Preparing for the Challenge

The challenge facing the 1998-99 Francis Marion University women's basketball team is a many-faceted one - new coach, new success, youth, old tradition, and reputation. First-year head coach Lee Buchanan moves to FMU from Brescia College, where he won 230 games in 12 seasons and took the NAIA school to three national tournaments. Looking to build on FMU's storied history, he inherits eight letterwinners, including three starters, from last year's 30-3 Patriot squad. That team won both the Peach Belt Athletic Conference and NCAA Division II South Atlantic Region Tournaments, reached the Division II "Final Four," and was ranked fifth in the final 1997-98 USA Today/Women's Basketball Coaches Association Top 25 poll. Interestingly, the 12-player 1998-99 Patriot roster does not include any seniors.

Gone from last season is head coach Wes Moore, who took the Patriot program to a pair of national tournament appearances in three years, before taking the head coaching position at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga. The only two players not returning, both of whom were starters, are guard Jennifer Puckett, who finished her career as one of the top three-point shooters in FMU history, and forward Damita Bullock, who transferred to UTC after earning PBAC "Freshman of the Year" honors last season.

"We are preparing for the challenge of this season everyday," Buchanan said. "Much of the early pre-season has been a 'getting to know each other' period. I'm new to the players, as is my system, and the players and their abilities are new to me. I am sure that this process will continue into the early portion of the schedule."

Heading the list of returnees are junior preseason All-Americans Chiffonia Adderson and Jennifer Brabson. Adderson, a 6-0 forward-center, is a two-time All-Conference performer and was the most outstanding player of the regional tournament last year, and the PBAC "Freshman of the Year" in 1996-97. Brabson also earned All-Conference recognition each of her first two years, was the PBAC "Player of the Year" last season, and was named to the All-Tournament Team at the 1998 NCAA Division II Elite Eight Tournament in Pine Bluff, Ark. Both have already surpassed the 1,000-point mark for their careers, becoming only the fourth and fifth sophomores to accomplish that feat in the storied history of the Patriot women's basketball program.

During the 1997-98 season, Brabson averaged 17.0 ppg and 6.2 rpg, while Adderson contributed 16.3 ppg and 8.8 rpg. Adderson led the team in double-doubles (13), blocked shots (43), and field goal percentage (55.0%). Amazingly, Brabson has already made 453 trips to the free throw line in just her first two seasons (an average of 7.3 attempts per game), and made 72 percent of those attempts. "I will look for these two individuals to lead us both on and off the court," Buchanan said. "Their experience will be invaluable to our young squad."

The third returning starter is point guard Christy Wright, who as a freshman last year started all 33 contests, averaged 10.7 ppg, and compiled 44 more assists (156) than turnovers (112). She also tied for the team lead in steals (56) and shot 39.7 percent from behind the three-point arch.

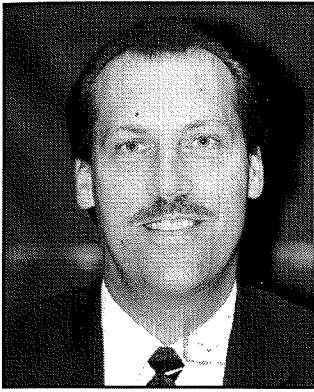
Other returning players include 5-11 sophomore forward-center Anna Kolbinsky (7.4 ppg, 5.0 rpg) and junior point guard Megan Duran (1.4 ppg, 1.9 apg), both of whom, according to Buchanan, worked extremely hard during the off-season to improve their overall game. Junior 5-11 forward Nikki Wolfe (2.5 ppg, 4.0 rpg) injured her knee during the preseason and her status for the upcoming campaign is questionable. Sophomore 5-10 forward Kristie Tecson (2.2 ppg) and 5-2 sophomore guard Tracy McIntosh (1.4 ppg) complete the list of returnees.

The first-year coach added, "In talking with the returning players, they really enjoyed the experience of advancing to the (NCAA Division II) Elite Eight and eventually the national semifinals this past season. But more than that, they used the trip as a measuring stick, and now know what it will take to win a national title."

Four freshmen newcomers join the Patriot squad: 5-9 guard-forward Leigh Ammons (Camden, S.C.), 5-9 forward Rachel Pack (Hinton, W.Va.), 5-11 frontline player Kendra Rowland (Sumter, S.C.), and 5-7 guard Christy Thomas (Maryville, Tenn.). All four averaged more than 15.0 ppg during their final high school season. Considering the talent of this recruiting class, Buchanan will look to these four to make immediate contributions.

Buchanan concluded by saying, "The bottom line is that we have good student-athletes that are hard workers. They are focused and determined to return to the Elite Eight and win a national championship."

Lee Buchanan, who has won over 200 games during his collegiate coaching career, enters his first year as head coach of the Francis Marion University women's basketball team. On June 4, 1998, he became the seventh head coach for the storied FMU women's cage program, succeeding Wes Moore, who resigned after three seasons at FMU to take the head coaching position at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga.

Buchanan, 37, comes to Francis Marion from Brescia College in Owensboro, Ky., where he served as the women's head coach for the past 12 years. During that time, he recorded a 230-118 mark, including eight 20-win seasons, and guided the Lady Bearcats to three NAIA Division II national tournament appearances. Last season, Brescia was 21-9 and Buchanan was named the Kentucky Intercol-

legiate Athletic Conference "Coach of the Year" as the Lady Bearcat program moved to NAIA Division I status. It marked the third consecutive year he had been named the KIAC "Coach of the Year."

Buchanan also served as Brescia's Athletic Director for Women's Sports for the past six years (1992-1998).

The Harrisburg, Ill., native was an assistant coach for the first Lady Bearcat basketball squad in 1985-86 and then took over the head coaching reigns the following year. After an 8-17 mark in 1986-87 and a 1-20 record in 1987-88, Buchanan guided Brescia to a 24-5 record in his third season and the program's first-ever national ranking. The program's most successful season came in 1996-97 when the 30-6 Lady Bearcats reached the Elite Eight of the NAIA Division II national tournament and were ranked fourth in the final national poll. In 1995, he was named the NAIA Mid-South Region "Coach of the Year" and in 1989 was selected as the District 32 "Coach of the Year."

Buchanan also started the Brescia women's slow-pitch softball program in 1990 and posted a 41-15 record in two seasons. Since 1987, he taught lifetime sports (classes) in the college's education department. He previously served as the school's sports information director for five years and director of intramural sports for five years.

Prior to joining the Brescia staff in 1985, he spent two years at McLean County High School in Calhoun, Ky. - one as a boys' assistant coach and one as an assistant for girls' team.

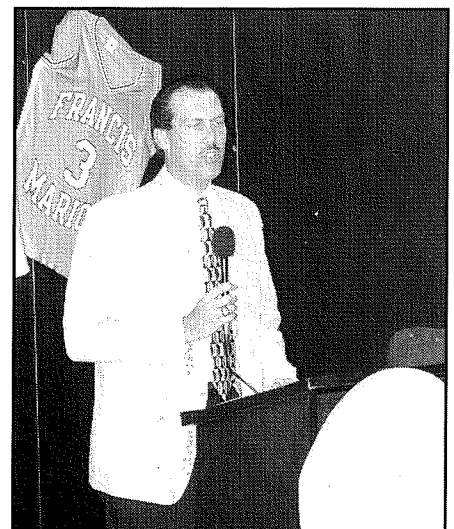

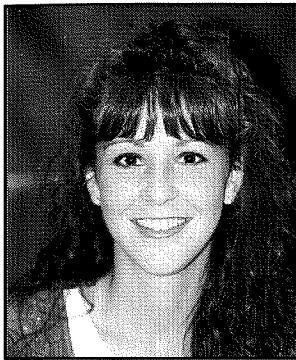

Mandy Decker begins her first year as assistant coach at FMU. A 1998 graduate of Brescia College, her primary responsibilities will be recruiting, on-floor coaching, individual player workouts, pre- and post-season workouts, and helping in the area of academic support of team members.

Decker played under the guidance of (current FMU head coach) Lee Buchanan for two seasons (1995-97) at Brescia. The Bedford, Ind., native then served as a volunteer assistant coach at Brescia during the 1997-98 season, during which the Lady Bearcats posted a 21-9 record. In the spring of 1998, Decker earned the Outstanding Student Teacher award at Brescia, while earning her degree in elementary education.

During her playing career, Brescia compiled a two-year mark of 57-10 and made two trips to the NAIA Division II national tournament, including an Elite Eight appearance in 1997. As a senior, she was the team captain and set single-season records for games played and started (36) and assists (142), while averaging 7.5 points per game. During her junior campaign, the point guard averaged 6.0 ppg and 2.2 assists per game. Prior to enrolling at Brescia, she attended Southeastern Illinois Junior College and played two seasons there.

Decker served as an AAU assistant coach during the summer of 1996 and has worked summer camps at Brescia, Liberty University, Southeastern Illinois, and her alma mater Bedford North Lawrence High School. She has also been a guest speaker and instructor at several schools over the past two-and-a-half years.

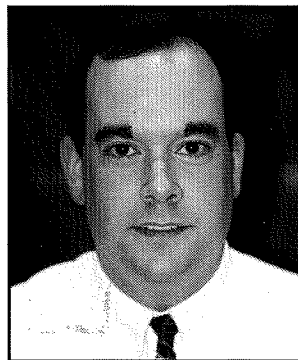

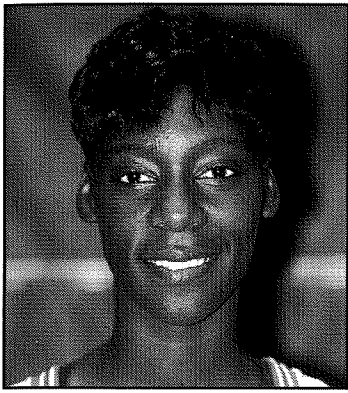

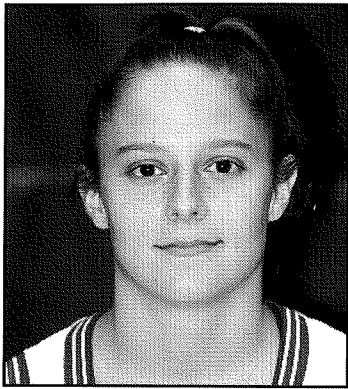

Three-Point Shots: 42-118 in 1996-97; 43-125 in 1997-98



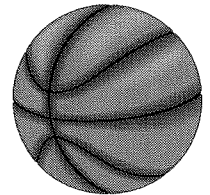

FMU'S SMITH UNIVERSITY CENTER

Named in honor of the university's first president, Dr. Walter D. Smith, the Smith University Center provides comprehensive facilities for student services and activities as well as for recreation and athletic programs to serve students, faculty, and staff. Opened in 1974, the center's gymnasium seats 3,027 for basketball and has a tartan floor.

The FMU men's basketball team owns a 201-113 (.640) record in the Smith University Center, while the Patriot Women have compiled a sparkling 272-69 (.798) mark in the building.



In addition to numerous sporting events, the building has hosted musical concerts, an appearance by Miss America 1994 Kimberly Aiken, U.S. Presidential candidates, and both college and high school commencement exercises. Francis Marion hosted the 1978 AIAW Division II National Women's Basketball Tournament, and in 1988, the U.S. Olympic Women's Basketball Team played an exhibition game against the Cuban National Team. Last year, FMU hosted the NCAA Division II women's basketball South Atlantic Regional Tournament.

PBAC

Francis Marion University is a member of the 12-school NCAA Division II Peach Belt Athletic Conference. Other PBAC members include Armstrong Atlantic State University (in Savannah, Ga.), Augusta State University (Augusta, Ga.), Clayton College & State University (Morrow, Ga.), Columbus State University (Columbus, Ga.), Georgia College & State University (Milledgeville, Ga.), Kennesaw State University (Kennesaw, Ga.), Lander University (Greenwood, S.C.), UNC Pembroke, University of North Florida (Jacksonville, Fla.), USC Aiken, and USC Spartanburg. Formed in December 1989 and headquartered in Augusta, Ga., the PBAC conducts championships in 11 sports, six for men and five for women. The 1998-99 Peach Belt men's and women's basketball tournaments will be held February 19 -24, 1999, at Armstrong Atlantic State University in Savannah, Ga.

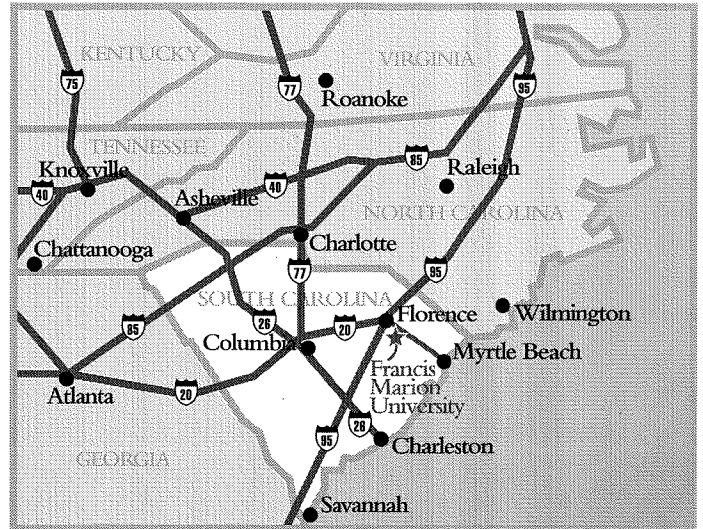
We at Francis Marion University are committed to providing students with opportunities to achieve their greatest potential—in athletics and in academics. We believe the two are compatible when expectations are clearly defined. Sure we want our teams to be successful in competition with peer institutions, but we also want them to be outstanding ambassadors and role models for Francis Marion University.

We will endeavor to assume a leadership role nationally in the integration of athletics and academics. We will strive to maintain exemplary standards for participation while emphasizing the need for continual progress toward a baccalaureate degree. Our graduation rate for student athletes exceeds that of our general student population, as it should because of the dedication and accountability required and due to the personal commitment expended by our coaches.

During the 1997-98 academic year, the university was awarded the Peach Belt Athletic Conference Commissioner's Cup trophy, signifying the conference's best all-around athletic program. Francis Marion also placed 82 student athletes on the PBAC Presidential Honor Roll, the most ever from one conference institution. To be eligible for this Honor Roll, a student athlete must have maintained a 3.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale during the 1997-98 academic year. That number represented approximately 39 percent of all our students competing in intercollegiate athletics.

We hold student athletes to high standards and expect them to exemplify the same leadership roles on campus and within our community as in athletic competition. Therein lies our goal of providing an outstanding, well-balanced athletic program.

THE UNIVERSITY

Founded in 1970, Francis Marion University is one of South Carolina's 12 state-supported universities. As one of the state's nine comprehensive institutions, FMU prides itself on providing a student-centered learning environment.

Enrolling nearly 4,000 students, the University offers a broad range of undergraduate degrees and a growing number of graduate programs in serving the needs of business and industry of the Pee Dee region. Francis Marion is the only state university serving the Pee Dee region, and many of its students are the first in their families to go to college.

While 92 percent of its students come from South Carolina, the University enrolls students from 28 states and 24 foreign countries in order for students to experience the diversity of people from other cultures. The student-faculty ratio is 16.4 to 1, and the overall class size is 21. The average age of undergraduates is 22, while the average age of graduate students is 36. All faculty members have advanced degrees, and 84 percent of the full-time faculty hold doctoral or terminal degrees.

Francis Marion University is fully accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) to award bachelor's and master's level degrees. The university is approved by the S.C. State Board of Education and is a member of the American Council on Education and the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. A number of FMU's individual academic programs have also been accredited by specialized agencies.

Located about seven miles east of Florence, the campus is situated on 300 wooded acres of beautiful foliage and landscaping. The campus features modern classroom buildings, laboratories and residence facilities to provide a safe, comfortable learning environment for students. The University has 18

buildings valued at more than \$60 million. The campus also features a number of recreational facilities that are available for use by students, faculty, staff and alumni, and for use in intra-mural and intercollegiate athletic competition.

Most buildings have been constructed or renovated since 1970. Facilities are equipped with ramps, and those of more than one story are equipped with elevators. Though each building has its own unique design, all are planned for architectural harmony.

One of the busiest places on campus is James A. Rogers Library, the state's sixth largest and the largest library in northeastern South Carolina. It serves as a valuable resource for individual citizens, business and industry for the entire region. It houses more than 354,000 volumes and provides access to a variety of electronic databases, including the Internet and Discus (Digital Information for South Carolina Users).

The FMU Research Park was established in 1996 in a cooperative arrangement among the South Carolina Research Authority, Francis Marion University, and the city and county of



Florence. The Research Park will encompass a 10-acre tract on the FMU campus and will attract companies likely to benefit the state's economy through technology-based activities.

FMU also provides numerous services

to the community, region and public at large. Additionally, the University offers programs and services in continuing education, technical and professional assistance, industrial and economic development and artistic and cultural enrichment. Many of the cultural arts are sponsored by FMU, making concerts, lectures, plays, art exhibits and film series free to the public.

The FMU Alumni Association has more than 11,000 members, 53 percent of whom live and work in the Pee Dee area. Private support comes from the FMU Foundation which was organized in 1974 to provide a means for soliciting and accepting substantial gifts of money or property to build an endowment fund that promotes the educational mission and welfare of the University. Its primary focus has been to provide scholarship support for students. The FMU Foundation is governed by an independent 35-member volunteer board of directors and currently has nearly \$8 million in assets.

The Community

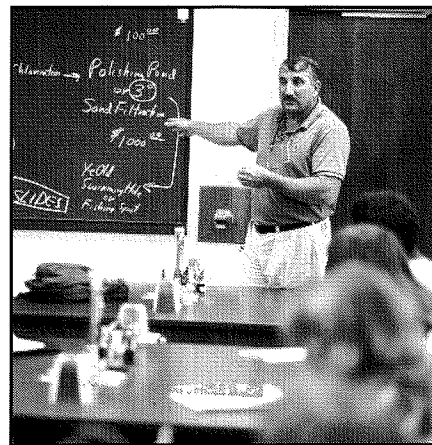
Francis Marion University is located just east of the city of Florence in the beautiful northeastern section of South Carolina. Florence is a regional hub of commerce, agriculture and industry for what is known as the Pee Dee region of South Carolina, an eight-county area. The greater Florence area is a thriving center of 125,000 people, while more than 675,000 people currently live within a 50-mile radius of the city. Florence is about 90 miles from the state capital of Columbia, 60 miles from the shores of Myrtle Beach, and the mountains of the Carolinas are only three hours drive to the northwest.

History

Francis Marion University was founded in response to an overwhelming need for a public higher education institution in the Pee Dee region of South Carolina. The university was

founded in 1970 and named in honor of Revolutionary War hero, General Francis Marion, who was nicknamed the "Swamp Fox" for using the South Carolina terrain to out-fox the British.

However, the university can trace its history to 1957 when the University of South Carolina established a "freshman center" at the Florence County Library. In 1961, a permanent campus for USC-Florence was established seven miles east of Florence on land donated by the Wallace family, the current location of FMU. By 1966, enrollment at USC-F had reached 350, and community leaders began a movement to establish a four-year institution to better meet the educational needs of the area. Following a Commission on Higher Education recommendation, Gov. Robert E. McNair signed into law an act creating Francis Marion College, effective July 1, 1970. The institution gained university status in 1992.



The institution has had three presidents: Dr. Walter Douglas Smith (1969 to 1983), Dr. Thomas C. Stanton (1983 to 1994), and Dr. Lee A. Vickers (1994 to present).

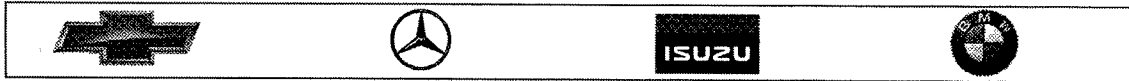

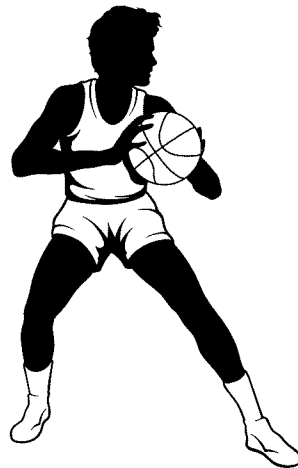

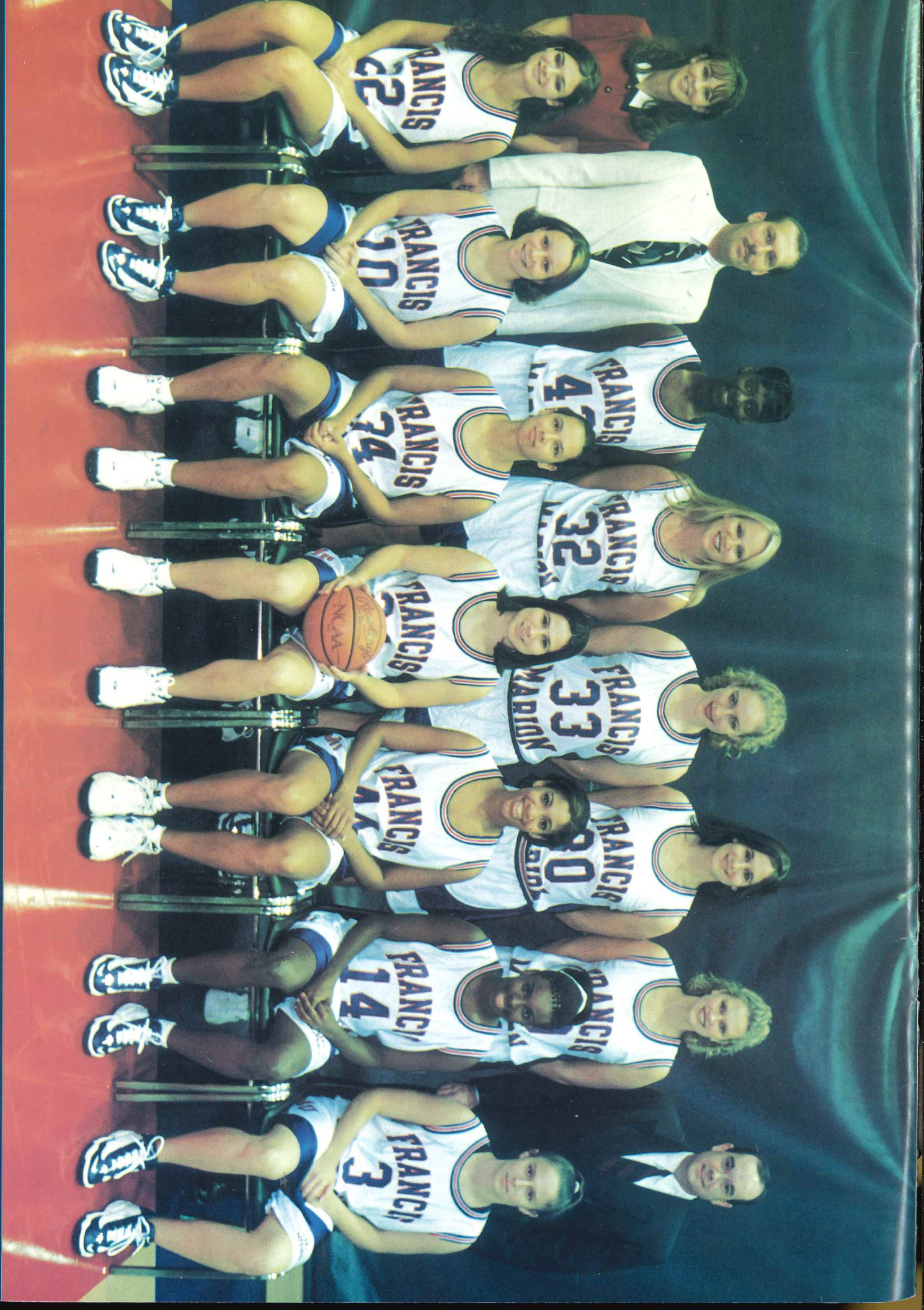
