FMU Patriot Athletics.....

Francis Marion University is affiliated with the NCAA and is a member of the Division II Peach Belt Conference. The school sponsors six sports for men and six for women. The men's golf and women's soccer programs compete as NCAA Division I Independents. **Women's Sports:** basketball, cross country, soccer, softball, tennis, and volleyball. **Men's Sports:** baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, and tennis.

Over the past decade, 11 of the university's 12 sports have participated in post-season NCAA competition, including the golf team winning the 2003 Division II national championship, the men's basketball team reaching the 2004 Sweet Sixteen, and the baseball team advancing to the 2006 College World Series. The men's tennis team has earned 11 invitations to the NCAA Division II tournament over the past 13 years.

FMU is a two-time winner of the Commissioner's Cup, which signifies the best all-around athletic program in the Peach Belt Conference, one of the nation's premier Division II conferences. FMU's outstanding athletic program recruits athletes from South Carolina as well as the nation and world. Francis Marion regularly ranks among the conference leaders for placing student-athletes on the PBC Presidential Honor Roll, which requires a 3.0 grade point average for the academic year. Over the past decade, nearly all of the Patriot athletic squads have appeared in national poll rankings.

2007-08 SEASON OUTLOOK

The Fast and the Furious as Run FMU Era Begins

First-year head coach Heather Macy inherits nine letterwinners, including all five starters, from last year's 6-22 squad that placed sixth in the Peach Belt Conference's North Division. The addition of a new coaching staff, a new style of play, and nine new roster members should make for a year of excitement.

Leading the returnees is senior guard Brittany Young, last year's team MVP with a team-leading 11.8 ppg average. She handed out 5.6 assists per contest, third-best in the Peach Belt Conference and 16th-best nationally. She is fifth on the program's career list for assists (440), and 10th on the PBC's career list. She is on pace to become the 24th player in Francis Marion history to surpass 1,000 career points.

Other returning starters include sophomore forward Yasmean Dixon (7.6 ppg, 4.6 rpg), who had a very productive freshman campaign; junior point guard Kirby Marsh (6.1 ppg), senior swing player Renee Guilliams (6.8 ppg), a three-point shooter; and senior 6-4 center Shavone Mack (4.5 ppg, 5.1 rpg), who ranked 11th nationally in blocked shots per game. Senior 5-11 forward Shonelle Downer (5.7 ppg) also returns and she ranked 42nd nationally in blocks per game. Mack is third on the FMU career list with 189 blocks, while Downer is fifth with 141.

Juniors Katherine Kiefer (7.8 ppg) and Creshenda Singletary also return. Singletary averaged 12.5 ppg over her first two seasons, but did not play last year. Senior forward Vanessa Goff (4.9 ppg) is the ninth returnee, but she will miss the 2007-08 season with an injury.

Many of the newcomers will contribute immediately this season. The

group includes two freshmen and seven transfers, including a pair of transfers from NCAA Division I schools.

Junior 5-7 guard Evelyn Ruff joins the program after transferring from St. Louis University, while 5-8 junior guard Shaquana Morgan comes from Delaware State University.



Senior swing player Rita Grayson averaged 10.9 ppg and 4.1 rpg last season at Division II State University of West Georgia and could step into the Patriots starting line. Speedy point guard Kevina Ransom will be a major injection into the Patriot program after averaging 11.6 points and 9.1 assists per game last year at Louisburg College in North Carolina.

Junior 5-11 post player Ebony Allen (10.9 ppg and 5.9 rpg at Garden City Community College in Kansas), junior swing player Jennifer Dyer (9.4 ppg and 5.2 rpg at Division II Rollins College) and sophomore guard YaRiah Bell (8.9 ppg at Division II Pfeiffer University) also join the FMU program and could see major minutes this year.

The freshmen include 5-9 swing player Shannon Singleton-Bates

(23.1 ppg, 3.2 apg) from South Norwalk, Conn., and 5-10 forward Ashley Abed (10.2 ppg, 8.3 rpg) from Oakton, Va.

Macy's charges figure to put forth a fast-paced, full-court pressure game plan that hopefully will turn opponents' turnovers into Patriot points. As many as 10 players may be in the first-year coach's regular rotation, so depth will certainly be an asset for Francis Marion.

The Patriots' schedule for 2007-08 features 27 regular-season games, including 14 home contests. FMU will open its slate on Nov. 17 at Mount Olive College, before playing three straight home games. The Patriots have won 115 of their last 150 home contests in the Smith University Center. The PBC Tournament is set for March 5-9, 2008 in Aiken, S.C.

vision II national tournament. She was named the CVAC Coach of the Year, and her squad led the nation in scoring offense (83.8 ppg) at the end of the regular season.

That Pfeiffer squad ranked fourth among all Division II women's basketball programs in regards to biggest improvement from the previous season.

In her first season, she guided Pfeiffer to a 14-15 mark after inheriting only four returnees from an 8-20 squad. Her Pfeiffer squad represented the United States in the Barbados vs. USA Friendship Basketball Tour during the summer of 2006.

Her coaching resume also includes stints as an assistant coach at two Division I institutions, University of Maryland-Baltimore County and High Point University, and a pair of Division II schools, Lenoir-Rhyne College, and Catawba College. In her six seasons as an assistant, her teams' combined records were 84-60.

She served as head coach for a USA Athletes International squad that toured Australia in 2004 and won a gold medal with a 7-0 mark at the Australian Youth Games.

She is founder of The Focused 50 Basketball Camp, which will now be held at FMU.

Macy received a B.S. degree in sport and exercise studies (cum laude) from Greensboro College, where she was a four-year letterwinner on the basketball court. She ended her career 11th on The Pride's career scoring list (707 points) and in the top 10 for assists (207). She also played on the GC tennis team. She spent two years coaching AAU basketball in North Carolina, and two seasons as an assistant for Team North Carolina Basketball's Junior Olympic squad.

In 2002, she earned a master's degree in human performance and recreation from the University of Southern Mississippi.

Upon her graduation, she quickly moved into the coaching ranks, accepting the position at Catawba.

The Francis Marion program has an all-time record of 675-335 in 34 seasons. The Patriots have captured two national championships, the 1982 AIAW Division II title and the 1986 NAIA title, and also advanced to the 1998 NCAA Division II Final Four. The program made five straight NCAA Division II Tournament appearances between 1997 and 2001.

Heather Macy begins her first season as head coach for women's basketball at Francis Marion University.

Macy, 28, was named to head the program on March 21, 2007, and became the 10th head coach in the storied history of the Francis Marion program, and the youngest new coach since Sherri Tynes took over the coaching reigns as a 27-year-old in 1988.

The Hamptonville, N.C., native comes to Francis Marion after two seasons as head coach at Pfeiffer University in Misenheimer, N.C. In 2006-07, she guided the Falcons to a 26-5 record, the CVAC regular-season and tournament championships, and an appearance in the NCAA Di-

Jami Cornwell of Mt. Crawford, Va., is beginning her first season as assistant coach for women's basketball at Francis Marion University.

Cornwell's primary responsibilities will include recruiting, on-floor coaching, individual player workouts, pre-

and post-season workouts, and helping in the area of academic support for team members.

She served as an assistant under new FMU head coach Heather Macy for the past two years at Pfeiffer University. The Falcons compiled a two-year mark of 40-20, including a 26-5 record this past season that included an appearance in the NCAA Division II national tournament. Pfeiffer led the nation in scoring offense (83 ppg) and recorded the fourth-best won-loss record improvement of all Division II women's programs.

She also spent one season as an assistant coach at NCAA Division I University of Maryland-Baltimore County.

Cornwell comes to FMU with a good knowledge of the Peach Belt Conference. She earned a B.A. degree in secondary education (cum laude) from USC Aiken, where she was an All-Conference performer in both basketball and softball. She was a two-time All-Region selection on the basketball court, established new school records for points (1,476), assists (568), and steals (317), and ranks in the top 10 on the PBC career lists for all three statistics. In 2004, her No. 20 basketball and softball jerseys were retired by the school.

She graduated from Turner Ashby High School, where she was a two-time All-State selection in basketball, and was the 1999 Virginia Class AA Player of the Year.

In June 2004, she was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in Knoxville, Tenn.

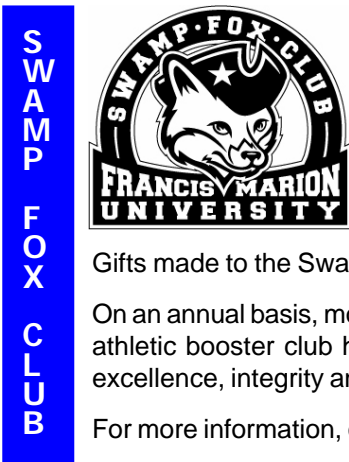

WHOM THEY PLAY (PEACH BELT CONFERENCE)

Francis Marion University is a member of the 11-school NCAA Division II Peach Belt Conference (formerly the Peach Belt Athletic Conference). Other PBC members include Armstrong Atlantic State University (in Savannah, Ga.), Augusta State University (Augusta, Ga.), Clayton State University (Morrow, Ga.), Columbus State University (Columbus, Ga.), Georgia College & State University (Milledgeville, Ga.), Georgia Southwestern State University (Americus, Ga.), Lander University (Greenwood, S.C.), UNC Pembroke, North Georgia College & State University (Dahlonega, Ga.), and USC Aiken.

Headquartered in Augusta, Ga., the PBC conducts championships in 12 sports, six for men and six for women. They are men's and women's cross country, men's and women's soccer, volleyball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's tennis, baseball, softball and men's golf.

Since its inception, the Peach Belt Conference has worked tirelessly to become one of the elite conferences in NCAA Division II. Now entering its 17th season with 24 national championships and 24 national finalists, the PBC has accomplished that goal. Starting with only two championships in 1991, men's and women's basketball, the conference has expanded to 12 sports. The conference traces its roots back to November of 1988 when 11 schools first met in Greenville, S.C. to form a Division II conference. Following a second meeting on Dec. 3, 1989, five of those 11 schools, plus two others, formed the Peach Belt and began play in 1991. The name Peach Belt Athletic Conference was adopted in January of 1990 and modified to Peach Belt Conference in May of 2000.

David Brunk was named the second PBC commissioner in May of 2007. Brunk replaced Marvin Vanover, who was the first PBC commissioner from 1991 to 2007. Diana Kling enters her second year as Director of Compliance for the conference and also serves as the Senior Woman Administrator. Ken Gerlinger enters his seventh year as the Director of Media Relations, while Dr. Dorothy Leland, president of Georgia College & State University, is the president of the Peach Belt for 2007-08.

WHERE THEY PLAY (SMITH UNIVERSITY CENTER)

FMU'S SMITH UNIVERSITY CENTER

Named in honor of the university's first president, Dr. Walter D. Smith, the Smith University Center provides comprehensive facilities for student services and activities as well as for recreation and athletic programs to serve students, faculty, and staff. Opened in 1974, the center's gymnasium seats 3,027 for basketball and has recently undergone a renovation project. Improvements include a new hardwood floor, new scoreboards, a new lighting and sound system, and a new paint job.



The Patriot Women have compiled a 353-103 (.774) mark in the Smith University Center, including a 115-35 run in the past 150 games. The FMU men's basketball team owns a 255-165 (.607) record in the building.

In addition to numerous sporting events, the building has hosted musical concerts, an appearance by Miss America 1994 Kimberly Aiken, U.S. Presidential candidates, and both college and high school commencement exercises. Francis Marion hosted the 1978 AIAW Division II National Women's Basketball Tournament, and in 1988, the U.S. Olympic Women's Basketball Team played an exhibition game against the Cuban National Team. In 1998 and 1999, FMU hosted the NCAA Division II women's basketball South Atlantic Regional Tournament.

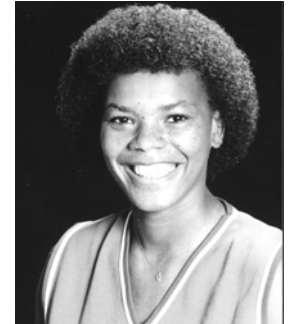

FMU HALL OF FAME CAGER PEARL MOORE (1975-79)



Pearl Moore, women's basketball basketball's all-time scoring leader, is a 1979 Francis Marion University graduate. Moore, a native of Florence and a graduate of Wilson High School, played for the Patriots between 1975 and 1979, and the four-time All-American scored 4,061 career points.

Moore started her collegiate career at Anderson Junior College in the fall of 1975. After one semester at Anderson (eight games and 177 points), she transferred to Francis Marion. Fortunately, the Patriots did not open their cage season until after the first of the year, and thus Moore played the entire 1975-76 Francis Marion schedule. At that time under Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (IAIW) rules, a player could transfer and be eligible immediately. The 5-7 guard-forward went on to score 3,884 points in a Patriot uniform. Her career point total includes the points scored at Anderson, because at that time in women's basketball, two- and four-year schools regularly competed against each other and all results counted.

During her junior year, she scored a then single-game record 60 points in a 114-71 victory over Eastern Washington State College in the 1978 AIAW Small College National Tournament (see lower left photo). In her final collegiate game, March 10, 1979, an AIAW Small College Regional Tournament consolation game against the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, she tallied 42 points to break the previous all-time record of 4,045 set by Travis Grant of Kentucky State University.

Moore averaged 30.6 points per game over her four seasons (127 games) at Francis Marion, and helped lead head coach Sylvia Rhyne Hatchell's program to an 85-42 record and three national tournament appearances. She scored below 20 points only 18 times in her Francis Marion career, and reached the 50-point mark on three occasions. She scored 1,109 points in her junior year alone. In addition to her point total, recorded in an era that did not have the three-point field goal, Moore grabbed 1,270 rebounds and shot 45.9 percent from the field and a then school-record 70.0 percent from the free-throw line.



Since that time, two male players (John Pierce and Philip Hutcheson, both of David Lipscomb University) have surpassed her total, but she still stands as the only female player to reach 4,000 career points. Miriam Walker-Samuels of Claflin College (SC) is second on the women's scoring list with 3,855 points.

Following her career at Francis Marion, Pearl went on to play two seasons in the Women's Pro Basketball League (1979-80 with the New York Stars and 1980-81 with the St. Louis Streak), earning All-Star status in 1981, and one season in Venezuela.

Moore was one of the first inductees into the FMU Athletic Hall of Fame in 1992. In 1994, she was nominated by the university for induction into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame, and her name remains in the nomination process. During the summer of 1996, several items from Pearl's playing days were sent to the Naismith Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., for inclusion in the Women's Basketball Exhibit Area. In 2000, she was inducted into the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame. In 2004, she was nominated for induction into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in Knoxville, Tenn.

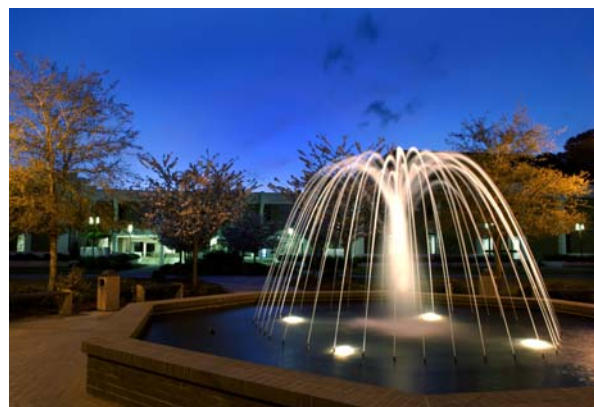

On campus housing includes The Village, Residence Halls, Forest Villas Apartment Complex, Forest Villas Community Center, and the Allard A. Allston Housing Office Complex.

In addition to the Walter Douglas Smith University Center, which houses the gymnasium, raquetball courts, weightroom, and an olympic-sized swimming pool, other on campus athletic facilities include Clifford S.
