SETTING THE STAGE

PANTHERS TREK TO EL PASO FOR SHOWDOWN AT SUN BOWL

FIU heads to El Paso, Texas, on Saturday, Nov. 19 for its final road contest of the 2022 regular season against UTEP in a 4 p.m. ET kickoff from the Sun Bowl.

The game will be aired on ESPN+ with Erik Elken (pxp) and Jacob Boggs (analyst) on the call.

The game can also be heard on Miami's WQBA 1140 AM with the voice of the Panthers AJ Ricketts (pxp) and Corey Brooks (analyst) calling the action.

FIU will be looking for its fifth win of the 2022 campaign when it travels to El Paso on Saturday. The Panthers are two wins shy of being bowl eligible with two left to play. The final game of 2022 will see FIU host Middle Tennessee in Miami on Nov. 26.

Saturday's game will mark the first time UTEP and FIU have met since 2019 - which the Panthers won 32-17 in Miami. FIU defeated the Miners 35-21 on Oct. 8, 2016 in the most recent meeting in El Paso. The Panthers lead the all-time series 3-1 and have not lost to the Miners since 2013.

The Panthers (4-6, 2-4 C-USA) have dropped their last two games at North Texas and at home against Florida Atlantic after winning two straight over Charlotte and Louisiana Tech.

UTEP owns an identical 4-6 overall and 2-4 mark in C-USA games entering Saturday's clash with FIU. The Miners defeated New Mexico State, Boise State, Charlotte and Florida Atlantic, while dropping games against North Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Louisiana Tech, Middle Tennessee and Rice.

The Panthers will close out the 2022 regular season at home on Saturday, Nov. 26 vs. Middle Tennessee in a 6 p.m. ET kick-off from FIU Stadium in Miami.

The game will be aired on ESPN3.

SCOUTING UTEP

The Miners enter Saturday's meeting with FIU having dropped each of their last two games and three of the last four overall.

UTEP is 3-2 at the Sun Bowl this season with wins already secured over New Mexico State, Boise State and Florida Atlantic.

FIU and UTEP have faced five common opponents so far this season with both defeating Charlotte and New Mexico State.

FIU defeated Louisiana Tech and lost to Florida Atlantic, while the Miners lost to La Tech and defeated FAU.

Both teams dropped their contest against North Texas.

The Miners are averaging 22.2 points per game, while allowing 28.4 over their initial 10 contests.

UTEP boasts a rushing attack that is averaging 141.8 yards per game and is paced by the 1-2 punch of Deion Hankins (589 yards) and Ronald Awatt (571).

Through the air, UTEP is posting an average of 217.7 passing yards per contest - led by quarterback Gavin Hardison, who has completed 164-of-315 pass attempts for 2,044 yards and 11 touchdowns.

The Miners top receiver is Tyrin Smith, who has amassed 62 receptions for 882 yards and five touchdowns. He averages over 14 yards per catch.

UTEP leads Conference USA in time of possession with an average of 32:44 per contest.

Defensively, UTEP is allowing 154.1 rushing yards and 216.0 passing yards per game - and an average of 28.4 points.

LAST TIME VS. UTEP

Anthony Jones led the Panthers on offense with 163 yards total yards as FIU rolled past UTEP 32-17 in Miami on Oct. 19, 2019.

The game marked Jones' third-straight over the 100-yard mark.

On the defensive side, Tevin Jones got the start at middle linebacker and produced with a game-high nine tackles. Rishard Dames grabbed his third interception of the year and added two tackles in the game.

Kicker Jose Borregales was a perfect 3-for-3 on field goals in the first half as he connected from 32, 34, and a season-long 46 yards out, giving the Panthers an 18-7 lead before the break.

PANTHERS MOVING FAST

The FIU offense has moved quickly through the initial 10 games under offensive coordinator David Yost - averaging 2.50 plays per minute - which is the 22nd-most nationally, according to 247 Sports' analysis.

PANTHERS CONTINUE TO GRADE HIGH

Through 10 games, the following FIU players graded out high according to Pro Football Focus (PFF):

- Shaun Peterson was the third highest-graded pass line-backer in all of the FBS for week 11.
- D'Verick Daniel rated as the ninth highest-graded coverage safety for week 11.

TURNOVERS SLOW DOWN FIU IN SHULA BOWL

FIU committed four turnovers - three of which came in the opening 30 minutes - in its loss to Florida Atlantic on Nov. 12.

The four turnovers marked the most committed by the Panthers since losing four fumbles vs. Middle Tennessee on Oct. 26, 2019.

FIU is 4-1 this season when it commits one turnover or less and 0-5 when it has more than two turnovers.

REGGIE PETERSON STEPPING UP

Sophomore linebacker Reggie Peterson has racked up 17 tackles over the last two games - including a career-high 11 vs. Florida Atlantic on Nov. 12.

The Fort Pierce, Fla., native had recorded a total of five stops over the initial eight games and recorded five all of last season before his recent breakout.

2025. The final two games will take place at FAU (2026) and FIU (2027).

The rivalry, which dates back to the 2002 season, is known as 'The Shula Bowl'. The game's annual winner receives the Don Shula Award, which is named after former Miami Dolphins head coach Don Shula.

Shula, who led the Miami Dolphins for 26 seasons and is the NFL's all-time winningest coach with 347 career victories, was connected to both FIU's and FAU's first head coach.

Florida Atlantic's first head coach Howard Schnellenberger was an assistant of Shula in the 1970s, while FIU's initial head coach Don Strock, was a quarterback under Shula in the 1970s and 1980s.

'The Shula Bowl' pays homage to Shula, South Florida football and the ties and history of both FIU and Florida Atlantic universities.

NORTH TEXAS TAKEAWAYS

SECOND DOUBLE-DIGIT RALLY IS PROGRAM FIRST

The Panthers' 42-34 win in double overtime over Louisiana Tech on Oct. 28 marked FIU's second comeback from a double-digit deficit this season – the first time in program history the Panthers have rallied for multiple victories when trailing by 10 or more in the regular season.

The Panthers trailed the Bulldogs 17-7 in the second quarter before securing for the victory.

FIU also rallied from a 16-0 deficit in the 2022 season opener vs. Bryant - which marked the third-largest comeback in program history.

The Panthers won that contest 38-37 in overtime.

BACK-TO-BACK WINS FOR PANTHERS

With the win vs. Louisiana Tech on Oct. 28, FIU recorded back-to-back wins for the first time since the 2019 campaign, when it won three straight over UMass, Charlotte and UTEP.

The victory also snapped a nine-game skid at home vs. FBS foes – dating back to a 30-24 win over Miami (Fla.) on Nov. 23, 2019 (game was played at Marlins Park/now Loan Depot Park).

It also marked the Panthers' first home win against a Conference USA opponent since a 24-17 win vs. Old Dominion on Nov. 21, 2019.

JAMES GOES FOR 300 AGAIN

Sophomore quarterback Grayson James completed 31-of-48 passes for 321 yards and tossed three touchdown passes to three different receivers in FIU's win over Louisiana Tech on Oct. 28 - his second straight game with over 300 passing yards.

James completed six passes on the final drive in regulation, including three to sophomore tight end Rivaldo Fairweather for a total of 41 yards, to set up the critical field goal - as the Panthers covered 69 yards in just 1:45.

The Duncanville, Texas, native completed 70 percent of his pass attempts for a total of 627 yards and six TDs over the two games - both FIU victories.

SPECIAL TEAMS SURGE LEADS TO COMEBACK VS. LA TECH

FIU's special teams provided numerous big plays to spark the victory vs. Louisiana Tech on Oct. 28, including a recovered kickoff attempt, a blocked field goal and connecting on a game-tying 28-yard field goal to force overtime with 16 seconds left in regulation.

- Freshman Hezekiah Masses recovered a pooch kickoff attempt for the Panthers at the 7:17 mark of the second quarter at the LTU 29 to set up a Panthers' TD.
- FIU senior linebacker Alex Nobles blocked a 29-yard field goal attempt by LTU's Jacob Barnes on the final play of the first half.
- Sophomore kicker Chase Gabriel nailed a 45-yard field goal in the third quarter – his second-longest of the season and his third over 40 yards.

GAMES NOTES

- Gabriel also drilled a 28-yard field goal with 16 seconds remaining in regulation to deadlock the score at 27-27 and force overtime.

LOUISIANA TECH TAKEAWAYS

- FIU sophomore quarterback Grayson James threw for over 300 yards for the second consecutive game with 321 yards (31-of-48) and three touchdowns in the win over the Bulldogs.
- James completed six passes on the final drive in regulation, including three to sophomore tight end Rivaldo Fairweather for a total of 41 yards, to set up the critical field goal - as the Panthers covered 69 yards in just 1:45.
- Fairweather was clutch down the stretch as he finished with six catches for a team-high 89 yards – 84 of which came in the second half and overtime.
- Defensively, four players registered double-figure stops, including freshman Demetrius Hill and sophomore Gaethan Bernandel, who each posted 11. Hill also forced a pair of fumbles. Donovan Manuel and D’verick Daniel each tabbed 10 tackles.
- FIU is 2-0 in overtime this season and the win marked its first in the series with Louisiana Tech.

PANTHERS POST CONSECUTIVE ROAD WINS

FIU’s 34-15 win at Charlotte on Oct. 22 marked the first time that FIU has posted victories in consecutive road games since the 2018 season when it won road games at UTSA (45-7/Nov. 10) and Charlotte (42-35/Nov. 17).

MOST TURNOVERS SINCE 2014

The Panthers’ defense forced five turnovers (3 INT/2 FR) in their 34-15 win at Charlotte on Oct. 22.

The last time that FIU forced five or more turnovers was on Nov. 15, 2014 vs. Middle Tennessee (3 INT/2 FR).

CHAMBERS GOES FOR 100 AGAIN

Senior wide receiver Tyrese Chambers matched a career-high with 10 catches for a total of 143 yards in the Panthers’ 34-15 victory at Charlotte on Oct. 22.

The 10 receptions marked the second time he has snagged 10 balls this season - along with the game on Sept. 10 at Texas State.

OUT OF THE GATES FAST AT CHARLOTTE

The Panthers opened up a 27-0 lead after the opening 30 minutes at Charlotte on Oct. 22 as it scored a touchdown on each of its opening four possessions.

FIU last scored a touchdown on each of its opening four possessions on Oct. 10, 2015 vs. UTEP, when it scored a TD on each of its initial six possessions.

DEFENSE SETS TONE IN CHARLOTTE WIN

The Panthers’ defense limited the Charlotte offense to just 100 yards of offense in the first half as it shut out an opponent for the opening 30 minutes in its win over the 49ers on Oct. 22.

The last time FIU posted a shutout in the first half for the first time since blanking UMass in the opening 30 minutes on Oct. 5, 2019.

C-USA ROAD SKID SNAPPED

FIU’s 34-15 win at Charlotte on Oct. 22 marked its first conference road win since defeating Charlotte on Nov. 17, 2018 by a 42-35 margin – snapping a 10-game stretch.

C-USA STREAK SNAPPED

The Panthers’ 34-15 win at Charlotte on Oct. 22 also snapped a 14-game losing streak in Conference USA games for FIU – its first since defeating Old Dominion 24-17 (11/2/19).

LEX JOSEPH FLEXES FOR TWO TDS

Junior running back Lexington Joseph ran for a pair of TDs in the Panthers’ 34-15 win at Charlotte on Oct. 22 - the first time he has recorded multiple rushing scores in a contest.

The last time a FIU running back posted multiple scores in a contest was in the 2021 season opener vs. Long Island when former Panther and current member of the Indianapolis Colts, D’Vonte Price posted three.

JAMES SCORES 2 TDS, TOSSES FOR 300 YARDS

Sophomore Grayson James was responsible for a total of three touchdowns in FIU’s 34-15 win at Charlotte on Oct. 22 - running for a pair and throwing for another.

In addition, James completed 26-of-34 passes for 306 yards - the first 300-plus yard effort of his career.

His two rushing TDs were the most by a FIU signal caller

JAMES HONORED FOR THIRD TIME

FIU sophomore quarterback Grayson James was honored for the third time this season as a member of the honorable mention list for The Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award National Player of the Week.

The award recognizes the best college football player each week that played high school in the state of Texas.

James was honored after guiding the Panthers to a 34-15 win at Charlotte on Oct. 22.

The Duncansville, Texas native completed 26-of-34 passes for a career-best 306 yards and a touchdown - he also ran for a pair of scores and 53 yards.

James was also recognized following wins over Bryant (Sept. 1) and at New Mexico (Oct. 1).

MONTIEL NAMED TO RAY GUY WATCH LIST

Sophomore punter Daton Montiel has been selected to the watch list for the Ray Guy Award, which is presented annually to college football's most outstanding punter by the Augusta Sports Council.

Montiel currently ranks 51st national among NCAA FBS leaders with an average of 42.4 yards over 56 punts this season.

The Pompano Beach, Fla., native has boomed 12 kicks over 50 yards this season, including a 64-yarder and has placed a total of 17 punts inside the 20-yard line.

He has totaled 56 punts this season over the initial 10 games – totaling 2,376 yards and forcing 28 fair catches.

Montiel is the third player in FIU history to earn mention to the prestigious list – joining former Panthers Stone Wilson and Tommy Heatherly.

The award is named after punter Ray Guy, an All-American for Southern Mississippi and an All-Pro in the National Football League for the Oakland Raiders.

The Ray Guy Award winner is selected by a voting body of Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) sports information directors, national media and former Ray Guy Award winners.

YOUNG ROSTER

FIU features one of the nation's youngest and most inexperienced rosters - as they Panthers have a total of 48 new faces on the 2022 squad - including 24 true freshmen.

Only two players on FIU's current roster will exhaust their eligibility after the 2022 season (Kyan Brumfield and Dorian Hall).

SEASON-BEST OFFENSIVE OUTPUT VS UCONN

The Panthers posted a total of 409 yards of total offense in their 33-12 loss vs. Connecticut on Oct. 8 - which at the time was their highest single-game output this season.

The Panthers out-gained the Huskies 409-402 overall, while posting 256 passing and 153 rushing yards.

FIU was doomed by three first-half turnovers in the loss - a pair of interceptions and a lost fumble that led to 17 points for Connecticut.

The Panthers entered the Oct. 8 game vs. UConn having lost just four turnovers over their first four games - before committing three in the first 30 minutes vs. the Huskies.

JOSEPH FLEXES FIRST FIU 100-YARD EFFORT

Junior running back Lexington Joseph (Miami Central HS) posted 103 rushing yards in the Panthers' game against UConn on Oct. 8 - the first by an FIU player this season and the second of his career.

In addition, Joseph's 47-yard TD burst in the third quarter vs. the Huskies marked the Panthers longest rush from scrimmage in 2022.

Joseph just missed surpassing his career-high effort of 105 yards which he set at Southern Miss last season.

It only took four games for the new FIU coaching staff led by Mike MacIntyre to erase a pair of losing skids that the Panthers have been battling 2018 and 2019.

The Panthers' 21-7 victory over New Mexico State in Las Cruces marked FIU's first win over a FBS opponent since defeating Miami (Fla.) 30-24 on Nov. 23, 2019 - snapping a 19-game skid. The win also snapped a 16-game losing skid on the road for FIU - the Panthers last road win came on Nov. 17, 2018 at Charlotte by a 42-35 margin.

LEX GETS LOOSE FOR LONGEST PLAY OF 2022

Junior Lexington Joseph's 60-yard TD reception during the Oct. 1 win at New Mexico State marked FIU's longest offensive play of the season to date.

It also represented the longest catch of Joseph's career at FIU.

JALEN BRACEY HAULS IN FIRST TD CATCH

Junior wide receiver Jalen Bracey hauled in the first TD pass of his FIU career at the 9:38 mark of the second quarter of the Panthers' 21-7 victory at New Mexico State on Oct. 1.

Bracey joined the FIU program this offseason with two seasons of eligibility remaining after being a three-year starter for Mississippi Gulf Coast College, where he amassed 1,678 receiving yards and 15 touchdowns for the Bulldogs.

HUDSON HONORED

FIU junior right tackle Lyndell Hudson Jr. was named to the Pro Football Focus (PFF) Week 5 Team of the Week.

Hudson, was a critical part of an offensive line that allowed the Panthers to churn out a season-high 162 rushing yards in a 21-7 victory at New Mexico State on Oct. 1.

FIU DEFENSE STEPS UP IN WIN AT NM STATE

The FIU defense was a key factor in the Panthers securing a 21-7 road win at New Mexico State on Oct. 1 as it limited the Aggies to just 221 yards of total offense - the lowest by a FIU opponent since Oct. 5, 2019 when it limited UMass to 115 total yards - a span of 29 games.

The Panthers also posted a shutout over the final 30 minutes vs. New Mexico State - their first blanking of an opponent in a single half since shutting out Long Island in the second half of the 2021 season opener.

NMSU entered the game averaging 157 rushing yards per game. FIU limited them to 82 in the win.

QUICK HITS FROM NEW MEXICO STATE WIN

▶ FIU's 21-7 lead at the half marked the first time it has led at the break since Sept. 25, 2021 at Central Michigan (14-10) and its largest since it held a 34-0 edge entering halftime at UMass (Oct. 5, 2019).

▶ Sophomore punter Daton Montiel booted a career-long 64-yard punt that was downed at the NMSU one-yard line at the 10:05 mark of the third quarter.



GAMES NOTES

- ▶ After combining for 28 points in the first half, the teams played a scoreless final 30 minutes.
- ▶ Game was FIU's third consecutive road game after opening the season at home.

FIU played its Sept. 24 game at Western Kentucky without the services of two key defensive starters – Davon Strickland (DL) and Shaun Peterson (LB) – each were out with injuries.

10 GRABS FOR TYRESE IN SAN MARCOS

FIU senior wide receiver Tyrese Chambers snagged a then-career-high 10 catches for the Panthers at Texas State on Sept. 10 - eclipsing his previous best of eight which he set in Week 1 vs. Bryant.

Chambers was the first FIU player with 10 or more receptions in a single contest since Austin Maloney on Dec. 21, 2019 in the Camellia Bowl vs. Arkansas State - a span of 18 games.

3 PANTHERS POST DOUBLE-DIGIT STOPS

FIU junior linebacker Donovan Manuel posted a team-high 14 tackles for the Panthers at Texas State on Sept. 10.

Gaethan Bernadel (12) and Demetrius Hill (11) also registered double-figure stops to give FIU its first game with three players with 10 or more tackles since Oct. 30, 2021 at Marshall.

GRAYSON JAMES MAKES FIRST START

FIU sophomore quarterback Grayson James made his first start under center in the Panthers' road game at Texas State on Saturday, Sept. 10.

James finished the game 30-of-47 through the air for 196 yards. He threw a pair of interceptions in the 41-12 loss in San Marcos.

PANTHERS PERFECT IN RED ZONE

FIU was a perfect 5-for-5 in the red zone during its 38-37 win over Bryant in the season opener on Sept 1.

The Panthers scored four touchdowns and one field goal during their red zone visits.

FIU OPENS MIKE MACINTYRE ERA WITH OT WIN

The Panthers rallied by scoring 32 points in the fourth quarter and overtime to post a 38-37 victory over Bryant on Sept. 1.

Sophomore quarterback Grayson James tossed his fourth touchdown of the game in overtime and then connected with EJ Wilson Jr. on the ensuing two-point conversion attempt to cap a thrilling come-from-behind 38-37 overtime victory over the Bulldogs in Mike MacIntyre's first game as FIU head coach.

James, entered the game for the Panthers in the third quarter and directed each of the Panthers' final five scoring drive. He finished the contest 16-of-31 for 207 yards and a career-high four touchdown passes - all in the second half.

53-POINT FLURRY IN OPENER

FIU trailed Bryant 16-6 entering the fourth quarter of the season opener on Sept. 1 before coming from behind with a total of 32 points in the fourth quarter and overtime.

The game featured a total of 53 combined points scored during the fourth quarter and overtime – a total of seven touchdowns, six extra points, one two-point conversion and one field goal during the stretch.

JAMES COMES OFF BENCH VS BRYANT

Sophomore signal Grayson James came off the bench in the season opener following an injury to starter Gunnar Holmberg in the third quarter to lead the Panthers back from a 16-6 deficit to a 38-37 overtime victory

He completed 16-of-31 passes for 207 yards and four touchdowns, including a five-yard scoring connection with Tyrese Chambers in overtime and the ensuing two-point conversion to EJ Wilson via a three-yard pass.

James entered the contest with a total of 18 completions on 27 pass attempts for 162 yards and a touchdown in his career - all of which came in 2021.

GAMES NOTES

He became the first FIU quarterback to record four TD passes in a game since Max Bortenthaler notched four against Charlotte on Oct. 8, 2021.

COACH MAC ROLLS THE DICE IN DEBUT

FIU head coach Mike MacIntyre wasted no time showing the Panther fanbase that he isn't afraid to take a shot with the game on the line in the season opener on Sept. 1 vs. Bryant.

MacIntyre made the decision to go for a two-point conversion with the Panthers trailing by one after scoring on their possession in the opening overtime stanza.

The Panthers, who gave up a touchdown and extra point on the previous possession to the Bulldogs, scored on the conversion on a three-yard pass from Grayson James to running back EJ Wilson to secure the come-from-behind win in dramatic fashion.

BIGGEST COMEBACK FROM FIU SINCE...

FIU rallied from a 16-0 deficit in the season opener to post a 38-37 overtime win over Bryant.

The win marked the largest come-from-behind win (16-0 deficit) for the Panthers since defeating Old Dominion 28-20 on Sept. 8, 2018, after trailing 17-0.

DOUBLE TROUBLE FOR BRYANT

FIU wide receivers Tyrese Chambers and Kris Mitchell each registered a pair of touchdown catches in the Panthers 38-37 win over Bryant in the 2022 season opener on Sept. 1.

It marks the first time that a Panther has recorded two TD grabs in the same contest since Bryce Singleton snagged two vs. Old Dominion on Nov. 6, 2021.

Mitchell finished with career bests in receiving TDs (2) and yards (80).

CHAMBERS PICKS UP WHERE HE LEFT OFF

Senior wide receiver Tyrese Chambers snagged two touchdowns for the first time this season and has now recorded at least one TD in **10 of 21** games at FIU.

The Biletnikoff candidate has posted 75 yards or more in 10-of-21 career games.

MIKE MACINTYRE NAMED SIXTH HEAD COACH OF FIU FOOTBALL

Mike MacIntyre was officially announced as the sixth coach in the history of the FIU football program on Dec. 9, 2021.

The consensus 2016 national coach of the year, MacIntyre was born in the Magic City and resided in the area while his father was an assistant coach for the University of Miami.

"Throughout this process, Coach MacIntyre rose to the top," Carr said. "He has a passion for student-athletes and building genuine relationships with them. He's a builder, with proven success taking two struggling programs and elevating them to national relevance. He is a two-time national coach of the year. He's a brand builder who will promote FIU throughout the South Florida community and the state of Florida. We could not be

more excited to bring his energy and passion to campus."

2022 CAPTAINS ANNOUNCED

FIU named senior Tyrese Chambers (WR), senior Davon Strickland (DL), junior Lexington Joseph (RB) and junior Donovan Manual (LB) as captains for the 2022 season.

The Panthers return a total of nine starters from last season's squad - with an even split with a total of three returning each on offense, defense and special teams.

CHAMBERS LOOKING TO FOLLOW BREAKOUT 2021

FIU senior wide receiver Tyrese Chambers established himself as one of the top deep threats in college football during a record-breaking campaign last season.

He ranked second nationally with an average of 23.9 yards per reception in 2021, while posting the top single season receiving-yard performance in FIU annals (1,074 yards).

The Baltimore, Md., native also recorded the most touchdown catches in a season by a FIU player - with nine.

Chambers' 91-yard TD catch at Southern Mississippi on Nov. 27 marked FIU's longest play from scrimmage in program history. He recorded a total of 10 catches of at least 40 yards in 2021.

CHAMBERS NAMED TO BILETNIKOFF LIST

FIU senior wide receiver Tyrese Chambers was been selected as one of 43 student-athletes named to the 2022 Biletnikoff Preseason Watch List, which recognizes college football's most outstanding FBS receiver regardless of position.

The list was released on Thursday by The Tallahassee Quarterback Club (TQC) Foundation, Inc., the Florida-based creator and sponsor of the prestigious Biletnikoff Award on July 21.

Chambers is the third FIU player to be named to the watch list for the Biletnikoff Award, joining T.Y. Hilton (2011) and Chandler Williams (2006).

FAIRWEATHER TABBED TO MACKEY WATCH LIST

Sophomore tight end Rivaldo Fairweather was selected as one of the 54 players named to the 2022 John Mackey Award Preseason Watch List, which was released in late July.

The John Mackey Award is presented annually to the most outstanding collegiate tight end. The award recipient is selected from a vote of the John Mackey Award Selection Committee.

Fairweather hauled in a total of 16 catches for 247 yards and a score during the 2021 season. The athletic tight end averaged over 15 yards per reception and registered five catches of at least 20 yards.

During the 2020 campaign, Fairweather collected 10 receptions for 165 yards, including a career-long 67-yard catch that went for a touchdown.

Fairweather's selection marks the seventh time that a FIU player has been named to the Mackey Watch List, joining Sterling Palmer (2019), Jonnu Smith (2014/2015/2016), Ya'Keem Griner (2015) and Samuel Smith (2006).

ROSS FURNET AWARDED SCHOLARSHIP

FIU head coach Mike MacIntyre surprised the Panthers, in particular freshman wide receiver Ross Fournet, during the teams' workout on August 27 when he announced that the former walk-on would now be on full scholarship.

Coach MacIntyre simply stated "that winners rise to the top" and then announced to the squad that Fournet was now on full scholarship.

LOOK AT THE FIU COACHING STAFF

FIU head coach Mike MacIntyre brought in a decorated coaching staff to aid him in the direction of the Panther program, including offensive and defensive coordinators who both boast over two decades of college football coaching experience.

HEAD COACH MIKE MACINTYRE ON STAFF

"We've hired a dynamic and energetic coaching staff with years of experience under their belts. They all care deeply about the well-being and personal development of young men and are all extremely excited to be at FIU!"

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR – DAVID YOST

Leading Panthers' staff on the offensive side is David Yost, who brings with him over 25 years of collegiate coaching experience, including previous stints as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Texas Tech and Utah State.

Yost brings with him a reputation of being one of the top quarterback developers in college football.

Yost also served as the quarterbacks coach at Oregon, where he mentored 2020 NFL Draft first round selection Justin Herbert. He also coached 2020 NFL first round choice Jordan Love during his tenure at Utah State.

In 2018, Yost was a semifinalist for the Broyles Award, which is presented to the top assistant coach annually in college football.

In addition, Yost has served on the coaching staff at Missouri, where he coached standouts Blaine Gabbert, Chase Daniels and Brad Smith.

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR/LB – JOVAN DEWITT

Defensively, the Panthers will be guided by Jovan Dewitt, a 23-year veteran of collegiate coaching who was most recently the

special teams coordinator and outside linebackers coach at North Carolina under head coach Mack Brown.

Prior to his time in Chapel Hill, Dewitt held the title of special teams coordinator at Nebraska (2018-19) and was the associate head coach while also having special teams coordinator and linebacker coach on his list of responsibilities. His punt overage unit with the Huskers in 2019 seventh nationally while allowing only 2.3 yards per return.

During his time at UCF, Dewitt coached Butkus Award candidate Shaquem Griffin. He helped the Knights improve their scoring defense ranking by 65 spots, as UCF went from allowing 37.7 points per game in 2015 to 25.3 points per game in 2017 – when the Knights finished a perfect 13-0.

DeWitt has previously served as a defensive coordinator for nine seasons at FAU and Northern Michigan. Including a Florida Atlantic unit that ranked 11th nationally in total defense in 2013.

Dewitt has also excelled at player development, as he has coached an all-conference linebacker in four of the last five seasons and has tutored two conference defensive players of the year in the past 10 years, including one national defensive player of the year.

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH/SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR/OUTSIDE LB – RICKY BRUMFIELD

Ricky Brumfield will lead the Panthers' special teams units as the special teams coordinator, while also serving as assistant head coach and coaching FIU's outside linebackers.

Brumfield arrives in South Florida following a four-year stint as the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at the University of Virginia under head coach Bronco Mendenhall. He boasts over 22 years of collegiate coaching experience and has consistently overseen record-breaking performances at all levels of college football.

Brumfield has coached pupils that have been named semifinalists for coveted honors like the Lou Groza Award and the Ray Guy Award and his 2019 UVA squad broke the single-season record for both kick return yards (1,204) and kick return average (28.7).

Also, tutored Joe Reed at Virginia who won the Jet Award in 2019 as the nation's top kick returner. Last season Virginia finished seventh nationally in special teams efficiency.

Prior to his time in Charlottesville, Brumfield was the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at UTSA where he helped lead the Roadrunners to their first-ever bowl appearance in 2016. UTSA's special teams set several records that season including points (79) and punting average (42.0). Under Brumfield's watch UTSA was one of just three programs in 2017 to have both their punter and place kicker listed on both the Ray Guy and Lou Groza Award semifinalist lists.

Brumfield also spent two seasons at Western Kentucky where he aided the Hilltoppers to a pair of bowl wins and a Conference USA Championship as the special teams coordinator and cornerbacks coach.

Brumfield also had coaching stints at Nicholls State, Fairmont State and Union College.

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH/RUNNING BACKS – ERIC HICKSON

On the offensive side of the ball Eric Hickson has been named as the running backs and associate head coach after previously serving in the same role at the University of Miami for the previous three seasons.

Hickson is a native of Fort Lauderdale who graduated from Dillard High School before heading to Kansas State where he graduated as the leading rusher in program history with 2,537 yards and 26 touchdowns.

During his first season in Coral Gables, all three of the Hurricanes running backs posted career-high rushing totals, including DeeJay Dallas who averaged 6.0 yards per carry and was selected in the 2020 NFL Draft by the Seattle Seahawks.

Prior to his time at Miami, Hickson also had stints at Kansas State and Akron. He got his start in coaching in South Florida at Coral Springs Charter School (2003-06) and American Heritage (2007-11).

OFFENSIVE LINE/RUN GAME COORDINATOR – GREG AUSTIN

Greg Austin has been tabbed as the Panthers' run game coordinator and offensive line coach following previous stops at Nebraska, UCF, Oregon and the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles.

Austin helped Nebraska become the lone Power Five program to average at least 200 rushing yards in each of the past three seasons and a part of three conference championship teams and four squads that finished with a top-10 national ranking.

Consistency has been a trademark in eight seasons at the collegiate level as Austin's teams have finished in the top 25 nationally in total offense five times. Four times his teams have finished in the top 10 nationally in both scoring and total offense.

Austin was assistant offensive line coach for the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles for three seasons – including helping lead them to the 2013 NFC East title. The Eagles ranked among the NFL's top five teams in total offense in two of his three seasons in Philadelphia.

A proven developer of talent, he has coached eight all-conference offensive linemen the past four seasons at Nebraska and UCF, and with the Eagles, his offensive linemen combined for six Pro Bowl appearances in three seasons.

Enjoyed a stellar playing career at Nebraska who earned honorable mention All-Big 12 status in 2012. Austin competed in the Big 12 Championship Game during his career and was an Academic All-Big 12 honoree.

TIGHT ENDS – JOSHUA EARGLE

Joshua Eargle, a 15-year veteran of collegiate coaching has been slotted as the Panthers' tight end coach. Eargle arrives in Miami after serving as the tight end coach and recruiting coordinator at Kansas, where he developed the hybrid position for the Jayhawks.

Prior to Kansas, Eargle was the offensive coordinator at Austin Peay and his 2018 unit set program records for yards per game (419.0), points scored (340), touchdowns scored (47), points per game (30.9) yards per play (6.19) and yards per rush (5.39).



GAMES NOTES

Eargle played college football at Memphis and won the inaugural Top Tiger Award, presented to the player who battled back from adversity or overcame difficult circumstances to return to the field.

The Eargles founded the Ruler of Hope foundation, whose mission is to provide support and research to medically fragile children.

Eargle also had coaching stints at Southern Mississippi, LSU, Nicholls State, Oachita Baptist and Southeastern Oklahoma State.

WIDE RECEIVERS - JAY MACINTYRE

Jay MacIntyre joins the Panthers as wide receivers coach following a stint at UT Martin and a successful playing career at the University of Colorado.

MacIntyre spent the previous two seasons as the wide receivers coach and pass game coordinator at UT Martin, where he helped guide the top passing offensive in the Ohio Valley Conference. UT Martin led the OVC in passing offense (258.9 yards) while featuring a pair of All-OVC honorees at the wide receiver position.

MacIntyre played wide receiver at Colorado and finished career 26th all-time on CU's receptions list with 86 and 30th in receiving yards (1,035).

He won the Ceal Barry Leadership Award for "inspiring others through exemplary commitment, composure and integrity" and received the Iron Buffalo Award which "recognizes hard work, dedication, toughness and total lifting performance."

Before UT Martin, MacIntyre spent the 2019 campaign in a similar role at Southeastern (Fla.) University. While with the Fire, the passing game was dynamic in an offense which averaged 43.5 points per game.

The passing game averaged 304.5 yards per game while receivers averaged 15.5 yards per reception and tallied 28 touchdowns. In total, eight different receivers eclipsed 100 receiving yards on the season.

DEFENSIVE LINE – GEORGE FRAZIER

George Frazier has been slotted to supervise the Panthers' defensive line following a two-year stint in the same role at UT Martin.

Frazier helped a dynamic UT Martin defensive unit rank amongst Ohio Valley Conference leaders in third down conversion defense (29.3 percent, first), blocked kicks (6, first), scoring defense (22.0, second), red zone defense (72.7 percent, second), fourth down conversion defense (37.5 percent, third), first down defense (116, second), team tackles for loss (7.7, second), total defense (330.9 ypg, third) and rushing defense (128.9, third).

Prior to his role at UT Martin, Frazier held graduate assistant positions at both Memphis and Ole Miss. He was also defensive line coach at Monrovia High School (Calif.) in 2018.

Frazier enjoyed a stellar playing career at the University of Colorado where he was the Buffs' first two-way player since 1964.

The three-time captain at the University of Colorado, where he played DE and TE, played 506 total plays with 266 on offense,

147 on defense and 93 on special teams during senior year.

CORNERBACKS/RECRUITING COORDINATOR – COREY BELL

Miami native and former head coach at Miami's Edison High and Miami-Dade's American Senior High School Corey Bell has been tabbed as the Panthers' cornerbacks coach and recruiting coordinator.

Bell, with strong ties to the local area after 18 years on the South Florida high school coaching circuit, arrives at FIU after a pair of stints at three other Sunshine State programs.

Bell spent the last five seasons as the defensive backs coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Florida and prior was a member of the staffs at USF and Florida Atlantic.

He was the youngest high school football coach in the state of Florida when he was hired by Miami Edison in 1997 at age 25. Bell has coached a total of six players that have reached the NFL.

Bell has appeared in three bowl games as a coach and played college football at South Carolina where he was a two-year starter at cornerback.

As a prep coach, he guided Miami Edison to five consecutive state playoff appearances and three district titles after inheriting a program that was 0-10 the previous season prior to his arrival.

SAFTETIES – NATE TAYE

Handling the coaching of the back end of the defense will be Nate Taye, who previously was on the coaching staff at the University of Colorado for six seasons – with the last three coming as the director of quality control for the Buffs' defensive unit.

He also held the title of assistant director of quality control at CU before earning the promotion in 2016.

Prior to his stint in Boulder, Taye spent time on the staff at San Jose State University under current FIU head coach Mike MacIntyre.

NEW TAILGATING/GAMEDAY EXPERIENCE

FIU Athletics and director of athletics Scott Carr announced new tailgating policies and gameday plans for the 2022 football season, inviting fans to experience "A New Day in FIU Athletics", beginning in the 2022 football season.

"The experience our fans have on game day is very important to us as a university and an athletics department," Carr said. "We want to do everything that we can to make it possible for each and every person that steps foot on campus on a game day to have a great time. Tailgating and community with other Panthers are vital parts of the college football experience, so we have really made the ease of tailgating a large part of our focus."

Tailgating for college football games is a special time for fans, which is why FIU is expanding its tailgating footprint and making it an easier process for all fans to tailgate on campus in 2022. There will be multiple locations on campus where fans can simply show up and start tailgating. The idea is to create a tailgating environment where fans can expect to enjoy the day experiencing all the activities associated with football tailgating.

GAMES NOTES

TAILGATING LOCATIONS

The addition of Tamiami Hall on the campus of FIU, and the promenade and plaza that go along with it, have created one of the most beautiful tailgating landscapes in college football. Starting in 2022 the promenade will be the home for all student tailgating.

For the first time since 2014, Tamiami Park will be available for tailgating on game days in 2022. The Cuban Memorial Area of the park will be the location for five of the six home games, while an area southwest of the stadium will be the park tailgating for Oct. 8. The spacious Cuban Memorial area on the southeast side of the FIU Football Stadium is the perfect setting for large gatherings of fans to enjoy their pre-game activities before kickoff. Priority parking in this area will be available for Panther Club members at \$150 level and above. General single-game parking further back in the park will be available online prior to gameday or in-person game day for \$20 based on availability.

PANTHER WALK

When the Panthers arrive at the stadium, approximately two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff, fans are encouraged to leave their tailgate and welcome the team. For the 2022 season, the team will be dropped off on the east side of Tamiami Hall and walk through the promenade and into the stadium at Gate 6. The band will be playing, and the spirit team will be there cheering them on. The team will be excited, so make sure to be there to join in on the fun.

NEW FOR STUDENTS IN 2022

In addition to the brand-new promenade for tailgating, FIU students will rest easy knowing that as soon as they are ready to enter the stadium, they will walk through Gates 6, 6A, and 7, conveniently located near the promenade at the northeast corner of the FIU Football Stadium. From there, students can either take the first stairwell on the north concourse up to sideline seating or walk through the northeast tunnel towards end zone seating. Student seating will be available in sections 101, 102, 135, and 136 on the north sideline, as well as sections 105 through 108 in the east end zone.

GAME THEMES AND FIU FAN FITS

Each of the six home games in 2022 will feature its own theme and all fans will have the opportunity to show their Panther Pride by coordinating with each other to wear their best FIU Fan Fits to the game (your FIU Panthers t-shirt, jersey, tank, etc.).

Nov. 26 – The final game of the season will be themed for the seniors as the Senior Day ceremony will take place prior to the game, recognizing Panthers that will be playing in their last regular season game at the FIU Football Stadium. The Senior Stroll will take place on the field as final-year students are welcomed onto the field as the Panthers enter the stadium. Your FIU Fan Fit for this last game is Fans Choice. Wear blue, white or gold!

Mike MacIntyre was named head coach of the FIU football program on Dec. 9, 2021.

A Miami native, MacIntyre was born in the Magic City and resided in the area while his father was an assistant coach for the University of Miami.

“Throughout this process, Coach MacIntyre rose to the top,” Carr said. “He has a passion for student-athletes and building genuine relationships with them. He’s a builder, with proven success taking two struggling programs and elevating them to national relevance. He is a two-time national coach of the year. He’s a brand builder who will promote FIU throughout the South Florida community and the state of Florida. We could not be more excited to bring his energy and passion to campus.”

“It is exciting to have the opportunity to come back to Miami,” MacIntyre said. “Not only was I born here but the roots of my family’s love for football and mentoring young people started here with my Dad. There is so much talent and passion for football in our area. I can’t wait to get started building a strong foundation for our program. I believe that together we will create something special to rally around, inspiring Panther Pride in everyone associated with FIU and our community.”

MacIntyre is a 32-year veteran of collegiate coaching and has previously served as the head coach at the University of Colorado (2013-18) and San Jose State University (2010-12) – where he led both programs to nationally recognized turnarounds in wins during his tenure. MacIntyre also has experience

coaching in the NFL under legendary coach, Bill Parcells.

He was the consensus national coach of the year in 2016 after guiding Colorado to a 10-4 finish and the Pac-12 South Division Title. While with San Jose State, MacIntyre led the Spartans to the program’s first ranking in the final BCS standings (No. 24) following a 10-2 mark in 2012.

“Coach MacIntyre is high-energy, passionate about student-athlete success and happy to be back home in Miami,” FIU President Mark B. Rosenberg said.

MacIntyre arrives at FIU after holding the position of defensive coordinator at Memphis for each of the previous two seasons (2020-21).

The 2021 season saw MacIntyre’s defense lead the American Athletic Conference in defensive touchdowns and ranked 23rd nationally.

During the 2020 campaign under MacIntyre, the Tigers ranked 13th in the nation in turnovers gained (20), 17th in the country in interceptions (12) and 19th in red zone defense (.744).

Under his guidance, Memphis defensive lineman O’Bryan Goodson was named First-Team All-American Athletic Conference and defensive back Quindell Johnson earned second-team all-conference accolades. Defensive lineman Morris Joseph earned honorable-mention all-league.

MacIntyre spent the 2019 season as Ole Miss’ defensive coordinator and did a tremendous job in turning around the

defense in his lone campaign in Oxford, Miss. It was MacIntyre's second stint at Ole Miss, as he also coached there from 1999-02.

Ole Miss made impressive jumps in several defensive statistical categories. The Rebels held opponents to nearly 10 fewer points in 2019 than in 2018 and also held foes to nearly 100 fewer rushing yards per game over those same two seasons.

Ole Miss' total defense under MacIntyre jumped nearly 40 spots in the NCAA rankings. The Rebels limited opponents to just under 70 fewer total yards per game.

MacIntyre has made turnarounds a trademark of his career, which was evident in his six seasons as the head coach at Colorado. In 2013, he took over a Colorado team that was coming off a 1-11 season. Four years later he directed the Buffs to a 10-4 mark and their first appearance in the Pac-12 Championship Game.

In 2016, Colorado was tied with five other programs for the most improved overall nationally and the most improved all-time in Pac-12 league games. The Buffaloes became just the ninth team among Power-5 schools since 1972 to win 10 or more games after finishing the previous season with four or fewer wins.

For his efforts in 2016, MacIntyre earned consensus National Coach of the Year honors after leading the Buffaloes to their first 10-win season in 15 years.

In 2015, the Buffs defense improved by as many as 50 spots nationally in many major defensive areas. The biggest jump came in points allowed per game, slicing off 11.5 from the previous year, the fifth-best improvement in all of FBS.

The turnaround at Colorado came just a few years after MacIntyre similarly resuscitated a San Jose State team from a 1-12 record in 2010 to one that finished 10-2 in 2012 and was nationally ranked. MacIntyre garnered Grant Teaff National Coach of the Year recognition that season. His San Jose State teams won 12 of his final 14 games there.

In recording their first 10-win season since 1987, the Spartans did it with a defense that ranked among the national leaders



in numerous statistical categories. The opportunistic Spartans were the co-national leaders with 20 fumble recoveries and were tied for fourth in turnovers gained (33).

MacIntyre arrived at San Jose State after two years as the defensive coordinator at Duke, where he was reunited with David Cutcliffe, who was the Rebels' coach during MacIntyre's first stint in Oxford.

In his first season in Durham (2008), the Blue Devils allowed 67.4 fewer yards and 9.8 fewer points per game than the previous season. The AFCA named MacIntyre its 2009 FBS Assistant Coach of the Year as his defenses were among Duke's best statistically over a 20-year span.

Prior to returning to college ball, MacIntyre spent five seasons in the National Football League with the New York Jets (2007) and Dallas Cowboys (2003-06), where he coached defensive backs.

Working for legendary coach Bill Parcells, the Cowboys returned to the NFL playoffs in 2003 and again in 2006 after missing out on postseason competition during the 2000 through 2002 seasons.

MacIntyre served as Ole Miss' secondary coach during the 2001 and 2002 seasons after spending his first two years in Oxford as the wide receivers coach. The Rebels posted a 29-19 record in that time with bowl appearances in the 1999 and 2002 Independence Bowls and the 2000 Music City Bowl. The 2001 Rebels ranked fifth nationally in pass defense, allowing just 161.3 yards per game.

At Ole Miss, among his recruits were two high-profile student-athletes, quarterback Eli Manning and linebacker Patrick Willis. He has mentored many current and former NFL players, including recently retired former Dallas and Cincinnati safety Roy Williams, a five-time Pro Bowl player.

He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Georgia, working two years (1990-91) in that capacity. He then coached one year as the defensive coordinator at Davidson (1992), four years at UT Martin (1993-96) and an assistant coach two seasons at Temple (1997-98).

A 1989 Georgia Tech graduate, he lettered twice (1987-88) at free safety and punt returner for legendary head coach Bobby Ross. Prior to becoming a Yellow Jacket, MacIntyre played two seasons (1984-85) at Vanderbilt for his father, George, the head coach of the Commodores from 1979-85.

MacIntyre earned a bachelor's degree in business management from Georgia Tech and his master's in education with an emphasis on sports management from Georgia in 1991.

MacIntyre and his wife, Trisha, have three children: Jennifer, Jay and Jonston.
