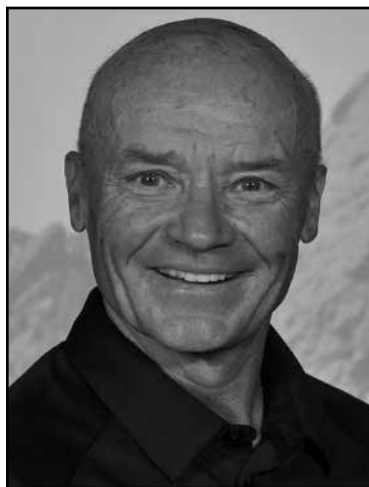

HEAD COACH RICHARD ROKOS



Eight NCAA Championships 14 NCAA West Regional Championships 214 All-Americans 42 Individual National Champions

Richard Rokos and Colorado Skiing. Now in his 28th season as the University of Colorado head coach and his 31st overall at the school, you can't think of one without the other, not to mention that the combination has been synonymous with success.

When he was promoted to head coach on July 3, 1990, the process to return a program that was eight years removed from an NCAA title back to national prominence took its first step. Twenty-seven seasons, eight national championships, 42 individual champions and 214 All-Americans later, he has turned CU into the premier ski program in the country.

Rokos, 67, is the 11th and longest tenured head coach in CU ski history, has guided Colorado to eight NCAA titles, claiming the crowns in 1991, 1995, 1998, 1999, 2006, 2011, 2013 and 2015. In addition, his Buffaloes have won individual titles (42 total) in 18 different years. That first team title came in his first season as head coach, a unique accomplishment in any sport, and served as a bookend for the school as it came on the heels of CU's first in football.

Only four coaches in CU history coached their teams longer than Rokos has been at the reins of the ski team: Frank Potts (41 seasons, cross country and track); Charles Vavra (32 seasons, men's gymnastics), and Les Fowler and Mark Simpson, both of whom coached the men's golf team 29 seasons. Rokos' teams have qualified for the NCAA Championships 27 times, the second most by any coach in school history.

He has also coached the Buffs to 14 Rocky Mountain Intercollegiate Ski Association (RMISA) titles, events that also serve as the NCAA West Regional, as well as eight runner-up finishes.

His skiers, alpine and Nordic, have posted 314 top 10 finishes at the NCAA Championships; that total includes 136 first-team All-Americans, with 41 earning two-time single-year first-team All-American mention, and 78 second-team All-Americans. Academically, the skiers have boasted grade point averages that are always at or near the top of all of CU's 17 varsity sports programs, often in excess of 3.5. His teams have placed 267 student-athletes on the NCAA Skiing All-Academic Team, the equivalent of Academic All-America.

Under Rokos, the Buffaloes have won 69 of 165 meets they have skied in, including the eight NCAA crowns (1991, 1995, 1998, 1999, 2006, 2011, 2013, 2015) and the 14 RMISA Championships/NCAA West Regionals (1991, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1998, 1999, 2002, 2006, 2008, 2010, 2011, 2013, 2015 and 2017). On 49 other occasions, CU has finished as the runner-up. That's an amazing 72 percent of the time CU has finished in the top two.

Though he has been notified on nine different occasions that he was the selection for the RMISA Coach of the Year, the last time in 2015, Rokos declines the honor for personal reasons, mainly that he doesn't believe in the philosophy and that the student-athletes

deserve the credit. He has been named the United States Collegiate Ski Coaches Association National Coach of the Year on five occasions, last in 2015.

One of Rokos' greatest accomplishments since taking over the program has been turning what was once essentially an individual sport, pulling divergent skiers—men and women, Nordic and Alpine—into a team event at CU. Prior to his arrival, the two units rarely saw each other prior to the national championships, as they trained and raced separately. But it was his philosophy, to be an educator as well as a coach, to understand the physical and psychological significance of a student-athlete and to introduce harmony and mutual support that has made it a more unified program. Credit Rokos himself for the strong camaraderie because there is very little that he asks of his skiers that he doesn't do himself. That includes 6 a.m. ice hockey games, off-season dryland training, mountain bike rides from Boulder to Winter Park and back, hiking Pikes Peak, playing soccer and rollerblading through Boulder.

Rokos, who also coordinates all alpine aspects of the program, was already very familiar with the CU ski program upon his hiring, as he was promoted from alpine coordinator to the post. He served one season (1989-90) in that role under his predecessor as head coach, Tim LaVallee, and was the head coach of Colorado's Alpine "B" Team for the two years prior to joining the varsity staff (1987-89). With Rokos tutoring the alpine skiers, the 1990 team finished third in both the West Regional and the NCAA Championships, with one individual national champion in the latter.

Rokos brought to CU a great amount of racing and coaching experience. He competed in his native home of Czechoslovakia and internationally for 19 years before beginning his coaching career with the Czechoslovakian Junior National Team in 1977. The year prior to joining the junior national team, Rokos graduated from the University of Masaryk with a masters' degree in physical education, his emphasis in his diploma work was the use of ski slopes with artificial surfaces for slalom and giant slalom practice. In 1969 he earned his bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from the College of Machiner. He has additional course work in Prague (Level II International Coaching License), Colorado State (athletic training) and the University of Colorado (special education).

Leaving the Czech National Team in 1980, Rokos went on to coach at several ski schools in Austria before finally coming to the United States to coach at the Grampian Mountain Ski School in Michigan the following year. He then spent four years (1984-87) working with the U.S. Pro Ski Tour before settling down in Boulder.

Dating back to 1995, Rokos has served as the Chief of the U.S. Alpine delegation for the World University Games (WUG) on nine occasions. He has handled what are essentially the head coaching duties for the alpine team in 1995 (Jaca, Spain), 1997 (Mugli, South Korea), 2001 (Zakopane, Poland), 2003 (Tarvisio, Italy), 2005 (Innsbruck, Austria), 2007 (Turin, Italy), 2011 (Erzurum, Turkey), 2013 (Trentino, Italy) and 2015 (Granada, Spain). The U.S. athletes have brought home several medals (gold, silver and bronze) under his direction, including four by CU skiers: gold medals by Thea Grosvold (slalom, 2015), Erika Ghent

(combined classification, 2011) and Katie Hartman (Super-G, 2011) and a bronze by Erika Hogan (slalom, 2003). He was also the head coach of the entire U.S. Team in the 1997 event in South Korea.

In 2013, he was inducted into the Colorado Ski & Snowboard Hall of Fame for his accomplishments in his two-plus decades as CU's head coach. He joined several former Buffs in the Hall, in which he was the 200th person enshrined.

In 2006, he earned a "Top of the Rocky Award" as the region's top college coach as selected by the writers and critics of the Rocky Mountain News. The honor made mention of CU being the first-ever shorthanded team to win an NCAA title, recording the biggest second-day comeback in the meet, and Rokos specifically being mentioned by President George W. Bush when the Buffs were one of 12 teams invited to the White House. Rokos was saluted by the president, who called him a "proud American" in reference to his defecting to

the States for freedom, which he also privately had mentioned upon meeting him, "There's nothing like freedom."

He was also selected as the 2006 Coach of the Year in the state of Colorado by the Sportswomen of Colorado Hall of Fame.

Rokos was born May 25, 1950 in Brno, Czechoslovakia. He and his wife, the former Helena Konecny, and then-18-month-old daughter Linda, left a communist-bound native homeland in 1980 for Austria where they spent a year preparing their visas, and defected from Czechoslovakia to the United States (Detroit) a year later before calling Colorado their permanent home beginning in 1982. He and Helena are the parents of two grown children Linda, now an alpine instructor at Eldora and Thomas, and one grandchild, Stella, who is also an avid skier.

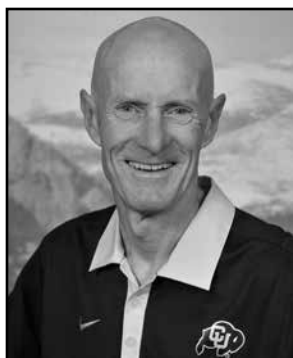

Head Nordic Coach

Bruce Cranmer, a familiar name among skiing historians in Colorado, is in his 18th season at the head Nordic coach for the Buffaloes.

Cranmer skied collegiately for CU, helping the Buffs to two national championships in 1972 and '73 under coach Bill Marolt. He later went on to compete for the U.S. Ski Team from 1980-

88 when he was a member of the 1985 World Championship team.

Longtime Coloradoans certainly know the name, as his grandfather, George, started the Winter Park Ski Resort in Winter Park, Colo., which has blossomed into one of the finer skier areas in the world.

Cranmer brought an outstanding coaching resume with him to Boulder and he has expanded it even further once he got there, as he was the head cross country coach at Vermont, helping the Catamounts to four NCAA Championships between 1989-2000. Vermont was also the national runner-up three different times under Cranmer and head coach Chip LaCasse.

Since returning to Colorado in 2001, the Buffs have won four NCAA Championships (2006, 2011, 2013 and 2015) and have finished runner-up another seven times in his 17 years.

He has coached 12 different skiers to 18 individual NCAA Championships, including Petra Hynicova who swept the women's Nordic titles at the 2017 NCAA Championships in New Hampshire. Hynicova is one of four athletes Cranmer has coached to individual NCAA Championship sweeps, first in 2006 when current assistant coach Jana Weinberger (then Rehema) won both the classical and freestyle championships, then in 2008 Maria Grevsgaard won both championships and Mads Stroem swept both in 2016.

Seventeen of the 18 individual national champions have come in the last 11 seasons.

The Buffs have also won the mythical Nordic national championship seven times under Cranmer's tutelage, scoring the most Nordic points at the NCAA Championships in 2004, '06, '08, '10, '11, '13 and '15, the only seven times the Buffs have topped the Nordic points list since the NCAA went to a combined skiing championship in 1983.

CU's men's Nordic skiers have earned the most points at the NCAA Championship five seven under Cranmer (2004, '06, '08, '10, '11, '14 and '15), the only seven times since 1983 the Buffs have topped that point total, as well. On the women's side, Cranmer's teams have earned more points than

other women's Nordic squads six times under Cranmer (out of eight times in CU history), including in 2002, '06, '08, '11, '13 and '17.

Grevsgaard set a new CU record when she won 24 races between 2006-09, five more than any other skier in CU history, Nordic or alpine. Out of the 225 skiers that have won five or more races in a season, Cranmer has coached 11 of them, including Grevsgaard's totals of 11 in 2008, matching the CU record, seven in 2007 and five in 2009, and Rehema's five in 2006, Matt Gelso's five in 2010, Oedegaard's five in 2012 and 2014, Reid's nine in 2013, Stroem's eight in 2016 and Hynicova's five in 2017.

In Cranmer's first season in 2001, Storeng became just the seventh skier in CU history to earn two podium appearances in their first NCAA Championship, as she was the runner up in the classical race and took third in the freestyle race.

A total of 28 of his athletes have earned 69 first-team All-America honors in all, he has had at least one first-team All-America performance each year and 10 times CU has had four or more Nordic athletes earn first-team All-America honors, including a CU record five, accomplished in 2010. CU's four athletes earning first-team honors in 2011 earned a combined seven honors, the most in CU history, and his 2017 squad duplicated the feat.

Including second-team All-America honors, Cranmer has coached 31 different athletes to 110 such honors in his time at Colorado. The Buffs under Cranmer have also had 23 different skiers win a total of 124 races, including 18 skiers winning 116 races since 2006. CU has won at least six races in each of the last 11 years and four of those years the Buffs won 12 or more Nordic races throughout the season. The Buffs have twice swept all four Nordic races under his tenure, in 2008 at the RMISA Championships when Grevsgaard and Kit Richmond both swept the races, and in 2009 at the Alaska Invitational when Grevsgaard won both races while Gelso and Kjoelhamar each one a men's race.

In his time at Vermont, the Catamounts boasted 12 individual Nordic NCAA Championships including a pair of four-time winners in Thorodd Bakken and Laura Wilson and a pair of Olympians in Joe Galanes and Kerrin Petty. Former DU Nordic coaches Knut and Trond Nystad were also All-Americans under Cranmer's tutelage while at Vermont.

Cranmer also coached for two U.S. Olympic Teams, the 1994 squad in Lillehammer, Norway, and the 1998 team in Nagano, Japan. Outside of skiing, Cranmer spent time as a Quality Control Engineer on the Trans-Alaska Pipeline and as an Outward Bound instructor in Bertchesgaden, Germany.

Born Sept. 15, 1950, in Denver, Cranmer graduated from Aspen High School. He won NBC's Survival of the Fittest in 1985 and won the overall Great American Ski Chase in 1986. He is also a Class 5 whitewater kayaker. He is married to the former Patricia Drislane.

Jana Weinberger

Assistant Nordic Coach

A five-time first-team All-American and two-time individual NCAA Champion for the University of Colorado, Jana Weinberger will enter her 10th season in 2018 as the assistant Nordic coach at her alma mater.

In her nine seasons at CU, a total of 14 different CU skiers have won 81 races and she has coached eight different Buffs who have won a combined 12 NCAA individual national titles.

Additionally, she has seen 16 different Nordic skiers win a combined 42 first-team All-America honors.

Petra Hyncicova's sweep of the Nordic titles at the 2017 NCAA Championships made her the 15th NCAA Division I woman to sweep the Nordic races and the fourth Buff (men and women). Of the four Buffs to sweep the national titles, Weinberger has coached two of them (Hyncicova, Mads Stroem in 2016) and she herself swept the titles at the 2006 NCAA Championships.

Stroem won three total NCAA titles under Weinberger and was an eight time All-American (seven first-team honors), tying the program record for most All-America honors and first-team accolades in a career.

Weinberger first season coaching for the Buffs was in 2009.

As a former student-athlete at CU from 2003-06, Weinberger raced 28 collegiate races, claiming 27 top 10 and 23 top five performances. Her most prolific season came her senior year in 2006 when she captained the national championship team and swept six consecutive races, including winning the individual titles in both the freestyle and classical events at the NCAA Championships.

As a result of her performance in 2006, she was awarded the Dick Schoenberger Memorial Award, presented to CU's most outstanding skier each season. When she won a pair of All-America citations in 2004, she became just the sixth women's cross country skier to accomplish that feat and first since former teammate and former assistant coach Mari Storeng in 2001. Weinberger was also the recipient of the Outstanding Nordic Woman award in both 2003 and '04.

Prior to her collegiate career, she skied for the Tartu Ski Club in Estonia. She also competed in basketball and track & field at Estonia Sport Gymnasium.

Born July 27, 1979 in Russia, the former Jana Rehema is the daughter of Udo and Veir Rehema. She graduated from the University of Colorado in 2006 with a degree in international affairs. She is married to former CU All-American and her predecessor as the assistant Nordic Coach, Dan Weinberger, and the couple has three children, Klara, Alexander and William.



Stefan Hughes

Assistant Alpine Coach

Stefan Hughes, a two-time All-American alpine skier for the Buffaloes from 2007-10, returns to his alma mater as the assistant alpine coach for the 2017-18 season.

Since graduating from CU in 2010 with a Bachelor of Arts in film studies, Hughes has spent the past eight years as a ski coach across the globe.

His first coaching job came right out of college in 2010, when he was a FIS Alpine Ski

Racing Coach for the British Junior National Ski Team.

After one season there, he moved back to Colorado to work at the Winter Park Competition Center as a U21 post-graduate coach from 2010-11.

Hughes spent the next four years coaching at the Ski and Snowboard Club in Vail, Colo., before going to work privately in the event production field the year before coming back to CU.

At Ski and Snowboard Club Vail, Hughes spent two winters working as the U21 FIS Alpine Ski Racing Coach (2012-14) and another two as the U16 USSA Alpine Ski Racing Coach (2014-16).

Skiing for head coach Richard Rokos, Hughes competed in 48 races during his CU career and had 11 top 10 and four top five finishes. He earned second-team All-America honors with a ninth place finish in the slalom at the 2009 NCAA

Championships and as a freshman in 2007 placed ninth in the giant slalom at NAAs to collect second-team All-America honors. He was presented with the 2007 Buddy Werner Award, which was named after the man synonymous with competitive skiing in America. He was the United States' first international skiing star who set a fine example and a scholarship commemorating him was established in 1983 for a deserving team member.

Hughes also participated in the 2007 World University Games in Italy with Rokos as his coach that January. He nabbed a 32nd place finish in the men's giant slalom, making him the fifth American finisher in the field of 116 skiers from universities around the world. He earned a top 20 finish in the men's slalom, good for the second-best American performance. Hughes was a member of the U.S. Ski Team from 2005-06, and won the U.S. Junior Slalom Championship as well as the Junior Combined Championship during that span.

He was born June 6, 1986 in Rutland, Vt. Hughes and his wife, the former Lleane Grimditch, had Rokos serve as the officiant at their wedding. Lleane played soccer at Denver University from 2003-07 and now owns Whole Pets store in Boulder. His sister-in-law, Lauren Grimditch, was an alpine skier at Colorado from 1990-94 and was a part of Rokos' 1991 national championship team.

He is the son of Chuck and Betty Hughes, and has two older siblings, Tyler and Megan, who were also accomplished skiers.



Jodi Mossoni

Administrative Assistant

Jodi Mossoni is in her 16th season with the Colorado ski program, having joined the east campus office staff in May 2002.

Mossoni is a Centennial State native and graduated from Berthoud High School before attending Colorado State University and beginning a career with StorageTek. She and her husband, Mark, are the former owners of the A&W restaurant in Louisville, Colo. and she is a former president of the Buffalo Belles.

She enjoys skiing, golf and doing scrapbooks for her two children, Kory and Joleen, both University of Colorado graduates. Kory was a four-year letter winner in football as a linebacker at CU before signing as a free agent and having a tryout with the New Orleans Saints.



Kris Livingston

Associate AD/Student Services

Kris Livingston began her career at the University of Colorado in 1997 and has been serving as the associate athletic director for student services since the spring of 2014. She had been promoted to an assistant athletic director in 2010.

As the director of academic support services, she oversees the Herbst Academic Center, which provides year-round academic support to all of CU's approximately 365 student-athletes. In addition, Livingston serves as the sport supervisor to the men's and women's ski teams and women's soccer team.

2017 (Freshman)—In her freshman season she finished seven of the 10 races she started, including both the GS and slalom races at the RMISA Championships. Her 19th place finish at Beaver Creek in the RMISA Championships was her best slalom finish of the season. Her top GS finish was in 16th place, which she recorded twice in the first two meets of the season at Utah and Montana State. She was named to the 2017 USCSCA National Collegiate All-Academic Ski Team, which requires a cumulative 3.5 grade point average and competing at the NCAA Regional Championships. After the end of the collegiate season she won a FIS race at the Western Region Open held at Sun Valley Resort. She took first in the GS on March 26, one day after placing second in another GS race.

Club—She has been a member of the Winter Park Competition Center since 2004 and has also been a member of the Czech Ski Team since 2015, competing in the Junior World Championships and the Youth Olympic Games. In April of 2016 she finished third in the Super G at Whistler. She was the Colorado Ski Cup winner in both 2013-14 and 2014-15 in the slalom and giant slalom and from 2015-16 she had five first place finishes (three in giant slalom and two in the slalom), along with three second place finishes (two Super G and one slalom) in the Colorado Ski Cup. At the 2015 Junior World Championships in the under 18 category she finished fourth in both the Super G and Alpine Combined. In the 2016 Youth Olympic Games she finished 18th in the Super G.

High School—Arnold graduated from Middle Park High School in Granby, Colo. in June of 2016. She was a member of the honor roll in high school.

In the Classroom—Arnold is majoring in integrative physiology at Colorado.

Personal—Andrea Arnold was born on Aug. 4, 1998 in Boulder, Colo. She is the only child of Ivana and Landis Arnold. Her father is a marketing manager and mother is a ski coach. Her hobbies include camping, traveling and riding horses. She is trilingual - fluent in Czech, English and Spanish - Czech was her first language as she is a dual citizen (Czech and American). After college, she would like to become a physician's assistant and one of the reasons she chose to attend the University of Colorado was because of its integrative physiology program in addition to the skiing program and being close to home. In May 2017 she spent two weeks in Cozumel, Mexico working with disabled children and dolphins at a dolphin rehabilitation center, assisting the dolphin trainers and also holding swimming sessions with the children.

Career at Colorado—In her first two seasons she has picked up a pair of All-America honors in the slalom, finishing fifth both seasons in the event at the NCAA Championships. She has placed inside the top 10 nine times in the 24 races she has finished in her career, and eight of those top 10 finishes came in her sophomore season (six of them were in the slalom).

2017 (Sophomore)—She earned first-team All-America honors for a second consecutive season by finishing fifth at the NCAA Championships. She built off her strong freshman season, finishing her second year in the program with eight top 10's out of the 12 races she finished. Six of those top 10 finishes were in slalom races, her best finish being third at both the Seawolf Invitational and RMISA Championships – the first two podium appearances in her career. In the giant slalom she opened the season strong with back-to-back ninth place finishes, first in the GS alpine qualifier and then in the Montana State Invitational. She also had another successful season in the classroom and was named to the USCSCA National Collegiate All-Academic Ski Team for the second consecutive season. She was presented with the Outstanding Alpine Woman Award at the team's end-of-the-season banquet.

2016 (Freshman)—She finished 12 of the 14 races on the season with 10 top 20 finishes and one top 10. Her top 10 race was actually a fifth place finish in the slalom race at the NCAA Championships, earning her first-team All-America honors. She was only skiing at the NCAA Championships as an injury replacement to senior Jessica Honkonen, who injured herself on the first day of training for the championships. Her top giant slalom finish was 13th in Park City at the Utah Invitational. In her seven slalom races, she finished five and was extremely consistent with two 11th and two 12th place finishes prior to breaking out with her fifth place finish at NAAs. On top of being a first-team All-American, she was also a member of the National Collegiate All-Academic Ski Team for maintaining above a 3.5 cumulative grade point average and competing at the RMISA Championships/NCAA West Regional.

Club—Christensen has skied for Norwegian Europa Cup Team for two seasons between 2012-15 and for Baerum Skiclub for her whole career. Christensen has been skiing in FIS races since 2010 and has finished 81 of 99 races prior to the start of her collegiate career with 95 top 10, 41 podium appearances and 14 victories. She won her first FIS race in Norefjell, Norway, in 2012, and during the 2013 season, she won four races, all of them in slalom. During the 2014 season she won two races, one in slalom and one in downhill. She has 44 European

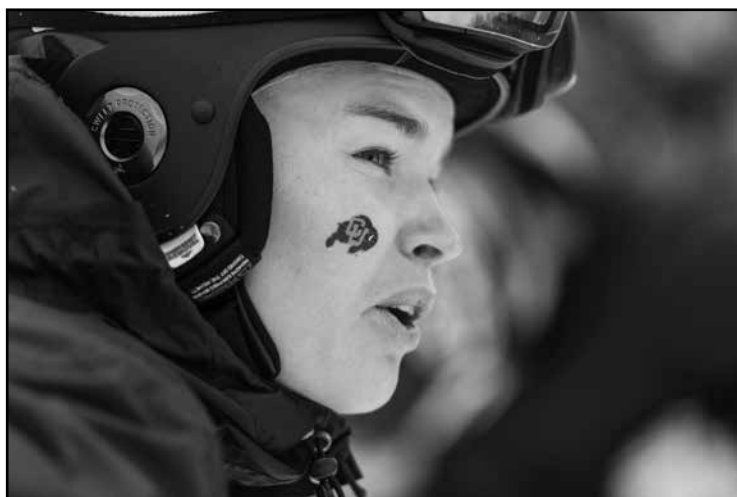


Cup starts under her belt with 30 finishes and 12 top 30 finishes. In Europa Cup she has been finishing in top 30 in all six disciplines, once in slalom, once in giant slalom, once in Super-G, three times in downhill, two times in super combine and two times in alpine combine. In 2014, she finished fifth in Europa Cup super-combined in Spital in Austria. She has 13 National Championship races to her credit from Norway, finishing them all in top 10 and four in top five. She also has eight races to her credit from National Junior Championships, with five podium appearances, and two victories. 2017 (Freshman)—She missed most all of fall training after sustaining a knee injury from being hit by a car while riding her bike in October. She healed in time to earn her first letter as a Buff after competing in the RMISA and NCAA Championships. At the RMISA Championships she was a pleasant surprise by finishing in 10th place in both the slalom and giant slalom races, helping the Buffs win their 28th RMISA title. Then at the NCAA Championships, she placed 17th in the giant slalom and 21st in the slalom. There she moved up 15 spots from her bib seed of 32 in the GS and 11 spots from her 32 bib seed in the slalom; impressive finishes given her low seeding after not having many qualifying points because of her injury at the start of the year. At the team's end-of-the-season banquet she was presented with the Lucie Hanusova Award, which has been given every season since 1999 and is given to the team member or members who overcomes adversity and challenges with smiles and enthusiasm.

Club—She skied for the Hovden Sportsclub for her entire career before Colorado and for the Norwegian National Junior Team from 2014-15. She battled through two injuries (knee and back) before coming to CU and missed most of the 2015 or 2016 seasons. From 2012-2014 she won seven races; five were FIS races held in Sweden or Norway (four in the giant slalom, one in the slalom), won the 2014 Norwegian National Senior Championship in the giant slalom and the 2013 Norwegian Junior Championship in the slalom. In her FIS racing career before coming to CU, she has earned 16 podium finishes, and she also won four medals competing in the national championships. She entered college with 26.93 FIS points in the giant slalom and 36.19 in the slalom.

High School—She graduated from Norges Toppidrettsgymnas Geilo located in Geilo, Norway in June 2016. She was named the Student-Athlete of the Year for 2014-15, as she had the best results in high school.

In The Classroom—Fidjeland is majoring in strategic communication at Colorado.

2017 (Freshman)—She was named to the 2017 USCSCA National Collegiate All-Academic Ski Team, which requires a cumulative 3.5 grade point average and competing at the NCAA Regional Championships. In her first year with the Buffs she finished 10 of the 12 races she competed in. Her top showings were in slalom races, as she finished 11th at both the Montana State and Utah Invitionals in the event to open the season. At her very first RMISA Championships, she placed 15th in the slalom and 24th in the giant slalom, the GS finish matching her best of the season. Prior to the start of NCAA competition, McGrew placed 14th in the giant slalom in a FIS race held at Eldora Mountain Resort on Jan. 2, 2017. She also placed 16th in the event in another FIS race held at Copper Mountain on Nov. 30, 2016. At the end of the school-year, she spent the month of July in New Zealand with two weeks during the month spent training at the Treble Cone Race Academy (TCRA), New Zealand's world class alpine ski training camp.

Club—She was a member of the USSA Team Academy out of Park City, Utah as well as Team Summit. Career at Colorado—In her first two seasons as a Buff she has placed inside the top 10 in 19 of the 24 races she has completed in her career. She also already has two NCAA Championship experiences under her belt and one All-America honor.

2017 (Sophomore)—She was a first-team All-RMISA selection and was also named to the 2017 USCSCA National Collegiate All-Academic Ski Team for maintaining a 3.5 cumulative GPA. She competed at the NCAA Championships for a second-straight season after finishing the regular season second in the RMISA women's alpine MVP points list. She had six top five finishes, five podium appearances and two race victories, both in giant slalom action at the Montana State Invitational and the CU Spencer James Nelson Memorial Invitational. A stronger slalom skier coming into CU, she excelled in giant slalom throughout the season, finishing off the podium just once in six finishes with two wins, a second place and twice was third. One of her third place GS finishes was at the NCAA Championships, earning her first-team All-America honors. She was first-team All-RMISA and the RMISA Skier of the Week for the first meet of the season in Park City at the Utah Invitational. She was a finalist for the CU CUSPY for Female Freshman of the Year and was twice a CU Athlete of the Week selection, for the Utah and CU Invitionals. Career at Colorado—He has competed for the Buffs at the NCAA Championships in each of his first two seasons in Boulder and is a two-time first-team All-RMISA selection. He has 15 top 10 finishes in the 19 races he has finished in his career.

He placed second in the giant slalom at a FIS Race held on Dec. 1, 2016 at Copper Mountain before the start of the NCAA season.

2016 (Freshman)—He completed one of the top freshman season in CU men's alpine history, racing out of the gate to four consecutive podium performances to kick of his collegiate career, setting a new CU standard for most consecutive podiums to start any season in men's alpine history at CU. In all, he competed in 12 of 14 races, missing the RMISA Championships after injuring himself at the New Mexico Invitational, despite winning the slalom race there a day after his only finish outside of the top 10. With that win, he was part of the first CU trio to sweep the podium in coach Richard Rokos' 26-year career with Max Luukko taking second and Henrik Gunnarsson third. His race wins came at the Utah Invitational in the GS race along with his win at Red River in the second slalom race. He finished 11 of the 12 races with 10 top 10 performance, eight finishes in the top five with six podium appearances and those two wins. He was a second-team All-American in the GS race at the NCAA Championships and earned the RMISA Men's Alpine MVP honor for collecting more points during the regular season

He was the CU Athlete of the Week for his performance at the Utah Invitational and the RMISA Men's Alpine Skier of the Week for the Montana State Invitational. A finalist for the CUSPY for CU's Male Freshman of the Year, he was named first-team All-RMISA.

Club—Johansen skied for Norwegian National Team for two seasons from 2013-15. He also skied for the Doenski alpine program during high school. He started FIS races in 2008, finishing 187 of 254 races prior to the start of his collegiate career with 87 top 10, 56 top five, 31 podium appearances and nine race victories. He won his first FIS race in giant slalom in Geilo, Norway in 2011. During the 2015 season, he started one World Cup, finishing in 57th place in the Super-G in Val Gardena, Italy. He had 39 European Cup starts with 19 finishes. In the 2010 season he finished 10th at the Europa Cup in the giant slalom held at Vermdalen, Sweden and in the 2014 season he finished 11th in the Europa Cup giant slalom race in Les Menuires, France. At another Europa Cup, this time at Levi, Finland in 2015, he placed 12th in the giant slalom. He participated in FIS World Ski Championships in 2012, 2013 and 2014, in Italy, Canada and Slovakia. He finished 8-of-12 races with six top 20 and four top 10 results. He has 20 Norwegian National Championship races to his credit. In 2012 he twice finished in eighth place, once in downhill and once in super combined. In 2013 he finished 11th in downhill, fourth in super combined and seventh in slalom. In 2014 he finished 10th in downhill and fifth in super-G.

Career at Colorado—He registered one of the best alpine seasons in school history during his first winter in Boulder. He tied the single-season alpine record for race victories with seven, which included a sweep of the slalom and giant slalom at the 2017 NCAA Championships. He was ranked No. 31 in the world in the slalom in the point standings released on April 5, as he holds 6.00 FIS Points. In his first winter at CU, Ketterer won 15 of the 34 races he competed in counting all NCAA, NorAm Cup and FIS races (but does not include his two World Cup starts).

2017-18 (International Competition)—He earned his first World Cup points in just his fourth slalom start, finishing 26th at Val d'Isere, France, to gain 5.0 points. In the Dec. 7, 2017 FIS Points List for the slalom he ranked 31st, and of everyone in the top 31, he is one of only just 13 in there that scored points within the first four World Cup starts of their careers.

2017 (Freshman)—He was named the USCSCA National Skier of the Year. He became just the fifth skier in NCAA history (and third Buff) to sweep the giant slalom and slalom national titles in the same year. He also joined two other Buffaloes as the only trio to win their first two NCAA races, though he is the first alpine skier to accomplish the rarity. He became just the eighth CU skier to have a pair of podium finishes (top three) in his first two NCAA races. He became the 13th different Buffalo to win the slalom national championship and the 10th to win a giant slalom title. His win in the giant slalom on the first day of the championships made him the ninth Buffalo to earn a title in his first-ever NCAA Championship race (the fifth in an alpine race, all giant slaloms). In addition to his pair of first-team All-America accolades he earned at the NCAA Championships, he was also the men's alpine MVP after earning the most points in the conference, the RMISA Skier of the Year for men's alpine in a vote by the league coaches and a first-team All-RMISA selection. He won a total of seven races on the season, tying the school record for most race victories by a CU alpine skier (male or female). Of this seven wins, five were in the slalom. That broke the men's program record previously held by John Skajem (who won four slalom races in both 1986 and 1987) and tied the overall CU coed record (Lucie Zikova won five slalom races in 2006). He also collected RMISA Skier of the Week honors after his first collegiate meet and was a three-time CU Athlete of the Week selection.

He won his first giant slalom race of the season at the RMISA Championships before going on to win again at the NCAA Championships. In 13 races on the collegiate circuit, he finished no worse than sixth place every time and was on the podium nine times. At end-of-the-year CUSPY Awards, he was named CU's Male Freshman Athlete of the Year and at the team's banquet he received the Buddy Werner Memorial Award.

2016-17 (International Competition)—He was the slalom champion in the 2016-17 NorAm Cup series, winning the event by 275 points, the second largest winning margin in the cup in the last 20 years. In all, he won 5 of 8 slalom races he competed in during the NorAm series and became the first CU alpine skier under 27-year head coach Richard Rokos to win a NorAm Cup race. He also placed 17th in the giant slalom standings, despite only competing in three of the eight possible GS races. His biggest stage he raced on during the year came in the men's slalom at the FIS World Cup on Jan. 22 and 24 in Kitzbühel, Austria. There he did finish in the top 30 in either of the two slalom races (only the top 30 qualify for a second run). His NorAm Cup victory earned him start positions for the 2017-2018 FIS World Cup.

Club—Ketterer entered his collegiate career with 16.82 FIS points in the slalom and 17.60 in the giant slalom. He was a member of the German European Cup Team from 2012-16. In 2013 at the Junior World Championships, he finished fourth in the slalom. In January of 2016 he placed fourth in the slalom in a FIS Race at Hinterreit, Austria and he had a second place finish in the giant slalom in April of the same year at Aal Skisenter, Norway.

In the Classroom—Ketterer is majoring in physics at Colorado.

Personal—Ketterer was born on June 22, 1993 in Donaueschingen, Germany to parents Sabine and Hans-Peter Ketterer. He is the youngest of four boys in his family, and all are skiers. After he graduated from high school, he went into the Army and also skied for the German National Team for four years.

Career at Colorado—Has earned three All-America honors in his first two seasons on a very strong men's alpine team. He has finished all 28 of his races in his first two seasons, and is the only Buff over the last two years that can make that claim (men's or women's). He has 23 career top 10 finishes and has reached the podium eight times, six of which have come in giant slalom races.

2017 (Sophomore)—He garnered second-team All-America honors in both the slalom and giant slalom for his top 10 finishes at the NCAA Championships. He was also selected to the All-RMISA second-team. He finished in the top 10 in all seven of his giant slalom races and he had six top 10's in the slalom. Overall on the season, he reached the podium three times with his highest finish being second in the giant slalom alpine qualifier at the Big Sky Resort in his very first race of the season. He would earn RMISA Skier of the Week honors for his performance in the alpine qualifiers, as he placed fourth in the slalom qualifier that was held in Utah. That started a string of five-straight races where he finished fifth or better, as he had a good showing in the two Alaska meets. His top finish there was third in the GS in the Alaska-Anchorage Invitational. In the Seawolf Invitational, he placed fourth in the slalom, matching the slalom qualifier as his top finish in the event on the season. At the RMISA Championships, he placed fifth in the slalom and eighth in the GS. He capped off his second season as a Buff placing ninth in the giant slalom and eighth in the slalom at the 2017 NCAA Championships. Prior to the start of the collegiate season, he won the giant slalom in a FIS race held Dec. 1, 2016 at Copper Mountain. He also competed at the Alpine NorAm Cup held at Spruce Peak in Stowe, Vt. where he finished ninth in the slalom race on Jan. 4 and 17th in the giant slalom on Jan. 2. He was named to the 2017 USCSCA National Collegiate All-Academic Ski Team, which requires a cumulative 3.5 grade point average and competing at the NCAA Regional Championships. He was inducted into CU's 4.0 club for having a 4.0 grade point average for the fall semester.

2016 (Freshman)—He put together one of the better men's alpine performances in recent memory, finishing all 14 races on the season with 13 top 20s and 10 finishes in the top six. He had nine top five performances with five podium appearances and one race victory. His race victory earned him the individual RMISA Championship in the slalom race at Beaver Creek and he had a run of four straight podium appearances between the New Mexico Invitational and the RMISA Championships (three slalom, one giant slalom). 2017 (Freshman)—He competed in all 12 races through the RMISA Championships, finishing 11 of them. He had three finishes inside the top 15, with all three of them placing 13th in slalom races. At his first RMISA Championship, he finished 13th in the slalom. His two other 13th place finishes came during the alpine slalom qualifier and in the Utah Invitational. Career at Colorado—She became the 15th woman to sweep the cross country races at the NCAA Championships when she won the freestyle and classical national titles in 2017. In 28 career races, she has finished fifth or better in 20 of them with five victories. She has claimed five All-America honors in her career, three as a first-teamer and two second-team honors. She has competed at the U23 World Ski Championships in each of the past two seasons.

2017 (Junior)—She was named the 2017 National Skier of the Year for women's Nordic by both the USCSCA and FasterSkier.com. She became the 15th woman to sweep the Nordic races at the NCAA Championships and the fourth CU skier, joining Line Selnes (1998), current assistant coach Jana Rehema Weinberger (2006) and Maria Grevsgaard (2008). She won the 15K freestyle at the NCAA Championships by 21.1 seconds, becoming Colorado's seventh freestyle national champion. Her first NCAA title came two days earlier in New Hampshire when she won the 5K classic race by 18.7 seconds, becoming CU's first women's classical national champion since 2011 and the seventh overall in the event. She was the top seed from the west heading into the NCAA Championships after drawing first-team All-RMISA honors. After the conclusion of the season she was named the 2017 RMISA Skier of the Year for women's Nordic in a vote by the league coaches. Her wins at the NCAA Championships gave her two more first-team All-America honors to her resume. She was also named the CU Co-

Female Athlete of the Year with Dani Jones from track at the end-of-the-year CUSPY Awards. On the season, she finished fifth or better in all eight races she competed in and won five of them; she missed both Alaska meets due to a heel injury that was sustained when she competed at the 2017 FIS Nordic Junior and U23 World Ski Championships on the Czech Republic National Team, Jan. 31-Feb. 4. She was named the RMISA Skier of the Week for the Montana State Invitational after winning both the freestyle and classical races there. She opened the season with a win at the Utah Invitational in the 10K freestyle, which was her first race victory of her career.

2016 (Sophomore)—She continued her brilliant skiing in her sophomore campaign and finished all eight races in which she competed, bringing home top 20 finishes in all eight races with six top 10s and two podium finishes. Her best finish of the season was a runner-up performance at the NCAA Championships in the freestyle race and her other podium was in classic, placing third at Solder Hollow during the Utah Invitational. She earned first-team All-America honors for her freestyle performance at the NCAA Championships and was a second-team All-RMISA selection. She was the CU Athlete of the Week for her performance at the Montana State Invitational and was a finalist for the CUSPY Female Athlete of the Year award. She was a member of the National Collegiate All-Academic Ski Team for maintaining above a 3.5 cumulative grade point average and competing at the RMISA Championships/NCAA West Regional.

2015 (Freshman)—She competed in all 12 races, including at the NCAA Championships. She finished in the top 15 every time with 11 of those finishes

being in the top 10 and five appearances on the podium. At the CU Invitational, she came in second place in the 5k freestyle event. Her successful season led her to being second-team All-American and a RMISA Skier of the Week winner. She was a finalist for CU Female Freshman Athlete of the Year award.

Club—She skied for 10 years for TJ Dukla Liberec and has been skiing in FIS sanctioned races since 2010, eventually reaching the World Cup level prior to coming to CU in 2014. She first hit the podium in 2011 in an Austrian Juniors race, finishing second in a freestyle sprint race and then taking third in a 7.5K freestyle race. She participated in the Youth Olympic Winter Games in Innsbruck, Austria in 2012, taking 10th in the sprint freestyle final and 12th in the team mixed relay. The 2013 Junior World Ski Championships took place in her hometown of Liberec and she took 37th in the 5K freestyle, 38th in the classic sprint final, 44th in the 5/5K skiathlon and ninth in the 4x3.3K relay. She won a Juniors 1K sprint qualifier and took sixth in the final in Bruksvallarna, Sweden, in 2013, and a month later in St. Ulrich/Pillerseetal, Austria, she was the runner up in the 1.2K sprint final. She skied in the Slavic Cup in Nove Mesto na Morave, Czech Republic, winning a sprint qualifier and taking second in the final. Her World Cup debut also came at Nove Mesto where she was 45th in the sprint freestyle final and 23rd in the classic team sprint race. She earned two top 10s at the 2014 Junior World Championships in Via di Fiemme, Italy, taking ninth in the freestyle sprint final and eighth in the 4x3.3K relay. She traveled to Finland for another World Cup appearance in 2014 in Lahti, where she was 62nd in the freestyle sprint and 67th in the 10K freestyle race. She was seven times the champion of the Czech Republic and named the Athlete of the Year in 2012 for the North Bohemian region.

High School—She graduated from Gymnasium Jernymova Liberec in May of 2013. Aside from skiing, she won three Czech Republic championships in roller skiing.

In the Classroom—She is in the concurrent plan at Colorado for her integrative physiology studies where she will earn her bachelor's and master's degrees in five years. In the spring 2017 semester she and former teammate Lucy Newman conducted a research project exploring the relationship between metabolic cost and added weight on their poles relating to the double-pole technique in Nordic skiing. She will continue on with this research project in 2018 taking a look at the frequency of pole strokes and its effect on metabolic cost.

Personal—Petra Hyncicova was born May 1, 1994, in Liberec, Czech Republic, to Pavel Hyncica and Hana Hyncicova. She enjoys every type of sport, music, dance and traveling. Career at Colorado—Johnsen opened her career with two highly successful seasons for the Buffs, earning All-America honors as both a freshman and a sophomore. Now with 17 top 10 performances and four podium finishes under her belt, she will be a senior veteran on the 2018 women's Nordic team.

2017 (Junior)—She only competed in three meets on the season, as illness caused her to miss the two meets in Alaska and kept her from qualifying with enough points to compete at what would have been her third NCAA Championships. Career at Colorado—Just two seasons into her career and she already has 11 top 10 finishes, which includes one podium appearance at the NCAA Championships in 2017 in the 15K freestyle.

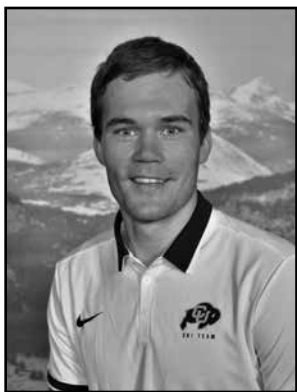

Career at Colorado—Now the lone senior on the men's Nordic team; he has finished 28 of the 30 races excluding the NCAA Championships over the past three seasons for the Buffs.

2017 (Junior)—He finished 8-of-9 races on the season in addition to competing in the mixed gender relay that was a part of the Seawolf Invitational. His top finish came in the first meet of the season in Utah, as he placed 14th in the classical sprint race at Soldier Hollow Resort. That was his only top 20 finish of the season and his best finish in any classic race in his career. Career at Colorado—He is already a four-time All-American in just his first two seasons at Colorado. In 22 career races, he has placed inside the top five 14 times with eight podium appearances.

2016 (Freshman)—He began his CU career with a bang, competing in 11 of the 12 races on the season and finishing in the top nine all 11 times. He had six top five finishes with three podium appearances. All three podiums were runner-up finishes in classic races at the Montana State Invitational, the New Mexico Invitational and the RMISA Championships. He earned two second-team All-America honors at the NCAA Championships held in Steamboat Springs, taking sixth in the freestyle and ninth in the classic race. CU IN THE NCAA'S

The NCAA first sponsored a men's national championship in skiing in 1954, though national title meets (National Intercollegiate Championships) were held as early as 1946, the same year CU's program began. Women's programs came into being in the late 1970s, with then CU head coach and eventual AD **Bill Marolt** at the forefront of making it a reality. CU has competed in each of the last 41 NCAA Championships and in 52 of 55 overall. One of those three occasions where CU didn't qualify (1964), several team members had competed in the Winter Olympics, and in 1967, CU sent only a few skiers to Maine for financial reasons. The old AIAW sponsored women's titles between 1977-82; in 1983, the NCAA absorbed the AIAW but combined the men's and women's competition, as was the case in rifle and fencing. Here's an in-depth look at the NCAA Championship history of the Buffaloes.

NCAA SCORING FORMAT & MISCELLANEOUS RECORDS

The latest scoring format was adopted in 2014, where a maximum 30 skiers can score for their teams. The weighted 40-point base still rewards the top eight skiers in the field with varying additional points over the skier behind them. Scoring is as follows: 40-37-34-31-29-27-25-23-22-21-20-19-18-17-16-15-14-13-12-11-10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1; the west has used this format the last three years, the east still uses the old 50-point format that allowed 39 skiers to score for their teams. Unlike from 1997-2009, no scores are thrown out for those teams that qualified a full 12-skier team or one shy with 11; so to tabulate the final standings, all scores have counted since 2010. Here's a day-by-day look at the NCAA Championships since 1991, also charting where the eventual winner was after each day (assorted scoring formats):

RMISA CHAMPIONSHIPS & HISTORY

The Rocky Mountain Intercollegiate Ski Association is the official association for college and university NCAA skiing teams in the Rocky Mountain region. It is comprised of 11 institutions, seven NCAA members and three associate members, from six states stretching from Alaska to New Mexico. Member schools in 2017-18 are Alaska Anchorage, Alaska Fairbanks, Colorado, Colorado Mesa University, Colorado Mountain College, Denver, Montana State, New Mexico, Utah, Westminster College and Wyoming.

Since the introduction of the NCAA Skiing National Championship in 1954, schools from the RMISA have captured 56 of the 64 team titles, or 87.3 percent, and 273 of the 383 individual champions are student-athletes from RMISA schools.

The outstanding skier each year is presented the Dick Schoenberger Memorial award. Schoenberger was a close friend and supporter of the Buff ski team for many years until his death in 1963. He hosted the ski team at his ranch, the C Lazy U near Winter Park, Colo., during the ski season.

The Buddy Werner Memorial Scholarship Award

The one name synonymous with competitive skiing in America is Buddy Werner, the gritty competitor from Steamboat Springs, Colo. Werner was America's first international skiing star who began his career at the University of Colorado in 1959. In 1961, he won the NCAA slalom and placed second in the downhill. Two years later, he reversed the order by claiming the downhill title and taking second in the slalom. Werner was a threetime all-American while at CU, was elected to the Skiing Hall of Fame and the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame. He was killed in an avalanche in St. Moritz, Switzerland, April 12, 1964. Werner established a standard for American skiers which still stands as an inspiration today. Because of the example Werner set for young athletes, a scholarship commemorating Buddy was established in 1973 to benefit a deserving team member.

COLORADO ALL-AMERICANS

The list of Colorado's all-time All-America skiers; research is sketchy prior to 1969, but coaches generally selected the teams themselves either at the NCAA Championships or shortly after the season was completed. One team, consisting of eight members, was selected until the mid-1960s, when both a first and second team was selected. When the NCAA merged men's skiing with the AIAW women's programs into one combined, coed sport in 1983, the formula became the first through fifth finishers earned first-team honors with the sixth through 10th performers earning second-team honors. Those members of winning relay teams also earned first-team recognition.
