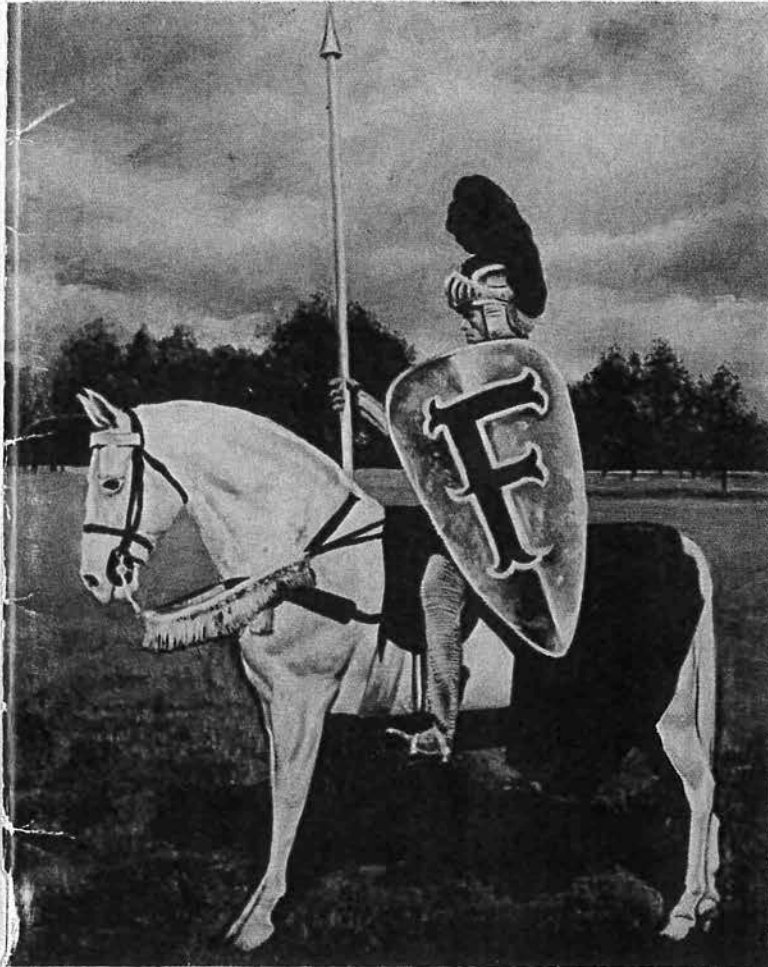

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FURMAN HISTORY



The oldest Baptist College in the South, Furman University is a co-educational liberal arts university offering six degrees in 25 areas of study.

Authorized by the South Carolina Baptist Convention of 1825, Furman was established as an academy and theological institution in Edgefield, South Carolina. For a short period of time it enjoyed a residency in the High Hills of Santee and Winnsboro before moving to Greenville, where in 1850 it was chartered "The Furman University."

When the Greenville Baptist Female College was established in 1855, it was placed in the hands of the Furman trustees. It was not until 1933 that the then Greenville Woman's College became coordinated with the university.

A member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, Furman offers the Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees in the areas of the humanities, social sciences, mathematics and natural sciences and the Bachelor of Arts in music. The Graduate Division offers course work leading to the degrees of Master of Arts in psychology and education, Master of Science in chemistry and Master of Education.

Last fall the university reached a record enrollment with 1,566 students attending regular daytime classes. An additional 341 students, including 93 graduate students are enrolled in the Evening Division. Furman alumni now number more than 16,000 men and women.

Located five miles north of Greenville, the campus lies on a beautifully landscaped 1200 acre tract at the foot of Paris Mountain. Already completed on the ten year old campus are 17 major buildings and several smaller ones. When completed, the campus of more than 20 major buildings will enable the university to serve some 2,000 students.

FURMAN ADMINISTRATION



GORDON W. BLACKWELL
President

Dr. Blackwell is a distinguished administrator, educator, author, and social scientist. He was elected to the presidency of Furman in 1964. At that time, he was President of Florida State University, one of the largest and fastest-growing universities in the South.

Gordon Blackwell, a Furman alumnus and the son of a Furman alumnus, sees a mighty challenge at Furman. He feels that the moral and religious development of today's youth is equally as important as their intellectual development, and he seeks to foster at Furman an atmosphere of spiritual quality as well as academic excellence.

Dr. Blackwell was graduated *summa cum laude* from Furman in 1932. His record at Furman was that of a brilliant scholar, an outstanding athlete, and a student leader. He was captain of the tennis team for three years, president of the band, and editor of the student magazine.

He decided upon a career in social science, received his M.A. degree from the University of North Carolina, and earned his Ph. D. degree at Harvard University. He served as Professor and Chairman of the Sociology Department of Furman from 1937 until 1941. He then went to the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where, as a teacher and head of the University's Institute for Research in Social Science, he experienced great success and received wide recognition. He was named Chancellor of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, and three and a half years later became President of Florida State.

A warm, direct, and approachable man, Dr. Blackwell is known and loved by Furman students, who recognize that his life's interest is teaching and contact with young people. His two sons, Gordon and Randy, are Furman graduates and were members of the basketball varsity.

DR. FRANCIS W. BONNER Vice President and Dean of the University

Dr. Bonner came to Furman as associate professor of English in 1949. He was named Dean of the Men's College in 1953 and served in that office until 1961 when he was named to his present position. In 1954 he became professor of English and was named Chairman of the English Department from 1956 to 1960. He also has served as Director of the Division of Humanities.



A native of Lanett, Ala., Dr. Bonner received his B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of Alabama, and his Ph.D. from the University of North Carolina.

Prior to coming to Furman, Dr. Bonner taught at the University of Alabama, was head of the English department of the Marietta, Ga., High School, and was a graduate instructor at North Carolina.

During World War II he was a captain in the U. S. Air Force and a captain in the Office of Strategic Services. He is a Rotarian, member of the Torch Club, and the Newcomers Society of North America. Dr. Bonner is married to the former Miss Nilaouise Carnes of Boaz, Ala., and they have a son, Frank, and a daughter, Elizabeth Ann.

DR. WINSTON C. BABB Faculty Chairman of Athletics

Dr. Babb has been a part of Furman athletics since his college days when he was a member of the varsity track team. After receiving a B.A. degree from Furman in 1935, Dr. Babb continued his studies in history at the University of Virginia where he earned the M.A. in 1936. In 1954 he was awarded his Ph.D. in history by Virginia. After graduating from Furman, Dr. Babb held various positions with the J. C. Penney Company, the Atlanta Retail Credit Company, and the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers.



In 1946 he joined the Furman faculty and has risen to head of the history department. He has served as vice-president of the Southern Conference from 1961-1964 and is the current president of the Southern Conference.

Dr. Babb is an active member of both the American and Southern Historical Associations and is a Deacon in Greenville's First Baptist Church.

1966 OUTLOOK

Coach Bob King begins his ninth year at the Paladin helm with what has been termed the "Football-For-Fun-Bunch." A local sportswriter dubbed the Paladins with this slogan when he learned that not a single player on the Furman roster was receiving a full athletic scholarship.

"We have a tremendous challenge," says King, "in that we will compete against squads that put much more money than we do into their program. But we feel that it isn't the amount of scholarship money spent that determines who wins a game. Actually, we have some real fine football players on our squad who have done and will continue to do a very fine job."

The 1966 Paladins will be a basically young squad, with half the roster composed of sophomores. At the conclusion of the Spring game, eight sophs were holding down starting assignments on the first offensive and defensive teams. Lack of depth, experienced depth, appears to present a problem, according to King, but he is hopeful that his team will not make the common sophomore mistakes that are so costly.

Paladin coaches are confident that this class of sophomores is the best they've had at Furman in several years. Furman has several sophs who should turn into better than average football players. Among them are quarterbacks Clyde Hewell and Fred Etheridge, ends Jimmy Jordan and Robbie Hahn, and guard George Veal.

Providing the nucleus around which King hopes to mold a winner are 23 returning lettermen, led by co-captains David Davidson (tackle) and Jimmy Kerr (fullback). Tackles and halfbacks outnumber the other positions as far as returnees are concerned with six monogram winners each, but that doesn't necessarily mean Furman will be strong at tackle and halfback. Weakest positions, lettermenwise, are end (two), center (one), and quarterback (two).

Offensively, the 1966 Paladins should be able to score points as evidenced by the Spring game (61-0). King will use his multiple-pro set, trying to present a well-balanced ground and air attack. Passing will be a big part of Furman's game plans with Hewell and Bob Stillwell trying to hit such gifted receivers as Hahn, Jordan, and Chichester.

Defensively, Furman will use the monster, or rover, lineup with the monster lining up to the wide side of the field. The big problem for Paladin coaches seems to be in their search for defensive backs. Lavern Barrs at safety is the only sure starter. Defensive backfield coach Jack Powers indicates that there are several candidates for those positions, but "the fast ones are not as tall as we'd like for them to be and the tall ones are not as fast as we'd like them to be."

Summing up, Furman will be a small, not too speedy squad, with not an abundance of experience. The play of the sophomores appears to be the key to success. If they get the leadership from the upperclassmen and if they mature quickly, they just might surprise some folks. Desire and hustle will also play an important part in the Furman fortunes. "We'll be out to prove a point," says King. "We want to prove to folks that the number of headlines and press clippings our players get isn't the important thing. What is important is how much this squad wants to win. We've been billed as the 'Football-For-Fun-Bunch,' but our kids know that this is serious business. They know that the only way to make football fun is to win. We're hoping this will be a fun season."

ROBERT B. KING

**Head Football Coach and
Athletic Director for Football**



When Coach Bob King returned to his alma mater in 1958 as head football coach, he was heralded as the most popular athletic figure to ever graduate from Furman. Today, there is no question that he deserved the acclaim, for he has become somewhat of a living Furman legend and has long been one of Greenville's favorite citizens.

The measure of any coach can best be judged by the confidence and respect accorded him by his team. King is a shining example, both in his daily life and on the field. His eternal optimism and love for the game rubs off on his assistants, his players, and those associated with him.

For the past eight seasons, King has had his "downs" as well as his "ups." His overall record is 36-42-1, with thirteen losses by a touchdown or less, and four losses by a single point. His sweetest victories are one-point upset wins over powerful Memphis State (7-6 in 1961) and over the Commodores of Vanderbilt (14-13 in 1963). In the eight years of his reign, King has managed only three winning seasons with his best teams coming in 1961 and 1963. Both were 7-3-0 seasons. At the conclusion of both years he was named S. C. Coach of the Year. *Responsibilities:* As head football coach he is responsible for Furman's intercollegiate football program. *Coaching Experience:* Was assistant coach at Furman for five years (1937-41). Coached at Chapel Hill Pre-Flight School while in the Navy. Returned to Furman as assistant in 1947. End coach at the University of Illinois for eleven years (1947-57). Head coach here since 1958. *Personal Information:* Born - Ranger, Texas, June 3, 1913. *College* - Furman '37, graduated with honors. Lettered in football, basketball, and track. Was All-State and All-Southern end in 1936. Nominated for All-American. *Service* - Volunteered for U. S. Navy in 1942. Separated as a lieutenant in 1946. *Married* - Gladys Mason of Greenville. *Children* - Mrs. Kenneth Bryant (Karen), of St. Louis, Mo., and Bobby, 20, (junior end on Furman football squad).

PALADIN CLUB SETS RECORD IN 1965

1965 was a banner year for the revitalized Paladin Club. Final figures show that 1,280 Paladin Club members contributed \$49,097.30 to the athletic program at Furman. The original goal was set at \$40 thousand, but after reviewing existing needs, the Board of Directors raised the ante to \$50 thousand.

The 1965 total is a new record in giving by Paladin Club members. The previous high was some \$36 thousand in 1964.

Under a new policy set forth in June, 1965, by Furman President Gordon W. Blackwell, all Paladin Club funds are to be used exclusively for athletic scholarships in football and basketball.

Membership in the Paladin Club is not restricted. Anyone can join with a minimum contribution of just \$10. Paladin Club membership entitles the member to priority on season tickets for football and basketball. Members also receive the "Paladin Patter" newsletter which is printed weekly during football season and twice monthly during basketball season.

Pacesetter members (those who have contributed \$25 or more) are eligible for annual membership in the Furman Golf Course.

Plans for the coming year's campaign are being made and president C. Dan Joyner is confident that this year will be the most successful in Club history.

There are three classes of membership. A contribution of \$10 to \$25 is a regular membership, from \$25 to \$99 is a Pacesetter membership. A contribution of \$100 or more entitles one to membership in the Century Club. Century Club members are awarded reserved parking spaces for all home football games.

You will receive a membership card, Paladin Club decal, and receipt for tax purposes in the mail.
