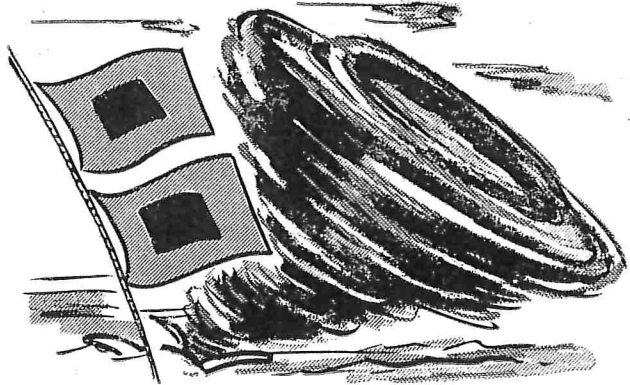

HURRICANE SEASON IS UNDERWAY

Greenville, S. C. — September 1 — (All wire services) — Hurricane warnings have been posted from Greenville south to the Tampa Bay area, northwestward to Tuscaloosa, Alabama and north to the Carolina outer banks and the Virginia capes. All interests in these areas, particularly the football teams of Presbyterian, Tampa, William and Mary, Wofford, The Citadel, Mississippi College, Alabama, Richmond and Clemson are advised to take extreme precautions in the wake of a new Hurricane Furman in 1960.

TO MEMBERS OF THE PRESS, RADIO AND TV—

The Hurricane warning flags, symbol of the fighting Purple Hurricane, fly proudly on the cover of the 1960 Furman University Press Guide.

Sirrine Stadium will be the scene of six grid battles starting with Presbyterian and including in order, William and Mary, Wofford, The Citadel, Mississippi College and Richmond. The complete Furman schedule can be found on page 2 and the outside back cover of this brochure.

All requests for working press tickets and comps should be made at least a week in advance. If wire or telephone service is required, please make necessary arrangements through your local Western Union or telephone office.

Additional improvements made on the upper deck of the press box will provide space for photographers and scouts. Only those persons wearing the PRESS ticket will be admitted to the working area or ground deck of the press box. Half-time and final game statistics will be provided. Furman statisticians use the NCAA form in reporting individual and game totals to the NCAB in New York.

The Furman Sports Publicity Office will cooperate in every way possible to furnish pictures, home town features and additional information about the Hurricane as the season progresses. We appreciate the fine coverage of the entire Furman athletic program in the past and extend a cordial invitation to be with us during the 1960 campaign.

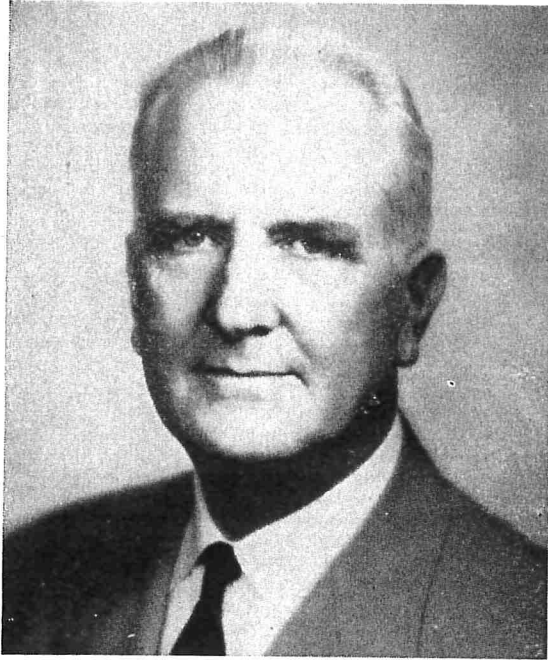

THE PRESIDENT

Dr. John Laney Plyler, now in his 21st year as president of his alma mater, graduated from Furman in 1913 with magna cum laude honors. He served for three years as a teacher and coach at Greenville High where he produced a state championship basketball team.

Dr. Plyler rose from private to the rank of second lieutenant as a volunteer in World War I. After the war, he received an LL.B. from Harvard and began the practice of law in Greenville. In 1935 he was chosen judge of the Greenville County Court. He had been re-elected for a second term when friends persuaded him to become president of Furman.

Under his administration the faculty has been greatly increased in size and academic training and the University has been admitted to the Southern University Conference, the Association and of the American Association of University Women.

In 1948 he served as president of the South Carolina Baptist Convention. Erskine College honored him in 1939 with the LL.D. degree, and in 1953 he received the LL.D. degree from Wofford College. In 1946-47 he was vice-chairman of Church-Related Colleges in the Southeast and, in 1951-52, president of the South Carolina Association of Colleges. As a member of an 11-man national committee of college presidents named in 1951, he helped work out recommendations on college football which were widely adopted.

Dr. Plyler's leadership has been chiefly responsible for the movement of the University to a new \$22,000,000 campus. Included on the campus is a new gymnasium which is far superior to the former athletic and physical education plant. Although the campus is not yet complete the impressive buildings already standing are symbols of Dr. Plyler's accomplishments during his tenure.

Dr. Plyler is interested in all intercollegiate and intramural athletics. He is convinced of the immense value of competitive sports in the overall development of college students and under his capable leadership Furman is conducting a sound and well-rounded program of athletics.



THE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Athletic Director Lyles Alley has been the architect for the football program which enters its third season, an ambitious undertaking with Head Coach Bob King at the helm.

When the head football coaching position became vacant in December of 1957, Alley immediately set about trying to secure the man who was regarded unanimously among Furman supporters as the most ideal person for the job—Bob King.

Since then, and even before, Alley has been the spearhead in that all-important operation, the stimulating of support for the program, as well as being coordinator of the entire athletic program.

This position, combined with his post as varsity basketball coach and coordinator for the Hurricane Club, Furman's athletic support group, easily makes Alley one of the busiest collegiate figures in the country.

He has been athletic director since February, 1957, and begins his fifteenth season as basketball coach, and will also commence his fifth year as athletic director and Hurricane Club chief in February, 1961.

Alley was graduated from Furman in 1933 after winning 12 letters in football, basketball, baseball and track. He coached high school and textile teams at Taylors and at Miami, Fla. before World War II. During the war he was in the Navy, emerging as a lieutenant in 1945, when he came to Furman.

He guided Furman from wartime inactivity in basketball to the state championship his first year. The season after he was away, Furman had a 3-20 won lost record and the next season was named the most improved team in the United States on the Dick Dunkel Rating System.

His teams were three-time national scoring champions in major college basketball and for three consecutive seasons, 1954, 1955, 1956 he had a representative on the first All-America basketball team of the Associated Press in Frank Selvy and then Darrell Floyd.

At the end of the 1956 basketball season, he was selected as coach for the East team in the Shrine East-West game in Kansas City. He is presently a member of the Southern Conference Basketball Committee and a past president of the Southern Conference Basketball Coaches Association.



VINCE PERONE

Vince Perone takes time from his many business enterprises to coaching the guards and has several fine proteges coming along this season which will bolster the interior of the Hurricane forward wall.

A 1954 graduate of Furman, Vince was an all-Southern guard in his last playing season. After he graduated he opened his own sandwich business which he still operates in Greenville while assisting in football on a part-time basis.

In addition to making the best sandwiches in town, Vince also operates the finest delicatessen in Greenville, Perone and Fritz, 25 S. Pleasantburg Drive and the Three-Minute Car Wash on Laurens Road.

Vince is married to the former Joyce Scheibner of Hackensack, N. J. his own home town and they have two boys and a girl, Vince Jr., 8, Steve 7, and daughter Sherry, 2.



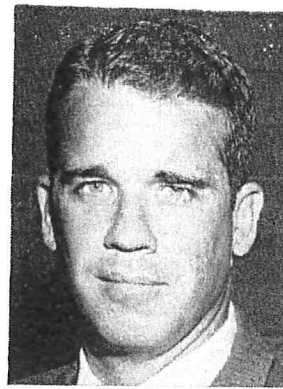
BOB GONGOLA

Youthful Bob Gongola, former quarterback for the fighting Illini, was a member of the 1952 Rose Bowl team which defeated Stanford, 40-7. He joined the Hurricane staff in the summer of 1958, begins his third season as quarterback coach and will handle the halfbacks and fullbacks on offense. Prior to his appointment here, he was freshman backfield coach at the University of Illinois.

A 1955 graduate of Illinois, Gongola is thoroughly schooled in the King system of play and will be spending a great deal of time with the backs teaching passing techniques as well as coaching them on punting fundamentals. He still holds the punting record for Illinois.

His military service during World War II included two years in the Navy, 1955-57. He is married to the former Ann Pennington of Phoenix, Arizona. The Gongolas have one son, Christopher Scott, 7 months old.

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MACK ERWIN

Greenville native Mack Erwin returned to his home town in July, joining the Furman staff as defensive backfield coach and head baseball coach. Mack served on the Citadel staff since 1957 and last season skippered the cadets to the Southern Conference baseball crown.

A graduate of Davidson (1950) Erwin was a slashing fullback in the single-wing attack the Wildcats used under fabled coach Bill Story. He entered the coaching profession first at Darlington Prep, then moved to Johns Hopkins where he served as head baseball coach and backfield coach.

Coach Erwin is one of the most successful baseball coaches in the college ranks and has produced championship teams at every college. Mack is also considered one of the best football scouts in the nation and will combine these duties with his principal assignment of backfield defense.

Mack is married to the former Martha Walker of China Grove, N. C. and they have one son, Mack III.



DICK COPAS, TRAINER

Furman's new trainer who joined the staff a few weeks before the opening of the 1960 season is 26-year old Dick Copas, former assistant trainer at Auburn.

A native of Albany, Georgia, Copas was an all-state high school center at Jefferson, Georgia before attending Auburn. He became interested in training during his college days and served as student trainer for three years and held the post of assistant trainer for one year. He graduated from Auburn in 1959.

Copas comes to Furman highly recommended by Kenny Howard, Auburn's head trainer, considered one of the finest in the country.

He is married to the former Ernestine Moody of Albany and they have one child, Kathy Lynn, four years of age.

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PURPLE HURRICANE BY POSITION

ENDS

Two lettermen, Bill Newman and Tom Walter are holding the number one posts at left and right end respectively. Both will be juniors in the fall. John Davis, 6-3, 200 prospect from Lancaster, a sophomore was rated number two behind Newman; Al Martin, another rising soph listed as third string end. Martin was one of the defensive giants of the '59 frosh. On the right flank behind Walter came Roger Senter, last year's outstanding punter among the newcomers. Best pass receiver of the group: Bill Newman. Best defensive end: Tom Walter.

TACKLES

Best tackle of the top six would be Joe Monti, Southern Cal transfer—6-0, 240—probably All-Conference lineman, a sophomore from Minersville, Pa. He will man the right post while at left tackle Marvin Behlke, senior from Lake Worth, Florida looms as starter although a strapping 6-4, 235 Olin Hill, another Floridian (Lakeland) and a rising soph, may be the big surprise at this position in the fall. On the right side behind Monti comes a good steady senior, Joe Olliff who has sophomore Carroll Hartley from Davisboro, Ga. pushing for the second team spot. Hartley was moved from end to tackle in the spring drills. Bob Mondo, a 5-10, 240 sophomore from Oak Park, Illinois round out the tackle candidates.

GUARDS

Two sophomore "veterans", lettermen John Tew and Claude Davis are the key figures at this position. Both lettered as sophs in '59, will be rising juniors in 1960. Tew (6-0, 205) is the strongest man on the squad, and could well be the defensive genius in the line this year. Davis started in most of the ten games last season, is becoming more polished at the interior line position. Bill Ogborn, Georgia Tech transfer rates the second team spot behind Davis and Wayne Belskis, letterman, also a junior, backs up Tew. George Langan, moved from center to guard this spring is a third team candidate and Jim Chapin, junior letterman is the third man behind Ogborn at left guard. Guards should be improved with four letterman of the top six slated for the major assignments.

CENTERS

Two rising juniors and one sophomore head the center contingent. Larry Jepson, strapping 6-4, 226 blonde from Ashtabula, Ohio and Jack Sharp (6-1, 200) Atlanta are the upperclassmen candidates. Ken Trammel, 185 pound soph and senior Jerry Roberts, round out the center contingent.

Jepson is considered Furman's prime hopeful as All-Conference material for the coming year at center. Bigger and stronger this season, Jepson is developing into one of Furman's top linemen, is rated as the best linebacker on the squad, a rugged defensive stalwart.

QUARTERBACK

Billy Canty and Buddy Revels, the Mississippi twosome, Bruce Davis, Clemson transfer and Elton Brunty, the latter two out of the freshman class are the four men showing promise. Canty is leading the pack (he completed 19 of 59 passes in '59 for 223 yards and two TD's—his est single game was against Richmond when he completed 10 of 20 for 87 yards)—Davis and Revels very close—Davis getting the nod for second team in the spring—All three QB's over six feet, the only backs outside of fullback George Angelica standing six feet or taller. Canty and Revels the lettermen, both juniors with two good understudies in Davis and Brunty.

HALFBACKS

At left half, Bradley Fowler runs the first team post fullback. Fowler the strongest runner of the halfbacks, followed by Tony Carmignani and Ted Loth. All lettered as Carmignani considered the best pass receiver. Defensive specialist Sam Taylor, senior letterman, won the starting assignment at right half but there will be competition from Bill Noonan, University of Maryland transfer and Don Kemp, the kickoff and punt return specialist rounding out his senior year. Average weight of backs around 135—no breakaway runner in the group but good speed among more experienced men.

FULLBACKS

Last year's leading ground gainer George Angelica coupled with the top scorer of the 1959 season Tom Campbell will battle for the starting spot here. Angelica led in individual rushing with a net of 453 yards and a 4.0 average. Campbell, with the highest rushing average of the Furman backs (5.2) was second in individual yardage with 262 on an even 50 carries. Tom had four TD's to his credit for the year. Angelica is the Hurricane's fastest back, and was tipping the scales at 215 at the close of winter drills. Campbell, the "dead leg" runner is also Furman's clutch runner, a hard man to bring down, a game little competitor standing 5-9, 190. Gary Hancock, a 5-10, 200 pound junior from North Charleston, S. C. and sophomore George Rapinchuk, 6-0, 190, Chicago are making the fullback picture interesting. Most of the 1960 mileage will be run up however by Angelica and Campbell.

IN THE HURRICANE HUDDLE

BACKFIELD BAROMETER

QUARTERBACKS

10 BUDDY REVELS, 20, 6-2, 185, Junior, Hattiesburg, Mississippi—Has leadership qualities for the QB spot, a good student, stands to take over either the top or alternate eleven. Revels has the equipment, will gain experience and poise as a junior this fall. Is a good running quarterback and his improvement in spring practice puts him high on the list for a major share of signal calling duty. Had one TD pass to his credit in '59—19 yard toss to Don Kemp in end zone—Chattanooga.

11 BRUCE DAVIS, 19, 6-3, 198, Sophomore, Lancaster, S. C.—Fine looking prospect whose outstanding speed and defensive ability qualifies him for service at two positions, quarterback and halfback. Lack of overall team speed may find Davis shifted to halfback ere the season is too far gone. Is considered the fastest quarterback, possibly the fastest man on the team. Look for Davis to be in the Furman picture in the future and definitely this season.

12 ELTON BRUNTY, 19, 5-10, 175, Sophomore, Hardy, Kentucky—The best quarterback prospect to come up from the frosh ranks—Brunty is the crowd-pleaser of the QB corps—a daredevil type, he exudes confidence in every movement—Was a standout in the Kentucky High School All-Star game before enrolling at Furman in 1959. He will be pushing for a starting role—lacks a year of experience but a top contender in '60—a fine young prospect. Did a fine job with the '59 frosh.

15 BILLY CANTY, 19, 6-1, 185 Junior, Pascagoula, Mississippi—Most seasoned of the quarterbacks—Canty is the best passer on the club—had 19 for 59 last year, 223 yards, two TD passes, both in the Davidson game. Coaches looking for Canty to show spark of last season. Lack of top receivers hampered Canty's overall passing record in '59—Is a long ball thrower and can break up a ball game with a flick of the wrist—Canty will handle the aerial team with Revels the drive series quarterback.

HALFBACKS

44 BRADLEY FOWLER, 20, 5-10, 175, Junior, Greenwood, S. C.—Best blocker in the backfield—one of the best short-yardage runners on the squad, Fowler earned a first string post in spring drills. Was third in individual rushing last season—a net of 227 yards on 68 carries for a 3.3 average—lost only 9 yards from line of scrimmage—On the receiving end of 7 passes for 70 yards—a tough, hard runner, Fowler will be hard to move out of the first team left half spot.

24 TONY CARMIGNANI, 20, 5-10, 187, Junior, Clarendon Hills, Ill.—Top pass receiver on team—can break up a game with an outstanding run or catch—Was close behind Fowler at end of spring practice at second unit left half—had a great season on the baseball team—a good, all-round athlete who will not do much bench warming in '60.

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21 SAM TAYLOR, 21, 5-10, 185, Senior, Avondale, Georgia—One of the senior captains of the '60 squad—was quarterback up to the middle of the '59 season—one of the defensive specialists—got two TD's last season, against CW and Davidson—a good tackler—was leading the pack at right half in off-season drills—A former All-Stater in football, baseball and basketball during his high school days in Avondale, Georgia—Taylor has the goods and will play in '60.

41 SHELLY SUTTON, 21, 5-10, 155, Senior, Fort Mill, S. C.—Senior Captain, extra point, field goal and defensive specialist—talented right toe good for 18 points in '59—one of the outstanding pass defenders on the squad. The inspirational leader of the team, the morale-builder who packs a lot of football in his 155 pounds. A mainstay on the baseball nine, Sutton is one of the "great little guys" in Furman athletics. Made 9 of 12 EPA's and had 3 for 5 field goals.

42 TED LOTH, 20, 5-10, 185, Junior, Millburn, N. J.—Another one of the scat-backs and a hustling letterman making a strong bid for the first two platoons. Spring listing on the third team left half behind Fowler and Carmignani. Has played fullback and halfback since coming to Furman—has quick opening speed which makes him a great prospect at halfback—played fullback most of '59. Had a 6.2 rushing average—21 carries, gained 130, lost only 5 for a net of 125.

21 DON KEMP, 21, 5-11, 155, Senior, Augusta, Ga.—Probably as devastating a tackler for his size as any player in the Southern Conference—Kemp is called a vicious tackler, the punt return and kickoff return specialist—Had the longest punt return of '59 (64 yards against Richmond) and lugged an intercepted pass 41 yards against Davidson for another single game high. A game competitor who was second in pass receiving last season (9 for 138 and a TD against Chattanooga), fifth in individual rushing (42 times carried, 114 net for a 2.7 average.)

40 JERRY THOMAS, 19, 5-10, 170, Sophomore, Birmingham, Ala.—A nifty little scooter, Thomas is a real speed merchant, an offensive threat who looked the part of a future star in the spring game. Definitely the top frosh halfback up from the '59 squad—This boy will play in '60—very fast, one of the most elusive halfbacks on the backfield roster.

27 JIM SUMNER, 19, 5-10, 175, Sophomore, Tampa, Fla. another budding sophomore who needs that extra year of experience and seasoning.

FULLBACKS

30 GEORGE ANGELICA, 19, 6-1, 215, Junior, Paterson, N. J.—Leading ground gainer in '59—a high-stepping runner who is the powerhouse in the backfield. Slashed through the opposition for a net total of 453 yards last season for a 4.0 average. Top single game was PC when he scored two touchdowns, carried the ball 21 times for 119 yards—averaged 5.6 and did not lose a yard. Will be more of a threat this fall—gets the call for a lot of ball handling, and is developing into a powerful up the middle threat.

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34 TOM CAMPBELL, 20, 5-9, 190 Junior, Plymouth Meeting, Pa.—Furman's leading scorer in '59, the man with the best rushing average (5.2) Campbell also credited with the longest run, a 50-yard gallop up the middle for a TD against George Washington and he was on the receiving end of the longest pass play of the year, 59 yards and a TD against the Citadel. Did not see action until third game of season (Chattanooga), leg injuries limited his duty for most part of '59—he still came up with second leading rushing average (262 on 50 carries)—a hard man to bring down, Campbell can come up with the big yardage when the pressure is on.

31 GEORGE RAPINCHUK, 19, 6-0, 180, Sophomore, Chicago, Ill.—One of three top sophomore prospects at fullback—was most impressive in the spring game—possesses great break-away speed—a former halfback, the young Chicagoan has the talent and drive to carry him to one of the top varsity posts in a very short time.

32 JOHN CHERRY, 19, 6-0, 185, Sophomore, Paterson, New Jersey—Fourth fullback on roster—fastest of the fullbacks needs a season of experience and he will be ready—had his toughest battle last year with old man injury as frosh—good prospect.

33 GEARY HANCOCK, 20, 5-10, 200, Junior, North Charleston, S. C.—A steady performer bidding for a top spot—third team rating following spring practice—will have a lot of competition ahead for first or second unit—will probably see more action than last season—outfielder and catcher on baseball team.

Storm Warnings in the Line

CENTERS

50 LARRY JEPSON, 19, 6-4, 230, Junior, Ashtabula, Ohio—Furman's choice for All-Southern Conference honors in 1960—not many centers will top the "big Swede" who had a fine year as a sophomore—the Jepson tackle of P. C. Thaxton in the William and Mary game resulting in a Jim Boroff recovered fumble started the Hurricane on their winning drive over the Indians last fall at Williamsburg. Coaches say the only thing that stands between him and greatness on the gridiron is a killer instinct—best line-backer on team, Jepson is developing into a tremendous defensive ball player—considered a real pro prospect, one of the youngest players in college football to show so much praise—had 3 pass interceptions last year and almost broke up the Citadel game with a near interception at the 15-yard line.

53 JACK SHARP, 20, 6-1, 200, Junior, Atlanta, Ga.—Showed more improvement in spring than the majority of the team and will play a lot of football this year—was number two center in 1959. The Atlanta junior is holding the number two spot this season, a valuable cog backing up Jepson.

54 KEN TRAMMELL, 19, 6-1, 185, Sophomore, Clinton, S. C.—Young and fast, Trammell rounds out the varsity centers—shows signs of developing into one of the future Furman greats—fine prospect who will bear watching.

GUARDS

60 BILL OGBORN, 19, 6-0, 210, Sophomore, Cairo, Ill.—Georgia Tech transfer—will have to fight off the bid of four lettermen at guard from '59—was listed as second team at close of spring practice at left guard behind Claude Davis—will help the cause at the vital interior lineman spot—not to be counted out this season even though just a sophomore.

61 ED FLYNN, 19, 5-9, 225, Sophomore, Millburn, N. J. Flynn has an uphill battle with more lettermen returning at guard than any other forward wall post. Rough and tough, he loves football and eventually will play—experience the answer but coaches feel he will produce in the future—a good solid guard prospect on the way up.

62 JIM CHAPIN, 19, 6-1, 210, Junior, Chevy Chase, Md.—Lettered as sophomore in '59—showed much improvement with additional season of experience—good, steady lineman he recovered after inactivity as freshman due to injuries to come along fast the past year—one of the mainstays at guard—third left guard post in spring—former All-American High School star at Chevy Chase.

PIGSKIN FORECAST

The 1960 University of Richmond football squad will number only 11 lettermen among a small squad of less than 40, so lack of depth will be the big problem.

"This year's FIRST team will be about as strong as that of last year," says Coach Ed Merrick. "We'll have a little better speed but our passing and running game will depend on the development of Mel Rideout (a sophomore) and Dick Curl (a third stringer in '59) at quarterback."

Rideout showed up well in spring practice and has the edge over Curl at present. They'll team with such experienced hands in the backfield as Halfbacks Earl Stoudt (who averaged 4.6 yards in 74 carries last season), Art D'Arrigo and Ron Ridenhour and Co-Captain Johnny Baggs and Jim McGinnes, fullbacks. Brent Vann is regarded as an "excellent sophomore halfback."

Junior Don Christman (whom Merrick expects to be the finest linebacker in the Southern Conference) moves into the No. 1 center spot with Bob Sizer and Joe Pesansky, providing he recovers from a knee injury, at the guard posts. The first three tackles will be Co-captain Bob Buffman, Joe Teefey and Bill Daughtrey. Bob Coolbaugh (a fine pass receiver who caught 26 tosses last season) and Art McGee return at the ends with Sophomore George Rapp regarded as "a real prospect".
