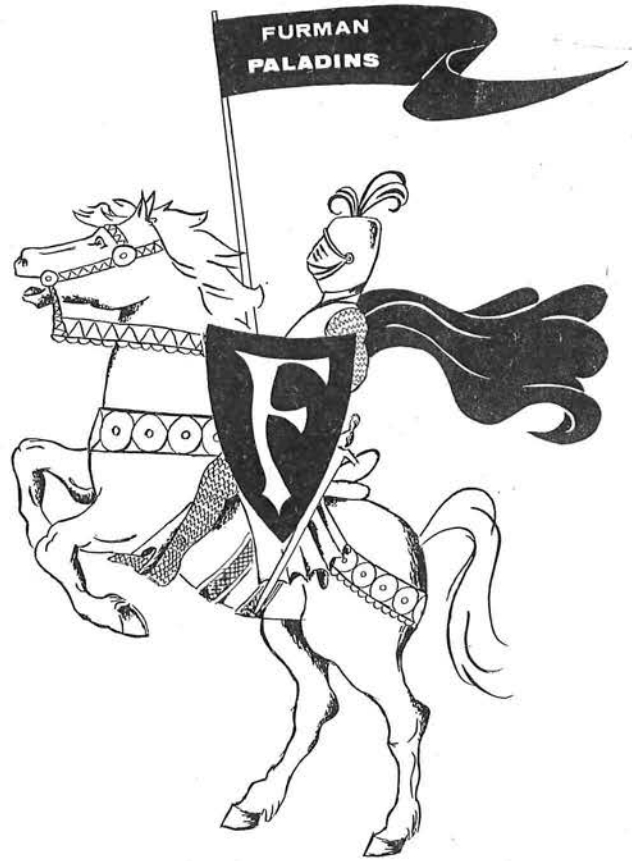

FURMAN'S HOMECOMING

(Excerpts from Editorial, *The Greenville News*,
Oct. 14, 1961)

Furman University, which has been an integral part of Greenville since the earliest days of the beginning of its growth from trading post and country town into a metropolis of unlimited potential, today will celebrate its annual homecoming day.

This is a big day for Furman and for Greenville, and hardly less so for the state and the cause of better education in South Carolina . . .

Nothing, so far as we can see, has been left out of the program to attract everyone who has an interest in Furman or the program of the small, private college which is assuming an ever more important role in higher education in the United States.

Furman combines all of the attributes of a university offering a broad program with those of the small college with the intimate associations among students and faculty . . .

Furman, now more than ever, offers a balanced program of the liberal arts and sciences. It has produced some of the most distinguished ministers in the South and nation. It has produced its share of the scientists, some of whom are world renowned, to say nothing of teachers and business administrators.

Furman has reached the point where almost "every prospect pleases."

From its science labs and library to the athletic field, Furman is rebuilding and moving forward. It now has probably the best football team it has had since Athletic Director Lyles Alley and Coach Bob King were making gridiron history on teams which could play on even terms with almost any school on their schedule.

Without over-emphasis, this is an important part of campus life. Furman has retained, expanded and improved its perspective.

But there seems to be a new spirit about the place. And it is wholesome, perhaps dynamic.

It's a small thing, perhaps, but the new athletic symbol, "The Paladin" astride a mighty white horse, has stirred more minds than those of sports fans. The campus newspaper, known as "The Furman Hornet" for longer than we can remember, is now "The Furman Paladin" and it bears on its masthead the motto, "To Strive, To Seek, To Find and Not to Yield."

COACH BOB KING'S PRESS CONFERENCE

At the end of spring practice I felt that if we had played the 1961 team against our present team we will field this fall, it would be a fine football game and that it would be difficult to pick the winner.

Now this statement may indicate some unwarranted optimism on my part about the 1962 team, because last year's football team had some fellows on it who have proven themselves to be very fine players, no guess work about it, namely: Tom Campbell, Tony Carmignani and Billy Canty. I may be overly optimistic when I say these men and almost a dozen other seniors may be amply replaced.

The obvious question is whether we can replace the C combination in the backfield. They will be hard to replace but at the close of spring drills George Rapinchuk had earned the fullback spot replacing Campbell, Sammy Pickens at right half was in Carmignani's former position and Elton Brunty had added a touch of Kentucky talk to the signal calling post formerly occupied by the slow-drawing Mississippian, Billy Canty.

Rapinchuk is able to go both ways, is not the runner Campbell was, but will make up for that in other phases of the game. George will be one of our key men on the defensive specialists roster. Pickens has many of the same characteristics of Carmignani, good blocker, good pass receiver and a fine runner. Brunty is a natural born leader and will make up for his lack of size with fine leadership qualities and determination.

We will have a problem this year of maintaining adequate depth. There is some question if we can continue our three-team system. We would like very much to be able to do that. Our mission in spring practice was of course to find replacements for the fourteen graduating lettermen. We were able to do that by transferring Doug Dillard to guard from his tackle spot. Doug Stacks took over the center position vacated by Larry Jepson and Jack Sharp and of course I have mentioned the changes in the first string backfield.

I would have to say that the highlights of Spring practice centered around Doug Dillard's development at guard and the tremendous job Olin Hill did at tackle. The work of Hill this year far exceeded our expectations at this position.

Actually, I could break down the off-season drills with possibly three highlights worthy of mention. First, the fine progress of Hill and Dillard, secondly, Elton Brunty holding on against Doug Watkins for the number one QB job and third, Doug Stacks taking over at center and doing a terrific job there. Let me add a fourth—the good defensive work and versatility shown by George Rapinchuk at fullback.

We found that by moving Pete Luongo from center to end that we strengthened our flanks. Pete will be a junior this fall. His speed and ability to catch a football will add considerably to our passing attack. Another pleasant surprise was Everett McTeer at right halfback who was able to hold his ground against Bill Chastain. McTeer earned a second team berth over Bill, who is considered to be one of our outstanding halfback prospects.

The fine attitude of John Gettys, a Presbyterian transfer, was also something to talk about in March. All three,

Luongo, McTeer and Gettys are on the second team at left end, right half and right tackle respectively. I like to think of them as the "three phenomenal upstarts" . . . all pleasant surprises in the spring and I am sure they will more than hold their own against the opposition this fall.

Our Saturday scrimmages, which were generally high scoring affairs, were other high spots in our preparation for the coming season and it means that we are going to be able to move the ball offensively. We have Pickens and Cook on that first team at the halfback posts, both of whom have enough size and speed to be good blockers and pass receivers. They are better than average ball carriers. We will continue to use the pro-type offense with flankers and split ends. And we will continue to put the ball in orbit as we have in the past. We have had one of the leading passers in the nation since I have been at Furman and this season the Furman offense will be just as colorful and exciting as in previous years.

It appears that our overall speed will be greater particularly in the line and at the halfback positions. Another strong point: our receivers are better and if our passing should come up to par, we will have a better passing attack. Elton Brunty and Doug Watkins will have to come through for us here. Our strength, wherever it turns out to be, will be fairly evenly distributed but we do feel that we are going to be improved in our overall team speed. It is impossible to say before the season begins that we are going to be stronger at any one position.

You ask about a particular position lacking in depth, well, you never have enough big, tough tackles or talented quarterbacks and you never have enough break-away backs. I can't say that we are weaker at center than at guard, or fullback as opposed to halfback. True, we lost two fine centers and have only one letterman back, Doug Stacks. However, we are not discounting Stacks' ability and feel that our first team center will be one of our strong positions. Stacks excels on defense and likes to tackle.

If I were to name some leading candidates for All-Conference honors it would have to be Olin Hill and Joe Monti at tackle. Both are seniors, both top prospects for All-Conference. Next would be Elton Brunty, Rodger Senter and Ed Flynn, at quarterback, end and guard. One man on the team for All-Conference? Olin Hill, our co-captain, tackle, senior, at 6-4, 235 from Lakeland, Florida.

We have had a steady improvement in the last four years and we feel we have now reached a normal football program. We realize that it would be impossible to continue indefinitely, but in my opinion, if we are able to continue our present program, we will never have a real bad football team!

I am looking forward to another very fine football season. It looks as though football is growing in popularity every year. We had more people see Furman play last year than perhaps at any other time in the history of the school. The interest in our program is increasing in the Greenville area by leaps and bounds.

Top stars on the team? Well, every one on our first team is a star as far as I'm concerned and we hope you feel that way when we finish our 1962 campaign at Tampa on November 17.



ROBERT B. KING
Head Coach

Robert B. (Bob) King is at once one of the most popular and accomplished athletic figures ever to graduate from Furman.

His presence as head football coach at Furman has been one of the greatest solidifying forces the University has ever had for its athletic program. Never had there been so much enthusiasm shown by the alumni and the administration as when he returned to his alma mater.

After eleven years as one of the most highly praised assistants in the Big Ten, King in December of 1957 accepted the job as head coach of the school where he was so renowned as an athlete.

During his coaching tour at Illinois, the Illini were Big Ten champions once, tied for the title once and were Rose Bowl champions one year.

King was graduated from Furman in 1937 after playing end on three teams that won twenty games and lost only seven. He is still regarded as the greatest end in Furman's history. After graduation, King served as an assistant until World War II. He played and coached at Chapel Hill as a Naval officer in 1942 and returned to Furman in 1946 as an assistant. The next year he went to the University of Illinois as end coach.

King is a native of Ranger, Texas. His tremendous enthusiasm for football and his enormous appetite for hard work has generated a healthy atmosphere throughout the entire athletic staff. A gifted after-dinner speaker, he is in demand for appearances throughout

the country at high school banquets, touchdown club rallies and various alumni meetings.

Coach King has an unusual flair for public relations, is held in high esteem by members of the press, radio and TV because of the mutual understanding with all members of the fourth estate concerning the value of good publicity.

The 1961 season was particularly significant. Coach King had seen his first team, the freshmen he brought to Furman in 1958, compile the best record of any Furman team since 1953. The Paladins last year had a 7-3-0 record with a 7-6 win over Memphis State in the books as one of the shocking gridiron upsets in the nation. The 1962 team gave promise in the winter drills of duplicating the performance of the '61 team. King has promised Furman fans the exciting type of football they witnessed last season, a multiple pro-type offense featuring wide flankers and plenty of aerial fireworks.

Under Coach King's tutelage and in the brief span of four years, Furman's prestige on the gridiron has risen steadily. A more selective group of freshmen entering school each year is indicative of the intelligent recruiting program he is conducting.

His personal interest in the welfare of each individual member of the team is just one example of his coaching philosophy. He is vitally concerned with a young man's progress in the classroom as he is with the development of the player on the football field.

Bob King received many honors during the past year including "Bob King Appreciation Night" at Homecoming November 11. For the tremendous job he had done during the '61 campaign, the South Carolina Sportswriters Association named him Coach of the Year in South Carolina.



JOHNNY MENGER, former star halfback at Georgia Tech, joined the Furman staff July 9, 1961, replacing Mack Erwin.

Menger had been head coach at Druid Hills High School in Atlanta for two years. He is a 1958 graduate of Georgia Tech. Johnny is considered one of the promising young coaches in football today and in his first season at Furman his tutoring ability was evidenced in both the offensive and defensive strength of the Paladin backfield. He was an outstanding halfback for Georgia

Tech for four years and has the unique distinction of participating in four post-season bowl games.

John saw action when Tech defeated West Virginia 42-19 in the 1954 Sugar Bowl; when Tech defeated Arkansas 14-6 in the 1955 Cotton Bowl; when Tech defeated Pitt 7-0 in the 1956 Sugar Bowl and against Pittsburgh the following year, Tech taking the Panthers 21-14 in the Gator Bowl.

Menger had been All-Southeastern Conference third baseman in 1956 and 1957. He was signed to a pro contract by the Athletics. Johnny had a season in the Sally League. He decided to give up baseball for coaching since he had been assistant freshman coach at Tech in 1957-58.

He became head coach at Druid Hills in 1959. In two seasons his football teams had a record of 11-7-2. His principal duties will be coaching the Furman half-backs on offense and the deep back on offense.

Johnny and his attractive wife, Ann, have two sons, one three years old and the youngest, a year and a half.



RICHARD GASKELL, former George Washington star lineman, joined the Furman staff in July of this year. He replaces Dixie Howell and will share line coaching duties with Harold Turpin. He graduated in 1955 with a B.A. and he also earned a Master's in 1962.

Gaskell was a four year varsity lineman at GW (1951-54), was Honorable Mention in two All-Star games, the Blue-Gray and the Senior Bowl and was the 13th draft choice of the San Francisco 49ers and he was also associated with the Green Bay Packers.

His high school coaching experience has centered mainly around the Arlington, Virginia area. He served at John Carroll High School, Washington; Columbian Prep, Washington and Wakefield High School in Arlington. He has also had five years of teaching experience in Physical Education and Psychology.

Gaskell is 29 years old, married to the former Patricia Ann Reed and they have three children, Deborah Lee, 8, Karen Ann, 5, and Linda Kay, 2.



HAROLD TURPIN, highly successful football coach at Ridgeland (S. C.) High School for the past seven years, was named line coach at Furman to replace Bobby Jennings, on July 28.

Athletic Director Lyles Alley announced that the coaching staff was now complete with the signing of Turpin.

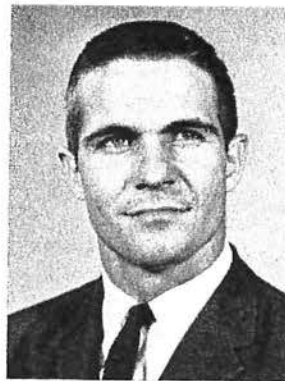
"We are particularly pleased to have a Furman graduate join the athletic staff," Alley commented at that time. "Hal played football and baseball here in '38 and

'39 when Dizzy McLeod was head coach. He was quite an outstanding baseball player in the textile league in the late '30's when baseball was so popular in this area. I have known him personally for many years and feel he will make a real contribution to our athletic program."

Turpin coached football and baseball at Pelzer and also taught there before accepting the head football coaching post at Ridgeland High. For the past seven years, he has not only produced winning teams but many of the individual players he has coached have been outstanding in collegiate football. Henry Crosby, half-back at South Carolina, Claude Davis, one of Furman's top linemen who finished last year and Walter Crosby, a rising junior at Furman this fall, are three former Ridgeland stars.

Turpin's teams have won four South Carolina High School Conference eight B titles, three of them coming in successive years from 1959 through 1961. The seven year grid record, most impressive in any league was 55 wins and 13 losses.

Turpin is married to the former Leoda Jordan and they have three children, Barry, 22, a senior at Furman, Ronald, 19, a sophomore at Clemson and Mary Beth, 10.



Athletic Director Lyles Alley announced on June 2 that **JACK POWERS**, former Furman football player and graduate of the class of 1957, would join the athletic staff as student assistant this fall.

Powers will not be a full time football coach as he is returning to Furman to continue academic work in graduate school and has agreed to assist Coach Bob King with the football program.

Powers is a native of Mullins, S. C. and attended Mars Hill Junior

College before enrolling at Furman. He lettered in base-

ball and track in addition to his favorite sport, football. While at Mars Hill, Jack was president of the Baptist Student Union, a member of the college football team and a member of the Philomaethian Literary Society. He was an above average student while at Furman and following graduation served as Assistant Pastor in the summer of 1957 at Andrews, S. C. Baptist Church. He taught for one year at Buchanan, Ga. High School and was backfield coach and also coach of the boys' basketball team.

In February of 1958 he entered the Marine Corps OCS at Quantico and in June received his commission as 2nd Lt. He continued his military service at Pensacola Naval Air Station and won his Naval Aviator wings in June of 1960. He served overseas at Okinawa from February 1961 to May 1962 when he was released from active duty. He played one season with the Pensacola NAS varsity football team and also played varsity ball while on duty in Okinawa.

Powers is married to the former Gayle Sharp, also a Furman graduate, class of '60, and they have twin sons, two years of age.

DICK COPAS, head trainer, begins his third season on the Furman staff. Dick is a 29 year old graduate of Auburn and was former assistant trainer at his alma mater before coming to Greenville.



A native of Albany, Georgia, Copas was an all-state high school center at Jefferson, Georgia before attending Auburn. He became interested in training during his college days and served as student trainer for three years and held the post of assistant trainer for

one year. He graduated from Auburn in 1959.

Copas joined the Furman staff a few weeks before the 1960 season. He is one of the most conscientious workers, he handles injury problems for all varsity sports and is on hand for spring activities as well as the Furman Summer Day Camp.

He came to Furman highly recommended by Kenny Howard, Auburn's head trainer, considered one of the finest in the country.

Dick is married to the former Ernestine Moody of Albany. They have two children, Kathy Lynn, six and Judi Lee, a year and three months of age.

1962 Season Outlook . . .

THE PALADIN BACKFIELD

Big replacement job in backfield will be the positions left vacant by QB Billy Canty (Senior Bowl standout last January), All-Conference and All-State FB Tom Campbell and halfback Tony Carmignani, who led the Southern Conference in pass receiving. Canty was 5th in the nation in final forward passing stats and Campbell finished 8th among the country's leading backs in rushing figures.

At fullback to fill Campbell's shoes will be **George Rapinchuk**, a 6-1, 195 senior from Chicago and **Elliott Keller**, 6-2, 195 junior, Clayton, Ga. Both are hard, straight up the middle chargers, good opening speed. Rapinchuk's defensive talents will be an asset to the team. One of his best games in the 1961 campaign was at Memphis State when Furman notched a startling upset in the mud, 7-6. George was the choice at end of spring drills to fill the FB post on the first platoon.

Keller was used more on offense last year although he did not carry the ball but 15 times. He did not lose a yard, ended the year with a 6.1 average with a net gain of 92 yards. Third fullback will be **Jim Sumner**, who had a great day against Memphis State with some cloud busting punts. He will share the kicking duties with **Rodger Senter**. Sumner had a 37.7 average last season (25 punts for 945 yards).

Furman will have seven returning lettermen at halfback. Leading ground gainer among the returnees is **John Cook**, a 6-1, 175 pound junior from Florence, S. C. Cook carried the ball 43 times, gained 210 yards, lost 2 for a net of 208 and a 4.8 rushing average. He is a fancy, hip-twisting back whose sparkling runs highlighted the spring drills. His flankman at right half will be **Sammy Pickens**, the strongest back on the team, whose abilities as a defensive specialist are as highly regarded as his value to the team as an offensive threat. Pickens has good speed and is a good blocker who could be used as a defensive specialist.

Paladin backfield will be faster than a year ago with second unit left half **Jerry Thomas** and third platoon **Bill Chastain** listed as Furman's fastest regulars.

Thomas' running mate on the second team will be rising junior **Everett McTeer**, a 5-11, 180 pounder from Haines City, Fla. **Walter Crosby**, the youngster who batted down an attempted extra point pass in the Memphis State game is listed at third unit left half.

McTeer, **Pickens** and **Ferguson** all saw about the same amount of duty on offense in '61 but will definitely handle the pigskin in the running attack to a greater extent than their average of 15 carries last season.

All of the first six backs are lettermen, with the exception of **Bill Chastain**, ineligible last season, but who returns to add depth to the halfback roster.

Senior Co-Captain Elton Brunty, an Eddie LeBaron type quarterback, 5-10, 175 pound native of Hardy, Ky. nailed down the top QB post after spring practice. He was another individual highlight sparking the "white"

team to a 19-18 edge over the "purples" in the intra-squad finale March 17. The scrappy field general hit on 10 of 14 passes in that game for 206 yards and he threw a 9 yard TD pass to end **Rodger Senter** in the closing minutes of the game. As a junior, Brunty will be remembered as the tough competitor who led the "Golden Goblins", Furman's famed gold platoon which relieved the first team on offense and sustained the Paladin march in many of the major victories.

The little Colonel from Kentucky who is sometimes referred to as the "Hardy Hammer" did a masterful job of signal calling in the spring game. He threw short passes, long passes, screens and sent his halfbacks and fullbacks through the right holes at the right time, for substantial gains and the winning TD's. He had passes of 42, 19, 15 and 9 yards but the big play in the final TD drive was a screen pass to **George Rapinchuk** which covered 33 yards.

Behind Brunty will be lanky **Doug Watkins**, a fine looking QB prospect, 6-3, 195, Decatur, Ga. Watkins runs the option well and would have slight edge over Brunty in speed. Watkins throws a hard pass on the short distances, but in the spring game he lobbed a 50 yarder to end **Pete Luongo**, pitched a 22 yard TD aerial to **HB Everett McTeer** and had an overall effort of 5 for 11 and 107 yards.

Watkins is the best safety and is another topflight defensive ball player. Doug averaged a respectable 5.6 yards per carry last season, saw action for only 26 offensive plays. He carried the ball 15 times, threw 11 passes.

The rangy **Watkins** gives Furman a double barreled attack at the QB spot . . . his threat as an option runner coupled with Brunty's field generalship and passing add a hopeful note to the position vacated by **Billy Canty**, one of Furman's finest quarterbacks. Not to be overlooked is **Danny Donovan**, a peppercorn at 5-9, 165, who was the leading rusher in the intra-squad game, tough and ready for reserve duty at the third team QB spot.

FURMAN LINE PROSPECTS

Loss of two lettermen at center, **Jack Sharp** and **Larry Jepson**, the latter All-Conference who recently signed with the '49ers. Top center prospect is **Doug Stacks**, whose main assets are speed, good snap and a good defensive blocker. He is also one of the hard-nosed players who loves to tackle, the best tlinebacker on the team. Stacks will be backed up by tough **Gerry Owens**, one of the best sophomore prospects who is a topflight defensive center.

Two prize tackles, **Co-Captain Olin Hill**, 6-4, 235 senior from Lakeland, Fla. and **Joe (Mountain) Monti**, a 6 foot 240 tank from Minersville, Pa. present formidable barriers at left and right tackle, respectively. "These are our All-American candidates," says Head Coach **Bob King**, who adds that they are the best tackles he has seen at Furman in five years.

Two fine prospects backing up the Hill and the Mountain are letterman **Charles Floyd**, a junior, Loris, S. C. (225) and **John Gettys**, promising soph, a PC transfer (220). Third team tackles are sophs **Richard Giddings**,

6-2, 200, Madison, N. J. and **Dennis Jepson**, 6-1, 210, Ashtabula, Ohio, younger brother of **Larry Jepson**, Furman's All-Conference center of 1961.

Doug Dillard, one of the pleasant surprises this Spring, did an outstanding job at guard, after playing tackle as a sophomore. He heads a trio of lettermen which include **Ed Flynn**, a rugged individual at right guard on the first team and **David Abercrombie**, Murrayville, Ga. senior who stands 6-1 and scales 200.

On the flanks, **Rodger Senter**, top punter and ace pass receiver, stayed at first team left end from opening day of winter drills. Senter is a senior from Marietta, Ga. considered a defensive stalwart in addition to his pass catching ability. A valuable member of the team, said after Spring practice that he was "ready and can't wait for that opening game."

Hayden Hays and **Doug Shaw**, two rising juniors who lettered as sophs, have earned posts on the first two clubs. **Shaw**, listed with Senter as best defensive end, will start at right end. **Shaw** is a 6-1, 195 athlete from Winnsboro, S. C. He is rated among the best pass receivers on the team along with Senter, and **Sammy Pickens**.

Hays, 6-2, 195 junior from Hartwell, Ga. will share end chores on the second platoon with **Pete Luongo**, who was moved from a center spot this season. **Luongo** grabbed a **Watkins** pass that covered 50 yards in the Spring game and caught another for 7 yards.

Senior letterman **John Davis**, 6-3, 200 pounder, Lancaster, S. C. and soph **Carl Kohrt, Jr.**, 6-2, 200, Tuscola, Ill. round out the top six flankers.

In a nutshell: Tackle will be one of the strongest positions in the line . . . Best tackles: **Olin Hill** and **Joe Monti**, All-Conference and All-American candidates.

Other probable All-Conference players: Guard **Doug Dillard**, QB **Elton Brunty**, End **Rodger Senter**, Halfbacks **John Cook** and **Sammy Pickens**.

Best sophomores: Guard **Walter Preston**, Tackle **John Gettys**, Center **Gerry Owens**.

Overall team speed will be good . . . Furman will have three elevens for competition.

First team line should be on equal terms with eight of the ten opponents this fall.

PALADIN CLUB REPORT

June 1, 1962

This is the final Paladin Club report of the current school year. It is filled with bright spots. Furman teams have compiled enviable records in every sport. But we cannot rest on the past. We must plan for the future, and act to provide the support which is necessary if Furman is to continue a sound, realistic sports program.

Much has been written and said in recent weeks about the Furman athletic program. Most of this has been intended to be factual and helpful. Unfortunately, the choice of words and comments at times have tended to distort the true picture.

After conferences with all responsible individuals at the University, we can report the following: the Furman athletic budget for the 1962-63 school year will be as great as in the past. It is not being cut. Instead, rising costs in every phase of university life made it necessary to appraise the athletic situation. This appraisal resulted in the formulation of a realistic athletic program of the same caliber now in effect. Simply stated, Furman is spending all the money it can afford in athletics. This means it cannot continue to expand its athletic program any further until additional revenue is secured through the Paladin Club, gate receipts, etc.

There is no cutback in the program. There is a leveling off, but this leveling off process is taking place at a very high level.

This process places the responsibility for further expansion squarely where it should be—on the shoulders of those who want Furman to compete on even terms with teams of the Southern Conference. Thus it will be necessary to continue the expansion of the Paladin Club membership. It will be necessary to sell more tickets to the various sports events.

The Paladin Club has more members and has raised more money this club year than in previous years. Our workers have done wonderful jobs, and to them we extend our most grateful appreciation. Yet we must continue to build. In fact, we need just about three times as much money as has been contributed thus far.

The unfortunate part of the Paladin Club work has been the lack of true support by Furman alumni. Only half of our contributions came from Furman alumni.

To those who are not members of the Paladin Club, we invite you to have a share in the future of Furman's athletic program by contributing to the club. Your check for \$10 or more sent to the Paladin Club at the university is all that's needed. To those who already are members, we solicit your help in securing new members.

By working together—coaches, players, alumni and friends—we can maintain a Furman athletic program that will be a real asset to the institution, the community and the state.

A KING'S EYE VIEW OF THE 1962 FURMAN FOOTBALL PICTURE

Capsule comments by Head Coach Bob King who begins his fifth season:

On the type of attack and what the fans can look for this fall:

"We will have an exciting team to watch. Furman will continue to use the multiple offense (pro-type) with the use of flankers and split ends."

"We will put the ball in orbit this year!"

In comparing the 1961 team that won 7, lost 3, King says:

"If we were to play this 1962 team against our club of '61, it would be difficult to forecast the outcome. Both teams would be fairly well balanced up front as well as in the backfield."

A rundown on the prospective first unit:

"I would say that each man on that first team is equally proficient on offense as defense . . . if Brunty turns out to be our number one quarterback, we will use a defensive specialist for him as we did for Canty last season."

On probable All-Southern Conference or All-American Candidates:

"Our outstanding players would have to be Co-Captain Olin Hill at left tackle and Joe Monti, right tackle. These men will stack up with any tackles in the country and are not only All-Conference material but I would say they merit consideration for All-American honors."

One more King quote:

"We should see the trend in college football this fall going to a more wide open brand of football with less emphasis placed on three yards and a cloud of dust. I haven't been convinced that this is the best offense to use. We will run a little and pass a little."
