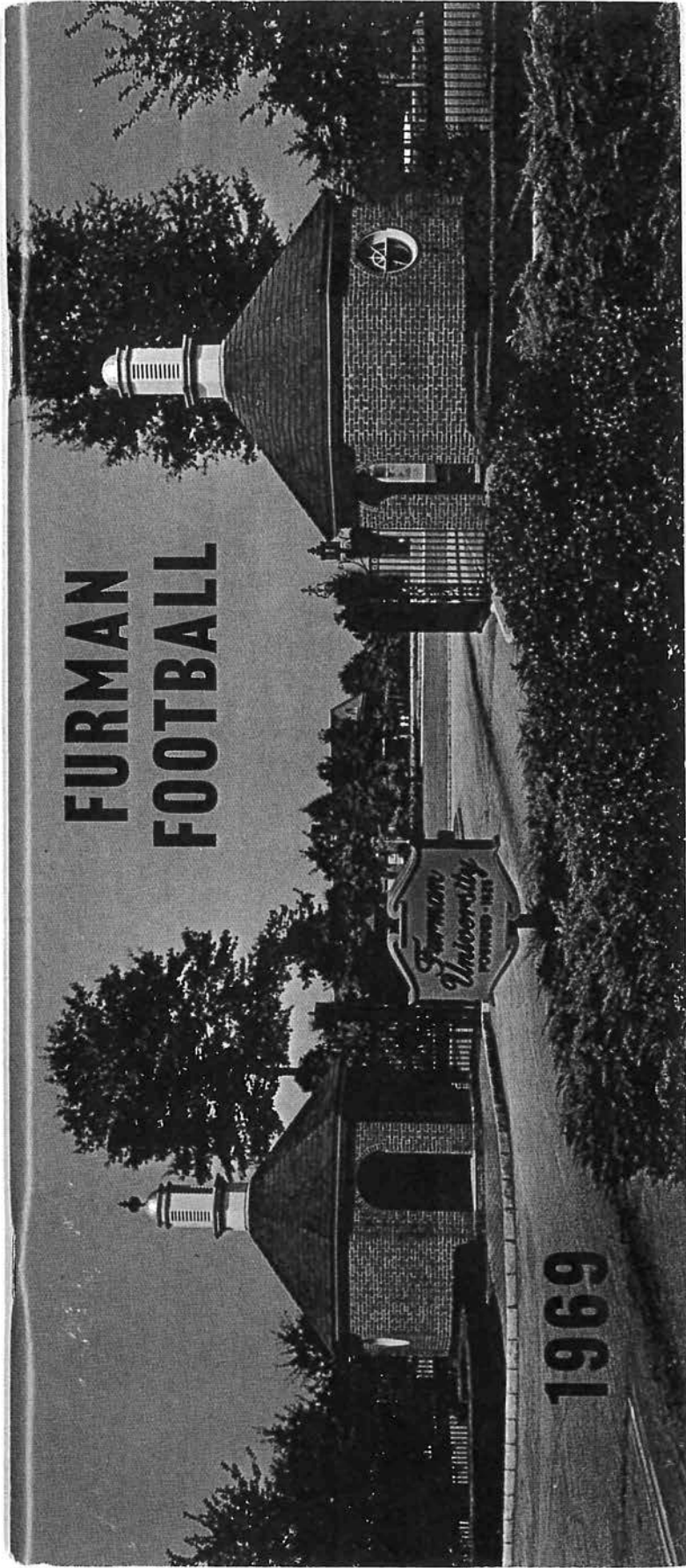

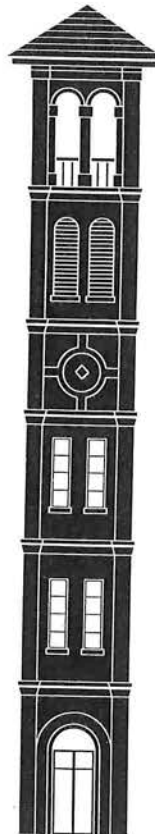

INTRODUCING FURMAN



Furman University is widely known as one of the finest educational facilities in the South, aspiring academic excellence under Christian influences.

Authorized by the South Carolina Baptist Convention of 1825, Furman was established as an academy and theological institution in Edgefield, South Carolina. For a short period of time it enjoyed a residency in the High Hills of Santee and Winnsboro before moving to Greenville, where in 1850 it was chartered "The Furman University."

The University is fortunate in its location five miles north of Greenville. The new campus occupies a beautifully designed area of a 750-acre tract owned by the University. Many of the buildings are situated close to a 30-acre lake.

A member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, Furman offers courses leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Arts in Music, Master of Arts and Master of Science.

Furman now has over 16,000 alumni, including some of the nation's leading scholars, doctors and lawyers. Dr. Charles Townes, who was awarded the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1964, is a graduate of Furman as is Max Steele, who won the Harper Novel Prize for his novel *Debby*.

Bob Stillwell, who was captain of the 1966 football team, was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship following his graduation. Larry Estridge, student body president for 1966, was given the Hughes Perpetual Trophy as the nation's outstanding ROTC participant in 1967.

The number of Furman's full-time faculty members has grown from 93 in 1964-65 to 113 in 1968-69 with 75 per cent having a doctor's degree.

When the campus is completed there will be more than 20 major buildings with the University being able to serve some 2,500 students.

The President:

DR. GORDON W. BLACKWELL



Dr. Gordon W. Blackwell, one of the South's most distinguished administrators, educators, authors and social scientists, became the eighth president of Furman University February 1, 1965.

Under his leadership, Furman has made gigantic strides in many areas. He has devoted his many talents to the improvement of Furman on the local, state and national scene and his administration strives for excellence in every field of endeavor.

Dr. Blackwell's career as an educator began at Furman, where he graduated summa cum laude in 1932. His record at Furman was one of a brilliant scholar, an outstanding athlete and a student leader. He was captain and No. 1 man on the tennis team for three years, president of the band, president of his fraternity and editor of the student magazine.

Dr. Blackwell's teaching career also started at Furman, where he served as Professor and Chairman of the Sociology Department from 1937 to 1941. He received his M.A. degree from the University of North Carolina and his Ph.D. degree at Harvard University.

Before coming to Furman, Dr. Blackwell was president at Florida State University for four and one-half years. He has also served as Chancellor of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina for three and one-half years.

Dr. Blackwell was born in Timmonsville, S. C., and is married to the former Elizabeth Blair Lyles. His two sons, Gordon and Randy, are Furman graduates and were members of the Furman varsity basketball team.

The Athletic Director:

J. LYLES ALLEY



For 20 years, Lyles Alley directed the Paladins' basketball fortunes and earned the reputation of "Mr. Basketball" in bringing Furman into national limelight.

It was on November 23, 1966 that Alley assumed the duties of full-time Athletic Director and under his direction the over-all athletic program at Furman has reached its greatest peak.

The 1968-69 athletic year was the greatest ever for the Paladins. There were two conference titles — baseball and tennis. In addition to this, there was a noticeable growth in all sports under his direction.

The job of Athletic Director, however, isn't a strange position for Alley. In addition to serving as basketball coach, he also doubled as AD from 1957 until assuming the position full-time in 1966.

Alley's list of accomplishments are many and the stars he has coached would fill a gymnasium. The names of Frank Selvy, Darrell Floyd, Nield Gordon, Jerry Smith, Gerald Glur, Bryon Pinson, Fred Fraley and Effie Evington are only a few he has helped develop.

From 1953 through 1956, Alley's teams were the national major college scoring champions, setting records each time. He also produced Furman's first All-Americans with Frank Selvy earning the award in 1954 and Darrell Floyd in 1955 and 1956.

Alley, himself, was a star athlete at Furman in the early '30's. He won 12 letters in basketball, football, baseball and track. He was voted the most valuable football player during his senior year in 1933.



The Head Coach:

ROBERT B. (BOB) KING

Robert B. (Bob) King is entering his 12th season as head football coach of the Furman Paladins and is now recognized as the dean of Southern Conference coaches.

As King starts his 12th campaign, second longest in the history of Furman, he still exudes the enthusiasm and warmth that signifies his love for the game of football.

He has been acclaimed as one of the most popular and accomplished athletic figures ever to graduate from Furman and his eternal optimism rubs off on his assistant coaches and those who are associated with him.

After 11 years as one of the most valued assistants in the Big Ten, King left the University of Illinois and accepted the position as head coach of his alma mater in December, 1957. Since then, he has produced some of the most exciting moments in Furman football history and has long been one of Greenville's most outstanding citizens.

King has twice been named South Carolina Coach of the Year, in 1961 and 1963 when his teams compiled 7-3-0 records.

He was assistant coach at Furman for five years (1937-41) and coached at Chapel Hill Pre-Flight School while in the Navy. From 1947 to 1957, he served as an assistant coach at the University of Illinois.

While at Furman, he was one of the school's most outstanding athletes. He lettered in football, basketball and track and was All-State and All-Southern end in 1936.

In 1942, King volunteered for the U. S. Navy and separated in 1946 as a lieutenant. He is married to the former Gladys Mason of Greenville.

HAYDEN HAYS Line Coach



Joined Furman staff in Sept., 1967 as graduate assistant and became full time varsity coach in March, 1968.

Responsibilities: Assistant varsity coach working with interior linemen on both offense and defense. Responsible for recruiting in North Georgia. *Coaching Experience:* Assistant coach at Commerce High School, Commerce, Ga., (1964-66). Named head coach and athletic director at Commerce in 1966. During first year at Furman (1967) worked primarily with freshman team.

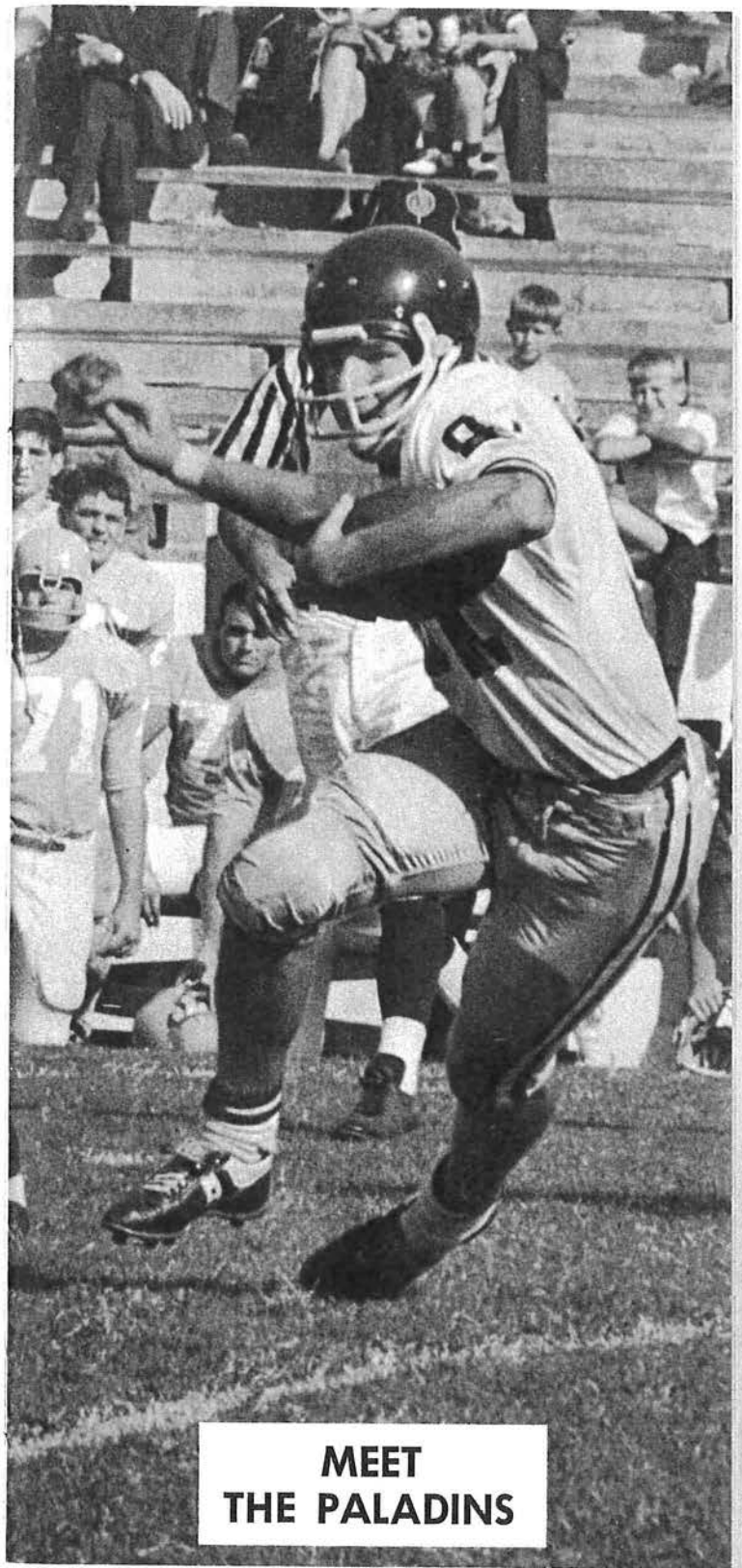

THE CO-CAPTAINS

TOMMY BROADWELL



For a 5-10, 175-pounder, Tommy Broadwell is considered one of the hardest hitting linebackers in the history of Furman.

Broadwell came to Furman as a fullback, but was moved to linebacker during his sophomore season. He finished the 1967 season as a starter and was a regular during the entire 1968 campaign.

During both seasons, he finished high in the Hatchetman Award, which goes to the top defensive player. During spring practice, Broadwell also saw some duty as fullback and could see some action there this fall.

"Tommy is certainly a fine player," said head coach Bob King. "He is also one of the finest leaders on the team and the players have made a wise choice in selecting him as a co-captain. He's a complete player and puts his heart into everything he undertakes."

DICK IMMEL



There's only one way to describe Dick Immel — one of the key players this season for the Paladins.

During the spring, Immel saw duty at three positions, running back, quarterback and defensive halfback. And he could open at any one of the three.

"Dick is definitely one of our key players this year," said head coach Bob King. "He can do so many things. In addition to the three positions, he could also handle our punting. He's a very fine athlete and should have an outstanding season."

Last season, Immel was a regular at defensive halfback, but also saw some action as a running back. He carried the ball 12 times for 39 yards. He came to Furman as a quarterback and was backup for Clyde Hewell until he was moved to defensive halfback last year.

BUTCH BARNHILL — 6-0, 185, senior, Greenville, S. C. Prepped at Wade Hampton High School . . . lettered his sophomore and junior years . . . scheduled to start at defensive end this season . . . one of steadiest players on team . . . could develop into real standout.



RONNIE BOOZER — 6-2, 194, sophomore, Union, S. C. Has the potential to develop into outstanding end . . . saw duty both offensively and defensively during spring . . . attended Union High School, where he also was track star . . . has a good chance to break into starting lineup.



KELLY HENSON — 5-11, 185, junior, Forest City, N. C. Being counted on to back up at defensive end . . . attended East Rutherford High School . . . also played tennis in high school . . . is expected to see considerable amount of action . . . could play offense because of blocking ability.



PHILIP HOWLE — 6-2, 195, junior, Darlington, S. C. Finished the 1968 season real strong . . . earned starting spot at end during spring . . . finished 1968 with ten receptions for 117 yards . . . good blocker as well as receiver . . . was all-around athlete while at Darlington High School.



MIKE JOHNSON — 6-1, 190, sophomore, Ninety Six, S. C. Had an outstanding spring and will give valuable depth at end . . . Has the size and speed to play either offense or defense . . . will be big boost if he comes through . . . career plans currently undecided.



CHARLES McCLELLAN — 6-2, 195, sophomore, Waycross, Ga. Was a standout on last year's freshman team and considered a top prospect at offensive end . . . good hands and speed . . . could make serious challenge for starting position . . . good blocker as well as receiver . . . career plans undecided.





BYRON TROTTER — 6-0, 184, junior, Decatur, Ga. Developed into real standout as sophomore . . . third leading receiver last year with 28 catches for 343 yards . . . also considered outstanding blocker . . . will open at end this season and could develop into All-Conference player . . . steady player.



PATRICK WIGGINS — 6-3, 193, senior, Orlando, Fla. Has developed into one of most outstanding defensive ends in Furman history . . . was second team All-Conference last season . . . leading candidate for post season honors this year . . . strong tackler as well as good pass defender.



TACKLES

RICHARD BURNETTE — 5-11, 220, sophomore, North Augusta, S. C. Was very impressive during spring . . . attended North Augusta High School where he was an all-around athlete . . . could develop into real standout at offensive tackle and will give valuable depth.



BRUCE BYERS — 5-10, 235, senior, Augusta, Ga. One of the most valuable linemen this year for the Paladins . . . was moved to offensive tackle during spring, but could also start at defensive guard . . . one of biggest men on team, but very quick for size.



RENNIE COLEMAN — 6-0, 215, sophomore, Fairfax, Va. Coaching staff impressed with desire and attitude to play . . . could see duty offensively or defensively . . . was outstanding lineman in high school . . . has size and ability to develop into outstanding player.



CHUCK DAVIS — 6-0, 203, junior, Short Hills, N. J. Lettered as a sophomore and figures heavily into 1969 plans . . . expected to open at defensive tackle after outstanding spring . . . could develop into all-star caliber player . . . attended Millburn High School.

BUTCH KERSEY — 5-11, 209, junior, McLean, Va. Started several games last fall as offensive guard, but has been moved to tackle . . . also played defense as sophomore . . . key interior lineman and will see plenty of action . . . attended Langley High School . . . will add valuable experience . . . career plans currently undecided.



BERNIE LANIGAN — 6-2, 195, senior, Thomasville, Ga. One of finest defensive players on team . . . will be starting third year at tackle . . . top candidate for post season honors . . . very fast and agile . . . attended Central High where he lettered in football, track and baseball and basketball.



WAYNE McINTOSH — 5-10, 213, sophomore, Columbus, Ga. Had an outstanding freshman season . . . shows a lot of promise at offensive tackle . . . with experience, could develop into all-star player . . . will see a lot of action . . . also lettered in baseball at Jordan Voc High School.



BOB MORFORD — 6-2, 195, sophomore, Eau Gallie, Fla. Had little playing experience in high school, but has developed into promising young tackle . . . speed and quickness are biggest assets . . . coaches feel he could develop into first rate interior lineman . . . career undecided.



RON STRICKLAND — 6-3, 245, junior, Dallas, Ga. One of the key players in the offensive forward wall . . . landed starting assignment last year and could well develop into all-star player . . . one of biggest men on team and one of largest in recent years for Paladins.



GUARDS

GERRY HART — 6-1, 190, senior, Groveland, Fla. Missed all of the 1968 season because of shoulder injury . . . could work himself back into starting role . . . also figures into picture at center . . . his return gives big boost to offensive line . . . also lettered in track and baseball at Groveland High School.





BEN MADDOX — 5-10, 200, sophomore Orlando, Fla. Was an outstanding guard on last year's freshman team and moved into starting role during spring . . . quick and speedy . . . a future all-star player . . . lettered three years at Orlando Colonial High School and captured numerous awards in Orlando area.



MARK McNABB — 5-11, 198, junior, Smyrna, Ga. Started several games last year as sophomore and could challenge for starting role this year . . . was captain and most valuable player of team at Willis High School . . . could figure into the defensive picture . . . career plans undecided.



JACKIE QUEEN — 5-10, 185, junior, Gaffney, S. C. Came to Furman as center, but was moved to guard late last year . . . will add valuable depth and could move into starting role . . . outstanding attitude . . . also lettered in basketball and track at Gaffney High School.



HAYNE STEADMAN — 6-1, 200, sophomore, Avondale, Ga. Another outstanding young lineman with a lot of potential . . . was starter on last year's freshman team . . . could also see duty as defensive tackle because of speed and quickness . . . attended Avondale High School.



STEVE WARREN — 6-0, 195, sophomore, Rome, Ga. Attended West Rome High School where he was an outstanding lineman . . . also figures into defensive plans at tackle . . . will be big asset to team once he gains experience . . . career plans currently undecided.



CHESTER WILLIS — 5-11, 205, sophomore, Hollywood, Fla. Had an outstanding freshman season as defensive guard . . . could easily challenge for starting role this season . . . considered one of hardest hitters on team . . . with experience, could develop into all-star player.

JOHN WILSON — 6-4, 250, junior Gainesville, Ga. Known to his teammates as "Big John" because of size . . . at 6-4, 250 is biggest man on team . . . started last year at defensive guard and will open 1969 at same spot . . . moves well for big man . . . could develop into all-star player . . . letter in baseball at Gainesville.

ED KATE — 6-1, 210, junior, Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. Played center and guard while lettering as sophomore . . . also expected to play defensive guard this year . . . key player because of versatility . . . elected all-county and all-region in high school . . . attended Plantation High School.



ROBERT OLIVER — 6-1, 205, senior, Commerce, Ga. Two-year letterman at center . . . expected to move into starting role this year . . . one of the most consistent blockers on team . . . big enough to play defense if needed . . . experience will be valuable in forward wall.



BRENT THEILING — 6-1, 180, sophomore, Charleston, S. C. Came to Furman as offensive guard, but was switched to center this spring . . . can also play linebacker . . . considered fine blocker with excellent speed will be big asset once he gains experience . . . attended St. Andrews High School.



LINEBACKERS

TOMMY BROADWELL — 5-10, 170, senior, Forest Park, Ga. Has developed into outstanding linebacker over last two years . . . will serve as co-captain during 1969 . . . if needed, could see duty as fullback . . . one of top defensive players last year . . . all-star caliber player.



RICKY CHILDERS — 6-2, 170, sophomore, Decatur, Ga. A versatile athlete who could see duty at several positions . . . could be valuable player once he gains experience . . . attended Towers High School in Decatur . . . excellent attitude and desire to play.





CHUCK CROSS — 6-0, 194, junior, Macon, Ga. Was a sensation as sophomore and bigger things are expected during 1969 . . . was top defensive player last year . . . has all the tools of outstanding linebacker . . . a definite candidate for post season honors . . . expected to be one of best in league.



DICK COLLINS — 5-11, 190, senior, Tallahassee, Fla. After an outstanding sophomore season, was hampered with a knee injury during 1968 . . . was moved to guard during spring and could land starting spot at that position . . . an all-around athlete in high school and college.



QUARTERBACKS

DON CALHOUN — 6-1, 175, junior, Cordele, Ga. Came to Furman as quarterback but was moved to safety last year . . . had knee operation during off-season, but is expected to be fully recovered this fall . . . attended Crisp County High where he played baseball and track.



DOUG GILL — 5-9, 177, sophomore, Waycross, Ga. Top quarterback on last year's freshman team . . . chief challenger to replace Clyde Hewell during 1969 . . . was an outstanding passer at Ware Co. High School . . . can throw long or short and also fine runner.



CLEVE HIGHTOWER — 5-9, 170, junior, Orlando, Fla. Served as backup quarterback last year and could land the No. 1 spot this season . . . suffered knee injury as freshman and has not fully recovered . . . strong arm and excellent scrambler . . . completed 23 of 66 passes last year for 355 yards and four touchdowns.

PALADIN OUTLOOK

For the first time in three years, the Paladins enter the season not sure of the quarterback situation. Little Clyde Hewell, who passed for 3,993 yards during his career has graduated, and spring practice failed to produce a clear cut replacement for him.

The two top candidates for the job are sophomore Doug Gill and junior Cleve Hightower, who passed for 355 yards as Hewell's backup last season. Another possibility is versatile Dick Immel, who could open at anyone of three positions this fall.

While offense has been the Paladins' trademark of excellence in the past, defense could well steal the spotlight during the 1969 campaign. Coach Bob King could put nine starters from last year's defensive team back into the lineup while the offense must replace seven starters.

Following spring drills, however, King was encouraged with his offense and noted plenty of improvement.

"We knew when spring practice opened we had more problems offensively," said the dean of Southern Conference coaches. "But we made plenty of progress and I feel we should be able to move the ball a little better than we did last year."

One of the strongest spots offensively appears to be full-back. George Vaughn, who led last year's freshman team in rushing with 473 yards, and Joe Street will give the Paladins a good one-two punch. Street, who missed most of the 1968 season because of an injury, was the team's leading rusher during 1967 with 693 yards.

Immel will be one of the key players for the Paladins. His most likely starting spot will be running back, but he is also being counted on as a defensive halfback, a spot he was a regular at last year. In addition to Immel at running back, the Paladins will have veteran Rusty Dennis and sophomores Gary Smallen and Steve Crislip.

Another possible double duty man for the Paladins will be Bruce Byers. Last year, Byers started at defensive guard, but was moved to offensive tackle during the spring.

At flanker, the Paladins will have plenty of speed in sophomore Mike Fabian, who could develop into an outstanding receiver, and junior Pat Carroll, who had 33 receptions for 311 yards last year. Bryon Trotter, who caught 28 passes for 343 yards as a sophomore will open at one of the end positions.

Two of the most outstanding returnees from last year's defensive team are tackle Bernie Lanigan and end Pat Wiggins, both of whom are considered all-star players. Junior Chuck Davis moves into the other tackle spot while 250-pounder John Wilson returns at a defensive guard spot.

The linebackers are also veterans in Chuck Cross, last year's top defensive player, and Tommy Broadwell. Dick Collins, who has been moved to offensive guard, could also see duty at linebacker.

The defensive secondary remains intact from a year ago with Immel and Mark Palmer at the halfbacks and Don Calhoun at safety. The trio accounted for nine interceptions last year with Palmer picking off five.

"Our biggest problem will be lack of depth," said King. "We just hope we can continue to improve as much this fall as we did in the spring."

Also, the University of South Carolina football brochure records a game in 1895 in which the Paladins were defeated by a score of 14-10 and Clemson lists its first football victory as a 14-6 win over Furman in 1896. The first schedule (and results) that recent research has revealed was in 1902.
