



A LETTER FROM STAG COUNTRY

VICE PRESIDENT FOR ATHLETICS PAUL SCHLICKMANN

Dear Stags Family,

It was this time last year that we published our Annual Report to rightfully celebrate an outstanding year that saw our Stags win three MAAC Championships and record eight runner-up conference finishes. While we secured our first Commissioner's Cup win in more than a decade, we knew there was a collective desire to continue our competitive progression and achieve greater heights. Thus, on the heels of that success, we chose the theme Forged Resilient for 2024-25 to serve as a daily mantra and motivating guidepost in our relentless pursuit of competitive excellence.

Our student-athletes and staff answered the call and upheld the spirit of that theme with exceptional results and an historic year for Stags Athletics, earning a record EIGHT conference titles – including four from teams that finished in second place the prior year – as well as ten individual MAAC championships.

All of this culminated in our second consecutive MAAC Commissioner's Cup and fourth straight MAAC Women's Commissioner's Cup. These accomplishments fueled eight NCAA tournament appearances and unprecedented success on the national stage with our best-ever performance in the Learfield Director's Cup, where we finished 10th of more than 100 schools in the I-AAA classification and fifth among the 21 Division I Jesuit Catholic institutions.

In the pages that follow, you will see the unique achievements of our 20 varsity athletics programs and the remarkable individual accomplishments of our 500 student-athletes in all aspects of their holistic educational experience, including a record 3.57 department GPA and the completion of more than 4,000 hours of community service!

Every new success and every new milestone is undoubtedly a reflection of TEAM and FAMILY. Our Stags have created and fostered a culture of hard work, commitment, and collective accountability that permeates our department and inspires all of us to become the best version of ourselves in support of one another.

As you view the 2024-25 Annual Report, I encourage you to join us in celebrating our historic year. As alumni, students, parents, and fans, you are and will always be integral to the ongoing success of the Fairfield Stags. Your support reached new heights this past year, with a record 3,295 gifts to Fairfield Athletics totaling more than \$2.9 million – including an all-time high of \$2.68 million in operational support.

Your contributions to our record-setting fundraising efforts, the boisterous crowds that fill our home venues, and overall support for our student-athletes in all their endeavors are vital to our growth as an institution and an athletics department and our continued rise to national prominence.

FAIRFIELD WINS SECOND CONSECUTIVE MAAC COMMISSIONER'S CUP, FOURTH STRAIGHT WOMEN'S COMMISSIONER'S CUP

For the second consecutive year and the sixth time in program history, Fairfield University Athletics has won the Richard J. Ensor, Esq. MAAC Commissioner's Cup.

The Stags also claimed the Commissioner's Cup for Women's Sports for the fourth straight academic year, as Fairfield Athletics won seven Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Championships and eight conference titles in total during the 2024-25 season.

The Richard J. Ensor, Esq. MAAC Commissioner's Cup is awarded annually as a symbol of overall excellence in athletics in the 23 championships conducted within the MAAC. Only the scores from Men's & Women's Basketball, plus the top six men's and top six women's scores are used to determine an institution's total points.

"We are honored and thrilled to receive the 2024-25 Ensor Commissioner's Cup. This is a true TEAM Award!" said Fairfield Vice President for Athletics Paul Schlickmann. "It is indicative of our University and Athletics Department's shared vision and commitment to comprehensive competitive excellence. We are grateful to all our campus partners who provide relentless support to our programs throughout the year."

After winning back-to-back Commissioner's Cups for the first time, Fairfield has now won a total of six – trailing only Marist (12) among current conference members. The Stags' 13th Women's Commissioner's Cup extends their own conference record.

FAIRFIELD WINS SECOND CONSECUTIVE MAAC COMMISSIONER'S CUP, FOURTH STRAIGHT WOMEN'S COMMISSIONER'S CUP

"On behalf of all of us at Fairfield, we are delighted to once again bring home the MAAC Commissioner's Cup. To win this award for the second consecutive year is a testament to our commitment to achievement and pre-eminence in all our endeavors," said President Mark R. Nemec, PhD. "As our university continues its rise in national prominence, our student-athletes, in partnership with our coaches and athletic staff, have consistently carried forward as models of modern excellence, not only as accomplished athletes, but as exemplary students, and as men and women for others in our community."

This year's Commissioner's Cup victory was carried by an impressive collection of MAAC Championships as the Stags claimed seven MAAC Tournament Titles. Fairfield raised the championship trophy in Women's Soccer, Volleyball, Women's Basketball, Women's Lacrosse, Men's Golf, Women's Rowing and Baseball and won the MAAC Regular Season Championship in Women's Soccer, Volleyball, Women's Basketball and Women's Lacrosse.

In addition to team accolades, Fairfield student-athletes won 10 individual MAAC Championships encompassing Women's Cross Country, Men's and Women's Swimming & Diving, Women's Tennis, Men's Golf and Women's Rowing.

"I applaud all our student-athletes, coaches, administrators, and support staff for their collective effort in achieving this annual goal while recording the most successful year in Stags Athletics history," said Schlickmann. "Each of our 20 varsity programs and all 500 student-athletes – even those who don't compete in the MAAC – foster a dynamic culture in which we support each other, challenge each other, and hold each other accountable in ways that allow us to achieve and celebrate success."

Fairfield Athletics finished the 2024-25 academic year with a record of 209-143-6 (.592) in head-to-head contests. This mark includes a 124-43-4 (.737) tally in conference play and a 103-39-1 (.724) record in all home games.

STAGS RANK TOP 10 IN I-AAA IN FINAL LEARFIELD DIRECTORS' CUP STANDINGS

Fairfield University Athletics ranked among the top 10 I-AAA programs in the nation in the final Learfield Directors' Cup Standings for the 2024-25 academic year. The Stags were also the top MAAC program on the final ledger, more than doubling-up second-place Quinnipiac.

The Learfield Cup measures success across all NCAA programs with points earned for participation and advancement in NCAA Tournament play. The University of Texas was the overall Learfield Cup champion, while the University of Denver topped the I-AAA classification.

Fairfield finished 10th in the I-AAA class, which includes the more than 100 Division I athletic programs that do not sponsor football. The Stags garnered 185 points in the standings after winning a school-record eight conference championships in 2024-25. Fairfield claimed conference titles and NCAA postseason berths in women's soccer, volleyball, women's basketball, men's golf, women's lacrosse, women's rowing and baseball, along with an NEC Championship in field hockey.

In addition to breaking into the top-10 in I-AAA, Fairfield's 185 points placed them atop the MAAC significantly in front of second-place Quinnipiac's 80 total points. The Stags also ranked fifth of the 21 Division I Jesuit institutions in final the Learfield Cup standings.

Fairfield was joined in the top 10 in I-AAA by Denver, Boston University, Pepperdine, UC Santa Barbara, Providence, Vermont, Loyola Marymount, Creighton and Cal Baptist.

HEAD COACH JACKIE KANE '87

After a career spanning 30 years, Head Coach Jackie Kane retired as the leader of Fairfield Field Hockey at the conclusion of the 2024 season.

A 1987 Fairfield graduate, Kane won 263 games at Fairfield since taking the helm in 1995. The 2024 Northeast Conference Championship marked her sixth conference title with the Stags while also leading Fairfield into the NCAA postseason for the sixth time.

"It has been an honor and a privilege to represent Fairfield Field Hockey for 30 years," said Kane. "Thank you to Paul Schlickmann for his support of the amazing young women that have come through our program, and to Gene Doris for believing in me and taking a chance on me as a first-time college head coach. Thank you to all of my assistant coaches over the years, as well as the countless others who have been a part of this journey, especially Alison Sexton, Mark Ayotte and Jack Jones who have been supporting the field hockey program for almost as long as I have."

"Most of all," Kane continued, "I want to thank all of the past and present Fairfield University Field Hockey student-athletes and their families for allowing me to be a part of their lives. It has been my pleasure to serve as your coach. Fairfield Field Hockey is and will always be a huge part of my life. I am looking forward to leading the team this fall and continuing to be a part of this amazing program as an alumna, friend and fan for many years to come. Once a Stag, always a Stag."

Kane has led the Stags to six NCAA postseason appearances after winning the Patriot League Championship in 2001, the MAAC Championship in 2015 and 2017 and the NEC Championship in 2019 and 2021. Kane and her staff were named the NFHCA Mideast Region Coaching Staff of the Year in 2019 after earning an NFHCA national ranking and winning a program-record 19 games – including the first-ever NCAA postseason win in program history with a 3-1 win over #23 American on University Field. Kane's players have been recognized as All-Conference, Conference Player of the Year, Regional All American and All Americans throughout her tenure.

Kane's 263 career wins rank 33rd all-time in NCAA Division I history. After coaching her 30th campaign in 2024, she surpassed former Fairfield Men's Tennis Head Coach Dr. Joseph Grassi as the longest tenured varsity head coach in Fairfield Athletics history.

Individually, Kane has coached more than 40 NFHCA Regional All-Americans, 14 conference Players of the Year and the first three All-Americans in program history.

During her tenure, Kane also espoused the importance of community service to her student-athletes which led to many projects including fundraisers for the Susan G. Komen Foundation, Play for the Cure, Lil Stags Field Hockey as well as many local organizations. The program also reached out to communities beyond the United States, planning service trips to places such as Barbados and parts of Europe.

In addition to the success on the pitch, Kane saw her student-athletes excel academically. The Stags received individual and team recognition for their accomplishments in the classroom over her 30 years at the helm. In 2021, Fairfield Field Hockey ranked #1 in NCAA Division I for highest team GPA with 24 student-athletes named to the NFHCA National Academic Squad. That squad owned a 3.79 team GPA in the fall, which was also best among all Fairfield athletic teams that year.

A four-year member of the Fairfield Field Hockey team as a student-athlete from 1983-86, Kane graduated in 1987 with a B.A. in Communication. She earned an M.A. in Education from Saint Joseph's in 1992. She began her coaching career at her high school alma mater – Mount St. Joseph Academy in Flourtown, Pa, where Kane led the Chiefs to two championship games and posted a 38-7-5 record in three seasons.







Fairfield Athletics received four "Best Of" Awards from the National Association of Collegiate Marketing Administrators at the organization's annual convention.

The Stags' marketing team earned two Gold awards and two Bronze awards for campaigns and promotions during the 2024-25 academic year.

"We are honored to be recognized by NACMA, and we enthusiastically share these awards with our partners and with all of Fairfield Athletics," said Sarah Ratchford, Associate Director of Athletics for Marketing & Revenue Generation. Zachary Maloy's Commencement Address to the Class of 2025

Good morning, everyone! President Nemec, members of the Board of Trustees, members of the faculty and administration, honored guests, family, friends, and most importantly, the outstanding members of the Class of 2025!

Four years ago, most of us showed up here enthusiastic, slightly anxious, and, at least for me. uncertain how to use a laundry machine. We were all more or less strangers, dropped off and left to explore. We had a lot of questions: "Will I make friends? Will I fit in? What if I fail?" And now, as we stand on the edge of the next chapter, I can say this with confidence: We did fail. We did get lost. But we also succeeded in making friends who became family. We've been cracked open by failure and stitched back together by friendship. We found our footing, not in perfection, but in people. And that's what Fairfield gave us —more than a degree, more than a major—it gave us each other. If I could name one truth Fairfield made undeniable, it's this:

People are the education. Impact is the legacy.

Since we stepped foot on campus, we've all participated in one big social experiment. Our time here wasn't just about preparing for careers. It was about discovering the value of true connection. Somewhere between freshman orientation and our senior victory lap, we learned the kind of things you just can't teach in a classroom: How to be someone others can count on. How to lead with compassion, not just charisma. Fairfield didn't just prepare us for the workforce—it prepared us for life.

I've had the privilege of having multiple corporate internships and during my time at various firms. I've had the opportunity to speak with a wide range of executives, and when I asked them what their greatest lesson was, the overwhelming majority of them never mentioned technical skills. Instead, they stressed the soft skills. Being the kind of person others want to work with, grow with, and live life alongside. That's what we've practiced every day, with each other. And that, my friends, is the ultimate edge in a world starved for real connection.

We studied for exams, sure—but we also studied each other. We spent time on relationships, on reflection, on growing into who we're meant to be. Fairfield taught us that education isn't just about learning what to think, but how. How to be with people, not just around them. This was done in the most effective way possible—through experiential learning. I think about the fun nights that turned into mornings, friendships that turned into lifelines, and shared experiences that became core memories. We learned empathy from late-night talks in Loyola Hall. We learned resilience from athletic games in Mahoney Arena and at the RecPlex.

We learned humor over meals at the Tully and parties at the beach. We even learned leadership in class—while trying to get everyone to pull their weight in the group project. These moments, and many others, are what made this ride unforgettable.

And they're more than just people. They're life-enhancers. We often hear: "College is the best four years of your life." I disagree. College is the four years that teach you how to live the best years of your life. Because what we built here —these relationships, this community, this Fairfield family — it's not just nostalgia; It's foundation.

And under the often, overwhelming societal pressure to constantly achieve and accumulate wealth, Fairfield encouraged us to achieve the magis — the greater more. To live with more meaning. More courage. More impact. And that ability? That capacity to connect? That's emotional intelligence. The world doesn't need perfect people. It needs consistent ones. People who call back. Who cheer the loudest. Who lead with humility, not ego. Those are the types of qualities you don't put on a resume. But it's the kind that builds the type of person people remember.

This — all of this — is what Father Mac meant when he said, "Cura personalis." It's clear that the memories that stick are the people, and they're the reason why Fairfield felt like home. These relationships, this community, is what turns a school into something sacred. We've come to realize that the people beside us matter— a lot! Many of us have met our best friends here. And some of us are already on track to become future Stag mates!

So look around you now — seriously! You probably see someone who, in some capacity — big or small — changed your life, or will. Someone who laughed with you, cried with you, pushed you, or walked with you through every twist and turn of these four years. This is the Fairfield education. You're not just classmates; you are all future colleagues, partners, and lifelong friends. You're all a part of a network of future leaders and agents of change—all coming from this university! This class should not only inspire you, but more importantly it should make you proud to be a Stag!

Now here we are on the eve of adventures unknown. Both excited and nostalgic. Ready, and yet wishing we could hit pause just a little longer. That mix of emotions? That's not weakness. That's love. That's a sign you cared deeply about this place and the people in it. That means you really lived this season of your life. And now, you're ready to carry it forward.

As we go into the world, remember this: your legacy will never be your title. Rather, it'll be your impact on the people around you. Your job isn't just to succeed. It's to create value in the lives of others. That's success! It's someone saying, "I'm better because you were in my life." It's being the person others want beside them when it matters most. Jim Carrey said, "The effect you have on others is the most valuable currency there is."

So let's be the people Fairfield would be proud to call alumni—not just by what we achieve, but by how we influence others. Because at the end of the day, you can teach someone how to write a business plan. But you can't teach them how to authentically connect with people and build genuine relationships.
