Could Be Lucky 13

A national audience, and fans taking advantage of the half-price tickets available for New Hampshire and Vermont residents, have the opportunity to witness something that hasn't happened in 13 years — a winning football season at Dartmouth. With a 5-3 record entering this game that will be televised in high-definition on VERSUS and broadcast on SIRIUS against Brown, a Big Green victory would guarantee that elusive winning campaign.

Dartmouth will have to overcome what could be categorized as stage fright, however, having lost its last nine games on television — including two this season — and 13 of its last 14 dating back to 2006.

Armed with the nation's fifth leading rusher in junior tailback **Nick Schwieger**, the Big Green have a great opportunity to put an end to both ignominious streaks. Schwieger averages nearly 135 yards a game on the ground and has reached the century mark in five of his seven games on the field. Last week he piled up 164 yards on 31 carries in a 28-10 win at Cornell with a couple of touchdowns. Schwieger is also gunning to become the fourth back in school history to run for 1,000 yards in one season; he has 942 entering the game.

Dartmouth will need quarterback **Conner Kempe** to snap out of a little funk of late, having completed less than 50 percent of his passes in four of the last five games. But the junior, who is one of seven Big Green QBs to throw for 3,000 yards in a career, has a variety of receiving weapons at his disposal in wide receivers **Tim McManus** (31 catches, 120 for his career), **Michael Reilly** (22 catches, 22.4 yards per catch) and **Tanner Scott** (17-219), as well as the ever-reliable tight end **John Gallagher** (14-111).

The defense is coming off its finest game of the season having sacked the Big Red quarterback a school-record 10 times, the third most by any FCS team this year. Senior end **Charles Bay** got to the QB three times himself and ranks eighth nationally in sacks per game, while junior tackle **Eddie Smith** and senior end **Buddy Benaderet** had a pair apiece.

Fans should pay attention when Brown kicks away to Dartmouth. Return man **Shawn Abuhoff** has taken two punts to the house this year, and the Bears allowed Yale to return two kickoffs for touchdowns just last week. Abuhoff is among the top 10 active leaders in the FCS in return average for both punt and kickoff returns.

The Big Green would like to avenge not only last year's overtime loss at Brown, but a loss to the Bears seven years ago when they last had a shot to post a winning record this late in the season. At 4-4, Dartmouth needed to win its last two games but was outscored by Brown in the fourth quarter, 20-7, to fall, 26-21. The Bears got the winning score on a 95-yard drive during the final two minutes of the game.

Scouting the Bears

Entering the season with the favorite for the Ivy League's Bushnell Cup behind center, Brown had the makings of a strong contender for the conference crown. After a convincing 29-14 victory over the league's pre-season favorite Harvard in the second game of the year, the Bears seemed to be in the driver's seat.

An overtime loss at Rhode Island the following week proved costly as quarterback Kyle Newhall-Caballero was knocked out of the game at the end of regulation with a season-ending injury. Without its playmaker directing the offense, Brown has had trouble putting away close games in the final minutes, all but eliminating the team from the race for the title as it enters today with a 3-2 mark in league play at 4-4 overall.

In place of Newhall-Caballero, Joe Springer has assumed much of the signal-calling duties. The senior from Minnesota has thrown for 1,147 yards while completing 58 percent of his passes with five touchdowns and four interceptions. But the Bears will also throw sophomore Patrick Donnelly into the mix, as he provides a bit more of a mobile option.

Brown is still very much a passing team with more than two-thirds of its total yards coming through the air. And there are plenty of receiving options available to the quarterbacks, led by wide receiver Alexander Tounkara who is second in the Ivy League with 50 receptions and 665 yards. Jimmy Saros has snared a total of 34 passes, while receivers Tellef Lundevall and Jonah Fay have 27 and 21, respectively. The Bears average nearly 250 yards a game via the pass, which ranks 23rd nationally.

The ground game isn't as imposing, but Mark Kachmer and Zachary Tronti make for a solid tandem at tailback. Kachmer leads Brown with 404 rushing yards on 99 carries, and Tronti has 331 yards on 91 rushes. The duo has all nine of the Bears' rushing scores.

The defense has been quite good, ranking among the top 30 in the country in both total defense (316.4 yards per game) and scoring defense (20.8 points). Inside linebacker Andrew Serrano and safety Stephen Peyton both rank among the top 10 in the league in tackles with 67 and 62, respectively, while defensive end Jeremy Raducha has been a disrupter

with nine tackles for a loss, including three sacks.

Alexander Noroceca has been one of the top kickers, not only in the league, but nationally as well with 12 field goals in 17 attempts. Five of those 12 three-pointers came in the win over Harvard, and his long for the year came from 45 yards out. And punter Nathan Lovett would rank second in the conference with a 42.4-yard average, but he does not have enough punts to qualify due to splitting time with Donnelly. On returns, watch out for Kachmer on kickoffs as he has brought two back to the house already this year. But the Bears also allowed Yale to take two kickoffs back for touchdowns last week.

Head coach Phil Estes, now in his 13th season guiding the program, is tied for the second winningest coach in Brown football history with a 76-51 record and finished among the top half of the league in 10 of his first 12 campaigns. He has three Ivy League crowns to his name, including the Bears' first ever outright title in 2005, and was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Award each year. In the first 42 years of the Ivy League prior to his arrival, Brown managed just one championship. An assistant at Brown for four years before being promoted to the top job, Estes began his collegiate coaching career at his alma mater, New Hampshire.

Television Trials

Over the last three seasons, Dartmouth has had nine of its games televised, most recently Harvard on Oct. 30, but has lost each one. The last Big Green win on TV came against Cornell in a wild 59-31 contest in 2007. Today's game, broadcast nationally on VERSUS in high-definition, is Dartmouth's last shot this year to break the streak. Overall, the Green are 24-46-1 in 71 televised games.

Road Warriors

With the 28-10 win at Cornell, Dartmouth has a 3-1 record on the road, its most victories away from Hanover since winning all five in 1997. Two weeks earlier, the Big Green posted their first Ivy victory on the road in four years with a 24-21 triumph at Columbia, ending a 13-game road skid. Dartmouth has as many road wins this year as it had over the past seven seasons combined.

Sack-alicious

- The Dartmouth defense put on quite a show at Cornell, sacking the Big Red quarterback a school-record 10 times, a total surpassed by just two FCS teams this year (Sam Houston State, 12; Northern Iowa, 11).
- The defensive line had nine of the 10 sacks, led by senior end **Charles Bay** with three with junior tackle **Eddie Smith** and senior end **Buddy Benaderet** each providing two, and junior tackles **Mark Dwyer** and **Royce Egeolu** one apiece.
- The lone sack by a non-lineman came from senior linebacker **Luke Hussey**.
- The previous high for sacks was nine, accomplished against Holy Cross in 1992 and again versus Princeton in 1996.
- The Big Green are 17-2 when registering at least six sacks in a game.

HEAD COACH



Buddy Teevens '79 is in his second stint at the helm of his alma mater, with his first tenure coming in 1987-91. In both 1990 and 1991, he led the Big Green to 7-2-1 marks, earning a share of the Ivy League title in '90 at 6-1, then winning the conference outright the following year at 6-0-1.

A native of Pembroke, Mass., Teevens was a standout quarterback for the Big Green as he was named the Ivy League Player of the Year and honorable mention All-American while leading Dartmouth to the league title as a senior in 1978. He also lettered in hockey, helping the Big Green to a third-place finish at the 1979 NCAA championship.

Teevens began his coaching career right after graduating, working with the running backs at DePauw. In 1980, he became the offensive coordinator at Boston University, where he stayed until 1985 when he was appointed as the head coach at Maine. In his two years with the Black Bears, he posted the first consecutive winning seasons (6-5 in '85, 7-4 in '86) at Maine in 21 years.

After his first five years with Dartmouth, he served five years as Tulane's head coach, four of which came while the school was without a conference. He was instrumental in building the foundation that allowed the program to achieve perfection in 1998 with an 11-0 record.

Teevens spent two years as the offensive coordinator at Illinois before three bowl seasons with the Florida Gators in 1999-2001.

Prior to his return to Dartmouth, Teevens spent three years as the head coach at Stanford, helping to rebuild the program there.

mouth has trailed at halftime, but has not been outscored during the second half even once. Twice the Green have tied the score after the intermission, only to lose in the final moments. But whenever they have taken the lead, they have won. In the first 10 seasons of Coach Teevens' two tenures, Dartmouth had managed to win a game it trailed at the half six times. It certainly helps to outscore the opposition 134-44 in the second half as the Big Green have thus far.

Road Warrior

The season has been a tale of two sites for quarterback **Conner Kempe** — home and away. In four road games, Kempe has excelled, completing 60.4 percent of his passes (67-of-111) for 810 yards and eight touchdowns against just two interceptions. But in the four home games, Kempe has hit on just 47.2 percent (50-of-106) of his throws for 634 yards with seven interceptions and nary a touchdown. But before this season, his numbers were better at home. Be wary of small sample sizes!

Going the Extra 100 Yards

Junior tailback **Nick Schwieger** has posted at least 100 yards rushing in five of his seven games this year, including 164 at Cornell with two touchdowns. Four times in his career he has had at least that many yards in a game, second only to Al Rosier who did it five times in his career. Entering the Brown game, Schwieger is sitting at 942 yards for the season and will likely become Dartmouth's first 1,000-yard rusher since Al Rosier '91 19 years ago and just fourth ever. Coincidentally or not, all four 1,000-yard rushers played for Buddy Teevens.

Topping 220 ...

Since 1975, Dartmouth has run for at least 220 yards a total of 63 times, including the 222 yards gained at Cornell on Nov. 6. The Big Green have fared quite well in those games, winning 57 of the contests against just six defeats. Probably a good target for the team.

... and Holding to 75

On the defensive side, the magic number for rushing yards is 75. When Dartmouth holds the opposition to less than 75 yards on the ground, the Big Green has a record of 48-5 since 1975. Cornell managed just 24 rushing yards on Nov. 6, the fewest for an opponent since the Big Red had just 16 in 2004. Oddly enough, that game is one of the five losses.

Time for a New Block Party

The streak of games with at least one blocked kick ended at Columbia as the Lions were able to get off seven punts and three PATs without a Big Green defender batting it away. Dartmouth still has six blocks, a mark surpassed only by South Carolina State with eight. The FCS record for blocks in one season is 13, held by the 1999 Davidson Wildcats.

Make a Run for It

Since 1975, Dartmouth has attempted at least 47 rushes in a game a total of 123 times, most recently against Cornell with 49. Of those 123 games, the Big Green have won 104 of them against just 16 losses and three ties for a winning percentage of .858.

Kempe Surpasses 3,000 ...

Entering the 2010 season, junior quarterback **Conner Kempe** was 20th on the career passing list at Dartmouth, one spot behind current head coach **Buddy Teevens**. Against Sacred Heart, he reached the 2,000-yard milestone, the 16th player in school history to attain that mark. And with his 242 yards through the air versus Harvard, Kempe became the seventh quarterback to reach 3,000. Entering today's game, he has 3,130 for his career.

... While Reilly Goes Over 1K

Facing a 4th-and-17 with little more than three minutes to play against Harvard, Dartmouth had no choice but to go for it. In stepped junior **Michael Reilly**, who stretched as far as he could to pull in a 24-yard reception and keep the slim hopes of the Big Green alive. His catch boosted him above 1,000 receiving yards in his career, making him the 17th Dartmouth player to do so, joining senior **Tim McManus** on the active roster in the exclusive club.

Crowded House

For the seventh straight year, Harvard beat the Big Green with a 30-14 victory on Oct. 30, spoiling homecoming and sent the Dartmouth crowd of 9,142 home unhappy. It was the largest crowd at Memorial Field since the renovations to the East stands in 2006, and the largest overall since Dartmouth beat Yale, 22-19, on Oct. 17, 1998 as 12,017 people witnessed the win.

Abuhoff Special of the Week

Junior **Shawn Abuhoff** was chosen as the Ivy's Special Teams Player of the Week on Nov. 1 after providing the fourth-longest punt return in Dartmouth history against Harvard — 82 yards for a touchdown. Not only is the return specialist and cornerback second all-time at Dartmouth in return yards for kickoffs and punts (1,630), he also has the third-highest kick return average (26.4 yards) and ninth-highest punt return average (10.24) among active FCS players.

Sackless Streak Stopped

In the season opener, Bucknell sacked **Conner Kempe** late in the second quarter for a two-yard loss. It took more than six full games (24 quarters) for a Big Green opponent to register another sack as Harvard got to the junior QB in the third quarter. The Crimson had three more sacks in the game, and after an intentional grounding penalty at Cornell (which counts as a sack), Dartmouth is eighth in the country in fewest sacks allowed per game (0.75).

Schweiet Schwieger

Junior **Nick Schwieger** has been the most prolific runner in the Ivy League to date, despite missing one of the first eight games. His 134.6 yards per game on the ground easily outdistance the next Ivy runner (and rank fifth nationally). Schwieger has 169.1 all-purpose yards per game as well, which also is first in the league and 10th in the country.

Close Calls

Dartmouth had a five-game streak of outcomes decided by single digits, win or lose, end with the 30-14 loss to Harvard. It was the longest such streak for the Big Green since the 2002 season when Dartmouth finished the year with seven straight (and nine of 10 for the season). This was the sixth time in the program's history that it has played five or more consecutive games decided by nine or fewer points (1919, '33, '55, '77, 2002, '10).

Cross-ed Off the List

Dartmouth had lost six straight games to Holy Cross before defeating the Crusaders on Oct. 16, 27-19, to even the all-time series at 35-35-4. The victory gave the Big Green a perfect record against its non-conference opponents for the first time since the 1996 team knocked off Lehigh, Fordham and Holy Cross in a perfect 10-0 campaign.

Scharing the Schpotlight

The Ivy League recognized a pair of Big Green players for their performances in the 27-19 victory over Holy Cross. Junior tailback **Nick Schwieger** took home the Offensive Player of the Week award for the second time this year and third in his career by running for 169 yards and a touchdown on a career-high 31 carries, not to mention his three receptions and two kickoff returns. In addition, junior placekicker **Foley Schmidt** was named the Special Teams Player of the Week as he not only converted all three PATs, but also provided two field goals in the fourth quarter that gave Dartmouth a one-point lead that it would not relinquish.

Tasty Turnovers

Before the second half of the win over Holy Cross, Dartmouth had recovered just five turnovers over 18 quarters of football. The floodgates opened after the intermission, however, as the Big Green more than doubled that total by forcing six turnovers, including four interceptions. The third pick was returned by senior **Pat Scorah** for a touchdown, the first points of his career, during the final minute of play. Junior **Shawn Abuhoff** recorded his ninth career reception, just four shy of the school record, while freshman **A.J. Dettorre** came up with his first. But perhaps the most surprising turnover came on a Crusader kick return when senior kicker **Donald Kephart** jarred the ball loose, which was recovered by junior **Tyler Melancon**. The last time an opponent turned the ball over as many times was Cornell three years ago when the Big Red coughed it up seven times in a 59-31 Dartmouth win.

Freshman Foibles

Several freshmen performed key roles against Holy Cross, with linebacker **Bronson Green** leading the team with 11 tackles. Cornerback **A.J. Dettorre** stepped up for two injured players and recorded his first interception and broke up three other passes. On offense, **Dominick Pierre** continued to effectively spell tailback **Nick Schwieger**, carrying the ball six times for 24 yards, plus had an eight-yard touchdown reception which was called back due to a penalty. On special teams, punter **Daniel Barstein** averaged 32.0 yards on his punts and placed one inside the 20.

Milestone Memo

Both junior tailback **Nick Schwieger** and senior wide receiver **Tim McManus** achieved career milestones in the game against Yale on Oct. 9. Schwieger became the 24th Dartmouth player to rush for 1,000 yards, and currently has a total of 1,649 — 10th all-time at the college — after posting his seventh career 100-yard game against Cornell. McManus, meanwhile, had four receptions on the afternoon, the second of which was the 100th of his career, a figure attained by only eight other Big Green players.

Bulldog Burden

The last-second field goal for Yale sent the visiting Bulldogs to their eighth straight victory over Dartmouth, equaling their longest winning streak against the Big Green that was originally accomplished during the 19th century. But Dartmouth still owns the longest winning streak in the series — nine games from 1990-98.

Waggoner Cruising Guide

Well, this isn't about the Northwest boating "bible," rather the exploits of sophomore free safety Garrett Waggoner. The sophomore recorded his second career double-digit tackle game when he made a team-high 10 stops against Yale on Oct. 9, but it was his block on a PAT attempt that nearly made the difference in the game. Waggoner made 10 more stops against Harvard and leads the team with 49 tackles this season.

Overtime for Ivy Opener

Playing at the reigning Ivy champion to begin its conference slate, Dartmouth went toe-to-toe with the Penn Quakers on Oct. 2, playing to a 28-28 stalemate at the end of regulation. Unfortunately, Penn escaped with the win over the Big Green by a touchdown, handing Dartmouth a loss for the fourth time in its last five overtime contests. Overall, the Big Green are 4-5 in nine games that have required more than 60 minutes, with seven of those nine taking place in the last five seasons.

Trio of Touchdowns

At Penn, junior quarterback **Conner Kempe** connected on three touchdown passes for the second time this year. He had never thrown more than two in any game entering this season and now has 17 for his career. Two of the scoring strikes went to junior tight end **John Gallagher**, giving him three on the season and four for his career.

Tanner Scott also earned a prestigious honor when the National Football Foundation listed him as one of 121 semifinalists across all NCAA divisions for the William V. Campbell Trophy, commonly referred to as the Heisman for scholar-athletes. Scott boasts a 3.83 GPA as an economics major.

Pickin' Like Curtis Loew

Curtis Loew may be the finest picker to ever play the blues (for you Southern rock fans), but his pickin' has nothing on sophomore **Chase Womack** or senior **Luke Hussey**. Trailing 28-14 at Penn in the third quarter, Womack turned the tide by ripping a pass away for his first career interception, leading to a Dartmouth touchdown. And in the fourth quarter with the score tied at 28, Hussey stepped in front of a receiver to record his first career pick as well, thwarting the Quakers in Big Green territory.

Going Back-to-Back

Prior to victories over Bucknell and Sacred Heart to start the season, it had been seven years since Dartmouth had posted consecutive victories. During the 2003 campaign, the Big Green won four straight games against Holy Cross, Columbia, Harvard and Cornell. Last year the Green came close when they beat Cornell in double-overtime, then lost the following week at Brown in overtime.

Another Week, Another Tailback

After junior Nick Schwieger galloped for 216 rushing yards in the season opener, he found himself in the school infirmary the day of the Sacred Heart game with flu-like symptoms. Up stepped freshman **Dominick Pierre**, who carried the ball 25 times for 110 yards and a pair of touchdowns in the 21-19 victory. The newbie was named the Ivy League's Co-Rookie of the Week for his performance, the 10th Dartmouth player to earn the honor since the start of the 2007 season.

First-Time Foe Follies

Dartmouth had never played Sacred Heart on the gridiron prior to the game on Sept. 25. One has to go back 23 years to find the last time the Big Green lined up against an opponent it previously had never done so. In 1987, Dartmouth welcomed Davidson College to campus and trounced the Wildcats, 38-7, in what turned out to be the first of just two games between the two schools. Before that, Bucknell was the last new foe to grace the schedule — in 1963. Fans won't have to wait so long to play against another new opponent with Butler on the schedule in 2012.

Votes in the FCS Poll

For the second time this year — but first times in 13 years — the Dartmouth Big Green received votes in The Sports Network/Fathead.com FCS poll. Dartmouth received a 25th-place vote for one point in the poll released on Oct. 11 and three points two weeks earlier. The poll was instituted during the 1996 season, and the Big Green finished that year ranked 19th after posting a perfect 10-0 record. The following season, Dartmouth won its first five games and finished at 8-2, earning votes throughout the year. The Green's appearance on Sept. 28 among those receiving votes was the first sight of the team in the poll since 1997.

Schwieger Shines at Bucknell

- Junior **Nick Schwieger** galloped his way to 216 yards rushing against the Bison in the season opener, the sixth most ever by a Big Green runner.
- He also caught five passes for 57 yards, giving him 273 all-purpose yards, which ranks third all-time behind Tom Spangenberg '64 (353) and Al Rosier '91 (274).
- With his 216 rushing yards, Schwieger became just the second player in Dartmouth history to top 200 in a game twice in a career. His other 200-yard game came last year against Columbia when he set a then-school-record with 242 on the ground. David Clark '90 accomplished the feat during the 1989 season, collecting 219 against Penn and 202 versus Brown.
- For his performance, Schwieger was named the Ivy League Co-Offensive Player of the Week and the Gridiron Club of Boston Gold Helmet Award winner, both for the second time in his career.

Road Rage

The 43-20 win at Bucknell gave Dartmouth its first road victory since beating Columbia in New York in 2006, 20-7. Between the two victories were 17 losses away from Memorial Field, the longest road drought in school history. The 43 points were also the most for the Green on the road since defeating Columbia in 1995, 43-27, and the most in any game since a 59-31 blasting of Cornell in 2007. The last time Dartmouth scored more than 43 on the road came in a 51-28 triumph at Brown in 1992.

Punting Paucity

The Dartmouth punt unit got the day off at Bucknell with nary a kick against the Bison. It marked just the third time the Big Green had not attempted a punt in a game over the past 35 seasons, winning each of the other two games scoring at least 43 points as well. Brown fell to Dartmouth in 1991, 45-13, and Columbia was whitewashed in 1980, 48-0.

Defense Dials It Up

In the first half at Bucknell, the Bison were able to make some big plays to build their 20-9 lead at the intermission, gaining 296 yards during the first 30 minutes. The holes closed in the second half, however, as the Dartmouth defense clamped down and yielded just 71 yards the rest of the way to keep Bucknell from scoring any more points.

Opening Day

Historically, the Big Green has been quite successful in the first action of the year. Overall they have an 84-42-3 record which includes a 49-game winning streak from 1895 to 1943. During the streak, Dartmouth outscored its opposition by a total of 1,562-52 with 39 shutouts. The Green also won 13 straight from 1960-72. Over the last 27 seasons, however, Dartmouth is just 6-21 on opening day. The Big Green are 3-8 in season openers under Coach Teevens.

Opinions Vary on Dartmouth's Fate

Despite returning perhaps the most experienced squad in the Ivy League, Dartmouth was picked to finish seventh in the conference's preseason media poll. The Big Green return 19 starters and a boatload of experience at every position, but it wasn't enough for the pundits to believe Dartmouth would improve upon its 2-5 tie for sixth place in 2009.

Other outlets, however, find more reason to be optimistic about the 2010 Big Green campaign. The Sports Network pegged Dartmouth for fourth place, citing the experience factor as well as numerous offensive weapons at Coach Teevens' disposal.

Steeler Country in Hanover

The one player on the Dartmouth roster from Pennsylvania happens to be a part of perhaps the most famous football family in that state, junior QB **Dan Rooney**, whose great-grandfather Art founded the Pittsburgh Steelers. His grandfather Dan is the chairman of the Steelers while his father Art is the president.

Experience Rules

Nearly all of the statistics produced from last season are back on the gridiron for the Big Green this fall. Dartmouth gained 1078 yards on the ground last year, of which 897 are still on the roster (83.2 percent). The receivers, meanwhile, amassed 1849 yards, all but 82 (95.6 percent) are back. And if you include the 637 yards McManus had in 2008, it means Dartmouth has 30 percent more receiving yards at its disposal than last year.

The stats aren't limited to simply the offense. The returning players had 629 of the 741 tackles in 2009, or 84.8 percent, while all nine sacks and seven of the eight interceptions are accounted for on the current roster. Then there are the special teams — all field goals and PATs, every punt and 54 of the 64 kick returns (84.4 percent) are still here.

California Dreaming

Once again, Dartmouth has more players from the state of California than anywhere else with 15 hailing from that state. The football talent hotbed of Florida has 10, but Illinois now ranks second with 12 members from the Land of Lincoln. Ten players on the roster are from Massachusetts, but only two from Dartmouth's native state of New Hampshire — senior DL **Tyler Green** and freshman OL **Brett Kana**.

Related or Not?

On the Dartmouth roster are seven pairs of players with the same last name, but only two of those pairs are flesh and blood. Offensive linemen Alex and Zach Wodka are brothers and playing their third season together in the Green uniforms. The other

duo is Brad and Luke Dornak, who are cousins. Brad is a junior receiver, while Luke is a freshman tight end and continues the recent Dornak legacy; running back Matthew Dornak '10 graduated this past spring after four years in Hanover.

New Members of the Staff

There are a few new faces coaching the Big Green this year, most notably offensive coordinator Jim Pry and defensive coordinator Don Dobes. Pry is a veteran college coach with 33 years on the sidelines, most recently as a receivers coach at the University of Illinois. Among his others stops along the way were Akron, Duke, East Stroudsburg, Buffalo, VMI, West Liberty State as well as his alma mater, Marshall.

Dobes is quite familiar with the Ivy League having come over from Princeton, where he was stationed for the past 16 years. The Tigers won two Ivy titles during his tenure — 1995 and 2006. A 1979 graduate of Illinois Wesleyan, Dobes began his college coaching career at Penn for five years before working at Rice, Temple and Rowan.

Dartmouth also welcomes former Big Green defensive lineman Derham Cato '05 onto the staff, as well as Clinton Cosgrove, a 2006 grad of Arizona State. Cato will be coaching the tight ends, while Cosgrove will work with the nickelbacks.

SCHWIEGER RUNS FOR 216 YARDS AS DARTMOUTH ENDS LONG ROAD LOSING STREAK AT BUCKNELL

LEWISBURG, Pa. — Junior Nick Schwieger bolted his way to 216 yards on the ground and a pair of touchdowns as Dartmouth dominated the second half at Bucknell to defeat the host Bison on Saturday afternoon at Christy Mathewson-Memorial Stadium, 43-20. Trailing 20-9 at the intermission, the Big Green (1-0) scored 34 unanswered points in the second half to win their season opener for the first time in five years and snap a 17-game road losing streak that dated back to 2006. Bucknell (0-3) dropped its home opener and third straight game to start the season.

Schwieger carried the ball 25 times in posting the sixth-most yards in a game in Dartmouth history, but shy of his career high of 242 yards set last year against Columbia. His longest run of the day was a 56-yard burst up the middle on a perfectly executed draw play to give Dartmouth its first lead of the day at 23-20 late in the third quarter. In addition, Schwieger led the team with five receptions for 57 yards, giving him 273 all-purpose yards for the day. The Dartmouth offense as a unit racked up 481 yards and 28 first downs.

Junior quarterback Conner Kempe enjoyed a fine day as well for the Big Green, completing 17-of-23 passes for 211 yards while connecting on a career-high three touchdowns. His longest toss came on the final play of the third quarter when he hit junior Michael Reilly in the end zone from 41 yards out. Two of Reilly's three receptions went for scores, both coming in the third quarter as Dartmouth scored 20 points in the period.

The second half also belonged to the Dartmouth defense, which after yielding 296 yards in the first half, held the Bison to a paltry 71 yards after half-time. For the first time in 19 years (and third time in the last 35 years), the Big Green did not attempt to punt even once while turning the ball over only one time.

Dartmouth, trailing by 11 points, received the kick to start the second half, but a holding penalty on the return forced the Green to start on their own 12. Another penalty pushed Dartmouth back to its seven before Schwieger sprinted through the defense for 30 yards to get the offense rolling. It took the Big Green 12 plays to traverse the 88 yards on the drive, culminating with a 16-yard score from Kempe to Reilly, pulling the team within four points at 20-16.

Bucknell moved the ball 34 yards on its next drive, but Drew Orth's 43-yard field goal attempt fell short of the uprights. Three Big Green plays later, Schwieger shot through the middle on the draw play to put Dartmouth ahead on his 56-yard run.

The Dartmouth defense held the Bison to a three-and-out, and senior Steve Morris blocked the punt, which rolled forward just 12 yards. On the very next play, Kempe launched his bomb to Reilly, who shed the defender and made the catch on his back in the end zone. The extra point attempt was blocked for the second time in the game by Bucknell, leaving the Big Green with a nine-point edge to start the final quarter.

Once again, Dartmouth held the Bison without a first down, which led to a methodical 11-play, 83-yard touchdown drive which Schwieger finished off with an 11-yard score right up the middle. Junior cornerback Shawn Abuhoff then put the finishing touch on the game with a 56-yard interception return for a touchdown, becoming the first Big Green player to return a pick for a score since Nov. 22, 2008.

Bucknell looked to be in command during most of the first half, driving down to the Big Green 19 on the game's opening drive before Abuhoff tipped a pass at the line on 3rd-and-2. The snap on the 36-yard field goal attempt was low, but the holder was able to get it down just in time, allowing Orth to sneak it through the uprights for a 3-0 lead.

The Big Green moved the ball quickly on their first drive as well with Schwieger carrying much of the load. But after advancing to the Bucknell 30, Derrick Palmer picked off a Kempe pass to thwart the drive. The first play after the interception was a 40-yard completion from Brandon Wesley to Victor Walker, and seven plays later, Wesley connected with Travis Friend from two yards out to put Bucknell up by 10.

Early in the second quarter, Dartmouth lined up for a 35-yard field goal attempt, but junior Foley Schmidt pulled the kick wide to the right. The Bison were held short of a first down on the ensuing drive at their own 29-yard line, but perfectly executed a fake punt for a 51-yard scamper by Beau Traber to the Dartmouth 20. The Bison ended up settling for a 23-yard field goal as the Green held up inside the 10.

Dartmouth scored its first points of the year after going down 13 points, starting with a Abuhoff 42-yard kick return to the Bison 35. An 11-yard run by Schwieger, 15-yard pass interference call and two more yards from Schwieger set up the nine-yard touchdown toss from Kempe to junior tight end John Gallagher, who stretched over the goal line for the score. The point after, however, was blocked by Josh Eden, leaving the score at 13-6.

The response to the Big Green touchdown was swift as Wesley found a wide-open Walker downfield for a 58-yard gain to the Dartmouth six. Wesley took a hit on the next play, but not until after he lofted a pass into the back left corner of the end zone to tight end Terna Ityokumbul. Orth added the extra point, making it 20-6 with just over six minutes left in the half.

The Big Green offense was able to move the ball once again, driving down to the Bucknell 12. But an eight-yard loss on a rush and a two-yard sack pushed Dartmouth back to the 22. Schmidt sculled the field goal attempt, but got just enough on it to scrape the crossbar and get through for the three points just 1:01 before the end of the half.

Sophomore linebacker Garrett Wymore led the defense with seven tackles, while juniors Eddie Smith and Tyler Melancon each had a sack.

LAST-MINUTE SACRED HEART FIELD GOAL GOES WIDE AS GREEN STARTS 2-0 FOR FIRST TIME IN 13 YEARS

HANOVER, N.H. — With junior tailback Nick Schwieger — who ran for 216 yards in the season opener last week — laid up in bed with flu-like symptoms, freshman Dominick Pierre filled in more than capably with 110 yards on the ground and a pair of touchdowns in just his second collegiate game as Dartmouth defeated Sacred Heart in the Big Green's home opener on Saturday afternoon at Memorial Field, 21-19. The Pioneers (1-3) had a 38-yard field goal attempt in the final minute go wide to the left before Dartmouth ran out the clock to secure its first 2-0 start since 1997.

Pierre took the ball 25 times for a 4.4-yard average on the day, plus caught two passes for 12 more yards. Meanwhile, junior quarterback Conner Kempe became the 16th passer in Dartmouth history to surpass 2,000 yards through the air by completing 16-of-30 passes for 154 yards, giving him 2,051 in his career. Senior tri-captain Tim McManus led the team with four catches for 60 yards, including a key fourth-down catch in the second quarter to set up the Big Green's second touchdown of the afternoon to give them the lead for good.

For the second straight week, Dartmouth had to overcome a halftime deficit as Sacred Heart took a five-point lead into the locker room, 12-7. But after receiving the opening kick of the second half, the Big Green marched right down the field in just nine plays covering 72 yards. A 15-yard unsportsmanlike conduct penalty helped, but it was the 4th-and-6 pass to a diving McManus down the middle of the field to the one-yard line that made the one-yard Kempe keeper possible for a 14-12 lead.

Sacred Heart got a rebound effort from its record-setting quarterback, Dale Fink, who owns 11 Pioneer passing records, as he completed 30-of-41 for 286 yards and a touchdown against the Big Green. Last week, Fink managed just 72 yards and was picked off four times. Freshman Gregory Ibe led the Pioneers rushing attack with 71 yards on just nine carries, while Mark Uyeno caught six passes for 68 yards.

The Dartmouth defense immediately held the Pioneers without a first down with the big play being a 14-yard sack courtesy of junior Connor Phillips and sophomore John Golio. On each of the Big Green's 10 plays during the next drive, they gained at least three yards as they methodically moved the ball downfield. Kempe was 4-for-4 for 36 yards during the drive, while Pierre and fellow freshman Dan Henggeler ran for 40 more with Pierre having the honor of taking the ball into the end zone on a seven-yard romp. Junior Foley Schmidt made it a 21-12 contest with his third PAT of the game.

Again Sacred Heart could not get anything going offensively with another three-and-out as they ran just six plays total during the third quarter. Dartmouth could not capitalize, however, despite advancing into Pioneer territory due to the only turnover of the game, an Ethan Ostermeyer interception at the 19-yard line on the second play of the fourth quarter.

That pick turned the tide a bit as the Sacred Heart offense started to find its stride. Penalties proved to be the Pioneers' undoing at first as another flag for unsportsmanlike conduct was thrown on SHU before a 4th-and-4 play at the Big Green 27. Sacred Heart settled for a perfectly placed 42-yard pooch punt inside the one.

Dartmouth got one first down but was forced to punt — a 53-yarder from freshman Daniel Barstein — only to have the Pioneers quickly gobble up the 71 yards which was capped by a four-yard pass from Dale Fink to Rich Rossi. The point after by Jesper Fredriksson made it a two-point game at 21-19.

Sacred Heart got one more shot to win the game, taking over with 3:29 to play at its own 44. The drive stalled at the Big Green 21, and the Pioneers sent Fredriksson in to try the 38-yard field goal with less than 50 seconds on the clock. Kicking from the left hash mark, his boot went wide to the left, and three kneeldowns later, Dartmouth had its victory.

Fredriksson started the game with a pair of field goals in the first quarter, from 25 and 33 yards as Sacred Heart dominated the opening period by running 27 plays to just three for the Big Green. In the second quarter, the two teams traded touchdowns with Pierre finishing off a 14-play drive with a three-yard run, and Marcel Archer diving in from a yard out with 12 seconds before the end of the half for the Pioneers. But while Schmidt drilled his extra point, Fredriksson had his blocked and nearly returned for a defensive PAT by the tandem of senior Luke Hussey and sophomore Chase Womack. Sacred Heart finally tripped up Womack, who took a lateral from Hussey, at the Pioneer 30. That missed PAT proved important as SHU could have gone for a two-point try on its final touchdown in the fourth quarter to tie the score.

Senior Pat Scoriah led three Big Green players in double-figure tackles with 13 stops, while Hussey had 12 and junior Joey Casey 10, all career highs. Sophomore Mick Davis and junior Tyler Melancon each had a solo sack, while Golio and junior Connor Phillips teamed up for another.

ANOTHER SECOND-HALF COMEBACK, BUT IT GOES FOR NAUGHT IN OVERTIME LOSS AT PENN

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. — Dartmouth recovered from a 14-point, second-half deficit to tie the game at 28, only to fall to the defending Ivy League champs, Penn, in overtime on Saturday afternoon, 35-28. The Quakers (2-1, 1-0 Ivy) amassed 427 yards of offense to defeat the Big Green for the 12th time in the last 13 meetings, while Dartmouth (2-1, 0-1 Ivy) lost its fourth overtime contest in its last five dating back to the 2007 season.

Junior quarterback Conner Kempe matched a season and career high by tossing three touchdown passes while completing 17-of-32 for 239 yards. More than half of those yards (134) went to junior Michael Reilly, who snared five throws including the game-tying score near the end of the fourth quarter. Junior tight end John Gallagher hauled in a pair of passes in the end zone as well.

The Penn offense, meanwhile, was based on a strong running game that averaged 5.1 yards per carry and timely passing with Billy Ragone running for 57 yards and three touchdowns. He also connected on 15-of-24 passes for 132 yards and another score to go along with two interceptions. Halfback Jeff Jack led the Quakers' ground game with 95 yards on 17 carries, while Colavita covered 62 yards and reached the end zone once on just nine rushes.

The coin toss for overtime was won by Dartmouth, which elected to play defense first. Penn faced a 3rd-and-8 right off the bat, but Ragone completed his most important pass of the day to David Wurst, who made a diving grab at the one. Two plays later, Ragone pushed just far enough to get over the goal line, and Andrew Samson booted the PAT for a 35-28 lead.

The Big Green went for the end zone on their first play with a fade pattern to Reilly, but the pass was off the mark. After junior Nick Schwieger ran for seven yards, Kempe lofted another pass to the other side of the field to senior Tanner Scott, but it also fell to the ground. On 4th-and-4, Kempe had his throw tipped at the line, causing it to come up short of its target and allowing heavily favored Penn to escape with the win.

Trailing 21-14 at the onset of the second half, Dartmouth tried to set the tone as junior Donald Kephart booted the kickoff through the end zone. But Penn asserted itself by covering the 80 yards in 14 plays while gobbling up half of the quarter. Three of the Big Green's six penalties in the game came during the drive, including a costly and controversial personal foul call. Ragone converted a 3rd-and-2 at the Dartmouth three-yard line with a pass to fullback Luke DeLuca for a touchdown to give the Quakers their largest lead of the game at 28-14.

Momentum favored the host Quakers as the Big Green went three-and-out, but that momentum quickly shifted when sophomore cornerback Chase Womack picked off a Ragone pass and returned it to the Penn 20. Dartmouth nearly settled for a field goal, but Reilly — serving as the holder — got up and ran with the ball instead for a first down at the four-yard line. On the next play, Kempe found Gallagher in the back of the end zone to close the gap to seven points.

After Penn failed to get a first down, the Big Green took over at their own 25. A pass interference call against the Quakers gave Dartmouth one first down, but the big play was a 53-yard bomb — all in the air — to Reilly to the Penn nine. A holding penalty negated a Schwieger sweep around the left side for a touchdown, but two plays later Kempe hooked up with Reilly again from 10 yards out for the score. Junior Foley Schmidt provided the point after to knot the score at 28 with 20 seconds left in the third quarter.

The Quakers had their chances in the fourth quarter, only to be stymied. Ragone was intercepted again at the Dartmouth 28 on one drive, and Samson had a 26-yard field goal attempt blocked by junior Connor Phillips with 4:24 left in regulation. The Green had an opportunity to drive for the possible winning score, and even pulled off a 4th-and-1 at their own 25 to sustain the drive. Then on the cusp of being in field goal range, a false start pushed them back to the Penn 39. Facing a 4th-and-7 with 33 seconds to play, Dartmouth decided to take its chances in overtime as freshman punter Daniel Barstein pinned the Quakers at their own two.

For the third straight week, Dartmouth's opponent put points on the board on its first possession. The Big Green got the ball first but could not produce a first down, then Penn quickly marched 76 yards with Ragone scampering the final 14 yards for the touchdown and a 7-0 lead.

Dartmouth did not wait long to answer the challenge as junior Shawn Abuhoff got things started with a kickoff return to midfield. Kempe guided the Green offense to the end zone in seven plays, culminating with a one-yard plunge by Schwieger. The big play, however, was a 36-yard diving catch by Reilly to the Quaker two on third down. The point after sailed through the upright to tie the game at seven.

The Quakers continued to prove problematic for the Dartmouth defense, traversing 68 yards in 11 plays. It appeared the Green might get the stop they needed inside the 10-yard line on third down, but Ragone — with no receiver open in sight — scrambled for the final six yards and dove for the pylon to score his second touchdown of the day with 1:16 remaining in the first quarter.

Again Dartmouth had a response, tying the game at 14 early in the second quarter on a 12-yard scoring strike from Kempe to Gallagher in the corner of the end zone. The drive was kept alive by senior Tim McManus who caught a 4th-and-12 pass across the middle to get the Green into the red zone.

Colavita capped off a 65-yard Quaker drive with a four-yard burst through the right side into the end zone, giving Penn a 21-14 lead which it took into the locker room.

The Dartmouth rushing game, which averaged over 200 yards in the first two Big Green games, was held to 79 yards by the Penn defense. Schwieger accounted for 72 of those yards, extending the Quakers' streak of not allowing a 100-yard rusher to 26 straight contests.

YALE CONTINUES STREAK AGAINST DARTMOUTH WITH FIELD GOAL ON FINAL PLAY OF THE GAME

HANOVER, N.H. — Yale had attempted six field goals this season with nary a one finding its way through the uprights, yet Philippe Panico managed to convert a 19-yard field goal that caromed off the right upright as time expired to send the Bulldogs (3-1, 2-0 Ivy) home with a 23-20 victory over host Dartmouth (2-2, 0-2 Ivy) at Memorial Field on Saturday afternoon. The loss spoiled some individual milestone accomplishments for a pair of Big Green players and gave the Bulldogs their eighth straight win over Dartmouth.

Senior wide receiver Tim McManus became the ninth Big Green receiver to haul in 100 career passes with his second of four receptions on the day, totaling 34 yards. On the ground, junior tailback Nick Schwieger became the 24th player in Dartmouth history to amass 1,000 rushing yards as he racked up 128 yards on 26 carries for his fourth career 100-yard game. But it was a Schwieger fumble — just the second of his career — near midfield on a screen pass with barely over a minute to play that set up Yale's winning kick.

With the game tied at 20, Yale attempted to take the lead with just over two-and-a-half minutes to play with a 43-yard field goal attempt. The kick was well short of the target, giving the Green an opportunity to drive for the winning score.

Schwieger took the handoff on the first three plays, gaining 10 yards for a first down, then caught a well-executed screen pass. On his way up the left sideline, he had already gained 11 yards when Yale's Chris Stanley cleanly stripped the ball from Schwieger's grasp to give the Bulldogs the ball at the Dartmouth 47.

After one first down, Yale quarterback Patrick Witt was under pressure but managed to find Jordan Forney for a 28-yard gain down to the Big Green seven. Mordecai Cargill nearly carried the ball into the end zone with his rush on the next play, but was stopped a yard-and-a-half short of the goal line. Three of the Bulldogs' previous six field goal tries had been blocked this season, and Dartmouth had already blocked a PAT in the game. But Panico managed to sneak the kick through for the game-winner.

Dartmouth had tied the game at 20 earlier in the fourth quarter when holding penalties backed Yale up to its own 7-yard line for a 4th-and-23. The punt was a low end-over-end kick that junior Shawn Abuhoff plucked out of the sky at the Bulldog 41, and he weaved his way through traffic and sprinted to the end zone for the first unblocked punt return for a touchdown in 15 years for the Big Green.

Dartmouth trailed at the half, 13-10, before tying the game on a 45-yard field goal by junior Foley Schmidt, the longest of his career and fourth in six tries from at least 40 yards out. But the Big Green shanked the ensuing kickoff out of bounds, giving the Bulldogs the ball with great field position at their own 40. Yale needed just eight plays to drive the 60 yards, the last seven coming on a run by third-string halfback Javi Sosa for his first career touchdown.

For the fourth straight week, Dartmouth's opponent scored on its first possession of the game as Yale jumped out to a 7-0 lead to start the game on Alex Thomas' 13-yard run, capping a 13-play, 70-yard drive.

Dartmouth junior quarterback Conner Kempe dropped a long strike downfield to junior Michael Reilly for a 44-yard gain late in the first quarter, and the Big Green capitalized with a Schmidt 37-yard field goal that just snuck over the crossbar, making it a 7-3 game.

Early in the second quarter, Dartmouth took a 10-7 lead. Reilly caught another long pass, this time for 25 yards to the Yale six, and Schwieger took care of the remainder of the 24 yards on the ground during the drive, including the six-yard run around the left side for the touchdown.

But the Bulldogs took the lead back with barely a minute until the intermission, covering 80 yards. Witt completed 8-of-9 passes during the drive, accounting for 63 of those yards, including the last three to fullback Shane Bannon. Panico's extra-point attempt was batted down by sophomore Garrett Waggoner — the eighth game in the last nine that Dartmouth has blocked a kick — and Abuhoff scooped the ball up in hopes of getting two points. He only got as far as midfield before his lateral attempt was ruled an illegal forward pass.

Yale finished the game with 437 total yards, 238 through the air as Witt completed 28-of-37 with one touchdown and one interception by Abuhoff. Cargill ran for 126 yards on just 18 carries, a 7.0 average, to lead the Bulldogs on the ground.

Kempe was just 11-of-23 on the day for 181 yards as Dartmouth had 316 total yards. Reilly had 124 of those yards on just four catches, his second straight 100-yard game.

Yale controlled the ball most of the afternoon with nearly a 12-minute possession advantage and had 24 first downs to just 12 for Dartmouth.

Dartmouth plays against at Memorial Field next Saturday, hosting Holy Cross (3-3) at 1:30 p.m. Yale begins a three-game homestand next week, beginning with Fordham at noon

FOURTH-QUARTER COMEBACK FUELED BY SIX HOLY CROSS TURNOVERS

HANOVER, N.H. — After committing four turnovers in the game, Dartmouth forced visiting Holy Cross into six miscues in the second half — four in the fourth quarter — to pull out a thrilling 27-19 victory on Saturday at Memorial Field. Junior Foley Schmidt booted two fourth-quarter field goals and junior tailback Nick Schwieger ran for 169 yards as Dartmouth (3-2) ended a personal six-game skid against the Crusaders. Holy Cross (3-4) fell below .500 despite amassing 398 yards while running a whopping 92 plays on the afternoon.

Schwieger had 36 touches in the game, gaining his 169 yards on the ground on 31 carries while catching three passes and returning a pair of kick-offs. Dartmouth needed the workhorse on offense as junior quarterback Conner Kempe struggled on this windy day, completing just eight passes in 20 attempts for 57 yards with a pair of interceptions.

Ryan Taggart led the Holy Cross offense completing 25-of-39 passes for 220 yards and a pair of touchdowns, but threw four interceptions as well. Sam Auffant was the Crusaders' leading rusher with 71 yards on 22 carries, and Luke Chmielinski caught seven passes for 57 yards.

The Big Green entered the fourth quarter trailing, 19-14, after Rob Dornfried knocked a 20-yard chip shot through the uprights for his second field goal of the day. Schwieger and freshman Dominick Pierre combined to run for 44 yards on 10 rushes during the next possession, with Schwieger gaining 11 yards on two separate carries, advancing the Big Green inside the Holy Cross 10. An eight-yard pass to Pierre out of the backfield appeared to put Dartmouth on top, yet a holding penalty negated the play. Schmidt came on for the 35-yard field goal to cut the deficit to two.

On the ensuing kickoff, Big Green kicker Donald Kephart — who is also a shot putter for the track and field team — smashed into the returner to force a fumble, which Dartmouth recovered at the Crusader 30. A pair of Schwieger runs moved the ball 13 yards, but the drive stalled out. Schmidt lined up for a 32-yard field goal this time and gave the Green a 20-19 lead with 8:36 to play.

Holy Cross started to move the ball, gaining one first down before facing a 3rd-and-2. Quarterback Ryan Taggart connected with tailback Sam Auffant, but junior cornerback Shawn Abuhoff jarred the ball loose with senior linebacker Luke Hussey pouncing on it for another Crusader turnover. Although the Big Green couldn't capitalize with another score, freshman Daniel Barstein pinned Holy Cross inside the 10 with a 39-yard punt. Holy Cross registered a pair of first downs before freshman A.J. Dettorre broke up a fourth-down pass, giving Dartmouth the ball with just 1:40 to play.

The game seemed well in hand, but the Crusaders still had three timeouts and used every one as their defense held the Big Green without a first down. The punt bounded into the end zone, so Holy Cross still had hope at its own 20 and 1:21 on the clock. Taggart completed a 14-yard pass on 4th-and-10, but was picked off on the very next play by senior strong safety Pat Scoria. He didn't stop until

he traveled 43 yards for a touchdown. The Big Green were whistled for a holding penalty on the return, but Holy Cross had to decline it in order to get the ball back for one last chance to tie. But after Holy Cross botched the kickoff to start at its own two, junior Anthony Diblasi came up with Dartmouth's fourth interception to leave no doubt to the outcome.

Holy Cross began the game as each of Dartmouth first four opponents had — scoring points on its first possession. The Crusaders marched 75 yards in 13 plays as Taggart completed 6-of-7 passes on the drive, including an eight-yard strike to Freddie Santana to put six points on the board. Dornfried provided the PAT for an early 7-0 Holy Cross lead.

Abuhoff returned the kickoff to near midfield, setting up a touchdown drive for the Big Green. Schwieger got the hand-off on the first play from scrimmage and went 24 yards, then accounted for 20 more before reaching the end zone on a four-yard burst. The extra point by Schmidt tied the game at seven.

Turnovers became a problem for Dartmouth after getting a defensive stop. With Holy Cross kicking into a stiff wind, the Big Green tried to field the punt but could not corral the ball. Ricky Otis came up with it, giving the Crusaders possession in Dartmouth territory. Holy Cross stalled out at the Big Green 13, but Dornfried knocked a 30-yard field goal into the wind for a 10-7 advantage.

Kempe was picked off just before the end of the first quarter, but the errant throw did not lead to any Crusader points. But when Kempe fumbled the snap on the next drive at the Big Green 36, Holy Cross did not let the opportunity pass by again as Taggart hooked up with Gerald Mistretta on an eight-yard touchdown. Dartmouth senior Charles Bay came up with what turned out to be a huge play as blocking the extra-point attempt, giving the Big Green at least one blocked kick in each of their five games this year and in nine of their last 10 dating back to last season.

Dartmouth put together a 14-play, 80-yard drive spanning more than six minutes to reach the end zone again. But it didn't come easy as Holy Cross nearly completed a goal-line stand after the Green had 1st-and-goal at the two. It took all four plays to get the touchdown as Kempe stretched the ball across the goal line after an initial stop.

Holy Cross then ran 17 plays but came away empty as the Big Green came up with an impressive goal-line stand of their own, turning the Crusaders away three times at the one-yard line.

Dartmouth turned the ball over for the fourth time on the first possession of the second half on Kempe's second interception. But the turnover trend changed in the Big Green's favor as Abuhoff and Dettorre each recorded interceptions on the next two Crusader possessions.

Freshman linebacker Bronson Green led the Green defense with a season-high 11 tackles, while junior linebacker Tyler Melancon had 10 more stops with a fumble recovery. Both Bay and junior Connor Phillips had sacks for Dartmouth as well.

DARTMOUTH OVECOMES LATE FUMBLES TO SPOIL HOMECOMING FOR COLUMBIA

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Junior quarterback Conner Kempe led Dartmouth on a 14-play touchdown drive late in the game to help the Big Green overcome three fourth-quarter fumbles and defeat Columbia, 24-21, spoiling the Lions' homecoming. Junior tailback Nick Schwieger provided the go-ahead score on a one-yard run with 2:28 to play, giving Dartmouth (4-2, 1-2 Ivy) its first road win in conference play in four years and sending Columbia (3-3, 1-2 Ivy) to its second straight loss.

Kempe enjoyed a fine day behind center, completing 24-of-37 passes for 235 yards and a touchdown, and completed four passes during the game-winning drive for 35 yards. Three receivers — senior Tim McManus, junior tight end John Gallagher and Schwieger — each caught five passes with McManus leading the way with 66 yards. The Big Green passing game was balanced by Schwieger on the ground with his 124 yards on a career-high 32 carries as Dartmouth piled up 402 yards of offense.

Dartmouth seemed to be in command of the game as the fourth quarter began with 17-7 lead and driving into Lion territory for another score. But Lion defender Josh Smith hit Kempe as he pitched the ball back to freshman tailback Dominick Pierre, causing the ball to bound downfield where Columbia's Josh Martin fell on it at the Lion 30. Columbia needed just seven plays to traverse the 70 yards with the big play a 30-yard, third-down pass from Sean Brackett to Kurt Williams. Brackett ran four yards for the touchdown, and Luke Eddy's extra point brought the Lions within three.

On the ensuing kickoff, senior T.J. Cameron took a vicious hit from Ryan Murphy, jarring the ball loose, and Nick Mistretta pounced on it at the Dartmouth 25. Three plays later, however, Dartmouth returned the favor when senior Charles Bay got to Brackett in the backfield and knocked the ball out his hand, allowing junior Eddie Smith to recover for the Big Green.

The fumble-itis continued on the very next play when Schwieger lost the handle during a run, and again Martin was there to cover it up. The Lions did not let this opportunity pass them by when Brackett threw a two-yard strike to Nathan Lenz in the end zone, putting Columbia up by four at 21-17.

But Dartmouth was not to be denied on this day. Starting at the Big Green 31, Kempe completed a 3rd-and-10 pass to senior Tanner Scott for 16 yards, and Schwieger followed up with a 12-yard run to move past midfield. Then facing another 3rd-and-10, Kempe threw to Schwieger for a nine-yard gain. Pierre provided the first down with a three-yard gain, then galloped for 15 more to the Columbia 14. Another third-down play arose, and Kempe hit junior Michael Reilly across the middle

under intense pressure for a 1st-and-goal at the two. Two plays later, Schwieger found himself in the end zone.

As has been the case in each of Dartmouth's six games this year, the Big Green trailed at the half, this time by a 7-3 count. Dartmouth failed to get a first down to start the second stanza, but freshman Daniel Barstein drilled a 61-yard punt with a favorable roll to the Columbia one. This led to a three-and-out for the Lions, and the Big Green took over at midfield following a punt. First-down passes to McManus and Scott helped Dartmouth get down inside the 10 before facing a 4th-and-goal from the one. Dartmouth head coach Buddy Teevens elected to go for it, and Schwieger tunneled his way into the end zone for the touchdown and a 10-7 lead.

After another abbreviated Columbia possession, Kempe went right back to work maneuvering the offense downfield. McManus helped out with a phenomenal one-hand grab on a pass thrown behind him for a 14-yard gain. A 10-yard run by Schwieger and another 16-yard gain by Kempe put the Big Green on the three-yard line before an illegal shift penalty pushed them back five yards. It did not matter, though, as Kempe found sophomore tight end Mitch Aprahamian — although throwing to Gallagher — in the end zone for his first catch of the season and third of his career.

Columbia put points on the board on its first drive of the game. The Lions ran 11 of their 13 plays on the ground, gaining 52 of their 80 yards. Nick Gerst finished off the possession with a three-yard sweep around the left side and into the end zone, and Eddy provided the PAT for an early 7-0 Columbia lead.

The Big Green came right back, beginning with a 27-yard kick return by junior Shawn Abuhoff to the Dartmouth 43. A 17-yard screen pass to Schwieger moved the Green into Lion territory, and Dartmouth also converted a 4th-and-2 in the red zone. But the Columbia defense held and made the Big Green settle for a 28-yard field goal by junior Foley Schmidt.

The Dartmouth defense sacked Brackett four times in the game, while Columbia failed to get to Kempe even once. The Big Green have allowed just one sack all season and none since the first half of the season opener.

Brackett finished the game 17-of-31 for 188 yards, plus led the Lions with 47 rushing yards on 20 carries.

Dartmouth returns home next weekend for its homecoming game against the preseason favorite, Harvard (4-2, 2-1). The game will be televised regionally by NESN at 1:30 p.m. Columbia travels to Yale (4-2, 2-1) next Saturday for a game at noon.

LARGE HOMECOMING CROWD CAN'T LIFT DARTMOUTH OUT OF EARLY HOLE AGAINST HARVARD

HANOVER, N.H. — Harvard scored on each of its first four possessions to build a 24-0 lead, then held off host Dartmouth, 30-14, to spoil the Big Green homecoming game and disappoint the largest crowd at Memorial Field (9,142) in 12 years. Collier Winters ran for two touchdowns and threw for another as the Crimson (5-2, 3-1 Ivy) defeated Dartmouth (4-3, 1-3 Ivy) for the seventh consecutive year.

Big Green junior Conner Kempe threw for a season-high 242 yards and became just the seventh quarterback in school history to surpass 3,000 yards, reaching the milestone with his last completion of the game. But he completed just 15-of-33 tosses on the afternoon, was sacked four times and intercepted thrice, which the Crimson were able to convert into 10 points. Entering the game, Kempe had been sacked just once all season and had avoided going down behind the line for 24 consecutive quarters.

Harvard utilized a balanced attack all day with 233 yards on the ground and another 247 through the air for the most yards (480) for a Dartmouth opponent this season, 323 of which came in the opening 30 minutes. Winters connected on 19-of-31 passes for 212 yards with a 10-yard touchdown to Adam Chrissis, who led the Crimson with seven catches for 86 yards. On the ground, Treavor Scales ran for 124 yards on 18 carries and Gino Gordon 93 yards on 17 rushes, though the latter missed the entire second half with an injury.

The Ivy League's leading rusher, Big Green junior Nick Schwieger, was held to 69 yards on 16 carries before departing in the third quarter with an injury as well. As a team, Dartmouth managed to run for 112 yards and totaled 354 yards of offense, but only 95 in the decisive first half.

The Crimson put together two lengthy touchdown drives in the first quarter to jump out to a 14-0 lead. After taking the opening kickoff, Harvard marched 78 yards over 14 plays, and after the Dartmouth defense stuffed a 1st-and-goal run at the one, Winters snuck through on the next play for the touchdown. The Crimson started their next drive at their own 13 and originally was stopped at the 29 on a third-down play. But an offside penalty against the Green kept the drive alive, and Harvard took advantage by stringing together 17 plays to traverse 87 yards, the last five on a Winters sweep around the right side.

In the second quarter, Harvard continued

pounding the ball down the field, advancing to the Dartmouth 26 before stalling and settling for a career-long 43-yard field goal by David Mothander.

Dartmouth strung together three first downs when trailing 17-0, but on 3rd-and-8 at the Crimson 39, Kempe was picked off by Joshua Boyd who took the ball 45 yards down to the Big Green 26. Harvard needed just five plays to reach the end zone with the 10-yard pass to Chrissis finishing the short drive.

With less than three minutes until half-time, Harvard was forced to punt for the first time. Junior Shawn Abuhoff took advantage of the opportunity and electrified the crowd with an 82-yard return — the fourth longest in Dartmouth history — to put the Green on the board.

But with 2:22 still on the clock, the Crimson drove into the red zone and got another field goal, this time from 27 yards out, to give them a 20-point lead at the half at 27-7.

Kempe was intercepted on his first pass of the second half, but the Dartmouth defense was able to hold off Harvard. But when Bobby Schneider recorded the third Crimson interception, Harvard was able to tack on three more with a 35-yard Mothander field goal.

Dartmouth missed on a 40-yard field goal just before the end of the third quarter after Schwieger went down, but his back-up, freshman Dominick Pierre, provided a five-yard touchdown run early in the fourth quarter to cap an eight-play, 70-yard drive and make the score 30-14.

The last hope for the Big Green came on what turned out to be their final drive of the day. Needing a touchdown and a two-point conversion, Dartmouth covered 74 yards — including 24 on a terrific catch by junior Michael Reilly on a 4th-and-17 play — down to the Crimson seven before turning the ball over on downs with 2:51 to play. With no timeouts left, Dartmouth could not stop Harvard from running out the clock.

One of the biggest factors in Harvard winning the game was third-down conversions. The Crimson faced a third down play 17 times and were able to come up with a first down 10 times, while Dartmouth was just 1-for-9 on third-down plays.

Dartmouth takes to the road next week for a game at Cornell (2-5, 1-3 Ivy) on Saturday at 12:30 p.m. Harvard returns home to host Columbia (3-4, 1-3 Ivy) at noon.

DARTMOUTH RUNS AWAY FROM CORNELL WITH LATE 28-10 VICTORY

ITHACA, N.Y. — Junior tailback Nick Schwieger ran for 164 yards and two touchdowns while the Dartmouth defense registered 10 sacks — just two shy of the Dartmouth record set in 1973 — as the Big Green defeated host Cornell on Saturday afternoon at Schoellkopf Field, 28-10. The victory for Dartmouth (5-3, 2-3 Ivy) was its first in Ithaca since 1996, having lost the last six games at Cornell, while the Big Red dropped to 2-6 overall and 1-4 in the Ivy League.

The Dartmouth defense held Cornell to just 188 total yards for the game, the first time a Big Green opponent had less than 200 since Columbia almost exactly 13 years ago. In the second half, Dartmouth really put the clamps on, yielding just 44 yards. Big Red rushers managed just 24 rushing yards, partly due to losing 54 yards on the 10 sacks. Six different Big Green defenders had at least one sack, led by senior Charles Bay with a career-high three with both senior Buddy Benaderet and junior Eddie Smith posting two.

Schwieger enjoyed his fifth 100-yard game of the season and seventh of his career, boosting his league-leading total to 942. As a team, Dartmouth amassed 222 yards on the ground, half of which came in the fourth quarter when the Big Green put the game away with touchdown runs by Schwieger and freshman Dominick Pierre.

Cornell won the toss and elected to receive, likely due to the fact that the Big Green had not kept an opponent from scoring on its first drive of the game all season. But the defense came through with a stop, allowing the Dartmouth offense to take over at its own 40. Seven plays later, senior Tim McManus shed a defender in the end zone and snared a Kempe pass for a seven-yard score, giving the Green their first lead in the opening quarter this year.

On Cornell's next possession, quarterback Jeff Mathews strung together four consecutive first-down passes down to the Dartmouth 20 before getting drilled by Bay. The sack jarred the ball loose and senior defensive tackle Eddie Smith pounced on it.

Offense became scarce for both sides as the two teams combined for one first down over the next seven possessions. But when Drew Alston dropped a punt that pinned Dartmouth at its own two, Cornell cornerback Emani Fenton came through with his league-leading fifth interception two plays later at the 12. Wide receiver Luke Tasker then took a handoff after a fake reverse and carried the ball for the 12-yard touchdown. The extra point tied the game at seven with 9:34 left in the half.

Dartmouth still could not get on track offensively, finishing the half with just 97 total yards, 60 of which came on the opening drive. Less than a minute before the intermission, the Big Red managed to find themselves just close enough to attempt a 49-yard field goal, which Brad Greenway snuck through the uprights and just over the crossbar for a 10-7 lead.

Junior Shawn Abuhoff set the tone for the Big Green to start the second half, returning the kickoff 50 yards to the Cornell 32. Schwieger was given the ball three straight times, gaining a first down with the first two, then galloping 18 yards for the go-ahead score barely a minute into the third quarter.

The remainder of the quarter brought about punt after punt as Cornell managed to gain just 19 yards and one first down. At the start of the fourth quarter, the Big Red picked up a first down thanks to an offside penalty, then immediately threw an interception to Dartmouth cornerback Chase Womack deep downfield.

The Big Green finally got some breathing room on the scoreboard after Abuhoff returned a punt 15 yards to the Cornell 44. After junior quarterback Conner Kempe threw his longest pass of the day — 29 yards — to senior Tanner Scott, freshman Dominick Pierre scored on an 11-yard burst through the right side.

Schwieger was still shy of 100 rushing yards when Dartmouth took over with 6:50 to play, then promptly was stopped for a two-yard loss. But on a 3rd-and-1 play, Schwieger took the ball 28 yards into Big Red territory. He immediately ran for 13 more, then finished off the eight-play, 83-yard drive by burrowing through several tacklers for a 22-yard touchdown.

Kempe finished the day a modest 9-of-19 for 125 yards with McManus catching five of the nine completions for 73 yards. Freshman Bronson Green was the leading tackler for the Big Green defense with nine.

For Cornell, Mathews completed 21-of-33 passes for 164 yards while taking each of the 10 sacks. Shane Savage was the leading receiver with seven catches for 73 yards, while Ryan Houska had six more for 41 yards. On defense, Zack Imhoff contributed a game-high 13 tackles with Ben Heller adding 10 more.
