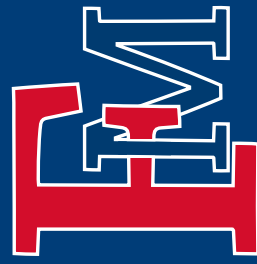

Other PBC members include Armstrong State University (Savannah, Ga.), Georgia Regents University Augusta (Augusta, Ga.), Clayton State University (Morrow, Ga.), Columbus State University (Columbus, Ga.), Flagler College (St. Augustine, Fla.), Georgia College (Milledgeville, Ga.), Georgia Southwestern State University (Americus, Ga.), Lander University (Greenwood, S.C.), University of Montevallo (Montevallo, Ala.), UNC Pembroke, University of North Georgia (Dahlonega, Ga.), USC Aiken, and Young Harris (Ga.) College. Headquartered in Augusta, Ga., the PBC has worked tirelessly to become one of the elite conferences in NCAA Division II, and is now entering its 24th season with 33 national championships and 28 national finalists. The 2014-15 Peach Belt women's basketball tournaments will begin with quarterfinal games at higher seeds on Feb. 28. The tournament semifinals and finals will be played March 7-8, 2015, at the site of the highest remaining East Division men's seed.

## New Spark for Patriot Women's Hoops

The 2014-15 Francis Marion University women's basketball team will commence its season on Friday (Nov. 14) at 7 p.m. against Erskine College in the Peach Belt Conference-Conference Carolinas Challenge in Tigerville, S.C. The two-day event is being hosted by North Greenville University and will be held in the Crusaders' 1,000-seat Hayes Gymnasium.

On Saturday, the Patriots will take on North Greenville at 5 p.m., while Erskine faces the University of North Georgia at 7 p.m.

This weekend will be the debut of first-year FMU head coach Jay Sparks, who brings his 367 career coaching wins to Florence after a highly successful career elsewhere in the Peach Belt Conference. Sparks started the hoops program at Columbus State University, compiled ten 20-win seasons, and earned PBC Coach of the Year recognition three times (1994, 1998, 2001), while coaching 21 All-Conference performers and two All-Americans in his two decades at the school.

Sparks had been the athletic director at CSU for the past six years after leaving the coaching bench in 2009 to move into athletic administration. A long-time nemesis of the Patriots, Sparks owned a 22-18 record coaching against the Patriots.

"I am excited about the history of this basketball program," said Sparks. "The goal of my staff and I is to bring the women's program back to where it has been in the past and follow the footsteps of the great coaches that have been here."

The Patriots welcome back two starters from last year's 13-13 crew in 5-6 junior guard Camille Dash (8.3 ppg, 4.2 rpg) and 5-8 senior point guard Cy'erra Mills (7.8 ppg, 3.7 rpg), on whom Sparks has placed high expectations.

"Cy'erra is our team captain. The girls respect her because she has a work ethic that is second to none. As we have evolved, she is commanding respect from her teammates."

Other key returnees for FMU include 5-11 sophomore forward De'Ana Turner and 5-11 junior forward Alaysia Watts. Sparks said, "De'Ana gives us stability at the small forward position. She's the most consistent post player that we have." Watts, who has been battling through a knee injury, presents another scoring option to FMU's post play as well as productivity on the

glass at both the offensive and defensive end.

Red-shirt 5-11 swing player Savannah Summers also returns after missing last season with an injury.

Francis Marion owned plus margins in both rebounding and turnover margin during the 2013-14 season, and the team surrendered only an average of 65.9 points per game – sixth-best in the PBC.



The Patriots welcome eight newcomers – including seven freshmen and one transfer – to this year's team. With only one senior and two juniors, FMU will be fielding its youngest team in nearly a decade, and possibly the youngest in the Peach Belt and in NCAA Division II.

Sparks notes one newcomer – Barton College transfer Danielle Pray, a 5-4 guard from Fort Washington, Md. – as a key contributor to the club because of her playing experience.

"Danielle is one of those players who has the understanding of what she's getting into. We'll lean on her to give us big minutes because being in the know is a huge factor in having success."

The incoming freshmen include 5-10 guard Natalie Bruce from Townsville, Queensland, Australia, 5-9 forward Stephanie Brown from Philadelphia, Pa., 5-8 guard Briana Burgins from High Point, N.C., 5-10 guard Khayani Chandler from Raleigh, N.C., 5-7 guard Emily Green from Fredericksburg, Va., 5-4 guard Mariah Johnson from Statesville, N.C., and 6-0 forward Courtney Wood from Granite Falls, N.C. Johnson recently competed for the FMU women's cross country program.

Offensively, the Patriots will look to push the basketball in transition to get high-percentage looks at the basket. On the defensive end, FMU will employ a pressure-style attack and an onslaught Sparks considers "a unique defense that other teams might not face the rest of the year."

Francis Marion has an all-time mark of 28-13 in season openers. The Patriots lead the all-time series against Erskine 22-1, with the lone Flying Fleet victory coming in 1984. FMU and North Greenville have not met since the Crusaders moved from junior college to four-year status.

FMU's opening four games will be on the road prior to the Patriots' home opener against Shaw University on Saturday, Nov. 29, at 2 p.m. at the Smith University Center. This year's slate includes 13 home contests.

The Patriots will open Peach Belt play on Dec. 18 against the University of Montevallo.

In the team's 41-year history, FMU has totaled 803 all-time victories and twenty-two 20-win seasons – and stands eighth among all Division II programs in total wins. The Patriots advanced to the NCAA Division II Tournament in 2008, 2009, 2010, and 2011, but since then FMU has not posted a winning campaign. FMU is 67-5 in its last 72 games (covering 14 seasons) when scoring 85 points or more.

sion II national tournament.

His 20-year career record stands at 367-231, including an even more impressive .677 winning percentage over the final 16 seasons. Sparks compiled ten 20-win seasons and earned PBC Coach of the Year recognition three times (1994, 1998, 2001), while coaching 21 All-Conference performers and two All-Americans.

Sparks amassed a 22-18 record coaching against FMU.

In 1997, he assumed assistant athletic director responsibilities, and then became the athletic director in 2008. He left the coaching ranks in 2009 to concentrate fully on his duties as athletic director. At CSU, he oversaw the addition of five sports, and the institution served as host for the 2011 NCAA Rifle Championships.

Before starting the program at Columbus State, Sparks also recorded a 63-39 record coaching high school girls' basketball.

A native of Columbus, Sparks earned his undergraduate degree from the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, where he played for four seasons on the baseball team. During his career, he earned Freshman Pitcher of the Year accolades, threw two no-hitters, was voted team captain twice, and received All-Tennessee Team honors as a senior.

Sparks has been married to his wife

Cindy for 33 years and they have two grown children: daughter Emily and her husband Justin, who reside in Birmingham, Ala., with Sparks' grandson Will; and son Bentley and his wife Mary, who reside in Columbus, Ga.

The Francis Marion program has an all-time record of 803-407 in 41 seasons and ranks eighth among all NCAA Division II institutions in total wins. The Patriots have captured two national championships, the 1982 AIAW Division II title and the 1986 NAIA title, and also advanced to the 1998 NCAA Division II Final Four. The program made five straight NCAA Division II Tournament appearances between 1997 and 2001, and four consecutive appearances between 2008 and 2011.

Francis Marion lost three seniors from this past season's 13-13 squad that failed to qualify for the PBC Tournament for the third consecutive year. The Patriots were 7-12 in Peach Belt Conference play, placing fifth in the East Division standings.

Jay Sparks begins his first season as head coach of the Francis Marion University women's basketball program. He was announced as the storied program's 12th head coach on April 4, 2014.

Sparks had been the athletic director at CSU for the past six years after leaving the coaching bench in 2009 to move into athletic administration.

Sparks began the Columbus State women's basketball program in 1989 and led the program to national notoriety. It only took him only five seasons to produce a 20-win squad, in 1993-94. His 2000-01 team went 31-1 and reached the NCAA Division II Final Four (for the second straight year). His program won the PBC regular season crown in 1998 and 2001, while sharing the title in 1995 and 2003. CSU won the PBC Tournament championship in 2000 and 2001, and six times the Lady Cougars earned invitations to the NCAA Divi-

### ***Trelanne Moore, 1st Year at FMU***

Trelanne Moore begins her first season as an assistant coach on the Francis Marion University women's basketball staff, where she will be reunited with coach Jay Sparks. Her primary responsibilities with the Patriots include recruiting, on-floor coaching, individual player workouts, pre- and post-season workouts, and helping in the area of academic support for team members.

Moore comes to FMU after five seasons at Chattahoochee Valley Community College in Phenix City, Alabama, including the past three as head coach. She recorded a 49-30 mark over the past three seasons, including a 21-7 record during the 2013-14 campaign. Her 2013-14 squad also registered a perfect 12-0 conference record.

Moore is a graduate of Southwest High School in Macon, Georgia. She attended Hiwassee (Junior) College in Madisonville, Tennessee, where she was named a Tennessee-Kentucky All-Star as a sophomore. She then moved on to Columbus State University, where she played for now FMU head coach Jay Sparks and earned Peach Belt Conference Presidential Honor Roll recognition. As a junior, she helped the Lady Cougars to a 28-4 record, a share of the PBC regular-season title, and an appearance in the second round of the NCAA Division II national tournament.

Moore earned a Bachelor's Degree in Health & Exercise Science from Columbus State in 2006. She returned to CSU in 2007 and served as Sparks' graduate assistant coach, and in 2008 received a Master's Degree in Public Administration-Health Services. She is member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated.

Moore played semi-professional basketball (ABA out of Birmingham, Ala. / WBCBL in Atlanta, Ga. 2008-2009 / WBCL in Columbus, Ga. 2011) as well as participating in a professional basketball overseas tour to North Africa in Rabat, Morocco, to the Middle East, and to Qatar in 2010.

After two seasons as an assistant on the CVCC bench, she took over the head coaching reigns and posted marks of 14-12 in 2011-12 and 14-11 in 2012-13 before the twenty-win season in 2013-14.

### ***Mike Hedrick, 1st Year at FMU***

Mike Hedrick begins his first season as an assistant coach on the Francis Marion University women's basketball staff. His primary responsibilities with the Patriots include recruiting, on-floor coaching, individual player workouts, pre- and post-season workouts, and helping in the area of academic support for team members.

Hedrick is a graduate of Lenoir-Rhyne University, where he earned a B.A. degree in health and physical education.

He served as the assistant girls' varsity coach at Hickory (N.C.) High School for the past four seasons. The Red Tornados posted a 112-9 mark in those four years, including two state championship game appearances, three Final Fours, and four conference titles. Hickory was 26-3 in 2013-14 and reached the sectional finals.

Hedrick is a past-president of the Carolina Express Basketball Organization, based in Hickory. He recorded 109 wins in three seasons as an AAU head coach under the same organization. He founded the Carolina Basketball Academy in 2012 to provide individual basketball instruction to players in the Hickory area. He also served as an assistant boys' varsity coach at St. Stephens Lutheran School in Hickory during the 2008-09 school year.

# FMU HALL OF FAME CAGER PEARL MOORE (1975-79)



Pearl Moore, women's basketball's all-time scoring leader, is a 1979 Francis Marion University graduate. Moore, a native of Florence and a graduate of Wilson High School, played for the Patriots between 1975 and 1979, and the four-time All-American scored 4,061 career points.

Moore started her collegiate career at Anderson Junior College in the fall of 1975. After one semester at Anderson (eight games and 177 points), she transferred to Francis Marion. Fortunately, the Patriots did not open their cage season until after the first of the year, and thus Moore played the entire 1975-76 Francis Marion schedule. At that time under Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (IAIW) rules, a player could transfer and be eligible immediately. The 5-7 guard-forward went on to score 3,884 points in a Patriot uniform. Her career point total includes the points scored at Anderson, because at that time in women's basketball, two- and four-year schools regularly competed against each other and all results counted.

During her junior year, she scored a then single-game record 60 points in a 114-71 victory over Eastern Washington State College in the 1978 IAIW Small College National Tournament (see lower left photo). In her final collegiate game, March 10, 1979, an IAIW Small College Regional Tournament consolation game against the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, she tallied 42 points to break the previous all-time record of 4,045 set by Travis Grant of Kentucky State University.

Moore averaged 30.6 points per game over her four seasons (127 games) at Francis Marion, and helped lead head coach Sylvia Rhyne Hatchell's program to an 85-42 record and three national tournament appearances. She scored below 20 points only 18 times in her Francis Marion career, and reached the 50-point mark on three occasions. She scored 1,109 points in her junior year alone. In addition to her point total, recorded in an era that did not have the three-point field goal, Moore grabbed 1,270 rebounds and shot 45.9 percent from the field and a then school-record 70.0 percent from the free-throw line.

Since that time, two male players (John Pierce and Philip Hutcheson, both of David Lipscomb University) have surpassed her total, but she still stands as the only female player to reach 4,000 career points. Miriam Walker-Samuels of Claflin College (SC) is second on the women's scoring list with 3,855 points.

Following her career at Francis Marion, Pearl went on to play two seasons in the Women's Pro Basketball League (1979-80 with the New York Stars and 1980-81 with the St. Louis Streak), earning All-Star status in 1981, and one season in Venezuela.

Moore was one of the first inductees into the FMU Athletic Hall of Fame in 1992. In 1994, she was nominated by the university for induction into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame, and her name remains in the nomination process. During the summer of 1996, several items from Pearl's playing days were sent to the Naismith Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., for inclusion in the Women's Basketball Exhibit Area. In 2000, she was inducted into the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame, and in 2008 became a member of the Florence Area Athletic Hall of Fame. In 2011, she was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in Knoxville, Tenn.

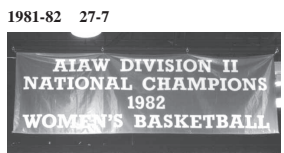

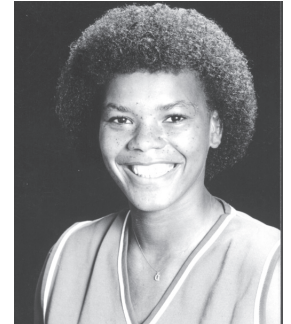

## WHERE THEY PLAY (SMITH UNIVERSITY CENTER)



### FMU'S SMITH UNIVERSITY CENTER

Named in honor of the university's first president, Dr. Walter D. Smith, the Smith University Center provides comprehensive facilities for student services and activities as well as for recreation and athletic programs to serve students, faculty, and staff. Opened in 1974, the center's gymnasium originally seated 3,027 for basketball, but with recent renovations that include new theatre-style seats, a new hardwood floor, new scoreboards, a new lighting and sound system, and a new paint job it now seats 2,547.

The Patriot Women have compiled a 422-130 (.764) mark in the Smith University Center, including a 184-62 run in the past 246 games. The FMU men's basketball team owns a 323-198 (.620) record in the building.

In addition to numerous sporting events, the building has hosted musical concerts, an appearance by Miss America 1994 Kimberly Aiken, U.S. Presidential candidates, and both college and high school commencement exercises. Francis Marion hosted the 1978 AIAW Division II National Women's Basketball Tournament, and in 1988, the U.S. Olympic Women's Basketball Team played an exhibition game against the Cuban National Team. In 1998, 1999, and 2008, FMU hosted the NCAA Division II women's basketball South Atlantic Regional Tournament.



# FRANCIS MARION UNIVERSITY CAMPUS

## Where the Swamp Fox Lives.....

Francis Marion University, founded in 1970, prides itself on providing a strong liberal arts education.

Named for Revolutionary War hero, General Francis Marion, who was nicknamed the “Swamp Fox” for using the South Carolina terrain to outfox the British, the University enrolls more than 4,000 students. The University offers a broad range of undergraduate degrees and a select number of graduate programs in serving the needs of communities, businesses and industries of the Pee Dee region. Francis Marion is the only state university serving the Pee Dee region, and many of its students are the first in their families to go to college.



The campus features modern classroom buildings, laboratories and residence facilities to provide a safe, comfortable learning environment for students. The campus also features a number of recreational facilities that are available for use by students, faculty, staff and alumni, and for use in intramural and intercollegiate athletic competition.

Most buildings have been constructed or renovated since 1970. Facilities are equipped with ramps, and those of more than one story are equipped with elevators. Though each building has its own unique design, all are planned for architectural harmony.

Lee Nursing Building (top left photo), Robert E. McNair Science Building, The Observatory, James A. Rogers Library, Thomas C. Stanton Academic Computer Center, The Grille (top right photo), and the BB&T/Amelia Wallace Faculty/Alumni Cottage.



On campus housing includes The Village, Residence Halls, Forest Villas Apartment Complex, Forest Villas Community Center, and the Allard A. Allston Housing Office Complex.

In addition to the Walter Douglas Smith University Center, which houses the gymnasium, raquetball courts, weightroom, fitness room, and an olympic-sized swimming pool, other on campus athletic facilities include John Kassab (tennis) Courts, a reslite eight-lane track, two natural grass intramural fields, an outdoor recreational pool, and the new state-of-the-art Griffin Athletic Complex, which opened in 2012. It includes Clifford S. Cornell (baseball) Field at Sparrow Stadium, the FMU Softball Stadium, Murray G. Hartzler (soccer) Field, and a fieldhouse.
