Ivy Opener Goes National

The Dartmouth Big Green get to try their luck on television this Saturday when they host Penn in a nationally televised game on VERSUS at noon. Both Dartmouth and the Quakers have started the season 0-2, yet each has plenty of reasons for optimism.

Coming off a misleading 44-14 defeat at sixth-ranked New Hampshire, the Big Green are attempting to break a 14-game losing streak, the second longest in the country. Despite losing by 30 to the Wildcats, Dartmouth was in position to take a lead in the middle of the third quarter. Driving inside the UNH 15, a Green receiver had the ball stripped from his clutches, and the Wildcats pounced on the loose ball. New Hampshire converted the fumble into an 88-yard touchdown drive, then pulled away in the fourth quarter.

The Dartmouth offense was effective for most of the game, totaling 314 yards against the top-ranked defense in the FCS. And it was a balanced offense — 148 yards on the ground, 166 through the air. The last time the Big Green had amassed 100 yards on the ground was the final game of the 2007 season.

Most of the ground gains came via sophomore **Nick Schwieger**, who became the first Dartmouth rusher to go for 100 since Oct. 20, 2007, a span of 16 games. His 119 yards came on 26 carries, none of which lost yardage, for a 4.6-yard average. Running the ball against Penn has proven difficult for the Big Green in the recent past — only once have they run for 100 yards against the Quaker defense in the last 12 meetings, that coming in 2000 with 108 yards. Last year Dartmouth had just five yards in a 23-10 loss at Penn.

The passing game was solid as well with senior **Alex Jenny** throwing for 166 yards while completing 20 of his 29 attempts. Sophomore **Michael Reilly** and senior **Niles Murphy** each caught touchdown tosses to account for the Big Green scores. Emerging as a solid possession receiver was junior **Tanner Scott**, who caught a team-high six passes — four going for first downs — for 48 yards.

Turnovers were the Big Green's undoing as they gave the ball away five times, three times inside the red zone. Dartmouth knows it can't afford those mistakes, especially against highly regarded teams like UNH or Penn.

On the defensive side of the ball, senior strong safety **Tony Pastoors** has been busy, racking up 28 tackles in the first two games and placing him fourth nationally at 14 per game. Sophomore cornerback **Shawn Abuhoff** is one of six players in the FCS to average an interception a game, picking a pass off in each of the first two contests. Abuhoff doubles as the Big Green's top return man, ranking fourth in the nation in kickoff returns (32.4 yards per return) and 10th in punt returns (18.3 ypr).

Scouting the Quakers

Picked to finish second in the Ivy League in the preseason poll, Penn has had a frustrating start to the season with an 0-2 record having lost to second-ranked Villanova in a defensive struggle, 14-3, and in overtime at Lafayette, 20-17.

The Quakers are having a bit of an identity crisis at quarterback with Keiffer Garton and Kyle Olson splitting time last week. Garton is a dual threat with his arm and his legs, but reportedly is having arm troubles, throwing just three pass attempts at Lafayette. Kyle Olson stepped in to complete 14-of-28 for 151 yards and a pair of touchdowns to help Penn rally to tie the game, but the host Leopards converted a 28-yard field goal in the overtime period after the Quakers missed from 42 to salvage the game.

A freshman emerged at tailback for Penn last week, however, as Lyle Marsh was named the Ivy League Rookie of the Week for amassing 85 yards on 15 carries, all after the second half. Mike DiMaggio, who ran for 129 yards last year against the Big Green, is second on the team with 34 yards on the ground in the two games. But Marsh does not appear on the two-deep for Penn this week.

The receiving corps is led by Kyle Derham, a possession receiver with 11 catches for 81 yards. Matt Tuten has proven to be a good deep threat, averaging over 18 yards on each of his five receptions, while Brad Blackmon has hauled in six passes for 82 yards, including a touchdown.

Linebacker Jake Lewko spearheads one of the most revered defenses in the Ivy League with 23 tackles, three of which have gone for a loss. Safety Josh Powers and Zach Heller are tied for second in tackles with 16 stops. Penn has yielded less than 250 yards per game of offense thus far, and just 187 to Villanova.

Andrew Samson, the kicker who booted three field goals against Dartmouth last year, is just 2-for-5 on his three-pointers this year. All three of his attempts last week were from at least 40 yards, connecting on a 40-yarder. Handling most of the punting duties is Scott Lopano, averaging 37 yards per kick, but Olson twice punted in the fourth quarter near midfield against Lafayette, perhaps in hopes of running a fake.

Coaching the Quakers is the dean of the Ivy League, Al Bagnoli, now in his 18th season at Penn and 28th as a head coach. He has won more than twice as many as he has lost with the Quakers at 114-56 and last year won his 200th game in the season finale. The second-winningest active FCS coach has won six outright league titles, the most by any Ivy League coach ever. Bagnoli is a 1975 graduate of Central Connecticut State and got his start as a head coach at Union College, where he guided the Dutchmen to the Division III title game in 1983.

Penn Game Picked up by VERSUS

The game against Penn will be televised nationally by the VERSUS network. To accommodate the broadcast, the game will now kick off at noon instead of the original listed time of 1:30.

- This will mark the 16th consecutive year the Big Green have had at least one game on TV.
- Last year a school-record six of the 10 football games were broadcast on television.
- Overall, Dartmouth is 24-43-1 in 68 previous TV appearances and 14-22 at Memorial Field.
- Recent history has not been kind, however, as the Green have lost 10 of their last 11 televised games.
- Dartmouth and Penn have met six times on TV, and the Quakers have won each game.

Ivy Honor Roll

For the second straight week, two Dartmouth players were named to the Ivy Honor Roll. Sophomore **Nick Schwieger** rushed for 119 yards on 26 carries, making him just one of two players in the league to surpass the century mark on Saturday. Another sophomore, **Shawn Abuhoff**, recorded eight tackles, seven solo, and intercepted a pass from his cornerback position. He also had 112 return yards, including a 58-yard kickoff return to set up Dartmouth's first score.

Schweet Schwieger

By amassing 119 yards on the ground against New Hampshire, sophomore **Nick Schwieger** became the first Big Green runner to rush for 100 yards since Nate Servis '09 and current senior **Rob Mitchelson** both did it against Columbia on Oct. 20, 2007, a span of 16 games. Schwieger was very consistent all game, not once losing a single yard on any of his 26 carries while posting a long of 12 yards. Dartmouth had not had 100 rushing yards *as a team* since the final game of the 2007 season.

Jenny Passes 2,000 Yards

Senior **Alex Jenny** began the season 19th on the Dartmouth career passing list. After just one game, he jumped four spots to 15th, passing Bill King '63, Mike Fritz '07, Tom Bennewitz '08 and ... current head coach Buddy Teevens '79. Actually, Jenny passed all four of them in one fell swoop on his 57-yard touchdown pass to sophomore **Michael Reilly**, the longest completion of his career and longest by a Dartmouth quarterback since three 60-plus yard passes by Bennewitz against Cornell on Nov. 3, 2007. After throwing for 166 yards at UNH, Jenny now has 2,106 yards through the air and needs 122 more to advance on the charts again.

LAST MEETING

PENN 23, DARTMOUTH 10

October 4, 2008

The game looked like a classic defensive struggle in the first half with Dartmouth and Penn combined for 14 rushing yards in the first half as the two teams played to a 7-7 stalemate through 30 minutes. Each side took advantage of a fumble deep in enemy territory to set up its touchdown. In the second half, the Quakers' Mike DiMaggio found the holes to finish the day with 129 yards rushing (123 in the second half), and Penn QB Robert Irvin threw for 270 yards while the Big Green struggled to move the ball. Dartmouth did take a brief 10-7 lead on a Foley Schmidt field goal early in the third quarter, but Penn responded with a touchdown, and three field goals in the fourth quarter sealed the deal.

HEAD COACH



Buddy Teevens '79 is in his second stint at the helm of his alma mater, with his first tenure coming in 1987-91. In both 1990 and 1991, he led the Big Green to 7-2-1 marks, earning a share of the Ivy League title in '90 at 6-1, then winning the conference outright the following year at 6-0-1.

Teevens' record in nine-plus seasons at Dartmouth is 33-56-2 and 27-35-1 in the Ivy League.

A native of Pembroke, Mass., Teevens was a standout quarterback for the Big Green as he was named the Ivy League Player of the Year and honorable mention All-American while leading Dartmouth to the league title as a senior in 1978. He also lettered in hockey, helping the Big Green to a third-place finish at the 1979 NCAA championship.

Teevens began his coaching career right after graduating, working with the running backs at DePauw. In 1980, he became the offensive coordinator at Boston University, where he stayed until 1985 when he was appointed as the head coach at Maine. In his two years with the Black Bears, he posted the first consecutive winning seasons (6-5 in '85, 7-4 in '86) at Maine in 21 years.

After his first five years with Dartmouth, he served five years as Tulane's head coach, four of which came while the school was without a conference. He was instrumental in building the foundation that allowed the program to achieve perfection in 1998 with an 11-0 record.

Teevens spent two years as the offensive coordinator at Illinois before three bowl seasons with the Florida Gators in 1999-2001.

Prior to his return to Dartmouth, Teevens spent three years as the head coach at Stanford, helping to rebuild the program there.

Great Scott!

Junior **Tanner Scott** has come a long way since walking on to the football team during the spring of his freshman year. He saw his first varsity action in the first week, but made a name for himself at New Hampshire by leading the team with his first six career receptions for 48 yards. Four of those catches went for first downs.

Abuhoff Among Nation's Leaders

Sophomore cornerback/kick returner **Shawn Abuhoff** has been an electrifying performer in the first two games, intercepting a pass in each contest and bringing the crowd to its feet on his kickoff and punt returns. And the numbers bear this out as he is tied for first in the FCS in interceptions per game (1.0), fourth in kickoff returns (32.4 yards per return) and 10th in punt returns (18.3 ypr).

Turnover Trouble

In what was a mismatch on paper between Dartmouth and sixth-ranked New Hampshire turned into quite an interesting ball game despite the final score of 44-14. The Big Green had a terrific opportunity to take a one-point lead in the middle of the third quarter, but fumbled the ball away at the UNH 12. Dartmouth committed five turnovers in the game, its most since coughing the ball up five times against Cornell in 2007 — a game the Green won, 59-31.

UNH Series Goes on Hiatus

Dartmouth and New Hampshire have played every year this millenium, but after 10 straight years of Wildcat wins, the final two years of the contract have been suspended for four years. Sacred Heart will replace UNH on the schedule the next two years. With New Hampshire's 44-14 win on Sept. 26, the Wildcats now own an 18-17-2 lead in the all-time series. Dartmouth won the first 16 games, and UNH is 17-0-2 in the last 19. The last Big Green win in the series came in 1976 by a 24-13 final.

Mann '02 Returns to Dartmouth

Former Big Green quarterback Brian Mann '02 has been hired by head coach Buddy Teevens as the director of football operations. Mann will oversee all administrative functions of the football office and work closely with football alumni and others to coordinate activities of the Friends of Dartmouth Football. While a player, Mann set the Big Green single-season passing record with 2,913 yards in 2002, and is second in career yardage with 5,912, behind only former NFL quarterback Jay Fiedler '94.

Tackling Practice

No fewer than five Big Green defenders posted at least 10 tackles against Colgate, led by senior strong safety **Tony Pastoors** with a career-high 16, nearly matching his career total of 21 entering the game. The other four also set career highs in stops: sophomore **Royce Egeolu** with 13, sophomore **Diego Fernandez-Soto** with 12, junior **Charles Bay** with 11 and sophomore **J.B. Andreassi** with 10.

Defensive Extra Point

Rarely will a Big Green fan witness a defensive extra point in a Dartmouth football game, for either team. No Big Green opponent has ever returned an extra point attempted by Dartmouth for a two-point conversion at the other end of the field. And sophomore **Shawn Abuhoff** became just the second Big Green player to accomplish the feat with his 90-plus yard return of a blocked extra point, courtesy of sophomore **Eddie Smith**. The only other one in Dartmouth history was pulled off by Joe Perry '94 against Cornell in 1993.

Sack Attack

Both junior defensive end **Charles Bay** and sophomore defensive tackle **Mark Dwyer** registered their first career sack in the loss to Colgate on Sept. 19. Bay's came on the first possession of the game as he poked the ball out of the quarterback's hand causing a fumble. Last year the Big Green had just two games in which the defense recorded more than one sack, one of which came at Colgate as well.

Getting a Lead

Last year, Dartmouth held the lead for a grand total of 22 minutes and 26 seconds in the 10 games combined. Nearly two-thirds of that time with the lead (14:55) came in the opener against Colgate. And until the Green took a 15-13 advantage against the Raiders this year, they had not had a lead in nearly 380 minutes, or more than six full games. So far this year, Dartmouth has had a lead for 4:14.

McManus Record Chase on Hold

Last year, wide receiver **Tim McManus** became just the fifth Big Green receiver to snare 60 passes in a season while amassing 637 yards. That latter figure put him over 1,000 for his career in just two seasons at Dartmouth. His chase to become the fifth Big Green receiver with 2,000 yards in a career is currently on hold as he recovers from a fractured leg suffered just before preseason camp started.

Dartmouth Eighth in Preseason Poll

After an 0-10 season a year ago, it came as no surprise to head coach Buddy Teevens that his squad was tabbed to finish last in the Preseason Ivy League Media Poll. But Teevens has what he deems to be his most athletic and swift squad since his return to Hanover, breeding optimism throughout the program. How that athleticism and speed translates in the standings is all that is left to determine.

Changing of the Guard

There will be quite a few new faces on the field this year for the Big Green, particularly in the skilled offensive positions. More than 77 percent of the rushing yards graduated — mostly in the form of Milan Williams — and more than half of the receiving yards from last year will not be on the field this year. The defensive side is not much different in terms of returning numbers as 55 percent of the tackles, including five of the top seven tacklers on the team, have moved on. At least at quarterback Dartmouth has good experience in senior **Alex Jenny** and sophomore **Conner Kempe** who combined to throw all but six of the team's yards last year.

Co-Captains

This season Dartmouth has two captains in senior free safety **Peter Pidermann** and junior wide receiver **Tim McManus**.

Harvard Scrimmage

Although Dartmouth was beaten by the top-25 ranked Harvard Crimson in a preseason scrimmage, 44-17, Coach Teevens came away with some things to build upon, particularly a 100-yard rushing half by sophomore **Nick Schwieger**. Three receivers had at least 50 receiving yards, led by sophomore tight end **John Gallagher**, and quarterback **Alex Jenny** was just shy of 200 yards passing without an interception. On the other side of the ball, senior safety **Tony Pastoors** and sophomore linebacker **Royce Egeolu** led Dartmouth with seven tackles apiece, while Pastoors and freshman **Garrett Waggoner** each forced a fumble.

New Hampshire Native

Although Dartmouth resides in New Hampshire and is on the border of Vermont, the Big Green boast just one player on their roster from either state in the form of junior defensive tackle **Tyler Green**.

New Face Up Front

Coach Teevens has just one new full-time coach on staff this year in Keith Clark, a 17-year veteran of the Ivy League. The past 12 seasons Clark spent with Yale as the offensive line coach and offensive coordinator as he developed 11 linemen who earned first team All-Ivy honors. The Bulldogs also won two Ivy titles (1999 and 2006) during his tenure. Prior to his stint in New Haven, Clark coached five years at Columbia and was on staff when the Lions posted an 8-2 record and placed second in the Ivy League (behind Dartmouth) in 1996.

DARTMOUTH SUCCUMBS TO COLGATE IN SEASON OPENER, 34-15

HANOVER, N.H. — Tailback Jordan McCord carried the ball 44 times for 212 yards and two touchdowns as visiting Colgate defeated Dartmouth on Saturday afternoon, 34-15, in the season opener for the host Big Green at Memorial Field. The Raiders improved to 3-0 on the season by winning their 11th straight regular-season game, while Dartmouth dropped to 0-1 despite converting a rare defensive extra point.

Colgate's offense held on to the ball for nearly three-quarters of the game (44:30) thanks to 63 rushes for 292 yards. Quarterback Greg Sullivan, besides rushing for 51 yards and a pair of touchdowns on 10 carries, completed 12-of-19 passes for 172 yards and a touchdown. Preseason All-America receiver Pat Simonds was held to just three catches for 64 yards and a score. As a team, the Raiders racked up 464 yards on 82 plays.

The Dartmouth offense had just one drive of longer than six plays, that being of 11 plays coming late in the second quarter which led to a field goal. Of the Big Green's 11 possessions, seven ended in under one minute. The running game was held in check with just 26 rushing yards, with sophomore Nick Schwieger carrying the ball 14 of the 16 attempts for 38 yards.

Senior quarterback Alex Jenny, who had 343 yards passing against Colgate a year ago, was held to less than half that total at 147 yards on 11-of-28 passing with one touchdown, a 57-yard bomb to sophomore Michael Reilly in the first quarter. Reilly led all receivers with four catches and 87 yards, including his first career score.

"We had our opportunities to make some plays today," stated Dartmouth head coach Buddy Teevens, "but we missed too many assignments and that really cost us. We competed very well, but we cannot afford the mental mistakes if we want to beat a football team as good as Colgate."

Colgate got on the board first on a 12-yard touchdown pass from Sullivan to Simonds, capping a nine-play, 60-yard drive with 3:45 on the clock in the first quarter.

Jenny wasted no time in tying the score at seven on the first play from scrimmage after the ensuing kickoff with his strike to Reilly.

In the second quarter, Colgate methodically

marched 79 yards in 13 plays, culminating on a Sullivan 15-yard keeper. The extra point, however, was blocked by sophomore defensive tackle Eddie Smith. The ball was scooped up by sophomore Shawn Abuhoff, and he outran the Raiders to the opposite end of the field for a defensive two-point conversion, making the score 13-9 in favor of Colgate. It was just the second defensive extra point in Dartmouth history, the other coming against Cornell in 1993.

The Big Green tacked on three more points to close within one when their 63-yard drive stalled at the Raider four, leading to a 21-yard field goal by sophomore Foley Schmidt.

As time expired in the half, Colgate had an opportunity to get those three points back, but Evan Colborne's 30-yard field goal attempt went wide left to keep the score at 13-12.

Dartmouth took its only lead of the game at the outset of the second half. Abuhoff brought the kickoff back 42 yards to the Raider 28, and six plays later, Schmidt booted a 29-yard field goal for a 15-13 Big Green lead.

The lead was short-lived, however, as Colgate needed little more than four minutes to traverse the field. Sullivan pushed his way into the end zone from the one on 3rd-and-goal for the go-ahead touchdown, and Colborne added the extra point for a five-point advantage at 20-15.

After just one play from scrimmage, Dartmouth found itself in Raider territory, but safety Vinnie Nicosia got to Jenny on a blitz before he could throw the ball, forcing a fumble which was recovered by Lamont Sonds at the Raider 48. That led to another Colgate touchdown, this time on a seven-yard run by McCord, pushing the Raider lead to 12.

Abuhoff nearly made it a one-possession game early in the fourth quarter when he broke free on a punt return. But punter Evan Goldszak, the last man to beat, was able to get just enough of Abuhoff's foot to trip him up after a 39-yard return. The Colgate defense was able to keep Dartmouth in check and force a punt.

The Big Green gained just 10 yards over the last 19 minutes of the game, and McCord sealed the Colgate victory with a 12-yard burst into the end zone with 4:56 to play.

FIVE TURNOVERS SABOTAGE SOLID OFFENSIVE EFFORT AT #6 NEW HAMPSHIRE

DURHAM, N.H. — Big Green sophomore Nick Schwieger rushed for 119 yards as Dartmouth gained more than 300 yards of offense against the top-ranked defense in the FCS, but sixth-ranked New Hampshire (3-0) took advantage of five Big Green turnovers to defeat Dartmouth (0-2) at Cowell Stadium on Saturday afternoon, 44-14. The host Wildcats increased their unbeaten streak against the Big Green to 19 games, going 17-0-2 over the last 30 years and winning the last 12.

New Hampshire evenly distributed 528 yards of offense — 269 on the ground, 259 through the air — despite the loss of starting quarterback R.J. Toman late in the second quarter. While Toman was 9-of-13 passing for 154 yards while running for 58 more on six carries, Decker was just as effective going 9-of-14 for 76 yards and a touchdown, plus 56 yards rushing on three carries, one of which was a 33-yard touchdown scamper in the fourth quarter. Running back Chad Kackert, making his first appearance of the season, led the team with 12 rushes for 71 yards and two scores.

With his 119 yards on 26 carries, Schwieger became the first Dartmouth back to rush for 100 yards since both Nate Servis and senior Rob Mitchelson both topped the century mark against Columbia on Oct. 20, 2007, a span of 16 games.

Senior Alex Jenny was effective at quarterback, completing 20-of-29 passes for 166 yards and a pair of touchdowns. It was Jenny's fourth career game with at least 20 completions. His favorite receiver was junior Tanner Scott, who caught six passes for 48 yards, while sophomore Michael Reilly hauled in four receptions for a game-high 57 yards.

The New Hampshire offense proved to be difficult to stop in the opening quarter, scoring three touchdowns. After taking the opening kick, the Wildcats took nine plays to move the ball 70 yards to the end zone. Toman completed all three passes for 39 yards during the drive, and Kackert scored on a four-yard run.

Dartmouth answered right back as sophomore Shawn Abuhoff returned the ensuing kick 58 yards to the Wildcat 27. Three Schwieger runs got the ball down to the 10 before Jenny lofted a pass to Reilly, who won the jump ball in the end zone to tie the score at seven.

But the Wildcats quickly marched downfield once again. Kackert finished off a seven-play, 62-yard possession with a 15-yard jaunt around the left side for a touchdown.

The Big Green moved the ball well again, but the Wildcat defense stood Schwieger up at the UNH 14 and stripped the ball for a fumble. A 65-yard pass from Toman to Eric Mangieri was the big play for

New Hampshire, setting up a seven-yard touchdown run on a Toman keeper. The extra point attempt, however, was blocked by junior Matt Oh to keep the score at 20-7.

Despite facing the top defense in the country in terms of total yards, Dartmouth continued to move the ball downfield. Jenny completed all six of his passes during a drive early in the second quarter, the final one for 12 yards to senior Niles Murphy for his first career touchdown. Murphy made the catch despite being interfered with, tipping the ball when it arrived before corralling it for the score.

The Big Green had one more shot to put points on the board before the half expired, advancing to the UNH 36 with under a minute to play. But Jenny took a shot at the end zone and had his pass picked off by Dino Vasso, keeping the Dartmouth deficit at six at 20-14 going into the intermission.

New Hampshire kicked off to start the second half, recovering a fumble at the Dartmouth 22 for a golden opportunity of its own. But a staunch defensive effort by the Green kept the Wildcats from advancing and the 40-yard field goal attempt went wide left.

Jenny continued to guide the offense through the Wildcat defense, only to have New Hampshire strip the ball out of receiver Garrett Babb's hands at the UNH 12. The Wildcats were able to convert that turnover into a touchdown on the 13th play of the drive as Decker connected with J.T. Wright from 15 yards out on a 3rd-and-goal. New Hampshire converted the two-point play on a shovel pass to Sean Jellison, making it a 28-14 game.

Once again, Dartmouth took the ball into the red zone, this time stalling at the 13-yard line. The 30-yard field goal attempt by sophomore Foley Schmidt went wide right, however, and the Big Green never threatened again.

After Decker's 33-yard touchdown run, sophomore Connor Phillips blocked another PAT for the Big Green. Dartmouth went three-and-out, but Abuhoff came up with his second interception in as many weeks at the Dartmouth 27. Two plays later, Vasso returned the favor with his second pick of the day, taking it 34 yards to the house for a 41-14 UNH lead. A Tom Manning field goal with just over a minute to play completed New Hampshire's scoring in the game.

For the second straight week, senior safety Tony Pastoors led the Dartmouth defense in tackles, accumulating 12 stops this week. Juniors Pat Scorch and Matt Oh each had a pair of tackles for a loss, while sophomore J.B. Andreassi registered his first career sack.
