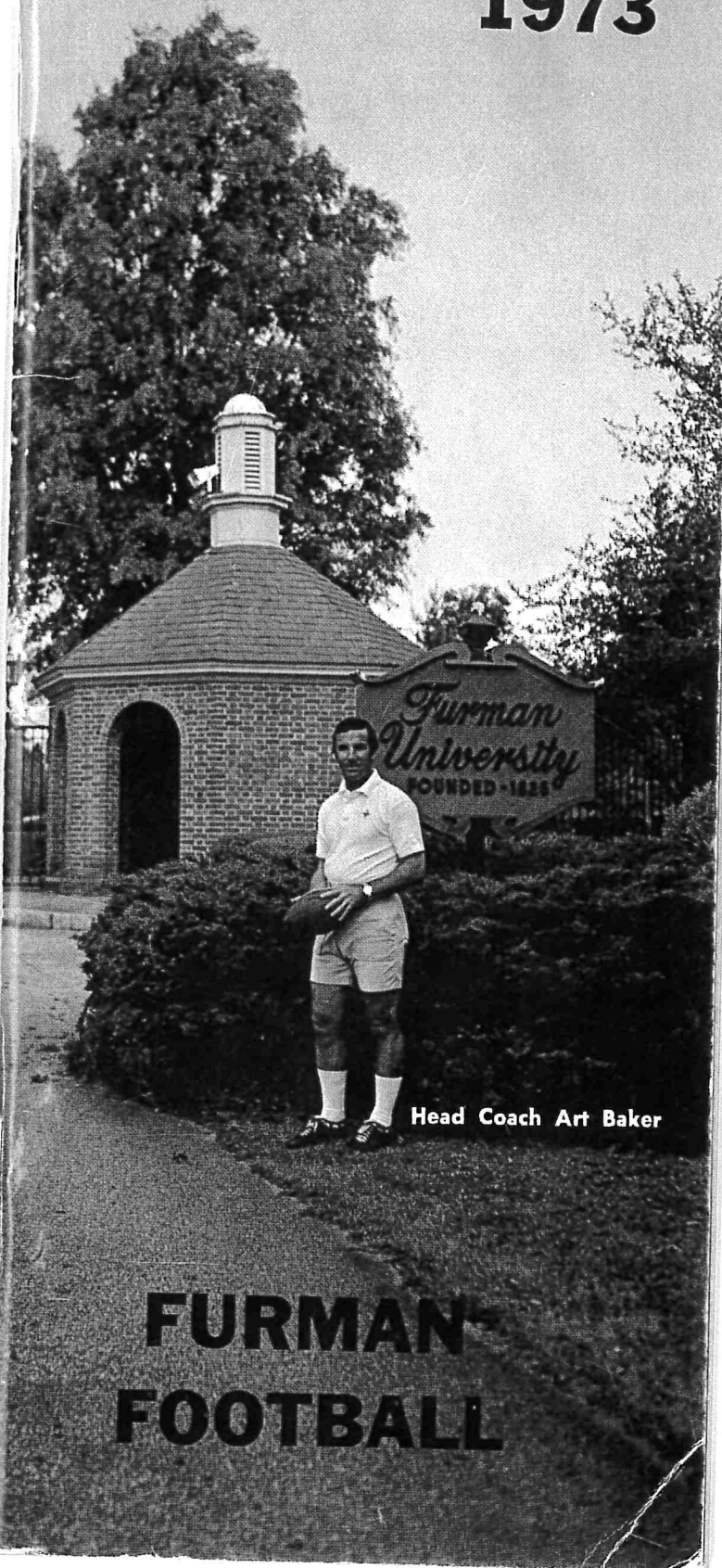

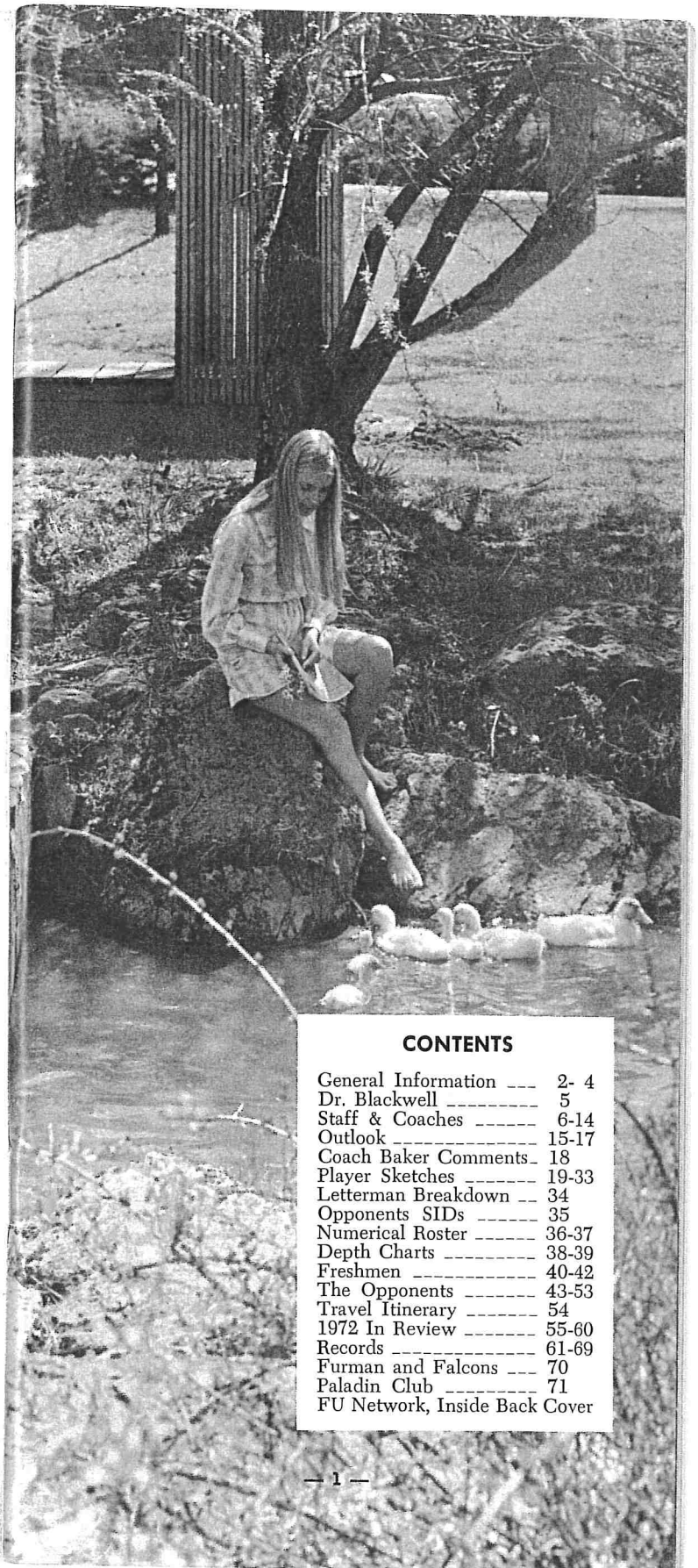
All press box accommodations are handled through the Sports Information Director and should be made at least one week prior to each home game. Only working press will be admitted.

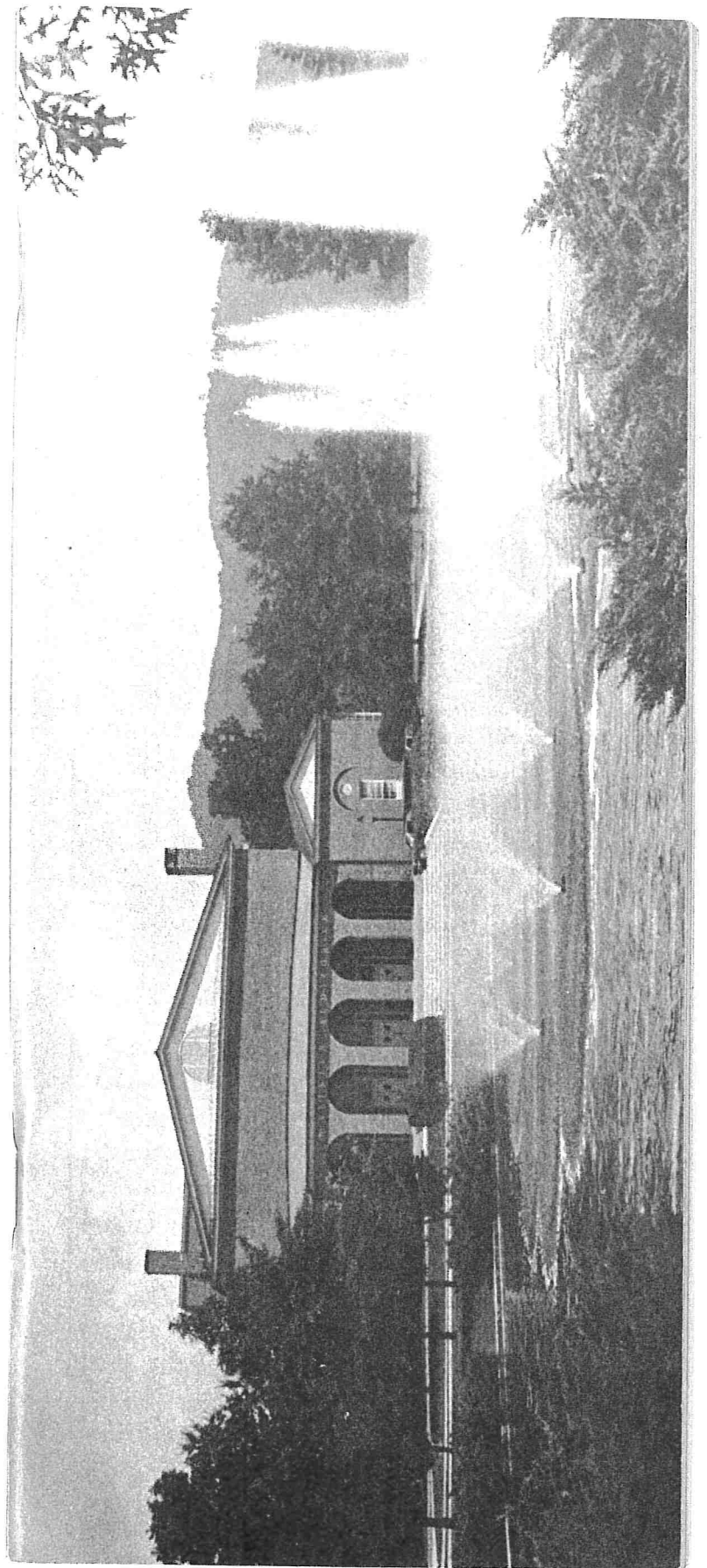

## FURMAN FACTS

- °Furman University is a private, coeducational college of liberal arts located in Greenville, S. C. Founded in 1826, and located on its present campus in 1958, the University is partially supported by the South Carolina Baptist Convention.
- °The University is located on a 750-acre wooded campus six miles north of the city. Campus facilities and activities include a 30-acre lake for swimming, boating, and fishing, an 18-hole golf course, 20 tennis courts, a playhouse for experimental drama, a 2,000 seat auditorium, physical activities center, an athletic building, seven playing fields, a movie series, a lecture series, and a fine arts series.
- °Furman offers the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Science degrees. The graduate division awards the Master of Arts degree with a major in education and the Master of Science degree with a major in chemistry. A Master of Business Education degree is offered jointly by Furman's Department of Business Administration and the Clemson University College of Industrial Management and Textile Science.
- °The James B. Duke Library, fully air-conditioned, houses over 205,000 volumes. More than 1,250 periodicals are received regularly and the microfilm and record collections are extensive. New books are now being acquired at the rate of approximately 10,000 per year.
- °The faculty, 75 per cent of whom hold earned doctoral degrees, consists of 128 full-time and 12 part-time professors. The student-faculty ratio of 15:1 allows for individual attention and personal relationships.
- °Enrollment during the 1972-73 academic year was 2,089, with students from 34 states in the United States and six foreign countries in attendance.
- °The Furman University physical plant is valued at over \$29,000,000. Twenty-one major buildings have been completed. Buildings for music and the visual arts will be begun shortly.
- °Buildings are reinforced concrete, faced with handmade Virginia brick. The contemporary Williamsburg colonial architecture captures much of the flavor of the Old South, adapted to modern needs and usage.
- °The 1972-73 Furman freshman class averaged 1118 on the Scholastic Aptitude Tests.
- °Furman is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the Southern University Conference, the Association of American Colleges and the South Carolina Association of Colleges. It is on the approved list of the American Association of University Women and the American Chemical Society, and is a member of the National Association of Schools of Music.
- °Students at Furman are eligible to earn college credit by participating in foreign study programs for a term or an academic year. Programs offered include travel to England, Spain, France, Austria, and the Middle East.





## J. LYLES ALLEY, M. A.

Director of Athletics



One of the foremost figures in Furman Athletic history, J. Lyles Alley is in his 16th year as the Paladins' Director of Athletics. However, his role in the Furman University athletic program reaches back over a period of almost 30 years as a athlete, coach, and administrator.

As a student, Alley lettered in basketball, football, baseball, and track, and was named Furman's most valuable football player in 1933 when the Paladins rolled to a 6-1-2 mark. Altogether, Alley won 12 letters before graduating in 1933.

After a 12-year separation, the Spartanburg, S. C., native returned to Furman in 1945 to assume the position of head basketball coach and within 10 years Furman University had become a familiar name throughout the nation. Under his guidance, Furman produced its first two All-Americans, Frank Selvy in 1954 and Darrell Floyd in 1956.

His teams were national scoring champions, 1953-56, setting records each time, and his 1951-52 team was voted the nation's most improved. His 1952-53 team still holds the record for most victories by a Furman team with 21 triumphs.

In 1957, Alley assumed the duties of athletic director as well as basketball coach, and continued the dual position nine years before relinquishing his coaching position in order to devote fulltime to his duties as Director of Athletics.

In recognition of his many contributions to Furman and the State of South Carolina, Alley has been honored with membership in the state's Athletic Hall of Fame. However, all of his contributions are not in the past. Under Alley's leadership, Furman is currently enjoying new peaks in athletic morale and looks to go higher.

## JOHN WEST, M. ED.

Associate Director of Athletics



In only a year John West has established himself as one on the nation's most capable young administrators. Through his promotional efforts, Furman football attendance reached an all-time high last season as the Paladins drew 55,000 spectators for five home games.

Before concentrating his efforts on the administrative end of athletics, West was one of the nation's most successful track coaches at Furman and the University of South Carolina.

The Memphis, Tenn., native coached the Paladin track teams to unprecedented heights during the mid-sixties before going to the University of South Carolina in 1968. His 1971 team at South Carolina had the first undefeated dual season in the history of the University with a perfect 6-0 record including a victory in the prestigious Penn Relays.

West attended Louisiana State University and graduated from East Texas State University, where he was one of the nation's fastest sprinters with a 9.4 clocking in the 100-yard dash.

A much sought after banquet speaker and member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, West holds a Master's degree from Memphis State University and coached at Frayssure High School (Memphis) and Union University (Jackson, Tenn.) before coming to Furman.

West married the former Charlotte Dickerson of Greenville, Tex., and they have three children, DeAnn, 13, John, 11, and Elizabeth, 9.

## DR. FRANCIS W. BONNER, M. A., PH. D.

Vice President and Provost

Faculty Chairman of Athletics

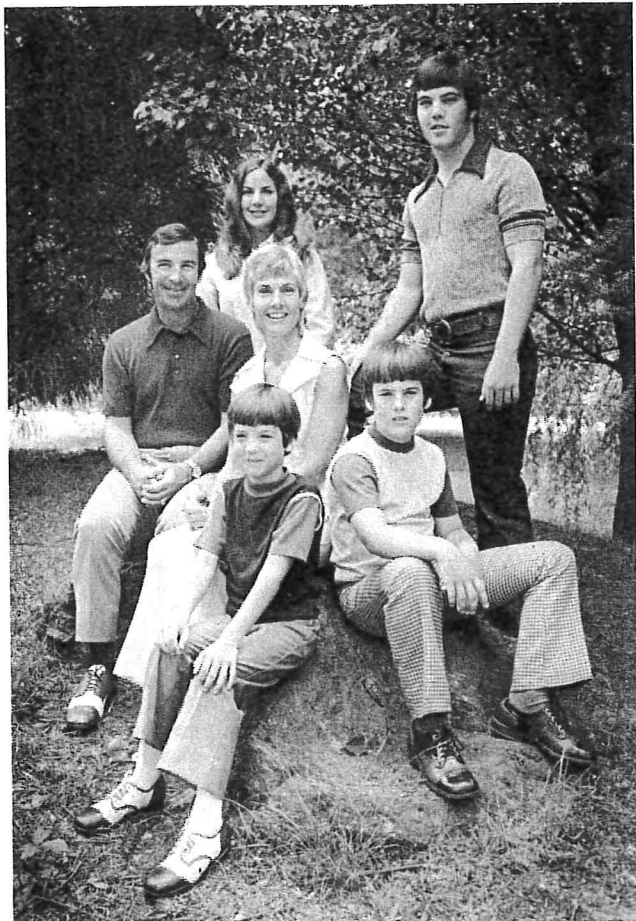


One of the most respected men in the Southern Conference, Dr. Bonner was elected President of the Conference last January. He has served as Faculty Chairman of Athletics since January of 1968. Dr. Bonner came to Furman as an associate professor of English in 1949, and was named Dean of the University in 1961. Two years later he was named Vice President of the University. He has been a member of Furman's Faculty Committee on Athletics since 1953 and is one of the most loyal Paladin sports fans.

A native of Lanett, Ala., Dr. Bonner received his B. A. and M. A. degree from the University of Alabama and his Ph. D. from the University of North Carolina.

Prior to coming to Furman, Dr. Bonner taught at the University of Alabama, was head of the English department of the Marietta, Ga., High School, and was a graduate instructor at North Carolina.

## HEAD COACH ART BAKER, B. A.



Some people jump at any chance. Others wait for the right opportunity. Arthur Wellington Baker, 44, belongs to the latter group and Furman football fans could not be happier.

Last December, Baker accepted the head coaching position at Furman University after waiting in the shadows as an assistant for seven years at Clemson, and most recently, at Texas Tech.

"At Texas Tech I had one of the top assistant coach's jobs in the nation, but I have had an objective to be a head coach, and felt that it was time to make the move," explains Baker. "Furman University offers a tremendous opportunity and challenge that I look forward to."

Baker brings to Furman a record filled with success, both as an athlete and as a coach. A native of Sumter, S. C., Baker graduated from Edmunds High School in 1948 and attended Presbyterian College where he lettered in football and wrestling before graduating in 1953. After two years of mil-

itary service, he began his coaching career at McColl High School in 1956. Two years later he moved to Newberry High School and in 1959 was named head coach at Columbia's Eau Claire High School.

Under Baker, the Shamrocks became one of the dominant football powers of the state as they compiled a 43-16-4 record from 1959-64, and finished as state runner-up on two occasions. Three times (1959-60-63), Baker was tabbed as Coach-of-the-Year in Columbia and in 1963, he was chosen to coach the South Carolina team in the Shrine Bowl.

In 1965, Baker received his first taste of college coaching when he guided the Clemson freshmen to their first undefeated season in almost 20 years, leading the Cubs to a 4-0-1 record. The next season he was appointed offensive backfield coach on the varsity level and remained on Coach Frank Howard's staff until 1969 when he went to Texas Tech as an assistant to Jim Carlen.

Once again Baker wasted little time in helping to change the fortunes of a football program as the Red Raiders compiled an 8-3 mark in the regular season before losing to Georgia Tech in the Sun Bowl. A year later, a series of close defeats brought a disappointing 4-7 record, but last season Tech rebounded with another 8-3 record and earned another trip to the Sun Bowl.

Baker's impact on the Tech success can be found quickly by looking at the Southwest Conference statistics. With Baker serving as offensive backfield coach, the Red Raiders led the tough Southwest Conference in scoring, total offense, and rushing last season by averaging 23.1 points per game, 368.5 yards total offense a contest, and 263.3 yards rushing during the 1972 regular season.

In addition, Baker was also in charge of the kick return team, which produced the nation's top returner in Lawrence Williams.

Just as his coaching record stands on its own, Baker's interest and work in the community also testify to his enthusiastic spirit. A very active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Baker is a frequent speaker at many area banquets and youth organizations, and his philosophy of life plays a large role in his coaching philosophy.

"Our program is based on character. Without it, it is impossible to win. Discipline is at a premium at this time in our country, but our football team will have discipline," says Baker.

Baker is married to the former Julia Edith Edens and they have four children—Artie, 18, who is a runningback and linebacker for Christ Church School, Kim, 17, Ryan 10, and Curtis, 8.

## JIM SATTERFIELD, M. A.

### Assistant Coach



Jim Satterfield comes to Furman after compiling one of the most outstanding records in South Carolina prep history. During his five seasons as head coach at Eau Claire and Irmo High Schools, Satterfield put together a record of 49-4-1. During that period, Satterfield-coached teams won five conference championships and one Upper State title. When Eau Claire won the Upper State crown in 1970, Satterfield, who has also served as Shrine Bowl coach, was named South Carolina High School Coach of the Year.

A native of Lancaster, S. C., Satterfield graduated from the University of South Carolina in 1962. He immediately joined the Eau Claire staff where he served as an assistant coach under Art Baker. In 1968, he was named head coach at Eau Claire where he remained until moving to Irmo High School in 1971.

Satterfield will handle the offensive backs for the Paladins, and will also take a large role in recruiting. He is married to the former Sara Ann Funderburk and they have three children, Shaun, 9, Sydney, 7, and Lee, 6.

## DICK SHERIDAN, M. A.

### Assistant Coach



Another former South Carolina High School Coach of the Year, Dick Sheridan rejoins Coach Baker after compiling a 37-8-1 mark in his four years as a prep head coach. The highlight of that impressive prep coaching career came in 1971 when Sheridan coached Orangeburg-Wilkinson to an undefeated 13-0 record and the State 4-A championship. That team was also ranked 12th in the nation, and Sheridan was tabbed Coach of the Year in South Carolina.

A 1964 graduate of the University of South Carolina, Sheridan joined Baker at Eau Claire in the fall of '64 and remained there as an assistant until 1969. He was named head coach at Orangeburg-Wilkinson in 1969 and remained there three seasons before going to Airport High School in 1972.

A native of North Augusta, S. C., Sheridan and his wife, Brenda, have two sons, Bobby, 7, and Jon, 5.

## HAROLD WHEELER, M. A.

### Assistant Coach



Harold Wheeler comes to Furman after establishing a reputation as one of the top defensive backfield coaches in the country while at Newberry College. A 1964 graduate of Southwest Missouri State, Wheeler coached the Indian backfield to a collegiate record of 41 interceptions in 1971.

A native of West Plains, Mo., Wheeler graduated from West Plains High School and played football at Southwest Missouri State. After earning a Bachelor of Science degree in mathematics, he coached for two seasons at Mountain View High School in Missouri. In 1966, Wheeler began a two year graduate assistant tenure at the University of Georgia before going to Newberry in 1968.

A bachelor, Wheeler is an avid sportsman whose main interest outside of football is golf. He also enjoys movies, and is active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

## STEVE ROBERTSON, B. A.

### Assistant Coach



Steve Robertson comes to Furman from Newberry College where he has served as defensive co-ordinator since 1968. Before joining the Indian Staff, Robertson spent eight years at Eau Claire High School as an assistant and head coach. He joined the Shamrocks in 1959 as an assistant to Baker and assumed the head coaching duties in 1965 when Baker accepted the freshman coaching position at Clemson.

In 1967, Robertson guided Eau Claire to the state 3-A championship and was tabbed as coach of the year in the Palmetto State. His three year record at Eau Claire was 28-4-1.

A native of Greer, S. C., Robertson graduated from Newberry College after earning all-state and all-conference honors for the Indians.

Robertson is married to the former Linda Gossett, and they have two children, Ron, 6, and Robin, 3.

## BILLY WARE, B. A.

### Graduate Assistant



A former star linebacker at Clemson, Billy Ware is assisting Coach Baker this year while working on his master's degree in education. Ware was a three year starter for the Tigers after going to Clemson without a scholarship, and was named to the South Carolina All-State team as a senior. As a freshman, Ware started for Coach Baker on Clemson's first undefeated freshmen team in 20 years.

After completing his eligibility, the Varnhill, S. C., native was an assistant coach for Clemson's undefeated, untied freshmen team in 1969. The following year he was an assistant coach at Wade Hampton High School, but returned to Clemson in 1972 to serve as a graduate assistant.

An avid hunter and golfer, Ware is married to the former Claudia Lightsey and they have two daughters, Stephanie Louise and Claudia Dowling, both one year old.

## RICKY GILSTRAP, B. A.

### Graduate Assistant



One of the best high school athletes ever to come out of South Carolina, Rick Gilstrap is undertaking his first coaching assignment this fall. A native of Easley, S. C., Gilstrap played football for the Green Wave and was named to the High School All-American team and captain of the All-State team. He was also selected as the Most Outstanding Back in the 1967 Shrine Bowl.

Gilstrap graduated from Clemson University in 1972 after playing four years of football and a season of freshman basketball. As a senior, he led the Tigers in rushing yardage and was named to the Atlantic Coast Conference Scholastic Honor Roll. During his career at Clemson, Gilstrap started at fullback, quarterback, and halfback.

An enthusiastic movie goer, he enjoys hunting and sporting activities of most any type. Gilstrap is single.

## KEN PETTUS, B. A.

### Graduate Assistant



A small college All-American at Newberry College, Ken Pettus is in his first season at Furman. Pettus played his high school ball at Greenville High School under Slick Moore and led the Red Raiders to a 9-1 record as a senior. During his high school career, Pettus was tabbed All-State, All-South, and All-American. Following graduation in 1969, he attended Newberry and helped the Indians to four successful seasons. He was Lineman of the Year in the Carolinas Conference as a junior, and was selected to the All-State team last fall. Pettus was chosen for the small college A-A team as a linebacker. He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in history and education. A bachelor, Pettus enjoys hunting and fishing and is a active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

## JAY SHOOP, B. S.

### Trainer



Jay Shoop has become one of the most indispensable members of the Furman family since his arrival in 1970. A graduate of East Tennessee State, where he earned a double major in health and physical education, Shoop has rapidly become one of the top trainers in the South.

The Wise, Va., native has a thorough background in physical training, serving as assistant trainer at East Tennessee for three years. He has also worked in five summer training camps with the NFC Atlanta Falcons and one summer with the Detroit Tiger baseball farm club at Bristol, Va.

Shoop maintains an up-to-date training room, and is always available to Furman athletes from his campus apartment. In addition to serving as trainer for the entire athletic department, Shoop also oversees four student trainers and handles all travel arrangements in football and basketball.

When not tied up with training responsibilities, Shoop enjoys golf and is active in local church work. He and his wife, Anne, have no children.

## DR. DAYTON RIDDLE, M. D.

### Team Physician



A Furman graduate, who had the honor of graduating at the top of his class, Dr. Riddle serves unselfishly as the team physician for the Paladin athletic squads.

Riddle is a native of Greenville, S. C., and attended Greenville Senior High School before entering Furman. Following his graduation from Furman, he attended the Medical College of South Carolina.

An orthopedic surgeon, Riddle did his residence work at the Medical College. He then was in the Navy and served as team physician for the U. S. Naval Academy during the Middies' Orange and Cotton Bowl appearances in the sixties. He served the Midshipmen while Dallas Cowboys' quarterback Roger Staubach was signal-caller for Navy.

Although now maintaining his own practice, Riddle continues to take an avid interest in Furman, and serves the athletic program with a tireless effort.

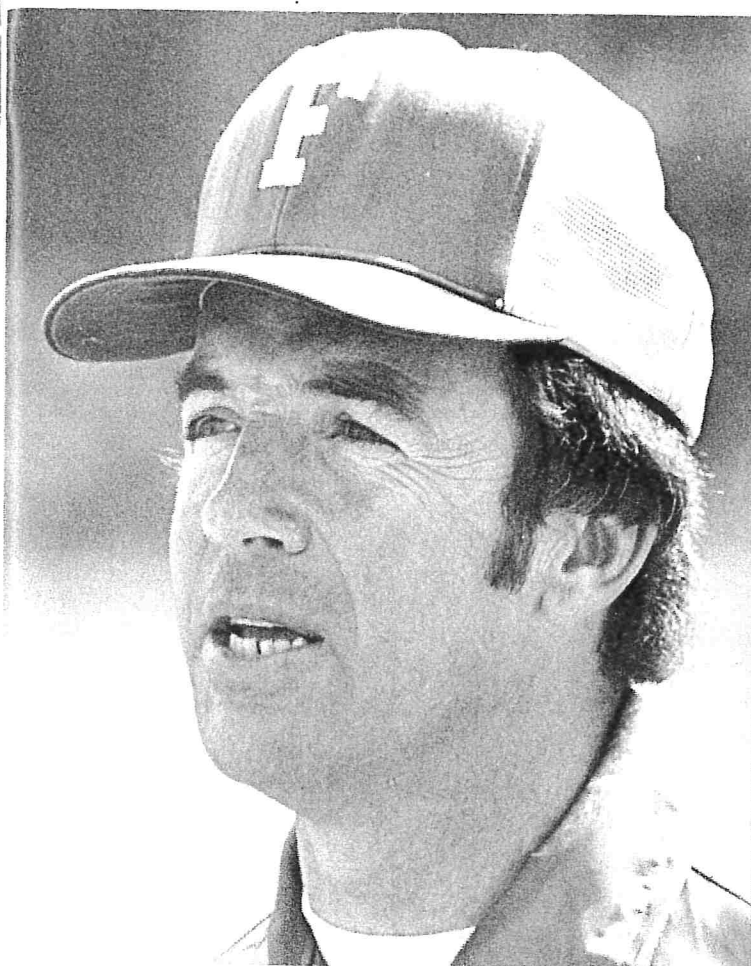

## THE OUTLOOK . . .



## THE BAKER ERA BEGINS . . .

A solid corps of returning lettermen, an outstanding recruiting year, and one of the top college coaching staffs to be found anywhere should provide Paladin fans with one of Furman's most exciting seasons ever.

Heading the list of veterans is All-Southern Conference, All-State defensive back Vince Perone, Jr., who tied the conference record (10) for interceptions as a sophomore. Add defensive tackle Danny Utley, another all-conference performer, and exciting runningback Donny Griffin and the picture becomes clearer.

However, individual performances are important only in terms of group results and new coach Art Baker is primarily concerned with overall offensive and defensive performances.

Putting the football into the end zone proved to be a problem for the Paladins last fall as they played five games scoring only one touchdown or less. Baker tried to correct that flaw during spring practice and the early results were encouraging.

The offensive backfield proved to be a pleasant surprise and should be a strong point this season with Griffin at tailback, Sam Christner and Randy Mahaffey dividing time at fullback, and either Charles Elvington or Mike Shelton at quarterback.

"Griffin is ideal for the tailback spot in our type of offense," says Baker, whose Veer style of play calls for running approximately 65 per cent of the time. "Christner and Mahaffey are also the kind of fullbacks we need because they are strong enough to go inside, but also quick enough to go outside."

Targets for Shelton and Elvington will be no problem with the return of glue-fingered split end Mike Bartik, flanker Jim Warren, and tight ends Steve Hall and Ted Cain.

The offensive line, though small, should also prove to be effective if last spring was any indication. Anchoring the line are "mini-brutes" Mike Romano (5-8, 195) at guard and Keifer Calkins (5-8, 185) at center. Other likely starters are Richard Goodpaster (6-4, 215) and Tom Scherich (6-1, 200) at tackles and Ken Head (6-2, 205) at the other guard.

Despite the return of Perone, the defense appears suspect in the backfield due to inexperience, but should be very adequate elsewhere. Senior Keith Downey heads a corps of linebackers that could be the strongest part of the entire team. Teaming with Downey are junior Bayless Biles and sophomore Kit Smith, and also look for freshman Larry Anderson to play an important role before the season is completed.

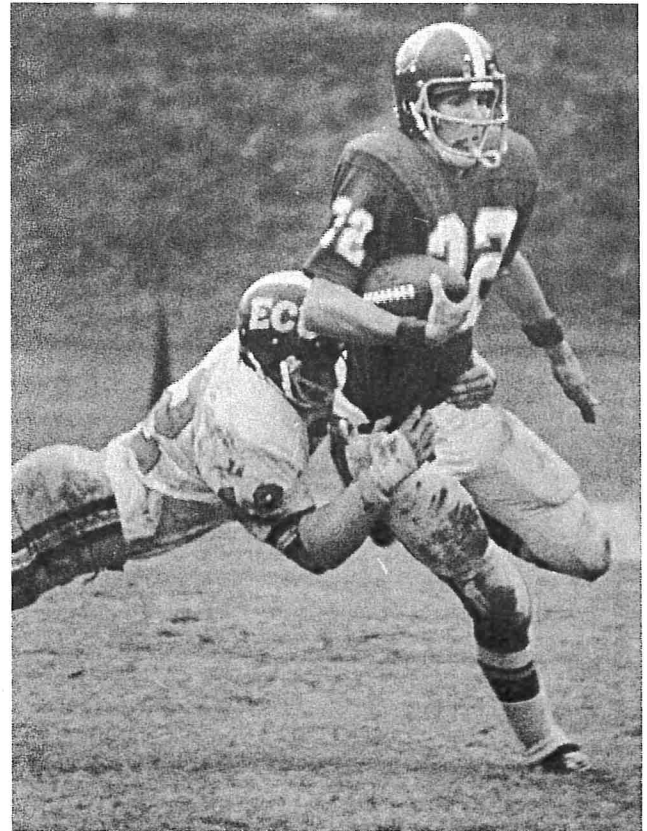
The defensive line appears solid with ends Bill Anderson

and Jerry Cofer, and tackles Stan Walker, Danny Utley, and freshman Tony Cox.

After Perone in the secondary, the Paladins have little experience unless safety Wayne Wilson recovers from knee surgery. Probable starters with Perone will be junior Norman MacDonald and sophomores Mark Mosher and Jimmy Griffin, but look for John Nichols, John Brocard, and Ronny Byrd to also see plenty of action.

The Paladins preseason picture could be altered by some of the 30 incoming freshmen, who should form one of the Furman's strongest first year classes in many seasons. Some of the freshmen who have a good chance of seeing varsity action along with Anderson and Cox are David Whitehurst, Neal Phillips, Robert Hutchingson, Harry King, and Chan Henry.

Along with outstanding players, the Paladins will feature a coaching staff that has compiled one of the most remarkable prep records anywhere. As high school coaches, Baker, Steve Robertson, Dick Sheridan, and Jimmy Satterfield had a composite mark of 157 victories, 32 losses, and seven ties. Those four are joined by Harold Wheeler, and graduate assistants Ricky Gilstrap, Billy Ware, and Ken Pettus.



## COACH BAKER COMMENTS ON . . .

### The Role of Athletics in the University System.

*"I think athletics are a valuable asset to the overall university program. You hear a lot about the evils of college athletics (recruiting violations, academic privileges, etc.), but that represents only a small portion of the universities and a small portion of the athletes. Compared to the average student, you will find a favorable picture as far as the performance and contributions of former athletes in the world after graduation. I feel definitely that the values (discipline, competition, ability to learn to accept success and failure) far outweigh the bad points of college athletics."*

### The Role of Discipline in Athletics.

*"Based on the people and programs I have admired and respected since entering coaching, those people who have discipline generally have winning programs. To be a football player in college is not normal. Players have to learn to conform to certain standards for the good of the team. Most of our rules we believe are for the good of the individual as well as the team. I feel like the objective of any program is to win and without discipline winning is not possible."*

### Why He Chose to Come to Furman.

*"As most any man entering the coaching profession, I had set a goal of being a head coach. Furman was not my first opportunity. I had had four or five chances prior to get into a head coaching position, but had not felt they were not the opportunity I was looking for. There were several reasons for choosing Furman. First, it was a university with a Christian background. Second, it was a university where students could receive a quality education. Third, I would be allowed to bring in the staff that I felt was necessary. Fourth, there was the challenge. Finally, my wife felt it would be a good move when we discussed it, and she has been uncanny in her wisdom throughout my career."*

### Goals at Furman.

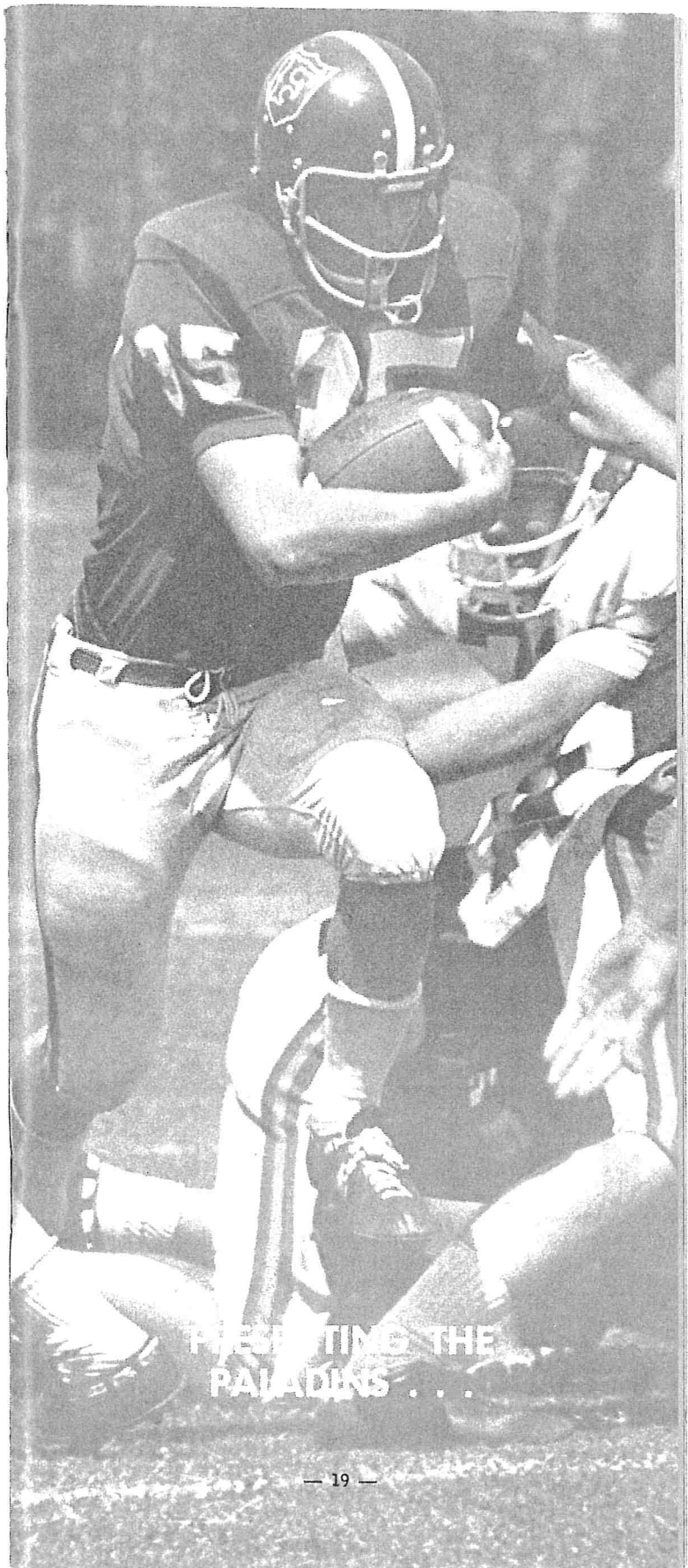
*"We have both short-range and long-range goals. Our goals for this season are to have a winning season, get the very utmost out of every player, and give Furman fans an opportunity to bring their families out for an evening of entertainment. Our long-range goals are to win the Southern Conference every year we compete for it, improve the facilities and program, and help Furman University football to reach its highest potential."*

### The Role of Christianity in his Life.

*"As a coach I feel I have opportunities to meet, talk to, and influence a lot of people, especially young people. As a Christian, I feel it is my responsibility to take every opportunity to speak about Jesus Christ to anyone who is willing to listen. I will not try to force a player against any religious or non-religious beliefs he has personally, but every boy is told of our desire to see him in church on Sunday and become a part of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes when he is recruited. Being married to a wonderful Christian wife has played a big role in my feeling this way."*

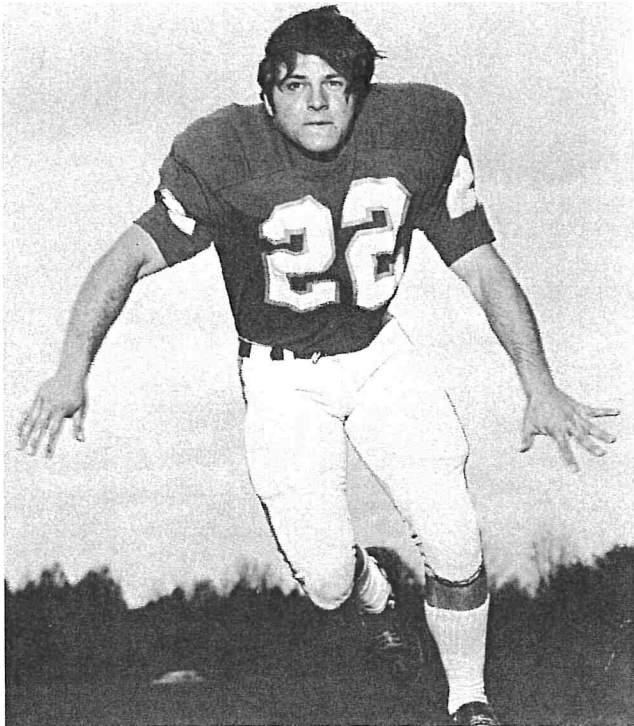
### Unselfishness.

- \*Tied Conference Record of 10 Interceptions



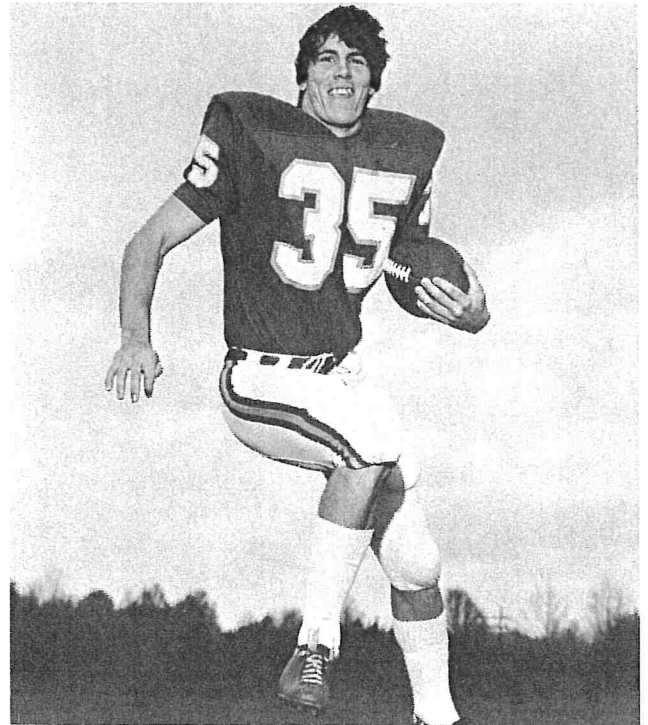

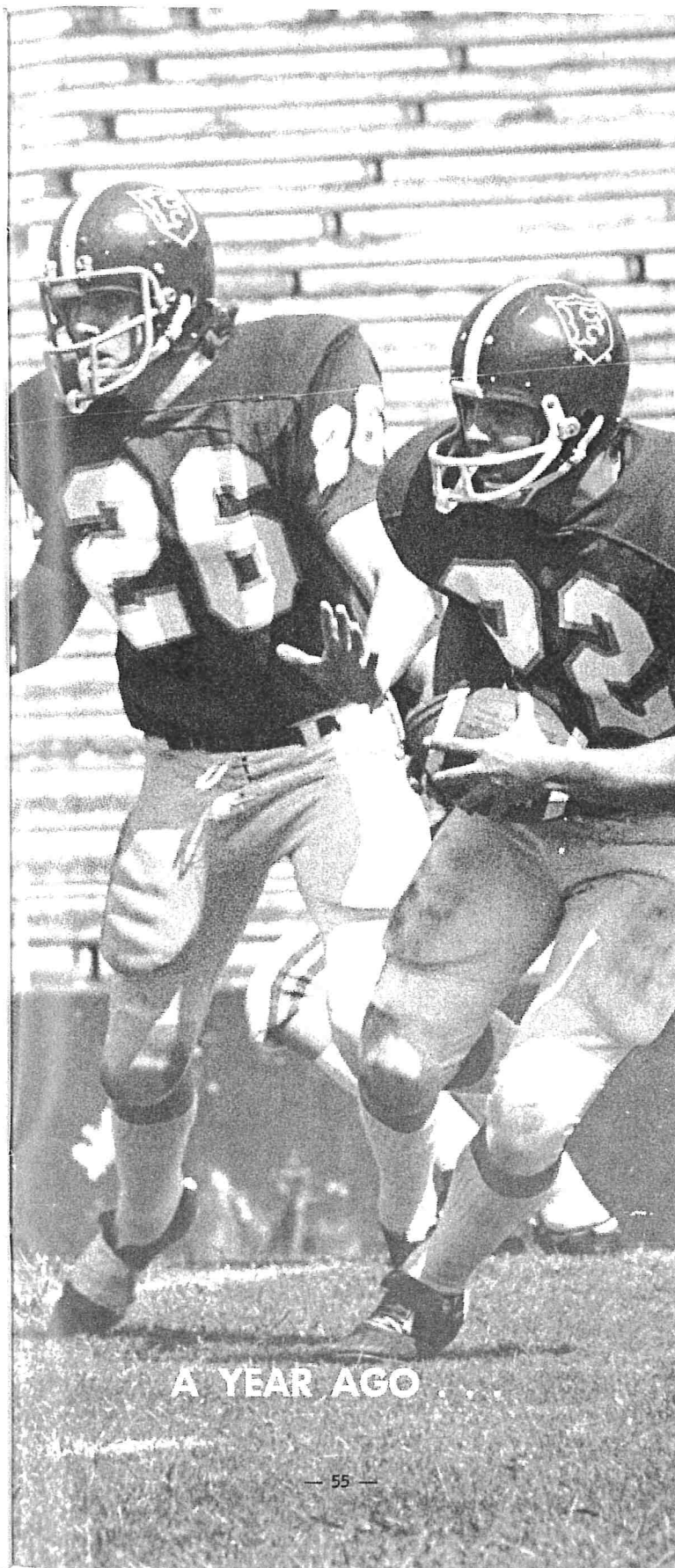


### ORIGIN OF THE PALADIN

"Paladin" is derived from Count Paladine, one of the twelve knights who comprised the bodyguard and inner circle of Emperor Charlemagne.

The Paladin Club is an organization of alumni and friends of Furman University. It exists for the primary purpose of elevating athletics through contributions to its scholarship programs.



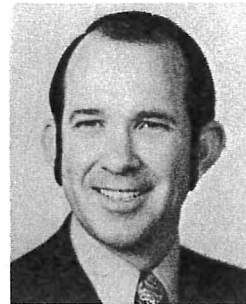
