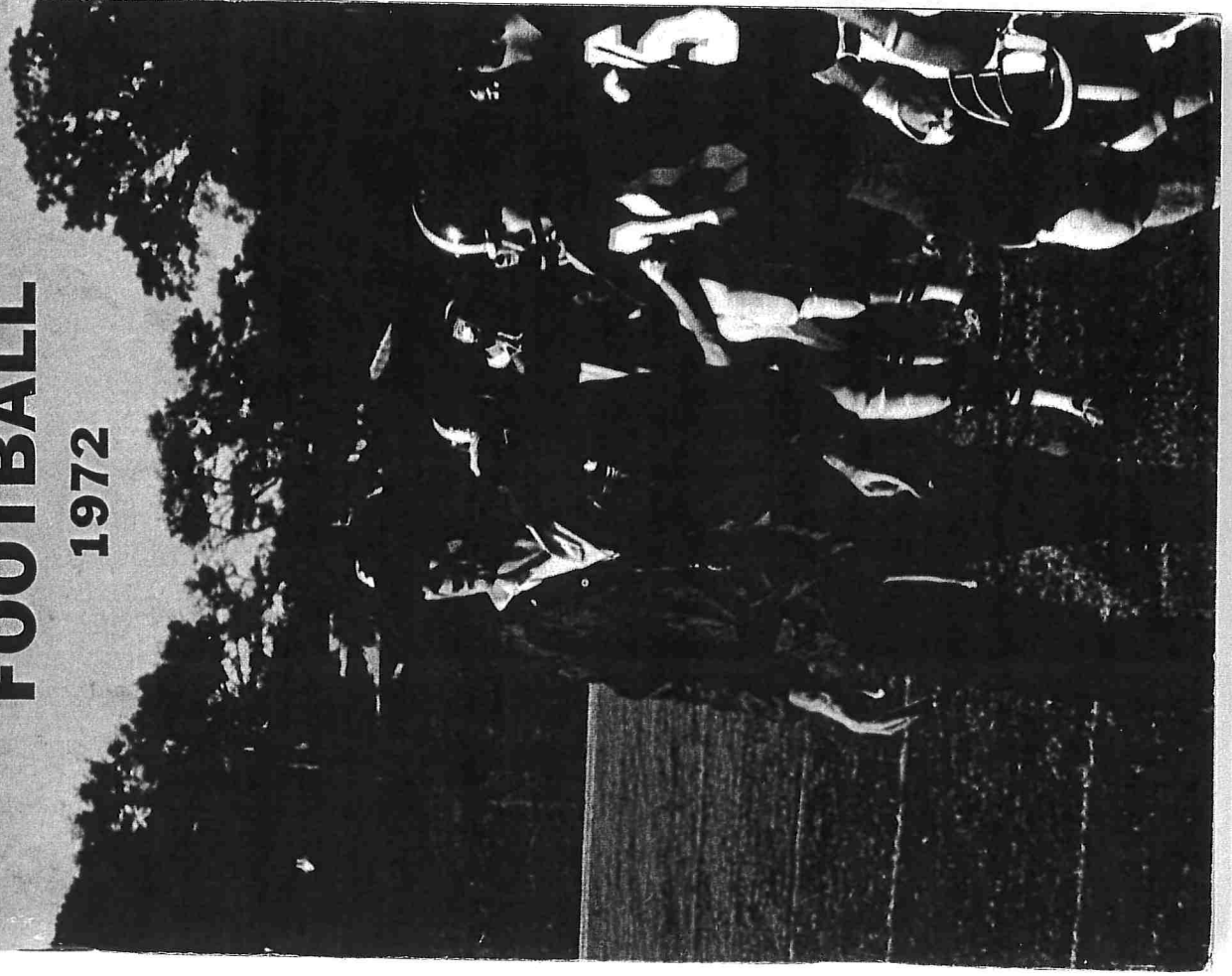

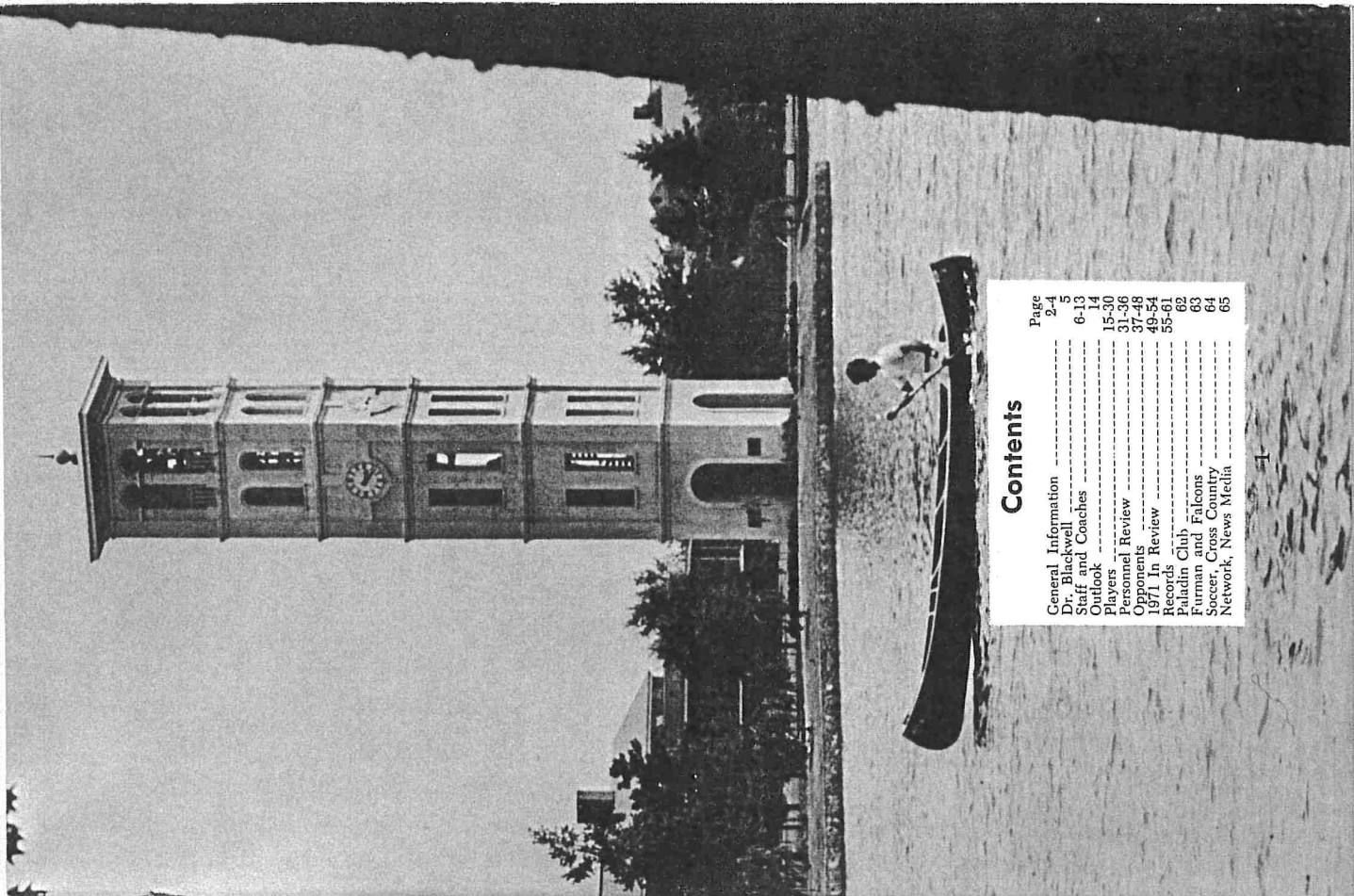
All press box accommodations are handled through the Sports Information Director and should be made at least one week prior to each home game. Only working press will be admitted.

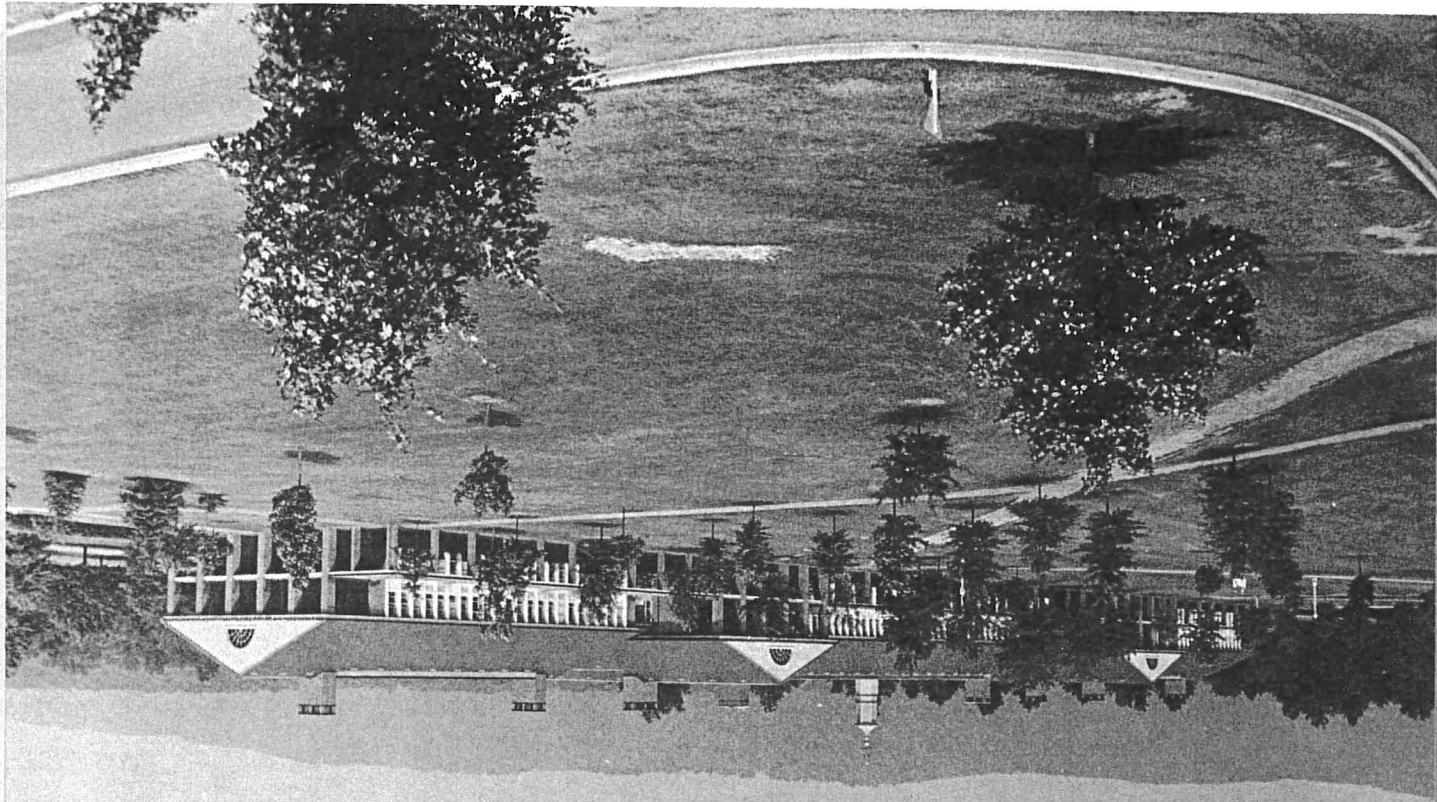

Furman Facts

- Furman University is a private, coeducational college of liberal arts located in Greenville, S. C. Founded in 1826, and located on its present campus in 1958, the University is partially supported by the South Carolina Baptist Association.
- The University is located on a 750-acre wooded campus six miles north of the city. The campus facilities and activities include a 30-acre lake for swimming, boating, and fishing, an 18-hole golf course, 20 tennis courts, a playhouse for experimental drama, a 2,000 seat auditorium, complete gym facilities, a movie series, a lecture series, and a fine art series.
- Furman offers the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Science degrees. The graduate division awards the Master of Arts degree with a major in education and the Master of Science degree with a major in chemistry. A Master of Business Education degree is offered jointly by Furman's Department of Business Administration and the Clemson University College of Industrial Management and Textile Science.
- The James B. Duke Library, fully air-conditioned, houses over 200,000 volumes. More than 1,200 periodicals are received regularly and the microfilm and record collections are extensive.
- The faculty, 75 per cent of whom hold earned doctoral degrees, consists of 127 full-time and 13 part-time professors. The student-faculty ratio of 14:1 allows for individual attention and personal relationships.
- Enrollment during the 1971-72 academic year was 2,075, with students from 36 states in the United States and 9 foreign countries in attendance.
- The Furman University physical plant is valued at over \$25,000,000. Twenty major buildings have been completed. Presently under construction and scheduled for occupancy in 1973 is the Herman W. Lay Physical Education Building.
- All buildings are of reinforced concrete, faced with handmade Virginia brick. The contemporary Williamsburg colonial architecture captures much of the flavor of the Old South, adapted to modern needs and usage.
- The 1971-72 Furman freshman class averaged 1113 on the Scholastic Aptitude Test.
- Furman is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the Southern University Conference, the Association of American Colleges and the South Carolina Association of Colleges. It is on the approved list of the American Association of University Women and the American Chemical Society, and is a member of the National Association of Schools of Music.
- Students at Furman are eligible to earn college credit by participating in foreign study programs for a term or an academic year. Programs offered include travel to England, Spain, France, Austria, Vienna and the Holy Lands.

DR. GORDON W. BLACKWELL



On Feb. 1, 1965, Furman University welcomed Dr. Gordon W. Blackwell as its eighth president.

Known throughout the South as one of the most distinguished administrators, educators, authors and social scientists, Dr. Blackwell has guided Furman to gratifying success in many areas. He has devoted his many talents to the improvement of Furman on the local, state and national scene and his administration strives for excellence in all fields.

Dr. Blackwell launched his career as an educator at Furman where he graduated summa cum laude in 1932. He had a brilliant record at Furman as a scholar, athlete, and student leader. He was captain and No. 1 man on the tennis team for three years, president of the band, president of his fraternity and student magazine editor.

Furman also was the scene where Dr. Blackwell began a teaching career serving as Professor and Chairman of the Sociology Department from 1937 to 1941. He received his M. A. degree from the University of North Carolina and his Ph. D. degree from Harvard University.

Before becoming Furman president, Dr. Blackwell served in the same capacity at Florida State University for four and one-half years. He has also served as Chancellor of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina for three and one-half years.

Born in Timmonsville, S. C., Dr. Blackwell is married to the former Elizabeth Blair Lyles. Sons, Gordon and Randy, are Furman graduates and were Furman varsity basketball team members. Blackwell also has two daughters, Blair (Mrs. Charles Cooper) and Millie (Mrs. W. D. Yarborough).

J. LYLES ALLEY

Director Of Athletics



Seldom has the athletic moral of Furman University surpassed its current state and the man primarily responsible for this success is Director of Athletics J. Lyles Alley. An integral part in the Paladim athletic fortunes for over 25 years, Alley was the chief architect of the 74-57-2 overall record compiled by Furman teams during 1971-72.

Alley is known primarily for the nationally known basketball teams and players that he coached during the 1950's, but his contributions to Furman athletics extend into the 1930's when he established himself as one of the Paladim's most versatile athletes. He won 12 letters in basketball, football, baseball, and track, and was the most valuable football player during his senior year in 1933.

Alley returned to his alma mater in 1945 to assume the position of head basketball coach, and within 10 years Furman had become a familiar name throughout the nation. Under his tutelage, Furman produced its first two All-Americans, Frank Selvy in '54 and Darrell Floyd in '56. His teams were national scoring champions, 1953-56, setting records each time.

In 1957, Alley assumed the duties of athletic director as well as basketball coach, and continued the dual position nine years.

On Nov. 23, 1966, Alley left the game to which he had devoted so many years and assumed the duties of fulltime Director of Athletics. Under his guidance Furman had attained some impressive peaks — and the future looks even brighter.

JOHN WEST

Associate Director of Athletics



John West, one of the most successful track coaches in the nation, returned to Furman University last February as Associate Director of Athletics after a four-year absence. West had coached the Paladim track teams to unprecedented heights during the mid-sixties before going to the University of South Carolina in 1968.

His 1971 team at South Carolina had the first undefeated dual season in the history of the University with a perfect 6-0 record including a relay victory at the prestigious Penn Relays.

A native of Memphis, Tenn., West attended Louisiana State University and graduated from East Texas State University, where he was one of the nation's fastest sprinters with a 9.4 clocking in the 100-yard dash.

West holds a Master's degree from Memphis State University and coached at Frayser High School (Memphis) and Union University (Jackson, Tenn.) before coming to Furman.

An active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, West serves each summer on the staff of several national conferences.

West married the former Charlotte Dickerson of Greenville, Tex. and they have three children, DeAnn, 12, John, 10, and Elizabeth, 8.

DR. FRANCIS W. BONNER

Vice President and Dean Faculty Chairman of Athletics



Dr. Bonner, who was named Faculty Chairman of Athletics in January, 1968, came to Furman as associate professor of English in 1949. He was named Dean of the University in 1961 and Vice President in 1963. He has been a member of Furman's Faculty Committee on Athletics since 1953 and is one of the most loyal Paladim sports fans.

A native of Lanett, Ala., Dr. Bonner received his B. A. and M. A. degrees from the University of Alabama and his Ph. D. from the University of North Carolina.

Prior to coming to Furman, Dr. Bonner taught at the University of Alabama, was head of the English department of the Marietta, Ga., High School and was a graduate instructor at North Carolina.

COACH BOB KING

Furman football and Bob King. For 14 years, the two have been synonymous, and in 1972 the amiable Texan will be at the helm again for the Paladins. As in any tenure of such length, King's career has had its share of "ups and downs", but the past two years have to be termed successful for King and the Paladins.

Two years ago, King led his squad to an 8-3, and was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year. Although not quite as successful last year, Furman still compiled a respectable 5-5-1 record under King's guidance, and the foundation appears solid for another good year in '72.

However, good years are not something of only recent times for Bob King and Furman University. As a Furman athlete, King proved himself to be one of the school's most outstanding and versatile performers, lettering in football, basketball, and track. He was named All-State and All-Southern as a football end in 1936, and also captained the basketball quintet as a senior.

During his final two years, the then Purple Hurricane rolled to 15 victories in 18 games. For his entire collegiate career on the Baptist campus, Furman won 20 games while losing only seven times. Off the field, he was a member of Furman's leadership organization, the Quaternation Club.

Following his graduation, King served as an assistant under Coach "Dizzy" McLeod until 1941. World War II meant that the Ranger, Tex., native had to leave his alma mater, and while away, he coached at Chapel Hill Pre-Flight School while in the Navy.

In 1947, King assumed duties as Coach Ray Eliot's end coach at the University of Illinois, and he remained at the Big Ten school for 11 years until 1957.

King then returned to Furman where he has remained, guiding the Paladins for 14 consecutive years and establishing himself as the Dean of Southern Conference Coaches. During that time, he has twice been named South Carolina Coach of the Year (1961 and 1963). His teams compiled records of 7-3 on each occasion.

The eighth victories by his 1971 team was the most wins for a Furman team since 1935 when the Paladins amassed an 8-1-1 record with a lanky junior named Bob King playing the end position.

King is married to the former Gladys Mason of Greenville, and they are the parents of two children, Bobby and Karen, and three grandchildren.

DON KEMP

Backfield Coach



Kemp joined the Furman staff in June, 1967, and holds the longest tenure of any of the Furman assistant coaches. Before coming to Furman, he served as head coach and athletic director at Ridgeland High School.

A 1961 Furman graduate, Kemp played both offense and defense for the Paladins. He served as co-captain of the 1961 squad.

Following graduation, he served as assistant coach at Carolina High in Greenville for one year before going to Butler High (Augusta, Ga.) as an assistant. In 1964, Kemp moved to Richmond Academy in Augusta for one year, and then went to Ridgeland.

Kemp is responsible for the offensive backfield of the Paladins, and also works with the offensive ends. His recruiting responsibilities are centered in the upper South Carolina area and in Alabama.

An avid golfer, Kemp shoots in the low 70's and has won several local tournaments. He and his wife, Peggy, have one child, Donna, who is nine.

WOODY DILLARD

Line Coach



An East Tennessee State graduate ('64), Dillard played center and linebacker for the Buccaneers. After earning a degree in biology, he served as assistant coach at North (S. C.) High School for a year, and then as head coach for three years at Charleston's Stall High School.

In 1968, Dillard moved to St. Andrews High School in Charleston for two years before coming to Furman in June of 1970. In 1971, the Easley, S. C., native guided the Paladins freshman squad to a 4-1 record, losing only to Gordon Military Academy.

Dillard is in charge of the defensive line and team. His recruiting responsibilities include the lower South Carolina area.

Dillard and his wife, Carolyn, have no children.

FRED HALEY

Line Coach



A former little All-American at Newberry College, Haley joined the Furman staff after serving as head coach for four years at Ninety-Six High School. Since his appointment in July, 1969, he has worked with the offensive line of the Paladins.

Following his graduation from Newberry, where he played end, Haley served as an assistant coach at Macedonia High School. He then moved to Ninety-Six where he remained until coming to Furman as a graduate assistant.

In addition to his responsibilities with the offensive line, Haley also serves as chief recruiter in parts of Florida and the southern area of Georgia.

Haley majored in education major and is a native of Hartwell, Ga. He and his wife, Mandy, have two children, Kip, who is four, and Tap, six months.

BILLY TURNER

Backfield Coach



One of three former Furman players on the staff, Turner returned to his alma mater after serving in the U. S. Army in Germany. Upon his return in June, 1970, Turner served for one year as assistant frosh coach.

Last year, he assumed coaching duties of the defensive backs and ends, and will have the same responsibility this fall. His recruiting responsibilities are primarily in North Georgia and the Dade County area of Florida.

Turner graduated from Furman in 1966 after playing three years of varsity football as fullback and linebacker. The physical education major then served one year as assistant coach at Commerce (Ga.) High School, and two years as military service football coach before returning to Furman.

Turner is a native of Augusta, Ga., and he and wife, Chris, have one child, Todd, who is three.

ELTON BRUNTY

Assistant Coach



A 1963 alumnus, Elton Brunty is entering his second season on the Paladin staff. In 1971, Brunty helped coach the Paladin freshmen to a 4-1 mark, and also guided the Furman baseball team to a 19-12 record.

Before returning to his alma mater, the Hardy, Ky., native coached at Myrtle Beach High School for four years, the last two of which he served as athletic director. In addition to coaching football, Brunty also coached baseball, basketball and track.

While at Furman, Brunty played three years of varsity football, serving as co-captain his senior season. He received his degree in Business Administration. During his junior year, the Paladins compiled an outstanding 7-3 record.

Brunty's responsibilities will center around heading the Paladin junior varsity unit, although he will also assist on the varsity staff. He will once again serve as baseball coach in the spring.

Brunty is a bachelor.

J. L. SHOOP

Trainer



J. L. Shoop, who joined the Furman staff in 1970, will be entering his third year as head trainer of the Paladins. He came to the Baptist school from East Tennessee State University, where he earned a degree with a double major in Health and Physical Education.

While at East Tennessee, Shoop served as assistant trainer for three years. He has also worked in three summer training camps with the NFC Atlanta Falcons and one summer with the Detroit Tiger baseball farm club at Bristol, Va.

Shoop serves as head trainer for the entire athletic department, and is also responsible for student managers and student trainers. He has the additional responsibility of overseeing the equipment manager.

He maintains up-to-date training facilities, and is always available to Furman athletes from his campus apartment.

Shoop was born Sept. 30, 1947 in Wise, Va., and he and his wife, Anne, have no children.

DR. DAYTON RIDDLE

Team Physician



A Furman graduate, who had the honor of graduating at the top of his class, Dr. Riddle serves unselfishly as the team physician for the Paladin athletic squads.

Riddle is a native of Greenville, S. C., and attended Greenville Senior High School before entering Furman. Following his graduation from Furman, he attended the Medical College of South Carolina.

An orthopedic surgeon, Riddle did his residence work at the Medical College. He then was in the Navy and served as team physician for the U. S. Naval Academy during the Midshipmen's Orange and Cotton Bowl appearances in the sixties. He served the Midshipmen while present world champion Dallas Cowboys' quarterback Roger Staubach was signal-caller for Navy.

Although now maintaining his own practice, Riddle continues to take an avid interest in Furman, and serves the athletic program with a tireless effort.

PRINCE ALBERT BROWN

Equipment Manager



For 15 years, one of the most familiar and friendly faces associated with the Furman Athletic Program has been that of equipment manager Prince Brown. Known simply as "Prince," to the hundreds of Furman athletes and students with whom he has come in contact over the years, Brown came to Furman with Coach King in 1957.

Since that time, Prince, who is a veteran of World War II, has served ably and devotedly as the Furman equipment manager. His responsibilities include keeping up with all the Furman football equipment, and making certain that the equipment gets to all away games. He also is responsible for keeping the equipment in good

condition.

During World War II, Brown served overseas in Guam and various other Pacific ports.

THE PALADINS

1972 Outlook

After two successful seasons, 1972 promises to be a year of transition for the Furman Paladins.

The Paladins have compiled a 13-8-1 record during the past two years, but 16 of the players who helped make that mark possible are now gone. Among the losses are such key performers as quarterback John DeLeo, record setting runningback Steve Crislip, and interior line stalwarts Peyton Barton and Ron Boozer.

King's main problem is finding a replacement for DeLeo. Senior John Wolfom appears to be the likely heir to DeLeo's quarterback position, but he has two other challengers and the look of the Paladins in '72 will depend heavily on who wins the signal calling job.

"Whenever you lose your quarterback, the football team takes on an entirely different look," explains King. "If Wolfom starts, we will run more than in the past. If Mike Shelton is the starter, we will be more of a passing team. However, if sophomore Charles Elvington should start, we would be very similar to recent years."

While the quarterback slot remains somewhat doubtful, it is certain that the backfield will have more quickness than in the past with Donnie Griffin, Jim Barnett, Mike Johnson, and Bob Neel slated for the most duty. Griffin, who gained 166 yards as a sophomore, will also handle the punt and kickoff return chores for the Paladins.

The offensive line is suspect with three sophomores possibly in the starting line-up. Starting newcomers could be split end Bill Hayes, tackle Stan Walker, and guard Ketter Calkins, but Mike Bartik, David Couch, and junior college transfer Mike Romano could move into the line-up at any time. The rest of the offensive line is composed of veterans, with James Howard at center, Tom Scherich at guard, Dan Utley at tackle, and John Monferdini at tight end.

The receiving corps of the Paladins has three mainstays in Bartik, who caught 13 passes for 172 yards last year, Monferdini, eight receptions for 111 yards, and flanker Rodney Acker, two catches for 50 yards.

The field goal and extra point game will rest on the reliable toe of junior Al Standiford, who converted 24 of 25 extra point attempts in '71. However, the punting game remains questionable with the graduation of DeLeo, who handled the punting duties.

While the offense appears destined to suffer from lack of experience in the early stages, King will be able to field one of his most experienced defensive units ever.

Heading the veteran defensive unit is All-Southern Conference defensive end David Shi. The 6-0, 190 pounder from Atlanta, Ga., is one of five lettermen slated to start on the defensive front. Other returnees are tackles Paul Wickswat, Don Haynie, end George Harbin, and Bruce Crowe.

The linebacker positions will also be in experienced hands with the return of veterans Ivey Stewart and Keith Downey, both of whom started last season. Sophomores Bayless Byles and Bill Anderson provide capable backup help.

Three more veterans are tabbed to start in the defensive secondary, but an outstanding sophomore could possibly break into that trio. The lettermen are halfbacks David Williamson and Jimmy Hagelthorn and safety Wayne Wilson, but versatile sophomore Norman MacDonald is highly regarded by the Paladin coaching staff. Senior safetyman Jimmy Ouzts should also see plenty of action.

THE 1971 SEASON

It was difficult to follow-up the "Impossible Dream Year of 1970," but the Furman Paladins put together another fine season last fall, going 5-5-1. As the record indicates it was a year of "ups-and-downs," which ended on a very sweet note after a somewhat sour beginning.

The year started with a 0-0 deadlock with Appalachian State in a game which the defense ruled. Although both teams had several scoring opportunities, neither could cash in on them. A week later, the Paladins offense started moving but defense had a second half collapse as Presbyterian rolled to a 35-14 victory.

The low ebb came a week later however, when Wofford smothered the visiting Paladins 27-0 as the Furman offense sputtered throughout the night.

Now 0-2-1, Coach Bob King and his squad were faced with a "must" game against the VMI Keydets, and produced. The heroes were a stout defense and quarterback John DeLeo who fired scoring passes to Blake Carlyle and John Monferdini. With the confidence of victory, Furman staged a second half comeback to defeat Western Carolina 21-14 and blitzed Davidson one week later 41-6. In both games, it was the Paladins' senior duo of DeLeo and Steve Crislip leading the way on offense, with Donny Griffin and Mike Fabian adding some spectacular fireworks on punt and kick off returns.

The Paladins' express, now 3-2-1, was brought to an abrupt halt the next week when conference champion-to-be Richmond upended Furman 20-0. The record went back below .500 the following Saturday as East Carolina used a second half surge to topple the visiting Paladins 26-13, despite a pair of scoring runs by DeLeo. The game was unusual in that Paladin place kicker Al Standiford missed an extra point — his only miss of the season in 25 attempts.

It was "up" the next week as the Paladins used big plays by Crislip, Griffin, and Fabian to crush the Guilford Quakers 42-14, but the ensuing week brought the most bitter defeat of the year as The Citadel nipped Furman 35-33 when a last minute rally fell short.

Saddled with a 4-5-1 mark entering the final game, the Paladins now faced small-college power Carson-Newman as they tried to avoid a losing season. Jumping into a 13-3 halftime lead, Furman coasted to a 23-10 victory, but the big story of the evening was the record setting performance of Crislip.

The Augusta, Ga., native rushed for a school record 229 yards, giving him a season mark of 1,002 yards and making him the first Furman player to ever gain over 1,000 yards via the ground in a single season. The Furman season had certainly ended on a sweet note—a note which it will try to carry throughout 1972.

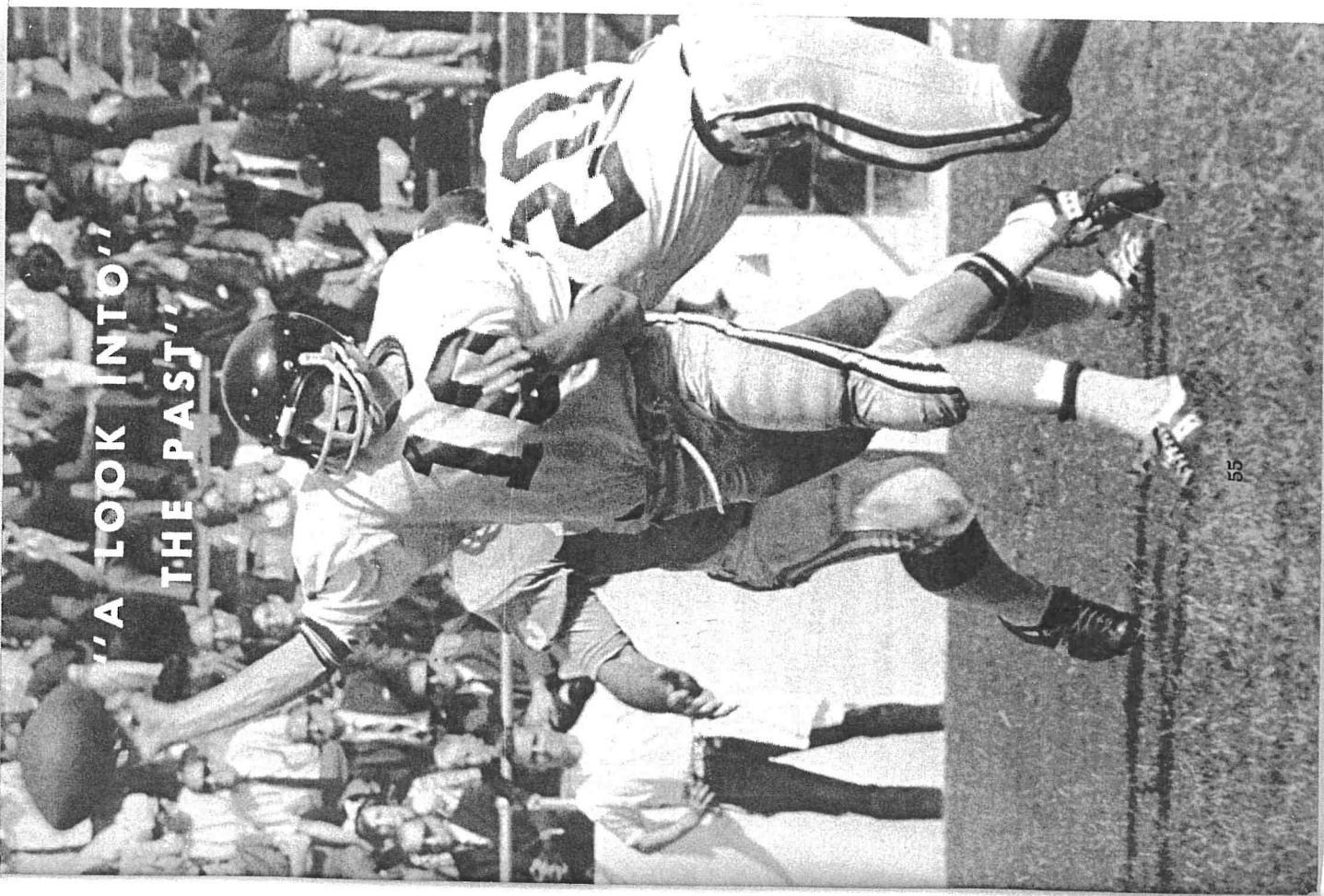

Official Scores

Furman University had student football teams of a somewhat unorganized nature before 1900. Harold Claassen's Encyclopedia of Football lists an 1891 game in which Duke defeated Furman 96-0. Also, the University of South Carolina football brochure records a game in 1895 in which the Paladins were defeated by a score of 14-10 and Clemson lists its first football victory as a 14-6 win over Furman in 1896. The first schedule (and results) that recent research has revealed was in 1902. Down through the years football has been an important part of the Furman athletic program, and indeed of the University itself. Of necessity, there have been two periods when football was not played. No intercollegiate games were played from 1903 through 1912—because of University administrative action—and no games were played during World War II.
