The Series: DSU leads 4-1

Delaware State Head Coach Rod Milstead (Delaware State, '92): The former Hornet All-America offensive lineman and National Football League standout is in his first season as head coach at his alma mater. This is his first collegiate head coach position. Milstead served as Delaware State's offensive line coach in 2014 and held the same position at DSU's Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference rival North Carolina Central in 2013. Following his playing career with the Hornets, Milstead competed for the NFL's Dallas Cowboys, Cleveland Browns, San Francisco 49ers and Washington Redskins.

SSU Head Coach Eric Raeburn (Mount Union, '94) is in his third year as head coach of the Tigers. He has an overall record of 7-20 at the school. Prior to accepting the SSU job, Raeburn was head coach at NCAA Div. III Wabash College (Ind.) for eight seasons. While at Wabash, he posted an overall record of 78-13 and led the team to five NCAA playoff appearances. His 2015 squad was 12-1 and reached the Div. III playoff quarterfinals. He also served as head coach at Coe College (IA) for eight years and was an assistant coach at his alma mater, Mount Union College (OH). Raeburn is 1-0 vs. Delaware State, leading the Tigers to a 35-21 victory over the Hornets in 2017.

THE GAME

Delaware State is home for the second straight week, taking on Savannah State in a Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference contest. The Hornets cracked the win column for the first time this season with a 28-13 victory over North Carolina Central last week. Running backs Michael Chris-Ike and Brycen Alleyne rushed for more than a hundred yards and a touchdown each, and the defense allowed season-lows in points and yardage to lead the way in the homecoming win. Savannah State is also riding high after a 32-3 homecoming victory over Norfolk State last Saturday. Rashad Saxton rushed for 118 yards and a touchdown, while quarterback D'vonn Gibbons threw two touchdown passes to lead the Tigers.

THE HORNETS

The Hornets rushed for a season-high 273 yards vs. North Carolina Central last week to improve its season average to 182.9 per game, third-best in the MEAC. Brycen Alleyne is third in the league in rushing at 64.6 yards per game (452 total). Alleyne is coming off a season-best 122-yard performance in last week's NC Central contest. He's also tops in the MEAC in all-purpose yards at 127.3 per game. In addition to 452 rushing yards, Alleyne has 337 kickoff return yards, 59 receiving and 43 punt return yards. Mike Waters (jr.) is second on the Hornets with 338 rushing yards (67.6 ypg), but does not qualify in the MEAC rankings because he has missed the last three games due to injury. Despite playing in just two games, Chris-Ike is third on the team with 183 rushing yards and is tied with Alleyne for the Hornet high with two rushing touchdowns this season. He was selected as the MEAC Rookie-of-the-Week after rushing for a career-high 127 yards, including a 42-yard touchdown, on 21 carries in the North Carolina Central contest. The Hornets rank sixth in the MEAC in total offense at 307.4 yards per game. Jack McDaniels (so.) has started the last two games at quarterback for the Hornets. McDaniels has completed 57-of-114 passes for 564 yards with four touchdowns and four interceptions. He has thrown two TD passes in each of the last two games and ranks ninth in the MEAC in passing average at 94.0 yards per game. Trey Gross is tops on the Hornets and fifth in the conference in receiving yards at 52.1 per game (417 total). Gross also leads the Hornets with 26 receptions. Defensively, the Hornets rank seventh in the MEAC in yards allowed at 407.9 per game. Linebacker Brian Cavicante (jr.) leads all MEAC players in tackles at 9.1 per game (73 total). He's also tops in the conference with 14.5 tackles-for-loss. Hornet defensive back Jahad Niebauer (jr.) is tied for ninth in the MEAC at 6.4 tackles per game (51 total). Niebauer is also one of three DSU players among the MEAC leaders in passes defended (pass break-up + interceptions). He's tied for ninth in the league with seven passes defended, while teammate Keyjuan Selby is second (12) and Juwain Granger is fifth in the conference with 10.

THE TIGERS

The Tigers are fourth in the MEAC in total defense, allowing 346.4 yards per game, entering this weekend. Savannah State is second in the league in pass defense (176.9 ypg) and fifth against the run (169.6 ypg). Linebacker Mulik Simmons is tops on the Tigers and fifth in the MEAC in tackles at 7.1 per game (50 total). He's also among the league leaders in forced fumbles and passes defended. While Savannah State has struggled offensively this season, the Tigers had a solid performance in last week's victory over Norfolk State. SSU rushed for a season-high 293 yards last week. Quarterback Gibbons is a dual threat. He's the team leader and is ninth in the MEAC in rushing at 48.4 yards per game (329 total). As a passer, Gibbons has completed 36-of-80 passes (45.0%) for 514 yards with three touchdowns and three interceptions. He's ninth in the league in pass efficiency (103.8 rating) and 10th in passing average at 73.4 yards per game. Rashad Saxton Jaylen McCloud are second and third on the team in rushing yards with 289 and 236, respectively. McCloud also has a team-high four rushing touchdowns. James Kicklighter leads all Savannah State receivers with 11 catches, while Treveyon Pratt has a team-high 170 receiving yards.

THE SERIES (DSU LEADS 4-1)

This will be the sixth meeting between the teams. Delaware State holds a 4-1 series lead. Savannah State defeated the Hornets for the first time in the last meeting, posting a 35-21 victory on its home field in 2017. SSU quarterback D'Vonn Gibbons rushed for 126 yards and two touchdowns and completed 13-of-22 passes for 162 yards and a score to lead the Tigers in the contest. Hornet quarterback Keenan Black threw for 216 yards and three touchdowns, including two to Trey Gross in the meeting. Delaware State won the first four meetings between the teams, including a 35-10 triumph the last time the teams met at Alumni Stadium in 2014.

HORNET ROOKIE HONORED BY MEAC

Delaware State running back Michael Chris-Ike (fr.) has been honored by the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference for his performance in the Hornets' 28-13 homecoming victory over North Carolina Central last Saturday. Chris-Ike was selected as the MEAC Rookie-of-the-Week after rushing for a career-high 127 yards on 21 carries (6.0 ypc) in just his second collegiate game. His performance was highlighted by a 42-yard touchdown run in the second quarter to give the Hornets a 21-7 lead. For the season, the Toronto, Ontario, native has 183 yards rushing on just 31 carries for a 5.9 yard avg. He's also tied with Brycen Alleyne for the team lead with two rushing touchdowns. Chris-Ike rushed for 56 yards and a touchdown on 10 carries (5.6 ypc) in his Hornet debut at Howard on Oct. 13.



HORNETS CLIMB MEAC RUSHING CHART

Despite its record, Delaware State has emerged as one of the MEAC's top running teams this season. Entering this weekend's play, the Hornets are third in the league in rushing at 182.9 yards per game, trailing only Howard (188.0 ypg) and South Carolina State (183.1) in the conference rankings. DSU rushed for a season-best 273 yards in last week's 28-13 win over North Carolina Central. **Bryson Alleyne** (sr.) is third in the league in rushing at 64.6 yards per game (452 total). Alleyne ran for a season-high 122 yards last week to raise his career total to 1,525. He needs 245 yards in the next three games to move into 10th place on the Hornets' career rushing yardage list. DSU junior **Mike Waters** has rushed for 338 yards (67.6 pg), despite missing the last three contests. The Philadelphia, Pa., native rushed for a season-high 107 yards vs. Saint Francis on Sep. 8. and opened the season with 92 yards at FBS Buffalo. The Philadelphia, Pa., native rushed for a DSU freshman record 820 yards in 2016, but was held to just 111 during an injury-plagued sophomore season in 2017. Although he has appeared in just two games, Chris-Ike is third on the Hornets with 183 rushing yards this season.

McDANIELS RETAKES STARTING QB POST

Jack McDaniels (so.) is expected to start his third consecutive game at quarterback this weekend. McDaniels has thrown two touchdown passes in each of the last two games, including last week's win vs. North Carolina Central. He was the Hornets' starting QB in the first two games of the season before being relegated to second string the next four contests. For the season, McDaniels has completed 57-of-114 passes (50.0%) for 564 yards with four touchdowns and four interceptions this season. He was 18-for-36 for a career-high 217 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions, while rushing for a personal best 53 yards vs. South Carolina State on Oct. 20. **Keenan Black** (jr.) has started four games this season, connecting on 38-of-84 throws (45.2%) for 432 yards with two touchdowns and two picks. He's also rushed for 154 yards on 42 attempts (3.7 ypc). Black threw for a career-high 247 yards, completing 17-of-29 passes (2 TDs; 1 INT), vs. Norfolk State on Sep. 29.

The duo split time under center in 2017 and waged a battle throughout 2018 summer camp. Black was ninth in the MEAC in passing average (129.9 ypg) and pass efficiency (116.2 rating) after completing 82-of-173 passes (47.4%) for 1169 yards and 11 touchdowns in 2017. McDaniels connected on 95-of-175 throws (54.3%) for 1139 yards and three TDs a year ago.

HORNETS MAKE MOST OF KICK RETURNS AT NORFOLK STATE

Delaware State achieved a milestone on Sep. 29 when two players returned a kickoff for a touchdown in the same game for the first time in recorded team history. **Kwannah Kollie** returned a Norfolk State kickoff 93 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter and **Brycen Alleyne** followed suit with a 95-yard touchdown later in the quarter. Kollie is second in the MEAC in kickoff returns with a 23.2 yard average on 16 returns, while Alleyne is averaging 28.1 yards per return, but does not have enough to qualify in the MEAC statistical rankings.

Delaware State's 2018 opening roster included a total of 14 in-state players, tops among states. The Hornets' Delaware products are: **Brycen Alleyne** (Wilmington), **Karim Beatty** (Dover), **Tyreek Booker** (Newark); **David Bowman** (Milford), **Dwight Chavis** (Newark), **Sequan Daniels** (Woodside), **Shareef Flowers** (Bear), **Jawain Granger** (New Castle), **Brooks Parker** (Laurel), **Keyjuan Selby** (Bear), **Taronn Selby** (Bear); **Kyle Taylor** (Wilmington), **Taj Washington** (Newark), and **Shawn Wood** (New Castle). New York and New Jersey are tied for second among states with 12 players on the Hornets' 2018 roster.

LOCAL STAR SHINES IN HORNET DEBUT SEASON

No first year jitters for Delaware State freshman defensive back **David Bowman**, a former star at Milford (Del.) High School. Bowman, a two-way standout at Milford (RB/DB), led all players with 11 tackles, including seven solo stops, in his collegiate debut at Buffalo on Sep. 1. He currently ranks third on the Hornets and tied for 14th in the MEAC in tackles at 6.1 per game (43 total) after seven games. Before enrolling at DSU, Bowman helped lead Milford HS to the state Division II championship during senior year. He's also the school's all-time record holder in yards from scrimmage (6,068), rushing yards (5,600), touchdowns (74) and tackles (376). As a senior, Bowman was the 2017 Delaware Defensive Player-of-the-Year, All-State First Team as a running back and defensive back, All-Henlopen Conference First Team (RB & DB), Delaware Blue/Gold All-Star selection and Delaware SportsZone Star Health Athlete-of-the-Week.

STINGERS

Delaware State has 24 freshmen (including redshirts) on its 2018 opening day roster ... Delaware State has seven road games and just four home contests during the 2018 season ... Hornets are currently riding a 27-game road losing streak ... DSU's last road win was at Norfolk State on 10/11/14 (13-10 ot).

HORNET DEFENSE SHINES IN HOMECOMING WIN

Delaware State is hoping its defense can turn in another stellar performance a season-best performance vs. North Carolina Central last week. The Hornets allowed season-lows in points (13), total yardage (329), and recorded a season-high three sacks in the contest. Delaware State also forced a season-high two turnovers last week. Linebackers **Brian Cavicante** (jr.) and **Justin Castell** (jr.) led the way with nine tackles, including four solo stops each. Cavicante also tallied 2.5 tackles-for-loss. Three players recorded eight tackles, including **Devin Smith** (jr.) with a game-high six unassisted stops. Defensive back **Andrew Reese** (fr.) recorded his first career interception and the second of the season for the Hornets.

CAVICANTE EARNS MEAC HONOR

Delaware State linebacker **Brian Cavicante** (jr.) was honored by the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference for his performance in the Hornets' Sep. 8 contest at Saint Francis (Pa.). Cavicante was selected as the MEAC Defensive Player-of-the-Week after recording 12 tackles, including eight unassisted, in the contest. Among the tackles, five were in the Saint Francis backfield, accounting for 14 lost yards. In addition, Cavicante scooped up a fumble on a Saint Francis punt return and ran 14 yards to the end zone for the first touchdown of the game and his career. The Portsmouth, Va., native is currently No. 1 in the MEAC in tackles at 9.1 per game (73 total). Cavicante is also tops in the league in tackles-for-loss (14.5) and is second with 40 solo stops in the latest conference statistical rankings.

HORNET PUNTER SHUT DOWN FOR REMAINDER OF SEASON

Delaware State punter **Fidel Romo-Martinez** (jr.), a Preseason FCS All-America candidate, is out for the rest of the season due to a shoulder injury Romo-Martinez has been out since suffering the injury at Howard on Oct. 13. Before the injury, he ranked third in the MEAC with a 41.3 yard average. Romo-Martinez had nine kicks of 50-or-more yards, including a long of 70 yards at Western Michigan on Sep. 15, and seven that have landed inside the opponents' 20-yard line this season. He punted 72 times for 3,224 yards, both school records, last season. His average of 44.8 yards per kick was tops in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference and fourth among all FCS punters in 2017. He had 24 kicks of 50-or-more yards and 17 that landed inside the opponents' 20-yard line. His talents have certainly not gone unnoticed. Romo-Martinez is a 2018 HERO Sports Preseason FCS All-America Third Team and PHIL STEELE Preseason FCS All-America Fourth Team selection, in addition to being a Preseason All-MEAC First Team pick.

SEEING "DOUBLE"

You're not seeing double. Delaware State's "Selby twins" **Keyjuan** and **Taronn** have been causing folks on campus to do double-takes since joining the team in 2015. Keyjuan is a defensive back and Taronn a wide receiver, so they often go head-to-head in practice. Keyjuan is a 2018 preseason All-MEAC First Team selection, and ranked among the league leaders in passes defended the last two seasons. Taronn was the Hornets' leader in receptions (35) and receiving yards (512) in 2017. The Selbys were standout players at St. George's Vo-Tech in New Castle County, Del., before enrolling at Delaware State. Taronn was Delaware's 2014 Gatorade High School Player-of-the-Year after rushing for more than 1,300 yards and 23 touchdowns as a senior. Keyjuan also rushed for more than 1,000 yards as a senior at St. George's, and is the school's career interception leader.

The 2018 Hornets also feature the "kicking Romo-Martinez brothers." Junior punter **Fidel Romo-Martinez** joined the team in 2016, while his younger brother **Jose Romo-Martinez**, a redshirt freshman, is expected to handle placekicking duties this season.

HORNETS IN THE MEAC

A charter member of the MEAC, Delaware State is in its 48th year of league play. The Hornets have an all-time record of 137-187-1 in MEAC contests. DSU has won or shared six league championships. The Hornets claimed outright MEAC titles in 1985, 1989 and 2007, while sharing the crown in 1987, 1988 and 1991. Delaware State was 10th in the MEAC standings with a 2-6 league mark in 2017.

PLAYING WITH THE BIG BOYS

DSU's 68-0 loss at Western Michigan on Sep. 15 was the second of two vs. FBS opponents on the Hornets' 2018 schedule. DSU opened the season with a 48-10 loss at Buffalo, along with WMU a member of the Mid-America Conference. This is the second year in a row that Delaware State has faced multiple major college foes. In 2017, the Hornets suffered a week three loss to West Virginia (59-16) and were routed by Florida A&M (77-6) to close out the season.

Delaware State has played 13 games all-time vs. FBS/Div. I-A opponents. The Hornets are 1-11 all-time vs. FBS opponents. The only win was a 52-26 upset of Akron, also a current MAC member, in 1987.

Smith and Jones are defensive linemen, while Wilson and Wood join the linebacker corps.

Junior college transfers RB **Richard Harris** (Dean College), OT **Anetelea "RJ" Moli** (DeAnza College), DL **Corey St. John** (Ellsworth CC), DB **La Vonte Wilson** (San Bernardino CC) and OL **Michael Wood** (Compton College) also signed with the Hornets this season.

BACK TO THE FUTURE

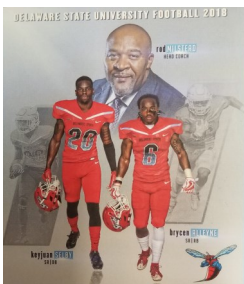
Delaware State head coach and former Hornet great **Rod Milstead** did not overlook the talented football minds his alma mater has produced when putting together his staff. In addition to Milstead, the 2018 Hornet coaching staff consists of DSU alums **Tyrone Greenwood** (cornerbacks), **Cordie Greenlea** (linebackers) and **Ollie Taylor** (wide receivers).

Greenlea and Milstead first crossed paths at Delaware State and were members of the Hornets' 1988 MEAC championship squad. Greenlea was most recently a football coach consultant and previously a successful Delaware high school head coach.

Greenwood has been on the DSU staff since 2015 and retained by Milstead when he took the job this year. Prior to returning to his alma mater, Greenwood was a member of the University of Kansas football staff. He played with the Hornets from 2000 to 2003.

Before entering the coaching ranks, Taylor was a member of the Hornets' 2007 MEAC championship squad. He most recently served as receivers coach at Saginaw Valley State (Mich.) before returning to Delaware State.

FOUR HORNETS EARN PRESEASON ALL-MEAC NOD

Delaware State has four players on the 2018 Preseason All-MEAC Teams, including three first team selections. Hornet defensive back **Keyjuan Selby** (sr.), punter **Fidel Romo-Martinez** (jr.) and linebacker **Brian Cavicante** (jr.) were named to the preseason first team, while running back **Brian Alleyne** (sr.) was a second team pick in voting by league head coaches and sports information directors. Selby, a 2017 All-MEAC Second Team honoree, was second in the MEAC in passes defended (1.18 pg) and the team leader with two interceptions last season. Romo-Martinez, also a 2017 All-MEAC Second Team selection, was tops in the league and fourth among all FCS punters with a 44.8-yard average last season. He had 24 kicks of 50-or-more yards and 17 that landed inside the opponents' 20-yard line. Cavicante was second on the Hornets and 13th in the MEAC in tackles at 6.7 per games (74 total) a year ago. Alleyne has more than a thousand yards rushing in his career and is also one of the MEAC's top kickoff returners.

THIS DAY IN HORNET FOOTBALL HISTORY (Nov. 3, 1984)

Gene Lake rushed for a school-record six touchdowns to lead Delaware State to a 45-7 victory over Howard on Nov. 3, 1984. Lake ran for 245 yards in the contest, the third-best single-game mark in team history. He led all college players with a school-record 1,772 yards rushing that season. Lake was named MEAC Offensive Player-of-the-Year, and selected to the Kodak Division I-AA and Sheridan Black College All-America teams in 1984.

HORNET GREAT JOHN TAYLOR SELECTED TO 2019 BLACK COLLEGE HALL OF FAME CLASS

John Taylor, whose record-setting years at Delaware State led to National Football League stardom and Super Bowl championships, has been selected for induction into the Black College Football Hall of Fame.

Taylor is among seven inductees selected from a list of 25 finalists determined by the BCFHOF selection committee. He is joined in the 10th hall of fame class by players Emerson Boozer, Hugh Douglas, Rich "Tombstone" Jackson, Frank Lewis, Timmy Newsome, and coach Arnett "Ace" Mumford.



The Class of 2019 will be honored at the Annual Black College Football Hall of Fame and Induction Ceremony, presented by the Atlanta Falcons on Feb. 16, 2019. The ceremony will be held at the BCFHOF in Atlanta. The inductees will also be recognized at the 2018 Celebration Bowl in Atlanta on Dec. 15.

Taylor, a standout wide receiver and punt returner, capped off his Delaware State career as the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference Offensive Player - of-the-Year in 1985. That season, he earned Black College and Division I-AA All-America honors after topping the MEAC with 15 touchdowns to lead the Hornets to their first conference championship in team history.

Taylor completed his college career as the MEAC's all-time leader with 42 touchdowns and 254 points. He is tied for the Hornets' career record with 33 touchdown catches and is third all-time

with 2,426 receiving yards. In addition, Taylor still holds the Delaware State record for receiving yards in a game (223) and the top two longest receptions (97, 93). He previously held the NCAA record for career yards per catch at 24.3.

Taylor ranks fifth in Delaware State history with 3,593 all-purpose yards, is fourth in career punt return yards (576) and second in punt return touchdowns (4).

Taylor was selected by the San Francisco 49ers in the third round of the 1986 NFL Draft. During his nine seasons with San Francisco, he was a member of three Super Bowl Championship teams. He caught the game-winning touchdown pass from Joe Montana in the final seconds of the 49ers' Super Bowl XXIII win over the Cincinnati Bengals in 1989.

A two-time Pro Bowl selection, Taylor was selected to the NFL's 1980s All-Decade Team as a punt returner.

His NFL career statistics include 347 catches, 5,598 receiving yards and 43 touchdown grabs. He was also the first player in NFL history with two touchdown receptions of 90-or-more yards in a game.

Taylor is the first Delaware State athlete selected for induction into the Black College Football Hall of Fame, which includes such legends as Walter Payton (Jackson State), Buck Buchanan (Grambling State), Willie Lanier (Morgan State), Jerry Rice (Mississippi Valley State), Deacon Jones (South Carolina State) and coach Eddie Robinson (Grambling State).

DELAWARE STATE HEAD COACH ROD MILSTEAD



One of the most decorated players in the history of the Delaware State University football program was appointed as head coach at his alma mater on Jan. 30, 2018.

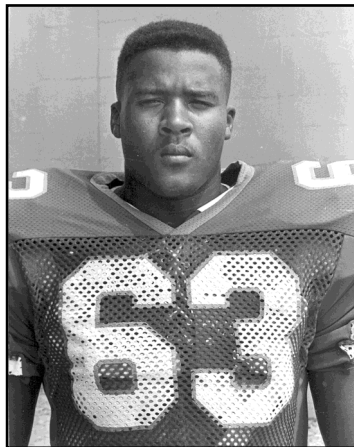
Milstead was a standout offensive lineman for the Hornets from 1988 to '91 before an eight-year career in the National Football League.

During his tenure with the Hornets, Milstead was a three-time All-MEAC First Team selection (1989, '90, 91); and a 1991 Associated Press, Walter Camp and Sheridan Black College All-America First Team pick.

He helped lead Delaware State to the 1989 MEAC championship and a share of the conference title in 1988 and '91.

In addition, he helped pave the way to the Hornets' No. 1 ranking among all Division I-AA (now FCS) teams in rushing at 300.2 yards per game in 1990.

Delaware State named Milstead as its Male Athlete-of-the-Year and Senior Male Athlete-of-the-Year in 1992. He was inducted into the Hornets' Athletics Hall-of-Fame in 2003.



Milstead was a Div. I-AA All-America offensive lineman at Delaware State

Milstead earned a bachelor's in Sociology/Criminal Justice from Delaware State in 1992.

Following his collegiate career, Milstead was selected by the Dallas Cowboys in the fifth round of the 1992 National Football League draft. After several weeks in the Cowboys' training camp, he was traded to the Cleveland Browns, where he played two seasons.

In 1994, Milstead signed with the San Francisco 49ers, where he joined former Hornet star wide receiver **John Taylor**.

Milstead was a member of San Francisco's 1995 Super Bowl champion squad. The Niners captured the title with a 49-26 win over the San Diego Chargers in Super Bowl XXIX in Miami, Fla. In four seasons with the 49ers (1994-97), Milstead competed in 36 games, including 12 starts.

He completed his professional playing career after two seasons with the Washington Redskins (1998-99), during which he appeared in 20 games, starting 11.



In 2013, Milstead was offensive line coach at Delaware State's Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference rival North Carolina Central University.

During the 2014 season, he returned to Delaware State as offensive line coach.

From 2000 to '06, Milstead was the assistant head coach/offensive line coach at his high school alma mater, Lackey High in Indian Head, Md.

He was head football coach at La Plata High School in Maryland from 2015 to 2018.

**ERIC DAY - OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR / QBS
FROSTBURG STATE, '94
FOURTH SEASON AT DSU**

Day is in his second stint on the Delaware State coaching staff. He previously served under head coach Al Lavan as quarterbacks coach, then offensive coordinator with the Hornets for three seasons from 2004 to '06. During the 2004 to '05 seasons, Delaware State compiled a 15-7 overall record and 11-4 mark in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference. In 2006, with Day as offensive coordinator, the Hornets were 8-3 overall and 6-2 in the MEAC, their best record in each since 1991. DSU's 2006

squad ranked second in the MEAC in scoring offense at 30.5 points per game and in rushing 191.3 yards per game. The Hornets topped the 60-point mark in two games that season. That season, senior running back Emmanuel Marc was second in the MEAC with 1,230 yards rushing the 4th best single season total in team history.



**MARK JAMES - DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR /
DEFENSIVE LINE
VIRGINIA UNION, '00
FIRST SEASON AT DSU**

Prior to joining the Hornets, James served four years as head football coach at Virginia Union University from 2014 to 2017. While at Virginia Union, he led the Panthers to an overall record of 26-14, highlighted by the school's first NCAA playoff appearance in more than two decades in 2015. That season, VUU was No. 1 among all NCAA Div. II schools in total defense. During James' tenure at Virginia Union, the team produced five Div. II

All-Americans and two players earned National Football League opportunities. In addition, he was the recipient of the 2016 Fritz Pollard Coach-of-the-Year Award, presented by the Black Coaches Alliance and Brown University. Pollard was the first African-American head coach in the National Football League. He and Bobby Marshall were the first African-Americans to compete in the NFL. James' college coaching experience also includes one season (2011) as offensive coordinator at St. Paul's College (Va.) and a year as linebackers coach at Norfolk State University (2003).



**JEFF BRAXTON - / RUN GAME COORDINATOR/ TIGHT
ENDS/ SPECIAL TEAMS
SALISBURY STATE, '87
12th SEASON AT DSU**

Braxton returns to Delaware State after a three-year stint (2015-17) as an assistant at NCAA Division III power Wesley College in Dover, Del., under the late legendary head coach Mike Drass. The Wolverines reached the NCAA Div. III playoff quarterfinals in 2015 and the second round in 2016 and '17. Also at Wesley, Braxton was the position coach of 2018 National Football League

signee Matt Gono, currently with the Atlanta Falcons. This is Braxton's fifth stint with the Hornets. In addition to his duties as tight ends coach, he also oversees special teams. He previously served as the Hornets' defensive line coach from 2012-14, offensive line coach during the 2006 and '07 seasons, and offensive coordinator from 2000 to 2003. In addition, he was a Delaware State assistant in 1995 (offensive line) and '96 (linebackers).



**TY GREENWOOD - CORNERBACKS
DELAWARE STATE, '04
FOURTH SEASON AT DSU**

Before returning to his alma mater, the former Hornet star defensive back most recently served two years with the University of Kansas football program as the quality control coach for defense. Greenwood spent the previous six seasons on the staff at Pierce College in Los Angeles, where he served as defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach. Greenwood is a 2004 graduate of Delaware State where he was a three-year starter at defensive back. While at DSU, Greenwood earned All-MEAC honors and was named the team's defensive MVP in 2003.



**ANTHONY MISSICK - SAFETIES
KENTUCKY, '99
FIRST SEASON AT DSU**

The former University of Kentucky and Canadian Football League standout joined the Delaware State staff in March 2018. He most recently served as defensive backs for the Canadian Football League Blue Bombers since June 2016. During the 2015 CFL season, Missick was defensive backs coach for the Saskatchewan Roughriders. Prior to joining the Riders, he spent four seasons in the same capacity with the

Calgary Stampeders. Missick won his first Grey Cup (CFL Championship) with the Stamps that season. Prior to joining the Stampeders, Missick spent nine seasons coaching in the Arena Football League. He was named head coach of the Cincinnati Jungle Kats in 2007.



**CORDIE GREENLEA - LINEBACKERS

The former Delaware State offensive line standout and teammate of Hornet head coach Rod Milstead returns to his alma mater as a new member of the coaching staff. Vitale most recently served as offensive line coach at Southwest Baptist University in Bolivar, Mo. During his four years at Southwest Baptist (2014-17), Vitale helped transform the Bearcats from a team that posted a 1-10 overall record before he arrived to a 10-2 Great Lakes Valley Conference championship squad. In addition, he coached one All-America and eight All-GLVC offensive linemen while at SBU. Prior to his tenure at Southwest Baptist, Vitale coached at Lindenwood University,

where he served as an offensive graduate assistant and assistant offensive line coach. He helped guide the Lions to a successful transition into NCAA Division II football and the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association.



**OLLIE TAYLOR - WIDE RECEIVERS
DELAWARE STATE, '08
FIRST SEASON AT DSU**

Taylor returns to his alma mater from Saginaw Valley State University (Mich.), where he served as wide receivers coach since 2016. Prior to joining Saginaw Valley, Taylor was the wide receivers coach at Widener University (Pa.). In 2015, the Widener offense was the conference leader in passing yards per game (316.0), while three earned all-conference recognition. Taylor was running backs coach at Widener in 2012. That season, the Pride reached the NCAA Div. III national quarterfi-

nals and ranked eighth in the country in the final season poll.

FIRST SEASON AT DSU**

Prior to joining the Hornets, Misipeaka was a member of the Garden City Community College (Kan.) football staff as Running Backs Coach and International Recruiting Coordinator. In 2017, Garden City posted an 8-4 overall record and 5-2 mark in the Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference. The Broncbusters also competed in the Heart of Texas Bowl last season. Garden City running back Charles West was a 2017 all-conference selection. Before his tenure at Garden City, Misipeaka joined the coaching staff at Silverado High School in Las Vegas Nev., under former National Football League quarterback Randall Cunningham in

2015.

HORNETS LOOK TO PROVE DOUBTERS WRONG IN 2018 MEAC RACE

The Delaware State football team should have plenty of motivation for the 2018 season. Voters in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference poll give the Hornets little or no chance to win the league championship. DSU has been picked to finish 10th in the 10-team MEAC race, according to the poll of league head coaches and sports information directors. Defending MEAC champ North Carolina A&T is the voters' choice to repeat this season. The Aggies were 12-0 in 2017 (8-0 MEAC), and capped off the season with a 21-14 victory over Grambling State in the Celebration Bowl to capture their second HBCU National Championship in the last three years. NCA&T garnered 19 of 20 first place votes in the 2018 MEAC poll. Howard (7-4; 6-2) has been picked to finish second in the upcoming MEAC race, while North Carolina Central (7-4; 5-3), Bethune-Cookman (7-4; 6-2) and Florida A&M (3-8; 2-6) round out the top five



in the poll.

MEAC CHAMPION TO COMPETE IN CELEBRATION BOWL

The quest for the 2018 MEAC championship will again have an added incentive for Delaware State and its fellow conference members.

This year's MEAC champion will also have the honor of representing the conference against the champ of the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) in the Fourth Annual Celebration Bowl Atlanta, Ga..

The MEAC holds a 2-1 lead in the Celebration Bowl after North Carolina A&T defeated Grambling State in the 2017 contest.

NCA&T also claimed the first Celebration Bowl championship with its victory over Alcorn State in 2015. Grambling State defeated North Carolina Central in 2016 for the SWAC's lone victory in the post-season bowl.

ESPN Events, a subsidiary of ESPN, has announced that the fourth Celebration Bowl will again be televised live on ABC. The 2018 post-season college football bowl game will kick off at noon ET on Saturday, Dec. 15, at Mercedes Benz Stadium in Atlanta.



HORNET FOOTBALL STREAMING LIVE ON ESPN NETWORKS

Each of Delaware State's 2018 Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference football contests will be streamed live on either ESPN3 or ESPN+, the result of a multi-year agreement between the conference and the *Worldwide Leader in Sports*. The MEAC and ESPN recently announced the plan to stream the conference's football contests on ESPN3 and ESPN+, the new multi-sport, direct-to-consumer subscription streaming service from The Walt Disney Company Direct-to-Consumer & International segment and ESPN. The agreement is effective immediately. A total of 35 MEAC football contests will be available on ESPN3 and ESPN+ this season in addition to 10 televised contests on either ABC, ESPN, ESPN2 or ESPN+.

"I am elated to utilize ESPN3 and ESPN+ in continuing to grow the MEAC's relationship with ESPN," said MEAC Commissioner Dennis E. Thomas. "Both ESPN3 and ESPN+ are innovative digital platforms upon which we can better serve our member institutions and our fans, while also expanding our reach both from a conference perspective and at the institutional level. This is an exciting time for college sports, with the expansion of digital content, and I am pleased that the MEAC is on the forefront with ESPN3 and ESPN+."

"This agreement reflects another significant step in our relationship with the MEAC and for the opportunity to continue to enhance our already robust ESPN3 and ESPN+ offerings with quality HBCU competition," said Burke Magnus, ESPN executive vice president of programming and scheduling.

ESPN3 is accessible on computers, smartphones, tablets and connected devices through the ESPN app. The network is currently available nationwide at no additional cost to fans who receive their high-speed Internet connection or video subscription from an affiliated service provider.

Fans can subscribe to ESPN+ on ESPN.com or through the ESPN App for just \$4.99 a month (or \$49.99 per year).

The agreement adds additional exposure to the MEAC, which has collaborated with ESPN since 2005. The ESPN+ football contests add to an already impressive lineup as the ESPN networks carry multiple men's basketball, baseball and softball regular-season contests. The men's and women's basketball tournament championship, volleyball and bowling finals are also televised on ESPN+.

FORMER HORNETS MAKING THEIR MARK IN THE PROS AND BEYOND

RODNEY GUNTER LONE HORNET ACTIVE IN NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE

Former Hornet defensive lineman **Rodney Gunter** ('14) is making an impact in professional football. Gunter was selected by the Arizona Cardinals in the fourth round (116h overall pick) of the 2015 National Football League draft, making him the third highest NFL selection in Hornet football history. He was also the first Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference player chosen in the 2015 NFL draft. Gunter has 51 tackles (34 solo), including 3.5 sacks, in three seasons the



Cards (2015 - 2017).

Gunter was a four-year starter for the Hornets from 2011 to 2014, competing in each of the Hornets' 45 games during the span. He was an All-MEAC First Team selection in 2013; and second team pick in 2012 and 2014.

Delaware State football also honors the memory of former Hornet

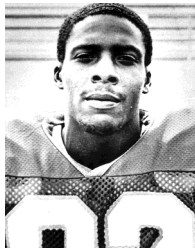

JOHN TAYLOR TOPS LIST OF FORMER HORNET PROS

Rodney Gunter may one day be recognized as the former Hornet with the greatest professional football career, but right now that distinction belongs to **John Taylor**, who played nine seasons with the great San Francisco 49er teams of the late 1980s to mid-90s. Taylor is most famous for catching the winning touchdown on a 10-yard pass from **Joe Montana** with 34 seconds left in the 49ers' 20-16 win over the Cincinnati Bengals in Super Bowl XXIII in Miami, Fla. It was his first of three Super Bowls championships



with the Niners. Taylor was also a two-time NFL All-Pro selection, competed in two Pro Bowls and was named as to the NFL's 1980s All-Decade Team as the second team punt returner. In a Monday night game against the Rams, Taylor scored touchdowns on two

receptions of over 90 yards (92 and 96), an NFL first. He recorded 347 receptions for 5,589 yards (16.1 ypr) and 43 touchdowns in his NFL career.

OTHER FORMER HORNETS RAISE DSU PROFILE

Two other former DSU football standouts are making news these days. Regular cable news watchers likely know the name **Matthew Horace**, an offensive lineman for the Hornets from 1980 to '83. In 1983, he helped lead the team to a 7-3-1 record, its first winning season in six years. Horace is currently an internationally recognized law enforcement, homeland security and leadership expert. He is Senior Vice President and Chief Security Officer for FJC Security Services, a national security firm based in metropolitan New York City. A twenty-eight year veteran of federal, state and local law enforcement, he ascended to the Senior Executive Service (SES) rank in the United States Department of Justice where he managed local, regional, national, and international investigations. He is frequently featured in live broadcast news segments related to Homeland Security, Federal investigations and general law enforcement matters on CNN, Headline News, MSNBC, FOX and local affiliates throughout the United States and abroad.



Television and movie watchers may recognize former Hornet **Aaron Spears** (right), now a Hollywood actor. Spears was a running back for the Hornets during the 1992 and '93 seasons. In 1993, he was one of three Hornets to rush for 100 yards (133) in a 65-42 win over Morgan State. Today, Spears plays the character **Mark Bradley** in the BET series *Being Mary Jane* starring *Gabrielle Union*. He received a NAACP Image Award for his role as *Justin Barber* in the daytime soap *Bold and the Beautiful*. His television credits also include guest roles in *Criminal Minds*, *Bones* and *Everybody Loves Raymond*.
