Illini Host Rutgers for Dads Day After 9 OT Thriller

- Illinois and Rutgers square off for the sixth straight year in Big Ten play.
- The Illini have won three straight over Rutgers, including a 23-20 win last season in Piscataway.

The Longest Game in College Football History

- Illinois is coming off a win in the longest game in college football history, a 9 OT victory at #7 Penn State, 20-18.
- Illinois was named the National Team of the Week by the Football Writers Association of America.
- The victory over #7 Penn State was Illinois' second in a row over a top-10 opponent (vs. #6 Wisconsin, 24-23, 10/19/2019).
- It was Illinois' first road win over a ranked opponent since Nov. 10, 2007 at #1 Ohio State (28-21).
- The win marked the 100th career victory for head coach Bret Bielema.
- The Fighting Illini outgained the Nittany Lions 395-227 including a 357-62 edge in rushing yards and an advantage in time of possession of 36:25 to 23:35.
- Illinois' 357 rushing yards were the most ever by an opponent in a Big Ten game at Beaver Stadium.

Defense Steps Up

- Illinois has held opponents to 24 points or fewer in five straight games for the first time since Dec. 2010-Sept. 2011. Last year's Illini team allowed 24 points or fewer twice in eight games.
- Illinois' defense has made a 10+-point improvement from last season (34.88 ppg to 23.75 ppg).
- Illinois is ninth in the nation and second in the Big Ten in fumbles recovered (8).
- Illinois is 24th in the nation and second in the Big Ten in takeaways (13).
- Illinois is 28th in the nation and seventh in the Big Ten in turnover margin (+0.62).

Chase Brown Chases History

- Chase Brown's 223 rushing yards at Penn State were the most ever by an opponent at Beaver Stadium and the fourth-most ever against Penn State.
- Brown's 223-yard game marks his second game of the season with 200+ yards (257 vs. Charlotte). He joined Howard Griffith (1990) and Rashard Mendenhall (2007) as the only players in Illinois program history with multiple 200-yard rushing games in a single season.
- Brown is the first Illini in history to run for 220+ yards twice in a career. He did it in the span of three games.
- Brown eclipsed the 100-yard mark in the first half (134) at Penn State. By halftime Brown's 134 yards were already the most given up in a game by Penn State this season.
- Brown led the nation in yards after contact last week with 141, according to PFF. He has led the nation in yards after contact twice in the last four weeks and he is the only running back to lead the nation in yards after contact twice this season.
- Brown is one of three players in FBS to have two 200-yard rushing games this season.
- Brown is ninth in the nation in yards per carry (6.85) and second in the Big Ten, behind only Ohio State's TreVeyon Henderson (8.79).
- Brown is 16th in the nation in rushing yards per game (106.2) and second in the Big Ten, behind only Michigan State's Kenneth Walker III (142.4).
- Brown's 223 yards pushed him past 1000-career yards as an Illini. He is the 46th player in program history to eclipse 1,000 career yards and now sits at No. 37 on the list at exactly 1,200 yards in Orange and Blue. Brown also tallied 352 yards as a freshman at Western Michigan, giving him 1,552 for his collegiate career.

DADS DAY / MILITARY APPRECIATION DAY

- » As the oldest known parent association in the U.S., started in 1922, the Illini Dads Association hosts Dads Weekend annually. The philanthropic organization is a part of events all around campus and awards over \$25,000 per year in student scholarships and grants for Registered Student Organizations.
- » Illinois will also celebrate its annual Military Appreciation Day this weekend, including a flyover scheduled for pregame at Memorial Stadium and other in-game recognitions.

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TEAM NOTES

Ground Game

- Illinois routinely lined up with seven offensive linemen for 24 snaps at Penn State, leading to the most ever rushing yards by an opposing team at Beaver Stadium in a Big Ten game (357 rushing yards). The “barge” package produced 129 yards (5.4 yards/carry) and nine first downs.
- Brown rushed for a career-high 257 yards against Charlotte, the fourth-most in a single game in Illinois history.
- Brown has two of the nation's top 10 rushing games of the season. He and Michigan State's Kenneth Walker III are the only running backs with two of the top 10 highest rushing games.
- Brown's 257 yards are the fourth-most by a running back in college football this season. Only LSU's Tyrion Davis-Price (287 vs. Florida), Ohio State's TreVeyon Henderson (277 vs. Tulsa), and Michigan State's Kenneth Walker III (264 vs. Northwestern) have had more in a game this season.
- Brown's 257 yards were the most by a RB coached by Bret Bielema in his 13 years as a head coach.
- Chase Brown led the nation in yards after contact last week with 141, according to PFF. He has led the nation in yards after contact twice in the last four weeks and he is the only RB to lead the nation in yards after contact twice this season.
- Brown had 200 yards after contact against Charlotte according to PFF, the most yards after contact in all of college football in Week 5 and second-most yards after contact in a game this season (Michigan State's Kenneth Walker III, 206 after contact vs. Northwestern).
- Josh McCray ran for a career-best 156 yards on 24 carries against Purdue 9/25/21. It was the fifth-most rushing yards by a true freshman in program history, and the most by a true freshman running back since Ke'Shawn Vaughn recorded 180 yards at Purdue 11/7/2015.
- McCray had 144 yards after contact at Purdue according to PFF, the second-most yards after contact in Week 4 and tied for the 16th-most yards after contact in a game this season. He had another 100 yards after contact at Penn State.
- McCray's 156 rushing yards at Purdue are the second most by a true freshman this season (Ohio State's TreVeyon Henderson, 277 vs. Tulsa).
- McCray's 156 rushing yards at Purdue are the most by a true freshman in a road game this year.

Hansen Out for the Season

- LB Jake Hansen announced Oct. 20 that he underwent knee surgery and will miss the remainder of the season, thus ending his career at Illinois.
- Hansen finished his Illini career with 276 tackles, 28.5 TFLs, 12 FF, 7 FR, 6 PBU, 3 INTs.
- Hansen led the nation in takeaways over the span of two seasons from 2019-20 (14) and led the nation in forced fumbles in 2019 (7).
- Hansen is the active FBS leader in career forced fumbles (12).
- Hansen's 12 career forced fumbles finished as the second-most in Illinois history, one behind Simeon Rice's 13 forced fumbles. Hansen passed Whitney Mercilus (11 career forced fumbles) for second place on Illinois' all-time career list.
- Hansen's 12 forced fumbles are tied for the sixth-most in Big Ten history. The conference record is 15, set by Wisconsin's Chris Borland from 2009-13 with head coach Bret Bielema.

Offensive Line Notes

- Doug Kramer is the No. 27 graded center in the nation according to PFF (71.7) (min. 300 snaps). Kramer has the No. 20 run blocking grade in the nation among centers (74.4).
- Alex Palczewski is the No. 29 graded tackle in the nation according to PFF (77.1) (min. 300 snaps), although he played guard against Penn State. Palczewski has the No. 6 run blocking grade in the nation among tackles (89.2).
- Vederian Lowe is the No. 32 graded tackle in the nation according to PFF (76.2) (min. 300 snaps). Lowe was the highest graded offensive lineman in the nation in Week 5 against Charlotte (93.7).
- Jack Badovinac is the No. 54 graded guard in the nation according to PFF (69.4) (min. 300 snaps).

Quarterbacks Turned Wide Receivers

- Isaiah Williams and Deuce Spann have both transitioned from quarterback to wide receiver in 2021 and have become Illinois' top two leading receivers.
- Isaiah Williams leads the team in receptions (34) and receiving yards (305).
- Williams is tied for six in the nation and leads Power-5 in receptions among freshmen (32).
- Williams is 10th in the Big Ten in receptions per game (4.2).
- Deuce Spann is tied for second on the team in receiving yards (117), second on the team in receiving touchdowns (2), and leads the team in yards per catch (29.25).
- Two of Deuce Spann's four catches have been 30+-yard touchdowns: 31-yard TD against UTSA and a 33-yard TD against Virginia.

TEAM NOTES

Carney on a Roll

- Owen Carney Jr. has 5.5 sacks on the season, all in the last five games.
- Carney is 23rd in the nation and tied for second in the Big Ten in sacks (5.5), only 0.5 behind Big Ten leader Aidan Hutchinson of Michigan.
- Carney is tied for ninth in Illini history in career sacks with 15.0.
- Carney has already surpassed his career high for sacks in a season (5.0, 2020).

Kerby's Emergence

- Kerby Joseph is the only player in the nation with 3+ interceptions and 3+ fumble recoveries.
- Joseph is tied for the national lead in fumble recoveries (Lorenzo Dantzler, UTSA and Reed Blankenship, Middle Tennessee).
- Joseph is one of only four Illini since 1971 to record 3+ interceptions and 3+ fumble recoveries in a single season.
- Joseph is one of only three Big Ten players since 2016 to record 3+ interceptions and 3+ fumble recoveries in a single season.
- Joseph's three fumble recoveries are tied for the 10th-most in Illinois history (stat since 1971).
- Joseph had either an interception or a fumble recovery in five straight games before Penn State did not have any turnovers against Illinois.

Lowe, Palczewski Tie Starts Record

- Illinois offensive tackles Vederian Lowe and Alex Palczewski tied the Illini record for career starts at Penn State. With a start against Rutgers, they both would set the record for career starts in Illini history (49) previously held by QB Nathan Scheelhaase (2010-13), C Ryan McDonald (2005-08), and OL Tim Simpson (1988-91), who all had 48 career starts.

Special Teams Notes

- Illinois is eighth in the nation in net punting (44.0).
- Illinois is eighth in the nation in kickoff return defense (15.0).
- P Blake Hayes boomed a career-long 80-yard punt early in the second quarter against Purdue 9/25/21. It is tied for the seventh-longest punt in program history (Brett Larson, 80 yards vs. Arizona, 9/16/1995) and is the longest since Ryan Tabloff's 85-yarder vs. Purdue (10/25/1997).
- K James McCourt hit two field goals from 50+ yards against UTSA, giving him six for his Illini career and moving him past former teammate Chase McLaughlin (2014-18) for the Illini career record. McCourt became the first Illini to hit two field goals from 50+ yards in a single game, then added to his own record with a 51-yard field goal at Purdue 9/25/21.

True Freshman Starters

- Josh McCray became the first true freshman to start at RB for the Illini since Ra'Von Bonner at Minnesota (10/21/2017) when he started at Purdue 9/25/21. Bonner and Mike Epstein each started three games as freshmen during the 2017 season. McCray ran for a career-most 156 yards on 24 carries against the Boilermakers.
- Freshman WR Pat Bryant also earned the first of his Illini career at Purdue then started again against Charlotte. Bryant is the 15th Illini in program history to start multiple games at wide receiver as a true freshman.
- The combination of Bryant and RB Josh McCray starting at Purdue marked the first time that the Illini offense has started two true freshman since QB M.J. Rivers and WR Carlos Sandy started against Penn State (9/21/18). Bryant also made the most of his opportunity, recording 25 yards on three receptions, both career-best totals.
- McCray became the first true freshman running back to score a touchdown for Illinois since Ra'Von Bonner (at Minnesota, 10/21/2017) when he scored against Maryland.

(Super) Seniors

- Illinois has 41 seniors, including 21 super seniors who received an extra year due to COVID-19.
- Illinois' 21 super seniors are the most in Power-5.
- Illinois' 20 other seniors still have one year of eligibility remaining following this season - if they choose to use it - and are listed as juniors on the roster.
- The Fighting Illini roster features 28 student-athletes that already earned bachelor's degrees, the most of any team in the nation.
- Illinois returned 10 four-time letterwinners, tied for the second-most in the nation (Toledo, USC) behind only Ball State (11).
- Illinois returned 21 of the 26 student-athletes listed as seniors on the 2020 roster.
- Illinois returned 18 scholarship seniors from last year's roster, the most of any Power-5 team.

Bret Bielema was named as the 26th Fighting Illini Head Football Coach in the 132-year history of the program in December 2020.

A native of Prophetstown, Illinois, Bielema (pronounced BEEL-ma) has 24 years of collegiate coaching experience and compiled a 12-year record of 97-58 (.626) as head coach at Wisconsin and Arkansas.

From 2006-12 Bielema was the head coach at Wisconsin, where he led the Badgers to three Big Ten championships (2010-12), six consecutive bowl games and a 68-24 record (.739). Bielema then spent five seasons as head coach at Arkansas from 2013-17. After inheriting a depleted roster and enduring a difficult first season, he led the Razorbacks to three consecutive bowl games, including victories against Texas in 2014 and Kansas State in 2015.

In Bielema's debut season at Wisconsin in 2006, the Badgers finished 12-1, including a victory in the Capital One Bowl against Arkansas. He was the first coach in Big Ten history to win 10 games in his first season, the first Wisconsin coach to win 11 games prior to a bowl game and became the third coach in NCAA history to win 12 games in his first season. Bielema won 17 of his first 18 games with the Badgers. The Badgers shared or won Big Ten championships three straight seasons from 2010-12 and led Wisconsin to victories in the first two Big Ten championship games.

Bielema's coaching pedigree and list of football mentors matches that of any coach in the nation. He played for and coached under Hall-of-Famer Hayden Fry, helping the Hawkeyes share the 1990 Big Ten title with Illinois. After two years as a graduate assistant and six seasons as linebacker coach at Iowa, Bielema spent two years as Co-Defensive Coordinator at Kansas State under Hall-of-Famer Bill Snyder, helping the Wildcats win the 2003 Big 12 Championship.

Two seasons later, he was named Defensive Coordinator at Wisconsin under Hall-of-Famer Barry Alvarez and moved into the head coaching role of the Badgers in 2006 when Alvarez retired.

Bielema has spent the last three seasons in the National Football League. His first two seasons in the NFL were with the New England Patriots as a consultant to six-time Super Bowl champion head coach Bill Belichick in 2018 and as the team's defensive line coach in 2019, when the Patriots won the AFC East with a 12-4 record and had the NFL's best defense. In Bielema's first season with the Patriots, New England was 11-5 and defeated the Los Angeles Rams in Super Bowl LIII. He has been the outside linebackers coach and senior assistant for the New York Giants during the 2020 season.

Bielema was a defensive lineman at Iowa from 1989-92, when he was a four-time letterman under Fry. After joining the team as a walk-on, Bielema earned a scholarship after his first year, started as a junior and was named a team captain for his senior season. Bielema graduated from Iowa in 1992 with a bachelor's degree in marketing.

Following his graduation, Bielema signed a free-agent contract with the Seattle Seahawks and ended his playing career in 1994 as a member of the Milwaukee Mustangs of the Arena Football League.

He and his wife, Jen, have two daughters, Briella Nicole and Brexli Nichole.

TONY PETERSEN

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/QUARTERBACKS

Petersen has directed some of the nation's most exciting and prolific offenses during his 30-year college coaching career, serving as an offensive coordinator in the Big Ten, MAC, Conference USA, American and Sun Belt prior to taking the reins of the Fighting Illini offense. Petersen spent the 2020 season as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Appalachian State, when the Mountaineers finished 9-3 overall with a Myrtle Beach Bowl victory over North Texas on December 21. App State averaged 452 yards in total offense (26th nationally), including 264.9 rushing yards (7th nationally), on the season. He moved to App State after spending the 2019 season as an offensive analyst at Missouri following three-year stints coordinating successful offenses at Marshall (2010-12), Louisiana Tech (2013-15) and East Carolina (2016-18). He has helped lead his teams to 13 bowl games, seven conference championships and two FCS national championships throughout his coaching career. Petersen and his wife, Beth, have three children: Andy, Nikki Nelson and Taylor.



GEORGE MCDONALD

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH/WIDE RECEIVERS

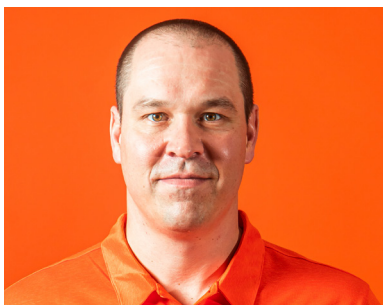
George McDonald returns to his alma mater following six seasons at N.C. State and with experience in three Power-5 conferences and the NFL. McDonald began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Ball State before earning his first full-time position at Northern Illinois from 2001-03. While in DeKalb, he coached First-Team All-MAC receiver, and current Minnesota head coach, P.J. Fleck, second-team All-American Dan Sheldon, and All-American Darrell "The Thrill" Hill. McDonald was a four-year letterwinner at receiver for the Fighting Illini and completed his Illinois football career with 57 receptions for 589 yards and four touchdowns. He led the Big Ten in kickoff return yardage in 1996 (736) while returning 57 kickoffs for 1,276 yards (22.4 avg.) during his career. McDonald also ran track his freshman and senior years, earning All-Big Ten honors his senior year when he set an Illinois record with a time of 6.74 in the 60 meters, a mark that still ranks seventh on the Illini top times list, to win the 1999 Big Ten Indoor Championships 60m title. He earned his bachelor's degree in health planning and administration from Illinois in 1999. He and his wife, the former Heather Anderson, have two sons, Roman and Maverick.



BART MILLER

OFFENSIVE LINE

Bart Miller joins Bret Bielema's coaching staff for the second time and comes to Champaign-Urbana after two successful seasons as offensive line coach and offensive run-game coordinator at Wyoming. Miller's first full-time coaching position came as the offensive line coach at Wisconsin under Bielema in 2012. He took over the offensive line unit in September of 2012 after serving as a graduate assistant coach the previous season at Wisconsin. The Badgers ranked No. 13 in the nation in rushing offense in 2012, averaging 236.36 rushing yards per game. Wisconsin won its third straight Big Ten Championship that season, defeating Nebraska 70-31 in the Big Ten Championship Game, and played in a third consecutive Rose Bowl. At Wisconsin, Miller coached First Team All-Big Ten selections Travis Frederick (center) and Rick Wagner (left tackle) in 2012. Miller played football and graduated from Elk Grove High School in the Chicago area prior to completing his bachelor's degree in organizational communication from New Mexico in 2007. He obtained a master's degree in education from New Mexico State in 2011. Originally from Omaha, Nebraska, Miller and his wife, Amy, have two sons, Barrett and Gunner.



BEN MILLER

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR/TIGHT ENDS

Ben Miller spent the previous 14 seasons as an assistant coach at Air Force. A 2002 Air Force Academy graduate, Miller spent the 2006 season as the offensive graduate assistant at Illinois under Ron Zook before returning to the Academy. He spent nine seasons as the running backs coach and 13 years coaching the specialists, including the last 10 as the special teams coordinator. His nine years working with Falcon running backs was highly successful. He oversaw the progress of first-year starter Cody Getz, who rushed for 1,248 yards in 2012. Miller also coached Jacobi Owens, who posted back-to-back 1,000-yard rushing seasons in 2014 and 2015, while topping 3,000 yards in his career. Miller was an all-conference offensive lineman for the Falcons, starting at left tackle as a junior and senior. After completing his collegiate career, Miller signed a contract with the Cleveland Browns, where he was used as a fullback/tight end/long snapper. Miller is married to the former Meghan Carney. The couple has two daughters, Quinn and Keeley, and a son, Lochlan.



CORY PATTERSON

RUNNING BACKS

Cory Patterson is in his fourth season as an assistant coach at Illinois in 2021. Illinois head football coach Bret Bielema retained Patterson on his coaching staff, changing roles to running backs coach. Patterson spent his first three seasons with the Illini as tight ends coach after three seasons as the highly successful head coach at Trinity Catholic High School in St. Louis. Patterson helped Illinois to the 2019 Redbox Bowl, the program's first bowl in five years. Patterson has been key to Illinois' recruiting efforts, specifically in St. Louis. Two of the highest rated recruits in the modern era have signed from St. Louis since the arrival of Patterson. Isaiah Williams, Patterson's quarterback at Trinity, and Shammond Cooper, Trinity's star linebacker, both came to Champaign-Urbana in 2019 as four-star prospects and top 150 recruits in the nation. Patterson is a 2002 finance graduate of Lindenwood University in St. Charles, Missouri. Patterson and his wife Tiffany have two daughters, Nyla and Nori.

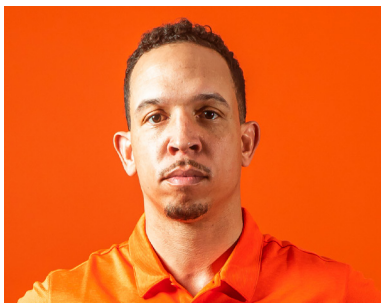

DEFENSIVE ASSISTANTS



RYAN WALTERS **DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR**

One of the nation's top young coaches, Walters arrived at Illinois following six seasons at Missouri, including three years as the Tigers' defensive coordinator and two years as co-defensive coordinator. Walters has had an impressive run at Missouri where he has overseen an impressive transformation of the Tiger defense into one of the SEC's top units. In 2019, Walters' defense ranked in the nation's Top 20 in several major categories, including total defense (14th NCAA/3rd SEC – 312.0 avg) and scoring defense (17th NCAA/6th SEC – 19.4 avg.), while excelling as a Top 10 pass defense (eighth in passing yards allowed NCAA/2nd SEC – 179.3 avg.). A native of Aurora, Colorado, Walters played collegiately at Colorado, where he was a standout safety for the Buffaloes (2004-08). He began his coaching career as a student assistant at Colorado working with the secondary in 2009, and then spent two years on staff at Arizona, where he was a graduate assistant in 2010 before being promoted to defensive backs coach for the 2011 season. Walters and his wife Tara have two sons, Aaron and Cason.



KEVIN KANE **ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH/OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS**

Kevin Kane reunites with Bielema following three seasons leading a stingy defense at SMU as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach. Kane joined the SMU staff in 2018 and in his first two seasons led the Mustangs to several national top 25 rankings, including the No. 1 ranking for sacks per game (3.92) and No. 3 ranking in tackles for loss (8.5 avg) in 2019. He made the move to SMU after spending the 2016 and 2017 seasons as the defensive coordinator at Northern Illinois. That was his second stint at NIU, having served in multiple capacities for the Huskies from 2011-14. Kane helped the Huskies to five bowl appearances during his time in DeKalb, including a win in the 2012 GoDaddy.com Bowl over Arkansas State, and three MAC Championships. During the 2015 season, Kane coached linebackers at Kansas. A 2006 graduate of Kansas, Kane played linebacker for the Jayhawks, earning All-Big 12 honorable mention accolades from the Associated Press as a junior and senior. He and wife Theresa have two sons, Jack and Colin, and one daughter, Nora.



ANDY BUH **LINEBACKERS**

Andy Buh brings 23 years of collegiate coaching experience to Champaign-Urbana including four different stops as defensive coordinator in three Power-5 conferences. Bielema and Buh spent the 2012 season together at Wisconsin helping the Badgers win the Big Ten Championship. He makes the move to Illinois after spending the 2020 season as outside linebackers coach at Arizona. Buh also spent time in the Big Ten as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Rutgers in 2019 and three years as defensive coordinator at Maryland from 2016-18. He also served as a coordinator earlier in his career at California, Nevada and Stanford. Buh had a successful three-year run at Maryland, guiding a Terrapins defense that collected 37 sacks in 2016. Buh's defense allowed just one 300-yard passer in his first season at Maryland and allowed just 212.3 passing yards per game on the season. The following year, Buh's defense collected 10 interceptions and saw four players earn All-Big Ten honors. A native of Escondido, California, Buh and his wife, Kelly, have two sons, Luke and Logan. He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education at Nevada in 1995.



TERRANCE JAMISON **DEFENSIVE LINE**

Terrance Jamison joined the Illini staff after one season at Purdue. A two-time graduate of Wisconsin, Jamison played on the defensive line for the Badgers from 2005-07 under Bielema before knee injuries forced him to the sidelines, and combined to serve four seasons as a student assistant (2008-09), quality control assistant (2011) and a graduate assistant (2012). Prior to making the move to Purdue in 2020, Jamison spent the 2019 season at Air Force in a similar role, where he helped the Falcons to an 11-2 record that included a 31-21 victory over Washington State in the Cheez-It Bowl. That Air Force defensive unit finished in the top 20 nationally in a number of categories, including rushing defense (7th, 100.5), defensive touchdowns (12th, 3), total defense (17th, 319.6) and scoring defense (20th, 19.8). A native of Riverdale, Illinois, who graduated from Thornton Township High School, Jamison has two degrees from Wisconsin, a bachelor's in agricultural business management (2009) and a master's in educational leadership and policy analysis (2011). He and his wife, Ashley, have two daughters, Ava and Mackenzie, and one son, Jayce.



AARON HENRY **DEFENSIVE BACKS**

Aaron Henry, who was a standout player and coached under Bielema at Wisconsin and Arkansas, respectively, makes the move to Champaign-Urbana after SEC, ACC and Big Ten stops at Vanderbilt, North Carolina State and Rutgers. Henry played under Bielema at Wisconsin where he was a All-Big Ten defensive back, earning 32 starts from 2007-11, and helping lead the Badgers to consecutive Big Ten titles and Rose Bowl appearances as a junior and senior. Henry spent the 2020 season as cornerbacks coach at Vanderbilt after three seasons at North Carolina State. He worked under Commodore and Wolfpack defensive coordinator Ted Roof at both schools, and helped NC State to a 9-3 record and Gator Bowl appearance in 2018. Henry has coached in three bowl games, including the 2018 Gator Bowl, 2017 Sun Bowl and 2015 Liberty Bowl. At native of Immokalee, Florida, Henry played football and baseball at Immokalee High School. As a wide receiver and defensive back, he helped Immokalee to the 2004 Florida state title and an undefeated regular season in 2006.

- Last season, Illinois defeated the Scarlet Knights 23-20 on a last second game-winning field goal from James McCourt. Then QB Isaiah Williams made his first career start and set the Illinois quarterback single-game rushing record with 192 yards.
- The teams split a nonconference home-and-home in 2005 and 2006, before Illinois has won four of five Big Ten Conference games in the last four seasons.
- The road team has won four of five games in the series since Rutgers joined the Big Ten.
- Illinois and Rutgers will meet for the sixth time since Rutgers joined the Big Ten in 2014.
- Illinois won the program's first meeting in overtime on Sept. 3, 2005 in Champaign. Illinois trailed 27-7 in the third quarter before scoring 20 unanswered points to fore overtime. After Rutgers hit a field goal in the first possession of overtime, Pierre Thomas' two-yard touchdown run ended the game 33-30. The 20-point comeback is tied for the second-largest comeback win in Illinois history along with the Illini's 35-29 victory at Michigan on Oct. 25, 1999.

BOBBY ROUNDTREE PASSES AWAY

The Illini Family lost one of its inspirational leaders with the passing of former Fighting Illini football student-athlete Bobby Roundtree on July 16, 2021 in the Tampa Bay area. Roundtree, 23, suffered a serious spinal cord injury during a boating and swimming accident in Tampa Bay on May 18, 2019, and has been working on his rehabilitation there for more than 18 months, sharing much of his progress on his social media accounts.

“All of us with Illinois Athletics are shocked and saddened by the sudden passing of Bobby Roundtree,” said Illinois Director of Athletics Josh Whitman. “From his first day on campus, Bobby was a leader. His work ethic, competitive fire, and drive for excellence set him apart. Following his tragic accident, those same qualities allowed him to tackle his new challenges with the same vigor and determination that we had seen on the football field. In so doing, he continued to bring light and inspiration to the lives of those around him — and, in fact, to so many people who had never had the pleasure of meeting him.

“In the face of incredible adversity, he demonstrated he was, and always will remain, a true champion. Our thoughts and prayers are with his family. We will support them, and our players, coaches, and staff who knew him well, as we struggle to understand this terrible news and, ultimately, look to celebrate the remarkable young leader we have lost.”

- Illinois played a season opener at Memorial Stadium against a conference opponent for the first time since Sept. 2, 1995, when No. 25 Illinois hosted No. 13 Michigan.
- Aug. 28 marked the earliest season opener in Illinois' 132-year program history. The previous earliest start date was Aug. 30 (2003, 2008, 2014). This is the ninth time in program history that the season has started in August.
- Illinois played Nebraska in a season opener for the fifth time in program history (1923, 1924, 1925, 1953). The Illini now have a record of 3-1-1 against Nebraska in season openers.
- Illinois captains: DB Tony Adams, OLB Owen Carney Jr., LB Jake Hansen, P Blake Hayes, OL Doug Kramer, OL Vederian Lowe
- Illinois welcomed back fans at Memorial Stadium for the first time since the conclusion of the 2019 season. Today's attendance was 41,064.

- Today's game at Virginia kicked off at 11:01 a.m. ET/10:01 a.m. CT, marking the earliest kickoff time in program history.
- The Illinois defense gave up 405 yards passing to Virginia QB Brennan Armstrong (27-36, 5 TDs). It marks the first 400-yard passer against the Illini defense in almost 19 years, dating back to Sept. 21, 2002 when San Jose State's Scott Rislov recorded 408 passing yards.
- Illinois captains: DB Tony Adams, OLB Owen Carney Jr., LB Jake Hansen, P Blake Hayes, OL Doug Kramer, OL Vederian Lowe.
- Senior OL duo of Vederian Lowe and Alex Palczewski each made their 43rd career starts (37th consecutive for Lowe) on Saturday. They are now tied for 17th on the Illini career starts list, five starts away from tying the Illinois record of 48.
- Senior LB Jake Hansen forced two fumbles on Saturday, giving him 12 for his Illini career. He moves past Whitney Mercilus (11) into second place in program history and is one behind career leader Simeon Rice (13)
- Sophomore RB Chase Brown recorded a career-high with 4 receptions. His previous best was 2 catches (vs. Iowa on 12/5/20, and at Penn State on 12/19/20).
- Senior DB Kerby Joseph recorded his first-career interception with 9:30 to play in the fourth quarter. Joseph's pick ended the UVA drive at the 1-yard line.
- Redshirt freshman WR Isaiah Williams, also a converted quarterback, led the Illini in receiving for the second-consecutive game, finishing with five catches for 41 yards.

- Friday's loss moves the Illini to 0-2 in the series vs. Maryland.
- Tonight's game marked the fourth Friday night game in the last five years for the Illini. (also 2017 at #22 USF, 2018 vs. #10 Penn State, 2020 at Wisconsin).
- The Illini defense held Maryland out of the end zone in the first half Friday night. The Terrapins entered the game averaging 46.0 points per game overall, and had averaged 29.0 points per game in the first half of each of their first two games.
- The Terrapins entered Week 3 13th in the country in scoring, but were held to a season-low 20 points by the Illini defense.
- The Illinois defense forced Maryland's first turnover of the season in the third quarter, halting a Terrapins drive that had covered 66 yards in seven plays by forcing a fumble at the Illini 7-yard line.
- The illini offense out-rushed the Maryland ground attack, 150-131 on Friday night with four different Illinois players recording at least 30 yards on the ground.
- Senior LB Jake Hansen recorded his first sack of the season on Friday night. Hansen finished with a game-high 12 total tackles (11 solo).
- Junior DB Jartavius Martin caused the first turnover of the season for the Maryland offense when he forced Terps running back Tayon Fleet-Davis to fumble at the Illini 7-yard line. It was the first forced fumble of the year for Martin (second career). Martin also finished with double-digit tackles, tallying 10 total tackles (7 solo).
- Junior DB Kerby Joseph recovered the Maryland fumble by Tayon Fleet-Davis, the first fumble recovery of his collegiate career.
- Maryland lost their second fumble of the third quarter on their next offensive possession when redshirt freshman LB Seth Coleman ripped the ball away from Maryland RB Penny Boone. It mark the first forced fumble and fumble recovery of Coleman's Illini career.
- True freshman RB Josh McCray's 38-yard touchdown run in the third quarter tied the game at 10. It was both McCray's first-career TD and the longest carry of his career. He is the first true freshman RB to score a touchdown for Illinois since Ra'Von Bonner (at Minnesota, 10/21/2017). McCray finished the game as the Illini's leading rusher with a career-best 60 yards on the ground.

GAME NOTES

- The 38 rushing yards allowed marked a season-low for the Illini defense, eclipsing the 131 yards given up on the ground vs. Maryland (9/17/21). It is the first time that the Illini have held an opponent to 50 or fewer rushing yards since allowing 10 vs. UConn (9/7/2019).
- The Illini defense also held the Boilermakers to just 315 yards of total offense, also a season-low for the Orange and Blue, besting the mark of 392 yards surrendered in the season-opening victory over Nebraska (8/28/21).
- The Illinois defense, which entered the game ranked third in the Big Ten and 22nd nationally with six takeaways, recorded two more vs. the Boilermakers with a pair of second-half interceptions.
- Senior OL duo of Vederian Lowe and Alex Palczewski each made their 45th career starts (39th consecutive for Lowe) on Saturday. They are now tied for ninth on the Illini career starts list, two starts away from the top five and three away from tying the Illinois record of 48.
- The Illini defense played without senior LB Jake Hansen, who entered the game as the team's leading tackler at 7.5 tackles per game.
- Josh McCray became the first true freshman to start at RB for the Illini since Ra'Von Bonner at Minnesota (10/21/2017). Bonner and Mike Epstein each started three games as freshmen during the 2017 season.
- McCray ran for a career-most 156 yards on 24 carries vs. the Boilermakers. It marks the fifth-most rushing yards by a true freshman in program history, and the most by a true freshman RB since Ke'Shawn Vaughn recorded 180 yards against Purdue (11/7/2015).
- The combination of Bryant and RB Josh McCray marks the first time that the Illini offense has started two true freshman on since QB M.J. Rivers and WR Carlos Sandy started against Penn State (9/21/2018).

GAME NOTES

- The Fighting Illini improve to 2-4 with the 24-14 victory over Charlotte.
- Illinois tallied a season-high 414 yards of total offense on Saturday, eclipsing the 412 yards recorded in Game 2 vs. UTSA.
- The Illini rushed for 336 yards as a team, also a season-best mark. It is the most for the program since rushing for 341 yards last season at Rutgers (11/14/20).
- After surrendering 14 first-half points, the Illinois defense held Charlotte scoreless in the second half on Sunday. It marks the first time the Fighting Illini defense held an opponent scoreless in the second half of a game since a 38-10 win at Rutgers on Nov. 2, 2019.
- The Illini offense took a 17-14 lead with 6:52 left in the third quarter on a 10-play, 94-yard drive capped by a 31-yard TD run by sophomore RB Chase Brown. The 94-yard drive marked the longest scoring drive of the season for the Illini.
- On the next offensive possession, the Illini scored on their first play from scrimmage, an 80-yard TD run also by Brown.
- Sophomore running back Chase Brown rushed for a career-high 257 yards and tied his career-high with two rushing touchdowns, giving him three TDs on the season and five for his career. Brown's 257 yards are the fourth-most in a single game in program history and the third-most by a running back in college football this season.
- Brown's second TD of the game, an 80-yard score, came on the first play of the ensuing Illini possession and gave Illinois a 24-14 lead as time expired in the third quarter. The 80-yard scoring run tied for the 10th-longest in program history.
- Junior Daniel Barker hauled in his 10th career touchdown in the second quarter, breaking the Illini record for career-TD receptions by a tight end. He moved past Ken Dilger who caught nine touchdowns for the Illini from 1991-94.
- Senior OLB Owen Carney Jr. recorded two fourth-quarter sacks and now has 14 for his career which ranks 13th in program history, just one away from cracking the top 10.
- Freshman Pat Bryant became the 15th Illini in program history to start multiple games at wide receiver as a true freshman.

• Illinois running back duo of Chase Brown (33 carries, 223 yards) and Josh McCray (24 carries, 142 yards) are the first teammates to rush for 100+ yards against Penn State since Rodney Smith (104) & Shannon Brooks (100) for Minnesota in 2016. They are also the first Illini teammates to rush for 100 yards in the same game since Mike Epstein (113) and Brown (110) at Nebraska in 2020.	
• Brown and McCray are just the third and fourth rushers to record more than 100 yards against Penn State this season joining Wisconsin's Chez Mellusi (31 carries, 121 yards) and Auburn's Tank Bigsby (23 carries, 102 yards).	
• Brown's 223 rushing yards were the most ever by an opponent at Beaver Stadium and the fourth-most ever against Penn State. Brown is the first rusher to eclipse the 200-yard mark against the Penn State defense since Benjarvus Green-Ellis recorded 203 yards in 2003 for Indiana.	
• Brown's 223-yard game marks his second game of the season with 200+ yards. He joins Howard Griffith (1990) and Rashard Mendenhall (2007) as the only players in program history with multiple 200-yard rushing games in a single season.	
• OLB Owen Carney recorded the 15th sack of his career on Penn State's opening offensive drive. Carney is now tied for ninth in Illini history. The sack also gives him 5.5 sacks on the season (all withing the last five games) a single-season career high surpassing his 5.0 sacks from last season.
