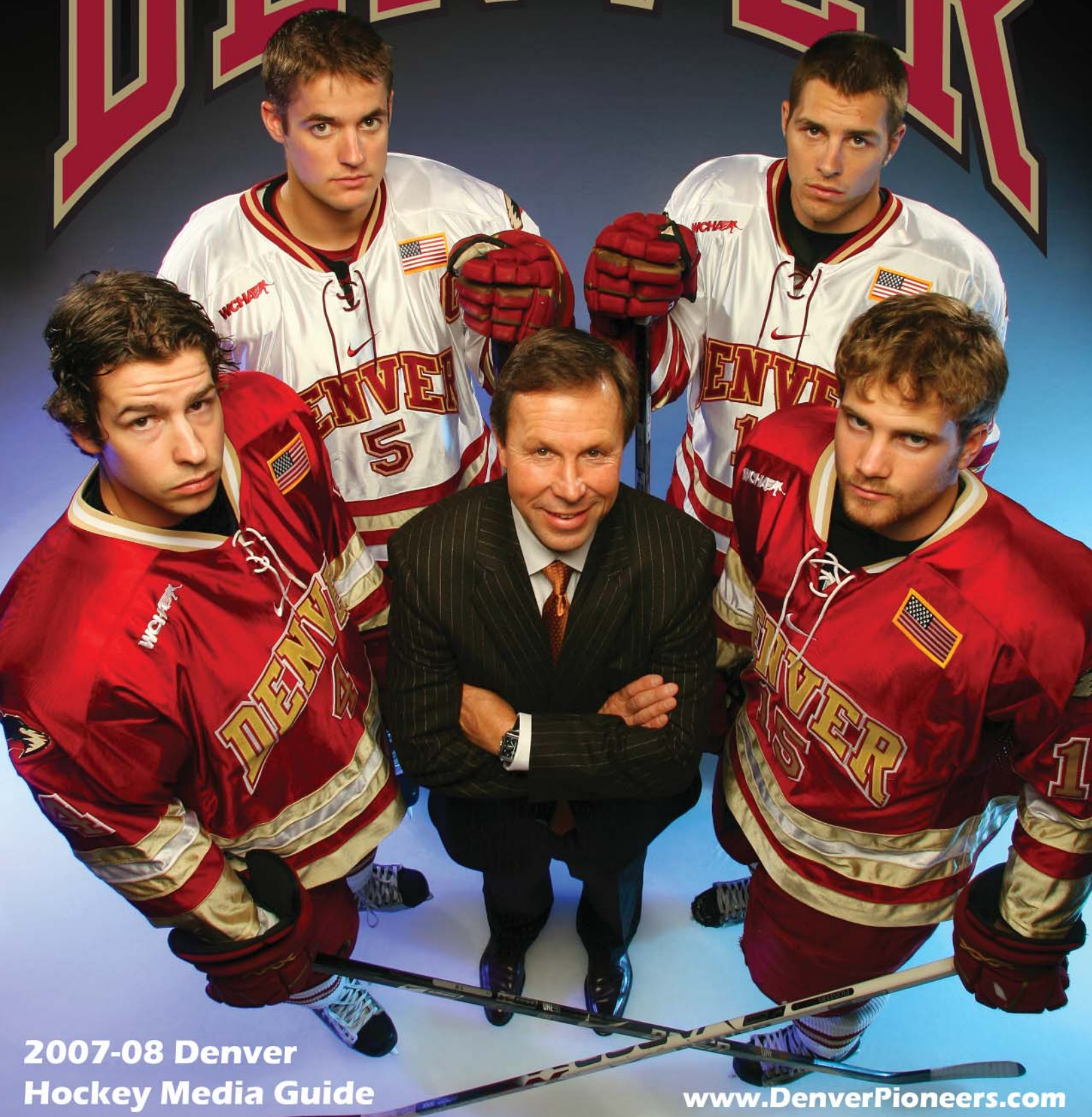

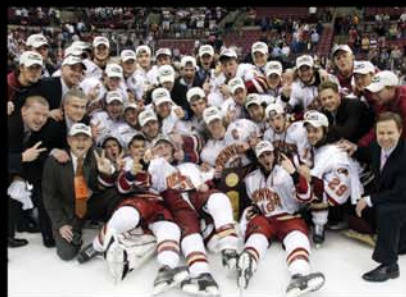

Erich Bacher is in his third year as Director of Media Relations and sixth year at the University of Denver. He manages the overall operation of Denver's 17-sport NCAA Division I media relations department and handles all media relations responsibilities for the seven-time NCAA National Champion Pioneer hockey program and men and women's tennis teams.

The Stevens Point, Wis., native arrived in Denver after a two-year stint as a Venue Press Services Supervisor with the Salt Lake Organizing Committee (SLOC) for the Olympic Winter Games of 2002. Bacher handled all of the facilities and services for over 3,000 written and photographic press at five ice venues and served as the Venue Press Chief for men and women's ice hockey. Prior to his Olympic experience, Bacher was an Assistant to the Associate Director of Athletics at the University of Illinois. He was promoted to the position after working two years in the Illinois sports information office.

Bacher interned at the University of Minnesota media relations office from 1996-97. He was the main contact for baseball, wrestling, men's track and field and cross country. Bacher has worked many NCAA tournaments, international sporting events and was a press officer for the National Hockey League at the 2004 World Cup of Hockey in Helsinki, Finland and Cologne, Germany. Bacher was also a press officer for Team USA at the 1996 Paralympic Games.

He earned a bachelor of science degree in organizational communication from the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point (UWSP) in 1992 and a sports management master's degree from St. Cloud State University in 1996. Bacher is a member of the College Sports Information Director's of America (CoSIDA), Metro Denver Sports Commission and National Sports Marketing Network. He serves on the UWSP Alumni Board of Directors.

Pioneer Television

The 2007-08 season marks the 13th year DU hockey will be televised on FSN Rocky Mountain. Tim Neverett begins his third season calling the play-by-play action after serving as game analyst in 2005-06. Neverett is joined by former DU player Charlie Host, who begins his third season on the telecast team as game analyst. Neverett anchors "The Press Box" show on Denver's newest sports radio station, Mile High Sports Radio AM 1510 AM KCKK/1570 AM KSXT. Neverett, a 23-year veteran of sports broadcasting, was the radio and television voice of the Las Vegas Thunder of the IHL for five seasons and radio voice for Providence College hockey for two seasons. He broadcasted hockey at the 2002 Salt Lake Olympic Winter Games. Host played for DU from 1993-97, playing his final two years for DU coach George Gwozdecky. Host had served as game analyst for the Pioneers' radio network for five seasons (2000-05).

MEDIA INFORMATION

Interview Policies

All interviews with University of Denver student-athletes and coaches must be arranged through the University of Denver Media Relations Department. The University of Denver is committed to accommodating the needs of the media. Coaches and players are typically available before and after practice on a first-come, first-served basis. No interviews will be granted during a practice session.

Credentials

Media credentials are issued to accredited members of the media only. Please submit requests on letterhead via fax or email to be received at least two working days prior to the event. Credentials may be picked up at the Daniel L. Ritchie Center for Sports and Wellness media will call, located inside the loading dock, 90 minutes prior to the start of each contest. Credentials to be mailed should be requested at least two weeks in advance. Credentials issued for the previous academic year are not valid. Individuals must submit the appropriate documentation in order to receive a new credential for the current year. The University of Denver Division of Athletics reserves the right to accept or reject all credential requests.

Photographer Credentials

Photo access at University of Denver athletics events is limited to accredited photographers on assignment by daily newspapers, national publications, wire services, local and national television outlets, and individuals on special assignment. No freelance, private, high school or college photographer, weekly newspapers or journalism students shall be issued photographic credentials unless they officially represent the visiting or host school. Please submit requests on letterhead via fax or email to be received at least two working days prior to the event. Credentials issued for the previous academic year are not valid. Individuals must submit the appropriate documentation in order to receive a new credential for the current year. The University of Denver Division of Athletics reserves the right to accept or reject all credential requests.

Camera Procedures

Photographers must work from within the designated areas and not block any spectator's view of the on-ice action. Photographers may shoot from the press box or the Zamboni entrance in the northeast corner. Requests to photograph from any other location in Magness Arena must be made in advance to the University of Denver Media Relations Department. The University of Denver reserves the right to accept or reject all credential requests.

Strobes

Any use of strobe lights at the Ritchie Center for athletic events must be approved by the University of Denver Media Relations Office in advance. Strobe units may not exceed four clusters of strobe lights producing a maximum of 3,200-watt seconds. All strobes must flash at a duration of less than 1/2,000 of a second. All hanging or installed strobes must be placed as close to the playing surface as possible and near the corners but not behind the baskets or the goals. All strobes must be placed at the site and tested 24 hours before the first game during which the strobes will be used. No other strobes, including hand-carried units, are permitted in the arena and no strobes may be placed on or attached to a backboard or goal standard.

Radio

All radio stations wishing to broadcast from Magness Arena should contact the University of Denver Media Relations Office at least one week prior to the event. Space will be provided for the official radio station of the visiting team; others will be accommodated as space permits. Phone lines must be arranged for all stations in advance.

Telephones

The University of Denver has telephones available for media use in Magness Arena. Media members requiring dedicated telephone lines are asked to contact the University of Denver Athletic Media Relations Department in advance.

Game Services

Pre-game media notes, biographical updates, lineups, game programs and season statistics will be available to the working media in the press box at Magness Arena. Shot charts will be provided between each period and complete game packets are available following the game. In-game statistics will be distributed to members of the media.

Post-game Work Areas

The press box will be available following each home game as work area for media. Final statistics and game packets will be available, and telephones will be available for post-game filing.

Post-game Interviews

Post-game interviews will be conducted outside the Pioneer hockey locker room following a 10-minute cooling-off period. Denver head coach George Gwozdecky and selected players will be available for interviews. Media requests for both Denver and opposing coaches and players should be made to hockey SID Erich Bacher. Opponent requests will be forwarded to the visiting SID. The Pioneer hockey locker room is closed to the media.

Parking

A limited number of media parking spaces are available for the 2007-08 season and will be distributed on a first-come, first-served basis. Please request parking when requesting credentials. Media parking for athletic events at the Ritchie Center is in lot 401, which is on the east side of Joy Burns Arena. Easiest access is from Jewell Ave., off University Boulevard.

Directions to the University of Denver

Take I-25 to the South University Boulevard exit. Proceed south to the first stop light (Buchtel Boulevard). Go through the Buchtel Boulevard intersection to the next block south (Jewell Avenue). Take a right on Jewell and proceed west approximately one-half block to the east entrance of the Ritchie Center and Hamilton Gymnasium. Media parking is just east of Joy Burns Arena (the easternmost part of the Ritchie Center) in lot 401.

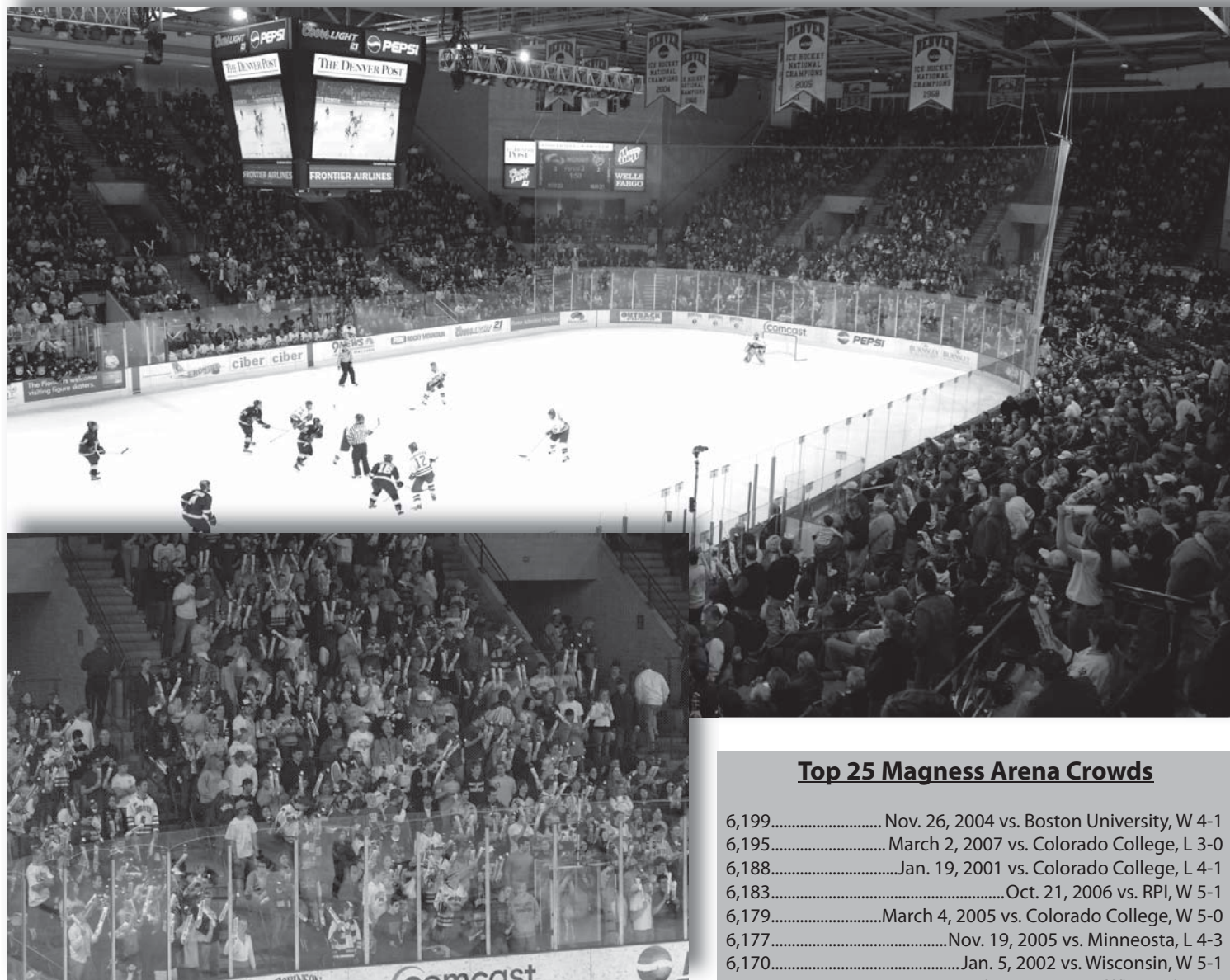

Magness Arena - Home of the Denver Pioneers



The University of Denver celebrated 50 years of hockey in the Mile High City when it opened play at Magness Arena on Oct. 15, 1999. DU defeated Union, 4-1, at the Ice Breaker Tournament before 4,906 fans. Magness Arena is one part of the state-of-the-art Daniel L. Ritchie Center for Sports and Wellness, named after the former DU chancellor who stepped down in 2005 after 16 years of excellence to chair the DU Board of Trustees. The arena is named after local cable entrepreneur Bob Magness, who donated \$10 million toward the project. Numerous individuals, corporations and foundations contributed to the Ritchie Center, which cost approximately \$75 million. Lead donors are recognized on the panels of the Williams Tower, which is located outside the west entrance to the Ritchie Center.

Magness Arena features 6,026 theatre-style seats for hockey, 7,200 seats for basketball and up to 8,000 seats for concerts. When configured for hockey and skating, the ice surface is 85 x 200 feet for North American-rules play. In its short history, Magness Arena has played host to a WBC title fight, a pair of charity tennis matches, numerous concerts featuring the likes of Christina Aguilera, Prince, Sting and The Counting Crows, and of course, a steady diet of sellout hockey games. The DU hockey team played before 22 sell-outs last season at Magness. The Pioneers sport a 99-55-4 (.639) all-time record in eight years of competition at the arena. Magness Arena has been sold out for 57 consecutive regular season DU hockey games since the start of the 2004-05 season.

Pioneers Poised for Return Trip to the NCAA Tournament

After capturing back-to-back NCAA National Championships in 2004 and 2005, the Denver Pioneers have missed the NCAA Tournament the past two seasons and are hungry for a return trip to college hockey's most coveted tournament and a berth to the 2008 Frozen Four at Pepsi Center in Denver. The Pioneers return 15 letterwinners from last year's team that finished 21-15-4 and fourth in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association. DU also welcomes 12 incoming freshmen to the program, which has captured 21 or more wins the past six seasons. The Pioneers will lean on the leadership of senior captain **Andrew Thomas** (Bow, N.H.), senior goaltender **Peter Mannino** (Farmington Hills, Mich.) and junior defenseman **Chris Butler** (St. Louis, Mo.), as well as production from super sophomores **Brock Trotter** (Brandon, Manitoba), **Rhett Rakhshani** (Huntington Beach, Calif.) and **Tyler Ruegsegger** (Lakewood, Colo.) to gain the program's seventh trip to the NCAA Tournament under two-time National Coach of the Year **George Gwozdecky**.

"Our players and staff have worked hard in the offseason to prepare for the challenges that our 2007-08 schedule presents," Gwozdecky said. "With so many new student-athletes joining the program, our primary goal is to become a team. Our secondary goals will be to gain home ice for the WCHA playoffs and advance to the WCHA Final Five and NCAA Tournament."

Thomas is the eighth defenseman to captain the Pioneers in the past eight years and is DU's most experienced returning player having played in 120 career games. Mannino takes over the full-time reigns as DU's No. 1 goaltender after sharing the net with Glenn Fisher the last three seasons. The 2005 NCAA Frozen Four Most Outstanding Player ranks second all-time at DU with a .917 career saves percentage and nine shutouts. Butler is arguably the top two-way defenseman in the WCHA and led all DU blueliners in points (27), goals (10), assists (17) and power-play goals (4) last season. Trotter, Rakhshani and Ruegsegger highlight a sophomore class which ranked second in the nation in freshmen scoring last season behind Minnesota with 160 points on 48 goals and 112 assists. Senior forward **Tom May** (Eagan, Minn.), junior forward **Patrick Mullen** (Pittsburgh, Pa.) and junior alternate captain **J.P. Testwuide** (Vail, Colo.) provide additional leadership and big-game experience, while **Tyler Bozak** (Regina, Saskatchewan), **Jesse Martin** (Edmonton, Alberta), **Kyle Ostrow** (Calgary, Alberta) and **Marc Cheverie** (Cole Harbour, Nova Scotia) highlight Denver's largest freshmen class during Gwozdecky's 14-year tenure.

FORWARDS

The Pioneers will pack plenty of scoring punch despite losing talented three-year veterans Ryan Dingle and Geoff Paukovich early to the NHL. Trotter leads the way after becoming the first DU freshman last season to lead the team in scoring since Dave Shields in 1986-87. Trotter tied for third among WCHA freshmen in scoring with 40 points on 16 goals and 24 assists, while racking up seven power-play goals and 12 multi-point efforts, tying his career-best three points in four games. Rakhshani led DU with 26 assists and finished third with 36 points last season. The talented forward earned Wells Fargo Denver Cup Most Valuable Player honors and recorded a pair of two-goal games against Minnesota Duluth. Ruegsegger is DU's most energetic player and best two-way forward. He tallied 34 points on 15 goals and 19 assists and recorded a team-leading +15 plus/minus rating.

"Brock, Rhett and Tyler had great freshmen seasons and provided much of our scoring offense," Gwozdecky said. "With a tremendous summer of training as well as the experience gained, we expect our 'dynamic three-some' to continue to lead us in many of our offensive categories."

Mullen, May and sophomore **Brian Gifford** (Moorhead, Minn.) provide

experience and are ready to be consistent contributors. Mullen, who saw action at forward and defense last season, returns to forward and will be counted on as one of DU's top two-way forwards. Mullen scored five goals last season, including two game-winners. May looks to regain a regular spot in the lineup and has worked hard toward a solid senior season. May packs one of the hardest shots in the league and is expected to provide a strong presence on both ends of the ice. Gifford netted 13 points on three goals and 10 assists during his freshman campaign last season. Sophomore returnees **Brandon Vossberg** (St. Paul, Minn.) and **Matt Glasser** (Calgary, Alberta) will also compete for increased playing time.

"Patrick showed his unique skills and diversity last year by playing forward and defense," Gwozdecky said. "Tom will once again be expected to play a consistent power forward role. Brian gained a lot of confidence last season and we will rely on him for even more contributions at both ends of the ice."

Bozak, Martin and Ostrow headline the list of six freshmen forwards. Bozak led the British Columbia Hockey League in scoring last season with 128 points on 45 goals and a league-leading 83 assists in 59 games as team captain for Victoria. Martin is a highly-skilled forward who tallied 56 points on 19 goals and 37 assists for Tri-City of the United States Hockey League, while Ostrow recorded 71 points on 26 goals and 45 assists for BCHL Coastal Conference champion Nanaimo. **Stephen Cunningham**

(Boulder, Colo.), **Dustin Jackson** (Omaha, Neb.) and **Anthony Maiani** (Shelby Township, Mich.) look for immediate playing time as well.

"Assistant coaches **Steve Miller** and **Derek Lalonde** have put together a group of freshmen forwards that are loaded with talent and character," Gwozdecky said. "With the early departure of many of our returning forwards to the pro ranks, we will once again rely heavily on our freshmen to produce."

DEFENSEMEN

Thomas and Butler will anchor an inexperienced defensive corps that should improve with increased ice time. Thomas is a fierce competitor who has established himself as one of the league's top defensive blueliners. The 6-2, 215-pound Thomas led DU in penalty minutes last season, but also established himself as a better all-around defenseman.

"With his experience, character and skill, Andy was an obvious choice to be our captain for the 2007-08 season," Gwozdecky said. "He has developed into one of the most consistent defenseman in the WCHA. Andy's strength, courage, intelligence and personality will be valuable assets in his leadership role."

Alternate captain Butler will have increased ice time and responsibility this season. The former All-WCHA Rookie Team member in 2005 tied for second among WCHA defensemen in points (20) and goals (7) in league play last season. Butler earned Ice Breaker Invitational and Wells Fargo Denver Cup All-Tournament honors and led DU with 110 blocked shots. Butler is ready to establish himself as one of the best two-way defensemen in college hockey.

"Undoubtedly one of the most talented defenseman in the WCHA, Chris is expected to provide us with dynamic play in our transition game as well as defend against the best our opponents can throw at us," Gwozdecky said.

Testwuide moves back to the blueline to start the season, but also could see action at forward. Testwuide was part of DU's top defensive forward line last season and is DU's most physical two-way player. He will be counted on for extensive ice time and physical play this season.

"J.P. is another success story in a long line of Pioneer walk-on players," Gwozdecky said. "In just two seasons J.P. has played important roles at several positions and gained the admiration and respect of his peers. He will be expected to provide a powerful and intimidating force this season."

Senior **Zach Blom** (Englewood, Colo.), junior **Julian Marcuzzi** (N. Vancouver, British Columbia), sophomore **Cody Brookwell** (Calgary, Alberta) and freshmen **Joey Brehm** (Edina, Minn.), **Jon Cook** (Denver, Colo.), **Chris Nutini** (Centennial, Colo.) and **John Ryder** (Colorado Springs, Colo.) will battle for the remaining defensive positions.

"As usual there will be great competition for the final three playing positions on our defensive corps," Gwozdecky said. "Cody showed great improvement during his freshman season and Zach has worked hard to earn increased playing time. Our freshmen defensemen provide us with depth as well as an array of multi-dimensional skills."

GOALTENDING

Mannino is DU's first No. 1 goaltender since Adam Berkhoel led the Pioneers to the NCAA National Championship in 2004. Mannino excelled in DU's goaltending rotation the last three seasons with Fisher, leading the team in goals against average and saves percentage each year during that span. Last season, Mannino posted an 8-6-2 record with a 2.29 GAA and .919 Sv%. He added four shutouts, including back-to-back efforts against

Alaska Anchorage and Mercyhurst. Mannino will be backed up by incoming freshman **Marc Cheverie** (Cole Harbour, Nova Scotia), who posted a 20-9-2 record, including three shutouts, with a 3.10 GAA and .875 Sv% in 34 games for Coastal Conference champion Nanaimo of the BCHL in 2006-07. Freshman **Eddie Guinn** (South Burlington, Vt.) will serve as the No. 3 goaltender.

"Peter assumes the No. 1 role and is arguably the best goaltender in the WCHA," Gwozdecky said. "With his great skill, competitive fire and big-game experience, we expect him to be a difference maker in every game he plays. Marc is a talented goaltender, who will be mentored by one of the nation's best. We expect Marc to be ready when called upon."

SCHEDULE

The Pioneers play 14 of their 36 games against teams which qualified for the 2007 NCAA Tournament, including four games against Frozen Four participant North Dakota and two-game nonconference series' against Hockey East contender Maine and Central Collegiate Hockey Association defending champion Notre Dame. In addition, the Pioneers face perennial power Minnesota and in-state rival Colorado College four times each.

"We are excited to play one of the premier schedules in the country," Gwozdecky said. "Our nonconference schedule will challenge us from the beginning of the season with series' against Maine and Notre Dame. We're also looking forward to another competitive season in the always tough and rigorous WCHA."

Head coach George Gwozdecky begins his 14th season behind the bench for the seven-time NCAA National Champion Denver Pioneers. Since Gwozdecky's arrival on the DU campus in 1994, the Pioneers have solidified themselves as a perennial top-10 program. The Pioneers have captured two NCAA National Championships, three WCHA regular-season titles and two WCHA playoff titles during Gwozdecky's 13-year tenure.

The Thunder Bay, Ontario, native has led the Pioneers to 10 20-win seasons and five seasons with 25 or more wins. Gwozdecky has brought the excitement back to one of college hockey's elite programs.

As the only coach in NCAA history to win a hockey national title as a player, assistant coach and head coach, Gwozdecky has compiled a 297-191-40 (.600) record with the Pioneers. Gwozdecky-coached teams have reached the NCAA Tournament (including the 1992-93 Miami team) in seven of the last 15 years. Denver has also captured nine Denver Cup titles under Gwozdecky, who currently boasts a 447-315-61 (.580) record in 21 seasons. Gwozdecky sports a 380-285-59 (.566) record coaching Division I programs over 18 seasons, including two Spencer Penrose Awards as the National Coach of the Year.

Gwozdecky's coaching expertise led the Pioneers back to national prominence with back-to-back NCAA National Championships in 2004 and 2005. Entering the 2004 Frozen Four as underdogs, the Pioneers captured a come-from-behind win over Minnesota Duluth and held off a 6-on-3 advantage in the final 78 seconds in a 1-0 victory over Maine in the championship game. The NCAA title was the first for DU since 1969, when Pioneer all-time greats Keith Magnuson and Gerry Powers led the team to its second consecutive national title. Gwozdecky's leadership carried the team to a 27-12-5 record, including his 200th win at Denver against Northeastern on October 18, 2004. For his accomplishments, Gwozdecky finished runner-up for the 2004 Spencer Penrose Award for the National Coach of the Year for the second time in his career.

In 2005, the Pioneers silenced all the critics by becoming the first WCHA team since 1997 to capture the MacNaughton Cup, Broadmoor Trophy and NCAA National Championship in the same season. Denver's 4-1 victory over North Dakota in the 2005 NCAA title game gave the school its seventh hockey national championship in 56 seasons of varsity hockey. Gwozdecky was honored as national coach of the year for the second

time and WCHA Coach of the Year for the third time in his illustrious career. Gwozdecky captured his 400th career win on March 18 with Denver's 2-1 overtime decision against North Dakota at the WCHA Final Five.

DU's run at a third consecutive NCAA National Championship ended with a respectable 21-15-3 overall mark in 2005-06. The Pioneers finished second in the WCHA regular season, but were ousted by Minnesota Duluth in the WCHA Playoffs. All-American defenseman Matt Carle became the first DU Pioneer and first player coached by Gwozdecky to capture the Hobey Baker Memorial Award as the nation's top player. In 2006-07, DU registered its sixth consecutive season with at least 21 wins, while finishing fourth in the WCHA with 13 league victories.

The Pioneers returned to the national scene in 2001-02, when Gwozdecky's team was picked to finish fifth in the annual *Grand Forks Herald* WCHA Coaches' Poll. Instead, his squad rewrote Denver hockey history, opening the season with nine consecutive wins, the best start in school history. Gwozdecky guided Denver to a 32-8-1 record and the Pioneers achieved their first No. 1 ranking in the modern history of the polls. DU also earned its first MacNaughton Cup trophy since the 1985-86 season as the 2001-02 WCHA regular-season champions and captured its first Broadmoor Trophy as WCHA playoff champs since 1999. It was the first time since the 1990-91 season that a WCHA school had won both the MacNaughton Cup and Broadmoor Trophy outright in the same season. The team was the fourth in school history to reach 30 wins in a season. Gwozdecky earned his second WCHA Coach of the Year and was runner-up to Maine's Tim Whitehead for the Spencer Penrose Award.

In 2000-01, Gwozdecky guided a young Pioneer team to a 19-15-4 mark, which was three wins better than the 1999-00 squad.

The Pioneers experienced the greatest turnaround of any team in college hockey in 1998-99. Denver rebounded from a disappointing 11-25-2 record in 1997-98 to finish with an astounding 26-13-2 overall mark, marking the first time in the history of the WCHA that a team won more than 25 games after losing 25 the year before.

Gwozdecky led the 1996-97 Pioneers to a 24-13-4 overall record and an

appearance in the NCAA Tournament. Denver entered the tournament winning seven of its last eight games and was one of the hottest teams in the country before losing to the eventual runner-up, Boston University, in the semifinals of the NCAA East Regional on an overtime goal by former Colorado Avalanche forward Chris Drury.

In 1995-96, Gwozdecky led a young Denver team to a 22-14-3 overall record and a 17-12-3 mark in the WCHA, good for a third-place league finish. The Pioneers also captured their fourth consecutive Wells Fargo Denver Cup championship when they upended top-ranked and then-undefeated Colorado College, 3-2, before a capacity crowd of 16,061 at McNichols Sports Arena. It was the largest crowd in Colorado history to witness a college hockey game and will go down as one of the all-time great moments in Pioneer hockey.

After inheriting a team that finished ninth in the WCHA in 1993-94, Gwozdecky guided the Pioneers to the 1995 NCAA Tournament quarterfinals. The 1994-95 squad was picked to finish fifth in the *Grand Forks Herald* preseason poll, yet Gwozdecky led the team to a second-place regular-season finish in WCHA action. For his efforts, Gwozdecky was honored as the WCHA's Coach of the Year. The team's winning percentage (.619) was the best for the program since 1985-86, and the Pioneers hosted the first round of the WCHA playoffs for the first time since 1987-88.

Gwozdecky came to Denver from Miami (Ohio) where he served as head coach for five seasons. In his first five years as a Division I head coach, the two-time Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA) Coach of the Year posted an 83-94-19 (.468) record. During that time, Miami won the CCHA title for the first time in school history. In 1992-93, Gwozdecky guided the Redskins to their second consecutive CCHA championship berth, the school's first NCAA Tournament bid and their best record ever (27-9-5). Following the 1992-93 season, Gwozdecky won the Spencer Penrose Award as National Coach of the Year for the first time and was named CCHA Coach of the Year for the second consecutive season.

Prior to his appointment at Miami, Gwozdecky served as an assistant coach at Michigan State University following a head coaching stint at

the University of Wisconsin-River Falls, an NAIA school. At UW-River Falls, Gwozdecky compiled a three-year mark of 67-30-2 (.687).

Gwozdecky played wing for the University of Wisconsin's 1977 NCAA championship team, coached UW-River Falls to an NAIA title in 1983, and served as an assistant coach for Michigan State's 1986 team that won the NCAA crown.

To add to his distinguished list of accomplishments, Gwozdecky was honored on October 22, 1994, as an inductee into the Wisconsin Hockey Hall of Fame. Gwozdecky was inducted into the Miami University "Cradle of Coaches" Hall of Fame in October of 2006.

A 1978 Wisconsin graduate and four-year letterwinner, Gwozdecky earned his bachelor's degree in physical education. One year later he earned his master's of education from UW-River Falls. He and his wife, Bonnie, have a 14-year-old daughter, Adrienne.

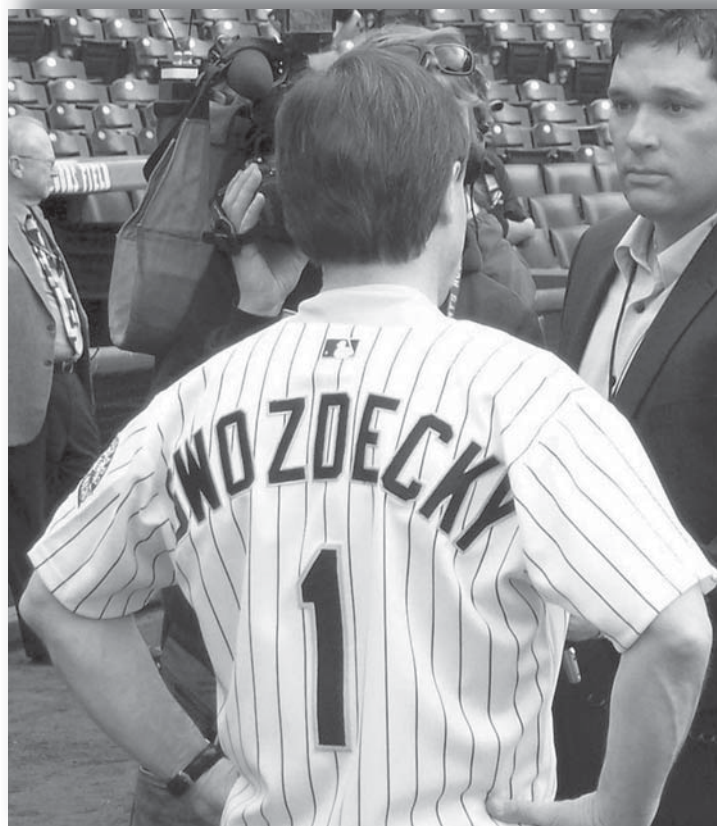

Steve Miller begins his 14th year at Denver and his 17th season as a member of George Gwozdecky's staff. He serves as the recruiting coordinator in addition to on-ice coaching, video breakdown and game analysis.

While at Denver, Miller has helped the Pioneers to back-to-back NCAA National Championships in 2004 and 2005, two WCHA regular-season championships and three WCHA Final Five titles. Miller has been responsible for the signing of 11 consecutive nationally-ranked recruiting classes. He has coached and recruited 28 NHL Draft picks, 28 All-WCHA honorees, six World Junior Championship participants, seven All-Americans, one Hobey Baker Award winner, three WCHA Student-Athletes of the Year, three WCHA Defensive Players of the Year, one Rookie of the Year and two Frozen Four Most Outstanding Players. The Pioneers have averaged over 22 wins in Miller's 13 years, including six NCAA appearances, two Frozen Four appearances and two national championships. Miller recruited or coached current NHL players Matt Carle (San Jose), Wade Dubielewicz (New York Islanders), Mark Rycroft (Colorado), Paul Stastny (Colorado) and Matt Pettinger (Washington).

Prior to his arrival at Denver, Miller assisted Gwozdecky in a similar role at Miami (Ohio) University from 1991 to 1994. Miller was a big part of Miami's first-ever appearance in the NCAA Tournament in 1992-93. The Redskins posted a school-best mark of 27-9-5 and won their first-ever CCHA league championship. Miller coached or assisted in the recruitment of former Miami and current NHL players Kevyn Adams (Carolina), Brian Savage (Philadelphia), Dan Boyle (Tampa Bay). He coached 11 NHL draft picks, 19 all-CCHA honorees, four All-Americans, two Hobey Baker nominees, an Olympian and one World Junior Championship participant.

Prior to his stint at Miami, Miller served as assistant varsity coach, head junior varsity coach and recruiting coordinator at his alma mater, St. Mary's (Minn.) University. He helped St. Mary's capture the 1989 Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) playoff championship and reach the quarterfinals of the NCAA championships.

Miller has also gained additional coaching experience working for USA Hockey. He also coached current NHL players Brian Gionta (New Jersey), Mike York (New York Islanders) and John-Michael Liles (Colorado). He was the head coach of Team Rocky Mountain, which included current Pioneer Zach Blom, at the Select 17 festival in 2000 and led the team to its best finish by winning a silver medal.

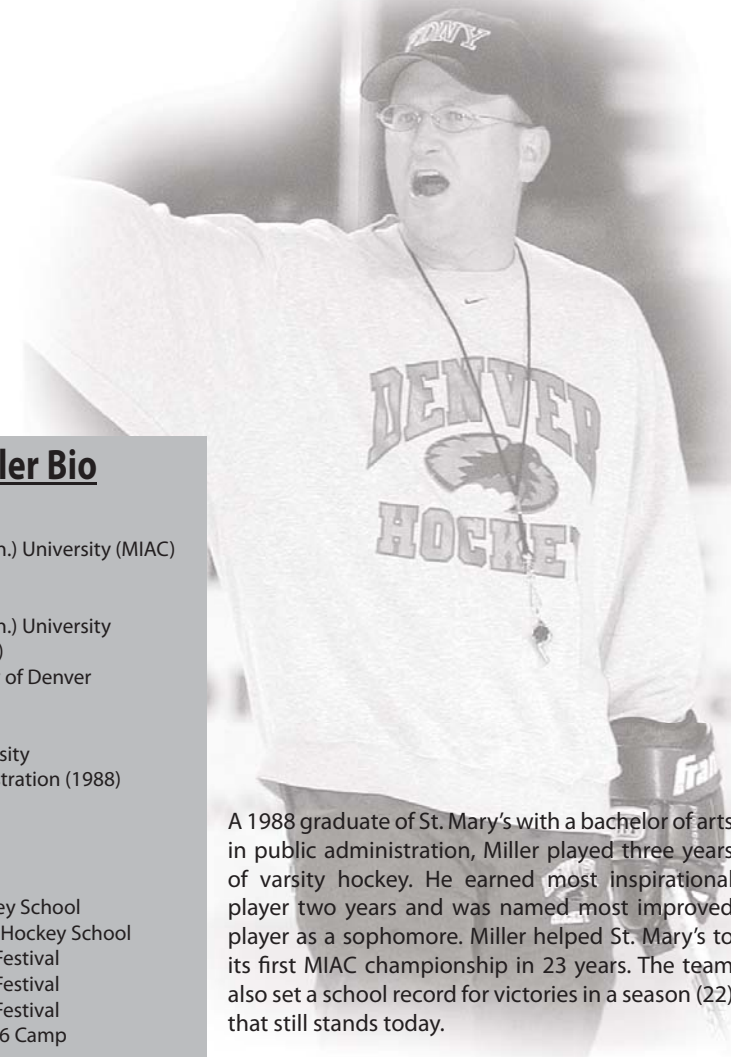

Derek Lalonde begins his second season as an assistant coach at DU after spending four seasons at Ferris State under long-time head coach Bob Daniels. Lalonde assists in DU's recruiting and video efforts, while working primarily with DU's goaltenders and defensemen.

In Lalonde's first season at DU, standouts Glenn Fisher and Peter Mannino combined to post the fifth-best goals against average in school history at 2.34. The Pioneers also recorded their sixth consecutive season with 21 or more wins, while finishing fourth in the WCHA.

Lalonde helped the Bulldogs to a 76-67-12 record during his four-year tenure. Ferris State captured its first Central Collegiate Hockey Association Championship and CCHA Super 6 Championship appearance during a record-setting 31-10-1 season in 2002-03.

A native of Brasher Falls, N.Y., Lalonde arrived at FSU after serving two seasons (2000-02) as an assistant coach at Hamilton College in Clinton, N.Y. While at Hamilton, his primary responsibilities included being the Continentals' recruiting coordinator, scheduling, managing practices, supervising training programs and video analysis. Lalonde was Hamilton's junior varsity head coach and served as director of the program's summer hockey school. Prior to his coaching stint at Hamilton, Lalonde held the same position at Lebanon Valley College in Annville, Pa., from August 1998 through July 2000. He assisted with the establishment of the NCAA Division II-III's men's ice hockey program from its inception and in 1998-99, the team went 19-6-1 in the program's first year of competition.

The Flying Dutchmen also captured the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference (ECAC) Northeast Championship and qualified for the NCAA Division III Tournament in the program's third year of existence. From 1995-98, Lalonde was a graduate assistant coach at the Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts in North Adams, Mass. Lalonde coached at a Prospects Camp for 16-year olds, while a member of the selection committee for the Empire State Games and the New York State Select 16/17-year old group.

Lalonde was a four-year member (1990-95) of SUNY Cortland State University's men's ice hockey team. He was the recipient of the team's Red Letter Award in recognition of being selected the Red Dragons' MVP during his senior season in 1994-95 and concluded his career as the program's holder of four goaltending records. 2006-07 Season in Review



MVP Fisher Leads Pioneers to 21-15-4 Season

The Denver Pioneers concluded their 58th season of hockey with a 21-15-4 overall record and 13-11-4 fourth-place mark in the WCHA. The Pioneers captured 21 or more wins for the sixth consecutive season and 13 or more league wins for the fourth consecutive season. After winning back-to-back NCAA National Championships in 2004 and 2005, the Pioneers failed to advance to the WCHA Final Five and NCAA Tournament for two consecutive seasons. DU finished last season ranked No. 15 in the *USA Today/AHM* and *USCHO.com/CSTV* national polls. The Pioneers started the season with a 17-7-2 mark before going 4-8-2 in the final 14 games.

DU head coach **George Gwozdecky** was inducted in the Miami University "Cradle of Coaches" Hall of Fame as the Pioneers split two games at the Ice Breaker Tournament in Oxford, Ohio, to start the season. After going 3-3 against St. Cloud State, RPI and Minnesota Duluth, the Pioneers enjoyed their first of two seven-game unbeaten streaks during the season. Senior goaltender **Glenn Fisher** posted back-to-back shutouts against Wisconsin (Nov. 10) and Michigan Tech (Nov. 17) to propel the Pioneers to a 9-4-1 mark before back-to-back losses against in-state rival Colorado College on Dec. 1-2. Junior defenseman **Zach Blom's** lone goal of the year in a 3-3 overtime tie against Minnesota State on Dec. 8 helped kick-start DU to its second seven-game unbeaten streak of the season. Junior **Ryan Dingle's** second career

hat trick helped DU complete the two-game sweep against the Mavericks, while goaltender **Peter Mannino** chipped in with back-to-back shutouts against Alaska Anchorage (Dec. 15) and Mercyhurst (Dec. 29). Fisher's 36 saves in a 2-1 win over Mercyhurst helped the Pioneers to their 12th Denver Cup title on Dec. 30. Sophomore Chris Butler netted the game-winning goal and Mannino's 34 saves capped the unbeaten streak in a 3-1 win over Wisconsin on Jan. 5.

Freshman **Tyler Ruegsegger's** overtime goal lifted DU past Niagara, 2-1, on Jan. 12 and the Pioneers completed their last sweep of the season with a 5-2 win on Jan. 13. Fisher extended the winning streak to three games with an impressive 31-save shutout effort in a 1-0 win at Minnesota, which ended the Gophers' 21-game home unbeaten streak at Mariucci Arena. The Pioneers went 3-6-2 to finish the regular season before being swept by Wisconsin at home in the first round of the WCHA playoffs on March 9-10 to end their season.

Freshman **Brock Trotter** (16-24--40) became the first DU freshman to lead the team in scoring since

Dave Shields in 1986-87, while Dingle (22-15-37) led the team in goals, power-play goals (9), game-winning goals (4) and shorthanded goals for the second consecutive season. Dingle earned All-WCHA third-team honors for the second consecutive season and concluded his eligibility when he signed a professional contract with Anaheim on March 26. Team MVP Fisher posted a 13-9-2 record with career highs in goals against average (2.32) and saves percentage (.919). Fisher was one of 10 finalists for the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award. Fisher and Mannino (8-6-2, 2.29 GAA, .919 Sv%) held opponents to three goals or less in 32 of 40 games. Fisher and Mannino became the second DU goaltending tandem to record three shutouts each in a single season, while defenseman Butler earned honorable mention All-USCHO All-America honors after tallying 27 points on 10 goals and 17 assists. DU freshmen accounted for 48% of the team's scoring points. In addition to Trotter's 40 points, newcomers **Rhett Rakhshani** and Ruegsegger collected 36 and 34 points, respectively. DU landed 10 players on the All-WCHA Academic team: **Steven Cook, J.D. Corbin, Ryan Helgason, Danny King, Patrick Mullen, J.P. Testwuide, Andrew Thomas**, Blom, Butler and Fisher. Blom, Cook, Corbin, Fisher, Helgason, King and Thomas were repeat selections for the Pioneers.

DU finished 44-for-270 (16.3%) on the power play and 197-for-235 (83.8%) on the penalty kill.

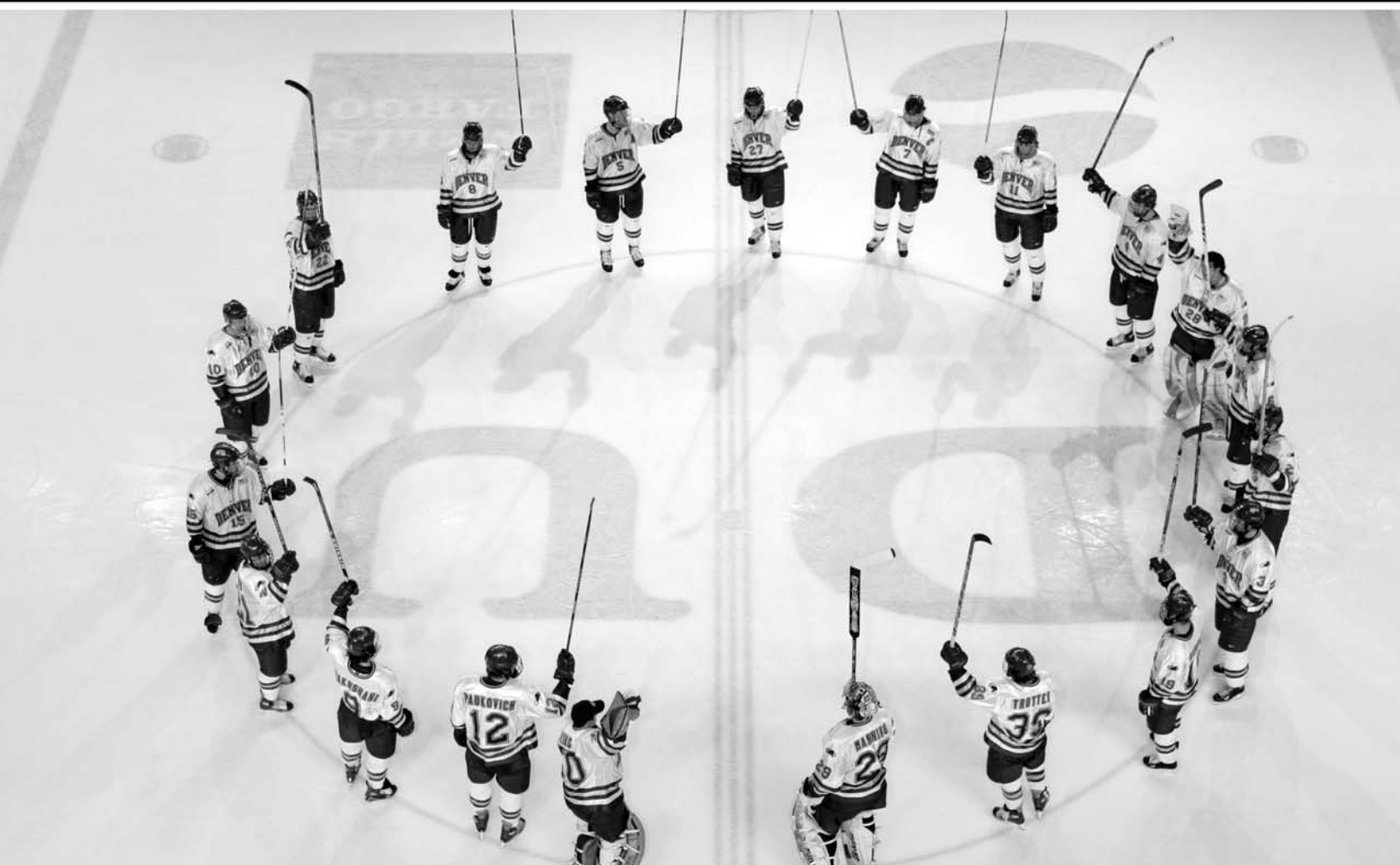

Pioneers Host Denver Cup for 16th Year

Now in its 16th year, the Denver Cup continues its tradition as one of the nation's finest college hockey tournaments. Magness Arena hosts the two-day tournament on Dec. 28-29. This year's holiday tournament features Dartmouth (ECACHL), Northern Michigan (CCHA), Sacred Heart (Atlantic Hockey) and 12-time champion and host Denver.

The tournament was founded by former Denver Director of Athletics Jack McDonald in the fall of 1992. McDonald and former Pioneer coach Frank Serratore identified a need for an event for college sports fans in Denver between Christmas and New Year's Day. McDonald and Serratore's visions proved accurate as the tournament has grown to become the premier sporting event in Denver during the holiday season. In 1996, a record opening-round crowd of 10,317 watched Yale beat Air Force, followed by DU's terrific 4-3 overtime win over Maine. In addition, a two-day attendance record of 23,187 was set at the 1999 showcase. In 1995, the championship game set an all-time record for attendance at a college hockey game in the state of Colorado when 16,061 - a sellout crowd - witnessed Denver's 3-2 win over Colorado College in the title game on Dec. 28.

The Denver Cup has come into its own as one of the premier annual sporting events in the Rocky Mountain region. Media coverage for the Denver Cup, regionally and nationally, has been exceptional.

Denver sports a 24-5-1 record in 15 years of Denver Cup competition. The Pioneers claimed the first five titles before Miami (Ohio) won the tournament championship in 1997. The Pioneers have won the last six of the last seven Denver Cup championships, including a 2-1 title game victory over UMass Lowell in 2006. Twelve Denver players have been selected as the Cup's most valuable players and 43 Pioneers have been named to the all-tournament team.

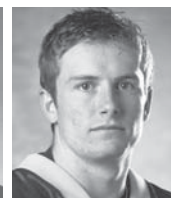

THIS IS THE WCHA

With a noteworthy past that spans six decades and marks its 56th season overall in 2007-08, three characteristics that continue to define the Western Collegiate Hockey Association are history, tradition and success.

From the founding days as the Midwest Collegiate Hockey League (MCHL) from 1951-53, to the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League (WIHL) from 1953-58, and ultimately on to the Western Collegiate Hockey Association in 1959, this prestigious athletic conference has developed and maintained a tradition of excellence that truly is second to none.

In fact, no collegiate conference – in any sport – can top the impressive list of national scale accomplishments of the WCHA and its member teams. Since 1951, teams representing the men's WCHA have earned a record 36 NCAA (national) championships, finished as the national runner-up another 27 times, and qualified for a berth in collegiate hockey's national championship round – the NCAA Men's Frozen Four – in 52 of 55 seasons overall. And since its founding in 1999-2000, teams representing the women's WCHA have now captured eight consecutive national championships in 2000, 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006 and 2007!

In addition to its successes in national championship tournament play over the years, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association owns an enviable reputation for producing outstanding coaches and student-athletes, with hundreds upon hundreds of its alumni moving on to successful professional and Olympic playing careers. On top of the more than 200 men's and women's league alumni who have Olympic experience playing for the likes of the U.S., Canada, Italy, Norway, Austria, Germany, Sweden, Finland, and France, conference-member teams and players have also received additional international exposure on a regular basis since 1951. The WCHA has hosted touring teams from Russia, Canada, Sweden, Czech Republic, Latvia, Germany, Italy, Finland, Norway, Switzerland, England and France. The league has also sent men's WCHA All-Star Teams to Europe in both 1998 (Switzerland) and 2000 (Norway) and hopes to make another overseas trip in the future, while the women's WCHA has also regularly put together all-star teams, with the 2005-06 season bringing WCHA All-Star Team games against the U.S. National Team at both Xcel Energy Center and the Duluth Entertainment & Convention Center. In 2006-07, the women's WCHA had nine current and seven former players compete at the 2007 IIHF Women's World Championship in Manitoba, with the likes of former and current WCHA stars Carla MacLeod, Caroline Ouellette, and Tessa Bonhomme winning Gold as members of Team Canada.

Just a few of the more than 350 past and present National Hockey Leaguer's who have roots in the WCHA include the likes of legendary goaltenders Tony Esposito, Eddio Mio and Glenn 'Chico' Resch, defensemen Keith Magnuson, Lou Nanne and Curt Giles, and forwards Lou Angotti, Bill Masterton, Bill 'Red' Hay, Red Berenson, Glenn Anderson and Mark Johnson. The current crop of WCHA stars playing in the NHL include the likes of Chris Chelios, Brett Hull, Dany Heatley, Mark Parrish, Jordan Leopold, Curtis Joseph, Greg Johnson, Sean Hill, Antti Laaksonen, Jason Blake, Tyler Arnason, Andy Sutton, Bret Hedican and Matt Carle.

WCHA home attendance for men's games reached another new milestone in 2006-07, this time surpassing the 1.6 million mark for the first time with a record total of 1,606,686 and a per game average attendance of 7,370. The WCHA has now surpassed the one million mark in home attendance 14 straight seasons and 1.5 million for five straight seasons.

Over the last decade, the WCHA has been able to showcase its exciting brand of hockey to an ever-increasing number of fans, thanks in part to such impressive new facilities as Ralph Engelstad Arena in Grand Forks, Colorado Springs World Arena, the Kohl Center in Madison, Magness Arena in Denver, Mariucci Arena and Ridder Arena in Minneapolis, the National Hockey Center in St. Cloud, and Alltel Center in Mankato.

The conference's two annual playoff championships, known as the Red Baron™ WCHA Final Five (men's) and the WCHA Championship (women's), continue to be among the most successful collegiate tournaments of their kind. Held at Xcel Energy Center in St. Paul, the WCHA Final Five has drawn in excess of 1,100,000 fans since its inception in 1987 – including a record 88,900 in 2007. The women's 2008 WCHA Championship, set for next March 8-9 at the Duluth Entertainment & Convention Center, also continues to grow both in exposure and attendance.

Also in 2007-08, WCHA member arenas will be showcased throughout the hockey world as they will host several national events. On the final weekend of March, the Colorado Springs World Arena, home of the CC Tigers, will host the NCAA Men's West Regional while the Kohl Center, home of the UW Badgers, will host the NCAA Men's Midwest Regional. And the University of Denver will

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serve as the host institution for the 2008 NCAA Men's Frozen Four, to be held April 10-12 at Pepsi Center in the Mile High City. On the women's side, the Duluth Entertainment & Convention, home of the UMD Bulldogs, will host both the WCHA Championship on March 8-9 and the 2008 NCAA Women's Frozen Four from March 20-22.

Under the leadership and guidance of Commissioner Bruce M. McLeod and Associate Commissioner Sara R. Martin, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association proudly celebrates it's 56th season of men's competition and ninth in women's competition in 2007-08 with prospects for another tremendously competitive campaign being extremely bright.

2006-07 WCHA Men's Team Highlights

Although the Western Collegiate Hockey Association's run of five consecutive men's national championships won came to an end, the 2006-07 hockey season will still be remembered among the best ever for the now 56-year-old league. Home to a record 36 NCAA championship teams since it's founding in 1951, the WCHA on-ice product this past winter was one of the most competitive in history, conference-member teams were again ranked among the top clubs in the country throughout the campaign in the national polls, league-member student-athletes and coaches received numerous national accolades, the conference continued to generate new attendance records, and WCHA players and alums continued to play a prominent role in international and professional competition.

Witness the following team and individual highlights from the 2006-07 season:

- The WCHA had six teams ranked among the nation's top 20 in the final USCHO.com/CSTV Div. 1 Men's Poll for 2006-07 ... Minnesota was No. 2, North Dakota was No. 6, St. Cloud State was No. 7, Denver was No. 15, Wisconsin was No. 17, Michigan Tech was No. 19, and Colorado College was No. 20. In the final USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine Poll, North Dakota was No. 3, Minnesota was No. 5, St. Cloud State was No. 8, and Denver was No. 15.
- The WCHA placed a team in the NCAA Men's Frozen Four – North Dakota – for the 52nd time in 55 seasons overall. For the Sioux, it was their third consecutive appearance in the Frozen Four under coach Dave Hakstol. Denver will serve as the host city for the NCAA Men's Frozen Four in 2008 while both Wisconsin (Kohl Center) and Colorado College (Colorado Springs World Arena) will host NCAA Regionals next season.
- Western Collegiate Hockey Association-member teams produced a combined 53-24-6 record in non-conference play in 2006-07, for a .675 winning percentage. Since 2000, WCHA teams are a combined 348-153-54 (.676) against the

other Div. 1 men's hockey conferences.

- WCHA home attendance reached another new milestone in 2006-07, this time surpassing the 1.6 million mark for the first time with a record total of 1,606,686 and a per game average attendance of 7,370. The WCHA has now surpassed the one million mark in home attendance 14 straight seasons and 1.5 million for five straight seasons.
- For the first time since the WCHA expanded to 10 member teams with the addition of Minnesota State, Mankato in 1999-2000, and for the first time since the 1994-95 season overall, every league member team won at least 10 games overall. By the conclusion of the 2006-07 campaign, every member team had won at least 13 games overall and seven won at least 18.
- The University of Minnesota Golden Gophers, for only the ninth time in WCHA history, successfully defended it's regular season championship and captured the MacNaughton Cup on March 3. Selected as the pre-season co-favorite along with Wisconsin by the league's head coaches, Minnesota went 18-7-3 for 39 points in 28 WCHA games, four better than runner-up St. Cloud State. Fourteen of UM's players were underclassmen as the Gophers claimed the program's 12th league title. Minnesota head coach Don Lucia won his fifth MacNaughton Cup behind a WCHA team bench – the last two with Minnesota and three with Colorado College in 1994, 1995 and 1996.
- Home teams won 54.3% of the time in 2006-07 league play while 68 of the 140 WCHA games overall – or 48.6% – were decided by one goal or less. Nineteen of those ended in overtime ties.
- Minnesota also won the Broadmoor Trophy at the record setting 2007 Red Baron™ WCHA Final Five, held March 15-17 at Xcel Energy Center in Saint Paul, Minn. The Golden Gophers became only the third team in the past 10 years to win both the regular season and playoff titles in the WCHA, defeating North Dakota, 3-2 on a dramatic overtime goal by forward and tournament Most Valuable Player Blake Wheeler, in the title game before a WCHA record-setting sellout crowd of 19,463. In all, the Final Five drew a record 88,900 fans to eclipse the previous mark of 87,579 set in 2006 at Xcel Energy Center. The five games drew, in order, 16,449, 17,511, 19,359, 16,118 and 19,463.
- North Dakota sophomore forward Ryan Duncan was named the winner of the 2007 Hobey Baker Memorial Award, becoming the sixth straight recipient from the WCHA and upping the league's record total of winners to 13 overall since 1981. One other WCHA player – St. Cloud State senior goaltender Bobby Goepfert – was among the 10 finalists for the 2007 Hobey Baker award.
- Five Western Collegiate Hockey Association players earned 2006-07 RBK All-American honors. Named to the West First Team were forwards Ryan Duncan (UND) and Jonathan Toews (UND)

and defenseman Alex Goligoski (UM). Named to the West Second Team were defenseman Taylor Chorney (UND) and goaltender Bobby Goepfert (SCSU).

- St. Cloud State freshman forward Andreas Nodl was named the first winner of the Hockey Commissioners' Association (HCA) National Rookie of the Year award.
- Three WCHA head coaches – Dave Hakstol of North Dakota, Bob Motzko of St. Cloud State and Jamie Russell of Michigan Tech – were named as finalists for the American Hockey Coaches' Association 2007 Spencer Penrose Award as Division 1 men's hockey coach of the year.
- WCHA post-season awards, announced on March 15 at the annual league awards banquet at RiverCentre in Saint Paul, went to: UND forward Ryan Duncan as WCHA Player of the Year and WCHA Scoring Champion; CC defenseman Lee Sweatt as WCHA Outstanding Student-Athlete of the Year; UM defenseman Alex Goligoski as WCHA Defensive Player of the Year; SCSU forward Andreas Nodl as WCHA Rookie of the Year; and to St. Cloud State's Bob Motzko and Michigan Tech's Jamie Russell as WCHA co-Coach of the Year. Also announced were the league's All-WCHA First, Second and Third Teams and the WCHA All-Rookie Team.
- A total of 20 male student-athletes were honored as WCHA Scholar-Athletes in 2006-07, including repeat honorees Scott McCulloch (CC), Lee Sweatt (CC), Zach Blom (DU), Steven Cook (DU), J.D. Corbin (DU), Daniel King (DU), Tyler Skworchinski (MTU), Evan Kaufmann (UM), Joel Hansen (MSU), Erik Fabian (UND), and Nate Raduns (SCSU).
- A total of 88 conference student-athletes, representing all 10 member teams, earned recognition on the men's 2006-07 All-WCHA Academic Team. Fifty of the 88 were repeat honorees from 2005-06.
- The 10 finalists selected for the men's hockey division of 2006-07 Lowe's Senior Class Award were announced on Feb. 28 and the group included University of Denver goaltender Glenn Fisher and St. Cloud State forward Nate Raduns. Finalists were selected from a list of 30 candidates based on personal qualities that define a complete student-athlete. The criteria to determine the top ten included the areas of classroom, character and community in addition to performance in the hockey rink during this season.
- Two long-standing WCHA player records were broken in 2006-07. North Dakota forward Chris Porter set a new conference standard for most consecutive games played at 175, breaking the previous mark of 171 held by UW's John Johansson (1980-84) and CC's Calvin Elfring (1994-98). Minnesota senior goaltender Kellen Briggs, meanwhile, broke the WCHA record for most career victories by earning his 84th on March 24 in the Golden Gophers' 4-3 NCAA West Regional win over Air Force. The previous mark of 83 was

set by UM's Adam Hauser from 1998-2002.

- Former University of Minnesota hockey player Gary Gambucci was inducted into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame on Oct. 7 in St. Paul.
- Minnesota freshman forward Jay Barriball was the CSTV/HCA National Div. 1 Rookie of the Month for October, 2006.
- SCSU freshman forward Ryan Lasch was the HCA/CSTV National Rookie of the Month for November, 2006.
- North Dakota forward Jonathan Toews earned a Gold Medal with Canada at the 2007 IIHF World Junior Championship in Sweden over Christmas-New Year's, while 11 other WCHA players earned Bronze Medals with Team USA. They were: Mike Carman (UM), Taylor Chorney (UND), Jeff Frazee (UM), Blake Geoffrion (UW), Erik Johnson (UM), Brian Lee (UND), Jamie McBain (UW), Kyle Okposo (UM), Jack Skille (UW), Ryan Stoa (UM), and Bill Sweatt (CC).
- Three WCHA student-athletes – MSU's Chad Brownlee, UW's Andrew Joudrey and SCSU's Nate Raduns – were among the 13 nominees for the 2007 Hockey Humanitarian Award. Joudrey was then named one of five finalists.
- SCSU freshman forward Andreas Nodl was the HCA/CSTV National Rookie of the Month for December, 2006.
- Three former WCHA players – UND's Jason Blake and UW's Dany Heatley and Brian Rafalski – skated in the 55th Annual National Hockey League All-Star Game in Dallas on Jan. 24.
- Four former WCHA players – DU's Matt Carle, UM's Phil Kessel and Thomas Vanek, and UND's Zach Parise – participated in the NHL Youngstars Game on Jan. 23.
- Michigan Tech forward Mike Batovanja was an honorable mention for the first annual Derek Hines Unsung Hero Award, presented by the Hockey Commissioners' Association. The award went to Dartmouth senior Dan Schribman.
- Former Colorado College and Wisconsin hockey coach Jeff Sauer led the 2007 U.S. Deaflympic Ice Hockey Team to a gold medal at the 16th Winter Deaflympics, held Feb. 1-10, in Salt Lake City, Utah, after finishing the round-robin tournament with a 4-1-0 record. The gold medal represented the United States' fifth medal in as many attempts at the Deaflympics.
- Former Colorado College coach John Matchefts was named winner of the John 'Snooks' Kelley Founders Award on January 9 by the American Hockey Coaches' Association. Named after the famed Boston College coach, this award honors those people in the coaching profession who have contributed to the overall growth and development of the sport of ice hockey in the United States. Matchefts was a team captain and two-time All-American at Michigan, playing varsity hockey from 1951-53 and his playing career also included a number of years on the U.S. National Team, including the 1952 and 1956 (silver medal) Olympic Teams.
- As the battle for the National Hockey League's Stanley Cup got underway in mid-April, a look at the 30 NHL-member teams found their 2006-07 rosters dotted with 74 former Western Collegiate Hockey Association players.

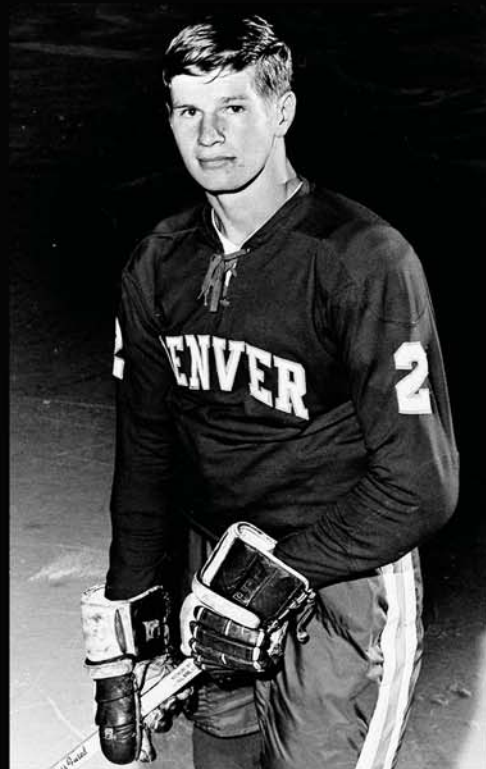

1958 NCAA NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

DU Whips Nodaks 6-2, Wins Ice Crown

MINNEAPOLIS - A super-charged University of Denver team routed North Dakota 6-2 Saturday night to win the national championship of collegiate hockey.

The Pioneers, who shook off a 1-0 first period deficit, put out enough human effort to win two ordinary games as they came pounding back with three quick goals in the second period and three more in the third.

Coach Murray Armstrong's crew saved its best all-around performance of the season for its most important game.

Although beaten three times in four Western Intercollegiate Hockey League games by the Nodaks earlier in the season, the razor-sharp Pioneers skated like demons and passed with precision to defeat their old nemesis.

The pressure of a championship game had little effect on the Redshirts. All six DU goals were scored by different players, but if individuals had to be singled out, they would have to be Jim Brown and Murray Massier, the tournament's most valuable player.

A crowd of 7,878 watched the Pioneers win their first NCAA title as they played in their first tournament in the 11-year history of the event.

Denver had trouble getting started in the first period and trailed 1-0. But the Pioneers loosened up the rugged Sioux defenses with some crisp, long passes and scored three goals in 3:40 midway in the second period.

While 3,000 North Dakota fans sat in silent disbelief, Denver pounded in two consolation goals to make it "no contest."

North Dakota's first period goal came on a 40-foot shot by Ed Thomlinson, which deflected off the skate of a Pioneer defender and slid into the net.

Brown opened Denver's middle period by picking up a loose puck in front of the Sioux cage and drilling a 20-footer into the corner of the net with 7:18 gone.

The Murray Massier-Bruce Walker-Walt Dingwell line, which had scored only three goals in Denver's last five games, scored two goals 19 seconds apart to send the Pioneers into a 3-1 lead.

Walker hit the first one as he swept in on North Dakota goalie Bob Peabody and caged a backhander from close range after a double assist from Dingwell and Massier.

But Massier, a pressure proof 150-pound sophomore, tapped in the killing goal at 7:18 as he poked the bouncing puck past Peabody.

Barry Sharp, one of only three seniors on the Denver team, and Denny Slinn, tacked on the icing to pad out the score.

Schneck, who made 19 saves in the first two periods, was credited with only two in the final round as Denver dominated offensive play.

DU Atop Pinnacle of College Icers

BOSTON - University of Denver now stands unmatched as THE hockey power of American colleges.

The Pioneers wound up their third consecutive highly-successful season Saturday night, winning the NCAA Championship with a 5-3 victory over Michigan Tech.

Five years ago, DU's hockey program tottered precariously following years of frustration.

But then came Coach Murray Armstrong, and after one building season, one of the most impressive records in collegiate annuals.

The accomplishments in the last three seasons:

Two national championships, 74 wins against only 19 losses and six ties and 270,000 paid admissions at DU Arena.

The reasons: Good talent, good coaching, good promotion.

"In the overall picture, I had a lot of good material," Armstrong said in summing up the season. "And I think all of the boys played up to their capability."

"There may never be another college team assembled with as much ability and color as this one."

All but six players on this year's squad return next fall including three Western Collegiate Hockey Association All-stars George Kirkwood, Marty Howe and Bill Masterton, one second-team pick, George Konik, and the club's top goal scorer, Jerry Walker.

Seniors John MacMillan, Bruce Walker, Con Collie, Murray MacDonald, Ray Hamlin and Al Barnhill will be hard to replace, but up from the freshman ranks are a half-dozen topnotch prospects.

Chances of the 1960-61 team matching this season's record are slim, however. The Pioneers won the WCHA title by two full games with a 17-4-1 record, had a 3-0-2 mark against Olympic teams and were 27-4-3 for the entire season.

"We really started to play well against the Olympic teams," Armstrong said. "We got our defense working right and our record against those clubs gave us a big lift. From then on we played good hockey."

The redshirts were not at their superb best in Saturday night's championship game; yet they were the better team in the tension-filled third period.

"I don't think we made a mistake in the last period," Armstrong said, "the boys really skated hard."

DU Breezes to Hockey Title

DENVER - Denver's "dream team" turned the 14th NCAA hockey championship finale into a night-mare for St. Lawrence Saturday night by lambasting the Larries 12-2 at DU Arena.

A deliriously happy crowd of 5,363 watched the Pioneers capture their second straight national title with their finest game of the season.

The triumph marked the Pioneers 30th win in 32 starts overall, and their 25th in a row without a defeat.

They have lost only one game over their last 52 starts over a two-season span.

Heading a host of Pioneer heroes was their all-America center and the tournament's most valuable player, captain Bill Masterton, who scored three goals and two assists.

Defenseman Grant Munro and wing Trent Beatty, both all-tournament choices, tallied two goals and two assists apiece.

Other Pioneers scoring goals in the Denver fusillade were Jerry Walker, all-tournament selection, Jerry Duffus, George Konik, Ken Williamson and Terry Lomnes.

The victory marked the third national championship in four years for Coach Murray Armstrong who has dubbed this "the finest college hockey team I have ever seen."

The Pioneers won their previous titles in 1958 in Minneapolis, and last year in Boston.

A total of 19,826 fans watched the four games in the three-day tournament, a mark surpassed only by the 22,950 who saw the 1958 tourney in Minneapolis.

Walker's goal and three assists firmly established him as the top western college scorer of all time with 85 points. Masterton equaled the former mark of 80 held jointly by Minnesota's John Mayasich and Colorado College's Bill (Red) Hay, now a Chicago Black Hawk star.

Rounding out their Denver careers was the fabulous "Senior Six," composed of Masterton, Konik, Munro, Marty Howe and Paul Josephson.

The Pioneers had 18 assists for a total of 30 points in the contest.

The elated Armstrong, surrounded by well wishers in the dressing room, said "with a bunch of boys like this, you can't miss."

He said he rated the triumph on a par with the thrill he received in tying the Russians 4-4 in Colorado Springs in 1959.

Herb Gallagher, Northeastern University coach and head of the NCAA Hockey Rules Committee said "I've seen a lot of college and amateur teams in my time, but never one that could match this Denver outfit."

The game opened at a furious tempo with seven goals scored in the opening stanza and the crowd roared its approval at the swiftness of action.

St. Lawrence startled DU supporters by taking a 1-0 lead at 1:29 when John Mason's shot from eight feet out caught the left corner of the net.

Masterton hit the right hand corner of the Larries' cage on a six-footer to equalize for Denver at the 3:19 mark.

Beatty sent Denver into the lead at 7:21 when he rebounded Masterton's shot after a similar long shot by Munro.

Walker notched his 56th goal of the season at 12:09 on a pass from Beatty for the third Denver goal of the stanza. But the Larries came right back to narrow the margin to 3-2 when Buster Dower converted all-America Terry Slater's pass on a two-on-one situation at 13:14.

Jerry Duffus blasted home a 50-footer at the 14:51 mark and Masterton grabbed hold of a Munro shot sliding past the St. Lawrence net, whirled and fired the puck past the Larries' goalie for the fifth score at 15:49.

The Pioneers exploded for four more goals in the second period with a quarter of the DU icers breaking into the scoring.

Beatty tallied his second goal of the evening at 5:33 and moments later Munro made it 7-2 when he added another marker at 6:57.

Two penalties to the Larries star defenseman Arlin Parker cost the Saints a pair of goals when Konik scored at 11:36 and Williamson ripped home another marker at 17:47.

The period had an added fillip for the fans in the awarding of the second penalty shot in as many weeks to a visiting team.

Konik tripped the Saints' Rollie Anderson at the 5:13 mark. Anderson roared in on Kirkwood on the penalty attempt. But the Pioneer goalie niftily turned the shot aside to the roar of the fans.

DU Sextet Wins NCAA Title

DULUTH, Minn. - The University of Denver hockey team survived one of its bitterest battles to capture one of its finest honors here Saturday night, smashing four goals in the final period to beat North Dakota 4-0 and win the fourth NCAA national championship in DU history.

DU's other titles, all under Coach Murray Armstrong, were in 1958, 1960 and 1961, while finishing second twice and third once in seven appearances.

But the victory, Denver's 22nd straight to complete a 28-5-1 season, came like extracting ore from a stubborn vein.

While a crowd of 5,453 sent sound waves rolling through Duluth Arena, the two Western Collegiate Hockey Association teams slammed at each other in one of the season's most bristling defensive duels.

Then just when it appeared things were headed for a possible sudden-death showdown, Denver's Bob Trembecky crashed the Sioux defense for two goals in the third period. It was like removing the key log in a big river jam as the Pioneers, a bit shaky early, took on a vicious smoothness that left no doubts they were now back in the throne room after a seven-year absence.

Goalie Gerry Powers was brilliant in recording the first shutout in NCAA tournament history and earning the meet's most valuable player honors. He vacuumed up everything the Sioux could hurl at him and he and Mike Curran, his North Dakota counterpart, rewarded the near sellout with a tremendous show as each made one fantastic save after another.

The goalies and both defenses packed a season's worth of thrills into the fast but scoreless first two periods.

Denver opened on much the same uncertain and off-key note that featured Pioneer play against Boston College in Thursday's 4-1 semifinal win. Passing was off, DU overskated the puck, and was caught offside to break up timing. But as the game wore on the Pioneers smoothed things out and by the end of the second period, while the Sioux rooters were pleading just above him, Curran was under tremendous pressure.

Terry Abram, John Markis, Terry Ogden and the rest of the Sioux defense hurled back DU sorties at one end of the ice while Dale Zeman, Keith Magnuson, Rich Blanche, Randy Ward, Tim Gould and Ed Hamilton were battering Sioux attackers at the other.

There were frequent spots where two and three hockey sticks just slithered across the ice - with their owners prone following a vicious check. It was no place for the faint-hearted.

Curran and Powers, meanwhile, treated the tournament's first good crowd to superb work in the nets, each meeting and mastering breakaways as well as halting the rapid-fire rebound attempts the Sioux and Pioneers got off on the rare times they could muscle through the other's defense.

DU was outshot and outskated for one of the few times this season in the first 20 minutes when the Sioux bombed Powers for 12 shots on goal while Curran saved six. Both clubs survived penalties in both periods, with North Dakota once escaping a 25-second stretch late in the first period while they were two men down.

All three of Denver's explosive scoring lines figured in the scoring in Denver's march to the crown. Jim Shires rapped home a pair of goals for the Tom Miller line to lead Thursday's win over BC, and then the other two took care of the scoreboard Saturday.

It was Denver's fourth win in five meetings with the Sioux this year.

1969 NCAA NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

DU Captures NCAA Ice Crown

COLORADO SPRINGS - The University of Denver's irresistible force cracked the immovable object, and the Pioneers captured their fifth NCAA hockey championship with a pressurized 4-3 victory over Cornell here Saturday night.

Third period goals by Bob Trembecky and Tom Miller shattered a tense bitter duel in which Cornell goalie Ken Dryden and Denver's Gerry Powers frustrated the shooters.

Cornell, however, showed they can skate with anyone, as the Big Red turned this 22nd national championship into one of the tightest duels in NCAA hockey history. Cornell twice overcame one-goal leads to tie DU at 1-1 and 2-2.

They struck back late in the third period on a goal by Gordon Lowe, the hero of Friday's win over Michigan Tech. It came with 1:20 left in the game and created a finish that had a record throng of 4,625 on its feet and roaring the entire last 80 seconds.

With DU ahead 4-2 and just nursing the margin with a magnificent defense, a double penalty created an opening. It sent off both Denver's Dale Zeman and Cornell's Daniel Lodboa for roughing, leaving both teams with four men and a goalie on the ice.

Lowe's long slapshot from the left point sailed past Powers 57 seconds later to make it 4-3. Then with 32 seconds left and Denver having to contend with a faceoff to the right of its own net, Cornell's Coach Ned Harkness pulled Dryden and sent in an extra attacker.

This had the effect of leaving Denver a man short for that hectic closing minute. But the Pioneers successfully defended their title and a long clearing pass almost found the open Cornell net 10 seconds from the close.

Powers was mobbed as his happy teammates started to celebrate the Pioneers' fifth title in Coach Murray Armstrong's 13 years on the Hilltop. DU beat North Dakota 4-0 a year ago and also won in 1958, 1960 and 1961.

Cornell, in the tournament for the third straight year, took the 1967 title.

All-American Keith Magnuson and George Morrison touched off another wild roar from the fans when they treated Armstrong to a ride around the rink to a rolling wave of applause.

It was a sparkling team effort on both sides with Denver featuring many of the same architects of its 1968 win. Powers, voted to the all-tournament first team for the second straight year, refused to yield to Cornell's desperate comeback efforts.

Magnuson wrapped up a brilliant college career by leading Denver defense that smothered many Cornell sorties, and Trembecky, who scored the first two goals in the 1968 championship game, delivered the tie-breaker to put DU ahead 3-2 Saturday after scoring twice in Thursday's 9-2 conquest of Harvard.

The clubs finished a swift first period deadlocked at 1-1 after DU seized an early lead on a goal by Tom Gilmore with just 2:41 played and Cornell struck back with a power play score by Lodboa at the midway point.

The Pioneers came out storming and slashed into Cornell to dominate the opening 10 minutes and force Dryden into a half dozen pressure stops from close range.

DU did a good job of forechecking the Cornell wide men to force defensemen to bring the puck up the middle and squeeze them there. It took away the wings the Big Red had used to advantage in Friday's 4-3 overtime conquest of Michigan Tech.

Gilmore scored when he deflected a long shot by Lynn Powis. It first caromed off a Cornell defenseman and then into the nets on the ice off Dryden's glove to touch off the crowd.

But DU's continuing control ended on a call by Referee Andy Gambucci, who whistled Gilmore for tripping behind his own net.

Where DU had failed to capitalize on an early Cornell penalty, the Big Red wasn't about to let the chance slip away. Lodboa tied things when he ricocheted a shot in off the right pipe with 13.9 played.

Cornell again used a defensive lapse by Denver to battle back into a 2-2 tie in a second period that, if anything, was even faster than the first.

Powers and Dryden both met sustained pressure. The Cornell goalkeeper finally succumbed to an overwhelming barrage with DU on the power play midway in the period. Morrison on the left corner of the crease poked home a rebound - his 40th goal of the year - from Tom Miller's three-footer on the right.

Just moments earlier, first Bill Pettinger and then George Morrison had poured shots in on the Big Red goalie from eyeball-to-eyeball range, and Keith Magnuson had forced him in to a kick save on a hard slap from the right point.

But the Big Red, which had dominated stretches of the period, particularly at the start, then caught DU defenseman Ed Hamilton sprawled at mid-ice and sent a two-on-one sweep in on Powers. Brian Cornell, leading scorer for the team all year, was just eight feet in front when he lashed a shot home off a fine feed by Peter Tufford. The goal came with 12:28 played.

Fantastic Finish

BOSTON - It's been 35 years and, for some, too long to remember since collegiate hockey in Denver felt so fine.

With a glorious, yet outdated history in a sport that recently has been dominated in Denver with a capital "A," the Pioneers, on Saturday night, beautifully connected the past to the present with a monumental update against top-ranked Maine in the NCAA championship game.

The Black Bears' 10-game winning streak is history, and DU traditionalist and current crop of young followers feel a Mile High.

"Wow," DU coach George Gwozdecky said. "It's a great story."

Before the largest hockey crowd in FleetCenter history (18,597), DU got a goal from sophomore Gabe Gauthier midway through the first period and sensational goaltending from Adam Berkhoel (24 saves) to topple Maine 1-0 in what might be its biggest victory ever.

The Pioneers (27-12-5) are national champions for the sixth time, but first since 1969.

"We're very proud," said Gwozdecky, whose team withstood a 6-on-3 disadvantage in the final minute to preserve its lead. "The way the game finished, I thought was pretty symbolic of the way our season has been. We haven't made it easy."

DU went 5-0 since being eliminated from the first round of the Western Collegiate Hockey Association playoffs. The Pioneers allowed just five goals during that span, which included upsets over WCHA champion North Dakota (1-0) and league runner-up Minnesota Duluth (5-3). The Pioneers, who stood seventh in the 10-team WCHA in January, went 13-2-2 in their final 17 games.

"Looking back when it was darkest for us back in January, this team was led by our captain, Ryan Caldwell," Gwozdecky said. "He showed great, great leadership, great character and we persevered and battled back in January and February, and again tonight in that last minute and a half."

Berkhoel, a senior, was named Most Outstanding Player of the tournament, and he was joined on the all-tournament team by Caldwell, a senior defenseman, and DU senior forward Connor James.

James, who returned to the lineup in Thursday's Frozen Four semifinal after missing nearly five weeks with a broken leg, assisted on Gauthier's team-leading 18th goal 12:26 into the first period.

After James outworked a defender to gain control of the puck in the corner, he found Gauthier at the top of the crease. Gauthier, who had no defender near him, found an opening through Jimmy Howard's legs and wristed the puck past the All-American goalie. Howard, the ringleader to the NCAA's top-rated defense,

led the country in goals-against average (1.19) and saves percentage (.957) coming into the game.

"Words can't describe how I'm feeling," said James, who figured his collegiate career was over after fracturing his right fibula on March 5. "We have every piece of the puzzle, every type of player, and we are a close-knit team. I'm pretty pumped up right now. It's the most exciting thing to happen to me."

DU's tally came 7:21 following Maine's disallowed goal. The Black Bears, after seemingly capitalizing on the first penalty of the game, had what looked like an honest goal by Derek Damon waved off because another Maine player had a skate in the crease.

"Anytime something like that happens it usually shifts the momentum," Maine coach Tim Whitehead said. "I haven't seen the replay so I can't comment, but there are lots of swings in momentum in the game. Not too many when the score is 1-0."

The unforgiving rule was abandoned by the NHL a few years ago.

"That was the turning point of the game, and they deserved that goal," Berkhoel said. "I'm not saying I want to give them the championship... but I really feel that they weren't obstructing me and scored a legitimate goal that I didn't read very well."

The Pioneers, who were 20-3 when leading after two periods, made it interesting in the waning minutes. Junior defenseman Matt Laatsch and Gauthier took penalties with 2:09 left in the game and 35 seconds later to allow Maine to finish the period on a 5-on-3 power play. The Black Bears pulled Howard for a sixth attacker with 1:18 left, doubling their arsenal compared to DU.

"Your best penalty killer is your goalie, Caldwell said. "It was fun hanging on behind him and letting him go."

Some errant Bears' passes, terrific Berkhoel saves and a few gutsy blocked shots by DU forwards, preserved the lead and led to a wild celebration, fitting for a team that wasn't expected to be here.

"To see a group of guys come so far over a long season is just amazing to me," Caldwell said.

Maine (33-8-3) also lost in the 2002 title game to Minnesota. "Obviously, it hurts a lot to have been here twice over the last three years and come up one goal short each time," Whitehead said. "But it was a tremendous win for Denver. They showed a lot of courage and a lot of heart to even get this far and to win it in a great game."

Prodigies on Ice Repeat DU's Feat

COLUMBUS, Ohio - Back-to-back, baby!

Freshmen goalie Peter Mannino and classmate Paul Stastny watched the University of Denver capture the 2004 NCAA hockey championship as wide-eyed signed recruits.

Saturday, the rookies signed, sealed and delivered the Pioneers to their second consecutive national title and seventh in program history by spearheading a 4-1 victory over North Dakota in the finale of the Frozen Four.

Mannino had a career-high 44 saves before a Value City Arena crowd of 17,155. And Stastny, a second-line center, had two goals and one assist.

The son of former NHL Hall of Famer Peter Stastny notched the game-winner midway through the second period and gave the Pioneers a two-goal cushion 8:19 into the third.

"Our freshmen stepped up tonight and just really played well," said DU senior wing Luke Fulghum of Colorado Springs. "This is such an unbelievable feeling. I cannot put into words how special this moment feels right now."

Mannino and Stastny made the all-Frozen Four team along with DU defensemen Brett Skinner and Matt Carle and center Gabe Gauthier, who added an empty-net goal to finish as the NCAA Tournament's leading scorer with five goals and 11 points in four games.

Mannino followed former DU goalie Adam Berkhoel as Most Outstanding Player.

"Seeing Berkhoel do this last year gave me a goal," said Mannino, who is 18-4-1 in his young career. "I dreamed about it. I set goals real high, especially after seeing how well our team was playing at mid-season."

DU finished 32-9-2 and on a nine-game winning streak. The Pioneers, who began defense of their crown 5-5, have won eight consecutive NCAA Tournament games and are now tied with North Dakota (25-15-5) with the country's second most titles. Michigan leads with nine.

"We're kind of like Tiger Woods of golf right now," said Fulghum, who had two goals in Thursday's Frozen Four semifinal win over Colorado College. "We're really getting it done. They had a lot of doubts about us last year, and we snuck up on them. But this year, everyone wanted a shot at us and we still got it done."

DU coach George Gwozdecky started the game with Stastny's line, which includes freshman Ryan Dingle, and freshman Andrew Thomas at one blue-line position.

"Knowing the kind of player I was, I marvel at most players," Gwozdecky joked. "But kidding aside, this freshman class that Steve Miller and Seth Appert put together a few years ago in my mind is the best freshman class in our 11 years at Denver and perhaps the most effective freshmen class that I've ever had the opportunity to coach."

Denver led 1-0 early and 2-1 going into the second period. The seven-time NCAA champion finished the season 26-1-1 when scoring first and 30-0-1 when tied or leading after two periods.

Jeff Drummond also scored for DU. He followed a Kevin Ulanski shot from beside the net that caromed off Sioux defenseman Matt Smaby's skate and hammered the loose puck in to make it 1-0 6:15 into the game.

North Dakota tied it at 9:52 on the power play. Travis Zajac redirected a Nick Fuher shot through Mannino's legs. But at 10:08 of the second period, Stastny, skating between the circles on the power play, made it 2-1 with a roofed-redirect of Ulanski's slap shot from the point.

Stastny made it 3-1 with 11:41 to go in regulation with a one-timer from the right circle and Gauthier produced his team-leading 26th goal in the final minute.

Mannino made 23 saves in the third period.

"Manno' looks older than me and he's so mature," said DU senior and captain Matt Laatsch. "He's our on-ice leader and he calms guys down and is an opposing force back there. Stastny, same type of deal. He plays like senior and he has a great touch for the puck and knack for the net. Both those guys

are future NHLers."

DU improved to 7-2 in NCAA title games and 25-13 in all national tournament contests. The Pioneers are 4-1 against the Sioux on the national stage. The teams also played for the 1958, 1963 and 1968 NCAA championships.

DU has won every time but 1963.

The MacNaughton Cup

Dating back more than 90 years to its original purchase in 1913, handcrafted of pure silver, standing three-feet high, and weighing more than 40 pounds, the MacNaughton Cup is the shining symbol of the Western Collegiate Hockey Association, and of its long-time standing as one of college hockey's premier conferences.

The MacNaughton Cup is awarded annually to the winner of the regular season championship, and as a traveling trophy, is on display throughout the course of each season at the home of the previous year's winner.

The MacNaughton Cup has gone to the WCHA's regular season winner on all but seven occasions since 1951. In 1962, 1963, 1964 and 1965, the Cup was presented to the league playoff winner. In 1982, 1983 and 1984, the trophy left the league with MacNaughton Cup custodian Michigan Tech and went to the champion of the CCHA.

Since the league's founding in 1951, nine different member schools have won the MacNaughton Cup, while Colorado College (1994, 1995 and 1996) and North Dakota (1997 co-, 1998 and 1999) are the only schools to have won the trophy three straight times. The Pioneers rank second in the WCHA with 12 regular-season championships.

The Broadmoor Trophy

One of the Western Collegiate Hockey Association's two major championship trophies is the statu-
esque and highly sought-after Broadmoor Trophy, which has been awarded annually since 1985
to the winner of the conference's postseason playoff championship tournament.

The Broadmoor Trophy itself dates to 1981 when it was first presented to the conference by the world-
renowned Broadmoor Hotel and Resort Complex in Colorado Springs, Colo.

For the first three seasons of its partnership with the WCHA (1981-1984) – and due to the departure of
league member and MacNaughton Cup (regular season championship trophy) custodian Michigan Tech
to the CCHA – the Broadmoor Trophy was presented to the Association's regular season champion.

But when the Huskies returned to the WCHA fold in 1984 – with the MacNaughton Cup in hand – the
Broadmoor Trophy became, and has remained since, the symbol of the league's postseason tournament
championship.

Long an ardent supporter of college hockey, the Broadmoor Hotel included the former Broadmoor World
Arena, which hosted the NCAA Ice Hockey Championship a total of 11 times between 1948 and 1969.

Denver and Minnesota lead all WCHA schools with 14 playoff championships each.

FORMER COACHES AND STAFF



Vern Turner (1949-51) 15-24-1 (.367)

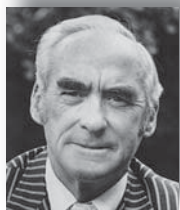
Vern Turner was the first coach to lead a varsity hockey program at Denver. Turner was born in Staner, Ontario. He began his playing career at the age of 12 in 1911 and played 23 years as a goalie. His playing days included seasons with the Duluth Hornets, where he was named an all-star goalie from 1913 to 1926. Prior to his appointment as head coach at Denver, he served as the rink manager and advisory coach. Before coming to Denver, Turner was manager of the Broadmoor Ice Palace in Colorado Springs, Colo., for seven years. At the Broadmoor, he was responsible for putting the Ice Palace on the map. Turner also organized hockey leagues for grade school, high school and college students.



Neil Celley (1951-56) 81-43-6 (.646)

Neil Celley was the youngest mentor in the game when he assumed the head coaching job in Denver at the age of 24. A native of Eveleth, Minn., Celley won all-state honors at Eveleth High School before starring at the University of Michigan for four years (1947-51). He earned NCAA all-tournament team honors in 1950-51 when the Wolverines defeated Brown 7-1 for their first national title. Celley led all Michigan scorers that

season, earning All-American accolades and the team's most valuable player award. In a strange quirk of fate, he notched a hat trick against Denver during the 1951 regular season and coached some of those same Pioneers to victory over his alma mater the following year. Celley was also a member of the 1948 U.S. Olympic team that competed in St. Moritz, Switzerland.



Murray Armstrong (1956-77) 460-215-31 (.674)

One of the greatest coaches to teach the college game, "The Chief" led the Pioneers to 11 NCAA Frozen Four appearances, including five national championships and three second-place finishes. Guiding his teams to eight WCHA titles, the Pioneers surpassed Armstrong's minimum expectation level of a .500 winning percentage 18 of 21 seasons. He played in the NHL for the Toronto Maple Leafs, New York Americans, and

Detroit Red Wings from 1936-46. From 1947-56, he coached the Regina Pats at the Canadian Junior A level before arriving in Denver. Among the many highlights of Armstrong's coaching career are the first national title in 1958, the historic 4-4 tie with the Russian National Team in 1959, the 1960-61 squad which posted an incredible 30-1-1 record, the 1959-60 tie and victory over the eventual gold-medal U.S. Olympic Team, and the dramatic 4-3 upset win over Cornell for the 1969 NCAA championship. Twice honored as WCHA Coach of the Year (1960-61, 67-68), he also copped the Spencer Penrose Award as the NCAA Division I Coach of the Year in 1961. Armstrong's contributions to the game did not go unnoticed by the National Hockey League - in 1977 he was awarded the Lester Patrick Trophy for "outstanding service to hockey in the United States." One of the finest tributes paid to Armstrong upon his retirement came from longtime-Denver sportswriter Dick Connor, who said, "He has been to college hockey what only a handful ever are to other sports--a John Wooden to basketball, for instance, a Woody Hayes or Bear Bryant to football. An era ends. We won't see another like him." On August 3, 1990, a life-size bronze sculpture of Armstrong was unveiled in conjunction with the Pioneer Hockey 40th Reunion. Sculpted by former Pioneer hockey player Steve Landis ('67), the statue is now featured in the Ritchie Center's west concourse. Today, Armstrong resides with his wife, Freda, in Venice, Fla.



Marshall Johnston (1977-81) 89-63-7 (.582)

Marshall Johnston guided the Pioneers for four seasons before becoming an assistant coach with the NHL's New Jersey Devils in 1981. Johnston played right wing under Murray Armstrong as a student at the University from 1959-63. He captained the Pioneer squad in 1962-63 that captured a WCHA title and placed second in the NCAA Tournament. Johnston played on the 1964 Canadian Olympic squad and captained

Canada's 1968 bronze-medal team. Following his Olympic years, Johnston played professionally in the Minnesota North Stars organization (1968-70) and for the California Seals (1971-73). He became the Seals' head coach in 1974 before returning to Denver again in 1975 to assist his former mentor, Murray Armstrong. When Armstrong retired after the '76-77 campaign, Johnston was named head coach. He led the Pioneers to a 33-6-1 mark and a ninth WCHA championship, earning him '77-78 WCHA Coach of the Year honors. The 33 victories and .846 winning percentage were the second highest in school history, but the team was denied a trip to the NCAA Frozen Four due to a mandatory one-year probation issued by the NCAA. Johnston was the general manager of the National Hockey League's Ottawa Senators three seasons ago and was most recently the Director of Player Evaluation for the Chicago Blackhawks.



Ralph Backstrom (1981-90) 182-174-14 (.511)

Ralph Backstrom coached the Pioneers to six winning seasons during his nine-year tenure. Backstrom came to Denver after an outstanding professional career in the NHL (six Stanley Cup championships with the Montreal Canadians) and the WHA. He was an assistant coach at Denver for three seasons (1977-80) and for the NHL's Los Angeles Kings (1980-81) before assuming the head job at DU. Backstrom's finest year was 1985-86

when he coached the Pioneers to the WCHA regular season and playoff championships, and an NCAA Frozen Four appearance in Providence, R.I. The team's 34 wins marked the most victories in a season by a Pioneer team. Backstrom earned WCHA Coach of the Year honors and garnered the Spencer Penrose Award as the NCAA Division I ice hockey coach of the year. He was the head coach of the International Hockey League's Phoenix Roadrunners in the early 1990s before serving as president of Roller Hockey International, a roller-hockey league he founded. He currently resides in Denver and scouts for the St. Louis Blues and owns the Colorado Eagles of the Central Hockey League.



Frank Serratore (1990-94) 49-92-9 (.357)

Frank Serratore helped bring a struggling program back to respectability on and off the ice. Taking over a program that was outdated in many respects compared to other top Division I programs, Frank took the program into the 21st century. He made great improvements to the hockey facilities, upgrading the DU Arena appearance and the locker room, while adding a first-class weight room and players' lounge. He strengthened the relationship with alumni by tapping into the Pioneers' rich hockey tradition. He was responsible for the erection of the Murray Armstrong statue that used to sit outside of the DU Arena, as well as for the photo plaques of all the Pioneers' All-Americans, Olympians and professional players that decorated the walls around the lobby of the arena. The greatest success of the Serratore era was fan support. In his first season, home attendance had dipped to a low 70-percent capacity level. When his tenure ended, attendance was up to a 93-percent capacity level, one of the top marks in the nation for Division I hockey. Although his record didn't show it, Serratore began the process of returning Denver to national prominence. He recruited two players currently in the NHL and presently serves as the head hockey coach at the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colo.

ALL-AMERICANS

Since the beginning of University of Denver hockey in 1949, 33 individuals have been recognized with 40 All-American honors. From that group of 33, seven players earned All-America status twice. The first were Marty Howe and Bill Masterton in 1960 and 1961, as they led the Pioneers to back-to-back national titles. The others who received the prestigious honor twice were Wayne Smith (1965, 1966), Jim Wiste (1967, 1968), Keith Magnuson (1968, 1969), George Morrison (1969, 1970) and 2006 Hobey Baker Award winner Matt Carle (2005, 2006).

The first Denver player to receive the honor was defenseman Eddie Miller in 1952. Six Pioneers have earned All-American honors since 2002. Goaltender Wade Dubielewicz (2002), defensemen Ryan Caldwell (2004), Matt Carle (2005, 2006) and Brett Skinner (2005), and forwards Gabe Gauthier (2005) and Paul Stastny (2006) have earned All-American status under head coach George Gwozdecky. Dubielewicz was named second-team All-America after posting a 20-4 record with a 1.72 goals against average and .943 saves percentage in 2001-02, and Caldwell was named a first-team JOFA All-American in 2004 after scoring 15 goals to lead Denver to its first NCAA title since 1969. Carle, Skinner and Gauthier were named CCM West All-Americans after helping the Pioneers to back-to-back NCAA national championships in 2005. Carle and Paul Stastny earned RBK West All-America honors in 2006.

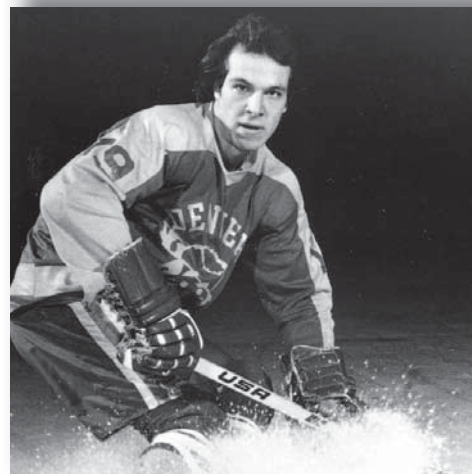
