FURMAN ADMINISTRATION

PRESIDENT GORDON W. BLACKWELL. Prior to assuming the presidency of Furman in February, 1965, Dr. Blackwell was president of Florida State University for four and one-half years and was Chancellor of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina for three and one-half years.



Born at Timmonsville, S. C., April 27, 1911, the son of a Baptist minister, Dr. Blackwell spent his boyhood in Spartanburg, S. C. In 1932 he graduated summa cum laude from Furman, where he was a varsity tennis player, president of the band, and editor of the student magazine.

He received the M.A. degree from the University of North Carolina and the Ph.D. from Harvard in 1940. After research work with several government agencies from 1933 to 1936, he joined the faculty of Furman University, where he served until 1941. During World War II Dr. Blackwell served as community organization specialist for the Office of Civilian Defense.

Following the War, Dr. Blackwell returned to the University of North Carolina as a professor and director

of the Institute for Research in Social Sciences. In 1955 he was appointed Kenan Professor of Sociology at the University.

In addition to his prior service at Furman and the two institutions in North Carolina, he directed a summer field course on the South for Columbia University Summer School. He also taught at the University of Delaware. In 1955 he was one of several American scholars chosen to lecture in a Fulbright Conference on American Studies at Oxford University.

Dr. Blackwell is married to the former Elizabeth Blair Lyles of Spartanburg. The Blackwells have two sons and two daughters.



VICE-PRESIDENT AND DEAN OF THE UNIVERSITY FRANCIS W. BONNER. Dr. Bonner came to Furman as associate professor of English in 1949. He was named Dean of the Men's College in 1953 and served in that office until 1961, when he was named to his present position. In 1954 he became professor of English and was named Chairman of the English Department from 1956 to 1960. He also has served as Direc-

tor of the Division of Humanities.

A native of Lanett, Ala., Dr. Bonner received his B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of Alabama, and his Ph.D. from the University of North Carolina.

Prior to coming to Furman, Dr. Bonner taught at the University of Alabama, was head of the English department of the Marietta, Ga., High School, and was a graduate instructor at North Carolina.

During World War II he was a captain in the U. S. Air Force and a captain in the Office of Strategic Services. He is a Rotarian, member of the Torch Club, and the Newcomers Society of North America. Dr. Bonner is married to the former Miss Nilaouise Carnes of Boaz, Ala., and they have a son, Frank, and a daughter, Elizabeth Ann.



PRESIDENT EMERITUS JOHN L. PLYLER. Dr. Plyler served for twenty-five years as Furman's president before retiring late last year. He is a 1913 magna cum laude graduate who devoted his life to his alma mater and was chiefly responsible for the movement to the present campus, valued at nearly \$30 million. After World War I, Dr. Plyler received an LL.B. from Harvard and began his law practice in Greenville.

In 1935 he was elected Greenville County Judge and had been re-elected for a second term when he was persuaded to become president of Furman. Shortly after his grad-

uation from Furman, Dr. Plyler accepted a teaching and coaching position at Greenville High School where he produced a state championship basketball team. He is interested in all intercollegiate athletics and is convinced of the immense value of competitive sports in the overall development of college students. He holds LL.D. degrees from both Erskine and Wofford colleges.

FACULTY CHAIRMAN OF ATHLETICS WINSTON C. BABB.

Dr. Babb has been a part of Furman athletics since his college days when he was a member of the varsity track team. After receiving a B.A. degree from Furman in 1935, Dr. Babb continued his studies in history at the University of Virginia where he earned the M.A. in 1936. In 1954 he was awarded his Ph.D. in history by Virginia. After graduation from Furman, Dr. Babb held various positions with the J. C. Penney Company, the Atlanta Retail Credit Company, and the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers. In 1946 he joined the Furman faculty and has risen to head of the history department. He has served as vice-president of the Southern Conference from 1961-1964 and is the current president of the Southern Conference. Dr. Babb is an active member of both the American and Southern Historical Associations and is a Deacon in Greenville's First Baptist Church.

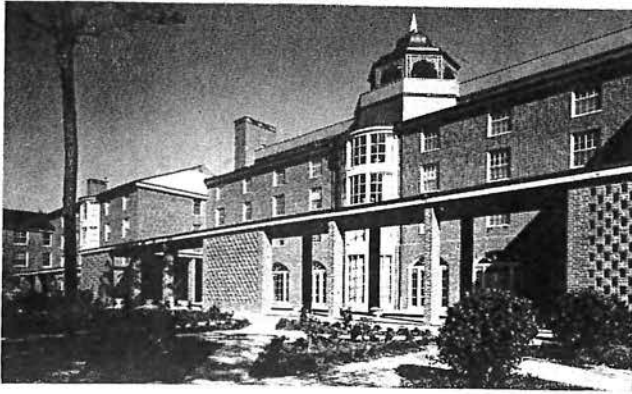


ATHLETIC DIRECTOR J. LYLES ALLEY.

The name Lyles Alley has become synonymous with championship basketball for the past nineteen years but the hard-working Furman alumnus also begins his ninth season as Director of Athletics. Alley was graduated from Furman in 1933, after winning 12 letters in football, basketball and track. The congenial head of Furman's intercollegiate athletic program became head basketball coach in 1945. He has coached every season since then except for the one of 1949-50, when he took a leave of absence to get his Master's degree from Columbia University. Alley's teams have been the national scoring champions three times and for three consecutive seasons (1954, 1955, 1956) he had a player selected to first team All-American by the Associated Press. He is presently a member of the Southern Conference Basketball Committee and a past president of the Southern Conference Basketball Coaches Association.

FURMAN HISTORY

Furman University is known practically everywhere as the oldest Baptist college in the South. This co-educational liberal arts university was founded in 1826 as the Furman Academy and Theological Institution, being authorized by the South Carolina Baptist Convention in 1825.

First home of the University was in Edgefield, S. C. Inspiration for its establishment came from a small group of patriotic and religious leaders of the South. One of these was Dr. Richard Furman for whom the school was named. Descendants of Dr. Furman have played active roles with the University ever since.

Furman has been continuously operated by the S. C. Baptist Convention since its beginning and has grown into one of the foremost educational institutions in the nation. A board of twenty-five trustees, named five each year for five-year terms, governs the University.

Since its modest beginning, Furman University has had several locations, but settled in Greenville in 1851 and has grown with the blossoming city. At that time the institution changed its name to Furman University. Greenville was then a community of 1,300 inhabitants. Today Furman has grown to some 1,500 students in a suburban community of nearly 200,000 people.

In the 1940's and 1950's, Furman occupied two campuses in downtown Greenville but found its growing pains were larger than the ground they occupied. In 1950 the Board of Trustees purchased 1,200 acres of property five miles north of the city near Paris Mountain, and began construction on the present campus. Today, half of the planned buildings and classrooms, made with Virginia handmade bricks in a modified-colonial architecture, have been completed. Long-range plans, which will eventually consist of nearly \$41 million in buildings and furnishings, include the construction of a modern facility for basketball and physical education and a new football stadium.

THE OUTLOOK

Coach Bob King feels that 1965 will be a better than average year for his Paladins, primarily because of attitude and desire. King said he felt Spring Drills were one of the best he has had at Furman and flatly predicts that "this squad will be the most interesting team I've had at Furman."

One reason for his prediction is a new Paladin game plan brought about by the now liberalized substitution rule. On September 18th, King will unveil his new three-platoon system. The first platoon is comprised of the best eleven all-around football players and will play both offense and defense. It will be expected to outplay the opposition's first unit. The second platoon will consist of the best eleven offensive players remaining and will handle offensive chores, while the third platoon will be defensive specialists.

King and his staff conducted an intensive experiment during Spring Drills and decided the three-unit system was best for Furman's material. The reason for the new game plan is that the first unit will be experienced, but that ever-present lack of depth could be a problem.

A total of 12 lettermen are lost from last year's squad, but a fine crop of sophomores from 1964's undefeated freshman team will be available, along with 23 returning lettermen, and should provide some bright spots in King's plans.

At the ends, four lettermen are returning. Tim Crawford, one of the best pass-catching ends ever at Furman, and stalwart Walker Kimbell will hold down first unit positions, with Dusty Chichester and Rick Gilstrap returning on the second unit. The center of the line, from tackle to tackle is the pressure point that will decide the 1965 fortune. Only seven lettermen are listed as interior linemen, and at least two of those may not make it academically. King has David Davidson, Richard Harper, Gray Geddie, and Jim Williams listed at the tackles, and Tommy Greene and Danny Walton at guard, with Dale Boyd the only letterman at center. Of these, Danny Walton and Jim Williams are doubtful returnees, while Gray Geddie has undergone surgery for a knee ailment and may not be ready to play.

The backfield is much brighter than in several years. Quarterback Sammy Wyche, who was accurate on 51% of his passes for 848 yards last year, is returning, along with his understudy, Bob Stillwell. Only one of the halfbacks on the first three units is not a letterman, but he will likely see plenty of action. Sophomore Johnny Talkington has the moves to become All-Southern before he's finished, and may accomplish that goal this season. Returning halfbacks include Jimmy Kerr, Larry McDonald, Johnny Litchfield, Lavern Barrs, and Greg Obenaur. At fullback, the Paladins will be very strong with co-captain Billy Turner and hard-running workhorse Bob Buzzell returning, along with defensive specialist John Burrell.

Sophomores play a major role in Coach King's planning, as ten will have won assignments on the first three units.

THE OUTLOOK

Coach Frank Madigan feels the success of the 1965 season depends on how fast his young, inexperienced team can develop. Last year's squad compiled a 3-7 season, which brought Madigan's record at Frederick to 10 wins against 10 losses. Coach Madigan is depending on captain Charles Thomas, a senior guard, to provide the maturity in the line. Another standout is senior halfback Teddy Putnam who averaged 4.6 yards per carry last season. The nucleus of the Lion team is built around a corps of 17 returning lettermen and a crop of freshmen. The quarterbacking chores will rest upon the shoulders of sophomores Jim Cruthoff and Skip Bouchard.

THE OUTLOOK

Speaking of his Wildcats' chances in 1965, Coach Homer Smith, in his first year at Davidson, says: "Our squad will lack size and will be depth-shy to the point that we will not have the luxury of a single reserve slotted for duty at one position only. We will attempt to play two platoon football with our 22 best players. Our multiple T offense will have zero experience at quarterback, but one of the finest runners a coach could hope to have in Steve Smith, will be playing fullback. Our defensive platoon will have to make up for lack of size in pure hustle. Pack Hindsley, honorable mention all-conference end last year will be back as a leader in the defensive line; if there are many in the conference as tough as he is, we are in trouble."

THE OUTLOOK

It is a possibility that the Pirates might be a touchdown stronger than they were last year. THE OUTLOOK

The 1965 Terrier edition will have a dangerous lack of depth at end and quarterback, better depth with interior linemen, and almost no experience in the backfield. Wofford success will depend upon adequate overall performance on the part of a great many new men, plus superior performance from Warren Whittaker at quarterback, Billy Ellis at halfback, Paul Infinger as a receiver, and Don Williams at tackle. Coach Conley Snidow plans to use two platoons to get the best performance from each athlete and will depend upon several entering freshmen to strengthen weak spots. Wholesale graduation of backs means a complete new lineup, both on offense and defense.

THE OUTLOOK

The outlook is promising for Presbyterian College as the Blue Hosemen head toward the 1965 football season and their debut into Carolinas Conference title competition. The entire starting backfield from last year's squad returns for this fall's action, and the Hose line must be rated as improved over the 1964 wall. Eighteen lettermen will give the Presbyterians a more balanced attack, despite the loss of 12 veterans. The line will be light once again, but is sparked by rugged ends in Jimmy Bankhead and Joe Lawson. Barring any crippling injuries and despite its veteran losses, PC should field an improved football team. Passing will be a major weapon in Presbyterian's split-T attack.

When Coach Bob King returned to his alma mater in 1958 as head football coach, he was heralded as the most popular athletic figure to ever graduate from Furman. Today, there is no question that he deserved the acclaim, for he has become somewhat of a living Furman legend and has long been one of Greenville's favorite citizens.

The measure of any coach can best be judged by the confidence and respect accorded him by his team. King is a shining example, both in his daily life and on the field. His eternal optimism and love for the game rubs off on his assistants, his players, and those associated with him.

For the past seven seasons, King has had his "downs" as well as his "ups." His overall record is 31-37-1, with twelve losses by a touchdown or less, and four losses by a single point. His sweetest victories are one-point upset wins over powerful Memphis State (7-6 in 1961) and over the Commodores of Vanderbilt (14-13 in 1963). In the seven years of his reign, King has managed only three winning seasons with his best teams coming in 1961 and 1963. Both were 7-3-0 seasons. At the conclusion of both years he was named S. C. Coach of the Year. *Responsibilities:* As head football coach he is responsible for Furman's intercollegiate football program. *Coaching Experience:* Was assistant coach at Furman for five years (1937-41). Coached at Chapel Hill Pre-Flight School while in the Navy. Returned to Furman as assistant in 1947. End coach at the University of Illinois for eleven years (1947-57). Head coach here since 1958. *Personal Information:* Born — Ranger, Texas, June 3, 1913. *College* — Furman '37, graduated with honors. Lettered in football, basketball, and track. Was All-State and All-Southern end in 1936. Nominated for All-American. *Service* — Volunteered for U. S. Navy in 1942. Separated as a lieutenant in 1946. *Married* — Gladys Moon of Greenville. *Children* — Mrs. Kenneth Bryant (Karen), of Black Mt., N. C., and Bobby, 19 (sophomore end on Furman football squad).

OFFICIAL SCORES

Furman University had student football teams of a somewhat unorganized nature before 1900. In fact, The University of South Carolina football brochure records a game in 1895 in which the Paladins were defeated by a score of 14-10 and Clemson lists its first football victory as a 14-6 win over Furman in 1896. The first schedule (and results) that recent research has revealed was in 1902. Down through the years football has been an important part of the Furman athletic program, and indeed, of the University itself. Of necessity, there have been two periods when football was not played. No inter-collegiate games were played from 1903 through 1912—because of University administrative action—and no games were played during World War II.

Until 1960, Furman athletic teams were known by different nicknames. The baseball team was "Hornets," the football team "Hurricanes," and the basketball team "Paladins." In 1960 it was decided to consolidate all athletic teams under one name. The popular choice was "Paladins," which a Greenville sportswriter dubbed the basketball team back in the 1930's. "Paladin" is derived from Count Palatine, one of the twelve knights who comprised the bodyguard and inner circle of Emperor Charlemagne.

What Is The Paladin Club?

The Paladin Club is Furman University's athletic booster organization which was formed by friends and alumni.

Why Have A Paladin Club?

In a statement made by President Blackwell shortly after his inauguration, he stated (as University policy) that Furman would continue to support and enhance the athletic program in the same monetary manner it has in the past. He made it perfectly clear that any building program would be up to the Paladin Club. In other words, if additional scholarship funds are to be had, they will have to come from contributions to the Paladin Club.

Who Can Hold Membership?

The Paladin Club is not an exclusive organization in the strict sense. Any interested alumnus or friend who would like to help worthy student-athletes, and who wants to help bolster Furman's athletic program is urged to join.

Where Does The Money Go?

All contributions to the Paladin Club are used for scholarships to qualified athletes to help offset educational costs.

Who Receives Such Scholarships?

Furman's scholarship program for athletes is based on (1) athletic ability, (2) scholarship and general ability, and (3) need. Athletes who qualify on the basis of these conditions, rules established by the NCAA and the Southern Conference, and upon the recommendation of the head coach, receive scholarships in varying amounts. The scholarships are made by the Awards Committee of the University.

It's simple. All you need to do is make a minimum contribution of \$10.00 (tax deductible) to The Paladin Club, Furman University, Greenville, S. C. If you would like to earmark your contribution for either football or basketball, please indicate. When your contribution is received you will be sent a decal for your car and your name will be added to the mailing list for the weekly newsletter during football season. You will also receive top priority in ordering season tickets for all sports.
