coach Sam Winterbotham.

As a youth, Bateman was the Minnesota state high school singles champion and was a nationally ranked junior (#58) in 1981. Today, he is the staff professional at the Boulder Harvest House since 1994.

Born December 28, 1962 in Edina, Minnesota, Bateman is married to the former Rachel Bogard.

His hobbies include being the baseball play-by-play voice of the Niwot Cougars (2004 Colorado HS and American Legion state champions). He also teaches part-time at the Boulder Country Club.

Bateman's future endeavor is being the future voice of the Buffaloes as the school's public address announcer taking over for Alan Cass when he retires.

"Bob cares a great deal about this university and athletic department," Winterbotham adds. "He brings a wealth of knowledge on and off the court and his impact has been great on this team."

## LYNN BURGER



### Administrative Assistant

**Lynn Burger** is in her fifth year with the CU athletic department after returning to help in the golf and tennis office. Prior to this position, Burger worked as the Special Events Coordinator from 1997-2000 and as a sports information intern in 1989.

Burger, 42, came to CU originally from the American Heart Association, where she was the Regional Director in charge of fundraising and special events for the Colorado and Wyoming area. She also directed special events for the Leukemia Society of America, the Rocky Mountain Chapter of the Arthritis Foundation and worked for the Bolder Boulder.

Burger graduated from the University of Colorado in 1990, earning a degree in journalism. She earned Outstanding Graduate and Kappa Tau Alpha academic honors and was on the Dean's List.

Born May 22, 1963 in Fort Worth, Texas, she graduated from Arvada West High School in Arvada, Colorado, where she lettered in track and field. Formerly Lynn Smith, she is married to Rick Burger.

## VIC CUMMINS



### Assistant Strength Coach

**Vic Cummins** begins his third year as an assistant strength coach at Colorado, with his primary responsibilities including working with the football team and the men's and women's tennis teams.

Cummins, 27, came to Colorado from the University of Memphis, where he spent the summer of 2003 as a strength and conditioning graduate assistant with the football and baseball teams. Prior to his stint at

Memphis, he worked as a football/strength and conditioning graduate assistant at East Central University in the spring of 2003.

Cummins graduated from East Central University in Oklahoma with a bachelor's degree in physical education in May of 2003. He lettered four years as a linebacker and three-year captain of the football team, earning second team all-conference and academic all-conference honors for the 2002-03 seasons.

Born Oct. 10, 1978 in Norman, Oklahoma, he graduated from Norman High School in 1999. Recently married in the summer of 2005, he is married to the former Suzanne Carter.

## ERIC FRY



### Assistant Athletic Trainer

**Eric Fry** enters his second year with the Colorado staff as an assistant athletic trainer with the men's basketball team. Prior to coming to Colorado, Fry spent two years at the University of Denver serving as the volleyball, men's lacrosse, and men's and women's ski teams.

Fry received a Master's Degree in Higher Education Administration in May of 2002.

He completed his undergraduate studies at Purdue University in 2000 and received a Bachelor's Degree in athletic training. While at Purdue he worked as a student athletic trainer with the football, baseball, and basketball teams. During his time there he had the opportunity to work as an intern athletic trainer with the Kenai Peninsula Oilers, a summer baseball team located in Kenai, Alaska.

Fry is a certified member of the National Athletic Trainers' Association. He is single and resides in Lafayette.

## ANDREW GREEN



### Assistant Sports Information Director

**Andrew Green** enters his fifth year as assistant sports information director at Colorado, joining the department in October 2001. He is the sports information director for men's basketball and men's and women's tennis.

Green, 37, came to Boulder from The College of William and Mary, where he worked three years and served as the Tribe's primary contact for women's basketball, soccer, and volleyball. He served as the media coordinator for the 1998 and 1999 NCAA women's soccer tournaments as well as the 1999 Colonial Athletic Association Volleyball Championships.

Green graduated from Ashland (Ohio) University in 1996 with a bachelor's degree in sports communication. He was a graduate student assistant in the sports information office at California University of Pennsylvania where he was the media liaison for the 1997 national champion softball team.

Born Jan. 31, 1968 in Batavia, N.Y., Green graduated from LeRoy (N.Y.) High, where he lettered in basketball and tennis. Green is married to CU's athletic travel coordinator, the former Jennifer

**Josh Newton** begins his first season as the men's team stringer, and second season with the CU men. When he's not stringing for the Buffs, he is the manager of Boulder's own racquet store, Rocky Mountain Racquet Specialists, which was recently named one of the top-10 specialty shops in the country by the Tennis Industry Association.

While attending CU, he studied molecular, cellular and developmental biology and was an officer in both Mortar Board and Golden Key national honor societies. Since CU, Newton has become a certified Master Racquet Technician. In addition, he is active in community tennis, both as a player and as a brief stint as Assistant Boy's Coach at Fairview High School.

Born July 5, 1972 in Memphis, Tenn., Newton grew up in Bucks County, Pa. (outside of Philadelphia). He graduated from Germantown Academy in 1991. He is single and resides in Boulder.

## KAREN MORRISON



### **Associate Athletic Director Compliance, Financial Aid & SWA**

**Karen Morrison** is in her sixth year as associate athletic director at the University of Colorado, being promoted to the position on Aug. 9, 2000. She was the assistant athletic director for compliance for two years prior to her promotion, and is in her 15th year overall associated with the CU athletic program. In 1998, she was also named CU's Senior Woman Administrator.

Morrison, 44, oversees several CU sport programs – women's basketball, volleyball, men's and women's skiing, men's and women's golf and men's and women's tennis. She also directs the compliance and financial aid programs. Other aspects of her role include Title IX compliance, NCAA Certification and service on several department and conference committees. She is also a member of the senior management team for the department.

Morrison is on the NCAA Women's Basketball Selection Committee, being placed on the 10-member working board starting the 2000-01 season and serving a five-year term. She is the current liaison from the Women's Basketball Committee to the NCAA's Women's Basketball Issues Committee. She is also the Big 12 representative on the NCAA Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet. She has served on the NCAA Interpretations subcommittee of the Cabinet for four years.

Morrison was appointed to the position in March 1997, after working as the assistant compliance coordinator since April 1996. Prior to that, she was an assistant coach for six seasons for Ceal Barry and the CU women's basketball team. She was on the staff of five Big Eight champion teams (regular or postseason), and two Elite 8 squads. She played a major role in the Buffs securing four top 20 recruiting classes and handled scheduling chores. She also was an instructor in kinesiology for two years on the CU campus (1989-91), and worked for two years as an attorney with the Fort Collins law firm of Frey, Lach & Michaels, P.C.

Born Jan. 13, 1961, and spending most of her youth in Tulsa, Okla., she graduated from the University of Oklahoma with honors, earning a B.A. degree in management in 1983. She earned her Juris Doctorate in 1987 from the University of Notre Dame School of Law. At Oklahoma, she was on academic and athletic scholarship and was a member of the women's basketball team. She has two boys, Jimmy (5) and Max (2).

Experience goes a long way, especially in a conference like the Big 12. That is why men's tennis coach **Sam Winterbotham** is excited about his improved squad which already turned some heads last season.

The Buffs finished the spring 9-15 against a very competitive schedule, facing 19 nationally ranked schools and defeating five of them. CU finished the season ranked from wire-to-wire, ending up at No. 59 in the final Intercollegiate Tennis Association poll.

The Buffs also had six players with at least 12 wins for the first time since the 1994-95 season; CU returns all but one of those players.

"The experience we have on this team in definitely something we will rely on this season," said Winterbotham, who is in his fourth year as the head coach at the University of Colorado. "The guys have also played a very good schedule for a couple years now and have grown with that schedule."

The veteran presence on this CU squad is represented by a slew of upperclassmen, including senior standouts **Marko Bundalo** (Pancevo, Serbia and Montenegro) and **Chad Tsuda** (Boulder, Colo.). Winterbotham said his seniors are already taking a more active leadership role in practice.

Bundalo is coming off a 20-16 overall record last season (11-4 Tournament, 9-12 Spring) and was one of eight regional winners named by the ITA as its Player to Watch winner. The distinction not only honors his performance last season, but it comes with expectations that he is in for a stellar senior year. As an All-Big 12 singles selection, Bundalo defeated five nationally ranked opponents and closed out the spring winning five of his last six matches. He also received the team Complete Student-Athlete Award. His 44 career victories rank him 25<sup>th</sup> on CU's all-time list.

Tsuda, the team's reigning MVP and two-time CU Athlete-of-the-Week last season, won 12 matches in the spring, the most on the team. A Boulder product from Fairview High School, Tsuda has 43 career victories, good for 26<sup>th</sup> all-time at CU. Winterbotham calls him a selfless player who should take his game to the next step this season.

**Justin Rofel** (Baltimore, Md.), the team's most improved player in the spring of 2004 will provide additional leadership and experience as he enters his senior year.

"For (the seniors), I want the best season CU has ever had," Winterbotham said. "I would love for these guys to set a few records and really help take CU to the next level."

A quartet of juniors also returns for the team, led by **Marek Dvorak** (Prague, The Czech Republic) who finished with an even 18-18 overall record last season. He and fellow classmate and Czech Republic native **Jan Zelezny** (Prague, The Czech Republic) finished the spring with three straight wins at No. 3 doubles. Dvorak won the Alabama Invitational consolation Flight B final in the fall, and Zelezny was the team's academic excellence award winner.

Junior **Peter Bjork** (Huddinge, Sweden) finished with a 14-17 overall record last season and had the distinction of being named the team's most improved player, finishing second on the team with 10 singles victories in the spring. He was also the Region VII rookie of the year for the 2003-04 season when he was the team's Most Valuable Player. **Eric Molnar** (Guelph, Ontario, Canada) is a transfer from Alabama where he was a nationally ranked doubles player. Winterbotham said Molnar is a "very talented player with a big game who will compete for the top spots." He is expected to compete for one of the top singles spots, likely with Zelezny and Bundalo.

Depth provided from the underclass ranks will also be invaluable to the Buffs this season. Sophomore **Geoff Chizever** (Tarzana, Calif.) is a walk-on who Winterbotham said is capable of playing in the team's top six. Another sophomore, **Karthik Raju** (Bangalore, India), is coming off a redshirt semester and has the ability to help in singles and doubles. **Charlie Yemm** (Fort Collins, Colo.) also adds some experience after winning six of nine matches in tournament play last fall and playing in a number of singles and doubles matches in the spring. **Tobias Scheil** (Oberhaching, Germany) is the team's only incoming freshman.

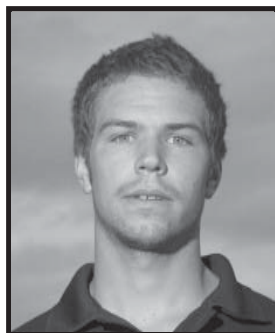
Winterbotham is not afraid to pit his team against the best in the nation. He believes facing the stiffest competition the country has to offer will only help his players get better.

"We are going to play a schedule that will give us the best chance of fulfilling our goals," he said. "Our goals are very high, and in order to meet them we have to beat top teams. The more ranked teams we play the better chance we have of meeting and exceeding those goals."

Winterbotham and assistant coach **Albin Polonyi** have always taken pride in developing their players through a gauntlet of unyielding competition. This season should be no different as the Buffs set their targets on the best the nation has to offer.

"We will challenge them in practice and we will challenge them in matches," Winterbotham said. "We are very proud of how much our players develop throughout their careers here at CU and we want to give them an opportunity to show that against great competition."

Reached the ITA Mountain Region VII semifinal main draw at Las Vegas (Oct. 19-23) with four consecutive victories without dropping a set; lost in the semifinals to eventual tournament champion and No. 13 nationally ranked Luke Shields ... In doubles, went 6-5 claiming four wins with Charlie Yemm and a pair with Marko Bundalo.



**2005 Spring:** Was named the team's most improved player award winner ... Won 14 victories for the season ... One of six players to win at least 12 or more matches ... Ranked second overall in dual wins (10) ... Played at the No. 2 (1-1), No. 3 (5-8), and No. 4 (4-2) singles positions ... Defeated a pair of nationally ranked opponents upsetting No. 45 Matija Zgaga, Baylor, 7-5, 6-4, and No. 96 Alexei Ivanov, Oklahoma 3-6, 6-2, 6-3 ... The vic-

tory over Ivanov was one of the key points in CU's upset of the No. 47 Sooners ... Also defeated Brett Joelson, Texas A&M 6-2, 7-6(4) ... Has won 28 career singles matches ... In doubles, won 10 matches during the spring, nine of them with teammate Marko Bundalo at No. 2 ... Also went 1-0 at No. 3 with Elliot Quibell ... It's the goal of every college tennis player - an invitation to the NCAA Tournament. The tournament represents much more than a gathering of the finest players collegiate tennis has to offer. It symbolizes the culmination of years of hard work and determination for its participants.

Since CU players first began representing the university on the tennis courts, four singles players, two doubles teams and several teams have earned the right to participate in the making of NCAA history. The first to do so was Lou Dods, who was invited to compete in the 1947 NCAA Tennis Championships. In addition to being the first Buff tennis player to compete in the NCAA Tournament, Dods also earned CU's first Big Seven tennis title when he won the No. 2 singles crown in 1948 in Lincoln, Neb.

CU's next appearance at the NCAAs came in 1951 when coach Dick Gray sent Buffs Scott Smith and Peter Arendrup to represent the university at the national championships. After his days at CU, Arendrup went on to represent his native Denmark as a member of the country's Davis Cup team.

Gray produced another NCAA qualifier in 1963 in the form of Richard Hillway, who would be the last Buff to earn this right for 30 years.

The Buffs' courtship with the NCAA Tournament was revived in 1993 when coach Ron Smarr sent Marc Leclair and the doubles tandem of Stefan Figley and Jeff Spiers, for the tournament. As a team, CU advanced to the second round by beating New Mexico before being ousted by defending national champion Stanford.

Leclair was eliminated in the first round of singles play, while Spiers and Figley advanced to the third round of doubles competition.

After a year off, Marc Bauer brought the Buffaloes back to the NCAA Tournament in 1995 as an unseeded wildcard entry. He went on to upset the 45th-ranked player in the ITA/Rolax Collegiate Tennis Rankings and became the first

Colorado player to win an NCAA Tournament singles match since Dods in 1947. The Big Eight Conference's Player of the Year was eliminated in the second round.

In 1996, Bauer once again advanced to the second round in the individual portion of the tourney, and Colorado returned to the tournament as a team, defeating Tulsa, 4-2 in the first round to reach the semifinals of the NCAA Region V Championships. The squad lost to Kansas, 4-0, in the Round of 32, but it sparked a run of three consecutive seasons in which the team would make an appearance in postseason competition.

In 1997, Colorado once again reached the second round with a 4-0 blanking of Oklahoma before falling to Kansas once again, 4-0, in the Round of 32. In 1998, Colorado's most recent showing at the NCAA Tournament, the squad could not get passed it's initial opponent, Tulsa, falling 4-1 to the Golden Hurricanes in the first round.

In 2006, the Buffs are looking for their first NCAA postseason since the spring of 1998.

## Hank Brown, President

Prior to his employment with the Daniels Fund, Brown served as the 11th president at the University of Northern Colorado.

Before Brown entered higher education, he spent several years in public service as one of the state's most popular politicians. A republican, he served one term in the United States Senate, representing Colorado from 1991-97. That followed five consecutive terms (1981-91) in the U.S. House as Colorado's representative from the 4th Congressional District. He also served in the Colorado Senate from 1972-76. Brown was elected and re-elected to the House of Representatives by margins ranging from 69 to 74 percent, the highest in the history of the District. He was elected to the U.S. Senate by a 13 percent victory margin.

Brown was also vice president with Monfort of Colorado (Greeley) from 1969 to 1980. He is both an attorney and a certified public accountant.

He earned his Bachelor's degree in Accounting from the University of Colorado-Boulder in 1961. As an undergraduate, he participated for three years in wrestling and was also a member of the freshman football team in addition to serving as CU's student body president.

He earned a Juris Doctorate degree from the University of Colorado Law School in 1969. While in Washington, Brown earned a Master of Law Degree

in 1986 from George Washington University. In 1988, he passed the exam to become a C.P.A.

Brown also served his country, as he was in the United State Navy from 1962-66, achieving the rank of lieutenant. He volunteered for service in Vietnam and was decorated for his combat service as a forward air controller.

Brown, 65, was born in Denver and moved with his family to northern California where he graduated high school and was star prep wrestler. He was the state runner-up as a junior and the state champion as a senior in the 191-pound classification. His father, Harry, was also an accomplished wrestler, as he was the national runner-up at Iowa State in the late 1930s.

He and his wife Nan live in Denver and they have three adult children, Harry, Christy, and Lori; and two grandchildren, Lilly and Hank.

**Hank Brown** was named the 21st president of the University of Colorado in June 2005. His name was advanced as the sole finalist for the position in two months earlier and he officially took over the reins of the university system on August 1, 2005.

He will serve in an interim capacity, with full control over the three campuses in Boulder, Denver and Colorado Springs, while CU's Board of Regents continue the process of appointing a permanent president.

Brown returned to his alma mater from the Daniels Fund, where he had served as president and Chief executive officer since July 1, 2002. The Daniels Fund is a billion dollar foundation left by the late cable entrepreneur, Bill Daniels, and in his first two years there, he reduced overhead by 35% and shifted \$2 million a year to increase grants and scholarships.



## Mike Bohn Athletic Director

**Mike Bohn** was introduced as just the sixth athletic director in University of Colorado history on April 13, 2005, returning to the place where he starred as

a prep athlete before embarking on a journey that would take him all over the western half of the United States and then back home.

Bohn, 44, came to Colorado from San Diego State University, where he left an indelible imprint in just 18 months as the Aztecs' director of athletics.

He replaced Jack Lengyel, who served as interim athletic director since last December 1; Lengyel took over the position when Dick Tharp stepped down on November 22. Tharp held the role from 1996 through 2004, as he followed three legendary men in CU athletic history, Harry Carlson (1927-65), Eddie Crowder (1965-84) and Bill Marolt (1984-96).

Bohn's brief tenure at San Diego State featured many remarkable accomplishments, including the instilling of energy, enthusiasm, accountability and determination into the Aztec staff. Officially named SDSU athletic director on October 6, 2003, Bohn strategically and steadily restructured the SDSU athletic department with emphasis on fund raising, fiscal responsibility, compliance and academics.

Under his watch, San Diego State saw its average football attendance increase by 14,369 per game

in 2004 marking the third largest jump in the country.

He landed the San Diego State position after serving five years as athletic director at the University of Idaho (1999-2003), where he first made his mark as a lead administrator in the area of transformation.

At Idaho, he oversaw the school's transition to the Division I-A ranks from the Big Sky Conference, he developed projects for new facilities, increased community and corporate support, and produced balanced budgets for the department after inheriting an operation that had accumulated a deficit of over \$1 million. He was also the driving force behind a 20-percent increase in the Vandal Scholarship Fund and a \$350,000 surge in annual corporate support.

His first job in athletic administration came at the Air Force Academy, where he worked for the better part of nine years (1984-92). During his tenure in Colorado Springs, Bohn advanced from an intern to assistant athletic director. He served as executive director of the Blue and Silver Club and implemented a fundraising campaign that generated \$16 million for stadium improvements.

From 1992 to 1995, Bohn served as Director of Marketing for the College Football Association. He created and developed the CFA "Good Works Team" which recognized significant off-the-field accomplishments in the area of community relations of 11 football student-athletes nationally (a team that is still selected today by the American Football Coaches Association).

He then moved on to Colorado State University, where he spent the next three years (1996-98) as an associate athletic director for the Rams. At CSU, he was responsible for all external revenue-producing operations, including ticket sales, fund raising through the Greater Ram Club, licensing, corporate sales, signage, capital campaigns and broadcasting rights fees, as well as special events.

He earned his bachelor's of arts degree from the University of Kansas in 1983, where he was recruited as a quarterback and also played baseball. He then graduated with a master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University in 1984. While earning his master's, he worked as a graduate assistant football coach for the Bobcats.

Bohn is a former member of the NCAA Championships Cabinet and the Division I-A Athletics Directors Association Executive Council. During his stay at Idaho, he was a member of the Big West Conference executive committee and served on the University of Idaho executive council.

Born November 16, 1960 in Hinsdale, Ill., he graduated from Boulder High School where he lettered in football, basketball and baseball. He is married to the former Kim Zeren, and the couple has two children, Michaelyn (21) and Brandon (19).

# UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO

*"The University of Colorado, and Boulder, is a town which stops where the Rocky Mountains begin. Normally in America such a superb site would be occupied by a golf course, but somebody goofed and instead they built what may be the most beautifully situated campus in the world... if anyone asks you to Boulder, I have one word of advice: 'Go.'"*

Often called the best of the United States' public universities by the *Fiske Guide to Colleges*, that belief was again strengthened in 2001 when the University of Colorado received the largest donation ever given to an American public institution of higher learning at the time. The quarter-billion dollar gift by Bill and Claudia Coleman established the Coleman Institute for Cognitive Disabilities to catalyze and integrate advances in science, engineering and technology to promote the quality of life and independent living of people with cognitive disabilities.

Founded in 1876 at the foot of the Flatirons, the University of Colorado has grown from a lone building on a bleak, windswept hill to one of the nation's leading public research institutions. The doors of Old Main opened the following year with 44 students, an instructor and the President who taught and lived there with his family, pasturing his horse nearby.

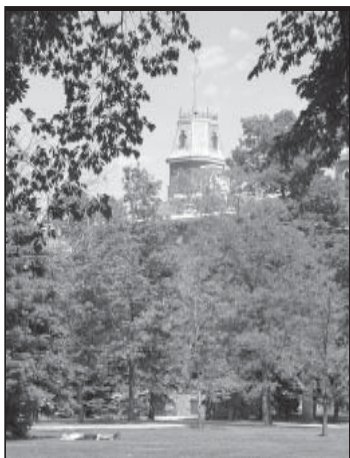
The Boulder campus now encompasses 786 acres on the main campus, east campus (which includes a research park), Williams Village and the Mountain Research Station north of nearby Nederland (which supports alpine research). In 1996 the Board of Regents purchased 308 acres of land in unincorporated Boulder County, now informally known as the south campus, in an effort to insure the growth of the University well into the 21st century.

While over 29,000 students are educated on the main campus, another 13,000 study at the University of Colorado (including the Health Sciences Center) at Denver and the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs. Nine elected Regents and President Hank Brown, who was named to the position this past August, leads the four-campus system, while each campus has a Chancellor who serves as the chief academic and administrative officer. Dr. Philip DiStefano is currently the acting chancellor of the Boulder campus. Students can enter any of nine schools and colleges offering more than 3,400 courses in 150 fields, representing a full range of disciplines in the humanities, social sciences, physical and biological sciences, the fine and performing arts, and the professions.

The largest university in the Centennial State is a big school, but its northern Italian architecture, named fourth in a ranking of the "most architecturally successful campuses in the country," in *The Campus as a Work of Art*, creates an intimate, visitor-friendly public space thanks to the varicolored sandstone and red-tiled roof facade of more than 200 buildings created by its rural Tuscany influence.

There are 17 residence halls that dot the campus, with more than 1,500 students enrolled in seven residential academic programs, providing undergraduates with shared learning and living experiences.

Many of the high-tech companies located along the Front Range owe their origins to CU-Boulder's cutting-edge science. CU researchers have created a new form of matter called Bose-Einstein condensate, shown that RNA can act as a catalyst in biochemical reactions, developed the first classification system of human chromosomes, created the first national model to assess child development, identified the battered child syndrome, discovered the process of aging is under direct genetic control, developed ways of dealing with natural hazards, and alerted the nation to



heightened academic pressures on kindergarten children.

CU-Boulder has played a major role in NASA space programs, designing and building many scientific instruments flown in outer space, and graduated 17 men and women who became astronauts, including the late Jack Swigert, one of the three astronauts in the crippled Apollo 13 mission who made it dock to Earth safely from the moon. When the Hubble Space Telescope was launched in 1990, it was carrying seven major instruments, including a high-resolution spectrograph to study the evolution of stars and designed and built by an international science team led by astronomer Jack Brandt of CU Boulder. CU-Boulder's Laboratory for Atmospheric and Space Physics currently operates nine scientific instruments in space. An additional CU instrument is being prepared for launch in 2006 as part of the New Horizons mission, which is expected to reach Pluto in 2015. Once the instrument is launched, LASP will have sent scientific instruments to every planet in the solar system.

The University has produced 19 Rhodes Scholars, five of which were former football student-athletes at CU, with Jim Hansen the most recent recipient in 1992. Three faculty members have received Nobel Prizes: Carl Wieman and Eric Cornell of JILA and physics won the 2001 Nobel Prize in physics, and Thomas Cech, a distinguished professor of chemistry and biochemistry, won the 1989 Nobel Prize in chemistry. Other notable alumni include former United States Supreme Court Justice Byron "Whizzer" White, former big band leader Glenn Miller and actor Robert Redford. A premier institution in and of itself, the Boulder campus is in good company with some of the finest campuses in the country:

\* Colorado is one of the four most outstanding universities in the United States according to the 2004 *Fiske Guide to Colleges* (with Brown, Stanford and Virginia), based on academics, social life and quality of life.

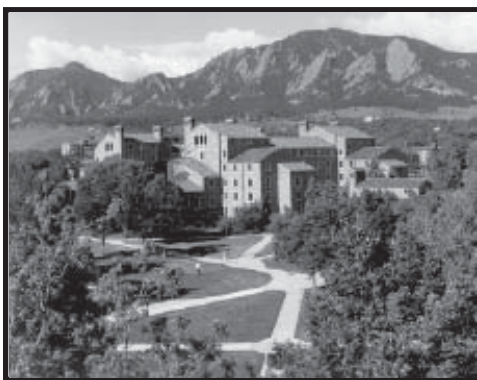
\* *U.S. News & World Report* ranked CU-Boulder 32nd among the nation's Top 50 Public National Universities in its 2005 Best Colleges issue. The rankings were based on factors such as academic reputation, retention, faculty resources, student selectivity and financial resources.

\* *U.S. News & World Report* in 2005 also ranked seven CU graduate programs in the nation's top 20: Environmental Law (7th), Aerospace Engineering (12th), Clinical Psychology (15th), Entrepreneurship Specialty (Business, 15th), Speech Language-Pathology (17th), Chemical Engineering (18th) and Civil Engineering (20th).

\* And in April 2004, *The Economist* of London ranked CU as the 11th best public university in the world, as well as one of the 50 best universities of any kind, based on criteria such as highly cited researchers and Nobel laureates in selected fields.

If the aphorism, "Somewhere between the Rockies and reality," seems too good to believe, then come for a visit. Start with a walk on the historic Pearl Street Mall, a downtown pedestrian mall that is the ceremonial heart of the city actually that works despite the efforts of its street theatre. Visitors may be so taken in by the scenery, the mall, Tudors and Victorians they may forget the University that put it all together. From Pearl, Broadway leads directly onto campus where the University of Colorado Museum and the CU Heritage Center, in the original Old Main building, which introduces the University's past and present. Visitors can experience the University's cosmopolitan atmosphere by visiting Fiske Planetarium, Sommers-Bausch Observatory, and Norlin Library. Lively performances are staged by the Artist Series, Department of Theatre and Dance, and the College of Music, and movie fans can relax with classic, contemporary, and avant garde films. Summer months bring the annual Shakespeare Festival to campus.

Take in the fresh mountain air on any part of 100 miles of trails and 30,000 acres of open space. Climb the Flatirons or in Eldorado Canyon State Park. Swim or board sail at the Boulder Reservoir while elite runners sprint around it. Rest assured, like the prophesy of an Arapaho Indian Chief, "If you leave Boulder, you will return."



# DAL WARD ATHLETIC CENTER/CU TENNIS FACILITY

The 1990-91 athletic season is landmark for the University of Colorado in two areas. The year produced national championships in football (its first) and skiing (its 14th at the time), and the men's basketball team reached the NIT Final Four.

That was also the year that the magnificent Dal Ward Athletic Center became a reality. The entire construction process was completed in less than nine months, from ground-breaking in December, 1990, to completion the following August.



The \$14 million building was completely funded through private donations. This multi-functional, state-of-the-art structure is one of the top facilities anywhere in college athletics.

The Dal Ward Center boasts 92,000 square feet that includes a massive academic center, sports medicine and weight training centers, a full-service kitchen and daily dining area, an auditorium, men's and women's lockerrooms, a player's lounge and offices for

athletic administration and coaches.

Construction on the project actually began in November, 1990, with the demolition of the old team house building, which had stood in the north end of Folsom Field since its erection in 1967. The foundation was dug and concrete poured over the next couple of months, with construction of the actual building starting in February, 1991. The structure was available for the football team's use by mid-August, with the remainder of the building completed later that fall.

The building is named for Dallas Ward, the football coach who led CU into the Big Seven Conference in 1948.

Ward was the head coach for the Buffaloes for 11 seasons (1948-1958), compiling a 63-41-6 record, which made him the third-winningest coach in CU history at the time. His teams, noted for the single wing offense, were a constant threat to Oklahoma's supremacy in the Big Seven Conference.

The facility has several outstanding attributes, which benefit both the athletic department and the entire CU Boulder campus. The tile roof, native stone walls and traditional Italinete architecture were selected to compliment the style of the Boulder campus.



The Center also establishes a new sense of entry to the campus coming from the north. The building features a dramatic two-story entry and lobby space with a grand staircase.

In 1999, a state-of-the-art video replay board, known as "BuffVision," replaced the original scoreboard. The Dal Ward Center allows CU athletics to provide a facility that is competitive with equivalent successful NCAA athletic programs.

The University of Colorado officially opened its brand new tennis facility, The CU Boulder South Campus Tennis Courts with a ribbon cutting ceremony in front of a large turn out of fans, players, and administrative staff, on a cold and cloudy Saturday morning on Sept. 13, 2004.

"It's a very exciting day for Colorado tennis," said men's tennis coach Sam Winterbotham. "Today is the first step of great things for both the men's and women's tennis programs at this new facility. We hope the Boulder community will embrace this as much as we have, and build a winning tradition here at Colorado."

The ribbon cutting ceremony took place before alumni and current players. The morning activities included an inaugural Alumni match where former standouts of CU's past took on today's rising stars. The Alumni team included recent graduates and players who graduated from the 1960's through last year.

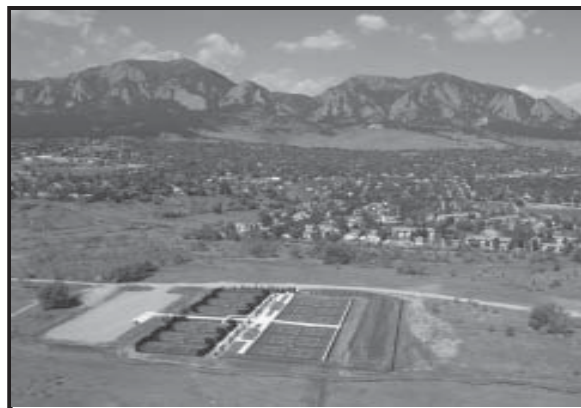


The new facility located off Table Mesa Drive consists of 12 tennis courts, two rows of six courts with a 35-foot walk-way in between. The courts also house a beautiful, breathtaking view of the Flatirons.

The new courts are financed through the CU Law School, the University of Colorado and the CU Athletic Department. The planning process for the new courts started three years ago as part of the CU Law School expansion.

"The facility brings a whole new excitement to the program," CU women's tennis head coach Nicole Kenneally said. "It opens up a new chapter of CU tennis. It's a first class college facility and will bring home to the players how valued they are on campus."

"It's a very nice complex," Colorado Associate Athletic Director Jon Burianek said. "The new courts have more space behind the baseline and more space behind the courts. People can see all six matches at a time now."

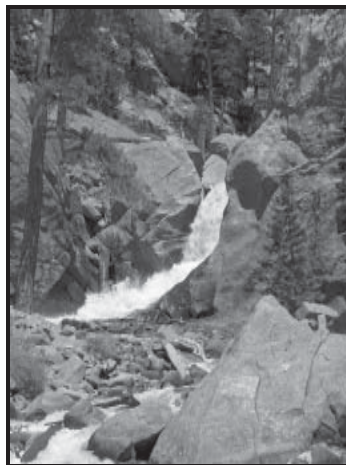

# DENVER FACTS

## DENVER'S POPULATION

Denver has more than doubled in population since 1960. The City & County of Denver has a population of 510,000 making it larger than the entire population of Wyoming (which has 480,000 people). The sixcounty metro area has a population of 2.3 million. Denver's population has increased by 23% since 1990. Denver is the 20th largest metro area in America, and has the 10th largest downtown area. The city and county of Denver has a minority population of 44.7% with 15% African American; 27.8% Hispanic; 3.3% Asian; and 1.4% Native American. The median age is 32.9 slightly below the U.S. median of 33.2. All of Colorado is experiencing a population boom with over 700,000 people moving to the state in the last decade.

**Highest Educated City:** Denver is the most educated city in the U.S. Denver has the greatest percentage of high school and college graduates of any major metropolitan area in the U.S.; 92.1% of the population in the metro area have high school diplomas and 35% have at least a bachelor's degree, according to the U.S. Census. The national average is 81.7% for high school diplomas and 23% with a college degree.

**Baby Boomer Capital:** Denver also is the nation's baby boomer capital, with the highest percentage of boomers of any major city, according to the 1998 U.S. Census. One third of the city is between age 35 and 54. Including small cities, only two had a higher percentage than Denver — Santa Fe and Anchorage. Among major cities, percentage of boomers is: Denver 32.8%; Seattle 31.5%; Atlanta 31.4%; Washington 31.4%; Portland OR 31.4%; San Francisco 30.8%.

**Thin City:** Denver is also the "thinnest" city in America, and Colorado is tied as the "thinnest" state with Hawaii.

## DENVER'S LOCATION

Contrary to popular belief, Denver is not in the mountains; it is near them. The "Foothills" (a gentle series of peaks ranging from 7,000 to 11,000 feet high (2,133 to 3,353 meters high) start to rise 15 miles (24 kilometers) west of the city. Slightly beyond that is the Continental Divide and a series of peaks soaring to heights of 14,000 feet (4,267 meters) known locally as the "Front Range." Denver itself is located on high, rolling plains. Although considered "Western" in character, Denver is actually located in the center of the country, just 346 miles (557 km) west of the exact center of the continental United States. With the exception of Kansas City, Denver is closer to the exact center of the nation than any other metropolitan area.

## DENVER'S TRANSPORTATION

Aviation history was made when the \$4.3 billion Denver International Airport opened on February 28, 1995. Covering 53 square miles (137 square kilometers, twice the size of Manhattan), Denver International Airport has five full-service runways and has established a landing rate of 120 planes an hour in good weather— 36% higher than the good weather rate of 88 planes an hour at Denver's previous airport, Stapleton International. DIA can be expanded to 11 runways capable of serving 110 million passengers a year. Currently DIA is the sixth-busiest airport in the United States and the 10th-busiest in the world. Twenty-two airlines offer 1200 flights

including non-stops to 120 American cities and according to the Federal Aviation Administration.

## DESCRIPTION OF DENVER



Denver is a clean, young and green city with over 200 parks and dozens of tree-lined boulevards. The architecture reflects the city's three boom periods: Victorian, when silver was discovered in Leadville; turn-of-the-century, when gold was discovered in Cripple Creek; and contemporary, when the energy boom added 16 skyscrapers to the downtown skyline in a three year period, 1980-1983. Unlike some Western cities, Denver has a central downtown area. Here, within easy walking distance, are 5,200 hotel rooms, the city's convention complex, performing arts complex, and a wide variety of shops, department stores, restaurants, and nightspots. Also within easy walking distance are some of the city's top attractions including the U.S. Mint,

Denver Art Museum and Colorado History Museum.

## DENVER'S CLIMATE

Nothing about Denver is more misunderstood than the city's climate. Located just east of a high mountain barrier and a long distance from any moisture source, Denver has a mild, dry and arid climate. The city receives only 8-15 inches (20.3 - 38 cm) of precipitation a year (about the same as

Los Angeles), and records 300 days of sunshine a year — more annual hours of sun than San Diego or Miami Beach. Winters are mild with an average daily high of 45 degrees Fahrenheit, 7 degrees Celsius in February, warmer than New York, Boston, Chicago or St. Louis. Snow does fall, but it usually melts in a short time. Golf courses remain open all year and have been played on as many as 30 days in January. Chinook winds (a wind blowing down from a mountain that gains heat as it loses elevation)

can bring 60 degree F (16 degrees C) weather to Denver at any time throughout the winter. In summer, dry relative humidity makes Denver feel cool and comfortable, offering natural air conditioning. Fall is a particularly delightful time to visit the city and make day excursions to the mountains to view the colorful changing of the aspens, an event that takes place from

mid-September until mid-October.

## DENVER'S MUSEUMS AND ATTRACTIONS

Denver has some of the finest museums in the West with a wide variety of historical, western, artistic and horticultural emphasis.

### The Black American West Museum

tells the forgotten story of African American cowboys, who made up as many as one third of all the cowboys on the great cattle drives. Housed in the home of Dr. Justina Ford, Denver's first African American



doctor; the museum has exhibits, historic photos and artifacts that tell the story of the many contributions made by Blacks in settling the West. (303) 292-2566.

# DENVER FACTS

**Butterfly Pavilion & Insect Center** features a lush tropical forest filled with up to 1,600 free-flying butterflies. There is also an insect center, gift shop, outdoor gardens and many fun, educational exhibits. (303) 469-5441.

**The Colorado History Museum** offers a series of dioramas and exhibits that trace the colorful history of the Indians, explorers, gold miners, cowboys and pioneers that have called Colorado home. Exhibits include an outstanding collection of William Henry Jackson photos and a large diorama of Denver as it appeared in 1860. Call for information on special exhibits. (303) 866-3670.

**The Colorado State Capitol** stands a mile above sea level with a plaque on the 15th step to mark the spot that is 5,280 feet (1,609 m) high. The dome is covered with 200 ounces of pure gold and there is a beautiful view from the rotunda of the entire Front Range, from Pikes Peak, all the way north to the Wyoming border, a distance of over 150 miles (241 km). Free tours on weekdays of the beautiful rooms and appointments. (303) 866-2604.

**The Coors Brewery** offers free tours of the largest single brewery in the world. Colorado brews more beer than any other state and this Golden brewery brews more beer than any other place on the planet. Free tours of the entire complex, from brewing to bottling, with free beer samples for those over the age of 21. (303) 277-2337.

**Denver Art Museum** has what is considered to be the finest collection of American Indian art works in the world covering all tribes, as well as 30,000 other art objects in seven curatorial departments. The museum celebrated its 100th Anniversary in 1993 with newly remodeled Asian, Pre-Columbian and Spanish Colonial galleries and renovated African and Oceanic galleries. It is the largest art museum between Kansas City and the West Coast. (303) 640-2793.

**The Denver Zoo** is consistently rated as one of the top 10 in America with 3,500 animals in lovely spreading grounds in City Park. "Tropical Discovery," is a 1.5-acre rainforest under glass in which visitors feel the sensation of walking through a jungle teeming with wildlife. Other highlights of the Zoo include "Northern Shores" where you can watch polar bears swim underwater and Primate Panorama, where visitors can get as close as 10 feet to over 29 species of monkeys. The Zoo celebrated its 100th anniversary in 1996. (303) 376-4800.

**Six Flags Elitch Gardens Theme Park** is a hundred-year-old theme park known for its European atmosphere, elaborate floral gardens, and thrill rides. In 1995, Elitch Gardens moved to an expanded location in downtown Denver along the South Platte River with all new rides, gardens, lagoons, restaurants and amusements. (303) 455-4771.

**Red Rocks Amphitheatre** is a 9,000-seat natural outdoor arena carved out of huge, 500-foot (152 m) high, red sandstone cliffs, all overlooking Denver and the plains. With its views and geologic wonders, it's one of the world's

most famous concert sites and has played host to everyone from the Beatles to symphony orchestras. Seventy million years ago, the rocks were the beach of an ancient inland sea that covered eastern Colorado and Kansas. Today, it's a wonderful site for hikes, picnics and concerts.



**The U.S. Mint** is where over five billion coins are made each year and there are free 20 minute tours on weekdays. It is also the second largest storehouse of gold bullion in the U.S. after Fort Knox. The gift shop has many unique coins not available anywhere else, and there is a small museum on the history of money. Tours are currently available on a very limited basis, please call the Mint at 303-405-4761 for details.

## DAY TRIP EXCURSIONS FROM DENVER

**Pikes Peak Country** is located 60 miles (97 km) south of Denver and features more than 40 attractions centered around 14,000-foot (4,267 m) high Pikes Peak. Things to see include the Air Force Academy, one of three United States military colleges; the famous Broadmoor Resort with its lake and three golf courses; the Pro Rodeo Hall of Fame with its exhibits on this exciting professional sport; and Garden of the Gods which has gigantic 500-foot (152 m) high red sandstone rock monuments in a spectacular setting at the base of Pikes Peak.

**Rocky Mountain National Park** is located 71 miles (114 km) northwest of Denver and features 400 square miles (1,036 sq km) of scenic beauty, including Trail Ridge Road, the highest continuous highway in the world crossing the Continental Divide at over two miles above sea level. The park has two information centers, hundreds of miles of hiking trails, tranquil lakes, waterfalls, wildlife and horseback riding. Estes Park is a resort town on the edge of the park with restaurants and shops.

## DENVER TRIVIA

In 1935, Louis Ballast grilled a slice of cheese onto a hamburger at his Denver Humpty Dumpty drive-in restaurant, and patented the invention as the world's first "cheeseburger." The restaurant is gone today, but there is a small memorial to this historic dining event at 2776 North Speer Blvd. (in the parking lot for Key Bank).

- Denver truly is one mile high. The 15th step on the west side of the State Capitol Building is 5,280 feet (1,609 m) above sea level.
- It was on top of nearby Pikes Peak in 1893 that Katherine Lee Bates was inspired to write the words to "America the Beautiful."
- The mountainous area of Colorado is six times the size of Switzerland and contains 9,600 miles (15,449 km) of fishing streams, 2,850 lakes and over 1,000 peaks two miles (3,218 km) high.
- The road up 14,260 foot (4,346 m) high Mount Evans is the highest paved road in North America — and it is maintained and operated by Denver City Parks Department. Denver's Mountain Parks Department maintains



20,000 acres of park lands including its own private buffalo herd and Red Rocks Amphitheatre — all part of the largest city park system in the nation.

Nicknamed the Centennial State because it officially became the 38th state in 1876 (on the 100th anniversary of the U.S. Declaration of Independence), Colorado was first established as a U.S. Territory in 1861.

Spanish for "colored red," Colorado is the nation's highest state with an average elevation of about 6,800 feet. Colorado is the eighth-largest state encompassing 104,247 square miles, but is just the 26th-most populous state with 3.8 million residents.

Colorado is known for lots of things, but some things even surprise the lifelong resident. Here are some interesting facts about Colorful Colorado:

- Colorado boasts 325 days of sunshine per year, and has more hours of sunshine than both Miami and San Diego.

- There are just 68 mountains in the U.S. that hover above 14,000 feet, and 54 of the "14ers" are in Colorado. Driving along U.S. Highway 24 between Leadville and Salida, you pass over 10 separate 14ers.

- Colorado's famous Pikes Peak is where Katherine Lee Bates was inspired to write "America the Beautiful," but it has just the 31st highest summit in Colorado.

- Colorado's Rocky Mountains cover an area equal to three times that of the Swiss Alps.

- Colorado boasts several of the nation's and world's highest places and things, among them are the world's highest automobile tunnel (Eisenhower Tunnel on I-70), the world's largest flat-top mountain (Grand Mesa near Grand Junction), the highest paved highway in the U.S. (Trail Ridge Road in Rocky Mountain National Park), the highest railroad in the U.S. (Pikes Peak Cog Railway in Colorado Springs) and the highest 18-hole golf course in the U.S. (Copper Creek Golf Club in Copper Mountain).

- From atop Rocky Mountain National Park, you can view points on the Continental Divide where within a few feet, waters separate and flow to both the Atlantic and Pacific oceans.

- The world's first-ever Rodeo was held July 4, 1869, in Deer Trail, Colo.

- The first Stetson hat was manufactured by John B. Stetson in Central City, Colo.

- Summit County, home to several world famous ski resorts including Vail, Beaver Creek, Breckenridge, Copper Mountain and Keystone, is bounded on three sides by the Continental Divide.

- Colorado is one of four states at the Four Corners, the only place in the U.S. where four states meet. Near Four Corners is Mesa Verde National Park, which was the first national park to preserve the works of man. The southwestern part of Colorado is considered the archeological center of the United States.

The Morrison Formation, just west of Denver, yielded the largest brontosaurus bones ever excavated.

- The Coors Brewery in Golden is the world's largest single-site brewery, and Colorado also boasts more microbreweries per capita than any state in the U.S.

- Colorado's Royal Gorge, which boasts the world's highest suspension bridge, is unique in that it was formed solely by erosion, not by an earthquake.



# COLORADO SPORTS SCENE

Few would argue that Colorado and the Boulder/Denver area in particular has been the hot spot for sports in the 1990s. In 1997, the *Sporting News* ranked the Denver area as the No. 1 sports city in America. To qualify, a city had to have a franchise in all four major professional leagues (MLB, NBA, NFL, NHL) and also claim a university participating in NCAA Division basketball and football.

The area has been home to the two-time Super Bowl Champion Denver Broncos, 1996 and 2001 Stanley Cup champion Colorado Avalanche, three national football titles in the 1990s (Colorado in 1990 and Northern Colorado in 1996 and 1997, seven NCAA ski championships (Colorado in 1991, '95, '98 and '99 and Denver in 2000, 2001, 2002), and two national titles in cross country (CU's women's title in 2000 and the men's in 2001) and DU's men's hockey teams in 2003-04 and 2004-05. Boulder hosts the second-largest 10k road race in the country (Bolder Boulder) and

several world-class Olympic-class athletes call it home.

Denver is one of the few cities to have a franchise in five major sports with the Denver Broncos (NFL), Colorado Avalanche (NHL), Denver Nuggets (NBA), Colorado Rockies (MLB) and the Colorado Rapids (MLS). Denver has also been the home to professional teams whose leagues have disbanded: Arena Football, United States Football League (Denver Gold), Volleyball (Colorado Thunder) and the American Basketball League (Colorado Xplosion).

Boulder and Denver are

known for lots of things. But some things even surprise the lifelong resident, a recent transplant (nearly two-thirds of the state's residents were born outside of Colorado), or first-time visitor to the Mile High City.

- Denver is called the "Mile High City" because it is exactly 5,280 feet above sea level. In fact, there is a spot on the west steps of the State Capitol building that is exactly 5,280 feet above sea level and there is a row of seats at Coors Field with the same bragging rights.

- Denver is the most educated city in the United States. It has the greatest percentage of high school and college graduates of any major metropolitan area in the U.S.

- While Boulder has 10 microbreweries, Denver brews more beer than any other American city. The state of Colorado boasts more microbrews per capita than any state in the U.S. The Coors Brewery, in nearby Golden, is the world's largest single-site brewery.

- Boulder and Denver record more than 300 days of sunshine per

year, and has more hours of sunshine than both Miami and San Diego. The cities receive only 8-15 inches of precipitation a year (about the same as Los Angeles). Winters are mild, with an average daily high of 45 degrees, warmer than New York, Boston,

Chicago or St. Louis. Snow falls, but usually melts in a short time.

- Golf courses remain open all year and have been played on as many as 30 days in January. Chinook wins (a wind blowing down from a mountain that gains heat as it loses elevation) can bring 60 degrees to the area at any time during the winter.

- The Denver/Boulder metropolitan area is the 20th largest in the United States. Boulder is not classified as a suburb of Denver; it's nestled in its own valley at the foothills of the Rocky Mountains. Contrary to popular belief, Denver is not in the mountains; it is near them. The "Foothills" start to rise 15 miles west of the city. Slightly beyond that is the Continental Divide and a series of peaks rising to 14,000 feet, known locally as the "Front Range".

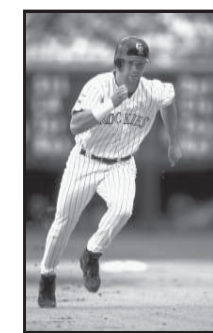
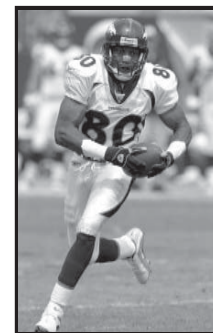
- Denver is also the "thinnest" city in America while Boulder is the second "fittest" city in America according to *Shape Magazine* and the state of Colorado is tied as the "thinnest" state with Hawai'i.

*Health Magazine* named Boulder one of America's 10 Fittest Cities. *Self Magazine* proclaimed Boulder one of the 10 healthiest places for women to live, with a perfect 100 in water quality.

- Denver is the nation's baby boomer capital, with the highest percentage of boomers of any major city. One third of the city is between the ages of 35 and 54 while Boulder's population of 25 to 44 year olds is slightly higher.

- Boulder has 200 miles of public hiking and biking trails, approximately 30,000 acres of open space and a 16-mile Boulder Creek Path which runs through the middle of town. The city of Denver offers over 450 miles of paved, designated bike paths, over 70 public golf courses and 143 free tennis courts. Denver also has the largest city park system in the nation with 205 within the city limits.

- As the largest city in a 600-mile radius, Denver is the shopping capital of the Rocky Mountain West. It features the largest sporting goods store in the world and the largest independent book store in America with over 400,000 volumes. The 16th street mall is a mile-long pedestrian promenade, not to be outdone by its counterpart in Boulder, the Pearl Street Mall. Boulder is also known for having more used book stores per capita than any other city in the country according to a *Money* magazine count in 1998.

### SCHOOL COLORS

THE OFFICIAL COLORS OF CU ARE SILVER AND GOLD. ACCORDING TO THE BOOK *GLORY COLORADO*, THESE COLORS WERE ADOPTED BY THE CLASS OF 1888, AS A SYMBOL OF THE MINERAL WEALTH OF THIS STATE. BUT IN 1921, AS FOOTBALL BECAME MORE POPULAR, THERE WERE COMPLAINTS FROM THE STUDENTS THAT SILVER AND GOLD DID NOT LOOK GOOD ON FOOTBALL JERSEYS. IN FACT, SILVER AND GOLD ENDED UP LOOKING LIKE DIRTY GRAY AND DARK YELLOW. IT WASN'T UNTIL 1959 THAT THE FOOTBALL TEAM CHANGED ITS JERSEYS TO BLACK WITH YELLOW. AND ALTHOUGH THE FOOTBALL TEAM SEEMS TO HAVE SET THE TREND WITH ITS COLOR CHOICE, CU STILL HAS THE OFFICIAL COLORS OF SILVER AND GOLD.

The University of Colorado has the most unique mascot in all of inter-collegiate athletics, a real buffalo named Ralphie. The live buffalo mascot leads the football team out on the field both at the start of the game and second half. It is truly one of the special sights that exists anywhere in college or professional sports, especially for opposing teams, who often stop in the tracks watching the massive buffalo round the end zone and head directly at their sideline.

The Buffalo first appeared in 1934, three weeks after a contest to select an official school nickname by the Silver and Gold newspaper had come to an end and "Buffaloes" was the winning entry. For the final game of the '34 season, some students paid \$25 to rent a buffalo calf mascot along with a real cowboy as his keeper. It took the cowboy and four students to keep the calf under control on the sidelines, a 7-0 win at the University of Denver on Thanksgiving Day.

Prior to 1934, CU athletic teams usually were referred to as the "Silver and Gold", but other nicknames teams were sometimes called included Silver Helmets, Yellow Jackets, Hornets, Arapahoes, Big Horns, Grizzlies and Frontiersmen. The campus newspaper announced the contest in the fall of 1934, with a \$5 prize to go to the author of the winning selection. Claude Bates of New Madrid, Mo., and James Proffitt of Cincinnati, Ohio, were co-winners for the prize as both submitted Buffaloes as their entry. Athletic Director Harry Carlson, graduate manager Walter Franklin and Kenneth Bundy of the Silver and Gold were the judges. Through the years, synonyms which quickly came into use included "Bisons," "Bufs," "Thundering Herd," "Stampeding Herd," and "Golden Buffaloes."

The first buffalo, "Mr. Chips," was eventually given to the University by Mahlon White. The buffalo was a regular at CU home games through the 1950s and was cared for by a men's honorary.

The CU football teams were without a mascot for several years before the original Ralphie made its first appearance at a CU function in 1966 (and as a six-month-old calf). For a while, she was billed as Ralph, the name given by the student body. An astute fan soon discovered that the buffalo was in fact a female, thus the name alteration to Ralphie.

Ralphie attended every CU home football game for 13 years (including bowl games), and retired at the end of the 1978 season.

Ralphie's replacement on the sidelines was Ralphie II, making her first-ever appearance at CU's final home game of the 1978 season. The buffalo's original name was Moon, short for Moonshine, but the name Ralphie had become so popular and traditional that I was restored. The Bank of Boulder, a significant contributor through the years to the Ralphie program, purchased and donated Ralphie II to CU. At the age of 12, and after serving the Bufs for 10 years, Ralphie II passed away on Sept. 19, 1987, following a 31-17 CU win over Stanford.

Ralphie III was pressed into action earlier than anticipated, as she had been in training for the 1988 season. Originally named "Tequila," she made her debut on Nov. 7, 1987, when the Bufs beat Missouri, 27-10. After over 10 years of service, she passed away in January, 1998, at the age of 13.

Colorado's latest mascot is Ralphie IV, donated to the university as a yearling in April, 1998, by media and sports entrepreneur Ted Turner.

Ralphie IV was born in April, 1997 on the Flying D Ranch in Gallatin Gateway, Montana, which is part of Turner Ranches, the largest ranch operation in the United States. Named "Rowdy" by ranch hands, she was separated from her mother when she was about a month old and was literally found in the jaws of a coyote with bite marks around her neck. She survived the attack and was bottle-fed by the hands for four months. She was released back to the herd but wouldn't bond with them, so the ranch hands took her back in and fed her grasses and grain.

Ralphie IV, rapidly growing and maturing, weighs in at about 1,300 pounds this year, well over twice her weight when she made her debut against Colorado State at Mile High Stadium in Denver on Sept. 5, 1998.
