## HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY

Furman University is known everywhere as the oldest Baptist college in the South. This co-educational liberal arts university was founded in 1826 as The Furman Academy and Theological Institution, being authorized by the South Carolina Baptist Convention in 1825.

First home of the University was in Edgefield, S. C. Inspiration for its establishment came from a small group of patriotic and religious leaders of the South. One of these was Dr. Richard Furman for whom the school was named. Descendants of Dr. Furman have played active roles with the University ever since.

Furman has been operated by the S. C. Baptist Convention since its beginning and has grown into one of the foremost educational institutions of the nation. A board of 25 trustees, named five each year for five-year terms, governs the University.

Since that modest beginning, Furman has had several locations. But in 1851 Furman moved to Greenville and has been a part of the blossoming Piedmont city ever since. It was that year that Furman was chartered as The Furman University in a village of 1,300. Now Furman has 1,450 students and Greenville's suburban area includes nearly 200,000 inhabitants.

Owning two campuses in downtown Greenville in the 1940's and 1950's, the University found itself without growing space. Both sites were small and insufficient for growth. In 1950 the trustees purchased 1,200 acres near Paris Mountain five miles north of the city. In 1958 about half of the modern buildings, made with Virginia hand-made bricks in a modified-colonial architecture, were completed. In 1961 the move from the city was completed. Plans go on to complete the \$30,000,000 campus with the finest of educational facilities in the South.

## FURMAN'S EIGHTH PRESIDENT

His teaching career began at Furman where he served as professor and head of the sociology department from 1937 to 1941. Dr. and Mrs. Blackwell have two sons and two daughters, and both sons graduated from Furman and were members of the basketball varsity (Gordon and Randy).

Dr. Gordon Williams Blackwell, a man well-known in South Carolina, was elected eighth president of Furman University during the summer. Dr. Blackwell is an alumnus of Furman and is now president of Florida State University. Because of pressing duties at the Florida institution, Dr. Blackwell will not be able to assume his new duties until early in 1965, but he has already assured the football coaching staff of his presence at as many Furman home games as possible.

Dr. Blackwell will replace Dr. John L. Plyler who retired August 31. He was chancellor at the Women's College of the University of North Carolina for three years, and in 1960 he left Greensboro to become president at Florida State. Dr. Blackwell is widely known as both an educator and sociologist. He is the author or co-author of six books and many articles.

## LYLES ALLEY, Athletic Director

Mr. Basketball at Furman—that's an appropriate name for head coach Lyles Alley. Coach Alley has been basketball coach at the University longer than anyone before him, and he is now in his 19th season.

The genial coach also serves Furman as athletic director but still finds time to turn out top-notch Paladin basketball teams. Coach Alley has had his share of stars at Furman through the years—to name them all would take a book. But players such as Effie Evington, Bob Stewart, Melvin Bell, Frank Selvy, Nield Gordon, Fred Fraley, Darrell Floyd, Dick Wright, Byron Pinson, Dag Wilson, Gerald Glur, and Jerry Smith surely stand among his best.

Lyles Alley became head coach at Furman in 1945.

Since becoming Furman's head basketball coach, he has been at the helm every season except 1949-50 when he studied at Columbia University for his master's degree.

## PURPLE PIGSKIN PREVIEW

Coach Bob King, head football coach for the Furman University Paladins, is beginning his seventh season with a 28-30-1 record. If he is to make this his fourth winning season, he must find adequate replacements for a dozen key players who have graduated. The only returnees from the starting lineup are guards Julian Carnes and Walt Preston and fullback Ernie Zuberer. King had 7-3 records in 1961 and in 1963—and was South Carolina Collegiate Coach of the Year both years. He has 19 lettermen returning—with five of them at guard, and 19 sophomores.

After that fine 7-3 season, including five wins over Vanderbilt, George Washington, and The Citadel—the Paladins will have a tough job to equal it. They have a rough schedule—with Clemson, Richmond, Citadel, East Carolina, and most of their other opponents being improved. The Paladins will probably rely on a solid running attack with Wyche and Watkins throwing. The team will be short on experience, but long on potential. The key to the season could be the maturing of some inexperienced players.

## THE PALADIN CLUB

### What Is the Paladin Club?

The Paladin Club is Furman University's athletic booster organization, formed by friends and alumni.

### Who Can Hold Membership?

The Paladin Club is not an exclusive organization in the strict sense. Any alumnus or friend interested in the progress of Furman University, who has an interest in the athletic program, can hold membership.

### Where Does the Money Go?

All contributions to the Paladin Club go to the University's business office where they are used for the educational needs of qualified students who have been awarded scholarships and who will be members of an athletic team at Furman.

### Who Receives Such Scholarships?

For the second year, Furman's scholarship program for athletes is based on (1) need, (2) scholarship and general ability, and (3) athletic ability. Athletes who qualify on the basis of these conditions (prescribed by the Awards Committee of the University), rules established by the NCAA, and rules of the Southern Conference, receive scholarships in varying amounts.

### How Can You Join?

You can join by sending a **minimum** donation of \$10.00 (tax deductible) to the Paladin Club, Furman University, Greenville, S. C.

Many alumni are members of the Paladin Club—but membership is by no means limited to Furman graduates. In fact, a college degree is not a requirement. Any friend who wants to help worthy students may join the Paladin Club. A weekly newsletter is mailed to all members, and a car decal is also furnished.

## HEAD COACH BOB KING



Securing Bob King as Furman's head football coach in December, 1957, was one of the greatest things that could happen to the University's athletic program. He attained greatness as an All-Southern Conference end during his playing days at Furman, and the popularity that he gained then has not diminished. He has long been one of Greenville's favorite citizens.

As he begins his seventh year at the helm of Furman's football fortunes, Bob King still exudes the enthusiasm and warmth that signifies his love for the game. He has been acclaimed as one of the most popular and accomplished athletic figures ever to graduate from Furman. His eternal optimism rubs off on his assistants, his players, and those who are associated with him. But while possessing a genial attitude—he is a strict taskmaster and his players respect him for it.

After 11 years as one of the most valued assistants in the Big Ten, King left the University of Illinois and accepted the job as head coach of his alma mater in December of 1957. He and his assistants faced a stupendous task. In the three seasons prior to his coming, Furman had won only seven games—once sinking to a 1-9 record. Slowly the building process began.

King's first year at Furman was rough. Playing a schedule that included Florida State, Alabama, Penn State, and Clemson, the Paladins won only two games. The following year, the mark was 3-7, and then in 1960—the team had a 5-4-1 mark. But 1961 was the big year for King and his men. Not only did the team have a 7-3 season, but they upset powerful Memphis State 7-6 and King was named S. C. Coach of the year. After a 4-6 record in 1962, the team bounced back last season with another 7-3 mark (including a 14-13 upset over Vanderbilt), and King was again named S. C. Coach of the Year. That brought his coaching record up to 28-30-1.

King graduated from Furman in 1937 with many nominations as an All-American end. During his college days, Furman won 20 football games and lost only seven. Later he served as an assistant coach at Furman until World War II. He played and coached at Chapel Hill Pre-Flight School as a naval officer in 1942, returning to Furman in 1946 as an assistant. The next year he went to the University of Illinois as end coach. During his coaching tour at Illinois, the Illini were Big Ten champions once, tied for the title once, and won the Rose Bowl once.

## THE PALADIN COACHES

### JACK POWERS . . . BACKFIELD COACH



Jack Powers, a former football player at Furman and graduate of the class of 1957, begins his third season as backfield coach and head baseball coach. Named as a student assistant June 2 of 1962, Powers continued his studies in graduate school last year but since that time, he has assumed the head baseball coaching position in addition to tutoring the Paladin backs.

Powers is a native of Mullins, S. C. and attended Mars Hill Junior College before enrolling at Furman. He lettered in baseball and track in addition to his favorite sport, football.

In February of 1958 he entered the Marine Corps OCS at Quantico and in June received his commission as 2nd Lt. He continued his military service at Pensacola Naval Air Station and won his Naval Aviator wings in June of 1960. He served overseas in Okinawa from February 1961 to May 1962 when he was released from active duty. He played one season with the Pensacola NAS varsity football team and also played varsity ball while on duty in Okinawa.

Powers is married to the former Gayle Sharp, also a Furman graduate, class of '60 and they have twin sons, Barry and Buzzy, four years of age.

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### RICHARD GASKELL . . . LINE COACH . . .



Richard Gaskell, a former standout lineman at George Washington University, joined the Furman coaching staff in July of 1962.

Gaskell was a four year varsity lineman at GW (1951-54) was honorable mention in two All-Star games, the Blue-Gray and the Senior Bowl. He was the 13th draft choice of the San Francisco 49ers and he was also associated with the Green Bay Packers.

A graduate of George Washington with a B. A. degree, Gaskell also earned a Master's Degree in 1962. His high school coaching experience prior to his appointment at Furman had centered mainly around the Arlington, Virginia area. He served at John Carroll High School, Washington; Columbian Prep, Washington and Wakefield High School in Arlington. He has also had five years of teaching experience in Physical Education and Psychology.

Gaskell is 31 years old, married to the former Patricia Ann Reed. They have three daughters, Deborah Lee, 10, Karen Ann, 7, and Linda Kay, 4.

## THE PALADIN COACHES

### BILLY CANTY . . . BACKFIELD COACH . . .



Billy Canty, co-captain of the 1961 Furman team and one of the school's outstanding grid stars of the past decade, returns to his alma mater and his first season as a college coach.

The soft-spoken Pascagoula, Mississippi athlete was a star of the Senior Bowl game in January of 1962, was signed with the Toledo Tornadoes of the United Football League, finishing the season in August of last year. He had originally signed with the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Football League and participated in exhibition games only with them before joining Toledo.

Canty still holds many school records and Southern Conference records in passing, among them the record for the most touchdown passes thrown in a single season. In 1960 his aerial marksmanship accounted for ten TD's. That same season he had the best percentage of all conference passers (54.8). He was among the six quarterbacks in the country that year who threw ten or more TD passes in the season.

Billy is married to the former Ann Lochridge, also a Furman graduate of '62 and whose home also is Pascagoula, Mississippi. Their only daughter, Christina, is one.

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### JIMMY WILLIAMS . . . LINE COACH



Jimmy Williams, former All-SEC grid star at the University of Georgia, joined the Furman staff shortly after the close of the regular school year. Williams, named to the All-Southeastern Conference team as a defensive back while a freshman at Georgia, had been head coach and end coach at Athens High School since 1961.

A native of Athens, Williams made the all-state prep team his last two years of high school. When he entered Georgia, freshmen were allowed to play with the varsity. He started every game on defense. In his junior year he had a knee injury in the Vanderbilt game, resulting in his being a spot player the final season of 1955.

In 1956 he became head coach at Sylvester (Ga.) High School and remained there until going to Athens High in 1961.

Williams is married to the former Mary Lou DuPriest of Sylvester and they have two sons, Hank, 6, and Mark, 4.

# Gary Meredith

Trainer Gary Meredith joined the athletic staff in August. He is fulltime trainer for all athletic teams at the University.

Meredith came to Furman from San Angelo, Texas, where he was trainer and a teacher in a high school there. He has had several years experience as trainer both in college and in high schools.

He is a graduate of Tennessee Tech with the B.S. degree and has done further study at Texas Western. He and his wife Martha have a daughter and two sons.

#### **86 WALKER KIMBELL Junior 6-1 192 Clayton, Ga.**

Though he did not see enough action to earn a letter last season, Walker has been watched closely by the Furman coaching staff for two years. This could be his year. He is a talented all-around end, and should start the season at first team right end. Favorite athlete is Jim Taylor of Green Bay.

#### **80 TIM CRAWFORD Junior 6-0 200 Pacolet, S. C.**

Tim played much football last season, and is now the number one man at left end. He is a physical education major, and a rugged defensive man. He intercepted a pass against PC last season, and on many occasions made sensational tackles. Has a tendency to be vicious.

#### **83 RICK GILSTRAP Junior 6-1 184 Charleston, S. C.**

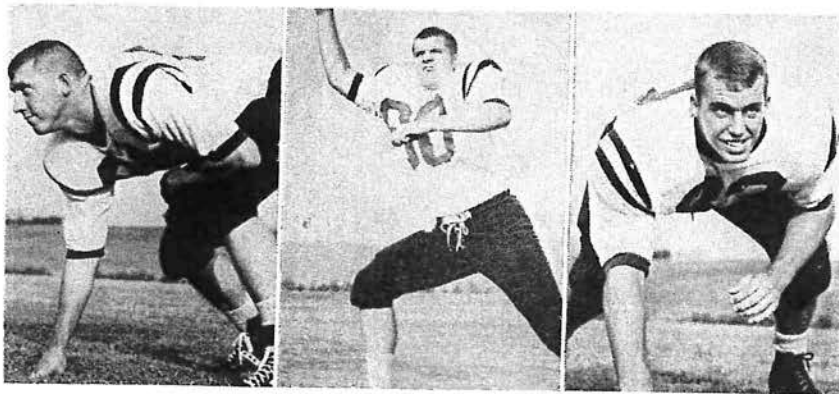
Last season as a sophomore Rick played in several games. He was chiefly noted for his fine defensive play and really stopped West Virginia's end runs in the final game of the year. An all-around athlete, he starred in the state high school all-star football game as a high school senior. Starts the season as second team left end.

#### **84 BILL CARTY Sophomore 6-4 228 Malden, Mass.**

One of the biggest men on the varsity squad, Bill starred last year with the unbeaten freshman team. He played a rough defensive game, and was outstanding as a receiver. Though he was noted last season mainly for his kicking ability, Dusty can also play the end position well. He won two frosh games with extra points and a field goal. In one of the spring scrimmages, he nabbed an aerial and galloped for a 50-yard TD. Shows promise, and starts season as third unit right end.

**82 ROBERT HUCKABEE Soph. 6-2 170 Lyman, S. C.**

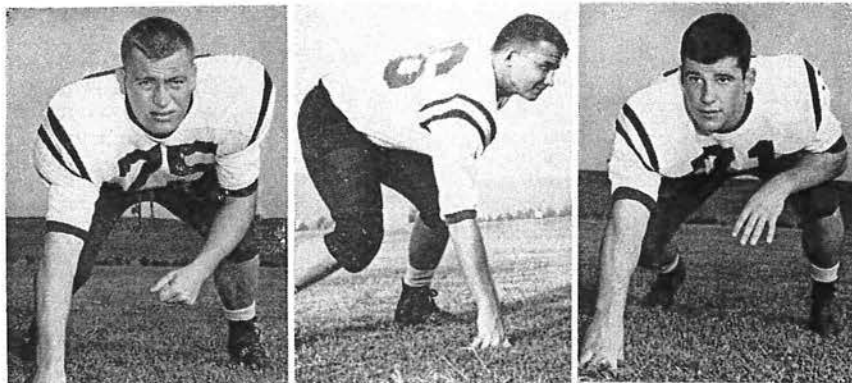
Huckabee is another of the sophomore ends that Coach King is counting on to fill the gap left by the graduating trio. He likes football and is starting the season as alternate on the third team.

Though he is not allergic to football action, thus far he has been used only as a kick-off, field-goal, and extra point kicker. He kicked 23 EP's last season, and booted a 30-yard field goal against Clemson in 1962.

**85 GORDY POWERS Junior 6-2 170 Urbana, Ill.**

Gordy is one of the few sophomores who earned varsity letters last season. He has not played offensively yet for Furman, but was the number one punter and field goal expert last year until his leg was broken as he kicked a field goal against William and Mary in the fourth game.

A letterman as a sophomore, Gray moves into the top spot at right tackle this season. He is a big man who carries his weight well. Along with Jepson he gives Furman a tough twosome at tackle, and has another year to go. Younger brother Al is a frosh tackle this season.

**73 TOM TAYLOR Soph. 6-0 210 Charlotte, N. C.**

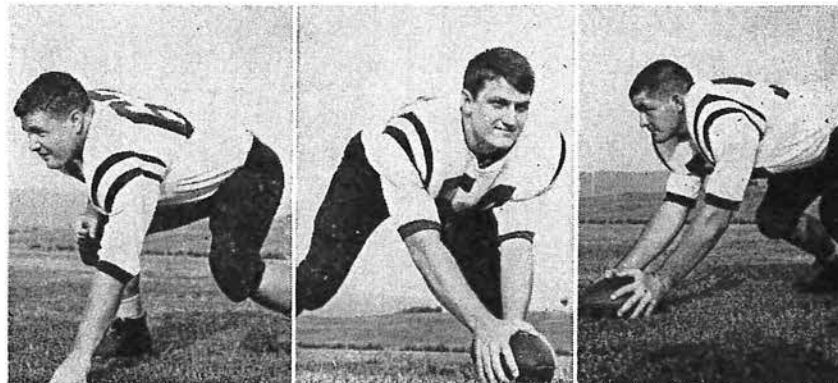

**66 WALT PRESTON Senior 5-10 195 Atlanta, Ga.**

Preston teamed with Carnes on the first unit last season and the two of them provided the Paladins with some solid performances at the center of the line. Preston, a blond, is solidly built and is smart and quick. He's back at the number one right guard position and is a candidate for all-star honors.

**67 CHARLIE HOLLOWAY Senior 5-0 180 Atlanta, Ga.**

Nicknamed "Barney Rubble" by his teammates last season, Charlie isn't too easy going and loveable on the football field. A good guard, he will again back up Carnes on the left side. He is a top-flight performer at his position.

**60 DAN WALTON Junior 5-11 218 Atlanta, Ga.**

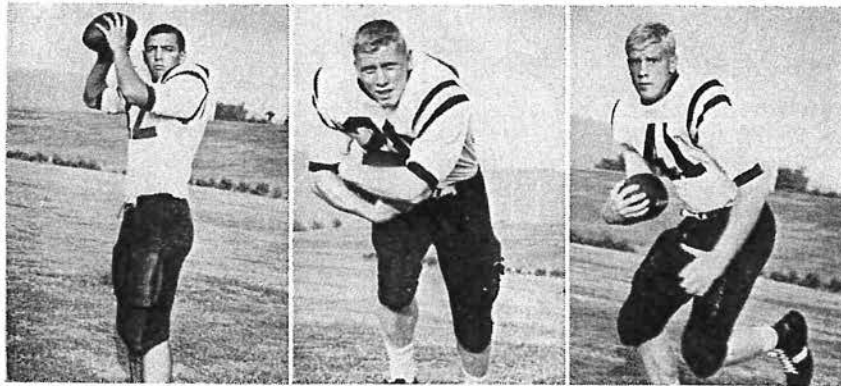

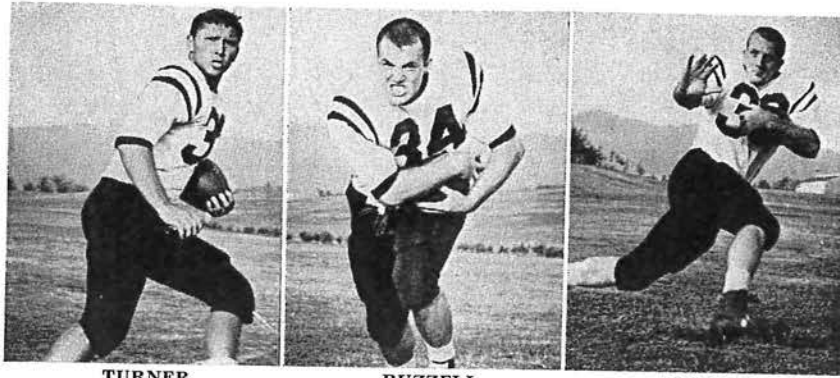

He served on the staff in orthopedic surgery at Baylor University, and later at Houston and at the Greenville Shriners Hospital. He began his practice in orthopedic surgery in Greenville in 1958. He is married to the former Katherine Graves of Union.

**FORECAST FOR 1964:** The Choctaws will be facing one of their toughest schedules, but there is a note of optimism. Though Coach Hartwell McPhail lost 17 lettermen, he also has 17 lettermen returning. Included in this group will be last season's leading ground gainer Richard Hubbard. Halfback Hubbard carried the ball 116 times for 467 yards. Also returning in the backfield will be fullback Jerry Hale, voted most improved player for the season; Chester Miller, ace quarterback; Ed Nixon, a top signal caller who completed 17 of 28 passes for 216 yards as a sophomore last year; and wingback Jimmy Hays, an elusive speedster.

Returning to the defensive backfield will be Ricky Farr and Bob Rogers, both small but rugged safety men. The Choctaws finished fourth nationally in pass defense among small colleges, largely

due to the efforts of these two.

Back in the line are two centers, four guards, and three tackles—but only one end. The end is Altus Newell, a pass catching specialist. Thomas Cole and Charles Lloyd return at center, flanked at the guards by Parker Dykes, Doug Merchant, Jerry Lyons, and Jack Scarborough, all starters at one time or another last year. Returnees at tackle are Jimmy Keith, Howard Godfrey, and possibly Wayne Jamison if an injury heals sufficiently.

FORECAST FOR 1964: Coach Frank Howard, in fielding his 25th Clemson team, has a big rebuilding job on hand. But he has 25 lettermen returning, and he has moved a letterman into every spot on the first unit.

Probably the weakest spot will be end. Not only are four lettermen gone from this spot, but the replacements are not the biggest. Tackle position will also be minus four lettermen, but Ricky Johnson returns as a junior after playing alternate as a soph and Johnny Boyette will also be a junior after sitting out last year because of a pre-season injury. Todd Heldreth at quarterback and Bill Lane at halfback are expected to generate most of the offensive fireworks. Both are well-adapted to the split-T with flanking fullback offense as used by Coach Snidow.

Some of the key players besides Heldreth and Lane are quarterback Mullins McLeod, halfbacks Walter Sweatt, John Gregg, Howard Hughes, and Archie Black, plus flanker Thomas Johnson. All these are lettermen, in addition to centers Bill Dayvault and Frank Satterfield; guards Lamar Westberry, Danny Suit, Ken Moorhead, Gary Bethard, and tackles Robby Atkins, Don Williams, and Lanier Phillips. Bob Smith, John Housel, and Paul Infinger all earned letters at end.

The Terriers had good offensive punch in six of their games—scoring at least three times in five of them. But the defense allowed too many points to rack up a winning season. This will have to be a point of emphasis this season.

FORECAST FOR 1964: Coach Camp says "The 1964 GW football team will be stronger than the 1963 unit and should bring the Colonials a winning season." Camp cites overall depth, improved team speed, experience—from the 18 lettermen and 28 players up from the undefeated freshman squad.

Despite the optimistic outlook everything is not bright for the Colonials. For the first time since he came to GW, Camp will be without Dick Drummond in the backfield. Also lost by graduation were two second team all-conference players in end Dick Duenkel and quarterback Merv Holland. There will be only four seniors on the squad.

At tackle, GW is much stronger with six lettermen among the nine candidates. Two probable starters there are among the best—Doug McNeil (230) and Steve Lapko (215). The Colonials have

talent and experience in the backfield but this is where they lost Holland and Drummond, the leaders of the offense. **FORECAST FOR 1964:** An experienced backfield raises Presbyterian's hopes for the football season, but Coach Cally Gault will have to rebuild the Blue Hose line almost completely before PC can launch an effective offense.

Gault has 12 letterman backs returning, including all four starters from last year. Senior Randy McCranie—who has led Hose rushers the past two seasons—will be back at fullback; and juniors Don McNeill and Wade Stewart return at the halfback posts. This trio averaged 4.0 yards per carry last year. Needless to say, Gault is expecting great things of them again this season.

Junior Leighton Grantham, who passed for more than 1,000 yards in two seasons, is the logical choice for the quarterback post. He is ably supported by two-year letterman Jackie Nix.

But these backfield veterans may find trouble ahead unless the Hose forward wall is patched up. Ends Jimmy Bankhead and Garnet Welch are the only starting linemen returning for action from 1963.

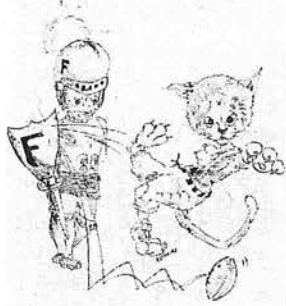
Team speed in the backfield may be improved, but the depth situation is bad. There will be some team platooning and several Wildcats will have to play both offense and defense when the going gets tough. Offense will have to develop more balance due to the graduation of passer Earl Cole. The backs may have more speed, but less power.

On defense the line is much depleted. Sophs and juniors will form the major replacements. There is overall good size, but there's a dearth of experience.

Coach Bill Dole has moved his senior star Steve Heckard from end to quarterback, and with Pack Hindsley and Steve Davidson there, the flanks are strong. The big question for the Wildcats is the offensive punch of the backfield. Heckard performed well in spring drills after shifting from end. Halfback Steve Smith is the leader there, and he must have some help. Behind Heckard, sophs Jimmy Poole and George Jacobsen should be of great value.

Perhaps the best proven position for Davidson is at fullback. Three lettermen are led by Pat Fisher—with Lyle Blalock and Dave Hendricks backing him up.

He bases that claim largely on the shoulders of 16 returning lettermen and 18 outstanding sophomores and junior college transfers. There are two returning lettermen at quarterback—Ronnie Smith and Bill Silvi; six at halfback—Kenny Stoudt, Mike Smelser, Pete Britton, Warren Hayes, Norris Aldridge, and Joe Stromick; two at fullback—Ron Gordon and Roger Moore; four at end—Pete Emelianchik (All-Southern), John Hilton, Kirk Kressler, and Ed Kullaf; but none at guard or center.

The center of the line will get a lot of attention in early practices. The two returning lettermen tackles are John Deeter and Dick Hodsdon. So every

position is fairly solid in experience except center, guard and tackle.

Merrick is really counting on All-Southern Stoudt and Emelianchik and end John Hilton. Hilton, ineligible in 1963, led the Conference in pass receptions the two previous seasons.

## Composite Record of Furman Coaches

Furman University had student football teams of a somewhat unorganized nature before 1900. In fact, The University of South Carolina football handbook records a game in 1895 in which the Paladins were defeated by a score of 14-10. The first schedule (and results) that research has revealed came in 1902. Down through the years football has been an important part of the Furman athletic program, and indeed, of the University itself. Of necessity, there have been two periods when football was not played by Furman. No intercollegiate games were played from 1903 through 1912—because of University administrative action. And no teams were fielded during World War II from 1943 through 1945. Here are the names of Furman coaches and their records.
