Seven Chapters Buy 18 School 'Blocks'

With 18 bricks already subscribed to immortalize 18 high school football teams, the BRICKS FOR CHAMPIONS drive is off to an auspicious start, it is reported by Jack Mohr, chairman of the National Football Foundation's Membership and Chapters committee and chairman of the Bricks campaign.

Seven chapters — Central Ohio (Columbus); Wilmington, Del.; New Haven, Conn.; Cumberland County, N. J.; Toledo, O., Lehigh Valley, Pa., and Philadelphia, Pa. — are the first subscribers.

Central Ohio leads with seven; Wilmington has three, New Haven, Cumberland and Toledo two each and Lehigh Valley and Philadelphia one each.

The 18 bricks will be built into the Wall of Champions, an impressive five-foot high brick wall, composed of handsome blocks 15 inches long and eight inches high, that will be a part of the Hall of Fame.

The question of how best to honor the great secondary school teams and how best to permit grass-roots participation in the Hall of Fame by secondary schools across the nation has been answered by the Bricks for Champions campaign, according to Mohr.

Here's how his plan works:

Each team which contributes, through its schoolmates, friends or relatives a minimum of \$110, \$10 for each first-string player or \$5 for each of the first 22 players, will have its name perpetuated on a block in the Wall of Champions. On each block will be engraved, handsomely and permanently, the school and home town of the team, its title if any, and the name of its coach.

Each school may honor as many of its teams as it chooses. The teams honored need not only be championship teams. They may include present teams as well as great teams of the past. In short, any team that the school and/or its supporters want to honor in the Wall of Champions may be included.

Another feature of the Wall of Champions, will be the divisions into Decades of Glory. The Decades of Glory will group outstanding teams of the '50s, '40s, '30s and so on.

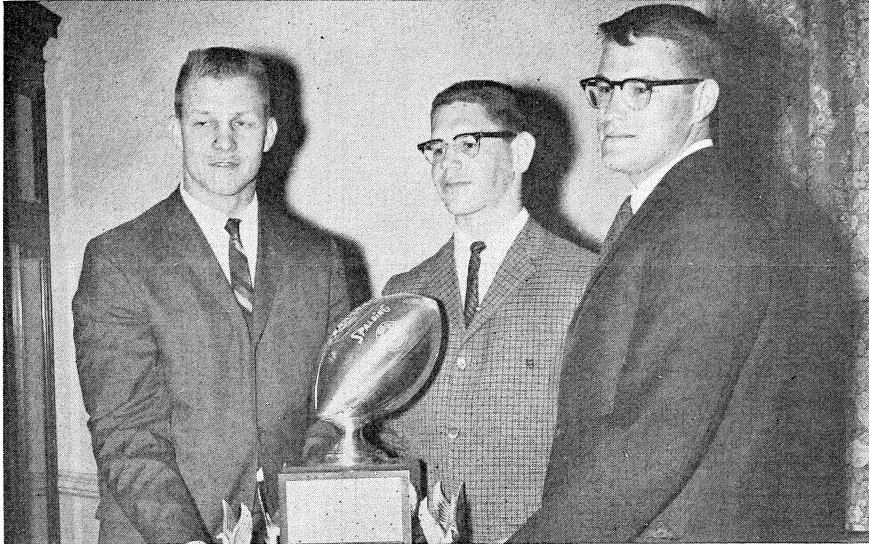

'The Good Heavily Outweighs the Bad'

Below is the story of the awards banquet of the Western Massachusetts Chapter of the National Football Foundation. It was written by Garry Brown, sports columnist of the Springfield Union, and is reprinted from that newspaper.

These admittedly are hard times for football, thanks to that explosion in the South which has brought the dread word "fix" to the venerable game.

Those who attended the Western Massachusetts Chapter of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame awards banquet at Deerfield Academy, however, came away realizing that the good heavily outweighs the bad in the grid sport.

The surroundings were perfect. Deerfield's dining hall was a study in candlelight. The academy Glee Club soothed the diners with soft selections. Then, the spotlight turned to the honored guests — seven young men and two silver-haired giants of the sport.

It was in these moments of tribute that one realized just how fine football can be, and how much it can do for an individual who has talent and the desire to excel.

Watching beaming young men like George Cannon of West Springfield, Jerry Batty of Mt. Hermon and Paul Majeski of UMass march front and center to receive shining trophies for scholastic and football achievement was inspiring indeed. They were followed in quick order by various league winners: a huge young man from Adams named Al Moser, a crew-cut kid from Williamstown named Bill Leete, and Palmer's Rocky Chase and Agawam's Jack Morin, small as football players go but nonetheless outstanding for their respective teams.

These were the shining senior stars of 1962, stars who

prove that it is possible to play ball and do well scholastically.

Before these boys were honored, the gathering was introduced to two gentlemen who have been associated with football over a lengthy span — and have been a credit to the game all the while. First the group met John H. Hubbard, Amherst College's only all-American (in 1905). Then they were introduced to

Ossie Solem, one of the great names in football coaching. These men were nominated for the Football Hall of Fame, and we can only add that they seem excellent choices.

An Isolated Case

A game that produces such men as Solem and Hubbard, and such up-and-comers as the award winners proves its worth. It seems a shame that one isolated case — that Georgia-Alabama game — can tend to incriminate the entire football world.

As National Foundation director Harvey Harman said, "Even if wrong is proved, and it has not been, that was one game out of the countless thousands that have been played over the years. I feel that an affair like the Western Mass. Chapter is conducting here (at Deerfield) is enough to show doubters the real values of football."

The committee picked the best when naming its awards — Dr. Frank L. Boyden of Deerfield for the prep division. Tuss McLaughry for the collegiate and Archie Roberts (Sr.) for the high school. Their names lend prestige, for they are towering figures in football and education.

New Yorkers Fete Stars of Then and Now

10 Hall of Famers By Touchdown Club

Football's role "in the totality of the undergraduate curriculum" has been lauded by Dr. Grayson Kirk, president of Columbia University.

At a talk before 300 members of the Touchdown Club of New York, assembled at a luncheon to pay tribute to clubmates who have achieved election to the National Football Hall of Fame, Dr. Kirk declared he believed deeply in football's place on the campus.

"It is an important part of our undergraduate life that supplements the work in the classroom," he said.

He believed, he added, in football particularly as it is played in the Ivy League whose eight members have stringent rules regarding its conduct.

"If I didn't," he asserted, "I'd take steps to change those rules."

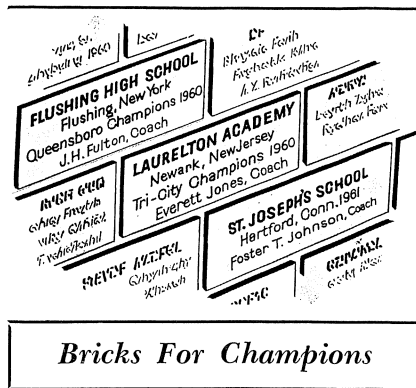
Dr. Kirk spoke before an array of football greats that included a group of former Columbia players who have left their mark on the game. One of them, Cliff Montgomery, quarterback of the team that defeated Stanford in the Rose Bowl in 1934, was among the 10 Hall of Famers present in whose honor the luncheon was held. Montgomery was elected this year.

Another Hall of Fame speaker was Col. John McEwan, former Army player and coach, who revealed that he had "offered" a course in poetry at Oregon while coaching football there — something, he said, he had tried to keep hidden all these years.

Other Hall of Famers introduced were Col. Edgar W. Garbisch, Army center; Hamilton Fish, Harvard tackle; Dr. Joseph Alexander, Syracuse center; Benny Friedman, Michigan quarterback; Vincent J. (Pat) Pazzetti, Lehigh quarterback; Fritz Pollard, Brown halfback; Elmer Oliphant, Purdue and Army back; and Ken Strong, N.Y.U. back. All also were named to the All-America during their playing days.

Unable to be present were Lou Little, former Columbia coach who was named to the Hall in 1960, and Henry R. (Pete) Pund, former Georgia Tech center, named this year.

Introducing the Hall of Famers and acting as toastmaster was the president of the Touchdown Club, George Vergara, who was an outstanding lineman at Notre Dame.

Scholar-Athletes By Met. Chapter

Senator Kenneth B. Keating (R.-N. Y.) has urged the National Football Foundation to support "in the strongest way" federal legislation designed to eliminate fixes in sporting contests.

Speaking at the awards luncheon of the Metropolitan Chapter of the Foundation at New York's Hotel Aster, Senator Keating said "the Foundation can be of invaluable assistance in winning support in the Congress and in the country for such legislation."

The Senator is sponsoring legislation that would make it possible to exercise Federal jurisdiction over schemes which utilize the facilities of interstate commerce to influence corruptly the outcome of sporting contests.

The Senator was the chief speaker at the annual luncheon, but the main business was the presentation of awards to six scholar-athletes from the Metropolitan New York district, made by Raymond Reeves, newly-elected president.

Two of the boys honored represented the Nassau County High School League — James Litterelle, tackle of Mineola High School and Henry Giffin, quarterback of East Meadow High School. Others were Douglas Wedel, quarterback of the Stony Brook School, representing the Ivy Preparatory League; Thomas Choquette, brother of Brown's All-Ivy fullback, Paul, from Archbishop Stepinac High School, of the Catholic High School League; Paul Menick, guard from Port Chester High School, of the Westchester County High School League, and Joseph Robert Mc Coy, tackle from St. John's Preparatory School of the Catholic Football Conference. Young Choquette is a quarterback.

The young men received engraved plaques for themselves and their schools. All are football players and scholars of the top rank. They were rewarded for being outstanding in three fields of endeavor, first in football ability and prominence, second in academic application and performance and third in school leadership and citizenship.

The election of officers opened the meeting. Elected were: president, Raymond L. Reeves; vice-president, Gene Rossides; secretary, Frank E. Devlin; treasurer, John Hubbell.

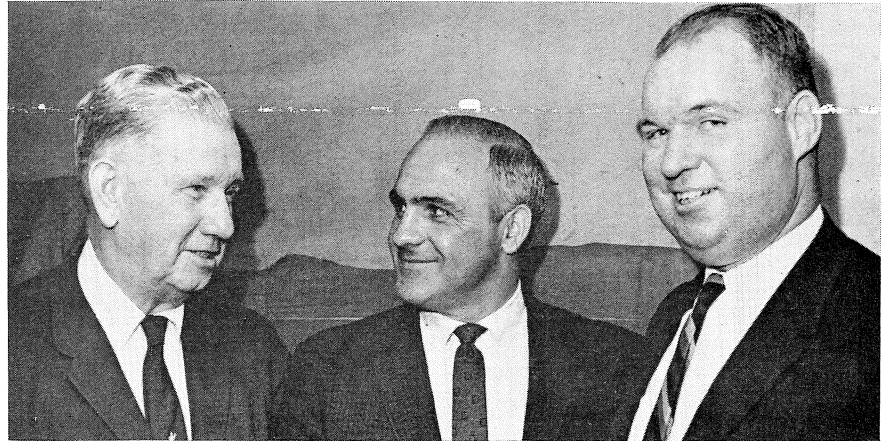
The principal of Claymont High
