ILLINOIS vs. MIAMI (OHIO)

FOR OPENERS

- The Fighting Illini (2-1) return to Memorial Stadium to host the Miami (Ohio) Redhawks (0-3) after an open date last weekend. Illinois is coming off a 34-24 loss to No. 19 Washington at Soldier Field on Sept. 14.
- The revamped Illinois offense, directed by new offensive coordinator **Bill Cubit**, has jumped at least 60 spots in the national rankings from last year to this year in passing offense, passing efficiency, scoring offense, total offense and turnovers lost, with the biggest turnaround a 95-place swing in long plays from scrimmage. The results have been astounding:

- Illinois tallied nine scrimmage plays of 20-plus yards against Cincinnati and has 21 plays of 20-plus yards on the season, ranking 27th nationally. The Illini had 34 plays of 20-plus yards in the entire 2012 season, ranking 122nd nationally (out of 124). The Orange and Blue's 17 passing plays of 20-plus yards is the 15th-most nationally and their four passing plays of 50-plus yards ranks sixth nationally.
- Senior QB **Nathan Scheelhaase** appears to have saved his best season for last. A four-year starter, Scheelhaase has thrived in Cubit's system, leading the Big Ten and ranking in the top 25 in the nation in both total offense (300.7 ypg, 24th) and passing yards per game (294.7, 15th) through week four.
- Running back **Josh Ferguson** and wide receiver **Ryan Lankford** rank 1-2 in the Big Ten in yards per reception. Ferguson ranks third in the nation with a 26.4 yards-per-catch average (seven receptions, 185 yards, two TDs), while Lankford ranks 12th nationally at 22.5 yards per catch (10 receptions, 225 yards, one TD).
- Senior LB and Butkus Award candidate **Jonathan Brown** leads the Big Ten and ranks third nationally in tackles per game (12.7). Brown had 15 stops against Washington, a BIG single-game high this season. Sophomore LB **Mason Monheim** is averaging 10.0 tackles per game to rank 24th nationally and second in the Big Ten behind only teammate Brown.
- The Illinois return game has improved in a big way. After ranking 107th nationally in kick returns (18.83 ypr) and 118th in punt returns (1.56 ypr) in 2012, the Illini have a 100-yard kickoff return TD from sophomore **V'Angelo Bentley** vs. SIU, the first UI kick return TD since 2008, and a 38-yard punt return from **Miles Osei** vs. Cincinnati, the longest by an Illini since 2004. Illinois currently ranks 11th nationally in kickoff returns (28.00 ypr) and 51st in punt returns (8.7 ypr), improvements of 96 and 67 spots, respectively.
- Illinois is one of five teams in the nation with a perfect fourth-down conversion percentage (1-of-1) and one of 16 teams with a perfect fourth-down conversion percentage defense (0-of-3). Only the Fighting Illini and top-ranked Alabama (1-of-1 and 0-of-1, respectively) are perfect in both categories this season.

- The Illini are playing their fourth-straight game in the state of Illinois on Saturday, with the Southern Illinois, Cincinnati and Miami (Ohio) contests at Memorial Stadium and the Washington game on Sept. 14 in Chicago's Soldier Field. Illinois plays its first road game on Oct. 5 at Nebraska, which will be the latest UI has played its first game outside the state's borders since 1994, when the Illini also played at Soldier Field and had three home games before playing a road game.

ILLINI STAFF TO PARTICIPATE IN COACH TO CURE MD WEEK

Illinois coach **Tim Beckman** and staff join forces with coaches around the country this weekend to support the Coach to Cure MD program. All the Fighting Illini coaches will be wearing patches on their sleeves for the Miami (Ohio) game on Sept. 28 to raise awareness and funding for Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy research, and a family who has been affected by the disease will participate in the coin toss prior to the game. BUSY SPORTS WEEKEND IN CHAMPAÑA

Saturday's football game against Miami (Ohio) is the centerpiece of a busy sports weekend in Champaign-Urbana, which is fitting for the annual Dads Weekend on campus. On Friday night, Fighting Illini volleyball hosts Iowa at State Farm Center (7 p.m.), while soccer also hosts the Hawkeyes at the same time. Following the football game on Saturday, volleyball faces Nebraska at Huff Hall at 4 p.m. before the men's and women's basketball teams kick off their preseason at Illini Street Jam, which will be held outdoors at the intersection of Green and Wright Streets in Campustown. Then on Sunday, the Illini host the eighth-annual SoccerFest against Nebraska at 1 p.m.

BYE WEEK FACTS

- The Fighting Illini are coming off an open weekend heading into Saturday's Miami (Ohio) game. It's the first of two byes for Illinois this season, marking just the fourth time in school history that the team has more than one open week in a season. The only other times were in 1989, 2009 and 2010.
- Illinois has played 32 games after a bye in the modern era (since 1985 when byes became commonplace) and is 11-21 in those contests. The Illini have lost 10 straight games coming off a bye, with their last win coming over Indiana (45-14) on Oct. 26, 2002.

MIAMI (OHIO) SERIES NOTES

- Illinois holds a 2-0 lead in the all-time series against Miami (Ohio), winning 20-7 in Champaign in 1932 and 45-0 in Champaign in 1941.
- Illini head coach Tim Beckman is 1-1 against Miami (Ohio) as a head coach, beating them 49-28 in 2011 when he led Toledo, and falling to the RedHawks 31-24 in 2009, his first season at UT.
- Illini defensive line coach Greg Colby and RedHawk defensive coordinator Jay Peterson coached together at Northwestern in 2002 and 2003, when Colby was defensive coordinator and Peterson led the defensive line.

FORMER ILLINI HEADING TO SPACE

- Former Illini defensive back and current NASA astronaut Mike Hopkins was scheduled to make his first space flight on Wednesday, Sept. 25. Hopkins and crewmates Oleg Kotov and Sergey Ryazanskiy were set to launch from Baikonur Kazakhstan at 3:58 pm CT on Wednesday, and were set to arrive at the International Space Station approximately six hours later. Hopkins will remain on board as a Flight Engineer on Expedition 37/Expedition 38, which is scheduled to end with the Soyuz landing in March 2014. During its time on the station, the crew will conduct science experiments and maintenance. - Hopkins played for coach John Mackovic at Illinois, helping the Fighting Illini reach four straight bowl games from 1988-91. He started his career as a walk-on and by the time he was a senior he was a team captain. He graduated from Illinois in 1991 with a degree in aerospace engineering and got his master's degree in aerospace engineering from Stanford in 1992. A colonel in the U.S. Air Force, Hopkins was selected in July 2009 as one of 14 members of the 20th NASA astronaut class.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

- Illinois has shown a great ability to sustain drives early in the season. Through three games, the Illini have six drives of 10-plus plays, five of which ended with scores and resulted in a total of 27 points. Last year, Illinois managed only 11 scoring drives of 10 or more plays.
- Conversely, the Illini also have shown quick-strike capability, with four scoring drives of zero, one or two plays. V'Angelo Bentley's 100-yard kickoff return against Southern Illinois doesn't even register in the game's drive chart, and the Illini had two-play scoring drives against SIU and Cincinnati. Most recently, Nathan Scheelhaase hit Ryan Lankford with a 72-yard touchdown strike late in the third quarter against Washington, a one-play drive that required only 16 seconds.
- Illinois' offense has been amazingly balanced, as 13 different players have caught a pass and nine different players have had a rushing attempt. Against Cincinnati, 11 different players caught passes, equaling the most since 11 players caught at least one pass against Purdue on Oct. 30, 2010.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

- The Illini have held opponents 0-for-3 on fourth down this year, making Illinois one of 16 teams in FBS yet to allow a fourth-down conversion and one of only eight to stay perfect in three or more attempts.
- Butkus Award candidate **Jonathan Brown** leads the Big Ten with 38 tackles and ranks third in the nation at 12.7 tackles per game after a 15-tackle performance against Washington, a single-game Big Ten high for this season. Over the last two years, Brown has put up monster numbers when healthy. He was leading the Illini with 59 tackles, 9.5 tackles for loss and 2.5 sacks in 2012 before having his season cut short by a shoulder injury. That followed a breakout 2011 season, when he earned All-Big Ten honors with 108 tackles, 19.5 tackles for loss and six sacks. He ranked sixth in the nation in TFLs per game (1.63) and led the Big Ten in TFLs per game during conference play (2.07). Brown is a member of preseason watch lists for the Butkus Award, Bednarik Award and Nagurski Trophy.

THE SPECIAL TEAMS

- Junior **Justin DuVernois**, a 2013 Ray Guy Award candidate, earned Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week honors following a stellar performance against Washington at Soldier Field. DuVernois punted five times for an average of 45.2 yards, pinning the Huskies inside the 20 three times and inside the 10 twice. He also had a career-high three punts over 50 yards. For the season, he is averaging 42.1 yards per kick – fourth-best in the Big Ten – up from his 41.9 average last season, which ranked fourth in the conference and was 3.6 yards per kick better than 2011.

TIM BECKMAN WEEKLY RADIO SHOW

The Tim Beckman radio show airs live from Houlihan's at the I Hotel in Champaign every Monday evening of a game week from 6:30-7:30 p.m. on the Fighting Illini Radio Network. Hosted by Fighting Illini football play-by-play voice Brian Barnhart, the live show allows University of Illinois students and the Champaign-Urbana community the opportunity to meet Coach Beckman and ask questions about the Illinois football program.

FIGHTING ILLINI INSIDER WEEKLY TV SHOW

Fighting Illini Athletics produces and airs the weekly 30-minute Fighting Illini Insider television show, which starts the week of Sept. 2 and runs through the end of May. In the fall, the primary focus of the show is on Illinois football and features Coach Beckman as a regular guest. Illinois radio voice Brian Barnhart will host the majority of the fall shows, which will include game highlights, in-studio interviews, special features and Olympic sports reviews in a 30-minute magazine style format.

True to its commitment to provide access to top quality higher education to all of Illinois, the Urbana campus regularly ranks among the "best buys" among American universities.

Nearly 3,000 faculty members lead more than 42,000 undergraduate, graduate and professional students in a process of discovery and learning in 17 colleges and schools and more than 150 research centers and institutes.

Illinois provides a diverse learning environment with students and faculty members from more than 120 nations, and a choice of 150 undergraduate majors. Students have opportunities ranging from participating in research or studying abroad, to leading one of more than 1,000 student organizations.

Illinois faculty members win the most prestigious national and international awards, including Nobel and Pulitzer prizes, Guggenheim Fellowships, Tony Awards, and National Medals of Science and Technology. Illinois alumni are similarly recognized; 11 have won Nobel Prizes.

HEAD COACH TIM BECKMAN

Tim Beckman is now in his second season leading the University of Illinois football program. He was named the 23rd Fighting Illini head football coach by director of athletics Mike Thomas on Dec. 9, 2011.

Beckman's first Fighting Illini team produced four 2013 NFL Draft picks – OL Hugh Thornton (third round, Colts), DT Akeem Spence (fourth round, Buccaneers), DB Terry Hawthorne (fifth round, Steelers) and DE Michael Buchanan (seventh round, Patriots) – the most by any Big Ten team.

The Illini also have excelled in the classroom under Beckman's leadership. Sixteen players earned their degrees in 2013, after 15 did so in 2012. And a record number of football student-athletes posted at least a 3.0 grade-point-average in three consecutive semesters: 39 in spring 2012, 42 in fall 2012 and 51 in spring 2013. The Illini also have been active in the community, hosting free weekly youth clinics during the season and making regular visits to local schools and hospitals throughout the year.

Prior to Illinois, Beckman spent three years as head coach at Toledo, where he led the Rockets to two bowl appearances and a Mid-American Conference West Division co-championship.

Beckman engineered an impressive turnaround at Toledo in his three years at the helm after inheriting a team that went 3-9 in 2008. The Rockets improved to 5-7 in 2009 before going 8-5 with a 7-1 record in the MAC and a berth in the Little Caesars Pizza Bowl in 2010. Toledo posted an 8-4 record in 2011, including another 7-1 MAC record, a share of the MAC West Division title and a berth in the Military Bowl. In the last two seasons, Beckman compiled a 14-2 record in MAC games, second best in the conference over that span.

He has learned under some of the finest coaches in America, including Pat Dye, Urban Meyer, Mike Gundy and Jim Tressel. When he guided the Rockets to an 8-4 regular-season record and a bowl appearance in 2010, it was UT's first bowl since 2005. In addition, his last two recruiting classes at Toledo have been widely praised, earning a No. 1 ranking among MAC teams by Rivals.com in both seasons after landing two of the three four-star prospects signed by conference schools.

Beckman sent a pair of Toledo players to the NFL in defensive back Barry Church and receiver Stephen Williams in 2010. Three players earned first-team All-MAC honors in 2011, including Eric Page, who earned first-team honors as a receiver, kick returner and punt returner.

HEAD COACH TIM BECKMAN

Before accepting Toledo's head coaching position, Beckman had 21 years of experience as an assistant coach. He served as the defensive coordinator at Oklahoma State (2007-08), the cornerbacks coach at Ohio State (2005-06), the defensive coordinator/assistant head coach at Bowling Green (1998-2004), the defensive coordinator at Elon (1996-97), the secondary coach/recruiting coordinator at Western Carolina (1990-95) and a graduate assistant at Auburn (1988-89).

Beckman's two seasons as the defensive coordinator at Oklahoma State were successful, as the Cowboys posted a 16-10 record, including a 9-4 mark in 2008 and an appearance in the Holiday Bowl. In 2007, the Cowboys went 7-6, including a win over Indiana in the Insight Bowl.

At Ohio State, Beckman mentored the Buckeye cornerbacks. During his stay at Ohio State, the Buckeyes were 22-3 and played in two BCS bowl games. Along the way, he coached six All-Big Ten defensive backs and five future NFL players. His final game as a coach with Ohio State was the 2007 BCS National Championship Game against Florida, where Beckman faced his former boss from his days at Bowling Green, Urban Meyer.

At Bowling Green, Beckman was a three-time nominee for the Frank Broyles Award, presented annually to the nation's top assistant coach. He was a finalist for the Broyles Award in 2001, and College Football News named him one of the country's top defensive coordinators. During his stay at Bowling Green, the Falcons won two bowl games, a MAC East division title and finished ranked in the national polls in 2003.

Beckman began his coaching career in 1988 as a graduate assistant at Auburn, where he earned his master's degree in education. His first full-time coaching job came at Western Carolina, where he coached the secondary and served as recruiting coordinator from 1990-95. Beckman then served as the defensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator at Elon College from 1996-97 before moving on to Bowling Green.

Beckman started his collegiate playing career at Kentucky but transferred to Findlay and excelled under Hall of Fame head coach Dick Strahm. A 1988 graduate of Findlay, Beckman majored in physical education and lettered in 1984 and 1985 on Oiler teams that qualified for the NAIA playoffs both seasons. Prior to that, he attended Forest Park High School in Beaumont, Texas, for two years before completing high school at Berea (Ohio) High School near Cleveland.

The son of longtime college and NFL coach Dave Beckman, Tim is a native of Berea, Ohio. He and his wife, Kim, also a Findlay graduate, have three children: Tyler, Lindsay and Alex. Lindsay is a junior at Oklahoma State and Alex is a sophomore quarterback at Urbana High School.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS MIKE THOMAS



Mike Thomas is in his third year at the University of Illinois in 2013-14 after being named the school's 18th director of athletics on Aug. 10, 2011. That follows six successful years as the director of athletics at the University of Cincinnati. A 28-year veteran of college athletics administration, Thomas has continued to boost the Fighting Illini athletic program to national prominence in men's and women's sports.

During the 2012-13 year, Thomas launched the State Farm Center renovation project and received UI Board of Trustees approval to move forward with the \$165 million project. Illinois signed a landmark 30-year, \$60 million naming rights agreement with State Farm for the renovated State Farm Center, formerly known as Assembly Hall, in April 2013. It is the largest corporate naming rights deal for a college-only venue in the country.

During his second year at Illinois, Thomas led a group that signed a 10-year agreement with Learfield Sports as the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics' exclusive athletics marketing partner and multimedia rights holder, marking the first time DIA has outsourced its multimedia rights in a comprehensive package. The DIA realized more than \$2.3 million net increase in value year-over-year and estimates that the agreement will generate more than \$60 million over its lifetime. Also on the revenue side, the UI saw an increase in the I FUND annual fund, in the number of Loyalty Circle members and in the overall donor base.

The overall GPA for 19 sports for both the fall and spring semesters in 2012-13 was an impressive 3.12. Ten teams posted perfect scores of 1,000 in the NCAA Academic Progress Rate (APR) for the 2011-12 academic year: baseball, men's golf, men's gymnastics, men's tennis, women's cross country, women's golf, women's gymnastics, soccer, women's tennis, women's track and field (indoor and outdoor) and volleyball.

A \$7.2 million project at Memorial Stadium that includes a new video board, ribbon boards, auxiliary video boards, sound system and control room was completed in time for the 2013 football season. Illinois also developed and launched a branding campaign in announcing the new athletic slogan – "Illinois. Our State. Our Team." – around the state.

Fighting Illini teams won Big Ten championships in men's golf and women's indoor track and field in 2012-13. Wrestler Jesse Delgado, men's gymnast Fred Hartville and women's track athlete Ashley Spencer all won individual NCAA championships in their respective sports.

In his first year at Illinois, Thomas directed Fighting Illini teams that won a national championship in men's gymnastics and Big Ten titles in women's soccer, men's gymnastics, men's tennis and men's golf, while also producing six NCAA individual champions, and 24 All-Americans in a wide range of sports. Illinois finished 21st in the final Learfield Director's Cup standings, just one spot behind the school's highest all-time finish.

In December 2011, Thomas announced the hiring of Tim Beckman as the Fighting Illini football coach. In April 2012, Thomas also named new head coaches in men's and women's basketball with the hiring of John Groce for the men and Matt Bollant for the women.

Prior to his move to Illinois, Thomas revamped and led a vibrant Cincinnati Bearcats athletic program from 2005-11, directing the school's launch into the Big East Conference and earning several Big East championships, as well as multiple Big East academic excellence awards.

In 2006, Thomas hired head football coach Brian Kelly and the Cincinnati football team made program history in the three following seasons by achieving a 34-6 record, consecutive Big East Championships and appearances in the Orange and Sugar Bowls. The 2009 season ended with UC finishing 12-0 and No. 3 in the final BCS rankings. Thomas also hired Butch Jones, who went on to ensure Cincinnati's dominance on the conference scene, sharing in a Big East title in 2011 and 2012.

Thomas brought back a Bearcat when he hired former UC assistant Mick Cronin as head men's basketball coach in 2006. Cronin returned the program to national prominence with appearances in the NCAA tournament the past three seasons.

UC grew to be one of the most recognized schools in the 16-member Big East for academic success and earning multiple Big East Academic Excellence Awards, including a league-high five Big East Academic Excellence Awards in 2009-10.

The overall APR of all Bearcats programs also increased during Thomas' tenure. In the final APR report from his tenure, five UC athletic teams earned perfect APR scores of 1,000, including men's basketball. In that same time period, the Graduate Success Rate (GSR) for student-athletes increased from 66 percent to 77 percent.

From 2006-11, UC's student-athletes emerged as community leaders, with annual community service hours growing from 1,000 to over 5,500.

On the external side, the University of Cincinnati grew at a tremendous rate. Thomas increased UC's athletic department budget 20 percent, while simultaneously reducing the annual operating deficit by more than \$6 million.

UC established single-season attendance and revenue records for football in each of the three seasons from 2008-10. Football attendance skyrocketed, with season-ticket package sales exploding by 277 percent since 2006 and resulting in record football revenues.

In terms of donor development, membership in UCATS increased by almost 300 percent during Thomas' tenure and the department raised \$70 million during his arrival. Thomas raised private funds and built the Sheakley Athletics Center, providing football and other UC athletic teams much needed additional practice and competitive space.

In 2008-09, Thomas revamped UC's multimedia rights partnership, reaching an agreement with IMG College for a new multimedia rights partnership, increasing overall revenues in this area by over \$17 million.

Prior to taking the athletic director position at UC, Thomas spent five years as the Director of Athletics at the University of Akron and seven years as associate athletic director at the University of Virginia, an institution known for achieving impressive success both academically and athletically, before bringing that model to Akron. Virginia finished in the Top 25 in the Director's Cup in each year of Thomas' tenure there while at the same time finishing in the Top 10 nationally in student-athlete graduation rates.

Under Thomas' direction, Akron rose from last place to second among Mid-American Conference schools in the Director's Cup annual rankings. Simultaneously, Akron vaulted from last to second place in the MAC Academic Achievement Awards. Thomas increased the financial base of the Akron athletics program through increasing corporate sponsorship levels by 750 percent and boosted annual giving to athletics to its highest level in the school's history. Community support was rallied, with record increases shown in both football and basketball attendance.

During this time period, the Zips won their first MAC football championship and Thomas' hire of men's basketball coach Keith Dambrot led to unparalleled success on the hardwood with Dambrot's program becoming one of the most successful in the MAC over the past eight seasons. While at Akron, support services and facilities for academic support for student-athletes were significantly improved, resulting in jumps in grade point averages and graduation rates of UA student-athletes.

During his career in collegiate athletics, Thomas has coordinated over \$325 million in facility construction and renovation, including \$25 million in capital improvements at Akron that featured a new indoor fieldhouse and golf facility, a football practice complex, and a softball facility. He also spearheaded the new on-campus football stadium and was instrumental in the development and launching stages of the \$61 million facility, which opened in September of 2009.

At Virginia, Thomas served as a member of the senior staff and was sport oversight for eight programs. He served as the department liaison for the \$86 million renovation to UVA's football stadium and oversaw several other capital projects. In addition, Thomas served as the Chair of the Atlantic Coast Conference Men's and Women's Swimming and Diving Committee and also served on the ACC Sportsmanship Committee.

Recognized for his administrative acumen by his peers, Thomas has served on several national and conference committees, including the NCAA Division I Championship/Sports Management Cabinet (where he also served as the NCAA men's basketball liaison to the cabinet and as a member of the cabinet's four-person Administrative Committee) and the NCAA Men's Basketball Issues Committee. Thomas also previously chaired the Big East Championship and Competition Committee and served as a member of the NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet, the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Issues Committee, the NCAA Division I Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet, the NCAA Postseason Bowl Licensing Subcommittee and the Division IA Athletics Director's Association Legislative Review Committee. He presently serves on the Big Ten Legislative Review Committee.

Twice during his career, Thomas has received distinction for his efforts and dedication as a director of athletics, garnering the General Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletics Director Award in 2005 at Akron and then again in April of 2008 at Cincinnati. He has been recognized by the Cincinnati Sports Professionals Network as the 2009-10 Sports Executive of the Year.

Prior to his experience at Virginia, Thomas spent seven years at the University of Denver as assistant athletic director for internal operations, serving as chief financial officer and overseeing the departments of compliance, merchandising, and facilities. He began his athletic administration career at the University of Iowa as an administrative and operations intern.

Thomas received his bachelor's degree in business administration from Colorado State University in 1983, and his master's degree in athletic administration from Western Illinois University in 1986. He and his wife, Jenifer, have four children: Vince, Joey, Mick and Meredith.

ASSISTANT COACHES

**TIM BANKS****Defensive Coordinator/Safeties**

Tim Banks is in his second season as Illinois' defensive coordinator and also works with the Illini safeties. He was hired in January 2012 as part of Tim Beckman's first staff at Illinois.

Three players from the 2012 Illini defense were selected in the 2013 NFL Draft, with Akeem Spence going to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the fourth round, Terry Hawthorne being picked by the Pittsburgh Steelers in the fifth round and Michael Buchanan being selected by the New England Patriots in the seventh round.

Banks has spent the past six seasons as a defensive coordinator, two at Cincinnati as a co-defensive coordinator and the previous three at Central Michigan.

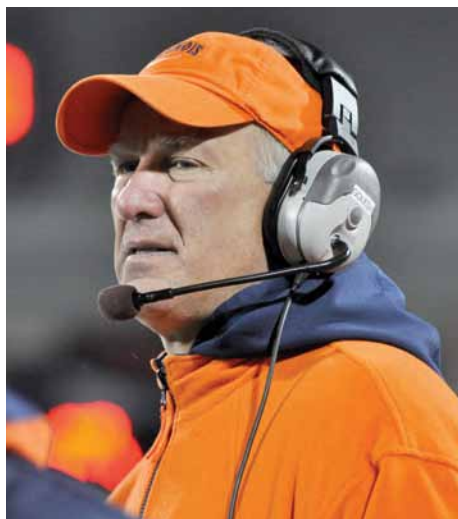
Under his guidance, the Bearcats improved 33 spots from 2010 to 2011 in the rushing defense national statistical rankings, from No. 39 to No. 6, and moved up 21 spots in total defense, from No. 63 to No. 42. Cincinnati led the nation in tackles for loss in 2011 after ranking No. 38 the year before and also ranked No. 2 nationally in sacks in 2011, up from No. 38 in 2010. UC improved 48 spots in scoring defense from No. 68 in 2010 to No. 20 in 2011 and jumped 110 spots in turnover margin from No. 119 in 2010 to No. 9 in 2011, largely as a result of forcing 33 turnovers in 2011 compared to 14 in 2010.

Banks' 2009 Central Michigan defense led the Mid-American Conference in scoring defense (18.9), ranked second in rushing defense (122.8), third in pass efficiency defense (117.4), and fourth in total defense (344.2) as the team went 12-2 overall and 8-0 in the MAC.

Prior to CMU, Banks spent four seasons at the University of Maryland (2003-06) before returning to his alma mater. He coached the Terrapins' secondary in 2006 after spending his first three seasons with the inside linebackers.

Prior to Maryland, Banks spent two seasons as an assistant at the University of Memphis (2001-02) and two years at Bowling Green (1999-00). At Memphis, the Tigers ranked ninth in Division I-A in pass defense in 2002 – his only season working with the cornerbacks.

Banks was a four-year letterman and two-time All-MAC second-team selection (1993-94) at Central Michigan. Banks was a co-captain for the Chippewas' 1994 MAC championship team and led the 1993 team in tackles with 105. He graduated from Central Michigan in 1995 with a bachelor's degree in industrial management.

**BILL CUBIT****Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks**

Bill Cubit is in his first season as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Illinois in 2013. He was hired in January 2013 following an eight-year stint as head coach at Western Michigan. Cubit led WMU to a 51-47 overall record and three bowls during his tenure in Kalamazoo.

Cubit brings 32 years of coaching experience, including 17 years as a head coach on the collegiate and high school level. He spent seven years as an offensive coordinator at four NCAA Division I schools working the sidelines in five of the nation's premier conferences (Mid-American, Big East, Big 12, PAC-12 and Southeastern).

Prior to returning to Western Michigan as head coach in 2004, Cubit served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Stanford in 2003, directing a Cardinal offense that ranked 28th in NCAA passing (247.3 yards per game). Prior to his time at Stanford, Cubit served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Rutgers (2001-02) and at Missouri in 2000.

Cubit's head coaching experience includes five seasons (1992-96) at Division III Widener University in Philadelphia, Pa. He led the Pioneers to a 34-18-1 mark, two Middle American Conference championships and a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances while twice being named conference coach of the year.

Other collegiate stops for Cubit include two years (1990-91) as running backs coach at Akron, a season (1989) as quarterbacks coach at Florida, three seasons as assistant head coach (1985) and the secondary coach (1983-85) at Central Florida and two years (1975-76) coaching running backs and receivers at Swarthmore College. As a high school coach, Cubit compiled a nine-year record of 79-15-2 at three different programs - Martin County (Fla.), Academy Park (Pa.) and his alma mater, Sharon Hill.

A Sharon Hill, Pa., native, Cubit (59 years old/DOB: 10-14-1953) earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Delaware in 1975. He played quarterback and wide receiver for the Blue Hens (1971-74), earning Associated Press All-America honorable mention in 1974. He also set school records for catches in a game (10) and a season (47), along with receiving yards in a season (787).

In 1981, he earned a master's degree in education from Saint Joseph's University. Cubit and his wife, Nancy, have three grown children: Stacey - who was married on March 3, 2007 - Sheri and Ryan, who was married on Feb. 9, 2008. Cubit also has three grandchildren.

**MIKE BELLAMY****Wide Receivers**

Mike Bellamy begins his second season on Tim Beckman's staff and first in a coaching role, as he was promoted to wide receivers coach in February 2013 after serving one year as assistant director of player personnel and relations.

In his role with the Fighting Illini last season, Bellamy coordinated all former player events, assisted with on-campus recruiting and recruiting mailings, helped coordinate the annual Illinois high school coaching clinic and coordinated all functions with Block I, fraternities and sororities. He immediately served as a bridge between Beckman's staff and former Illini players, coaches and staff across the country, building numerous relationships.

As a player at Illinois (1988 and '89), Bellamy was a second-team All-American and a first-team All-Big Ten receiver in 1989. He recorded 59 receptions for 927 yards and eight TDs for the Illini that season, the fourth-most TD catches in a season in school history and the ninth-most receiving yards. He also returned 16 kickoffs for 459 yards, an average of 28.7 that ranks second in school history.

Bellamy stands second in Illini history in career kickoff return average at 26.4 yards per return, and his 170 kickoff return yards against Indiana on Nov. 18, 1989, remain the single-game school record. He was named one of the top 10 receivers in Illinois history in 2008 and was inducted into the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Hall of Fame in 2007 for his achievements at the College of DuPage in suburban Chicago.

After earning a bachelor's degree in speech communication from Illinois in 1990, Bellamy was a second-round selection by the Philadelphia Eagles in the 1990 NFL Draft, playing two seasons for the team. He also played for the Indianapolis Colts, Chicago Bears and Oakland Raiders from 1992-95 before playing for Frankfurt Galaxy of the World League in 1995-96, winning the World Bowl in 1996.

Bellamy came to Illinois after serving as the receivers and specialists coach at Clark-Atlanta University in 2011. Prior to that, was the passing game coordinator, receivers coach and specialists coach at Sprayberry High School from 2008-10.

Following his playing career and before joining the coaching ranks, Bellamy and his wife, Tanya, built a successful business in the beauty industry in the Atlanta area. The couple has three children: Mike, McKenna and McKoy.

ASSISTANT COACHES



GREG COLBY

Defensive Line

Greg Colby is in his second stint on the Fighting Illini coaching staff, returning to the Illini staff in 2013 to coach the defensive line after previously serving as an assistant at Illinois from 1988-95. Colby came to Illinois following a five-year stint as head coach at Millersville University, an NCAA Division II institution located in Millersville, Pa. He played both football and baseball for the Illini from 1970-74.

Colby is a 34-year veteran of the coaching profession, including 27 years as a collegiate coach and 10 years as a defensive coordinator at the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) level. He has been on staff for two Big Ten championships and 12 bowl games. In his nine years as a high school football coach, Colby won a pair of state championships.

Prior to his head-coaching stint at Millersville, Colby spent six years as defensive coordinator at Northwestern under Randy Walker and Pat Fitzgerald. Prior to his time at Northwestern, Colby spent four seasons as the defensive coordinator at Kent State. Colby also helped Michigan State to three bowl appearances from 1995-97 while coaching the defensive line, outside linebackers and serving as co-special teams coordinator.

From 1988-95, Colby was assistant coach for outside linebackers and special teams at Illinois, helping the Fighting Illini to a Big Ten Championship in 1990 and six bowl appearances in seven years. He helped the Illini to a 53-38-3 record over that span, with trips to the Citrus Bowl, Hall of Fame Bowl, Holiday Bowl, All-American Bowl, Liberty Bowl and John Hancock Bowl.

Colby served as a graduate assistant at Michigan State from 1986-88, working with the defensive line and helping the Spartans to the 1987 Big Ten championship and a berth in the 1988 Rose Bowl. That was preceded by a seven-year stint as a high school coach. He led Danville's Schlarman High School to consecutive IHSA Class 2A state championships in 1980 and 1981, compiling a 25-1 record. He then guided Naperville Central High School to a 24-13 record from 1982-85, including a conference championship in 1983.

As a student-athlete at Illinois, Colby was a three-year starter for both the Fighting Illini football and baseball teams, serving as captain of the baseball squad as a senior in 1974. He is a native of Danville, Ill., and graduated from Danville High School in 1970.

Colby and his wife, Janet, have two sons: Matt and Mike.



ALEX GOLESH

Tight Ends/Specialists

Alex Golesh begins his second year on the Illinois staff as the tight ends and specialists coach and recruiting coordinator. He came to the Illini from Toledo along with head coach Tim Beckman and assistant coach Mike Ward.

Golesh, who was named a top-10 recruiter in the Big Ten by Rivals.com in 2013, guided punter Justin DuVernois to a strong sophomore campaign in 2012. DuVernois ranked fourth in the Big Ten in punting with a 41.9 yard-per-punt average, with a long of 72 yards, 16 fair catches, 19 punts downed inside the 20 yard line and 15 punts of 50 or more yards.

Golesh was on Beckman's staff at Toledo for three years from 2009-2011, serving as both the tight ends coach and the recruiting coordinator. Golesh aided the UT program in securing the No. 1 recruiting class in the Mid-American Conference in consecutive years. The 2010 UT class was No. 1 according to Rivals.com, while both Rivals and Scout.com rated the 2011 class No. 1.

Prior to going to Toledo, Golesh spent three seasons as a graduate assistant, two at Northern Illinois (2006-07) and one at Oklahoma State. Golesh worked with the outside linebackers at Oklahoma State in 2008, helping the Cowboys to a 9-4 record and a berth in the Holiday Bowl. At NIU, Golesh worked for one season assisting with the secondary and one season with the offensive line, helping the Huskies make the 2006 Poinsettia Bowl.

Golesh got his start in the coaching business as a student assistant coach while attending Ohio State as an undergraduate. He spent two-and-a-half years aiding the Buckeyes' defensive coaches, with responsibilities that included working with the defensive line and helping to break down film. During his time at Ohio State, the Buckeyes claimed the 2005 Big Ten Championship and went on to earn a victory in the Fiesta Bowl over Notre Dame. OSU also posted a win in the 2004 Alamo Bowl over Oklahoma State. Golesh also spent one year as a defensive line coach in a first-year football program at newly opened Westerville Central High School in 2002.

Golesh was born in Moscow, Russia, but grew up in Brooklyn, N.Y., and Dublin, Ohio, where he was a three-year letterwinner in football at Dublin Scioto High School. He earned a bachelor's degree in education from Ohio State in 2006. He and his wife, Alexis, had their first daughter, Corbin, in May 2011.



A.J. RICKER

Offensive Line

A.J. Ricker is in his first season as the offensive line coach at Illinois in 2013. Ricker came to Illinois following a brief stint at Middle Tennessee State. He spent the 2011 and 2012 seasons at Western Michigan under current Illini offensive coordinator Bill Cubit, where he served as offensive line coach/run game coordinator.

Under Ricker, the Bronco offensive line boasted All-MAC selection Dann O'Neill in 2011 and saw first-year guard Kasimili Uitalia start all 13 games. Returning center Kevin Galeher was a 2011 Rimington Trophy candidate under Ricker's tutelage.

Prior to rejoining WMU's program, Ricker served one season as the head coach at St. Joseph's College in Rensselaer, Ind., in 2010. Ricker served as the Pumas' offensive line coach in 2009 under Lou Esposito. In one season, the offensive line paved the way for 179.5 rushing yards per game and allowed only two sacks per contest. He was named the Great Lakes Football Conference Assistant Coach of the Year in 2009 for his offensive scheme efforts.

Ricker completed a stellar collegiate career at Missouri as a center, where he earned a degree in agriculture in 2004. He held the school record for consecutive starts with 47 from 2000-2003, leading the Tigers to the 2003 Independence Bowl, their first bowl appearance in five years. The Klein, Texas, native was named first-team All-Big 12 by the coaches and the Dallas Morning News in 2003, while receiving second-team All-Big 12 honors from the Associated Press.

He was named second-team All-Big 12 by the coaches and received honorable mention All-Big 12 from the AP in 2002. Ricker was also named first-team Academic All-Big 12 during his junior campaign. Being named third-team All-Big 12 by the coaches, receiving honorable mention for All-Big 12 from the AP and garnering second-team Academic All-Big 12 honors in 2001, highlighted his sophomore season in 2001.

Ricker signed a free-agent contract with the Chicago Bears in 2004 and was allocated to the Rhein Fire of NFL Europe in 2005, where he was named the offensive team captain prior to the season opener. He spent the 2006 season and part of the 2007 campaign as a member of the Arena Football League's Tampa Bay Storm. Ricker saw action in 16 games, starting 10 in 2006. He made seven tackles, playing both offense and defense, and recovered four fumbles.

Ricker is married to the former Lauren Mattaliano.

ASSISTANT COACHES

**TIM SALEM****Running Backs/Special Teams Coordinator**

Tim Salem is in his second season at Illinois as the running backs coach and special teams coordinator. He was hired in January 2012 as part of Tim Beckman's first staff at Illinois.

Salem came to Illinois from Central Florida, where he helped guide the Knights to four bowls in eight seasons. Most recently, he spent three seasons as the Knights' tight ends coach and special teams coordinator. Salem served the previous five years as UCF's offensive coordinator.

With Salem leading the way in 2011, UCF once again boasted one of the top kickoff return units in the nation. The Knights jumped into the top five thanks in large part to true freshman Rannell Hall, who was the lone freshman to earn first-team All-Conference USA honors. UCF's special teams units also excelled in 2010, propelling the Knights to the top season in program history. The Knights led the nation in kickoff returns, ranked third in kickoff return defense and 12th in punt returns to rank as the No. 2 overall special teams unit in the country.

As offensive coordinator in 2007, Salem guided UCF to one of the best seasons in program history. Behind a high-powered offense, the Knights won 10 contests, claimed the C-USA title for the first time and participated in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl. UCF broke several school records in 2007, including points (502), touchdowns (62) and rushing yards (3,287).

Prior to working at UCF, Salem was the offensive coordinator, quarterbacks coach and kicking coach at Eastern Michigan in 2003. From 1997-00, Salem was the quarterbacks coach at Ohio State, where he coached Joe Germaine to the 1998 Big Ten Player of the Year honor. Salem also worked at Purdue for six seasons as the quarterbacks coach, while also serving as the offensive coordinator for three years.

A 1985 graduate of Arizona State, Salem began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater for two seasons. Salem began his collegiate playing career at Minnesota, where he broke the Big Ten record for consecutive pass completions in 1980, before transferring to Arizona State for the 1983-84 seasons.

Salem is a native of Minneapolis, Minn., and starred at the prep level at St. Thomas Academy. His father, Joe, was the head football coach at Minnesota from 1979-84. Salem and his wife, Wendy, have three children: sons, Taylor and Landan, and daughter, Kylan.

**AL SEAMONSON****Outside Linebackers**

Al Seamonson is in his first season as the outside linebackers coach at Illinois. He was hired in February 2013 following coaching stints at Central Florida, Maryland, Bowling Green State, The Citadel, Army and Wisconsin. Seamonson, who spent the 2011 coaching linebackers Central Florida, works with the "LEO" and "Star" positions at Illinois.

In 2010, Seamonson helped Maryland go 9-4 and conclude the season with a No. 23 national ranking in the Associated Press Top 25 and a victory over East Carolina in the Military Bowl. He spent his first eight years in College Park working with the Terrapin outside linebackers before taking over as the coach for all linebackers in 2009. He served as a special teams assistant throughout his time under Ralph Friedgen and also was the Terps' defensive coordinator for the end of the 2008 season.

A 1982 graduate of Wisconsin and a two-year letterwinner at wide receiver, Seamonson got his start in coaching in Madison. In 1982, he served as a volunteer coach for Wisconsin's wide receivers. The next two years, he was a graduate assistant working with the secondary.

Seamonson's first stop after leaving Wisconsin was at the U.S. Military Academy (Army) in West Point for the 1985 and '86 seasons, helping the Cadets to a 31-29 Peach Bowl victory over Illinois in 1985. From Army, he moved to The Citadel, where he helped coach five linebackers to All-Southern Conference honors and one (J.J. Davis) to an appearance in the Senior Bowl. The highlight of his tenure was in 1992 when the Bulldogs led Division I-AA in scoring defense, yielding just 13.0 points per contest en route to a Southern Conference championship and their third berth in the I-AA playoffs in five years.

In 2000, Seamonson coached at Bowling Green State under Gary Blackney and along with Tim Beckman, Tim Banks and Mike Ward, helping the Falcons rank fourth in the MAC in rushing defense and total defense. He then spent 10 years at Maryland, working mostly with strong-side linebackers and the LEOs (linebacker/end option). In 2011, he was on the staff at Central Florida with current Illini running backs coach and special teams coordinator Tim Salem.

A native of Stoughton, Wis., Seamonson was a wide receiver at Stoughton High School and was a captain for the all-state shrine team in 1977. He and his wife, Kristi, have three children: Kylan, Calvin and Karter.

**MIKE WARD****Inside Linebackers**

Ward is in his second season at Illinois after joining the Fighting Illini staff as an assistant coach in December 2011, coming from Toledo along with head coach Tim Beckman and assistant coach Alex Golesh.

A 20-year veteran of the coaching profession, Ward guided Mason Monheim to a stellar freshman campaign in 2012, as the rookie linebacker earned second-team Freshman All-America honors from Phil Steele after leading the Illini and all Big Ten freshmen with 86 tackles.

Prior to coming to Illinois, Ward was the assistant head coach and co-defensive coordinator on Beckman's staff at Toledo from 2009-11 and was instrumental in the rapid development of the Rockets' defense. The last two seasons, the Toledo defense ranked among the national leaders in turnovers forced and turnover margin. The defensive turnaround helped propel Toledo to an 8-5 season and its first bowl appearance in five years in 2010, and an 8-4 season, a share of the MAC West Division title and a berth in the Military Bowl in 2011.

Prior to coaching at Toledo, Ward spent 17 years as an assistant at Bowling Green, including five years working with Beckman (2000-04) and the final two as the defensive coordinator. He began as the program's strength coach from 1992-99 before coaching the defensive linemen from 2000-06 and serving as the defensive coordinator in 2007-08.

Prior to becoming a Falcon, Ward was an assistant football coach and strength coach at his alma mater, Georgetown College, for two years. Ward earned a bachelor's degree in health and physical education from Georgetown in 1984. He later earned a graduate degree in secondary education from Georgetown. As a player at Georgetown, he earned second-team NAIA Division I All-America football honors as a guard in 1983. After completing his education at Georgetown, Ward was an assistant football coach at the University of Findlay for six years. He served as the linebacker coach and the strength and conditioning coordinator for the Oilers before leaving to join BGSU in 1992.

A Mansfield, Ohio, native, Ward attended Mansfield Lexington High School. He is certified by the National Strength and Conditioning Association as a Strength and Conditioning Specialist. His colleagues in the MAC twice named him as the NSCA Professional of the Year. Ward and his wife, Jody, have two children, Michaela and Addison.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois exercises final authority over the policies and governance of all three campuses of the university (Urbana-Champaign, Chicago, Springfield), within limits fixed by the Illinois Constitution and state law.

There are nine statewide trustees appointed by the governor. Each serves for six years. Their terms are staggered, with three expiring every two years. All trustees serve without pay. The governor also is an ex officio member of the board, with a vote.

In addition, three students, one each from the campuses of Urbana-Champaign, Chicago and Springfield serve single-year terms on the board.

Trustees elect their own chair annually in January. The chair for 2013 is Christopher G. Kennedy.

PRESIDENT ROBERT A. EASTER

Robert A. Easter was appointed president-designate of the University of Illinois in March 2012, and became the university's 19th president in July 2012.

Before becoming president, Easter spent his entire, nearly 40-year career as a senior administrator and faculty member on the university's Urbana-Champaign campus, where he earned his doctorate in animal science in 1976. He was interim chancellor from 2009-2011, serving as chief executive officer of the 42,000-student campus, and also served as interim provost and interim vice chancellor for research.

From 2002-2009, he was dean of the nationally ranked College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences. Before that, he served as head of the Department of Animal Sciences, where he has been a faculty member since 1976.

An expert in livestock feeding, Easter has co-authored a book on livestock production and has written more than 90 peer-reviewed articles, 11 book chapters, and numerous papers for conferences and industry publications. He also has spoken to audiences in the U.S. and 30 foreign countries on livestock feeding.

In 2006, he was appointed by President George W. Bush to the Board for International Food and Agricultural Development (BIFAD), and was appointed as chair of BIFAD in 2007. He also is a fellow of the American Society of Animal Science and the British Society of Animal Science, and he serves on the Illinois Agricultural Leadership Foundation and the Governor's Committee on China.

Reared on a grain and livestock farm in southwest Texas, Easter earned an undergraduate degree in agricultural education in 1970 and a master's degree in animal nutrition in 1972, both from Texas A&M University. He completed a doctorate in animal science at the University of Illinois in 1976 and immediately joined the Animal Science Department as an assistant professor of swine nutrition and management. He presently holds the rank of Professor Emeritus.

His teaching has been recognized by the Midwest Section of the American Society of Animal Science and at the departmental and college levels. In 1992, Easter received the American Feed Industry Association Award in Nonruminant Nutrition Research from the American Society of Animal Science. In 1994, the University of Illinois College of Agriculture awarded Easter with the prestigious Paul A. Funk Award for contributions to Illinois agriculture.

He operates a small grain farm in central Illinois and is a retired officer in the U.S. Army Reserve, where he served for 20 years. He also is an avid gardener and reader.

Easter and his wife Cheryl have two adult children and six grandchildren.



CHANCELLOR PHYLLIS M. WISE

Phyllis M. Wise, Ph.D., was named Chancellor of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and a Vice President of the University of Illinois on Oct. 1, 2011.

Dr. Wise is the chief executive officer for the Urbana-Champaign campus and is responsible for all financial programs, campus policies, and priorities with the mission of ensuring a transformative educational experience for America's next generation of leaders. The Urbana-Champaign campus has a budget of \$1.5B with more than \$400M in annual research expenditures. There are 42,000 students and 3,000 faculty members. The university is renowned for its interdisciplinary collaborations, advances in human understanding, community outreach, global partnerships, and life-changing scientific developments.

Prior to this appointment Phyllis M. Wise was interim President of the University of Washington in 2010-2011. Before that appointment, she served as Executive Vice President and Provost at the University of Washington, a position she held for five years. During that time Dr. Wise was a professor of physiology and biophysics, biology, and obstetrics and gynecology at the University of Washington.

Dr. Wise was dean of the College of Biological Sciences at the University of California-Davis for three years. Prior to that, she was professor and chair of the Department of Physiology at the University of Kentucky in Lexington from 1993 to 2001. Wise also was a faculty member at the University of Maryland, Baltimore, from 1976 to 1993, promoted through the ranks to full professor of physiology in 1987.

A fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and a member of the National Academy of Sciences' Institute of Medicine, she holds a bachelor's degree from Swarthmore College in biology and a doctorate degree in zoology from the University of Michigan.

MEMORIAL STADIUM



Memorial Stadium was built in 1923 as a memorial to Illinois men and women who gave their lives for their country during World War I. Their names appear on 200 columns that support the east and west sides of the stadium.

Donations of approximately \$1.7 million by more than 200,000 students, alumni and other friends of the university made the construction of Memorial Stadium possible. The Athletic Association (now known as the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics) later allocated \$509,805 to the project for the construction of the south stands and other stadium additions. The drive was needed to add seats for the over 30,000 fans who were turned away from games.

The stadium opened Nov. 3, 1923, when Illinois defeated Chicago, 7-0, in a Homecoming victory. The stadium was dedicated officially Oct. 18, 1924, a day that Illinois not only defeated Michigan, 39-14, for a Homecoming victory, but Harold E. "Red" Grange accounted for six touchdowns in what remains the single greatest performance in Memorial Stadium history. In the first 12 minutes of that game, Grange ran for a total of 265 yards and scored four times against a Michigan team that had not lost in its last 20 games. He had his hands on the ball only six times and left the field before the end of the first quarter.

In the third quarter, Grange returned and ran 13 yards for his fifth touchdown, and in the final period he passed to Marion Leonard for his sixth score of the day. In 42 minutes of playing time, Grange gained a total of 402 yards, carried the ball 21 times and also completed six passes for 64 yards. Legendary coach Amos Alonzo Stagg called it "the most spectacular single-handed performance ever delivered in a major game."

A press box was added atop the west balcony in 1967, then the Ray Eliot Varsity Room, a training table and trophy display area at the southeast corner of the stadium that was built with funds donated by friends of the Athletic Association, was constructed. A million-dollar 1972 renovation project added aluminum seating and other improvements, then installation of the first artificial turf and a new lighting system was made possible through a 1974 Golden Anniversary campaign drive. The locker rooms and training facilities also underwent a facelift in 1977.

The 1994 season represented the 70th anniversary of Memorial Stadium's dedication and the historic Illinois-Michigan game. To celebrate the event, Red Grange's wife, Mrs. Margaret Grange, attended the Fighting Illini's Oct. 22 game against Michigan. She helped dedicate The Grange Rock, which sits at the north end of Zuppke Field near the Illinois locker room, as a tribute to her husband. The rock came from the same Indiana stone quarry that produced the stadium's granite columns.

During the 1980s, Memorial Stadium saw 27 consecutive sell-outs. The single-game attendance record is 78,297 for a 1984 victory over Missouri.

In April 1985, \$7 million worth of improvements began. Out of this project came installation of a new AstroTurf artificial playing surface and expansion of the football headquarters in the northeast corner of the stadium. An airtight vacuum dome completely covering the field of Memorial Stadium, more commonly known as "The Bubble," was inflated for the first time in December 1985 for the purpose of practice during the winter months. It was used for the last time during the spring season of 2000, when the Irwin Indoor Practice Facility was completed.

In 1986, Memorial Stadium was nominated among 62 other sites – including Soldier Field, Wrigley Field, the Rose Bowl and Yale Bowl – to become a national historic landmark.

The portion of the field's AstroTurf between the goal lines was replaced in the fall of 1989 after vandals burned a 40-yard swath in the middle of the field in the early-morning hours of Sept. 24. Employees from AstroTurf Industries began removing the damaged turf and padding on the 26th and worked around the clock to install a new surface in time for Illinois' Oct. 7 game against Ohio State.



MEMORIAL STADIUM

Memorial Stadium underwent major renovations between November 1991 and August 1992. The \$18 million project included the replacement of all the concrete bleachers in both upper decks as well as the replacement of the top 25 rows of the main stands. The stadium's electrical and drainage systems were also brought up to code and new restroom facilities, for both men and women, were installed in the corner towers and great halls. The project was financed through the issuance of revenue bonds by the UI Auxiliary Facilities System.

Before the start of the 1994 season, a new color matrix scoreboard was added to the north end of Zuppkle Field. Renovations to the stadium surface came in the summer of 2001 with the replacement of the field's AstroTurf with AstroPlay, an artificial surface with a grass-like, non-abrasive, polyethylene fiber matrix filled with special rubber granules. The Illini played on the new surface for the first time in the 2001 home opener against Northern Illinois.

Construction took place in the winter of 2002 on the expansion of the football complex and a new state-of-the-art video replay scoreboard. Locker rooms and meeting rooms were expanded and a new sports medicine facility was built on the first floor of the Irwin complex.

In 2008, the University of Illinois unveiled a completed Memorial Stadium 'Renaissance' project that encompassed two years of work and over \$121 million. The renovations to the north end zone were completed in August 2007 and the west structure, along with refurbishing of the east great hall. Among the renovation on the west side was the addition of luxury suites, indoor and outdoor club areas, and a refurbishment of the concourses. An outdoor club space, the Colonnades Club, was added under the west balcony and allows for indoor game-day hospitality, as well as outdoor chair-back seats for game viewing. In the west balcony, a three-level structure was built to house two floors of suites and an indoor club space, as well as a new press box for media seating and game day operations. The indoor club, which seats 200, has been named the "77 Club" to honor the retired number of Illinois gridiron legend Harold "Red" Grange. The premium seating areas also serve as Champaign-Urbana's premier event

space, and have hosted weddings, banquets, receptions and meetings since their opening.

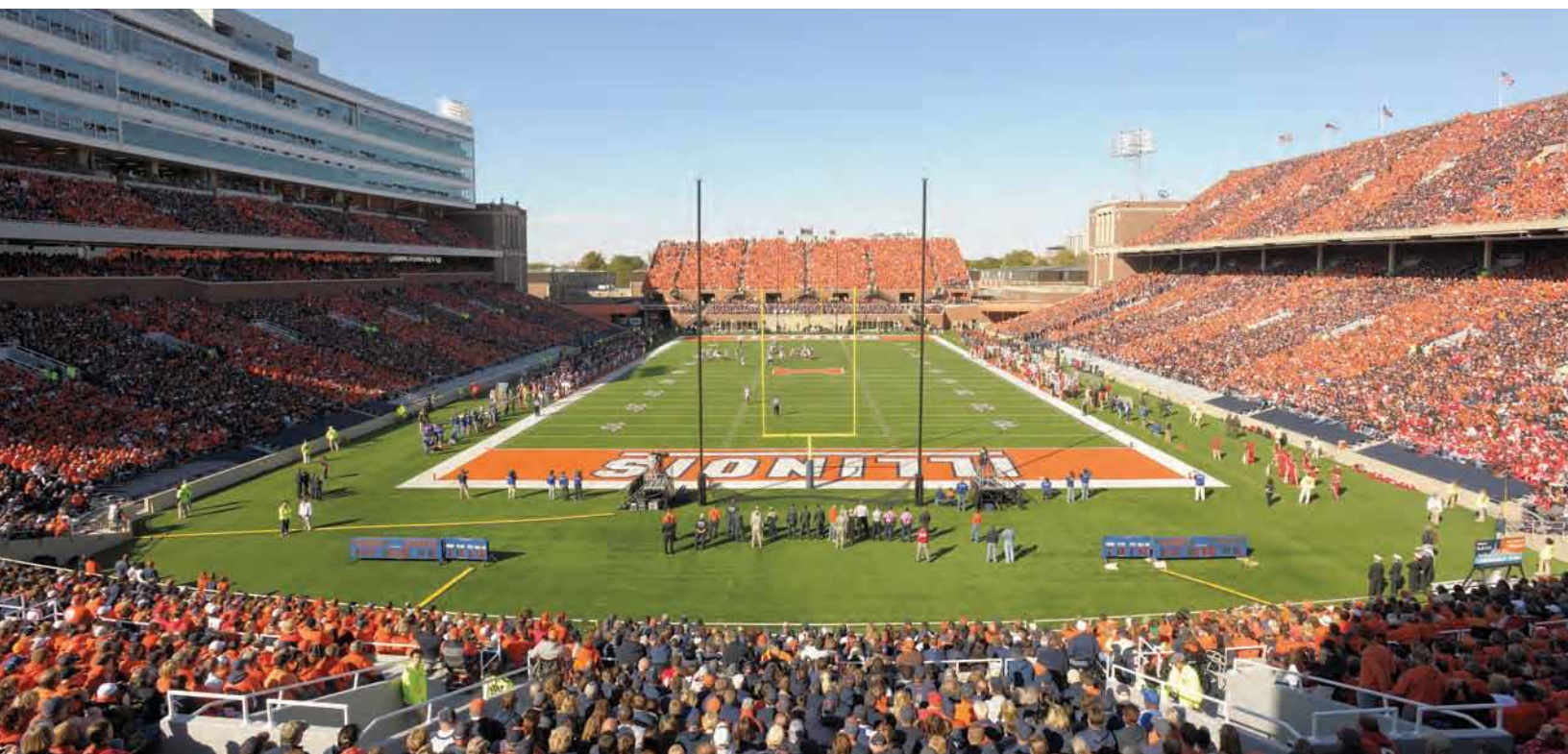
Also added underneath the newly enclosed north bleachers during the Illinois Renaissance project, the Illinois football complex got an expansion and refurbishing of the weight room, training facilities and meeting space. The entire project was conducted while keeping the stadium in a functioning capacity for the Illinois football team during the time of construction. The architectural firm HNTB of Kansas City, Mo., designed the renovation and Hunt Construction Managers handled the construction.

Prior to the 2012 season, a new FieldTurf Revolution surface and banners commemorating Illinois' national championships, Big Ten championships and bowl appearances were installed. The turf features the Block I logo inside an outline of the state of Illinois at midfield, similar to the design at center court of the State Farm Center floor, and alternating shades of green every five yards. For the 2013 season, a new high-definition video display measuring 36 feet tall by 96 feet wide was installed in the south horseshoe. In addition, two LED ribbon displays measuring more than 420 feet in length

were added to the fascia between the seating decks on each side of the field, and additional video displays measuring 17 feet by 10 feet were mounted to the northeast and southeast towers.

Memorial Stadium has been the site of many other events, including the first-ever "Farm Aid." Farm Aid was organized by Bob Dylan and Willie Nelson and was held on September 22, 1985, before a crowd of 80,000 people. It raised over \$7 million for America's family farmers. Performers included Bob Dylan, Billy Joel, B.B. King, Loretta Lynn, Roy Orbison, Tom Petty and many more.

Since 1999, the University of Illinois has played host to the Illinois High School Association's championship games during Thanksgiving weekend. Starting in 2012, the IHSA finals will only be hosted at Memorial Stadium in even-numbered years after the Big Ten adjusted the conference schedule to have a regular-season game on Thanksgiving weekend. In 2002, Memorial Stadium served as the home field for the Chicago Bears while Soldier Field underwent major renovations.

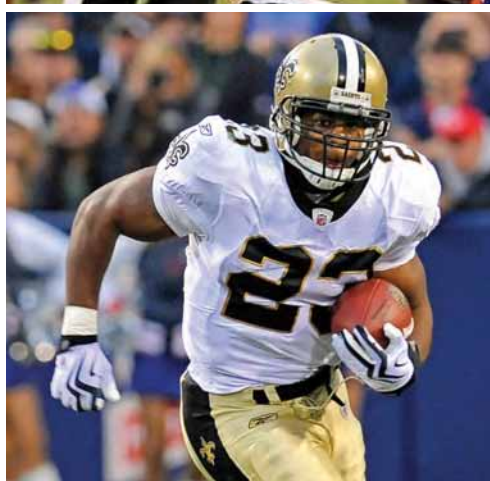

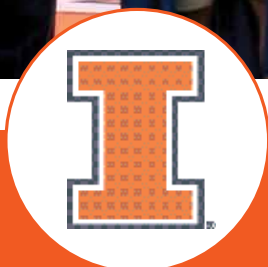

Doug earned six letters in basketball, baseball and football, and was the 1962 U of I Outstanding Athlete Award recipient. Doug graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in marketing. Doug was a two-time All-Big Ten pitcher from 1960-1962, compiling an 18-1 record and leading the Illini to the 1962 Big Ten baseball title. Doug earned two letters in basketball as a guard for Harry Combes and one letter as the starting punter and backup halfback in football as a senior.

Doug was involved as a member of the Advisory Committee for the College of Business and has spearheaded a number of projects for the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics in addition to serving as a Foundation Member and President's Council member for the U of I Foundation. Doug was honored with the Varsity "I" Award of the Year in 1999 and is a charter member of the Loyalty Circle.

Linda graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in biology, was a Bronze Tablet recipient and was recognized as the outstanding senior in education. Following graduation, she began her career with IBM, working first as a programmer and then as a systems engineer. In 1978, Linda received her MBA from Illinois.

Linda supported, with her leadership and patronage, the Krannert Center for the Performing Arts and sponsored the Bagley Scholarship in the College of Education. She also served on the Board of Directors for the U of I's Friends of the Library. In 1994, she received the Athena Award from the Champaign County Chamber of Commerce, an award which recognizes the achievements of outstanding professional women. In 1995, she was honored as a Woman of Distinction by the Green Meadows Girl Scout Council in Urbana.

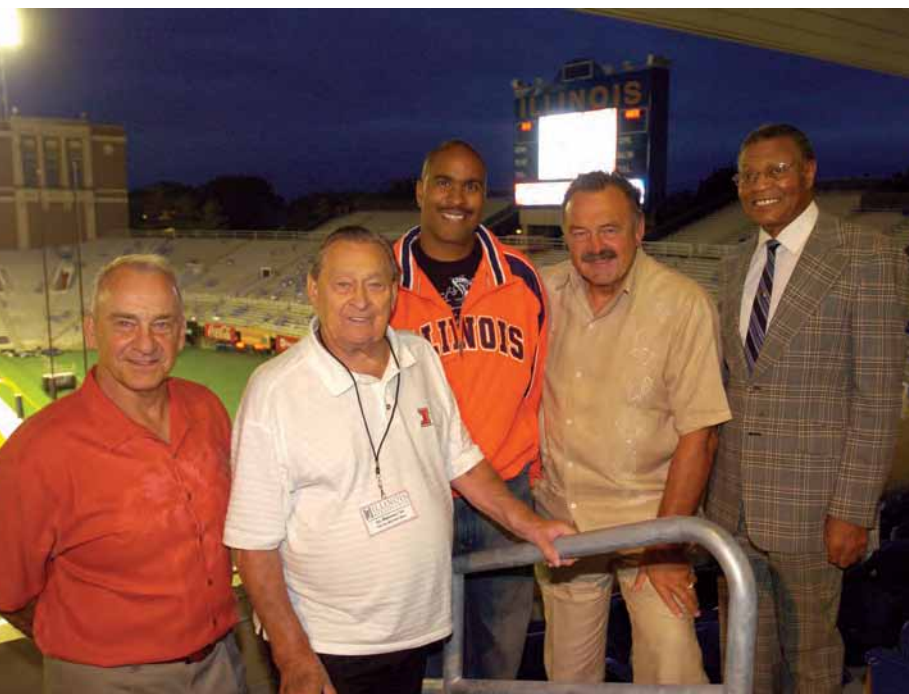
Linda was an active volunteer in the First Presbyterian Church where she served as a Financial Trustee. She served as the President of the Don Moyer Boys and Girls Club, Chairman of the Board of the Champaign-Urbana Schools Foundation and President of the Junior League. Cisty received her bachelor's degree from the University of Illinois in 1966 and a master's degree from Stanford University in 1968. Her father, Timothy W. Swain (BA '31 LLD '33), was appointed to fill Harold "Red" Grange's vacancy on the UI Board of Trustees in 1955. He served as a trustee for 20 years and was president of the board from 1967-69. Cisty has three sons, J.R., Tim and Hunter, all of whom work in investment banking. She has six grandchildren.

Varsity "I" Association Announces Annual Award Winners

The Varsity "I" Association was established in 1938 and consists of all past Illini student-athletes, managers, trainers, and cheerleaders. Through the association, the university and its letterwinners maintain contact and promote improvements in Fighting Illini athletics.

Every year, the Varsity "I" Association invites all former Fighting Illini athletes and letterwinners back to campus for individual sport reunions and special events, including today's annual Varsity "I" Weekend. As part of each year's Varsity "I" Weekend festivities, the Varsity "I" Association honors select individuals for their achievements and their contributions to Illinois athletics.

The highest honor bestowed upon a former letterwinner is the Achievement Award, which is presented for postgraduate accomplishments. This year's recipient is Ron Guenther. Ron was a three-year member of the Fighting Illini football team as an offensive lineman from 1964-66 being named Team MVP as a senior. He graduated with bachelor's and master's degrees in physical education.

Ron began his career as a coach, teacher and administrator at various schools before returning to his alma mater in 1983 to become an assistant athletic director for Chicago operations. While in Chicago, Guenther created the annual statewide caravan for promotion and public relations that led to tripling the number of donors to Illinois athletics. In 1992, Ron began his 19-year tenure as the school's athletic director.

During his highly successful era, the Fighting Illini captured 24 Big Ten championships, made a men's basketball Final Four appearance and six bowl appearances. He also was instrumental in securing commitments of over \$300 million for capital improvements and \$80 million for endowments all while restoring financial responsibility and institutional health.

Ron has been a longtime personal supporter of the I FUND, having made his first gift in 1981. He and his wife, Megan, currently reside in Champaign, Ill.

Varsity "I" also presented the Merit Award to Jim Grabowski in recognition of his loyalty and service to Fighting Illini athletics as a former letterwinner who also served as a staff member for the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics. Grabowski was a four-year letterwinner for the Fighting Illini football team from 1962-65.

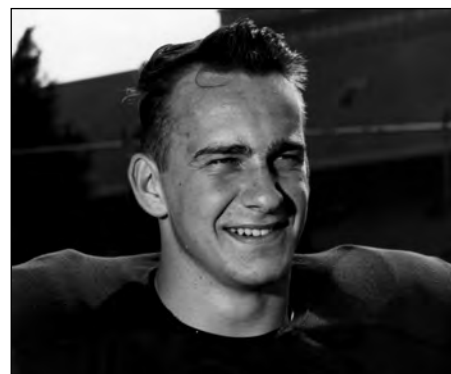
In 1965, he garnered All-American fullback honors and also finished third in the Heisman Trophy voting. That season, he finished second in the nation with 1,258 rushing yards. Grabowski earned multiple awards during his career as a Fighting Illini, including the Big Ten Medal of Honor, the Silver Football Award and two Academic All-America honors. As a member of the 1964 Rose Bowl team, he was named MVP for his 125-yard effort after Illinois' 17-7 win over Washington. He concluded his career as the all-time Big Ten rushing leader with 2,878 yards.

In 1993, Grabowski was inducted into the GTE Academic All-America Hall of Fame as well as the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame. In 1995, he earned the honor of being inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame. After his Illini career, he went on to play professionally for six years in the NFL with the Green Bay Packers and the Chicago Bears. Grabowski played in two Super Bowls for coach Vince Lombardi during this time. Following his successful football career, Grabowski served as the color analyst for football games on the Illini Sports Network for 27 years, retiring after the 2006 season.

Along with the Achievement and Merit Awards, the Varsity "I" Association also inducts honorary members for their long-standing loyalty, service and contributions to Illinois athletics. The 2013 Honorary "I" recipients are John Giuliani, Rex and Alice Martin, and Henry Dale and Betty Smith.

John Giuliani earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Illinois in 1983. The Rantoul native then began a highly successful business career, during which he became an industry leader in strategic sales and marketing consulting. He has almost 25 years of experience in growing successful organizations and is currently president and chief executive officer for ValueClick, Inc. Giuliani has been a lifelong Illini fan and a strong supporter of Illinois student-athletes, having established two scholarship endowments and a State Farm Center campaign contribution. John has a daughter, Lauren, and resides in Las Vegas, Nev.

Alice Martin earned an MBA in business administration from the University of Illinois in 1981. She and her husband, Rex, have helped guide the family-owned business NIBCO, INC., which is a worldwide leader in the manufacturing of plumbing fittings and valves. Rex is the chairman and chief executive officer of NIBCO, while Alice is the vice chairman and chief people officer. Together, they founded the Rex and Alice A. Martin Foundation. They have been long-standing supporters of Illinois student-athletes as

Loyalty Circle members of the I FUND, premium seating holders at Memorial Stadium, and through the Martin Softball Complex. The Martins reside in Elkhart, Ind., and have two daughters, Ashley and Alexis.

Henry Dale and Betty Smith moved to Springfield, Ill., in the 1950s. On January 1, 1954, Henry Dale launched the pharmaceutical wholesale business, H.D. Smith, with three employees. Today, H.D. Smith has more than 900 associates and is among the top pharmaceutical wholesalers in the country. Henry Dale still remains active as chairman emeritus. Together, they have been longtime supporters of Illini student-athletes as season-ticket holders and donors since 1971. They also have established a campaign gift to support the State Farm Center Renaissance Project. The Smiths live in Springfield and have four sons: Henry Dale Jr., Rogers, Chris, and Andy.

In addition to the individual awards, two of Illinois' greatest teams celebrated significant reunions this year. The 1953 Big Ten football champions celebrated their 60th anniversary. The 1953 Illini finished the season with a 7-1-1 record and a No. 7 national ranking. Coach Ray Elior's Illini were led by captain Bob Lenzini, All-American J.C. Caroline, and team MVP Don Ernst.

The 1963 Big Ten football champions also were honored as they celebrated their 50th anniversary. The 1963 Illinois football team finished the season with an 8-1-1 record and a No. 3 national ranking after defeating Washington in the Rose Bowl. Coach Pete Elliott's Illini were led by captains Dick Deller and Mike Taliaferro, and All-Americans Dick Butkus and Archie Sutton. Butkus and Grabowski were selected as Team MVP and Rose Bowl MVP, respectively.

SOCCER (5-2-2)

In the Big Ten opener last week, Illinois jumped out to a quick 1-0 advantage and led for nearly 80 minutes, but Ohio State scored in the 84th minute, which sent the game to overtime, where it ended in a 1-1 draw. Redshirt-junior Jannelle Flaws tallied her team-high ninth goal in the seventh minute and registered a game-high six shots, putting four on frame. UI has played four overtime games in its first nine contests, marking the most in program history to start the season.

Illinois played Iowa on Friday night and will host their premier promotion, SoccerFest, on Sunday, Sept. 29 when they take on Nebraska at 1 p.m. The eighth-annual SoccerFest will feature free pizza for the first 1,000 fans, a petting zoo, a create-your-own animal keychain station, the chance to make your own caramel apple and postgame autographs. The Sunday Soccer Fan Zone will be available for fans one hour prior to the game and a Celebrity Bumper Ballz Showdown will be held at halftime.

VOLLEYBALL (4-6)

Illinois volleyball had a rough finish to the non-conference season, going 0-2 in North Carolina against the 15th-ranked Tar Heels and Duke. The Illini struggled to get anything going against the Tar Heels, then bounced back to win the first set against Duke. After getting the first shot at set point in the second, Illinois dropped the frame, 27-25, and went on to lose the match in four.

Junior Morganne Criswell was a bright spot for the Illini, garnering her first start of the season at Duke and putting up career highs in kills (14) and digs (11) to record her first-ever double-double. Freshman Katie Stadick also got the start at Duke, and stuffed a whopping eight blocks, including five in the first set alone. The Illini defense had a solid

match against Duke, greatly topping their previous four-set high with 89 digs in the match, led by senior libero Jennifer Beltran's 23 and Jocelynn Birks' 17.

The Illini open Big Ten play at home on Sept. 27-28 with visits by Iowa and nationally ranked Nebraska. The Orange and Blue will host Iowa at State Farm Center at 7 p.m. on Friday night, where Spike Squad plans to "Storm the Center" to fill the storied arena with as many Illini faithful as possible. Saturday's matchup marks Illinois' first 2013 match to be aired on the Big Ten Network, squaring off with Nebraska at Huff Hall at 4 p.m. between the Illinois-Miami (Ohio) football game and basketball's Illini Street Jam.

WOMEN'S GOLF

After falling behind in the second day of the Minnesota Invitational, the Illinois women's golf team's comeback effort came up short, as they took second place at +39, and finished one stroke behind tournament champion Kent State. The Illini fought from behind most of the day, but a strong performance by freshman Stephanie Miller on the back nine put the Illini in a position to take the lead. On the back nine of the final round, Miller carded a birdie, an eagle and two more birdies on holes 12-15 to lead the Illinois comeback effort.

Miller played a strong three rounds of golf over the two-day tournament, finishing second individually at +6. Senior Ember Schultdt also played consistently over the three rounds, shooting a +3, +2, and +2 to finish third at +7. In addition, after shooting an even-par to lead all golfers in the first round, freshman Emily Joers went on to shoot a +11, tying for eighth. Redshirt-junior Sam Postillion shot +15, tying for 18th overall.

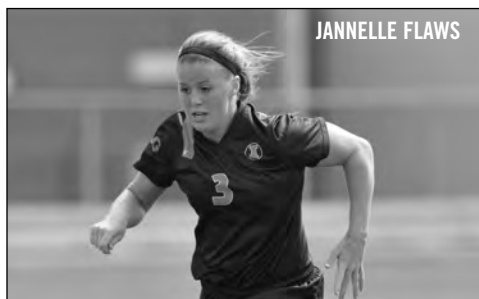

MEN'S GOLF

Illinois sophomore Thomas Detry fired an even-par 71 in the final round of the Wolf Run Intercollegiate to earn his first collegiate victory last Sunday, and the Illini ran away with a 33-shot team victory as the Orange and Blue shot under par in all three rounds and finished -8 overall with a tournament-record 844. Detry scored a three-stroke win over teammate Brian Campbell at the par-71, 7,155-yard Wolf Run Golf Club. Illinois swept the top four spots on the individual leaderboard, with sophomore David Kim taking third and sophomore Charlie Danielson placing fourth.

Meanwhile, in England, head coach Mike Small helped Team USA to a draw with Great Britain & Ireland in the 26th PGA Cup, allowing the U.S. to retain the trophy. Small and Bob Sowards won their foursome and four-ball matches on Friday, then the duo halved their foursome match on Saturday. Small dropped his singles match on Sunday, but the Americans won the necessary 2 1/2 points to retain the championship in the Ryder Cup-style event.

The Illini have next weekend off before heading to the campus of Yale University in New Haven, Conn., for the Macdonald Cup on Oct. 5-6.

ILLINI SPOTLIGHT

ILLINI OFFENSE MAKES DRAMATIC TURNAROUND UNDER CUBIT

It's no secret that the Illini have made a dramatic improvement from last season. The stats speak for themselves when comparing Illinois' offensive slump last year, to their offensive explosion three games into the 2013 season.

Illinois finished 122nd out of 124 teams in average yards per game in 2012-13. Giving up 39 sacks – last in the Big Ten and 111th in the country – left quarterback Nathan Scheelhaase in rough shape at the end of the season. Although, first-year offensive coordinator Bill Cubit may be just what the doctor ordered.

Through the first three games, Illinois has unveiled a variety of packages, spread the ball around to multiple receivers and already surpassed some key Illini offensive totals from last season. Scheelhaase has already thrown for more touchdown passes this year (seven) than he did all of last season (four). The Orange and Blue have gained more than 500 yards and scored 45 points in a game for the first time since 2011, numbers that were unthinkable last year.

And the biggest statistic is the Illini already have their second win of the year, matching their win total from all of last season.

"There are a lot of factors," Scheelhaase said. "I don't think you can pinpoint one thing. Throughout all those experiences, through the highs and the lows, it's all a learning process. There's stuff you learn from the good times and there's stuff you learn from the bad times. I felt like I learned a lot.

"Going into your senior year you want to leave your legacy. It's a great opportunity for that. Coach Cubit has done a great job working with our guys, helping us to understand what he's trying to get across and that's been a smooth transition."

So, really, what's the secret? What can possibly account for the sudden turnaround? Cubit claims he doesn't have a big secret – although his early success may make you think otherwise – he attributes his offensive knowledge to his 32 years of coaching experience.

"It's really a long history of experience being around different guys," Cubit said. "The biggest thing is we don't put anything in that doesn't fit. Way back when I was at the University of Florida, Ernie Zampese did some things that just made sense to me for the quarterback. The whole thing about it is we always want to be quarterback friendly. I took some of Steve Spurrier's stuff here and there, picking and choosing, seeing some tape. I love watching tape. I spend hours and hours just in a room watching. If there's an idea out there, let's do it. Then sometimes the kids come up and are like, 'Hey coach, I think I might be able to do this.' And we think, 'Hey, that's a pretty good idea.' It's everybody, but if it doesn't fit, we don't use it."

So Zampese, a former NFL offensive coordinator, and Spurrier, who had great success at Florida before taking over at South Carolina, might be a clue to what's happening with the Illini offense. But they aren't the ones making the play calls at Illinois.

Most recently the head coach at Western Michigan, Cubit did face Illinois in recent years, including a 23-17 victory over the Illini in 2008 in Detroit before losing to Illinois in 2011 and 2012. Before his eight years at Western Michigan, the Pennsylvanian was an offensive coordinator at Stanford for eight years.

At Illinois, Cubit has implemented an offense that is unrecognizable compared to last season.

"He does have a very deep playbook," senior wide receiver Steve Hull said. "But I think that we spend so much time together off the field as players, without the coaches around, that has allowed us to develop such good relationships with everybody on the offense. It's very easy for us to adapt to it because we spend so much time together. Even if we're just sitting in apartments and watching TV, at a commercial break we'll start throwing out formations. It sounds funny, but those are things we had to do. We had so much stuff thrown at us at one time. The relationship we have has helped keep us on the same page and really learn quickly."

Coming in together as freshmen, Hull and Scheelhaase used to run routes on Zuppke Field back when Hull was first a receiver and they were roommates their first year as Illini. Hull adjusted to defense the next three years, and now the tandem is able to play on the same side of the ball during their last year in Illinois uniforms. But it was a group effort that helped get Cubit's playbook set in their mind.

"There's just a challenge with getting it where it's second nature in your head," Scheelhaase said. "That's the biggest thing as a quarterback. When I walked out there for the first game, I wanted to really understand things and be comfortable and not be second-guessing anything. Throughout the spring, you're working through things and trying to figure things out. In the summer, you're feeling better and better. It really has been a good process for all of our players. It's one thing if the quarterback understands it, but if all the guys understand, that's what makes it work out on the field Saturday."

During the season opening win against Southern Illinois, a healthy Scheelhaase threw for a career-high 416 yards – 10th highest in school history – including 340 yards in the first half. Working comfortably in Cubit's offense, Scheelhaase completed 28 of 36 passes, including two touchdown passes and one interception.

"There have been a lot of great improvements," Scheelhaase said. "I've seen a lot of strides from not only myself but from all of our guys on the offensive side. Moving forward, we definitely have a good foundation to build on and definitely have established an identity of what we want to be. That's really important for us as an offense."

"For us to just keep improving and to understand the little things," Cubit said. "If we did some of the little things, we'd come out with a win. They're smart enough to understand that they've got to improve on some of those things. We're just trying to get better and be confident that we can compete. I really believe that we can compete with anybody. Everywhere we've been, we've been able to score points no matter who we're playing. I think that experience will help us out."

"Cubit has changed a lot," Hull said. "He's changed a lot of the culture and the expectations of our offense. The receiving corps was kind of a big question mark coming into this season. I think Cubit and (receivers

coach Mike) Bellamy have done a great job just raising the standards and expectations, and really opening up the playbook. They have gotten us to really believe in it and be selfless and unselfish in everything that we do."

"We do some things unconventional and kids like that," Cubit said. "Because of Coach Beckman, he sold us to the coaches and when he goes in there and tells the kids, 'I've got a guy for you and we're here to help you win.' You know [it's good] when the head coach has got your back."

With the University of Oregon setting the standard for speed in college football, Cubit wants Illinois to play at a faster pace and isn't holding back with the number of plays or how fast he's calling them.

"That's one thing I think we have taken advantage of, they're really smart kids," Cubit said. "They remind me of the Stanford kids. They understand what this game is. When you explain this game, they understand how it all fits with other games. We do a lot of different personnel packages. There are a lot of guys out there playing. Everyone has a role and everybody understands that. When you define it, all the kids understand to buy in. They go out there and are getting plays in some key moments. Nate's really a smart kid. He could be another coach out there. He goes out there and teaches the kids exactly what we want taught."

Illinois only topped 80 plays once (82 against Indiana) in 12 games last season, averaging 66 plays per game. So far, the Illini offense has averaged a tick higher at 68.3 in 2013, and they have lined up in so many formations, Cubit actually loses count sometimes.

"I've always liked challenges," Cubit said. "It seems like every program I ever walked into was kind of near the bottom when I got there. You just take great satisfaction in bringing it up. Because when you walk in, the kids are so eager. I'm in coaching because of the kids, nothing else. I just like being around those guys. When you come in here, you see the hurt by some of those kids because they haven't been successful offensively. You give them a plan and give them a little bit of confidence in it, and then all of a sudden, you see them follow the plan and look at you like, 'Hey, you guys know what you're doing.' Then, they follow you and it's so much easier and so much more fun to coach."

HAROLD "RED" GRANGE STATUE

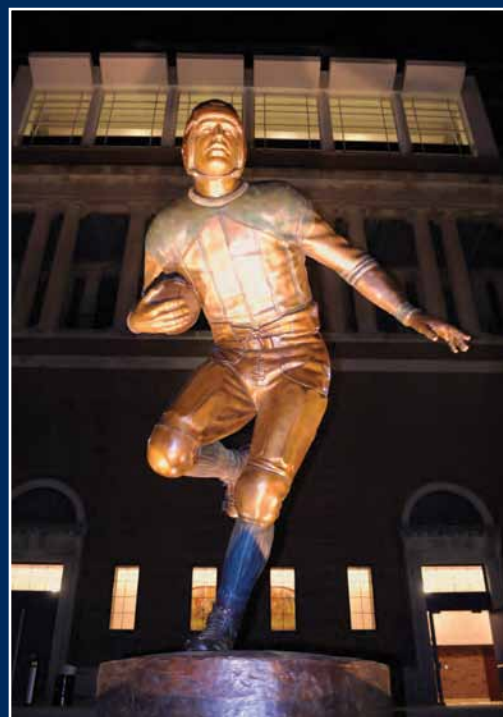
As one of the final accents to the Illinois Renaissance renovation project, a 12-foot statue of former Illini great Harold "Red" Grange was erected outside the Great West Hall of Memorial Stadium prior to the 2009 season. Grange is arguably football's all-time greatest offensive player and helped popularize both the college and professional games. He is a charter member of both the Pro (1963) and College (1951) Football Halls of Fame after being a three-time consensus All-American at Illinois.

The statue was sculpted by Illinois alumnus George Lundeen and the base was made from the same type of brick and limestone used in the construction of Memorial Stadium. The statue is roughly eight times bigger than life-size.

The Grange statue was donated by Tom Bryan in memory of his uncle, William R. "Bill" Bryan, who was a Professor of Finance and Dean of the College of Business at Illinois. During his career, Bill also served as Chairman of the Department of Finance and Director of the Bureau of Economic and Business Research within the College of Business, and was the past editor of the *Illinois Business Review*.

Tom Bryan is President of the Bank of Rantoul, owner of Ikoniq, Inc., co-founder of Gazillion!, Inc. and is a Loyalty Circle member. Tom earned his bachelor's degree from Ball State University before earning a master's degree in finance from the University of Illinois.

ILLINOIS COMPLIANCE



The University of Illinois Division of Intercollegiate Athletics is committed to compliance with NCAA, Big Ten and institutional rules. Compliance with the rules is a shared responsibility throughout our campus and our community. It is important for fans of Illini athletics to understand that the University is responsible not only for the actions of coaches and student-athletes, but also the “boosters” who support the University of Illinois and our athletic programs.

The following information is a basic summary of the NCAA rules that apply to boosters and fans. Please read through this information. By familiarizing yourself with NCAA regulations, you can help the University avoid the problems and negative publicity that can arise when violations of NCAA rules occur.

ARE YOU A BOOSTER?

You are considered to be a booster, and the University of Illinois is responsible for your actions, if you:

- Are or have been a season ticket holder for any University of Illinois sport;
- Are or have been a member of a booster organization that supports Illinois athletics;
- Have made any financial contributions to the University of Illinois, including nonathletics donations;
- Have been involved with the recruiting of a prospect to attend Illinois to participate in intercollegiate athletics;
- Have provided benefits to an enrolled student-athlete or the relatives or friends of a student-athlete;
- Provided or helped arrange employment for Illinois student-athletes;
- Are the parent of a current Illinois student-athlete; or
- Participated as a varsity student-athlete at the University of Illinois.

According to NCAA rules, once an individual has been identified as a booster, he or she retains this identity forever.

WHAT ARE THE RESTRICTIONS?

Benefits

As a booster, you are not permitted to provide benefits to current Illinois student-athletes or prospective student-athletes. The relative value of the benefit provided is not significant in determining if a benefit is contrary to NCAA rules. Whether the value is one dollar or one thousand dollars, the rules prohibit boosters from providing any benefits that are not expressly authorized in the NCAA Manual.

A prospective student-athlete is defined as any individual who has started classes for the ninth grade and has not yet enrolled as a full-time student at a four-year collegiate institution.

Examples of benefits that you **MAY NOT** provide to student-athletes or prospective student-athletes include:

- Cash
- Gifts
- Meals
- Loans or cosigning of loans
- Vehicle or use of a vehicle
- Payment for or arrangement of transportation
- Free or reduced cost good or services
- Free or reduced cost housing
- Free or reduced cost entertainment or event tickets

Recruiting

Boosters are not permitted to be involved in the recruiting process. Boosters may not have any contact with prospective student-athletes to encourage them to attend the University of Illinois to participate in intercollegiate athletics. This prohibition includes telephone calls, written correspondence and in-person contact.

It is permissible for boosters to contact Illinois coaches to let them know about a prospective student-athlete that the coaches might want to recruit, but it is up to the coach to make contact with the prospect.

One exception to this rule is that boosters may employ Illinois prospective student-athletes if the prospects have officially graduated from high school. Such employment arrangements must be approved in advance by the University of Illinois Division of Intercollegiate Athletics.

What Are the Consequences?

If a booster provides an impermissible benefit to a prospective student-athlete, a current student-athlete, or their relatives or friends, the University of Illinois may face sanctions from the NCAA. In addition, the student-athlete may become ineligible for a certain number of competitions and may have to pay back the value of the benefit received. The booster may also face penalties such as disassociation from the athletics program and the loss of all benefits and privileges offered by the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics. For example, a disassociated booster would not be permitted to purchase season tickets to Illini athletic events.

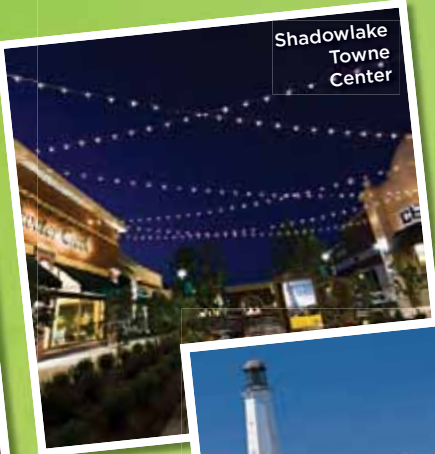
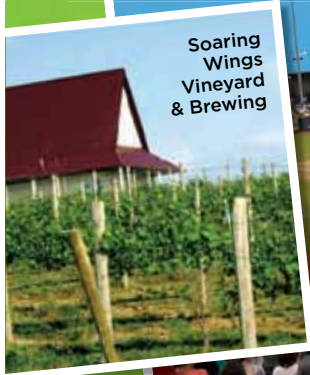

The 44-station Illini Sports Network brings Illinois football to fans across the state and Midwest with Brian Barnhart, Kurt Kittner and Steve Kelly calling the action.

In 2013, Barnhart will begin his 12th season as the "Voice of the Illini" after a long stint in professional baseball, including two years as the play-by-play voice of the Anaheim Angels. Barnhart serves as the voice of the Illini Sports Network, providing play-by-play coverage of football and men's basketball and as the host of the statewide "Tim Beckman Show" call-in program every Monday night at 6:30 p.m.

A native of nearby Tolono, Barnhart graduated from Unity High School and Liberty University before beginning a 15-year career in professional baseball in 1986. He served as the play-by-play voice of the Lynchburg Mets and Salem Buccaneers before moving up to the Oklahoma City 89ers, the Class AAA affiliate of the Texas Rangers, from 1988-94. Barnhart did high school football and other sport play-by-play for 11 years and was also the voice for Oklahoma Baptist basketball from 1992-94 and Oklahoma City Blazers minor league hockey in 1993. From 1996-98, he handled news, sports and play-by-play at WWLS in Oklahoma City.

In 1998, Barnhart was named the play-by-play announcer for the Angels and spent two full seasons with the American League club before returning to the Champaign-Urbana area in 2000. He currently is a news and sports announcer at WDWS-AM 1400 in Champaign, also doing play-by-play for baseball broadcasts on the Big Ten Network. During the 2007 season, Barnhart was honored by the Illinois Broadcasters Association with the "Silver Dome Award for Best Sports Play-by-Play" for his call of Illinois' football upset of No. 1 Ohio State. He also was named Sportscaster of the Year in Illinois in 2008 by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association, becoming only the second Illinois sports broadcaster outside the city of Chicago to win the award.

Former Illini All-American quarterback Kurt Kittner joined the Illini Sports Network in 2007 and is in his seventh season as expert analyst. Kittner lettered at Illinois from 1998-2001, leading the Illini to a the Big Ten title, a 10-win season and a trip to the BCS in 2001. The three-time team MVP was the signal caller for the most proficient offenses in school history. During his time under center, Illinois posted the two highest scoring seasons with 32.5 ppg in 2001 and 32.3 in 1999. Kittner still holds school records for career total offense (8,880), single-season (27) and career (70) touchdown passes thrown.

Kittner was the starting quarterback as a sophomore for the Illini in 1999 when the Illini mounted two upset road victories at ninth-ranked Michigan and at Ohio State. That season, Illinois went on to romp Virginia 63-21 in the Micronpc.com Bowl, where the squad broke 22 records.

Kittner was a two-time All-Big Ten selection, won 24 games in an Illinois jersey, finished 12th in the Heisman Trophy voting in 2001 and was a finalist for the Johnny Unitas National Quarterback Award. The Schaumburg, Ill. native was a fifth-round draft pick by the Atlanta Falcons and started four games during the 2003 season.

Along with Barnhart and Kittner on the broadcast again this fall is Kelly, a veteran Illini sportscaster who handles pregame, halftime and postgame host duties. Kelly has covered Illini athletics for over two decades on television and radio. He hosts the popular "Sports Talk" show on WDWS-AM 1400 in Champaign and also hosts "Gameday" extended coverage of Illini athletics on WDWS and Lite Rock 97.5.

The statewide Illini Sports Network is managed by Fighting Illini Sports Properties and encompasses all sponsorship and operational elements. ISN programming includes football, men's and women's basketball, volleyball and baseball, along with the "Illini Today" daily report. The "Tim Beckman Show" can be heard statewide on the Illini Sports Network every Monday beginning August 26th at 6:30 p.m.

MEMORIAL STADIUM POLICIES



WELCOME TO MEMORIAL STADIUM

*Home of Fighting Illini Football at the University of Illinois***DISABLED SERVICES**

Entrances... Access to ADA seating in the Horseshoe is through Gate 31 via Portal 6 on the east side of the stadium and through Gate 32 via Portal 1 on the west side of the stadium. Access to ADA seating in the North Stands is through Portal 3 on the northwest side of the stadium. Access to ADA seating in the west balcony is through Portal 1 or Portal 3.

Golf Cart Shuttle Services... are available to patrons that need assistance between the parking lots and the stadium on game days. The shuttle service will begin two hours prior to kick-off and will run continuously up to 15 minutes before kick-off. Shuttle service will resume at the end of each game as soon as pedestrian traffic allows. Patrons who would like to utilize this service prior to kick-off should wait at one of the following locations: East entrances of Lot 31 and Lot 33, Florida Avenue entrance of Lot 45, and on the corner of Oak Street and Hazelwood Drive in Research Park. Shuttle service will also be provided to patrons parked in the handicapped parking spaces in the quadrants of State Farm Center. Patrons parked in these spaces should remain by their vehicles and wait for the golf cart to approach them. The pre-game drop-off and post-game pick-up location at the stadium for the west side will be on Kirby Ave. near Portal 1 and for the east side will be on Kirby Ave. near Portal 6.

Hearing Assistance Devices... are designed to enhance the public address announcements made in Memorial Stadium. These devices can be checked out on game day at the West and East Guest Service Centers.

Parking and ADA Shuttle Lot... A limited number of handicapped parking spaces, including van accessible spaces, are provided in the four quadrants of State Farm Center. An ADA Shuttle Lot is also located in Research Park in the Yahoo Parking Lot off of First Street. An ADA accessible bus will provide transportation from this lot to the stadium prior to the game and after the game. The fee for all ADA parking is \$20 unless you have an I FUND parking pass. A disabled license plate or handicap placard is required to park in these spaces.

Seating... is located in the South Horseshoe, North Stands, and the West Balcony with chairs available for able body companions.

EMERGENCIES

Emergencies and Evacuation Procedures... In the event of an emergency, all Event Staff, Law Enforcement and Fire Personnel will assist guests in any necessary relocation or evacuation. Information will also be provided over the public address system.

Public address announcements... are not made under most instances; however, please contact the Guest Service Centers if you need to contact someone in the event of an extraordinary circumstance.

East Guest Service Center: 217-649-3231 (this number will only be active on game day).

West Guest Service Center: 217-265-0200 (this number will only be active on game day).

GUEST SERVICES

Athletic Information... For answers to questions about ticket availability, parking, kickoff times, or upcoming opponents, please visit the University of Illinois athletics website at www.fightingillini.com or call the Illinois Athletic Ticket Office at 866-ILLINI-1.

ATMs... are located in the Great East and West Halls, and the Colonnades Club level.

Baby Changing Stations... are located in men's and women's restrooms in the Horseshoe and in the Great East and West Halls.

Fan Text Message System... Should fans need assistance while inside of the stadium, they will be able to contact event management staff by sending a text message to 69050, keyword ILLINI from their phone. Be sure to include the problem and the location of the incident, including the section number, row, and seat number (if applicable) in the message. Please note that standard SMS rates apply.

Guest Service Centers... are located near Gate 15 on the east side of the stadium and near the middle of the Great West Hall on the west side of the stadium.

Lost and Found... inquiries can be made at the East and West Guest Service Centers. Once the booths have closed, inquiries can be directed to the Event Management Office, 1700 S. Fourth Street, Champaign, IL 61820, by phone at 217-265-9274, or by email: athleticstaff@illinois.edu.

Restrooms... are located throughout Memorial Stadium. Portable restrooms are located throughout the parking lots.

Smoking Policy... Smoking is prohibited in seating areas, press box, Great Halls, and restrooms. Smoking is allowed outside of Memorial Stadium but patrons must be at least 15 feet from the building. Starting in January of 2014, the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign will become a smoke-free campus. This includes Memorial Stadium and the parking lots surrounding it."

MEDICAL SERVICES

First Aid Rooms... at Memorial Stadium are located under section 105 on the east side, and in the southwest corner of the Great West Hall south of Gate 24.

IEMS (Illini Emergency Medical Services)... technicians wearing red shirts are located in the East Main Stands, East Balcony, West Main Stands, and Horseshoe in vomitories marked with red railings. These vomitories are found in sections 101/102, 104/105, and 107/108 in the East Main Stands, 203/204 and 206/207 in the East Balcony, 124/125, 127/128, and 130/131 in the West Main Stands. In the North Stands the technicians are located at the stairs to sections 132/133 and 136/137. IEMS technicians will also be available in the West Balcony.

PARKING

Parking Lot Fees... Many lots are pass only lots. There are some lots available for game day purchase. These lots are Lot 44, 47, 49, and the lots in Research Park. Parking fees for these lots are \$20 per automobile. Automobiles with pull behinds are only allowed in Lot 47 for \$40. Recreational vehicles/motor homes may park in Lot 33 for \$40. Buses may park on Pennsylvania Avenue for \$50.

Hours... Parking lots are open to patrons starting at 7:00 a.m. and remain open until 10:00 p.m.* on game days. No overnight parking is allowed. *NOTE: This excludes any night games that Illinois might have in which parking lots will close 1 hour after the completion of the game.

Prohibited Items... The following items or actions are not allowed in parking lots: open fires, weapons, fireworks, saving parking places, disorderly conduct, advertising banners or displays, picketing or political campaigning, solicitation, tethered blimps, balloons, and other oversized inflatables.

PROHIBITED OR RESTRICTED ITEMS

Alcoholic Beverages... are strictly prohibited from being carried into Memorial Stadium. Patrons seen consuming alcohol during Illinois Football games, outside the premium seating area, will be asked to leave the Stadium. No refunds will be granted for such cases.

Backpacks and Bags... are not allowed in Memorial Stadium. Small purses and fanny packs 8.5" x 11" or smaller are allowed but are subject to being searched by University personnel.

Banners & Signs... are not allowed in Memorial Stadium.

Cameras... are restricted in Memorial Stadium: cameras with a stand or tripod are not permitted. Video cameras are not permitted. Personal snapshot pocket cameras are allowed in the stadium, however, in no instance may photography interfere with access ways, seat aisles, or other guests' enjoyment of the game. NOTE: Secondary use of any pictures, audio description, film, tape or drawing of the game are the exclusive rights of the NCAA.

Coolers and Containers... are not allowed in Memorial Stadium. (This includes cans, glass bottles, thermos bottles, wine skins, bota bags, and glass of any kind.)

Diaper Bags... are allowed in Memorial Stadium but are subject to being searched by University personnel.

Food and Drink... Food items contained in clear plastic bags may be carried into Memorial Stadium. Sealed plastic bottles of water, 20 ounces and smaller, may also be carried into the stadium.

Other Items... prohibited from Memorial Stadium include fireworks, noisemakers (whistles or horns), smoking, strollers, baby carriers, tri-pods, umbrellas, video cameras, and weapons of any kind (including pocket knives). Storage facilities are not available for items left at portals.

Personal Seatbacks and Seat Cushions... brought into Memorial Stadium should be 9" x 16" or smaller in size.

TENTS AND TAILGATING

Groups... can reserve tent space in the exclusive tent area on the east side of State Farm Center along Fourth St. by registering with assistant marketing director for group sales Drew Claassen at 217-300-0084. Registered groups must purchase 100 tickets or more, (discounts are offered for large groups), and order tents, food and beverages through approved vendors.

Individual Tailgating... is allowed in all football parking lots. All those tailgating must adhere to the policies listed in the parking section of this guide. Personal tailgating tents and awnings must be 10'x10' or smaller, and must fit within the boundary of one designated parking space. Tailgating on sidewalks or walkways is prohibited. Personal golf carts are prohibited from tailgating areas. No electrical power will be provided. Please dispose of hot used charcoal in the specified disposal containers located throughout the parking lots.

TICKET INFORMATION

Entrance Information... Six portal entrances will be used on game day. For direct and efficient access to your seat, please enter the stadium through the portal nearest your seat location.

Game Day Ticket Sales... are located on the South side of Kirby Ave. half way between First and Fourth Streets. Ticket booths open at 9 a.m. for morning and afternoon games and 12 p.m. for evening and night games.

Infants and Toddlers... ages two and under, are allowed to enter the stadium at a discounted ticket price. For \$5, fans can purchase an infant ticket, but the infant must sit in the lap of an adult during the game. Infant tickets may not be purchased for use in suites or club areas. Tickets can be purchased at the ticket booths located on Kirby Avenue or at Will Call located at the Illinois Athletic Ticket Office on the west side of State Farm Center.

Office Information... The Illinois Athletic Ticket Office is open weekdays from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and is located on the west side of State Farm Center.

Re-Entry... Patrons are not allowed to leave Memorial Stadium during the game and re-enter with an already-scanned barcode on their ticket. A new ticket is required for entrance.

Tickets...may be purchased in person with cash, check, Discover, MasterCard, Visa, or American Express, over the telephone at 217-333-3470 or 866-ILLINI-1, or online at www.fightingillini.com.

WILL CALL

General Public Tickets... are to be picked up at the Illinois Athletic Ticket Office located on the west side of State Farm Center. Will Call opens at 9 a.m. for morning or early afternoon games and 12 p.m. for evening or night games. In order to obtain tickets at Will Call, a valid photo ID that matches the name on the order must be presented at the time of pick up. Refunds are not issued for unclaimed tickets left at will call.

University of Illinois player guest tickets... are located in Irwin Indoor Practice Facility located near the corner of Peabody Ave. and Fourth St. All recipients should use the north doors to enter the building and will be required to show a valid photo ID.

Visiting player guest tickets... are located in Irwin Indoor Practice Facility located near the corner of Peabody Ave. and Fourth St. All recipients should use the north doors to enter the building and will be required to show a valid photo ID.

Recruit and High School Coaches tickets... are located in Irwin Indoor Practice Facility located near the corner of Peabody Ave. and Fourth St. All recipients should use the north doors to enter the building and will be required to show a valid photo ID.

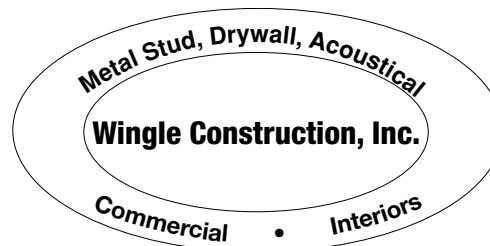

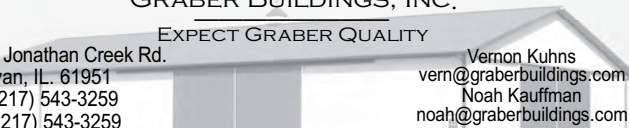

HEAD COACH DON TREADWELL



Don Treadwell (Miami '82) joined a dignified list of Miami graduates who ultimately became the head coach at their alma mater on Dec. 31, 2010 and enters his third season at the helm of the RedHawk football program.

In two years guiding Miami, Treadwell has had seven RedHawks earn a combined nine All-Mid-American Conference honors, including two-time First-Team All-MAC defensive back Dayonne Nunley. Under Treadwell, two RedHawks also have gone on to be selections in the National Football League Draft with offensive lineman Brandon Brooks being drafted by the Houston Texans in 2012 and quarterback Zac Dysert by the Denver Broncos in 2013.

Treadwell, who is 8-16 as a head coach, has conducted a passing offense at Miami that has annually ranked among league leaders. For the past two seasons, Miami has ranked among the top two in passing offense, leading the MAC in conference games in 2012. Last season, these numbers were spurred by the league's top quarterback in passing average as well as the MAC leader in receptions

and reception yards per game.

Boasting nearly three decades of coaching experience, Treadwell assumed the head coach position at Miami after a four-year stint as the offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach at Michigan State. He joined Ara Parseghian, John Pont, Bo Schembechler, Bill Mallory, Tom Reed and Randy Walker among the list of Miami graduates to serve as head coach of the Red and White.

At Michigan State in his second stint with the Spartans, Treadwell engineered one of the most explosive offenses in the Big Ten. He was a nominee for the Broyles Award, given to the nation's top assistant coach, in part for his role in leading the day-to-day team activities during Coach Mark Dantonio's absence following Dantonio's heart attack Sept. 19, 2010.

Without Dantonio in attendance, Treadwell, who normally coached in the booth, coached on the sidelines in MSU's wins over Northern Colorado and 11th-ranked Wisconsin. Treadwell also coached on the sideline in victories against Michigan and Illinois while Dantonio was in the press box.

The 28-year coaching veteran was Dantonio's offensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati from 2004-06 and served under Brady Hoke as offensive coordinator at Ball State in 2003.

During his first stint at Michigan State, from 2000-02, he tutored several top receivers, including Charles Rogers, the 2002 Biletnikoff Award winner and the No. 2 pick of the 2003 NFL Draft.

Treadwell went to Michigan State following one season at North Carolina State (1999) where he coached the running backs. He previously spent two years at Boston College (1997-98) where he served as the co-offensive coordinator while also working with the quarterbacks and wide receivers.

Treadwell coached running backs under Tyrone Willingham at Stanford from 1995-96, directing a Cardinal rushing attack that racked up 1,819 yards in 1995 -- the ninth-best single-season total in school history.

His coaching credits also include one season as a wide receivers coach at Cincinnati (1994), a two-year stay with Miami (1992-93) -- serving under Randy Walker -- and a six-year stint at Youngstown State (1986-91). Treadwell spent all of those seasons under former YSU and Ohio State head coach Jim Tressel. Dantonio was YSU's defensive coordinator from 1986-90, while Treadwell worked with the wide receivers, running backs and quarterbacks during his time at Youngstown State. While serving as the offensive coordinator in 1991, he helped guide the Penguins to the NCAA I-AA National Championship.

Treadwell's coaching resume also includes nine postseason bowl appearances.

Treadwell, who played for Coach Tom Reed, was a four-year starter at wide receiver at Miami (1978-81). He earned First-Team All-MAC honors as a junior and captained the team as a senior. With 73 career receptions for 1,540 yards, Treadwell averaged a school-record 21.1 yards per catch. He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Miami in 1982. Born June 10, 1960, Treadwell graduated from Oberlin High School in 1978 where he played quarterback.

Married to the former Lola Pinskey of Fostoria, Ohio, Treadwell and his wife have three children: Whitney, Blake and Spencer. Blake is a senior offensive lineman for Michigan State, while Spencer is currently a running back on Miami's football team.
