Furman: Heralded, strong-armed quarterback who is expected to contend for All-Southern Conference honors this fall . . . is an ideal field general and natural leader . . . was a big factor in Furman's drive to a 13-2 record and NCAA I-AA national championship last fall, showing maturity as the season progressed . . .

was beaten out for the starting job in the early going last year by Patrick Baynes mainly due to a sore shoulder sustained in the preseason . . . gained his first start in Furman's 42-0 win over Newberry and proceeded to direct the Paladins to an 11-1 record as Furman's no. 1 signal caller . . . maturity was best reflected in a comparison of his first six games vs. his last nine contests . . . completed just 24-of-74 passes (32.4%) for 379 yards and one touchdown (eight interceptions) in his first six outings vs. his last nine games in which he completed 78-of-137 passes (56.9%) for 1183 yards and eight touchdowns (seven interceptions) . . . passing efficiency in first six games was 58.25 vs. 138.48 in Furman's last nine games . . . finished the season with 1,562 yards passing and 48.3 completion percentage . . . was the team's total offense leader in 1988 with 1,928 yards . . . rushed for 366 yards and four touchdowns a year ago . . . best game came in Furman's 31-0 win over Western Carolina, when he completed 15-of-23 passes for 258 yards and three touchdowns, a performance that earned him team offensive player-of-the-week honors as well as Southern Conference Offensive Player-of-the-Week accolades . . . turned in an excellent performance in Furman's conference-title-clinching, 30-17 win over The Citadel by passing for 141 yards and one touchdown and rushing for 52 yards and a score . . . touchdown run against The Citadel covered 24 yards . . . was strong in Furman's 24-9 win over Appalachian State, passing for 91 yards and rushing for a season-high 72 yards and a touchdown . . . touchdown run vs. Mountaineers covered 36 yards . . . had a key 42-yard touchdown pass to George Quarles in Furman's 13-9 quarterfinal playoff win over Marshall in Huntington . . . sustained a broken ankle midway through his freshman season and ended up playing in only one game (Davidson) . . . broken ankle resulted from being thrown in Furman's lake by his classmates as part of a traditional birthday celebration . . . was named Furman Junior Varsity Offensive Player-of-the-Year in 1987.

High School: Lettered in both football and basketball at Greeneville High School . . . grid coach was Fred Sorrells, father of Paladin offensive backs coach Tim Sorrells . . . was twice named Greeneville's Most Valuable Player and was an all-conference selection in football as a senior . . . helped lead the Green Devils to a state semifinal finish in basketball his senior year.

Furman: Enters the fall as one of three returning starters along the Paladin offensive line . . . may very well be the best center in the Southern Conference and is already being called one of the best to ever play at Furman by the coaching staff . . . has All-America potential . . . sports excellent size, strength, and athletic ability,

which he couples effectively with a fine overall knowledge of the game . . . put together a good spring practice working against one of Furman's top young defensive linemen in nose guard Allen Edwards . . . was a first team All-Southern Conference choice a year ago in only his first season as a starter, the only sophomore named on the all-conference first-team ballot in 1988 . . . was a big reason why Furman's ground attack ranked as one of the best in the country a year ago, averaging 262.1 yards per game . . . contribution as a player in 1988 was probably best underlined by the fact that Furman's fullbacks rushed for 1,503 yards and averaged 5.74 yards per carry in helping the Paladins to a 13-2 record and NCAA I-AA national championship . . . proved to be rock solid in 1988 by leading Furman's offensive line in total plays with 910 and finishing second to David Adams among starters with an average grade of 1.92 . . . in all notched winning performances (1.85 or better) in 14 of Furman's 15 games a year ago, four of which were exceptional performances (2.00 or better) . . . highest grade was a 2.03 on a season high 75 plays against Marshall in the Paladins' 13-9 quarterfinal playoff win in Huntington, a game in which he earned team offensive player-of-the-game honors . . . also rolled up a 2.03 on 60 plays in Furman's 30-17 win over The Citadel to help the Paladins clinch a share of the Southern Conference title . . . other exceptional performances came against Georgia Southern in the NCAA I-AA championship game (17-12 win) and in Furman's 38-7 semifinal playoff win over Idaho (2.00 on 46 plays) . . . earned his first team offensive player-of-the-week tab in Furman's 42-0 win over Newberry by scoring a 1.94 on 51 plays . . . was a unanimous choice as Furman's Freshman-of-the-Year in 1987 after seeing playing time in all 11 games as a backup tackle . . . was moved to center in the spring following the 1987 season . . . came to Furman in 1986 but gained a medical redshirt after sustaining a badly bruised foot.

High School: Played football for Tom Lewis at Sumter High School, where he lettered as a sophomore, junior, and senior . . . served as a captain his senior year, leading Sumter to a state runnerup finish . . . tabbed by the **Sumter Daily Item** to its 1985 all-area team . . . also earned all-conference recognition that season . . . lettered four times in soccer, earning Most Valuable Player and second team all-state honors his senior year . . . was named Sumter High's Outstanding Male Athlete his senior year.

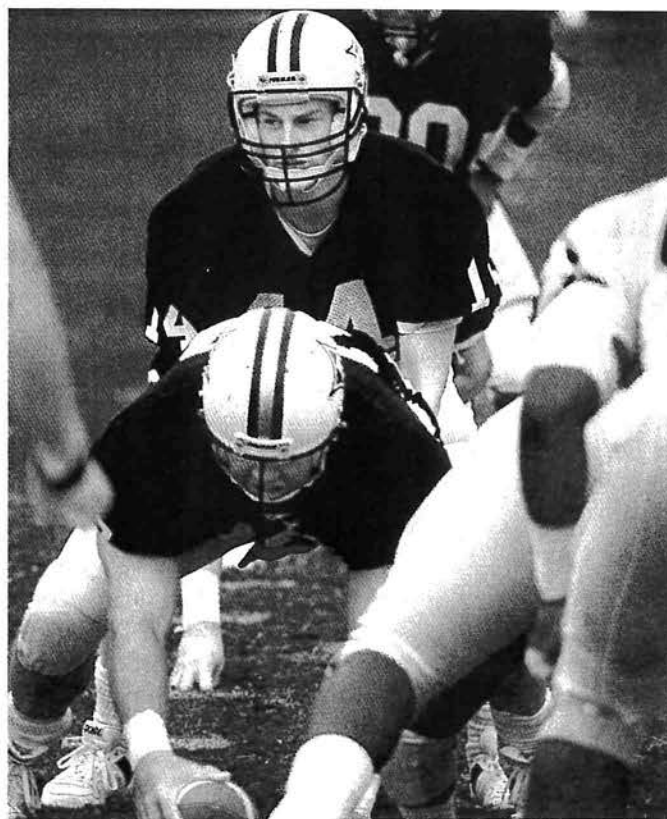

Furman: Emerged late last season as perhaps Furman's finest young defensive lineman . . . is expected to be in the starting lineup at nose guard this fall following a strong spring practice . . . packs excellent strength and quickness and has the potential to be an all-star performer according to the coaching staff . . . plays the run particularly well and is an improving pass rusher . . . moved into the spotlight in the last two games of the 1988 season filling in for injured starter Wayne Burr . . . started at nose guard in Furman's 38-7 semifinal playoff win over Idaho, recording two tackles and a sack . . . a week later played his finest game of the season in Furman's 17-12 win over Georgia Southern in the NCAA I-AA national championship game, thoroughly whipping Georgia Southern two-time All-American center Dennis Franklin by causing two fumbles, recording five tackles, and a hit-for-loss . . . contributed to a defensive effort that limited Southern's high-powered ground attack to just 134 yards on 52 attempts, an effort that netted him team defensive player-of-the-game laurels . . . other top games came against Newberry (7 tackles, 1 sack), a 42-0 win, and Presbyterian (4 tackles, 1 sack), a 21-0 Paladin victory . . . in all recorded 50 tackles, two tackles-for-losses, 4.5 sacks, and two pass deflections in 1988.

High School: Played football for Allen Sitterle at Spartanburg High School . . . helped lead Spartanburg to a region title, Upper State championship, and state runnerup finish in 1987, his senior year . . . earned all-area and all-region honors as a senior and also served as captain of his team . . . participated in the 1987 North-South All-Star Football Game . . . also competed in track while at Spartanburg.

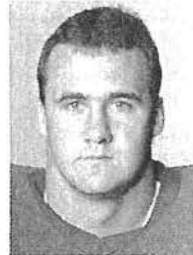

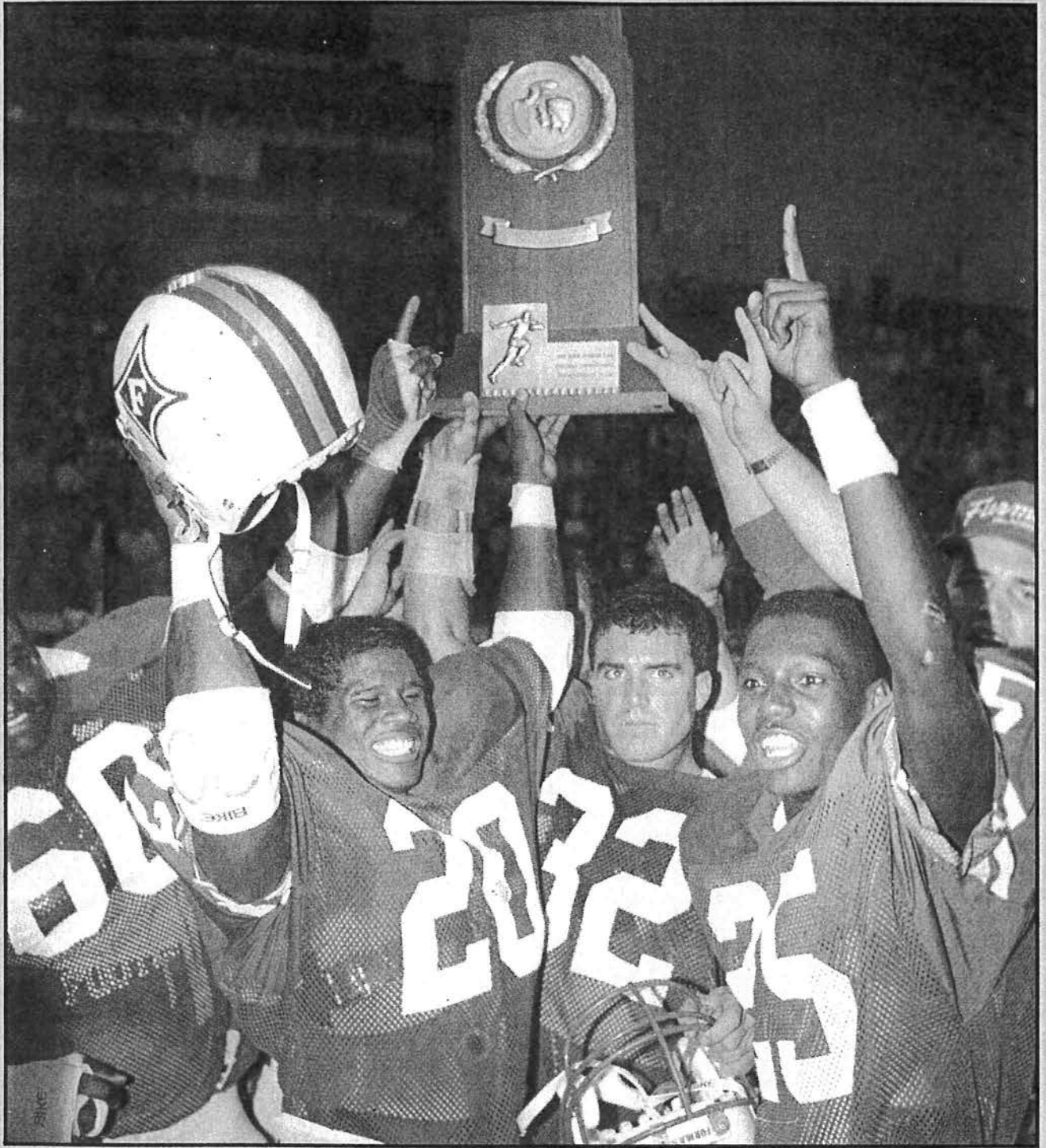

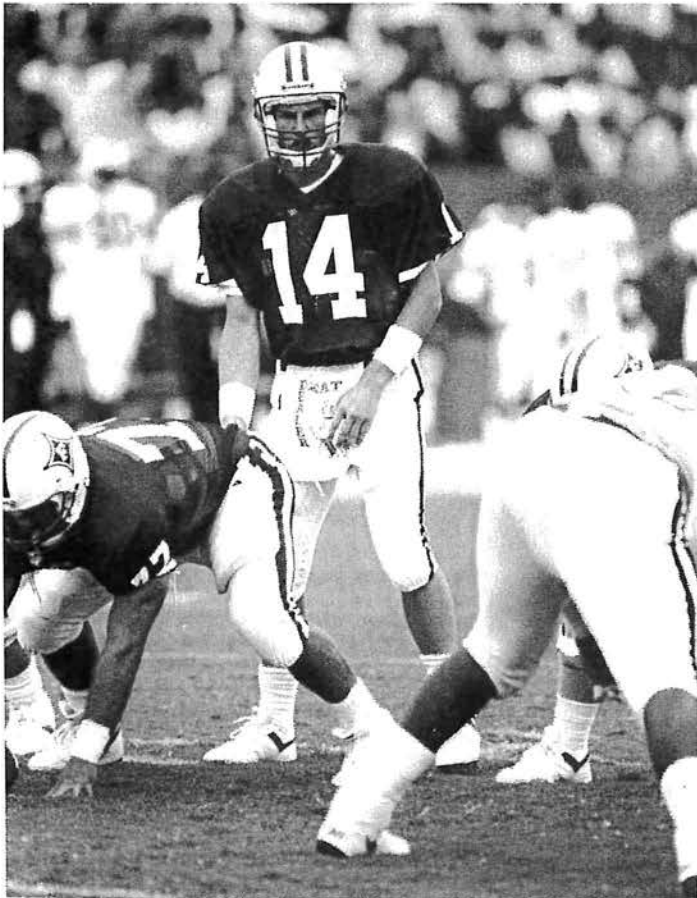
1988 IN REVIEW





Greenville — In a game that would set the tone for the remainder of a successful championship season, the Furman Paladins got strong special teams play and a solid effort from its defense to down the South Carolina State Bulldogs 38-0 before 13,386 onlookers at Paladin Stadium.

From the game's onset Furman controlled the tempo, stopping the Bulldogs on downs and taking over at the State 22 following a Julius Dixon block of a Mike Freeborn punt with 10:30 left in the first quarter. One play later Paladin tailback Bobby Daugherty took a pitch from quarterback Patrick Baynes and raced 22 yards around right end behind a wall of blockers for the Paladins' first score of the season. Mike Wood's extra point made it 7-0.

Midway through the first quarter Furman's defense, led by senior linebacker Jeff Blankenship, came up with its first of many key plays in 1988 when Blankenship smothered a fumble by State quarterback Darrell Gilmore at the Furman 39. From there Furman called on fullback Kennet Goldsmith for three yards and tailback Bobby Daugherty for 18 yards, moving to the State 40. Furman then went to the air with Goldsmith breaking loose for a 32-yard hookup with Patrick

Baynes down to the Bulldog 8. Unable to find the end zone in three plays, the Paladins settled for a 21-yard field goal by Mike Wood with 1:59 left in the first quarter to take a 10-0 lead.

Just three plays into the second period Furman made it 17-0 when Goldsmith, who rushed for 85 yards on the day on just eight carries, burst up the middle and broke to the outside on the way to a 35-yard scoring run. Goldsmith's jaunt followed a 24-yard pass from Baynes to Daugherty and capped a 59-yard drive that took only four plays and consumed just :59 of clock.

On its next possession Furman failed to convert on a fourth-and-two situation, and State took over at its own 38. From there Bulldog quarterback Darrell Gilmore connected with J.D. Montgomery for 15 yards to the Furman 47. Whistled for a personal foul on the play, Furman saw the Bulldogs move to the 32, but two plays later Paladin cornerback Julius Dixon ended the Bulldog advance by picking off a pass in the end zone with 9:34 remaining in the first half.

Making his first appearance since sustaining a knee injury midway through the 1986 season, Bobby Daugherty led Furman to its next score, catching an 18-yard pass and reeling off runs of 20, 8, and 5 yards in an 80-yard, six-play drive. Daugherty, who would pace Furman in rushing with 103 yards on 13 carries, scored his second touchdown on a 5-yard run around right end with 7:43 left in the second quarter. Mike Wood's extra point put the Paladins in command 24-0.

In the second half Furman continued to come up with the big plays as State punter Mike Freeborn yielded a second blocked kick to Julius Dixon at the Bulldog 31. Starting at the State 19, Furman used just four plays to reach the end zone. A 5-yard touchdown pass from Patrick Baynes to tight end Greg Key with 3:38 to go in the third quarter gave the Paladins a comfortable 31-0 lead.

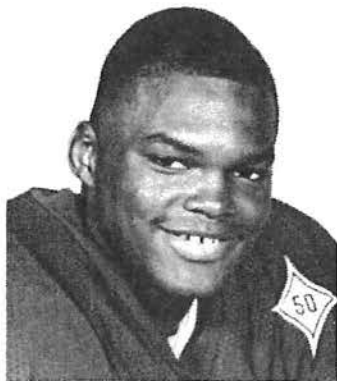
Forced to contend without the services of veteran tailbacks John Bagwell and Dwight Sterling, both of whom were injured in the preseason, Furman showed its backfield depth against South Carolina State by calling on junior tailback Richie Harris in support of starter Bobby Daugherty. A fine runner with excellent speed, Harris, who in the last game of the 1987 season rushed for 115 yards in a 58-13 win over The Citadel, totaled 51 yards on just seven carries against State and had a 19-yard touchdown reception from backup quarterback Frankie DeBusk at the 13:54 juncture of the fourth quarter for the Paladins' final tally.

On the afternoon Furman rolled up 446 yards in total offense, 310 of which came on the ground. Furman's defense, in addition to notching its first of four shutouts in 1988, gave up only eight completions in 29 pass attempts with two interceptions and nine pass deflections.

Game Notes: Furman's win over South Carolina State was its fifth consecutive and first shutout of the Bulldogs since the two schools began playing each other in 1982. Furman now leads in the series 5-2. The shutout was Furman's first in a season opener since the 1971 season when the Paladins battled Appalachian State to 0-0 tie. Prior to that Furman's last blanking of an opponent in a season opener was a 42-0 whitewash of Mars Hill in 1967.

Clemson — Played before 80,300 fans - the largest audience to ever witness a Paladin football game - Furman watched mistakes and Clemson's superior special teams play take their toll as the nationally third-ranked Tigers downed the pesky Paladins 23-3.

Although handed its 22nd consecutive loss to Clemson, Furman displayed enough defensive strength against the Tigers to impress more than a few coaches and players clad in purple. In holding an experienced, senior-dominated Tiger offense to just 234 yards rushing and 316 total yards, Furman's defensive effort was praised by Clemson's coaching staff following the game, a compliment one Tiger coach would later amend by calling the Paladin defense the second best defense Clemson faced all year next to North Carolina State's.

After stopping Clemson on its first possession, Furman did what it could not afford to do against the Tigers: gift wrap a score for Clemson when quarterback Patrick Baynes' pitch on an option was batted away by Levon Kirkland and recovered by Jesse Hatcher at the Furman 3. Two plays later tailback Terry Allen dove into the end zone from one yard out for the score, and Rusty Seyle's extra point made in 7-0 Clemson with 9:27 left in the first quarter.

A pair of punts later Furman, working behind fullback Kennet Goldsmith, moved 28 yards to the Tiger 31 early in the second quarter. From there Glen Connally knocked home his first career field goal and the second longest field goal in school history, a 48-yarder, to cut Clemson's lead to 7-3.

Mounting a 52-yard, eight-play drive - its longest of the day - Clemson on its next possession turned to the accurate toe of placekicker Chris Gardocki, who extended the Tiger lead to 10-3 with a 38-yard field goal with 11:05 remaining in the first half.

Late in the second period Clemson capitalized on a 31-yard punt return by Donnell Woolford to increase its lead to 13-3. Initiating a drive at the Furman 33, the Tigers dented the Paladin defense for just four yards on three plays, but that was enough for Gardocki, who drilled home his second of three field goals, this time from 46 yards out with 2:47 showing on the clock.

In the third quarter Clemson, which had yielded eight first downs to the Paladins in the first half, effectively shut down Furman's ground attack, allowing the Paladins no first downs and just 37 yards in total offense. Furman's defense, meanwhile, hung tough, holding Clemson to just 24 yards on its first two possessions. On its third possession, however, Clemson was able to push across a touchdown on a seven-yard run by Terry Allen at the 4:33 mark. Allen's second touchdown run of the game capped a 43-yard, five-play drive that began after a 23-yard punt return by James Lott.

The Tigers rounded out the scoring early in the fourth quarter by moving 47 yards in 13 plays for Chris Gardocki's

third field goal of the day, a 31-yard effort with 9:19 remaining to make it 23-3.

Outgained on the day 316-201, Furman's offensive output was its worst of the season despite a 70-yard effort by Kennet Goldsmith, who had a game high 19 attempts and notable success up the middle on the Tigers. Tailback Bobby Daugherty tacked on 66 yards for the Paladins, who tallied 15 first downs on the Tigers. Punter Bruce Leicht averaged 44.4 yards per kick on seven attempts, but five of his kicks, mostly the low, line drive variety, were returned for 78 yards, helping set up two Tiger scores.

Game Notes: Furman's tilt against Clemson was its first against the Tigers since 1979 when the Tigers shutout the Paladins 21-0. Although beaten, Furman racked up the biggest hit of the day when senior cornerback Cherod Webber nailed Tiger tailback Terry Allen under the chin in the second quarter just a second after Allen had received an option pitch from quarterback Rodney Williams. Witnessed by the 80,300 in attendance, Webber's hit on Allen was seen by an even bigger audience that evening, making CNN's "Hit of the Day."
