Thundering Herd Fall Notes

Notes at North Texas

The win by Marshall is the program's third ever in the state of Texas and the largest margin of victory ever by a Thundering Herd team in Texas (previous record: 13 points in a 2019 win at Rice).

Marshall took a 3-1 lead in the all-time series with North Texas.

Marshall junior offensive lineman James Magee received his first career start.

MU freshman quarterback Grant Wells set a program record with 18 consecutive completions, breaking the single game record of 13 set by Byron Leftwich (vs. Buffalo, 2002). The overall program record was 14, set by Eric Kresser (1996), who had 10 straight completions against The Citadel and then four to open the game against East Tennessee State.

Wells finished with three rushing touchdowns, the seventh time a Marshall QB has rushed for three or more TDs in school history and the first to accomplish the feat since Michael Payton in 1990.

Wells also had his first career multi-rushing touchdown game, scoring twice in the first half. Wells also surpassed 300 passing yards for the fifth time this season and seventh time in his career. He is one of seven players to have five-plus 300-yard games in a single season in Herd history.

Wells' three ground scores are tied for the third-most rushing TDs in a game by a Marshall quarterback.

Herd freshman running back Rasheen Ali scored twice in the first half, giving him four multi-rushing TD games in seven appearances this season. Ali also had the longest reception of his career (50 yards) and his 50 receiving yards is a single game career high.

Ali surpassed 100 rushing yards for the third time this season.

Marshall receiver Jayden Harrison caught a 6-yard touchdown pass, his first TD in college (nine games at Vanderbilt; seven games at Marshall).

With his fourth reception, senior receiver Willie Johnson reached 100 career catches.

MU linebacker Eli Neal recorded his first interception of the season and second of his career.

Safety Cory McCoy picked off a pass for the second consecutive game.

Forty-nine (49) points in a road game is tied for the tenth-most points Marshall has ever scored in a road game, and tied for the sixth-most points Marshall has ever scored in a conference road game. The Herd's 42 first-half points, and 28 in the second quarter, are the most for the program in a half and quarter in a road game since 2014 against Old Dominion.

Winning by 28 points on the road is tied for the sixth-largest margin of victory for Marshall in a Conference USA road game.

Feeling the Sunshine

Since the beginning of the 2013 season, Marshall is 15-4 in games contested in the state of Florida and/or against Florida schools.

Mollette Added to Rimington Trophy Watch List

Marshall center Alex Mollette had been selected as a midseason addition on the Rimington Trophy Watch List. The honor is given annually to college football's top center.

The Suwanee, Georgia redshirt senior moved to center from guard in 2021 and has started all seven games for the 4-3 Thundering Herd this season. He has 40 career starts for Marshall.

Mollette is the only Conference USA player to make the list.

The Rimington Trophy Presentation will be held January 15, 2022 in Rocco Theatre in Lincoln, Nebraska.

Ulmer Climbs the List

Senior offensive lineman Will Ulmer made his 51st career start at North Texas, moving him into a tie for sixth place on the program's career starts list. Ulmer is tied with Roger Johnson (1991-94), Chad Pennington (1995-99) and Nate McPeck (2000-03) with 51 starts.

Gaines Moves Up

Marshall tight end Xavier Gaines now has 1,280 career receiving yards. He has moved past Mike Bartrum (1,187 yards, 1989-92) into the No. 6 spot for Herd tight end career receiving yards. Gaines is now 38 yards from Gator Hoskins and the Marshall career top five.

No-fly Zone

In 2021, the Marshall defense has now held five of its first seven opponents to fewer than 135 passing yards. The Herd is currently 11th nationally in pass defense, allowing an average of 170 yards per game.

Third Quarter Stinginess

Marshall allowed its first points in the third quarter in the loss at Middle Tennessee, although the Herd DEFENSE has

still yet to yield any points in the third period.

Vroom!

Marshall ranks No. 8 in the nation in total offense at 509.1 yards per game and is fifth with 353.1 passing yards per game.

Marshall has:

- 16 plays of 40+ yards (third nationally)
- 45 plays of 20+ yards (12th nationally)
- 130 plays of 10+ yards (14th nationally)
- 21 of 30+ yards (16th nationally)

Individually, Rasheen Ali leads the nation with his 15 touchdowns, 13 rushing scores and his 12.9 points per game.

Wells ranks No. 5 in the nation with his average of 332.3 passing yards per game.

Sack Attack

Through seven games, Marshall is No. 8 in the nation in total quarterback sacks (26).

Coin Toss Slide

Marshall has lost the coin toss in each of its first seven games of 2021 (eight counting the one to begin the overtime victory against ODU). The Thundering Herd won the toss prior to the final four games of the 2020 campaign.

Bowl Prowess

Marshall enters 2021 featuring a .750 winning percentage (12-4) in all NCAA-sanctioned bowl games, the highest mark nationally among programs that have made at least seven appearances. (The Thundering Herd also participated in the 1948 Tangerine Bowl, at which point it was not sanctioned). The leaders are below:

Protecting the Home Turf

Marshall is nationally known for being one of the toughest places to play in college football. The program has won 81.9 percent (172-38) of its home games in Joan C. Edwards Stadium, the fourth-highest mark in the country of any program that has played more than eight games in its current facility.

Hang on!

Since the beginning of the 2010 season, the Thundering Herd has posted a combined 89-57 (.610) record. When Marshall has an edge in turnover margin, it is 47-12 (.797). When the turnover number is equal, Marshall is 22-8 (.733). When the opponent is more sure-handed, the Herd is 20-37 (.351).

Of Marshall's 146 games in that span, the Herd has played 73 while committing zero or one turnover, amassing a record of 55-18 (.753) in those games.

Marshall is 25-5 (.833) when it has a turnover margin of +2 or better.

Marshall has won nine in a row when winning the turnover battle by three or more.

Marshall is 27-7 (.794) when it has zero turnovers, and the Herd has won 14 of its last 17 when it does not make a miscue. Marshall has won 18 of its last 22 when winning the turnover battle and the 2020 win over Middle Tennessee was the 10th straight win when MU quarterbacks have two-plus touchdown passes without an interception.

The Thundering Herd had five takeaways in 2018 wins over Eastern Kentucky and Florida Atlantic, giving the program nine consecutive wins when it forces four or more turnovers.

First Blood

The Thundering Herd has now won 36 of its last 39 games when scoring first and has won 23 of its last 26 when leading after the first quarter. Related: since the beginning of the 2013 season, the Herd is 56-4 (.933) when scoring first.

Defensive Numbers to Know

The Herd has won 51 of its last 59 when holding offenses to 5.0 yards per play or fewer. The Herd has won 32 of its last 35 when allowing fewer than 300 yards. Twenty-two (22) times in the last 11-plus seasons has the Herd allowed 125 yards passing or fewer. Marshall is 19-3 (.864) in those games. Marshall is 34-4 (.895) when the defense does not allow a rushing touchdown during that timeframe as well.

Feel the Rush

The Herd is now 52-9 (.852) in the last eight-plus seasons when rushing for 150+ yards and 38-6 (.864) the last eight-plus years with 200+ on the ground. All-time, Marshall is 11-0 since 2010 when rushing for 300+ yards, as it did with 305 in the 33-31 win over Ohio in 2019. Marshall's 20 rushing first downs in the 2020 59-0 win over ECU was the most for the program since 24 versus Morris Harvey in 1925.

30+

Marshall's 49 points in the win at North Texas makes the Herd 53-5 (.914) in its last 58 games when scoring 30+ points.

50+

Marshall's 51-10 win over UMass in 2020 was the 19th time that the Thundering Herd reached the 50+-point plateau under coach Doc Holliday, four more than Jim Donnan (1990-95) for the all-time school mark. Bob Pruett (1996-2004) reached that mark 14 times and Cam Henderson (1936-42, 1946-49) did it on 13 occasions.

Herd Finishes

Since 2010, the Herd has an excellent record of finishing off its opponents once it takes the lead. Marshall is 71-10 (.877) when it scores first, 62-10 (.861) when leading after the first quarter, 74-6 (.925) when leading at halftime and 75-7 (.915) when leading after three quarters. In fact, Marshall has won 60 of its last 64 contests when it has the halftime lead.

Strong Versus Texas at Home

Interestingly enough, Marshall has lost just once to a school from Texas at home. The Thundering Herd is 13-1 against Texas schools in games played in Huntington (Rice, 2020). Marshall owns two wins over North Texas (1988, 2015), two wins over Houston (2008, 2012), three wins over Rice (2007, 2011, 2014), two wins over SMU (2005, 2009), two wins over UTEP (2006, 2010) and two victories over UTSA (2013, 2018).

Notes vs. ODU

Attendance for Saturday's game at Joan C. Edwards Stadium was 24,172.

With Saturday's win, Marshall improved to 6-1 against Old Dominion all-time, including 4-0 at Joan C. Edwards Stadium.

Marshall senior offensive lineman Will Ulmer made the 50th start of his career in Saturday's game, joining an exclusive club. Ulmer is the 11th player in Thundering Herd history to eclipse 50 starts, joining Chris Deaton, Aaron Ferguson, Chris Jasperse, Billy Lyon, Steve Sciallo, Roger Johnson, Chad Pennington, Nate McPeck, Levi Brown and Melvin Cunningham.

The fourth quarter interception by Marshall defensive back Steven Gilmore was his second pick this season and fifth of his career.

Thundering Herd safety Cory McCoy had his first career interception.

MU linebacker Charlie Gray set a career high with 11 tackles.

Marshall receiver Shadeed Ahmed caught the go-ahead touchdown in overtime, his second consecutive game with a touchdown. Ahmed also equaled his career high in catches with seven, which he had set the previous week.

Herd QB Grant Wells became the 14th player in school history to eclipse 4,000 career passing yards and tied Bud Nelson for No. 16 on the career passing touchdowns list with 26.

The Herd offense entered the game second nationally in fumbles, but did not fumble against the Monarchs.

Marshall is now 10-7, all-time, in overtime games.

Notes at Middle Tennessee

Attendance for Saturday's game was 15,806.

Marshall senior offensive lineman Will Ulmer started his 49th career game, tied for No. 13 in school history.

Freshman running back Rasheen Ali scored twice in the first half, making him the 13th player in program history to score two or more touchdowns in three consecutive games. Ali has scored at least one touchdown rushing, receiving or on a return in all five games this season.

Senior receiver Willie Johnson recorded a season long 47-yard catch.

Junior linebacker Abraham Beauplan recorded his 100th career tackle.

Senior defensive lineman Jamare Edwards recorded his first solo sack of the season. He has 5.5 sacks for his career.

Senior defensive lineman T.J. Johnson recorded a solo sack and now has 2.5 for the season.

Senior safety Nazeeh Johnson intercepted a pass for the sixth time in his career.

Ali had his second career 100-yard rushing game.

Freshman quarterback Grant Wells had 300 yards passing for the fourth time this season and the sixth time in his career.

Sophomore receiver Corey Gammage eclipsed 1,000 career receiving yards.

Notes at App State

App State's offense had an interception and a lost fumble, giving Marshall a plus-two turnover margin. The Thundering Herd had won 10 consecutive games – dating back to 2015 - when having a turnover margin of plus-two

or better.

Marshall senior tight end Xavier Gaines had his first career 100-yard game, finishing with a career-best 104 receiving yards. Gaines' receiving touchdown was his first this season.

Gaines had the first 100-yard receiving game by a Thundering Herd tight end since Gator Hoskins' 104-yard output on Dec. 17, 2013 vs. Maryland.

MU freshman running back Rasheen Ali scored for the fourth consecutive game.

Ali's 97-yard kickoff return for a touchdown was his first return of the season and was Marshall's first kickoff return for a touchdown since Keion Davis returned two of them for TDs against Miami (Ohio) on Sept. 2, 2017 (97 and 99 yards).

Herd receiver Shadeed Ahmed set career highs for receptions (four) and receiving yards (81).

Marshall senior receiver Willie Johnson's 41-yard catch was a season long.

The 61-yard punt by MU's Robert LeFevre tied a career long set last season.

Herd kicker Shane Ciucci saw his first action of the season, booting 3 of 4 field goals, including a career long of 46 yards.

Linebacker Eli Neal had his first career forced fumble and second career fumble recovery.

Defensive back Micah Abraham had his first interception this season (second of his career).

Notes vs. ECU

Attendance for Saturday's game at Joan C. Edwards Stadium was 24,833.

Marshall had won 10 consecutive games when scoring first.

The first quarter reception of 49 yards by Marshall's Corey Gammage is the longest of his career. Gammage also posted his first career 100-yard receiving game (180).

Thundering Herd running back Rasheen Ali scored on a 49-yard run in the third quarter, the longest run of his career. Ali also had his first career 100-yard rushing game (189). That rushing total is the most for a Marshall man since Brenden Knox ran for 220 yards at Florida Atlantic in 2019.

MU quarterback Grant Wells passed for at least 300 yards for the third consecutive game, the first Herd QB to accomplish that feat since Rakeem Cato, who threw for 300-plus yards against Purdue, Tulsa and Southern Miss during the 2012 season. Wells now has five career 300-yard passing games (13 career games).

Wells' 433 passing yards against East Carolina is the most for a Marshall man since Chase Litton threw for 486 yards at Charlotte in 2015.

Marshall cornerback Steven Gilmore recorded a second quarter sack, his first this season.

Senior defensive back Cory McCoy recovered his first fumble at Marshall (fourth of his collegiate career). McCoy also recorded his first sack at Marshall.

Herd receiver Willie Johnson had season highs in receptions (three) and receiving yards (66), and caught his 11th career touchdown.

MU running back Sheldon Evans had a career long reception of 56 yards and established a new career high with 65 receiving yards.

Notes vs. North Carolina Central

The Thundering Herd won its 11th consecutive home opener.

Marshall won by 30-plus points in the first two games of the season for the first time since 2013.

Marshall snapped the ball 101 times against the Eagles. The last time the Thundering Herd snapped the ball 100 times without overtime was in 2012 against Houston.

Grant Wells notched several career highs with his 48 attempts, 34 completions and his 344 yards.

Marshall running back Rasheen Ali caught nine passes for 55 yards and one TD. The only time a Marshall running back caught more passes in a game was when Ahmad Bradshaw snared 10 at UCF in 2005. Ali is the only one in the Herd book with 9.

Sixteen different Marshall players caught passes. The most different Herd receivers to catch passes prior to this game was 13 of them at West Virginia in 2012.

Marshall's 39 first downs is a new Thundering Herd record. The previous record was 37 first downs, accomplished three different times.

Marshall's defense allowed NC Central only one third down conversion in 13 tries.

Notes at Navy

Charles Huff is the first Marshall head coach to open on the road and win.

The 42-point margin of victory is the largest in program history in a season opener against a Football Bowl Subdivision team, besting the 38-point win against Miami (Ohio) to open the 2013 season.

Marshall won by 42 points on the road for just the sixth time in its history.

Attendance for Saturday's game at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium was 30,121.

Marshall had three first-time starters on offense: sophomore receiver Shadeed Ahmed; freshman lineman Logan Osburn; and junior lineman Kendrick Sartor.

The Thundering Herd had six on defense who started their first game at Marshall: senior end Shane Simmons; junior linebacker Charlie Gray; sophomore safety E.J. Jackson; senior safety Cory McCoy; sophomore end Sam Burton; and freshman lineman Jayshaun Coffman.

Marshall won its regular season opener for the ninth consecutive season.

The Herd defense finished with nine sacks, the second most in a single game in program history (Record: 12, vs. Ohio, 1986).

Sophomore receiver Talik Keaton matched a career long reception of 47 yards on the first play of the game. Keaton also established a new single game career high for receiving yards (100).

Freshman running back Rasheen Ali scored his first collegiate touchdown. Ali finished the day with four touchdowns on the ground. The last Herd player with four rushing touchdowns in a game was Devon Johnson vs. FAU in 2014.

Senior linebacker Brian Cavicante recorded his first sack at Marshall.

Freshman defensive tackle Jayshaun Coffman recorded his first collegiate sack.

Senior defensive lineman T.J. Johnson recorded his first sack of the season and second of his Herd career.

Senior kicker Andrew Sanders scored the first points of his Marshall career.

Junior running back Sheldon Evans had his first career multi-touchdown game (two) and now has seven career touchdowns on the ground.

Sophomore linebacker Eli Neal recorded three sacks after compiling 1.5 total sacks in his first 23 games with the Herd.

Junior defensive back Steven Gilmore recorded his fourth career interception.

Sophomore receiver Corey Gammage established new career highs for receptions (seven) and receiving yards (94).

Junior defensive back Keylin Roach recorded his first interception at Marshall.

Freshman receiver E.J. Horton caught a 30-yard pass from Luke Zban, Horton's first career reception and score.

The last time Marshall blocked two kicks in one game was in the 28-25 win at Florida International in 2018. In that game, Juwon Young blocked a Panther field goal attempt, and Brandon Drayton blocked a punt and fell on it in the end zone for a touchdown.

Thundering Herd By The Numbers

- 63** – In the last eight-plus seasons, the Marshall offense has scored 30 or more points 63 times. The Herd is 56-7 in those games and has won 22 of its last 24 when doing so.
- 60** – Marshall has won 60 of its last 64 games when holding the halftime lead.
- 56** – Since the beginning of the 2013 season, Marshall has won 56 of its last 59 games when scoring first.
- 51** – Marshall has won 51 of its last 59 contests when holding the opposition to 5.0 yards per play or fewer.
- 39** – In the past eight-plus seasons, Marshall quarterbacks have been interception-free 39 times. In those games, the Herd is 33-6.
- 39** – The Marshall offense has scored 40 or more points 39 times since 2010. The Herd is 35-4 in those games.
- 24** – Marshall has won 24 out of its last 25 games when rushing for at least 250 yards.
- 23** – Marshall has won 23 of its last 26 games when leading after the first quarter.
- 15** – Marshall has won 15 consecutive games when holding the opposition under 100 rushing yards.
- 10** – Marshall has won 10 of its last 11 games (dating back to 2015) when being +2 or better in turnover margin.
- 3** – Only three schools have a better current home stadium winning percentage than Marshall (of those who have played more than eight games): Alabama, Georgia Southern and Boise State. The Herd is 172-38 at Joan C. Edwards Stadium, which opened in 1991, winning at an .819 clip.
- 1** – The Marshall football program continues to rank No. 1 nationally in bowl winning percentage (minimum seven bowls to qualify). The Herd is 12-4 (.750) all-time in bowl games.
- 0** – The number of points Marshall's DEFENSE has allowed in the third quarter this season.
- 0** – The number of coin tosses Marshall has won in 2021.

Marshall vs. Ranked Opponents

Marshall Football Comes Out on Top in Overtime Against FIU on Senior Day (Nov. 30, 2019)

HUNTINGTON, W.Va. - Marshall running back Brenden Knox rushed for 146 yards and a touchdown to help send 17 Thundering Herd seniors off with a victory in their last game at Joan C. Edwards Stadium on Saturday afternoon in a 30-27 overtime win over the FIU Panthers.

Knox rushed for over 100 yards for the sixth time this season. With win, Marshall head coach Doc Holliday now has 71 wins over FBS opponents surpassing former head coach Bob Pruett's 70.

"I thought our guys kept fighting," Holliday said after the win. "And in a game like that you win it or you lose it, and you just hope at the end of the day you step up and find a way to win the game."

Down four, 21-17, and 6:12 on the clock, the Herd took over at its own 25-yard line. After benefitting from a pair of defensive pass interference calls, Marshall quarterback Isaiah Green flicked an 18-yard pass to tight end Xavier Gaines in the left corner of the end zone for the go-ahead touchdown with 2:16 left in regulation.

The Panthers began their next drive at their own 28, but took the ball down to the Marshall 25 where it was first-and-10 for the Panthers. After gaining just one yard on the next three plays, FIU kicker Jose Borregales came on and made a 41-yard field goal to tie game, 24-24, with 21 ticks left on the scoreboard, which ultimately forced overtime.

In overtime, Marshall won the toss and chose to start on defense. The Herd forced a three-and-out on the Panthers opening drive and Borregales made a 35-yard field goal to go up 27-24 with the Herd taking the ball. Knox started the possession with a 24-yard run and proceeded to punch it in on the next play with a one-yard rush to give MU the victory.

The game started with a scoreless first quarter, which saw just seven total first downs with five by the Herd, saw Marshall on the board first with a 38-yard field goal by Justin Rohrwasser a little over a minute into the second frame.

The Panthers answered quickly with a five-play, 75-yard drive, capped off by a one-yard touchdown rush by Napoleon Maxwell as the Herd trailed 7-3 with 11:29 left in the first half.

The very next Marshall drive it answered with a touchdown of its own. Gaines capped off a 75-yard drive with a 20-yard rush to paydirt on a "Statue of Liberty" play to put the Herd back on top 10-7.

Both teams went scoreless in the final five drives of the opening half, with three combined punts as the Herd entered the break leading 10-7.

Coming out of halftime, Marshall forced FIU into its third three-and-out of the contest by forcing a loss of 11 yards on the opening possession. The Herd proceeded to milk 5:48 off the clock on a 12-play, 50-yard drive to extend its lead to 17-7 as Green scampered into the end zone for his fourth rushing touchdown of the season.

FIU took the ball 75 yards for the second time of the game for a touchdown. Panthers running back Anthony Jones ended the drive with a nine-yard rushing touchdown.

On MU's next possession, Green fumbled and FIU recovered nine seconds into the final stanza. The Panthers needed just one play, a pass from quarterback James Morgan to wide receiver Tony Gaiter IV, for 21-yards to the end zone as it regained the lead at 21-17 with 14:42 left in the game.

After being forced to punt after a seven-play drive, Marshall linebacker Tavante Beckett collected his first interception at the FIU 29 with 9:45 on the clock. However, the Herd went three-and-out for the first time of the game and Rohrwasser missed a 45-yard field goal as it was pushed wide right, before the Herd went on to take the game in overtime.



Charles Huff (4-3 Overall, 2-1 C-USA) Head Coach - First Season

Charles Huff was named Marshall's head football coach on January 17, 2021.

An elite recruiter and developer of talent, Huff's proven track record bolstered head coach Nick Saban's staff for the 2019 and 2020 seasons.

In his inaugural season in Tuscaloosa, Huff helped Najee Harris rush for a career-best 1,224 yards on 209 carries with 13 rushing touchdowns while catching 27 passes for 304 yards and seven more scores. Brian Robinson Jr. added 441 rushing yards and five scores while then-freshman Keilan Robinson added 254 yards and two touchdowns. In 2020, Harris was a consensus All-American who led the nation in total touchdowns (30), rushing touchdowns (26) and points (180). He also ranked third nationally in rushing yards (1,466) and holds the school record for total touchdowns (57), rushing touchdowns (46) and rushing yards (3,843).

Huff arrived in Tuscaloosa after one season (2018) as the assistant head coach, run-game coordinator and running backs coach at Mississippi State. He boasts 16 years of coaching experience on both the NFL and college levels with stops at Penn State (2014-17), Western Michigan (2013), the Buffalo Bills (2012), Vanderbilt (2011), Hampton (2010), Maryland (2009) and Tennessee State (2006-08).

His one season in Starkville produced an effective rushing attack that averaged 223.6 yards per game to rank second in the SEC and 20th nationally. Kylin Hill and Aeris Williams carried the load at running back, averaging 6.3 and 6.2 yards per carry, respectively, while quarterback Nick Fitzgerald led the team in rushing with 1,121 yards and 13 touchdowns.

A native of Denton, Maryland, Huff spent four seasons (2014-17) as Penn State's running backs coach and special teams coordinator. He recruited and developed one of the game's most electrifying players in running back Saquon Barkley, who in 2018 became the highest drafted NFL running back since Reggie Bush went No. 2 overall in 2006.

Barkley, who was called with the second overall pick by the New York Giants in the 2018 draft, produced a dynamic rookie season, rushing for 1,307 yards and 11 touchdowns. He added 91 receptions for 721 yards and four more scores to amass 2,028 yards from scrimmage on his way to Offensive Rookie of the Year honors at season's end.

Numerous records fell at the running back position and on special teams under Huff's guidance at Penn State. Barkley, a 2017 consensus All-American, became the first Big Ten running back in history to win Offensive Player of the Year honors twice. A Walter Camp National Player of the Year finalist, Barkley ranked second nationally in all-purpose yards in 2017 (2,329). He broke four school career records, including rushing touchdowns (43), total touchdowns (53), all-purpose yards (5,538) and consecutive games with a touchdown (15) in just three seasons.

The 2016 campaign saw the Nittany Lions claim the Big Ten Championship and it was Huff who mentored two record-breakers. Barkley broke the Penn State sophomore record for rushing yards (1,496), all-purpose yards (1,972) and points scored (132), while junior kicker Tyler Davis collected All-Big Ten first-team honors after tying the league's single-season record for kicking points (128) and breaking the school record for field goals by a junior (22) and consecutive field goals made (18).

Huff recruited Barkley to Penn State, and his freshman season of 2015 was spectacular. The Freshman All-American broke the school's single-season freshman rushing record with 1,076 yards. He was named the Big Ten Network's Big Ten Freshman of the Year in the process.

He spent the 2013 season at Western Michigan as the running backs coach and helped the unit nearly double its rushing yards from 2012. The Broncos ran for 1,394 yards in 2013 after running for just 735 yards the year before.

Huff spent the 2012 season in the NFL as the assistant running backs coach for the Buffalo Bills. He helped C.J. Spiller to his first career 1,000-yard rushing campaign and a Pro Bowl invitation.

In 2011, Huff was on James Franklin's 2011 staff at Vanderbilt as the offensive quality control coach. Huff and Franklin also worked together at Maryland in 2009, when Huff was the assistant offensive line coach. Huff also mentored NFL first-round pick Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie as the tight ends and special teams coach at Tennessee State from 2007-08.

Huff graduated in 2005 from Hampton University where he served as a team captain, starting 12 games at center as a senior in 2005. He also played guard, fullback and tight end in his career.

Huff will be joined in Huntington by his wife Jessica and son Bobby.
