SATURDAY STORYLINES



RED RAIDERS LOOK FOR 3-0 START

- Texas Tech will look to sweep through the non-conference portion of its schedule Saturday when the Red Raiders welcome FIU for a 6 p.m. kick inside Jones AT&T Stadium. It is the Panthers' second all-time appearance in Lubbock after suffering a 56-3 rout at the hands of the Red Raiders to open the 2005 season.
- Texas Tech enters this weekend having won each of its last 13 non-conference games at home and 38 of its last 39 contests dating back to the 2002 season. The Red Raiders have won 29-consecutive regular season contests at home or on the road against non-power five members.



EXPLOSIVE PLAYS BECOMING E-Z

- Erik Ezukanma has developed a knack for creating explosive plays through the first two weeks of the season as the nation's leading receiver has caught 13 passes for 323 yards and a touchdown. It marks the most receiving yards to start a season by a Red Raider since Darrin Moore had 339 over the first two games of the 2011 campaign.
- Ezukanma has created the bulk of his receiving yardage through explosive plays as he has six catches for 30 or more yards thus far, which leads all FBS receivers thus far. He has also caught three passes of at least 50 yards, including a 75-yard touchdown strike early in the win over SFA.



GROUND GAME STRONG ON BOTH SIDES

- Tahj Brooks has proved to be a solid presence in the backfield through SaRodrick Thompson's absence so far this season as the sophomore has eclipsed the 100-yard mark in each of Texas Tech's two wins. His 237 rushing yards this season mark the most by a Red Raider through two games since Texas Tech moved to a spread offense prior to the 2000 campaign.
- On the other side, Texas Tech is allowing only 59.0 yards per game on the ground, which ranks 14th nationally and second in the Big 12 through two weeks. The Red Raiders also rank 18th nationally in tackles for loss per game (8.5) and 31st for sacks per game (3.0)

TEAM NOTEBOOK

FIU RETURNS TO LUBBOCK FOR SECOND MEETING WITH RED RAIDERS

- This will be the second all-time meeting between Texas Tech and Florida International as the Panthers previously traveled to Lubbock to start the 2005 season. The Red Raiders ran away with that game, routing FIU, 56-3, for the first of six-consecutive wins to start a memorable season that ended with an appearance in the Cotton Bowl.
- Two current Texas Tech staff members were still in their Red Raider playing careers the last time FIU visiting the South Plains. **Joel Filani** had four catches for 78 yards in the win over the Panthers, while **Antonio Huffman** racked up seven tackles to go along with a pair of pass breakups.
- Texas Tech is 51-30-2 all-time versus Conference USA members as Florida International is one of five league schools to face the Red Raiders in school history. In addition to FIU, Texas Tech has squared off against North Texas (4-4), UTEP (17-6-1), Rice (27-20-1) and Louisiana Tech (2-0). The Red Raiders are 13-2 against CUSA members over the course of the Big 12 era (1996-present).
- Texas Tech head coach **Matt Wells** is 2-0 all-time against Conference USA members after defeating UTEP twice during his career. The Red Raiders dropped UTEP, 38-3, in only Wells' second game as Texas Tech's head coach in 2019. His Utah State program topped UTEP, 21-6, to wrap the 2014 season as the Aggies and Miners faced each other in the Gildan New Mexico Bowl.

TEXAS TECH-FIU CONNECTIONS

- Texas Tech will be the first Big 12 opponent to face FIU head coach **Butch Davis** in his respective career. Davis is in his fifth season at FIU after previous head coaching stops at Miami and North Carolina as well as the NFL's Cleveland Browns.
- FIU defensive line coach **Deke Adams** and Texas Tech inside receivers and tight ends coach **Luke Wells**, associate head coach and special teams coordinator **Mark Tommerdahl** and offensive line coach **Steve Farmer** were all on the same staff together in 2008 at Louisiana-Monroe. Farmer was in his final year as Monroe's offensive coordinator, while Wells was the wide receivers and tight ends coach. Tommerdahl, meanwhile, served as Monroe's assistant head coach that season and special teams coordinator. Adams was in a similar role that season as he is now at FIU.
- Texas Tech boasts five Red Raiders on its roster that hail from the state of Florida - offensive lineman **Ethan Carde** (Valrico), quarterback **Henry Colombi** (Hollywood), long snapper **Jackson Knotts** (Plant City), linebacker **Jesiah Pierre** (Mount Dora) and defensive back **Marquis Waters** (Delray Beach). Both Colombi and Waters are South Florida natives who grew up within an hour from Florida International's campus in Miami.

TEXAS TECH LOOKS TO SWEEP THROUGH NON-CONFERENCE PLAY

- A win over Florida International would mark the first time Texas Tech has swept through non-conference play with an undefeated record since 2017 when the Red Raiders defeated Eastern Washington, Arizona State and Houston on their way to an appearance in the Birmingham Bowl (does not include the one non-conference game in 2020).
- Over the course of its time in the Big 12, Texas Tech has wrapped non-conference play without a blemish 12 times, with 11 of those ultimately ending with a bowl trip at the end of the season. The Red Raiders advanced to a bowl after undefeated non-conference states in 1998, 2000, 2001, 2005, 2007, 2008, 2010, 2012, 2013, 2015 and 2017. The lone year the Red Raiders failed to make a bowl game following an undefeated non-conference slate came in 2011.

NON-CONFERENCE SUCCESS FAMILIAR FOR RED RAIDERS

- Texas Tech enters this weekend having won each of its last 13 non-conference games at home and 38 of its last 39 contests dating back to the 2002 season. The Red Raiders are an impressive 45-2 overall in non-conference home games since moving to a spread offense in 2000.
- Texas Tech's success against non-conference opponents from either the FCS level or a Group of Five conference is even more impressive as the Red Raiders have won each of their last 29 regular-season contests at home or on the road against non-power five members.
- In fact, Texas Tech has not dropped a non-conference game against a Group of Five opponent since falling at No. 17 Houston, 29-28, early in the 2009 season. In addition, Tech has not lost to an unranked Group of Five opponent since New Mexico surprised the Red Raiders, 27-24, in 2004.
- Texas Tech head coach **Matt Wells** is 5-1 in non-conference games during his tenure at Texas Tech and is 17-14 over his career with 10 of those losses coming to power-five schools, nine of which that were during his tenure at Utah State. Texas Tech can run through the non-conference slate with an undefeated record for the first time in Wells' career with a win over FIU (not including 2020 where there was only one non-conference game).

CRABTREE, TARBOX AWAIT RING OF HONOR INDUCTION

- Texas Tech great **Michael Crabtree** will be back at his alma mater this weekend as he and the late **Elmer Tarbox** will be formally inducted into the prestigious Ring of Honor. The Ring of Honor ceremony will be held at 11:30 a.m. Saturday at The Overton Hotel and Conference Center followed by a pregame recognition prior to kickoff against FIU. The names of both Crabtree and Tarbox will both be unveiled on the West Stadium Building wall to Jones AT&T Stadium during the pregame ceremony.
- Crabtree was announced as Texas Tech's sixth inductee into the Ring of Honor early in the 2020 season as his ceremony was pushed back a year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Crabtree remains a fixture in Texas Tech history after shattering many of Texas Tech's receiving records during his two-year playing career from 2007-08, a span that saw the Red Raiders finish 20-6 overall, which was highlighted by an 11-2 campaign in 2008 that pushed Texas Tech to as high as No. 2 in the national rankings.
- Tarbox, meanwhile, was selected for Ring of Honor induction earlier this summer in recognition for his outstanding playing career during the early stages of the Texas Tech football program. Tarbox played three seasons for the Red Raiders from 1936-38, quickly developing into one of the most prominent two-way players in the country. For Tarbox, his legacy was felt on the defensive side of the ball. In 1938, Tarbox set the Texas Tech single-season record with 11 interceptions, a mark that has not seriously been approached by any Red Raider since then as the next-highest total is eight.

CLOSE WINS TURNING FOR THE RED RAIDERS

- After struggling to finish out tight games in Matt Wells' debut season in 2019, the Red Raiders have turned the tide in one-possession games as the Stephen F. Austin victory marked Texas Tech's fifth win since the start of the 2020 season in games determined by eight points or less. The Red Raiders are 5-2 in one-possession games during that span, which includes three Big 12 wins over West Virginia, Baylor and Kansas.

RED RAIDERS TURNING INTO A SECOND HALF TEAM

- Texas Tech has showed all signs of being a strong second-half team through the first two weeks of the season as the Red Raiders erased a 14-point deficit to win at Houston and then battled back from a slow start to edge Stephen F. Austin this past weekend. It marked the first time the Red Raiders had battled back from a halftime deficit to win in back-to-back games since Texas Tech topped both Nevada (35-34) and Kansas (45-34) early in the 2011 season.
- Texas Tech overcame a 14-point deficit against Houston to win for the second time in a four-game stretch as the Red Raiders previously battled back from a similar hole late in the 2020 season against Baylor. Prior to that game, the Red Raiders had not overcome such a deficit since rallying from a 20-0 hole against Kansas in 2011.
- Texas Tech is currently outscoring opponents, 52-9, in the second half this season as the Red Raider defense has allowed only one touchdown during that stretch, which came on a short drive that started just outside the red zone against Stephen F. Austin.
- The Red Raiders shut out Houston over the final 30 minutes of play, marking the first second-half shutout by Texas Tech since blanking No. 15 Oklahoma State to open Big 12 play with a victory in 2018.

RECAPING THE FIRST TWO WEEKS OF 2021

- Texas Tech started its season at 2-0 with wins over both Houston and Stephen F. Austin. It marks the eighth time since 2010 where the Red Raiders have opened their season with a 2-0 record.
- The victory over Houston marked the fourth-straight for the Red Raiders over the Cougars as Texas Tech is now 16-3 against former Southwest Conference foes since the league disbanded in 1995. The Red Raiders have now won nine of the past 10 meetings against Houston, including four of the five meetings since joining the Big 12 in 1996.
- Texas Tech started its season with a victory for the 18th time in the past 19 years after defeating the Cougars. With the win, the Red Raiders improved to 67-27-3 all-time in season openers.
- Texas Tech improved to 25-1 all-time against FCS opponents and 76-18-3 in home openers with its 28-22 victory over Stephen F. Austin last weekend. The Red Raiders have now won 19-consecutive games against opponents from the FCS ranks.
- Texas Tech notched four interceptions in the win over Houston, its most in a game since the Red Raiders picked off five passes against SMU early in the 2008 season. For comparisons sake, Texas Tech is now just one interception shy of its entire total from the 2020 season.
- Texas Tech's four interceptions matched the most in the FBS through the first two full weekends of the college football season as both Troy and Kent State have picked off four passes in a game thus far (Kent State has done so twice).
- Texas Tech limited Houston to only 251 yards of total offense, marking the second-straight game the Red Raiders have held an opponent to less than 300 yards dating back to the 2020 finale against Kansas. The Cougars only totaled 53 yards of total offense in the second half and went nowhere on the ground with negative-18 yards.
- The Red Raider defense was in the backfield often against the Cougars after totaling 11.0 tackles for loss, its most since recording the same amount against Baylor midway through the 2019 season. The Red Raiders have made it a habit of stopping the opposing offense behind the line of scrimmage thus far with 19.0 tackles for a loss through two games, their second-highest total in that stretch dating back to 2000. The 2009 team had 20.0 tackles for a loss through two games in the season. The Red Raiders currently rank 18th nationally in tackles for loss entering this weekend.
- When looking at Texas Tech's offensive output through the first two weeks, its important to note the Red Raiders have only had 102 plays (52 at Houston, 50 vs. SFA), their fewest through two games in a season dating back to 2000. Texas Tech's next-lowest total was the 137 the Red Raiders attempted early in the 2003 season.
- **Tahj Brooks** has been the breakout star for the Texas Tech offense through the first two weeks as he has carried 26 times for 237 yards and four touchdowns. Brooks has been explosive in finding the end zone, scoring on touchdown runs of 41 and 44 yards against Houston before breaking loose on a 67-yard scamper against SFA. To this point in the season, Brooks is the only FBS running back with three runs of at least 40 yards or longer.
- Brooks finished with a career-high 134 rushing yards against Houston and then added 103 on the ground versus SFA, marking his first two games to reach the 100-yard mark. His four rushing touchdowns this season are tied for the Big 12 high and match the most for a Red Raider through two games dating back to 2000.
- His rise gives Texas Tech the nation's leading receiver in **Erik Ezukanma** and then a top-25 rusher in Brooks, who ranks 23rd nationally in rushing yards entering this weekend. Texas Tech is one of three schools nationally currently with a player ranked in the top 10 for receiving and another in the top 25 for rushing.
- **Xavier White** added a 52-yard run against SFA as part of seven carries for 88 yards and a touchdown. With that run, Texas Tech has had four carries go at least 40 yards this season, which leads all team's nationally.
- **Riko Jeffers** stepped in front of a Clayton Tune pass midway through the third quarter against Houston for his first career interception. Jeffers returned the interception 13 yards for a touchdown, marking the first pick-six by a Red Raider since Adrian Frye went 43 yards into the end zone against Lamar in 2018.
- In addition to Jeffers, **Reggie Pearson Jr.** and **Eric Monroe** both recorded the first career interception of their respective careers versus the Cougars. Pearson, in his debut as a Red Raider, also forced a fumble and had eight tackles, while Monroe contributed five tackles.

Recap: The 2004 victory over TCU remains one of the most memorable wins in recent memory as the Red Raiders erased a 21-0 deficit midway through the second quarter behind 441 passing yards and four touchdowns from then-quarterback Sonny Cumbie. The Red Raiders ran off 56 unanswered points against the Horned Frogs thanks to three rushing touchdowns from Taurean Henderson and one through the air from Jarrett Hicks, who had an impressive 211 receiving yards in the win.

- **Colin Schooler** reached double digits for tackles for the 15th time in his career and the second time as a Red Raider after notching 10 against the Cougars. That total included a pair of tackles that went for a loss, giving him 53.0 now over his career at both Texas Tech and the University of Arizona. Schooler is Texas Tech's leading tackler through two weeks with 16 stops.
- The play of both Jeffers and Pearson earned the two Big 12 weekly award honors as Jeffers was tabbed Defensive Player of the Week, while Pearson was recognized as the top newcomer. It was the first conference weekly award in each of their respective careers.

A NEW TERM FOR 2021 - SUPER SENIORS

- Media and fans alike will likely hear a new term throughout the 2021 season - Super Seniors. The phrase describes many of the seniors across the country who decided to utilize the extra year granted by the NCAA for the 2020 season.
- The defense was the greatest benefactor of the Super Senior movement, retaining a collective 156 career starts between seven players entering this season. The group is led by Colin Schooler, the team's most veteran player, who has 41 career starts between his playing time at Arizona (33) and Texas Tech (8).
- The offense boasts five Super Seniors who own a collective 58 starts among them. The most experience of that group is shared by a pair of transfers in Kaylon Geiger (19) and T.J. Storment (19), who each arrived to Lubbock as Super Seniors.
- For Texas Tech, the Red Raiders lead the Big 12 Conference with 12 super seniors according to recent research by the Associated Press. The list of returnees includes nine players that were on Tech's roster this past fall as well as three others in **T.J. Storment**, who transferred to join the Red Raiders this spring following one season at TCU, **Kaylon Geiger Sr.**, a veteran wide receiver from Troy, and Marquis Waters, who started in 35 games over his career at Duke.
- According to the Associated Press' research this past spring, Texas Tech is tied for fifth among power-five programs with 12 super seniors as the Red Raiders only trail the likes of Illinois (17), Arizona State (14), USC (14) and Rutgers (13) and are tied with Pittsburgh (12). The arrival of Geiger pushed the Red Raiders ahead of Arizona (11), Utah (11) and Tennessee (11).

NEW TO TOWN BUT NOT TO THE GAME

- One of the goals for **Matt Wells** and his staff upon their arrival in Dec. 2018 was making the Red Raiders older as a roster. They have done just that, bringing in 22 scholarship transfers from four-year colleges during that span, including 17 that appear on the 2021 roster.
- An area, in particular, Wells and his staff have taken advantage of is transfers with multiple years of eligibility remaining as Texas Tech has signed 14 players in his tenure that will ultimately play multiple seasons for the Red Raiders. That total includes nine Red Raiders who are entering their second season at Texas Tech this season and three more who will have multiple seasons of eligibility after arriving in Lubbock this past January.
- Texas Tech has signed the bulk of its transfers from other power-five schools under Wells as 14 players have arrived after playing in the ACC, Big 12, Big Ten, SEC or Pac-12. Six of Texas Tech's transfer additions for this season came from power-five schools as the Red Raiders signed the likes of **Malik Dunlap** (N.C. State), **Reggie Pearson Jr.** (Wisconsin), **Jesiah Pierre** (Florida), **Tyler Shough** (Oregon), **T.J. Storment** (TCU), **Marquis Waters** (Duke) and **Rayshad Williams** (UCLA).
- Both Storment and Waters were considered instant-impact signees for the Red Raiders as Storment garnered All-Big 12 second team honors by the Associated Press this past season at TCU, while Waters started 35 games over his Duke career, totaling 234 tackles and three interceptions during that time.
- The impact of this veteran group could bring immediate results. A few have garnered notice from the Athletic's Max Olson and Bruce Feldman as part of their College Football Transfer Portal Top 100 that was released prior to the season: **Tyler Shough** (No. 21), **Marquis Waters** (No. 49), **T.J. Storment** (No. 74).
- Wells did go outside the power-five to land additional depth at wide receiver this summer with the signing of Troy transfer **Kaylon Geiger**. Over his two seasons at Troy, Geiger caught 141 passes for 1,625 yards and eight touchdowns over 23 games as he was tabbed the Sun Belt Newcomer of the Year as a junior in 2019 as well as an All-Sun Belt first team honoree. He collected second team accolades from the conference coaches this past season. Geiger previously starred at Navarro College prior to transferring to Troy as a junior in 2019.
- Over his first two seasons, four-year college transfers into the program under Wells have accounted for 84 starts.

INSIDE THE SCHEDULE

The FIU game is one of five contests inside the state of Texas over the Red Raiders' front half of the schedule as Texas Tech already faced Houston and Stephen F. Austin and will follow this weekend's contest with home games against Florida International (Sept. 18) and TCU (Oct. 9) and then road trips to Texas (Sept. 25) and West Virginia (Oct. 2).

Texas Tech will open Big 12 Conference play with back-to-back road games at Texas and West Virginia, marking the first time since 2014 where the Red Raiders started their league slate on the road for the first two contests. Tech also opened the 2002 and 2004 seasons with consecutive road games to start conference play (no neutral sites), both of which resulted in at least eight wins overall.

Texas Tech will play nine-straight games to start its season before experiencing its lone open week on the 2021 season, which comes Nov. 6 prior to back-to-back home games versus Iowa State and Oklahoma State. It is the furthest Tech has had to wait for an open date since 2015 when the Red Raiders lone weekend off came prior to the regular-season finale at Texas.

DEGREES IN HAND

Texas Tech will enter the 2021 season with 16 student-athletes who are current college graduates, including seven who earned their undergraduate degrees in Lubbock. The list of Tech graduates includes **Seth Collins**, **Dawson Deaton**, **Riko Jeffers**, **McLane Mannix**, **DaMarcus Fields** and **Nelson Mbanasor**.

In addition, nine other Red Raiders transferred to Texas Tech after earning their degrees at various other universities. That list features **Brandon Bouyer-Randle** (Michigan State), **Josh Burger** (Wofford), **Eric Monroe** (LSU), **Jacob Morgenstern** (Duke), **Colin Schooler** (Arizona), **Chadarius Townsend** (Alabama), **Marquis Waters** (Duke), **Tyler Shough** (Oregon) and **T.J. Stormont** (Colorado State) and **Matthew Young** (New Mexico State).

YOU'RE ON SCHOLARSHIP

Four Red Raiders closed preseason camp by hearing the three words every walk-on dreams of: "you're on scholarship." **Matt Wells** and his staff gave that opportunity to four different Red Raiders this past Saturday as sophomore offensive lineman **Aaron Castro**, sophomore linebacker **Bryce Ramirez**, junior tight end **Henry Teeter** and senior defensive lineman **Troy Te'o** were all recognized for their hard work.

The presentation was set up, in part, by offensive coordinator **Sonny Cumbie**, a former walk-on himself who discussed his journey to eventually earning a scholarship and then becoming the Red Raiders' starter behind center. Cumbie remains one of the most successful walk-ons in school history after leading the Red Raiders to a memorable win at the 2004 Holiday Bowl to close his career.

Wells and his staff have rewarded at least one walk-on with a scholarship in each of his three seasons, a list that includes three other current Red Raiders in senior wide receiver **Dalton Rigdon** (presented in 2019), junior place kicker **Trey Wolff** (honored following 2019 season) and junior running back **Xavier White** (earned in 2020).

CHAMPIONSHIP EXPERIENCE

Texas Tech has three members of its program with national championship rings in former Alabama running back **Chadarius Townsend** and LSU safety **Eric Monroe**. Townsend was a redshirt on Alabama's 2017 national championship team and later played in the Crimson Tide's College Football Playoff run in 2018. Monroe, meanwhile, saw action in 12 games during the 2019 campaign, including both of LSU's victories in the CFP.

Texas Tech linebackers coach **Kevin Cosgrove** was also part of LSU's national championship run in 2019 as he was a senior defensive analyst for the Tigers. **Matt Wells** hired Cosgrove to his staff not long after LSU raised the title trophy in New Orleans.

THE GAME IS NEVER OVER HERE

MAKING IT LOOK E-Z

Currently the nation's leading receiver, Erik Ezukanma has established himself among the Big 12's top wide receivers as he has caught 103 passes for 1,783 yards and 11 touchdowns during that span. He led Tech with 46 receptions for 748 yards and six touchdowns in 2020 en route to becoming the first Red Raider wide receiver to garner All-Big 12 first team honors since two-time Biletnikoff Award winner Michael Crabtree in 2008.

Ezukanma entered his junior season as the Big 12's returning leader in receiving yards per game as he ranked second in the league after averaging 74.8 yards, trailing only departed Oklahoma State standout Tylan Wallace and his 92.2 yards per game. A Preseason All-Big 12 selection, Ezukanma averaged 10 more yards per game more than any other returning conference wide receiver as he also ranked third in the league for total receiving yards.

OFFENSIVE NOTEBOOK

CUMBIE RETURNS TO ALMA MATER AS OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

■ Texas Tech fans will recognize a familiar face roaming the sidelines this season as former quarterback and assistant coach **Sonny Cumbie** was hired in December as the Red Raiders' new offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Cumbie, who spent the past seven seasons at Big 12 counterpart TCU, returns to his alma mater where he was the starting quarterback in 2004 before later serving as a graduate assistant in 2009 and then an assistant coach from 2010-13.

■ A native of nearby Snyder, Texas, Cumbie helped TCU boast the Big 12's second-best conference record (38-25) and third-best overall mark (58-30) over his seven seasons, which coincided with six bowl appearances. He oversaw the Horned Frogs' quarterbacks throughout his tenure and served as the sole offensive play caller each of his final four years.

■ Once the quarterback in one of Texas Tech's biggest bowl wins, Cumbie threw for 4,742 yards as a senior in 2004, the sixth-highest total in school history and one of the top-25 marks in NCAA history. Cumbie, who waited patiently as a former walk-on quarterback to finally lead the prolific Tech offense, twice led the Red Raiders to 70-point games that season en route to garnering honorable mention All-Big 12 accolades as well as Academic All-Big 12 first team honors.

■ Cumbie might be best remembered, however, for his 520 passing yards in Texas Tech's 2004 Holiday Bowl victory over (then) No. 4 California, capping off an 8-4 season. Cumbie was tabbed the Holiday Bowl MVP for his performance as he still owns the Holiday Bowl and the Tech bowl records for most passing yards.

EZUKANMA, THOMPSON HIGHLIGHT LIST OF RETURNERS

■ New offensive coordinator **Sonny Cumbie** will benefit from the return of both Texas Tech's leading rusher in **SaRodorick Thompson** and its leading receiver in **Erik Ezukanma**. Thompson paced the Red Raiders on the ground in 2020, totaling 610 rushing yards and eight touchdowns, while Ezukanma secured 46 catches for 748 yards and six touchdowns.

■ Thompson and Ezukanma also led the Red Raiders in both categories as freshmen in 2019, making them the first duo to lead the team in rushing and receiving in back-to-back seasons since the 2014-15 campaigns when **DeAndre Washington** and **Jakeem Grant** helped Tech rank among the nation's top offenses.

■ Additionally, this is the first time in school history where a pair of teammates have led the Red Raiders in both rushing and receiving yards during their freshman and sophomore seasons.

YARDS, TOUCHDOWNS STARTING TO RACK UP FOR THOMPSON

■ **SaRodorick Thompson** has established himself as Texas Tech's top running back the past two seasons as the junior has combined for 1,480 yards and 23 touchdowns on the ground to become the first Red Raider to lead the team in rushing back-to-back years since **DeAndre Washington** during the 2014-15 seasons.

■ Thompson is only the sixth Red Raider all-time to lead the team in rushing as both a freshman and sophomore, joining an elite list that includes two Doak Walker Award winners in **Byron "Bam" Morris** (1991-92) and **Byron Hanspard** (1994-95) as well as **James Gray** (1986-87), **Ricky Williams** (1997) and **Taurean Henderson** (2002-03).

IS THAT A BASKETBALL TEAM?

■ During a spring media availability, outside receivers coach **Joel Filani** was asked a surprising question: "Is there a certain height requirement to be a receiver now at Texas Tech?" While there is yet to be a set requirement, Texas Tech is beginning to resemble more of a basketball team at the receiver positions as eight Red Raider receivers or tight ends are listed at 6-3 or taller. The Red Raiders only boasted four receivers or tight ends at 6-3 or taller on its preseason depth chart in **Matt Wells'** first season in 2019.

■ Outside of transfer **Kaylon Geiger Sr.**, the Red Raiders boast a 6-3 or taller wideout at both outside receiver positions (X & Z) as well as at tight end, which features returning starter **Travis Koontz** (6-5) and a pair of talented true freshmen in **Mason Tharp** (6-9) and **Jed Castles** (6-7). The list of receivers includes **Erik Ezukanma** (6-3), **Trey Cleveland** (6-4), **J.J. Sparkman** (6-4), **Loic Founji** (6-4) and talented true freshman **Jerand Bradley** (6-5).





QB TYLER SHOUGH

SHOUGH NAMED QB1 FOR RED RAIDERS

- **Tyler Shough** was named Texas Tech's starting quarterback by head coach **Matt Wells** on Aug. 24, giving the Oregon transfer the reigns to the Red Raiders' high-octane offense. Shough, who transferred to Texas Tech this past spring, led Oregon to a 4-3 record and Pac-12 title a year ago after starting in all seven games for the Ducks.
- Shough is only the second Red Raider since 2000 to be named the starting quarterback out of preseason camp that did not begin his career at Texas Tech. **Nic Shimonek** garnered the starting nod for the Red Raiders in 2017 after originally beginning his collegiate career at Iowa before later transferring to Texas Tech.
- Shough made his debut as a Red Raider against Houston, completing 17-of-24 passes for 231 yards and a touchdown, while also rushing for one other score. The win improved Texas Tech to 16-2 since 2000 when its quarterback is making his first career start as a Red Raider.

WAITING THEIR TURN

- The journey to earning the starting nod didn't come without a few years of waiting for **Tyler Shough** at Oregon as he sat behind eventual first round selection **Jordan Herbert** for his first two seasons with the Ducks. Herbert, the NFL AP Rookie of the Year this past season with the Los Angeles Chargers, was Oregon's starter in each of Shough's first two seasons with the Ducks prior to him being named the starter prior to the 2020 campaign.
- Likewise, fellow Red Raider quarterback **Henry Colombi** had to wait his time at behind another 2020 NFL Draft first-round selection in former Utah State signal caller **Jordan Love**. Colombi was the primary backup to Love during his final season at Utah State before eventually transferring to Texas Tech in the weeks leading up to the 2020 campaign. Love, who jumped up NFL draft boards as a sophomore quarterback under **Matt Wells** in 2018, was chosen 26th overall by the Green Bay Packers.

DUAL THREAT

- Based on his career at Oregon, Red Raider fans might see more of a dual-threat quarterback in **Tyler Shough** as he was one of only seven signal callers in the country last season to throw for more than 200 yards and rush for at least 80 yards in two or more games. He was one of only three quarterbacks from a power-five conference to do so, joining Virginia's Brennan Armstrong and Virginia Tech's Hendon Hooker. Since the start of the 2000 season, Texas Tech has only had three quarterbacks - **Patrick Mahomes II**, **Jett Duffey** and **Seth Doege** - throw for at least 200 yards and rush for 80 more once in a game but never twice in a season yet alone a career.

"MOST-TALENTED QUARTERBACK ROOM IN MY TENURE"

- That's the quote **Matt Wells** used to describe his quarterback room throughout preseason camp as the third-year head coach felt the Red Raiders were four deep behind center with junior starter **Tyler Shough** followed by senior **Henry Colombi**, redshirt freshman **Donovan Smith** and true freshman **Behren Morton**.
- Colombi started four games for the Red Raiders a year ago, totaling 1,065 passing yards through the air and eight touchdowns, while also rushing 51 times for 103 yards and a touchdown. He transferred to Texas Tech in the weeks leading up to the 2020 season from Utah State where he played under Wells.
- **Sonny Cumbie** and Wells both feel the future is bright in the quarterback room thanks to a pair of freshmen in **Donovan Smith** and **Behren Morton**. Smith, the son of running backs coach **DeAndre Smith**, arrived at Texas Tech prior to the 2020 season out of nearby Frenship High School in the Lubbock area. He threw for more than 3,000 yards and 25 touchdowns as a senior after previously starring at Bishop Gorman High School in Las Vegas.
- Morton, meanwhile, is the highest-rated quarterback to ever sign with the Red Raiders after totaling more than 8,800 passing yards and 84 touchdowns in three seasons at Eastland High School. He was a consensus four-star prospect, ranking sixth nationally among pro-style quarterbacks. Morton grew up in Lubbock for part of his youth as his father was the head football coach at Monterey High School in Lubbock for 11 years.

PLENTY OF EXPERIENCE RETURNS ALONG OFFENSIVE LINE

■ **Steve Farmer** returns the bulk of his position room this season as the Red Raiders bring back four starters on the offensive line, including All-Big 12 second team selection **Dawson Deaton** at center. Texas Tech boasts 75 career starts as a Red Raider among its offensive line and 116 career starts when you factor in a pair of transfers such as **Josh Burger** and **T.J. Storment**.

■ Deaton, a two-year starter at center, ranks second on the team with 26 career starts, trailing only **DaMarcus Fields'** 39 career starts among returners with starts logged at Texas Tech. Deaton became the first Red Raider center to earn All-Big 12 first or second team accolades this past fall since **Dylan Gandy** was also a second-team honoree in 2004.

■ In addition to Deaton, the Red Raiders also benefit from the return of junior **Weston Wright** and senior **Josh Burger**, who both started in all 10 games last fall. Wright has now started in 20-consecutive games, while Burger has been the starter at right tackle in 37-straight games dating back to his time at Wofford. He transferred to Texas Tech prior to the 2020 season.

■ At the left tackle position, the Red Raiders return their top two starters from this past year as junior **Ethan Carde** earned seven starts, while sophomore **Caleb Rogers**, as only a true freshman at the time, made the start in the final three games. Both will likely shift to right tackle this season with the arrival of TCU transfer T.J. Storment.

■ Texas Tech's lone departure from the starting rotation was junior **Jack Anderson**, who was selected in the seventh round of the 2021 NFL Draft this past spring by the Buffalo Bills. He became the second Red Raider offensive lineman to join the NFL ranks in as many years after **Terence Steele** started in 14 games at right tackle this past season as an undrafted rookie for the Dallas Cowboys.

■ Anderson joined Deaton as an All-Big 12 selection this past fall as he was recognized on the first team by the conference coaches. It marked the first time since 1999 where Texas Tech has featured an All-Big 12 first and second team honoree along its offensive line as **Jonathan Gray** (first team) and **Curtis Lowery** (second team) were recognized that season.

POTENT NOTABLES (OFFENSE EDITION)

■ **Sonny Cumbie** will look to return the Red Raiders back to their offensive ways of the past as Texas Tech only averaged 29.1 points per game a year ago, breaking a streak of 20-consecutive seasons of averaging at least 30 points per game. That streak was previously the longest in the Big 12 Conference.

■ Texas Tech has averaged 6.5 penalties and 57.3 penalty yards per game under **Matt Wells**, which are the lowest two-year averages since the Red Raiders averaged 6.3 penalties and 54.5 penalty yards per game over the course of the 2001-02 seasons.

■ **Xavier White** emerged as another potential option behind SaRodorick Thompson last season as the former inside receiver rushed for 436 yards and two touchdowns in his first season in the Texas Tech backfield. White eclipsed the 100-yard mark twice last season, totaling 113 rushing yards at Kansas State and then a career-high 135 yards on the ground in the season finale against Kansas.

■ Senior running back **Chadarius Townsend** was tabbed to the annual Freaks List compiled by The Athletic and FOX Sports reporter Bruce Feldman this summer. Townsend, in his second year as a Red Raider after transferring from Alabama, currently benches 380 and power cleans 350, all while still managing to hit 22.5 MPH on Texas Tech's GPS tracker.

■ Texas Tech's young wide receiver core received plenty of experience last year as **Myles Price** ranked second on the team with 300 receiving yards, while **Trey Cleveland** and **Loic Fouonji** both hauled in touchdowns during Big 12 play. On the ground, meanwhile, **Tahj Brooks** received 69 carries on the ground, totaling 255 yards and four touchdowns, the bulk of which came in the back half of the season.

■ The Red Raiders have built their tight end position from the ground up as the entire room was recruited by Matt Wells and his staff. Texas Tech added two key additions at tight end this summer with the arrival of true freshmen **Mason Tharp**, standing at 6-9 in height, and **Jed Castles**, who is 6-7.

■ **McLane Mannix** has returned to health this offseason after being limited to only three games last season. Mannix previously caught 26 passes for 248 yards and three touchdowns as a junior in 2019, his first year back in West Texas after transferring from Nevada. Mannix was a Freshman All-American and an All-Mountain West selection in his two seasons at Nevada where he combined for 107 receptions for 1,653 yards and 13 touchdowns.

TEXAS TECH KNOWS OFFENSE

■ One thing is certain when watching Texas Tech - the Red Raiders are going to find their way onto the scoreboard. Tech is currently riding a consecutive-game scoring streak that spans 293 games dating back to the 1997 season. The streak, which began against Texas A&M on Oct. 25, 1997, ranks eighth nationally and is the third-longest active streak in the Big 12 behind TCU and Oklahoma.

■ The Red Raiders currently rank 11th in the FBS record book for consecutive scoring as Texas Tech trails Oklahoma by one game for 10th all-time and Boise State by eight games for ninth place. Both streaks from Oklahoma and Boise State are active. The next non-active streak is Air Force's streak of 306-consecutive games, which ranks eighth all-time.

DEFENSIVE NOTEBOOK

PATTERSON CONTINUES TO BUILD RED RAIDER DEFENSE

- The Red Raiders will look to build on the defensive improvements under third-year coordinator **Keith Patterson**, who returns eight starters on his side of the ball this season. Patterson's first year leading the defense was highlighted by an aggressive scheme that had Texas Tech force 19 turnovers while allowing 30.3 points per game, its lowest average since 2009. The Red Raiders have totaled 32 takeaways over Patterson's two-plus seasons.
- Patterson's defenses have long been known for their ability to create turnovers as Utah State led the nation with 32 takeaways in 2018 prior to his hire at Texas Tech. Patterson's unit has created 65 takeaways the past three-plus seasons alone, which is tied for seventh nationally among active defensive coordinators.
- Patterson has mentored three Red Raiders into NFL Draft selections during his short tenure as linebacker **Jordyn Brooks** was selected 27th overall by the Seattle Seahawks in 2019 followed by defensive lineman **Broderick Washington Jr.** in the fifth round with the Baltimore Ravens. Defensive back **Zech McPhearson** might have benefited the most from Patterson's guidance as he jumped up draft boards to be picked in the fourth round this past spring by the Philadelphia Eagles.
- Patterson pushed Brooks into one of the top linebackers in the country in 2019 as the now Seattle Seahawk garnered second team All-America honors by multiple publications. He later became the first Red Raider defensive player to be drafted in the first round of the NFL Draft since College Football Hall of Famer **Gabe Rivera** in 1983.
- Brooks joined a list of defensive standouts to record at least 100 tackles in a season under Patterson as he finished with 108 in 2019, including 20.0 that went for a loss, despite missing a considerable amount of playing time in November due to injury. Patterson has now mentored 10 players who have recorded 100 or more tackles in a season since he became the defensive coordinator at Tulsa in 2006.
- For McPhearson, he finished tied for eighth in the FBS with four interceptions en route to becoming just the second Red Raider cornerback to garner All-Big 12 first team honors. He later became the highest-drafted Red Raider defensive back since **Darcel McBath** was chosen in the second round of the 2009 draft.

PLENTY OF EXPERIENCE RETURNS ON DEFENSE

- **Keith Patterson** might have his most experienced defense of his tenure in 2021 as the third-year defensive coordinator brings back eight starters as well as the majority of his two-deep. Overall, Texas Tech's 2021 defense will feature eight players with 10 or more starts over their career and three players with at least 200 tackles for their career.
- Between returning linebackers **Colin Schooler** and **Riko Jeffers** and newcomer **Marquis Waters**, Patterson will have three players with plenty of experience as all three have recorded more than 200 tackles for their careers. In fact, Texas Tech is the only FBS program in the country with three players on its 2021 roster that currently boast 225 or more tackles.
- Texas Tech could potentially add to that total during the 2021 season as DaMarcus Fields has totaled 178 tackles over his four seasons as a Red Raider. He is one of 12 Super Seniors on this year's team.
- Waters will be a welcome addition to the Red Raider secondary as he arrives as a three-year starter from Duke where he made 234 tackles as a safety. He made 35 starts during his time as a Blue Devil, which coincided with the tenure of Texas Tech second-year associate head coach and secondary coach **Derek Jones**, who departed the Duke staff following the 2019 season. Waters will also rejoin with teammate **Jacob Morgenstern**, who transferred to Texas Tech from Duke prior to the 2020 campaign.

HOW 'BOUT SOME POINTS ON DEFENSE?

- Texas Tech made a knack for finding the end zone via its defense during the 2020 season as the Red Raiders ranked tied for seventh in the FBS and second in the Big 12 with three defensive touchdowns. It marked the most defensive touchdowns in a season by the Red Raiders since the 2017 campaign when Texas Tech had four over 13 games.
- **Matt Wells** has been no stranger in seeing his defense put up points over his career as his teams have created 25 defensive touchdowns during his eight-plus seasons as a collegiate head coach. The 2020 season marked the fifth time during his career where his team has recorded at least three defensive touchdowns in a year and the first time during his time at Texas Tech. Texas Tech recorded the 25th defensive touchdown of Wells' career against Houston with **Riko Jeffers'** pick-six midway through the third quarter.

STILL MORE FOOTBALL TO BE PLAYED

- It didn't take long for **Seth Collins** to decide he would return for a seventh season. The super senior made his decision before the Red Raiders played their final game of the 2020 season, simply stating he had plenty more football left in him. Collins, who was sidelined with an injury after the first four games, moved to the secondary following the opener against Houston Baptist, a position he will remain for his final year of eligibility. Collins approached **Matt Wells** and his staff about the position switch as he saw increased time in the secondary last season and was a standout on special teams, finishing tied for the team high with four tackles on kickoff coverage alone.
- It's the third position switch of Collins' career as he was previously a quarterback at Oregon State as a true freshman in 2015 before transitioning to wide receiver a year later. He transferred to Texas Tech prior to the 2018 campaign and remained a wide receiver.

BACK TO SCHOOL(ER)

Texas Tech will boast the nation's active leader in both tackles and tackles for loss entering the 2021 season as Colin Schooler returns for his final collegiate season. Schooler, who arrived at Tech as a graduate transfer in the weeks leading up to the 2020 season, has totaled 375 tackles over his career, which includes 51.0 that have gone for a loss. Schooler, a Freshman All-America honoree and the Pac-12 Freshman Defensive Player of the Year in 2017, will need 5.0 tackles for loss during the 2021 season to join the all-time leaders in FBS history.

MORE ON SCHOOLER

- **Colin Schooler** heads into this weekend needing 3.0 tackles for a loss to rank among the all-time greats in college football history. Schooler, who will be playing his fifth season overall and second as a Red Raider, currently trails Cincinnati's Antwan Peek (2000-02) and Michigan's Brandon Graham (2006-09) by that total for 24th all-time in FBS history. Schooler totaled 5.0 tackles for a loss over nine games in 2020 in his debut as a Red Raider and has 2.0 already this season.
- Schooler hails from a football family as his father, Tom, played at Eastern Michigan, while his older brother, Brendan, played at Oregon before transferring to Texas. His mother, Christine, was also a collegiate athlete as part of the Cal State Los Angeles volleyball program.

FIELDS TO THE PROS

- Not many defensive backs in the Big 12 yet alone the country have likely seen as much playing time as **DaMarcus Fields** the past four seasons. Fields, entering his sixth and final season as a Red Raider, leads the team with 39 career starts at Texas Tech from his spot at cornerback where he has recorded 178 tackles, four interceptions and 39 passes defended over his career.
- Fields led the Big 12 and ranked fourth in the FBS last season after defending 1.4 passes per game. He is third among returning FBS players in the category, trailing only the averages of Maryland's Tarheeb Still and Michigan's Germon Green.
- For his career, Fields ranks third among active FBS players with his 41 passes defended, which trails only the 49 of Devin Taylor from Virginia Tech. His total ranks second among Red Raiders since 2000 in category, trailing only **Jamar Wall**, who recorded 43 from 2006-09. He passed **Justis Nelson** (2013-16) during the SFA game as he had 39 over his respective career.
- Fields became the first member of his family to receive a college degree this summer as he graduated in May as a public relations major. Fields, who was cited by **Matt Wells** as one of three Red Raiders who chose to return for a Super Senior season despite having an NFL Draft grade, said at the time he elected to come back for a final year in order to obtain that degree.

MERRIWEATHER ARRIVES AS ADVERTISED

- It didn't take long for **Krishon Merriweather** to emerge as one of Texas Tech's most steady forces in its linebacker core as the junior-college transfer led the team with 75 tackles a year ago and was second with 6.5 tackles for loss. He closed the season by matching his career-high with 12 tackles in the win over Kansas.
- Merriweather arrived at Texas Tech as one of the top junior-college prospects in the country as he earned NJCAA first team All-America honors in 2019 after leading the country with 153 tackles. He picked the Red Raiders over offers from the likes of Arkansas and Oklahoma State.

POTENT NOTABLES (DEFENSE EDITION)

- Keith Patterson, a strict believer in cross training his defense at different positions, rotated defensive lineman **Tony Bradford Jr.** and **Jaylon Hutchings** at nose guard this spring after the two combined for 51 tackles a year ago, including 9.0 that went for a loss and 2.0 sacks. The move was a switch for Bradford, who can still play the tackle position as part of Texas Tech's defensive front. The duo each recorded a sack each in the season opener against Houston with Hutchings adding another this past weekend against SFA.
- **Riko Jeffers** has 26.0 tackles for loss over his career as his 8.5 stops behind the line a year ago was one shy of his career high. Jeffers has 234 tackles for his career after totaling at least 55 tackles in each of the last three seasons, including two with 70 or more stops.
- The Red Raiders received a big pickup in the weeks leading up to the 2020 season in **Tyree Wilson**, who transferred to Texas Tech from Texas A&M. He has 3.0 sacks for his career over his time with the Aggies and the Red Raiders.
- **Jacob Morgenstern's** blocked punt against Texas last season likely didn't come to a surprise to many of his former teammates at Duke where he was presented the team's Bill Keziah Award in 2019 as the school's top special teams performer.



REWRITING THE RECORD BOOK

Austin McNamara has quickly become a fixture in the Texas Tech record book in only two seasons as the junior punter already owns two of the top five single-season averages in program history as well as the longest punt by any Big 12 player in league history. His success will make him a sure candidate for the Ray Guy Award throughout the 2021 season.

McNamara wrapped the 2020 season averaging an impressive 46.3 yards per punt, the second-highest clip in school history behind only the 46.8 average compiled by Mark Bounds in 1991. He previously averaged 45.0 yards per punt as a true freshman in 2020, which now ranks fifth in program history. He is the only Red Raider with two of the top-five punting averages currently in the school record book.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTEBOOK

MORE ON MCNAMARA...

- Austin McNamara set social media on fire midway through the 2020 season with his booming 87-yard punt against West Virginia, which marked the longest by an FBS kicker since 2017 and the longest in Texas Tech and Big 12 history. McNamara broke the Texas Tech single-game record for the longest punt that was previously set by R.W. Moyers in 1945 against West Texas State. Moyers launched an 85-yard punt in the win, which is the only other punt of 80 yards or longer in school history. He broke the previous Big 12 record of 85 yards that was set by Oklahoma's Tress Way in 2010 against Utah State.
- McNamara closed the 2020 season ranked fifth in the FBS for punting average and fourth among punters who played in at least five games. He was easily the Big 12 leader in punting as his average was five yards higher than any other specialist, earning him All-Big 12 first team honors for a second-consecutive season.
- McNamara became the first Red Raider since LeRaven Clark in 2014-15 to collect first team honors in consecutive seasons and the first Tech specialist to do so during the Big 12 era. He joins Clark (2014-15), Michael Crabtree (2007-08), Joel Filani (2005-06), Jarrett Hicks (2004-05), Kevin Curtis (1999-00) and Montae Reagor (1997-98) as the only other Red Raiders to garner All-Big 12 first team accolades twice in a career.

THE RIGHT GUARD

- Since becoming a collegiate head coach at Utah State in 2013, Matt Wells has prioritized special teams, so much so that every skill player on both sides of the ball is expected to contribute. If you're the top "bigger skill player" (i.e. linebackers, running backs and tight ends), you will find your way on punt coverage as the right guard. Krishon Merriweather will take over the position this season, continuing the tradition Wells has employed throughout his career.
- Merriweather was Texas Tech's leading tackler a year ago after totaling 75 stops in his debut as a Red Raider. Merriweather, who transferred to Tech from Garden City Community College, was third in the Big 12 for total tackles per game (7.5) en route to garnering All-Big 12 honorable mention accolades.
- Merriweather follows teammate Riko Jeffers, who served as the right guard for majority of the 2020 season. Jordyn Brooks earned the designation in 2019 before eventually garnering second team All-America honors and being selected in the first round of the NFL Draft that next spring by the Seattle Seahawks. Wells utilized other future NFL linebackers such as Bobby Wagner and Nick Vigil at the right guard on punt team during his six seasons at Utah State.

WELLS BRINGS AGGRESSIVE STYLE TO SPECIAL TEAMS

- Matt Wells has stated on multiple occasions during his tenure that the Red Raiders will be more than aggressive on special teams in order to try to win the game. The Red Raiders have done that and more the last two-plus seasons with seven blocked kicks, a recovered onside kick and two touchdowns on special teams during that span.
- Texas Tech's seven blocked kicks under Wells lead the Big 12 and currently rank tied for third in the FBS as the Red Raiders trail only Army and Houston's nine during that span. Tech got its hands on three kicks during Wells' debut season in 2019 before finishing tied for fourth in the FBS a year ago after knocking down four attempts. Below is a listing of the top teams in the FBS in blocked kicks since 2019.
- Texas Tech's four blocked kicks from a year ago marked the most since 2000 when the Red Raiders also knocked down four kicks.
- Texas Tech's seven blocked kicks in Matt Wells' tenure marks the most for the Red Raiders over a two-year period dating back to 2000. Tech previously totaled five blocked kicks over the first two years under Mike Leach (2000-01).

FINDING THE UPRIGHTS

- Texas Tech will have multiple options at place kicker this season with the return of senior Jonathan Garibay and junior Trey Wolff, who have remained in a position battle throughout preseason camp. Garibay was 5-for-8 on field-goal attempts with a long of 48 yards a year ago, while Wolff is 21-of-27 for his career, which includes an impressive 20-of-22 showing as a redshirt freshman in 2019.

FIGHT LIKE LUKE



Texas Tech will wear a special helmet sticker throughout the 2021 football season in honor of the late Luke Siegel, who passed away Aug. 19 at only 15 years of age. The son of former Texas Tech men's tennis coach Tim Siegel and his wife Jenny, Luke Siegel suffered a traumatic brain injury following a golf cart accident in July 2015. Not guaranteed to survive the original accident, Siegel continued to fight in the six years since, beating the odds one time after another in his recovery. His passing generated tributes from across the sports landscape, ranging from NFL MVP quarterbacks in Texas Tech's own Patrick Mahomes II and Drew Brees to former professional tennis players Andre Agassi and Andy Roddick as well as sportscaster Dick Vitale. Texas Tech Athletics has established the Luke Siegel Fund to honor his memory.

THE STATE OF TEXAS' TOP ATHLETICS DEPARTMENT

- With all the talk of conference realignment in the air, it's important to remember Texas Tech has led all schools in the state of Texas in the Capital One Cup men's standings in two of the last three complete athletic seasons after finishing third nationally in 2018-19 and then 14th for the 2017-18 athletic year. Below are several other facts regarding Texas Tech's success in competition.
- Since 2017, Texas Tech has had 15 of its 17 athletic programs compete in the NCAA postseason or a bowl game.
- Texas Tech has had six different programs finish among the top-10 teams nationally in their respective sport since 2014 alone.
- The Red Raiders have appeared in 38 bowl games in their history, which ranks tied for third among Big 12 programs and among the top-25 teams in college football history.
- Texas Tech claimed the 2019 Men's Outdoor Track and Field National Championship under head coach Wes Kittley.
- Texas Tech played in the 2019 NCAA Championship Game as well as in two-consecutive Elite Eights (2018-19). The Red Raiders are one of four men's basketball programs in the country with multiple Elite Eight appearances over the last three NCAA Tournaments.
- Texas Tech has advanced to the Men's College World Series four times in recent years (2014, 2016, 2018, 2019), which is tied for the most trips to the hallowed grounds in Omaha among teams nationally since 2014.
- Lady Raider Basketball remains one of the top programs in women's college basketball history as Texas Tech ranks 19th all-time among power-five programs with its 925 victories. Backed by the legendary Sheryl Swoopes, the Lady Raiders claimed the NCAA National Championship in 1993, the first team national championship in school history.
- Since joining the Big 12 as a charter member in 1996, Texas Tech has won 27 conference titles, with 11 of those coming in the past six years alone.
- In addition to its athletics success, Texas Tech has unveiled several new facilities in recent years with the opening of the \$48 million Sports Performance Center in 2017, the Cash Family Sports Nutrition Center in 2020 and the \$32.2 million Dustin R. Womble Basketball Center this past May.

THE NATION'S MOST DEDICATED FANS

- Texas Tech boasts one of the most rabid fan bases in all of college athletics as Red Raider fans have traditionally traveled in droves for bowl trips as well as to basketball games in locations like New York City, Anaheim (CA) and Minneapolis for the Final Four as well as to Omaha for the Men's College World Series.
- To date, Texas Tech has played in the highest-attended games for three bowl games, including two prominent ones in the state of Texas: the Goodyear Cotton Bowl (Dallas), the Academy Sports + Outdoors Texas Bowl (Houston) and the Holiday Bowl (San Diego).
- The Red Raiders had 88,175 fans on tap for the 2009 Cotton Bowl when the Red Raiders faced Ole Miss in the bowl's final game at historic Fair Park. It remains the highest-attended contest in the bowl's history even with the move to AT&T Stadium in Arlington, which can reach over 100,000 fans in capacity.
- Additionally, Texas Tech helped set the Texas Bowl attendance record in 2015 when the Red Raiders faced LSU in NRG Stadium. The bowl drew 71,307 fans that night to see a pair of future NFL standouts in Texas Tech's Patrick Mahomes II and Jakeem Grant.
- At home, Texas Tech has sold out of season tickets for its baseball program over seven-consecutive seasons now and will likely be looking at another sellout in 2022 after the Red Raiders advanced to the NCAA Super Regional round this past June.
- Texas Tech has sold out of season tickets in each of its last two men's basketball seasons, giving the Red Raiders the premier home-court advantage in college basketball at 15,000-seat United Supermarkets Arena. The Red Raiders averaged a conference-leading 14,057 fans per game during the 2019-20 basketball season.
- On social media, Texas Tech student-athletes earned the highest engagement rate on their posts among peer power-five institutions over the past athletic year. Texas Tech's social media accounts accumulated over 35 million combined video views during the 2020-21 year alone.
- Texas Tech's brand has the ability to reach the nation through its creative social media usage. Texas Tech currently boasts the fifth-highest TikTok following by athletics accounts in the nation.
- Texas Tech is annually one of the top-performing schools among the Collegiate Licensing Company's (CLC) partner institutions, ranking 19th nationally in royalties generated this past year.

A PREMIER RESEARCH INSTITUTION

- Texas Tech University is the flagship institution, with a Moody Aa1 rating, of the five-member Texas Tech University System.
- Texas Tech is one of 16 universities designated as a Carnegie Very High Research Activity Institution and a Hispanic Serving Institution.
- Texas Tech has been named Higher Education Excellence in Diversity award winner in each of the last nine years. The university currently boasts 42 percent of its students identifying as racial-ethnic minorities.
- Texas Tech is a five-star Campus Pride Institution, one of two in Texas, and No. 25 on the Campus Pride Index.
- Texas Tech has awarded over \$170 million in scholarships recently with over 50 percent of students receiving scholarship support.
- Texas Tech boasted more than \$192 million in research expenditures in 2020 alone.



JONES AT&T STADIUM | HOME OF THE RED RAIDERS

STADIUM HISTORY

- Jones AT&T Stadium, home of Red Raider Football since Nov. 29, 1947, is arguably one of the most electric gameday atmospheres in all of college football. Armed with 60,000-plus rabid fans, Dave Curtis of The Sporting News proclaimed in May of 2010 that Jones AT&T Stadium was the "best home field advantage in all of college football."
- Since 2003, Texas Tech has invested \$150 million into the facility with four major renovations, making Jones AT&T Stadium one of the best on-campus football facilities in the country. The renovations have included a \$52 million West Stadium Building, the \$34 million East Stadium Building and the \$16 million north end zone renovation.
- The stadium was officially renamed from Jones Stadium to Jones SBC Stadium in 2000 following major corporate gifts (in excess of \$25 million) from SBC Communications (now AT&T). The stadium was renamed again in 2006 to Jones AT&T Stadium after SBC Communications formally changed its name to AT&T. The "Jones" in Jones Stadium comes from former Texas Tech president Clifford B. Jones and his wife Aubrey. The stadium was named in their honor upon its opening in 1947.
- In addition to consistent renovations to Jones AT&T Stadium, Texas Tech unveiled the \$48 million Sports Performance Center in 2017. The facility includes the Petersen Family Indoor Football Practice Facility, an indoor track and field competition complex with seating for 1,500 fans, a strength and conditioning area, the Becky and Kelly Joy Nutrition Center and the PlainsCapital Bank Sports Medicine Center. The

PROTECTING JONES AT&T STADIUM

- Since his arrival at Texas Tech, **Matt Wells** has stressed the importance in playing well inside Jones AT&T Stadium. In his words, teams that defend their home field elevate their season from "good" to "great," a key message early in his tenure for a Red Raider program that is 7-5 at home in two seasons thus far under Wells.
- The Red Raiders finished 3-3 overall at home in their first season under **Matt Wells**, who scored his first top-25 victory as Texas Tech's head coach with a win over Oklahoma State. Tech followed with a 4-2 record in the COVID-19 shortened 2020 season, marking the first time the Red Raiders had finished over .500 at home since 2015.
- During his six seasons at Utah State, Wells compiled a 27-7 record at home, an impressive .794 winning percentage. Wells led the Aggies to a .500 or better record at home in each of his six seasons and twice finished with a perfect 6-0 mark.
- Texas Tech is looking to get back to its winning ways as the Red Raiders were 69-18 at home over the course of the first 14 years (1996-2009) in the Big 12 Conference (a .793 winning percentage). Tech boasted a .500 or better record at home in each of those seasons en route to playing in 12 bowl games with the two lone exceptions being a result of a self-imposed postseason ban in 1997 and the retirement of **Spike Dykes** in 1999. Tech was 29-4 during the final five years of that stretch, including a pair of perfect 7-0 years (2005, 2008).
- Outside of the 2020 season where attendance was restricted to only 25 percent, Texas Tech has averaged more than 55,000 in every season with a record mark of 58,934 fans during the 2014 campaign.

HEAD COACH MATT WELLS

Matt Wells, a two-time conference Coach of the Year recipient, enters his third season at Texas Tech as he was named the 16th head football coach in school history on Nov. 29, 2018. The 2021 season will be Wells' ninth season as a collegiate head coach as he has compiled a 54-48 overall record following six seasons at his alma mater, Utah State, and two years leading the Red Raiders. He led the Aggies to five bowl appearances during his tenure, a feat he will look to accomplish frequently as he continues to build the Texas Tech program.

Through his first two seasons in Lubbock, Wells has set the groundwork for future success at Texas Tech behind a commitment to creating a true developmental program with the Red Raiders. That effort has already paid off as Tech has landed seven All-Big 12 first team selections during that time, its most in a two-year span since the 2004-05 seasons.

In only their first season, Wells and his staff helped Jordyn Brooks and Douglas Coleman III produce their best seasons as Red Raiders, ultimately leading to All-Big 12 first team accolades. Both were strong candidates for national awards as well with Coleman a semifinalist for the Jim Thorpe Award and Brooks a finalist for the Butkus Award. They were joined on the All-Big 12 first team by punter Austin McNamara, who led all FBS freshmen after averaging 45.0 yards per punt during the 2019 season.

Brooks is one of four Red Raiders to hear his name called during the NFL Draft under Wells as Broderick Washington Jr. was picked in the fifth round by the Baltimore Ravens in 2020, while McPhearson was selected in the third round of the 2021 draft by the Philadelphia Eagles followed by Anderson in the seventh round to the Buffalo Bills. For Wells, he became the first head coach to deliver multiple NFL Draft picks in each of his first two seasons since Jerry Moore during the 1982-83 drafts. It also marked the first time since the 2004-05 seasons where Tech boasted multiple NFL Draft selections in back-to-back years.

Wells was tabbed the head coach for his alma mater on Dec. 20, 2012, following two seasons as an assistant coach on staff. Utah State experienced its best stretch in history during Wells' tenure as the Aggies won 44 games and played in five bowl games under his guidance, quite the feat for a program that had only eight postseason trips to its record prior to his promotion.

Wells, the fourth-longest tenured coach in program history, departed Utah State as the only coach to lead the Aggies to at least three bowl games as well as multiple bowl victories. In fact, Wells was a player (1993), a coordinator (2012) or the head coach (2013-14) for four of Utah State's five bowl wins in its history with the lone exception coming at the 2018 Gildan New Mexico Bowl after he had already accepting the job at Texas Tech. Wells, a quarterback for the Aggies from 1994-96, was a member of two conference championship teams as a student-athlete, which came as a redshirt freshman in 1993 and as a senior in 1996 when Utah State was a member of the Big West.

In only their short time at Texas Tech, the Wells family has contributed significantly to the Lubbock community through local non-profit organizations such as Voice for Hope, Women's Protective Services and CASA of the South Plains through his Women's Football Clinic as well as the South Plains COVID-19 Relief Fund.

A DEVELOPMENTAL PROGRAM

Since taking the reigns as Texas Tech's head coach, Matt Wells has stressed the importance in turning the Red Raiders into a "developmental program." Over his career, Wells and his staff have done just that with eight former players moving on to the NFL, including a pair of first-round draft picks last year in Jordyn Brooks and Jordan Love. Below is a look at several notable players under Wells who have moved on to the next level.



JORDYN BROOKS | LB

Brooks put together his best season of his career under Wells en route to being selected 27th overall by the Seattle Seahawks in 2020 NFL Draft. He became the first Red Raider defensive player to be chosen in the first round since Ring of Honor member Gabe Rivera in 1983.



ZECH MCPHEARSON | DB

McPhearson developed into a top NFL prospect after transferring to Texas Tech prior to Wells' first season in 2019. He earned All-Big 12 first team honors as a senior before being selected in the fourth round of the 2021 NFL Draft by the Philadelphia Eagles.



JORDAN LOVE | QB

Love set numerous school records on his way to establishing himself among the nation's top quarterback prospects under Wells and David Yost at Utah State in 2018. He was later selected 26th overall by the Green Bay Packers in the 2020 NFL Draft.



NICK VIGIL | LB

Vigil, a two-time first team All-Mountain West selection under Wells, heard his name called one pick before Fackrell in the third round of the 2016 NFL Draft. He played his first four NFL seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals before signing with the LA Chargers this offseason.

Coaching History: Cumbie returns for his second stint on the Texas Tech staff following seven seasons at Big 12 counterpart TCU. Cumbie returns to West Texas where he threw for 4,742 yards as a senior in 2004, the sixth-highest total in school history and one of the top-25 marks in NCAA history.

He previously worked alongside head coach Matt Wells and defensive coordinator Keith Patterson at Tulsa in 2006.

Career Breakdown: Cosgrove, who arrived at Texas Tech after spending the 2019 campaign as the lead defensive analyst on LSU's national championship team, enters his second season as the Red Raiders' linebackers coach. His illustrious career extends over 40 years, which includes 23 as a defensive coordinator. In that time, he has mentored 50-plus players who have gone on to NFL careers as well as 16 All-Americans, four NFL first-round draft picks, a No. 1 overall NFL Draft selection and a Jim Thorpe winner.



JOEL FILANI
Outside Receivers

Career Breakdown: Filani enters his third season as the outside receivers coach at Texas Tech, the same position he starred at for the Red Raiders during the mid-2000s. Filani joined Matt Wells' charter staff prior to the 2019 season, returning to his alma mater where he was a two-time All-Big 12 first team selection. He remains one of the top wide receivers in school history, amassing 2,667 receiving yards and 23 touchdowns from 2003-06. Filani arrived in Lubbock after a three-year stint at North Texas.



DEANDRE SMITH

Career Breakdown: Now in year No. 3 with the Red Raiders, Smith reunited with head coach Matt Wells for the third time in his career. Smith served as Utah State's running backs coach in 2018 and the two were also assistant coaches together at New Mexico in 2008. Over his two decades of coaching, Smith has mentored four All-Americans and has had 10 running backs rush for at least 1,000 yards, namely Mikel LeShoure at Illinois and Michael Turner and Garrett Wolfe at Northern Illinois.

Career Breakdown: Patterson enters his third season as Texas Tech's defensive coordinator and his fourth-straight year working alongside Matt Wells after previously serving in a similar role at Utah State. The two were also on staff together at Tulsa from 2003-06. Over his last three seasons at both Texas Tech and Utah State, Patterson's units have created 61 takeaways, which ranks tied for eighth among active defensive coordinators during that stretch and leads all those in the Big 12 Conference.

Career Breakdown: Tommerdahl, in year No. 3 at Tech, shifts his focus to the Red Raiders' special teams' units after overseeing the offensive line in his first seasons on Matt Wells' staff. Tommerdahl, who arrived in Lubbock after spending the 2018 season at Purdue, brings an extensive background at the collegiate level with more than 30 years of experience, including 25 as a special teams coordinator, which includes a stint as Matt Wells' STC at Utah State in 2017.

Career Breakdown: Farmer enters his third season as the offensive line coach at Texas Tech, bringing 22 years of coaching experience at the collegiate level. Over his two seasons, Farmers has mentored one of college football's top offensive lines as the Red Raiders have allowed only 34 sacks during that span despite attempting 929 passes. Farmer followed head coach Matt Wells to Lubbock shortly after his hire at Texas Tech as he was previously in a similar capacity at Utah State.

Randolph arrived in Lubbock following three seasons in a similar role at the University of Memphis where the Tigers notched 26 wins and played in three bowl games during his tenure.

RED RAIDERS IN THE NFL



SPORTS LARGEST CONTRACT

- There isn't a bigger star in the NFL currently than Texas Tech's own **Patrick Mahomes II**. The one-time Red Raider gunslinger has transformed the NFL in only four professional seasons, claiming NFL MVP honors in 2018 before leading the Kansas City Chiefs to back-to-back Super Bowl appearances, including a win in 2020.
- With his Super Bowl win over the San Francisco 49ers, Mahomes became the youngest player in history to be named NFL MVP and also win a Super Bowl. Mahomes, who at only 24 years of age, was tabbed Super Bowl MVP after leading the Chiefs to only their second Super Bowl title in history and their first since 1970.
- In July 2020, Mahomes signed the richest contract in NFL history as he and the Chiefs agreed on a 10-year extension worth up to \$503 million. It marked the second time in school history where a Red Raider has signed the richest NFL contract as Ring of Honor member **Donny Anderson** previously did so with the Green Bay Packers upon being drafted in 1965.
- Dating back to his time as a Red Raider, the 2016 Sammy Baugh Trophy winner is the only quarterback in history to throw for 5,000 yards at both the collegiate and NFL levels.

WE, US, OUR: RED RAIDERS IN COMMUNITY

TEXAS TECH AMONG NATION'S MOST ACTIVE TEAMS IN COMMUNITY

- Since his hire at Texas Tech, **Matt Wells** has stressed the Red Raiders will be heavily involved in the community. That initiative was so important, in fact, that one of his first hires was a former teammate of his in **Troy Kema** as the football program's Associate Athletics Director for player development and student-athlete services to work closely on integrating the Red Raiders with the Lubbock community.
- Texas Tech continues to be recognized at the national level as the Red Raider football programs recently learned it ranked second this past year in community-service hours among FBS schools that utilize the Helper Helper app. The Red Raiders completed more than 1,200 hours of community service this past year, which ranked only behind Boston College among FBS football programs. Texas Tech was No. 10 in community service hours served a year ago, a steady increase of 350 hours that saw the Red Raiders volunteer for 39 different opportunities with 19 organizations.
- Even with the COVID-19 pandemic, the Red Raiders took precautions to make sure their community was served as Texas Tech continued its tradition of volunteering for a service project on the Friday before every home game. The Special Spectator program, meanwhile, moved to a virtual format, which allowed the Red Raiders to still reward a local student who has experienced a tragic life event, normally of a physical nature.
- The Special Spectator program is a cornerstone of Texas Tech's community outreach as it provides a two-day experience, in normal years, at a football practice, a tour of the Football Training Facility and Sports Performance Center as well as on-field recognition prior to the start of a selected home football game.

TEXAS TECH FOOTBALL HELPS ESTABLISH LOCAL SCHOLARSHIP

- The Texas Tech football program, in conjunction with 100 Black Men of West Texas, established a community scholarship this summer that will benefit a local student each year that plans to attend Texas Tech University. The scholarship will cover all tuition and fees for one full year, providing a life-changing opportunity for a local student to attend the university. The scholarship recipient will be selected each year by a committee comprised of representatives from the 100 Black Men of West Texas organization as well as Red Raider football student-athletes. The inaugural winner of the scholarship will be announced later this summer.
- Texas Tech has partnered with the 100 Black Men of West Texas for several community projects as the organization has also hosted student-athletes for peace walks through East Lubbock as well as on campus this past summer. That partnership will only continue to grow as part of the scholarship endowment.

POLICE CHIEF, TONY BRADFORD JR.

- In the midst of a national conversation regarding social injustice in this country, Texas Tech has found a voice with a unique perspective - junior defensive lineman **Tony Bradford Jr.**, who desires to join law enforcement once his playing career is over. Bradford's goal is to one day rise to the role of police chief in a major city where he says he "can make real change."
- Bradford has received a crash course in his future profession over the last year as he has served as a security guard with the Texas Tech Police Department. Bradford chose to spend his 2020 Spring Break with TTPD in what was expected to be a one-week internship but was extended through June due to the COVID-19 pandemic that ultimately canceled spring practice. Bradford returned to TTPD this past spring and summer, occasionally even working other Texas Tech athletics events.
- In only two years on campus, Bradford has become a leader in the Red Raider locker room as he has helped organize peaceful walks on the Texas Tech campus and in East Lubbock. Based on his career ambitions, Bradford has also been a key voice for student-athletes over the past year when it pertains to conflicts with law enforcement. Texas Tech has hosted multiple visits from police administration from around the Lubbock area with Bradford playing a key voice in those discussions.
- Bradford's efforts have translated to his work in the community as well as he is the leader of the Red Raider football program in service hours. Bradford, who is typically the leader in organizing community events, has helped the Red Raiders commit to multiple projects such as building a home for Habitat for Humanity, organizing a voter-registration drive and park cleanup as well as numerous visits to local schools. Bradford, himself, has volunteered at the South Plains Food Bank, the local Boys and Girls Club and several children's homes during his two-plus seasons on campus. For his efforts, Bradford is a nominee for the AFCA Good Works Team and the Wuerffel Trophy, two of the top community service awards in college football.

IN THEIR WORDS

- Over the past 18 months, Texas Tech has published a series of first-person narratives from various Red Raiders that are appropriately named "In My Words." The range of stories ranged from **DaMarcus Fields** describing the feeling of being a first-generation college graduate to **Jaylon Hutchings** journey to recover from a knee injury that ended his senior year of high school before it even started.
- **Tony Bradford Jr.**, in the weeks that followed the killing of George Floyd, detailed how he wanted to join law enforcement once his football career was over. Bradford also described the weeks that followed the start of the COVID-19 pandemic as he remained in Lubbock to continue what was supposed to be a one-week internship with the Texas Tech Police Department.
