# THE STAFF



## Head Coach Jim O'Brien



Now in his sixth season at the helm of the Fairfield University women's soccer program, Jim O'Brien ranks second in program history in victories (54) and winning percentage (.590). Over his first five seasons at the helm he has twice led the Stags to the NCAA Tournament, have received votes in the national coaches poll, and individual honors and accolades on the field and in the classroom.

O'Brien has been a collegiate head coach for the last 14 years and boasts an impressive career mark of 159-91-24. His .624 career winning percentage ranks 52nd among active Division I coaches with at least five years as a head coach at a four-year institution. Under O'Brien's tutelage the past five seasons, the Stags have put together a 54-35-16 record, with at least nine wins in each campaign.

Personal accolades have followed O'Brien at each of his coaching stops. He was named the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA)/adidas Northeast Region Coach of the Year in 2008. The Stags finished the year with 15 wins, an NCAA Tournament berth and a Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) Championship. Fairfield received 16 votes in the final NSCAA National poll, marking the second straight season that the team has earned votes in the national poll.

The 2009 Stags posted a 9-9-3 mark and for the fifth time in as many seasons qualified for the MAAC Championship. The Stags went 4-2-3 in conference action on the year and finished the year in third place. Once again, individual accolades abounded for Fairfield, at both the conference and regional level. For the fourth consecutive year the Stags had a player recognized by the NSCAA, as Jasmin Corniel was voted to the organization's All-Northeast Second Team. Spenser Allaway was recognized for her success as a student-athlete, earning ESPN The Magazine Second-Team All-District accolades. The squad picked up 14 awards at the annual MAAC Championship banquet; highlighted by three first-team selections and seven All-Academic Team nods.

It did not take long for O'Brien to take the Stags to the pinnacle of the league, leading the team to the MAAC Championship and an NCAA Tournament berth in his first season at the helm. The Stags became the first-ever number-five seed to win the conference title, avenging regular season losses to Iona, Loyola and Niagara, along the way.

In 2008 the Stags once again tasted post-season success, winning the league title for the second time in four years. Fairfield needed a 5-4 edge in penalty kicks to knock off Siena, on its home field, in the MAAC Championship semifinal, before riding the first career hat trick of Ahna Johnson

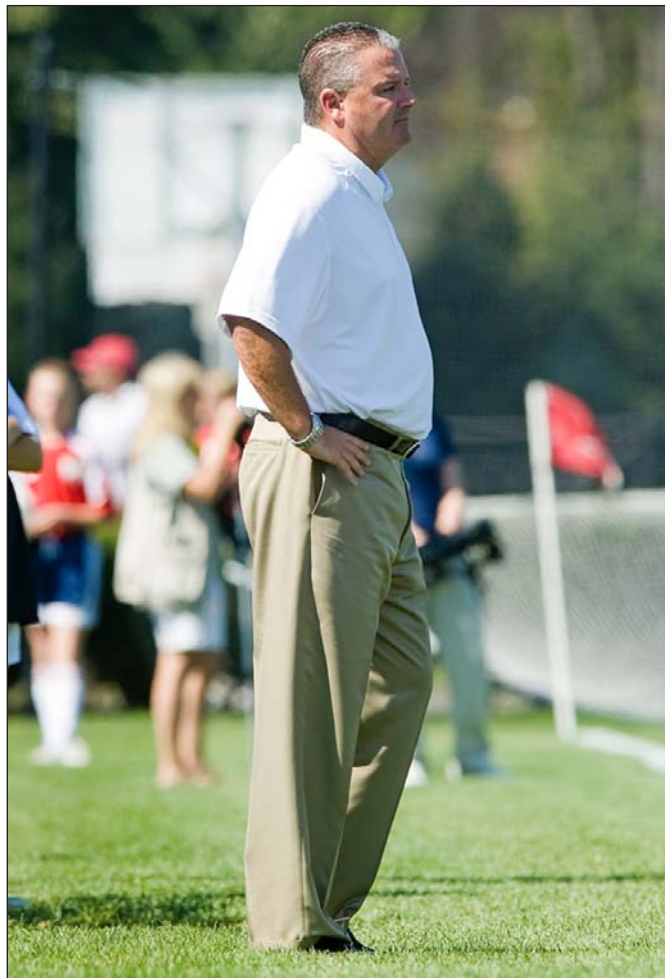
to a 3-0 blanking of Loyola in the title game.

While the 2006 and 2007 seasons did not end with trophy celebrations for the Stags, there were numerous on-field highlights, with the squad qualifying for the MAAC Tournament each season. The 2007 campaign got off to a quick start, as the Stags won the Denver Classic, highlighted by a tie with #14 Colorado, which resulted in Fairfield earning votes in the national polls. The Stags would play three nationally ranked teams during the season and finish with 11 wins, the most wins in a year since 2001. O'Brien's second season, 2006, resulted in a nine-win campaign, and recognition from the NSCAA, as the Stags returned to the regional rankings for multiple weeks.

Along with the success as a team, the Stags have had numerous players receive individual recognition under O'Brien's tutelage. Ahna Johnson became the most decorated Stag in program history in 2008-09, earning accolades on the field and in the classroom. On the field she was named to the NSCAA/adidas All-America Third Team, the first player in program history, as well as being named the MAAC Offensive Player of the Year, and the Most Valuable Player of the MAAC Tournament. She became the first Stag soccer player to earn ESPN The Magazine CoSida First Team Academic All-America and NSCAA/adidas First Team Scholar All-America, while also being named the MAAC Female Scholar Athlete of the Year.

All told, O'Brien has now coached 29 All-MAAC performers, with 17 being voted to the league's First Team. He has now had 10 freshmen named to the All-MAAC Rookie Team, including Casey Frobey (2006) and Nicole Cavallaro (2007) who were both named the MAAC Rookie of the Year. In 2007 Cavallaro was selected a Freshman All-America, just the second player in pro-





the ECAC Tournament and were ranked as high as seventh in the nation in Division II.

O'Brien was named the Northeast-10 Conference Coach of the Year in 2000 for leading the Owls to a final national ranking of seventh and an NE-10 crown. That season he was also named the NSCAA Senior College Women - Division II New England Region Coach of the Year, as well as being selected as the New England Women's intercollegiate Soccer Associations Division II Coach of the Year.

The Bohemia, N.Y., native, played scholastically at St. John the Baptist, before beginning his collegiate career at Suffolk Community College. O'Brien moved onto SCSU where he was the starting goalkeeper for two seasons. He posted a 35-7-1 record, including 17 shutouts, while leading the team to the 1982 NCAA Championship game, after a 1981 NCAA semifinal appearance.

It was with the Owls men's team that O'Brien began his coaching career, serving as an assistant coach from 1992-96. He obtained a Bachelor of Science degree from SCSU in corporate communications and recently earned his master's degree in recreation from the New Haven, Conn. institution.

O'Brien and his wife Francine have three children, Corey, a graduate of UConn, Julia, a freshman at Fairfield, and Aedan, a high school sophomore, and reside in North Haven, Conn.

gram history to earn that accolade.

O'Brien coached Stags have earned All-MAAC Academic Team honors 43 times in four seasons, with Ahna Johnson and Alex Caram being recognized regionally as well. In 2007 Caram was selected to the NSCAA Scholar-Athlete All-Northeast Region First Team, the first such selection in program history. An honorable mention in 2007, Johnson, followed in Caram's footsteps with a first team selection in 2008.

On the field regional accolades have been a yearly event for the Stags as well during the last four seasons. Johnson was an NSCAA All-Northeast Region First Team pick in 2009, after Caram earned the honor in 2007. Brett Maron earned NSCAA Third Team All-Northeast Region in 2006, after being named the MAAC Defensive Player of the Year. That same season, Casey Frobey was named to the SoccerBuzz Northeast Region All-Freshman Team.

Success was no stranger to O'Brien when he took over the women's soccer program at Fairfield prior to the 2005 season. For nine seasons O'Brien as the head coach of the women's soccer program at his alma mater. The first coach in program history, O'Brien posted a 105-56-8 record during his tenure. The Owls earned an NCAA Tournament berth, twice appeared in

**Sean Driscoll**  
**Associate Head Coach**  
**First Season**

Sean Driscoll begins his first season on the sidelines of the Fairfield University women's soccer team, serving as associate head coach. In that capacity he will play an active role in every facet of the program, including a prominent role in on-field coaching and the recruiting

process.

Driscoll comes to Fairfield after five seasons as the head coach at Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) rival Manhattan College, where he posted 40 victories, including a program record 12 wins in 2005. That is one of six single-season team records - consecutive wins, fewest goals allowed, shutouts, win percentage, wins, assists - that the Lady Jaspers set under his tutelage. In his tenure at Manhattan, Driscoll coached 13 All-MAAC selections, with four All-Rookie honorees, and an impressive 51 selections to the All-MAAC Academic Team.

Driscoll, who graduated from Denison University with a bachelor's degree in history in 1994, got his start at the collegiate level at Western Connecticut State University as an assistant coach. He helped lead the Colonials to the ECAC Division III Championship with an 18-5-2 record.

A native of Trumbull, Conn., Driscoll began his coaching career in Connecticut with stops at New Canaan High School, Brookfield and Green Farms Academy. In three seasons at New Canaan, Driscoll's squad went 52-8-2, including an undefeated (21-0-2) mark in 2002, to finish as co-champions of the Fairfield County Interscholastic Athletic Conference (FCIAC) and third in the national poll. In nine seasons as a scholastic coach, Driscoll compiled a 116-38-13 record.



**Susan Starr**  
**Assistant Coach**  
**Third Season**

Susan Starr is now in her third season as a member of the Fairfield University women's soccer coaching staff. Serving as an assistant coach, Starr will be primarily responsible for training the goal keepers, as well as assisting in day-to-day operations of the program.

Starr comes to Fairfield after earning four varsity letters for the Yale University women's soccer team. Over the course of her career she played in 52 games, notching 23 career wins. Starr posted a career GAA of 0.97, ranking second in Yale history, as well as having notched 148 saves and four shutouts. As a senior she led the Ivy League with a .867 save percentage and was second in GAA at 0.71, picking up nine wins. The NSCAA and SoccerBuzz.com named Starr Third Team All-Northeast Region, as well as being selected First Team All-Ivy League. She earned a degree in political science from Yale.

A native of Fairfield, Conn., Starr was twice named an All-America while at Fairfield High School. As a senior she was a state finalist for the Wendy's High School Heisman Award and was named the Connecticut Post Athlete of the Year as a junior.

Starr is working toward her MBA in finance/international business, which included an internship at Rabobank International in New York City doing mergers and acquisitions in ibanking. This coming fall she will be coaching the CFC U12 Arsenal as well.

## Mark Spellman

### Director of Strength & Conditioning

Mark Spellman is in his 10th year as the Director of Strength and Conditioning at Fairfield University, assuming the position in September 2001. In that role he develops, designs and implements comprehensive strength and conditioning programs for all 20 varsity

teams and 400 student-athletes. Spellman also oversees the day-to-day operations of the 4,700-square foot strength and conditioning facility in the Walsh Athletic Center.

Spellman earned a B.S. in Physical Education and an M.S. in Human Performance at Frostburg State University. As an undergraduate he earned four varsity letters as a member of the swimming and diving team. He is a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist by the National Strength and Conditioning Association.

Spellman, who interned in 1995 for the Washington Redskins and in 1998, for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, came to Fairfield from Villanova University. He spent two years as the assistant strength and conditioning coach at the Philadelphia, Pa., institution.

A native of Washington, D.C., Spellman, and his wife, Kelly, reside in Stratford, Conn., with their children, Emily (6), Drew (4) and Patrick (1).



## Chris Hagemann

### Assistant Director of Sports Medicine

Chris Hagemann is in his fourth year as an Assistant Director of Sports Medicine at Fairfield. He is the primary athletic trainer for the women's soccer team, as well as the men's lacrosse and golf programs.

Hagemann comes to Fairfield having completed his M.A. in Sports Management/Kinesiology at the University of Connecticut. In his time as a graduate assistant at UConn, he worked primarily with the football and golf teams. Prior to his time at UConn, Hagemann spent a year at Colgate as an assistant athletic trainer, covering men's soccer, women's basketball and softball.

A 2004 graduate of Ithaca College, with a B.S. in Exercise Science/Athletic Training, Hagemann was a four-year member of the school's football team. A wide receiver, Hagemann helped the Bombers to the quarterfinals of the Division III National Tournament during his sophomore and senior seasons.

A native of Watertown, N.Y., Hagemann currently resides in Norwalk, Conn.





With 10 institutions strongly bound by the sound principles of quality and integrity in academics and excellence in athletics, the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference is in its 30th year of competition during the 2010-2011 academic year.

The MAAC was founded in 1980 by six charter members: the U.S. Military Academy, Fairfield University, Fordham University, Iona College, Manhattan College and Saint Peter's College. Competition followed one year later in the fall of 1981 with members competing in the sports of men's cross country and men's soccer. On January 2, 1982, Army traveled to Iona for the first MAAC men's basketball game and the MAAC story had begun.

Today, Conference members include: Canisius College, Fairfield University, Iona College, Loyola University Maryland, Manhattan College, Marist College, Niagara University, Rider University, Saint Peter's College, and Siena College. In addition, associate members include the University of Detroit Mercy, Jacksonville University and Virginia Military Institute in men's lacrosse. St. Francis (N.Y.) College, Villanova University and Wagner College are all associate members of the MAAC Women's Water Polo League. Drake University, Robert Morris University and Sacred Heart University compete in women's rowing, while the University at Albany, Boston University and the University of Hartford began competition in women's golf in the spring of 2010. The MAAC will support 24 sports and championships during the 2010-2011 academic year.

The MAAC Basketball Championships return to the Arena at Harbor Yard in Bridgeport, Conn. for 2011, with Springfield's MassMutual Center preparing to host the 2012-2014 championships. By having an excellent working relationship with various facilities, the MAAC has been able to attract a number of NCAA Championship events. Most recently, the MAAC, Canisius College and Niagara University successfully hosted the 2010 NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship First and Second Rounds at the HSBC Arena in Buffalo, New York. All three parties hosted the event in 2004 and 2007. The MAAC and Rider University co-hosted the 2009 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championship Regional at the Sovereign Bank Arena in Trenton, N.J., after recording the third highest attendance figure for the women's championship with the First and Second Rounds in 2006. The MAAC and Rider will work together to co-host the 2011 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships at the Wells Fargo Center in Philadelphia, Pa.

## MAAC Associate Sports

In June of 1995, the MAAC continued to develop opportunities for student-athletes as the conference announced the formation of the MAAC Men's and Women's Lacrosse Leagues. The men's league began competition in the spring of 1996, while the women's league commenced in the spring of 1997. The men's league consists of four MAAC schools - Canisius, Manhattan, Marist, and Siena - and three associate members - Detroit Mercy, Jacksonville and Virginia Military Institute. The women's league consists of MAAC institutions Canisius, Fairfield, Iona, Manhattan, Marist, Niagara and Siena.

In 2002, the MAAC added the MAAC Women's Water Polo League. The league is made up of three MAAC schools - Iona, Marist and Siena - as well as three associate members, St. Francis (N.Y.), Villanova and Wagner.

Sacred Heart started participating in MAAC Women's Rowing in the spring of 2008. Drake University joined the league for the 2010 MAAC Championship, while Robert Morris will begin competition in the spring of 2011.

In the summer of 2009, the MAAC added three associate members - Albany, Boston University and Hartford - to women's golf, with the programs starting competition against MAAC members Fairfield, Niagara and Siena in 2009-2010.

## Academics and Athletics

The MAAC prides itself on the accomplishments of its student-athletes in the classroom, as well as on the field. Mary Beth Riley, a 1991 graduate of Canisius, was the first recipient of the NCAA Woman of the Year Award. In the fall of 1998, Erin Whalen, a member

of the Iona women's rowing team, was awarded one of the nation's 32 Rhodes Scholarships for academic achievement and civic leadership. Jose Vargas, a Loyola student, was also awarded a Rhodes Scholarship in 1999.

First-class facilities are the rule with MAAC schools, as teams regularly play in top-notch arenas, such as Madison Square Garden, the IZOD Center, HSBC Arena, Times Union Center, the Arena at Harbor Yard and Sovereign Bank Arena. The other MAAC championships boast their share of outstanding locales as well, such as the Reverend Harold Ridley, S.J., Athletic Complex at Loyola, where both the men's and women's soccer championships will be contested in the fall of 2010, and Waterfront Park in Trenton, home of the 2011 MAAC Baseball Championship. This year, the MAAC will take its volleyball championship to Orlando, Florida, where it will conduct its post-season event at the ESPN Wide World of Sports Complex. The MAAC Men's and Women's Golf Championships will be held at Disney's Magnolia Golf Course.

In the past several years, a number of the MAAC schools have also enjoyed success in NCAA Championships. MAAC schools have made a total of 75 NIT appearances and 45 NCAA appearances. In addition, Fairfield represented the league last season in the CollegenInsider.com Postseason Tournament while the Fairfield women participated in the Women's Basketball Invitational. The MAAC currently possesses 13 automatic bids to NCAA Championships in men's and women's basketball, baseball, softball, men's and women's soccer, volleyball, men's golf, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's lacrosse, and women's water polo. In 2007, the Marist women's basketball team advanced to the Sweet 16 before falling to the eventual National Champion, the University of Tennessee. Last fall, the No. 11 Iona men's cross country team finished tied for eighth place at the NCAA Championship race, extending the Gaels' streak to eight straight Top 10 national finishes. Canisius softball, Manhattan track, Manhattan and Marist baseball and Loyola soccer and lacrosse have also flourished on the national stage.

The MAAC has also been a leader in the forefront of technology, expanding the notoriety of the league into cyberspace. In 2007, the league reached an agreement with JumpTV, Inc. to sponsor the MAAC web page. Launched in November 1999, [www.maacsports.com](http://www.maacsports.com) has been a great success, providing fans with up-to-date contest results, multimedia content and an online merchandise store.

The MAAC President for the 2010-2011 academic year is Rev. Jeffrey von Arx, S.J., the President of Fairfield University. The Vice-President is Dr. Eugene J. Cornacchia, Ph.D., the President of Saint Peter's College. Ed McLaughlin, Director of Athletics at Niagara University, will chair the Committee on Athletic Administration, and Karin Torchia, Associate Athletic Director/Senior Woman Administrator at Rider University will serve as Vice Chair.

On paper, the Fairfield University women's soccer team begins the 2010 season as arguably the deepest roster in the six-year tenure of head coach Jim O'Brien, if not program history. The Stags return 19 letter winners from a season ago and lost only two starters from a team that posted nine wins and finished third in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC).

"As the program continues to grow and develop, we always look to improve the depth and talent level of the entire team," said O'Brien. "This pre-season we will go two deep at every position which will make for a very competitive and productive two weeks. This depth will also aid in our success during a tough campaign that we have scheduled for the team."

The Stags resurgence continues to build upon the winning tradition that is Fairfield soccer. Entering its 19th varsity campaign, the Stags first victory of the 2010 season will be the 200th all-time. Fairfield begins the year with a .603 winning percentage, posting a 199-125-35 record.

## FORWARDS

The Stags offensive attack is perhaps the most veteran group on the field, anchored by fifth-year senior, Casey Frobey. The two-year captain saw action in only six games during the 2010 campaign, and was emerging as a MAAC Player of the Year candidate, when she suffered a knee injury against Bryant. Over the course of her limited action, Frobey had a goal and four assists, moving her to seventh in program history with 70 career points.

"The loss of Casey so early in the year hurt us not only in expected offensive production, but the senior leadership quality that she brings to the team," O'Brien said. "In my experience in collegiate soccer, strong senior leadership on the field is vital to the success of the team. And with Casey up front and healthy again this fall, I am looking forward to her contributions."

While the Stags certainly missed Frobey during the year, her absence allowed for the emergence of Jasmin Corniel and Kasey Schulz. That duo, now with 60 career starts between them, will now play alongside Frobey, to provide an impressive offensive punch.

Corniel stepped into the shoes of Frobey in dramatic fashion last fall, finishing the year as the team's leading scorer, with 25 points. She touched net a team-high 10 times on the year, while also handing out a career-best five assists as she was named to the NSCAA All-Northeast Region Second Team. Schulz returns with a full season of collegiate soccer under her belt, starting all but two games a year ago. She provides another talented and speedy option up front that continues to develop into a dangerous offensive weapon within the Stags offensive scheme.

Two newcomers, Shannon Fay and Jac Ley, are also expected to be in the mix, and give the Stags offense a lift off of the bench. Ley is strong with both feet and is a versatile player that could slide into the midfield if needed. Fay is a big and strong forward that plays well with her back to the goal. A prototypical target forward, that should mesh well with the players around her.

"Jasmin is arguably one of the most dynamic and exciting players to put on a uniform for the Stags," said O'Brien. "In my mind, her 2009 campaign was just the tip of the iceberg, and we have high hopes for her to increase her production this fall. Add to that the more experienced Kasey Schulz and the incoming freshmen - Jac Ley and Shannon Fay - and we have clearly improved our attack from a year ago."

O'Brien has two additional returning players that will compete for playing time up front, in Alanna Locast and Courtney Reilly. Both have now spent a season in the program and are offensive options for O'Brien.

## MIDFIELD

The Fairfield midfield is nearly as experienced as the Stags group of forwards, as well as being equally talented. With a wide array of athletic midfielders, O'Brien will have numerous options in this area depending on the situation that presents itself.

"I believe our midfield now has the experience to provide the type of possession that we need to control the tempo of a game while keeping our attacking philosophy on the front burner," O'Brien said. "Loss of possession was the key to goals that we allowed on counter attacks

which proved to be our weakness against many of our defensive minded opponents. With that being said, we still boast a midfield corps that is capable of putting the ball in the back of the net."

The Stags attacking midfield is in the capable hands of senior Nicole Cavallaro and junior Spenser Allaway. Both are the type of offensive player that demand they be closely marked and will stretch an opponent's defense with their speed.

Cavallaro, a co-captain this season, begins her final campaign within striking distance of the school's all-time assist record. She has tallied 31 assists over her first three years, as well as netting 12 goals, for 55 points. In certain situations, Cavallaro can also be used up front, a role that she has played well in past seasons.

"Nicole has been a significant impact on our program in many ways," says O'Brien. "She has been our on field play maker since the day she arrived on campus. Her unselfish play with her emphasis on getting teammates involved is uncanny."

Allaway missed the final three games of the 2009 campaign, as well as the entire spring season with injuries, and her presence on the field will be similar to that of a trade deadline acquisition for a Cy Young pitcher. She is a playmaker who will play an active role on both ends of the field when she is in the game.

On the left side of the midfield the Stags are looking to fill the shoes of the graduated Chrissie Sidie. Red-shirt freshman Nikki Stanton missed the entire 2009 campaign as she rehabilitated an ACL injury. While not having seen any action, she benefited from training at the collegiate level and her energy and tenacious play will be a welcome addition. Also in the mix on the left side will be junior Bri Miller, who has given the Stags numerous minutes over the last two seasons. She has 35 games of collegiate experience, with 11 starting nods, and gives O'Brien a veteran presence on the flank.

On the opposite flank will be sophomores Rachel Madasci, an All-MAAC Rookie Team selection last fall, and Lauren Reilly. Madasci started 14 of the last 15 games of the year, appearing in all 21 contests. She netted five of her seven points in the final five games of the

year. Reilly appeared in 11 games as a rookie, battling through several injuries. She netted two goals during the campaign, the second of which came in her first of four starts.

## BACKS

The backline has been a strength over the time that O'Brien has been at the helm of the Stags, and this season will be no different. On the pitch this year Fairfield will have a talented mix of veterans and newcomers, anchored by All-MAAC selection Alyssa Decker.

"The key word for our defensive unit is experience," O'Brien said. "With Alyssa Decker as the foundation in the middle and the supporting cast a year older, we plan to be extremely difficult to score on. The addition of new faces, will add to a solid mix to our backline, and this group will work extremely hard to reduce our goals allowed."

Decker returns for her third season at center back, where she has been selected to the All-MAAC Team in each of her first two campaigns with the Stags. She has started all 41 games in which she has played at Fairfield; games in which the Stags have only given up 43 total goals. A big and strong defender, Decker provides an intimidating presence in the back.

Decker is likely to play alongside rookie Carly Beyar in the center. A versatile player, Beyar has the ability to play anywhere on the field, but will be an important part of the Stags defensive scheme. Also in the central defense are returning players Sarah Alesio and Lexi Simon. Alesio spent most of her 17 appearances in the midfield last year due to injuries, and will slide into her more natural position in the back this fall. Simon suffered some setback due to injuries, but had a strong spring and should she remain healthy will give O'Brien a strong option.

Entering camp O'Brien has penciled Allison Walsh into the starting left back spot, following an impressive, if not surprising, rookie campaign. Walsh saw action in all 21 games during the 2009 campaign and saw her role increase as she developed, stepping into the starting line-up in six of the final eight games of the year. Also in the mix at left back are sophomores Elise Hemmer and Nicole Stark. Hemmer appeared in seven games, at a variety of positions, however she is best suited to play in the back. She spent the spring season working at outside back

Kaitlin Denis has emerged as the front-runner to start at right back. The junior has shown her durability, playing in every game the Stags have played the last two seasons, including a start in each contest in 2009. Perhaps Denis' greatest asset is her offensive mindset, providing the Stags an additional option on the attack, scoring her first collegiate goal against Stony Brook last fall.

O'Brien will also look to another junior, Jackie Taylor, at right back. More of a defensive minded player, Taylor started 16 games as a sophomore, while playing in all 21 contests. Newcomer Sarah Frassetto will also be in the mix at right back, though with her ability to play the ball on either foot, could also see time on the left flank. Also in the mix are Gina Fiori and Stephanie Sutherby, who joined the team for preseason camp, and additional options for O'Brien.

### GOALKEEPER

The Stags last line of defense will be in the capable hands of junior Kelly Boudreau, a role she has excelled at over the last two seasons. She enters the season with a career goals-against average of 0.96, currently the best in program history. In her 41-game tenure, Boudreau has posted 22 victories, with 15 shutouts, and 191 saves.

"Although Kasey Cox will provide strong competition for Kelly Boudreau," said O'Brien, "we expect Kelly to have another excellent year. We consider Kelly to be one of the top athletes in our athletic department and I am confident that she will emerge as the top goalkeeper in the MAAC. We have built a tradition at Fairfield with stand-out goalkeepers as the backbone of so many of our championship teams and Kelly has the opportunity to put herself among the top of that very impressive list."

Also in the mix at keeper will be newcomer Kasey Cox. A strong player, Cox will benefit greatly from playing and practicing alongside Boudreau, and will be looked at to mind the net on occasion this season.

### SCHEDULE

Now in his sixth season, O'Brien continues his tradition of testing his squad early and often. Once again the Stags will play the NCAA maximum 20-games during the regular season, with 10 home games, and three contests versus teams that played in the 2009 NCAA Tournament. The team's 11 non-conference foes posted nearly 100 victories a year ago, and come from the Atlantic Coast Conference, Big East and Ivy League, among others.

"We have compiled an excellent schedule that will truly test us, from start to finish," said O'Brien, when announcing the slate this past summer. "Our non-conference foes combined to win nearly 100 games last season, and as a group finished with a winning record. That level of competition will certainly be advantageous for us in preparation for what is always a grueling conference slate."

Highlighting the campaign will be a home contest versus Boston College, which finished last year ranked seventh in the nation, won 18 games, and advanced to national quarterfinals. Another NCAA participant, Harvard, will also visit Lessing Field in the team's final non-conference game of the year.

The Stags open the year at Bryant the opening weekend of play, and five days later will host Binghamton in the home opener. Labor Day weekend finds the Stags at the D.C. Invitational as they play American and host Georgetown in the nation's capital. Fairfield will host Massachusetts, Army and Hartford in non-league play, while travelling to Stony Brook and Princeton.

The Stags will play four of their Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) games at home, hosting Manhattan, Saint Peter's, Canisius and Niagara. Fairfield begins MAAC play at Iona on October 1, and will conclude the regular season at Marist on Halloween, while also visiting Loyola, Rider and Siena during the regular season.

The 2010 MAAC Championship will be played November 5-7 at Loyola University Maryland in Baltimore. The top-four regular season finishers will meet at the Ridley Athletic Complex with the tournament champion earning a berth into the NCAA Tournament Field. The Stags have qualified for the MAAC Championship in each O'Brien's five seasons, winning the title in 2005 and 2008.

# 2009 REVIEW



**Nine Times:** The Fairfield University women's soccer team posted a 9-9-3 record during the 2009 campaign, its fifth consecutive season with at least nine victories. It marks the 16 times, in 18 campaigns, that the Stags have won at least that many games and gave the program its 16th year with at least a .500 record.

**Academic Success:** The Stags had seven players named to the All-MAAC Academic Team, headlined by seniors **Chrissie Sidie** and **Lisa Haylon**. To be eligible for the All-MAAC Academic Team. To be eligible for the MAAC All-Academic Team, a student athlete must complete two semesters at their institution and hold a cumulative grade point average of 3.20 on a 4.0 scale. The Stags sophomore class had five student-athletes – **Spenser Allaway, Kaitlin Denis, Bri Miller, Brittany Putnam** and **Jackie Taylor** – named to the squad.

**Tournament Regulars:** For the fifth time in as many seasons under head coach **Jim O'Brien** the Stags qualified for the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) Championship. Fairfield has qualified for the conference tournament in all but one of the 18 seasons the championship has been contested.

**Corniel's Counter:** **Jasmin Corniel** emerged as one of the top offensive threats, not only in the MAAC, but in the region, during her sophomore season. She finished the season as the Stags top scorer, with 25 points, including a team-best 10 goals. The campaign garnered her All-Northeast Second Team accolades, as well as a spot on the All-MAAC First Team.

**Magical Award Ceremony:** The Stags wrapped up the 2009 campaign at the annual conference awards ceremony, held this season at Disney's Hollywood Studios. **Spenser Allaway, Jasmin Corniel** and **Alyssa Decker** were named to the All-MAAC First Team, while **Adrienne Boyer, Kelly Boudreau** and **Nicole Cavallaro** were named to the All-MAAC Second Team. **Rachel Madasci** was also recognized, being voted to the All-MAAC Rookie Team.

**Big-Time Boyer:** **Adrienne Boyer** played well during the 2009 campaign, her senior season, and finished second on the squad with 15 points. She netted five goals, including the game-winner versus Rider during the regular season. Boyer also handed out five assists, giving her 16 for her career, and tying her for eighth in program history for career assists. Boyer started all 20 games in which she appeared dur-

ing the year, giving her 83 career appearances - second all-time, as well as finishing seventh in program history with 76 career starts.

**Team Academics:** For the 10th consecutive season the Stags were recognized with the NSCAA College Team Academic Award. The honor is presented annually to squads that post a team grade point average of 3.0 or higher.

**Backed By Boudreau:** **Kelly Boudreau** started 20 games for the Stags and in the process made 104 saves - the fifth highest single-season total in program history. She also blanked six opponents, on her way to nine wins, and finished the season fourth on the career list, with 15 shutouts.

**Senior Sensation:** **Bridget Nerich** started her final game, Senior Day, at home versus Loyola and made it a noteworthy one. She tied the program record that afternoon, stopping 14 shots in a heartbreaking overtime loss to the Greyhounds. Nerich played 138 minutes on the year, making 18 saves, and posting a .818 save percentage in her final campaign.

**Half-A-Century:** **Jim O'Brien** became the second coach in program history to earn 50 victories while at the helm of the Stags. His milestone came at home, versus Stony Brook, as Fairfield earned a 3-1 victory. He finished his fifth season at the helm of the team with 54 career Fairfield victories.

**Waking up Walsh:** **Allison Walsh** entered her preseason camp as a player that was going to see action during the year, but the expectations of a major role were in her future. She changed that idea pretty quickly however, appearing in every game the Stags played, and becoming a major part of the defensive unit. In fact, she made her first career start at Harvard, and then started each of the final five games of the year, including her first MAAC Tournament contest.

**Making It Work:** The 2009 Stags suffered numerous injuries throughout the season, starting their opening day line-up just five times on the year. **Casey Frobey** had a goal and four assists in the first six games of the year, before missing the rest of the year with a knee injury. Rookie **Nikki Stanton** missed the entire season rehabbing an ACL, while several others - **Nicole Cavallaro, Adrienne Boyer, Spenser Allaway, Chrissie Sidie** and **Bri Miller** - combined to miss over 30 games during the season.

**Preseason Awards:** **Nicole Cavallaro** headlined the Stags preseason award winners, being selected the MAAC's Preseason Player of the Year. She went on to finish third on the team in scoring, with 12 points, including eight assists, tops on the team and 57th in the nation. Cavallaro was named to the All-MAAC Second Team at the conclusion of the season, having started 19 of the 20 games in which she appeared.

**Closing The Gap:** The 2009 season marked the 18th varsity campaign for the Stags women's soccer program. Fairfield has posted a 199-125-35 record over the course of its 359 all-time games, and impressive .603 winning percentage.

**Iron-Women:** The 2009 season saw seven Stags step on the field in all 21 games, with three of them - **Jasmin Corniel, Alyssa Decker** and **Kaitlin Denis** - starting every game. **Jackie Taylor**, along with three rookies – **Rachel Madasci, Kasey Schulz** and **Alli Walsh** – all played in every game on the year.

## Women's Soccer Inductees

### ABBY ALLAN '00

#### Hall of Fame Class of 2006

Abby Allan was one of the guiding forces of the Fairfield women's soccer dominance in the last years of the previous century. She made her mark not only on the Stags record sections, but in conference records as well. The two-time MAAC Player of the Year, 1997 and 1998, Allan propelled the Stags to three consecutive conference titles, in 1997, '98 and '99. She is the school's all-time leading points scorer, tallying 139 during her four-year career. She also holds the school record for career goals, netting 58, and ranks third in the program's history with 23 assists. Allan ranks first and second in points and goals in a single-season. She set both marks in 1997, tallying 51 points, including 22 goals. The following season she finished with 43 points, with 18 goals to her credit. As a junior in 1998, Allan was named All-America Honorable Mention, the first in program history, by *SoccerBuzz*. Allan was the first Stag to earn MAAC Rookie of the Year honors, in 1996. She was a two-time All-MAAC First Team selection in 1997 and 1998 and concluded her career with an All-MAAC Second Team selection as a senior. Allan was named the MAAC Tournament MVP in 1997 and earned MAAC All-Tournament honors in 1998.



### KELLI HURLEY '98

#### Hall of Fame Class of 2003

Kelli Hurley epitomized the quality traits of a leader both on and off the field during her time at Fairfield. Hurley made her mark on the Stag record books, as she finished her career as the all-time leader in games played, goals, assists and points, while holding several single-game and single-season records. She capped off her remarkable career by being named to the NSCAA/UMBRO All-Northeast Third Team in 1997. She also led the Stags to their best single-season performance as a senior, finishing an impressive 18-4 overall and a perfect 9-0 in the MAAC en-route to earning a berth in the NCAA Tournament. Hurley is Fairfield's all-time assists leader, with 40. She ranks second all-time in the program's 15-year history, with 104 career points. Hurley netted 32 goals during the course of her career, which ranks fourth all-time for the Stags. She has her name three-times in the single-season assist list, twice recording 13 in a season (1996 and 1997) and once finishing with 11 (1994), three of the top four. Hurley graduated having played in 81 games, the most at the time, and still fourth most of any player. Hurley earned All-MAAC Academic Team honors, as well as being named an NSCAA Scholar-Athlete All-American.



### KARA (BURMASTER) HECKLER '96

#### Hall of Fame Class of 2002

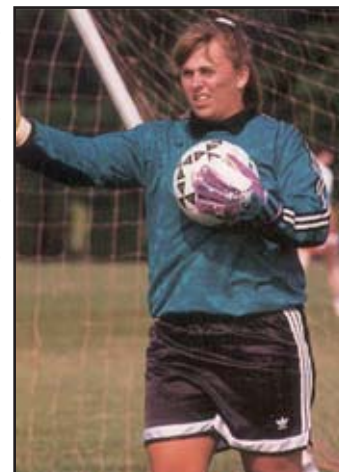
Kara (Burmester) Heckler was a guiding force in the midfield for the Stags, captaining the 1995 MAAC Championship team. At the conclusion of her senior season, Burmaster was the program's all-time leading scorer, with 65 points, which ranks her sixth all-time through 2006. She was named to the All-MAAC First Team three times, being voted on to the squad in 1993, 1994 and 1995. Burmaster excelled in the classroom as well, being named to the All-MAAC Academic Team in her sophomore, junior and senior years. In 1995 Burmaster was named to the MAAC All-Tournament Team. Her name remains throughout the Fairfield soccer program's record book. The 73 games she started, the most of any player at the time of her graduation, is currently 10th on the Stags all-time list. She netted 24 goals in her career, which is also 10th on the career list, while her 17 career assists ranks seventh in program history. Her eight assists during the 1995 season is the ninth best single-season effort in program history to this date.



### CHRISTEN VEACH '97

#### Hall of Fame Class of 2006

Christen Veach has been an integral member of the Fairfield women's soccer program as a player, coach and loyal alum. All told, she played a role in five MAAC regular season titles, five MAAC Tournament titles and the Stags first three NCAA Tournament appearances. She first made her mark as the Stags starting keeper, in the program's second season, 1993, leading the team to its first-ever MAAC Tournament title. She was named the MVP of that tournament, a feat she repeated in leading the Stags to the 1995 MAAC Tournament crown. Veach was named the MAAC Keeper of the Year three times, and is a three-time First Team All-MAAC selection. She ranks second in Fairfield history with 43 career wins and her 20 shutouts is third as well. Veach posted a 1.37 goals against average in her 77 starts, which still ranks tops all-time for a women's soccer player at Fairfield. When her playing days were complete she moved to the sideline, serving four seasons as an assistant coach. Under her tutelage, Anne Lyons was named the MAAC Keeper of the Year in 1998 and went on to break Veach's records for wins, with 49, and shutouts, with 24.5.

# This is Fairfield University

Fairfield University was founded by the Jesuits in 1942, in Fairfield, Conn. It is one of 28 Jesuit universities and colleges in the United States—a school shaped by one of the world's great intellectual, spiritual, and activist traditions. Following the Jesuit tradition, we are committed to educating the whole person - in body, mind, and spirit. By integrating living and learning, we free our students to realize their potential, giving each the confidence, the tools, and the boldness of vision to put their gifts to work in the world. A Fairfield education is an inspiring education, and the foundation for an inspired life.

## Location

Fairfield, overlooking Long Island Sound, is nestled in the southwest corner of Connecticut. It's central location provides students many cultural and social opportunities. Fairfield offers students the best of both worlds - a beautiful suburban setting situated in close proximity to some of the most dynamic corporate environments on the East Coast.

New York City is a mere hour away by car or train while Boston can be reached in under three hours. Fairfield is also 30 minutes away from Stamford, home to the corporate headquarters of dozens of Fortune 500 companies.

The quaint New England shore town of Fairfield has morphed into a lively suburb. It has familiar chain stores but is also home to an independent movie theater, an alternative weekly paper, and excellent restaurants. There are more than 1,000 acres of open space - forest, lakes, rivers - some of which are available for hiking and camping.

## A Fairfield Education

Students transition through four areas of focus as they progress through their four years at Fairfield. Freshman year community development, sophomore year is vocational exploration, junior year is civic engagement, and senior year is discernment.

First-year students find their place in the community, making the adjustment to independent living, looking to advisors and mentors for help, and becoming connected to others. Sophomores begin to focus their studies and ask, "What am I truly passionate about?" Students may choose to live in one of our special learning communities. Juniors consider their role in the larger world - "giving back" through leadership on campus or engagement with the communities beyond. Study abroad

and hands-on learning experiences lay the foundation for growth. By senior year, students enter a period of discernment, reflecting on where their future might lead. Capstone projects, senior retreats, and internships are all part of this process.

Undergraduate course work is grounded in Fairfield's core curriculum, a critical, comprehensive survey of essential knowledge in the major fields of study. Advanced course work often leads to a capstone project, an intensive, yearlong study of a focused topic.

The University's faculty conduct influential research and scholarship, serve as leaders in their fields, and share a commitment to social justice, to education that responds to human needs, and to intellectual inquiry that reaches across disciplinary boundaries. The heart of their work is the relationships they develop with students-as teachers and mentors, advisors, and research partners.

## Campus Life

Campus culture is defined by service and civic engagement, cultural exploration and creative expression, profound reflection and spirited, inspired activity. Approximately 3,300 students from 32 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and 45 countries are enrolled in the University. About 90 percent of Fairfield's students live on campus, making for a strong sense of community.

Fairfield offers a range of housing options, from traditional residence halls to townhouses and apartments. The University also sponsors special interest floors, including a floor for women involved in math and science, and a health and wellness floor. Every residence hall or living area has its own student association and Resident Assistants that are responsible for scheduling a variety of activities.

Students have the opportunity to become involved with more than 80 clubs and organizations, participate in an expansive intramural sports program, enjoy the 20 NCAA Division I varsity athletics programs, and work for an exceptionally active student government. In large numbers, they perform service in local, national, and international communities.

For the performing arts, the Regina A. Quick Center for the Arts, the cultural hub of the campus, hosts a professional season with acclaimed international artists in music, dance, and theater performances in both the acoustically superb 740-seat Kelley Theatre and the 150-seat Wien

Experimental (Black Box) Theatre, and the Thomas J. Walsh Gallery. The Center also hosts many of the other cultural activities presented by various University departments.

The Open VISIONS Forum is Fairfield's renowned public affairs lecture series - a stirring call to live the life of the mind. The series brings to campus the country's most innovative, iconoclastic writers, thinkers, artists, and performers. The goal is to stimulate a more lively, informed, unpredictable public debate. Recent speakers include prize-winning novelist Gore Vidal; former CNN anchor Campbell Brown, author Khaled Hosseini, and Robert F. Kennedy, Jr.

## Study Abroad

The study abroad program gives students a chance to engage – and transform – their understanding of themselves, how people live, and how societies work. Fairfield is proud to sponsor semester-long and short-term programs for every major in such countries as Australia, Ireland, Italy, and Nicaragua. Students have access to affiliated programs in countries around the world, from Chile to China, Ghana to Greece, Thailand to Turkey, including programs at The University of Maastricht in the Netherlands, Sophia University in Japan, and the London School of Economics.

## Service Learning and Community Service

As a Jesuit university, Fairfield is dedicated to being “men and women for others” – not simply students and teachers, but active responsible citizens in pursuit of a just, equitable world. Students can opt to take classes that include service or may develop their own service learning internship or independent study. The result is an experience that integrates theory and practice, action and reflection, civic activism, and serious scholarship.

The Office of Service Learning continues to build on Fairfield's long history of successful community service programs, partnerships with local organizations, and service learning initiatives. More than half of Fairfield's students are engaged in service in local, national, and international communities. For example, the student-run Hunger Cleanup has won several major awards from the National Student Campaign Against Hunger and Homelessness. Fairfield's Campus Ministry sponsors a broad range of volunteer programs: weekly engagements at

local schools and health care facilities, soup kitchens; and national and international service trips to communities in Kentucky and West Virginia, Nicaragua, Jamaica, Ecuador, Haiti, and Mexico.

## Career Planning and Internship Opportunities

The Career Planning Center, located in the Aloysius P. Kelley, S.J. Center, helps students identify and achieve career goals; whether they are graduate school, a year of post-grad service, or an immediate job. The Center offers Career Fairs, job listings, counseling services, specific data on the current job market, workshops on topics such as resume writing, interviewing techniques and personal statements. The Center works with outside organizations and invites them to post job/internship listings and offers them the opportunity to recruit on campus.

The Center works collaboratively with the schools and colleges of the University to provide internship opportunities for undergraduate students. An internship can be completed for academic credit once approved by the major department or school; some internships offer a stipend. Internships should support a student's academic course of study or professional development and training.

While the Center primarily serves undergraduate students, its services are open to all students and graduates of Fairfield. Undergraduates are encouraged to familiarize themselves with and use the Center's services prior to senior year, and graduates are always welcomed back.

## After Fairfield

More than 90 percent of Fairfield's graduates find employment within six months of commencement. Fairfield alumni are also a strong resource available to students. Even after leaving Fairfield, many graduates stay in touch, making themselves available to current students to help them evaluate careers and investigate their options. Through the Fairfield Alumni Network (FAN), sponsored by Alumni Relations, students can call on some 1,400 graduates working in a wide variety of fields who volunteer their time as mentors and advisors.

Fairfield regularly produces more winners of the Fulbright grant, the most prestigious international scholarship awarded by the U.S. Government. Fifty-five Fairfield University students have been awarded Fulbrights since 1993.

## Lessing Field

The Fairfield University soccer and lacrosse programs play their home games on Lessing Field. Renovated in 2003, the playing surface was expanded for soccer and the grass surface itself was replaced with a high-durability sod. Irrigation and drainage systems were installed along with lights to allow for night games. Along with a scoreboard and a press box, the renovation has given the Stags one of the league's top facilities. The 600-seat stadium is Stag fan-friendly as it is located centrally on campus.

Lessing Field has played host to numerous conference championships, hosting four MAAC Soccer Championships since 2004. In 2007 Lessing Field was the location for both the men's and women's tournaments, with each championship being aired live on ESPNU, as was the 2006 men's title game, also from the Fairfield campus.



## Directions to Fairfield

**From Interstate 95 North:** Take Exit 22 (Round Hill Road) which is also an exit for a rest area. Stay right on the exit and proceed to stop sign. Go straight through the stop sign to the end of road. Make left onto North Benson Road. Continue on North Benson Road to Fairfield University Main Entrance and turn left.

**From Interstate 95 South:** Take Exit 22 (North Benson Road). Turn right onto North Benson Road. Follow to Fairfield University main entrance and turn left.

**From Merritt Parkway:** Take Exit 44. Follow Rt. 58 South (Black Rock Turnpike). Proceed two miles to Stillson Road (Rt. 135), where you will see the Angus Steak House on the corner. Turn right onto Stillson and bear left onto North Benson Road at second traffic light. The University's main entrance is one mile on the right.



# Athletic Support Services



## Strength and Conditioning

The Strength and Conditioning Center is a 4,700-square foot facility located in the Walsh Athletic Center for exclusive use by student-athletes. The facility, one of the best in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC), is designed to meet the changing needs of today's student-athletes and is staffed with a full-time strength and conditioning coach.

A quality strength and conditioning program is an integral part of Fairfield's athletic programs and Head Strength & Conditioning Coach Mark Spellman is responsible for supervising, developing, and implementing workouts for all varsity athletes. Coach Spellman's programs reach team and individual performance goals.

Coach Spellman, a nationally certified conditioning specialist, supervises the University's varsity weight room. His goal is to decrease the potential for injuries while developing athletes who are stronger, faster, more powerful, flexible, and metabolically efficient.

Each year, teams are placed on sport-specific, periodical training programs and Spellman works closely with the Sports Medicine Department to provide individualized attention to athletes who have specific needs or require injury rehabilitation.

## Sports Medicine

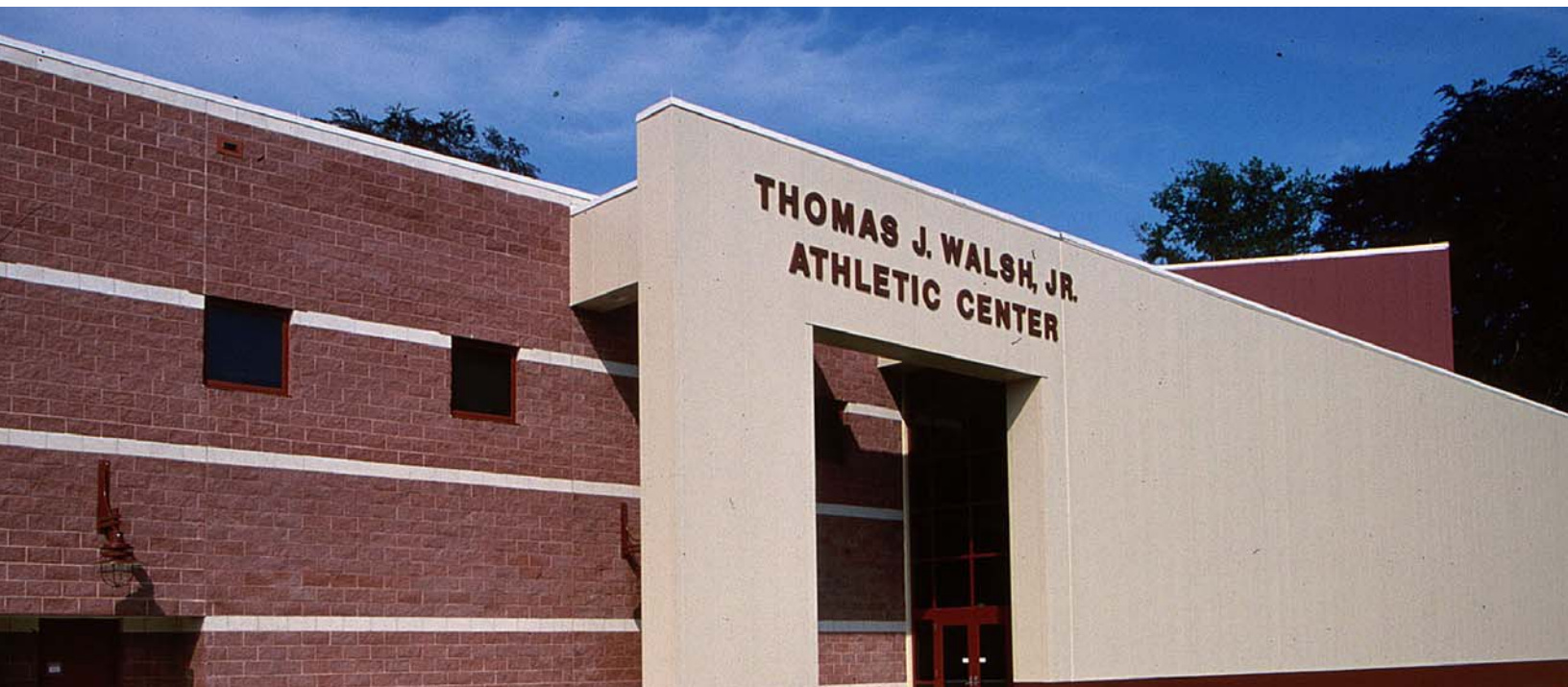
The Sports Medicine Department at Fairfield University is a vital part of the student-athlete experience. The sports medicine facility is located in the Walsh Athletic Center, with a staff comprised of five Nationally Certified Athletic Trainers, including three full-time and two graduate assistant trainers.

Director of Sports Medicine, Mark Ayotte, supervises the day-to-day activities for more than 500 student-athletes in 20 intercollegiate athletic programs. Under his guidance, the sports medicine staff works with student-athletes by providing information and techniques for proper conditioning and nutrition. The staff also supervises and conducts any physical therapy and rehabilitation protocols that a student-athlete may have to follow to safely return to competition.

Additionally, the department has an extensive support staff consisting of a variety of first-rate medical and health professionals. Members of this support staff include: a group of orthopedic physicians, dentists, a plastic surgeon, neurologists, a dermatologist, cardiologists, an ophthalmologist, a sports psychologist, a sports nutritionist and physical therapists. These dedicated individuals provide an invaluable service to injured or ill student-athletes and are readily-available for consultations.

## Thomas J. Walsh, Jr. Athletic Center

Fairfield University's commitment to athletics is best illustrated by the completion of the Thomas J. Walsh, Jr. Athletic Center, a 51,000 square-foot structure that caters to the academic and athletic needs of its student-athletes. Perhaps the building's most significant feature is a high-tech academic study center that is reserved for student-athlete use. The center includes individual and group study areas, computer terminals, hardwire and wireless internet access, a portal to educational systems, and a complete reference library. The building also serves the athlete as well, offering a practice gymnasium for men's and women's basketball as well as volleyball. Plus, all administrative offices and the majority of coaches' offices are located in the Athletic Center, which centralizes the Athletics Department. The first floor contains state-of-the-art locker rooms for all athletic teams, a 4,700 square-foot weight training center, and coaches' locker rooms.



## Academic Support

Fairfield is committed to a strong academic support program for its student-athletes. In 1995, the Athletic Department implemented a new support service designed to meet the unique needs of the college student-athlete. This office and its full-time staff was established to enhance the University through the promotion of the student-athlete's wholesome self concept.

Year-round programs encompass daily academic development as well as career goals and personal growth. The programs provide an academic support system that integrates the use of study halls, tutorials, basic study skills workshops, and personal advising. The support services are tailored to meet the specific needs of each student-athlete.



Mary Ann Palazzi, coordinator of student programs, and her staff of seven, offer services that include guidance and one-on-one counseling on everything from registration to tutoring services.

The Academic Center, located in the Walsh Athletic Center, is reserved for the exclusive use of student-athletes. The room encompasses individual and group study areas, a dozen desktop computers with internet access for research and desktop publishing. In 2006, the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) raised funds to have the center set up with full wireless internet capacity, so student-athletes can use personal laptops.

## Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC)

The Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) is a committee made up of student-athletes assembled to provide insight on the student-athlete experience. The SAAC also offers input on the rules, regulations, and policies that affect student-athletes' lives at Fairfield. Each varsity team is represented by at least one student-athlete and may be eligible to serve on the NCAA Student-Athlete Advisory Committee.

Additionally, the SAAC is very involved with giving back to the community. The members participate in the Relay For Life, and sponsor toy drives along with other volunteer work.

## S.T.A.G.S.

The Skills to Achieve Growth and Success (S.T.A.G.S.) program is specially designed to assist student-athletes in their overall development. The S.T.A.G.S. program encompasses an ongoing approach to impart and reinforce the skills necessary to meet the academic rigors of Fairfield University.

# Community Service

In fulfilling the Jesuit ideals of Fairfield University, the Stags are involved in many community service and service learning projects throughout the year. ## Eugene P. Doris

Fairfield Athletics Director (Fordham, 1974)

Fairfield Athletics has flourished under the guidance of Eugene P. Doris, who begins his 16th year as the director of athletics. His responsibilities include overseeing the varsity athletic program.

In 2010, Doris was named the Division I Athletics Director of the Year for the Northeast at the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA). He also received the Distinguished service award from the Metropolitan Basketball Writers Association.

Under his leadership, the varsity athletic program has undergone many changes, including increasing the number of varsity sports to 20 and the improvement of athletic facilities, a softball field, an artificial turf field and the construction of a multi-million dollar athletic facility. Doris has seen the Stags win the overall MAAC Commissioner's Cup twice, while the men have won the Cup twice and the women's teams an impressive five times.

In 2004, Doris received the Constituent Supporter of the Year award from the Coastal Fairfield County Convention and Visitors Bureau for his role in bringing the 2004 NCAA Women's Basketball First and Second rounds to the Arena at Harbor Yard. Doris was also instrumental in securing the 2006 NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament Regionals, and the 2007 MAAC Men's and Women's Basketball Tournaments. Fairfield also hosted the 2008 NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament First and Second rounds and played co-host the 2009 and 2011 NCAA Men's Ice Hockey East Regional.

Doris remains active off campus, serving on both regional and national committees, as well as several MAAC committees. He has also served a term as president of the ECAC, the nation's largest athletic conference, and has sat on the Division I-AA Athletic Directors Football Committee.

Prior to Fairfield, Doris was the athletics director at Marist College for five years, during which time Marist increased the number of its intercollegiate athletic teams from 14 to 20. He enjoyed a five-year stay at Fordham University where he started as an assistant athletic director before earning a promotion to associate athletic director. He was also an assistant basketball coach at Fordham under Richard "Digger" Phelps.

He coached basketball for 11 years at Archbishop Stepinac High School in White Plains, N.Y., where his team won the Division II New York Catholic High School Championship in 1985. He also coached baseball at Stepinac for eight seasons, as well as JV baseball at Archbishop Molloy High School in Jamaica, N.Y. In 2007, Doris was inducted into the Catholic High School Athletic Association (CHSAA) Hall of Fame for his contribution to the New York City-based league.

Doris holds a B.A., and an M.A. from Fordham.



## Jeffrey von Arx, S.J.

Fairfield President (Princeton, 1969)

In July 2004, Rev. Jeffrey von Arx, S.J., assumed the presidency of Fairfield University, becoming the eighth Jesuit to hold the position since the institution's founding in 1942.

Fr. von Arx brings to Fairfield broad academic interests, an integrated view of learning, and a zest for student life born of having lived in undergraduate residence halls throughout his years at Georgetown and Fordham. His approach to the intellectual life reflects the best of what Jesuit education offers the world – the integration of knowledge and values as the foundation for unity of mind, body, and spirit.

An historian by discipline, Fr. von Arx began his academic career at Georgetown University, where he taught in the History Department from 1982 to 1998 and was its chair from 1991 to 1997. He then moved into administration at Fordham University, serving as Dean of Fordham College at Rose Hill from 1998 until his selection as president by the Fairfield University Board of Trustees in 2004.

Born in Bellefont, Penn., Fr. von Arx grew up in Locust Valley on the north shore of Long Island. He graduated from Princeton University in 1969 and entered the Society of Jesus that summer. He subsequently earned an M.A. and M.Phil. in history at Yale University, and completed his Ph.D. there in 1980. A year later, Fr. von Arx received an M.Div. from the Weston School of Theology and was ordained a priest.

Fr. von Arx has served or is currently on the boards of trustees of Boston College, Canisius College, Loyola Marymount University, and Xavier University, as well as the Commission on New England Association of Schools and Colleges. He was appointed to the Fairfield Board in 2002 and as President, continues to serve as a trustee.

A noted scholar and historian, Fr. von Arx is the author of numerous articles as well as the books *Progress and Pessimism: Religion, Politics and History in Late Nineteenth-Century Britain* (Harvard University Press, 1985) and *Varieties of Ultramontanism* (Catholic University Press, 1998).
