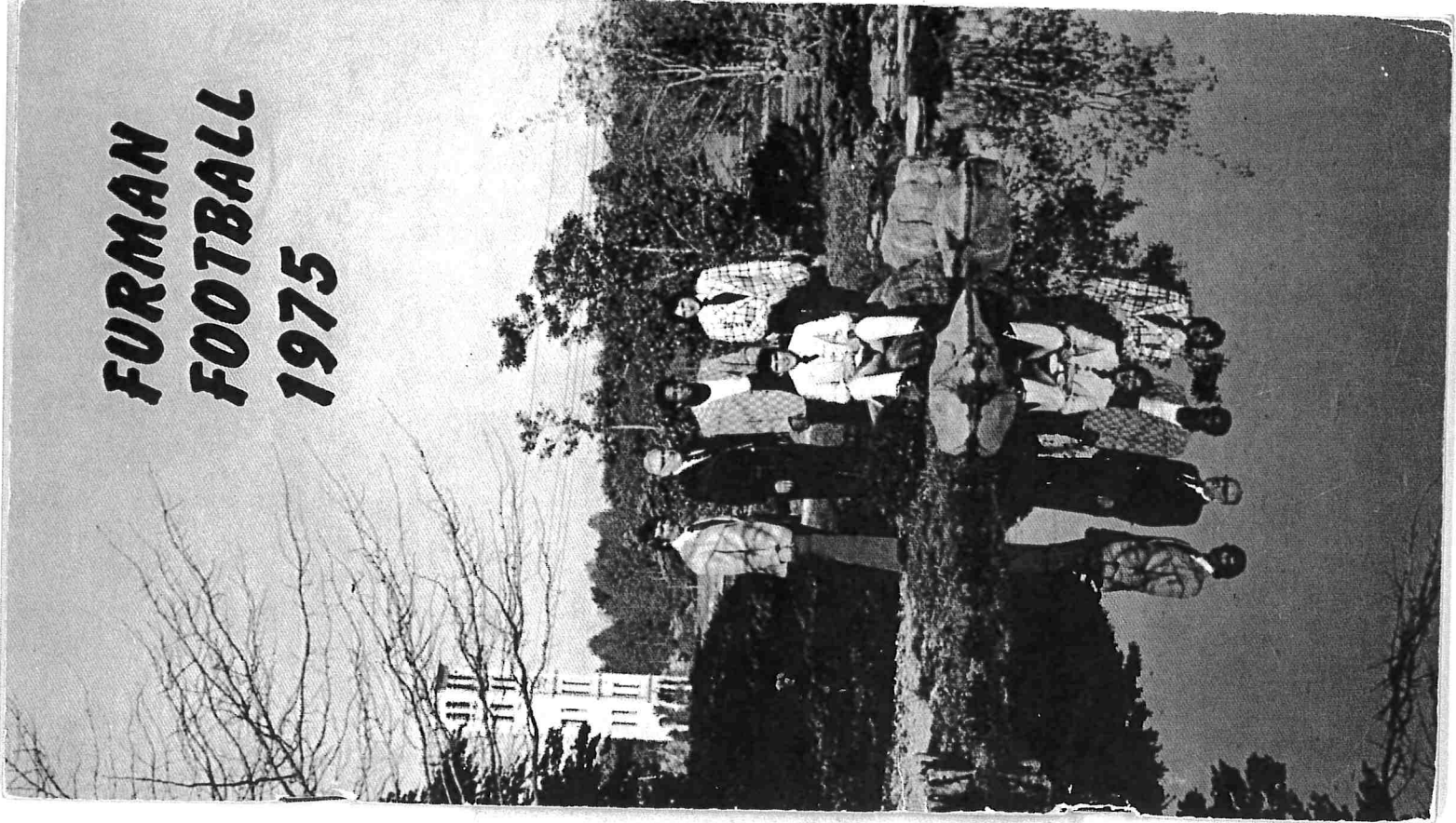

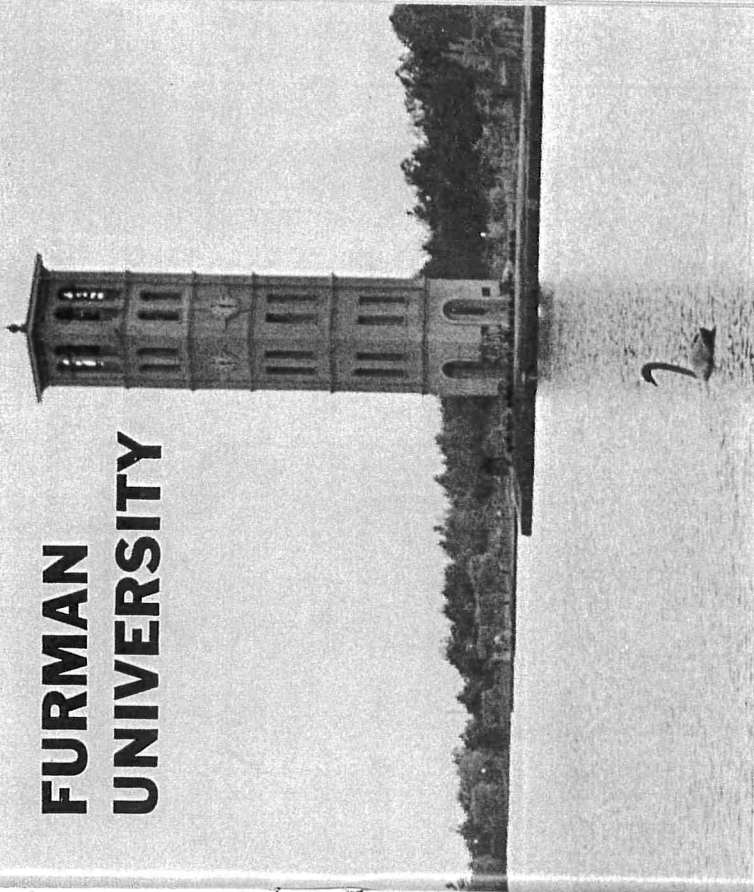

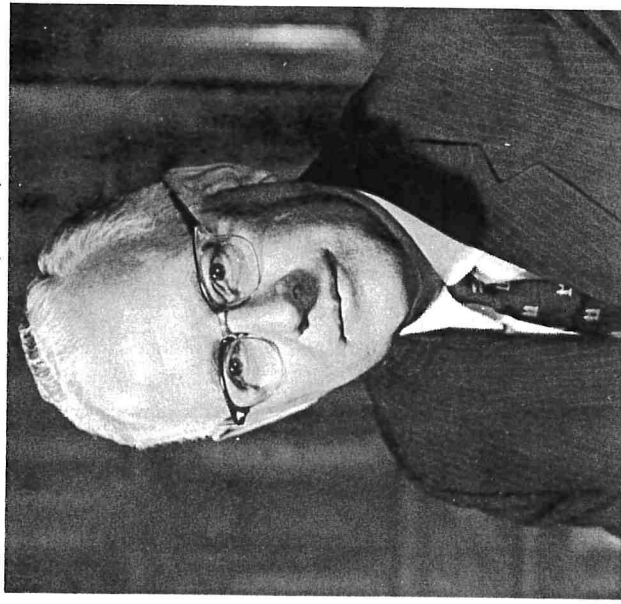

DR. GORDON W. BLACKWELL

President, M. A., Ph. D., LL. D., L. H. D.



A Furman graduate, Dr. Gordon W. Blackwell became the university's eighth president on February 1, 1965.

Since becoming President, Dr. Blackwell has led the Furman administration and student body into closer week-to-week dialogue through an open-door policy concerning students and faculty. Students now serve on most administrative and faculty committees as well as on committees of the Board of Trustees and Advisory Council. Academic innovations have resulted in a thoroughly revised curriculum and academic calendar.

Blackwell's teaching career began at Furman, where he served as professor and chairman of the Sociology Department from 1937-41. He was a member of the faculty of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill for a short time before serving two years during World War II as a community organization specialist in the Office of Civilian Defense.

After the war he taught further at Chapel Hill, becoming Kenan Professor, the most prestigious in the University. He was also Director of the Institute for Research in Social Science for 13 years. For two summers he was visiting professor at Columbia University and lectured at Oxford University in England in 1955.

At the time of his election to the Furman presidency, he was president of Florida State University, Tallahassee, where he served for four and one-half years. Prior to assuming this position, he was chancellor of the Women's College of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro for three and one-half years.

Blackwell graduated *summa cum laude* in 1932, and was captain and number one man on the tennis team for three years, editor of the literary magazine, and president of the band. He received the Master of Arts degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1933, and the Ph. D. degree from Harvard University in 1940.

Born in Timmonsville, S. C., Dr. Blackwell is married to the former Elizabeth Blair Lyles. Sons, Gordon and Randy, are Furman graduates and were Furman varsity basketball players. The Blackwells also have two daughters, Blair (Mrs. Charles Cooper) and Millie (Mrs. W. D. Yarborough).

DR. FRANCIS W. BONNER, M.A., PH.D.

Vice President and Provost
President of Southern Conference



One of the most respected men in the Southern Conference, Dr. Bonner was elected President of the conference in 1973. He has served as Faculty Chairman of Athletics since 1968.

Dr. Bonner came to Furman as an associate professor of English in 1949 and was named Dean of the University in 1961. Two years later he was named Vice President of the University. He has been a member of Furman's Faculty Committee on Athletics since 1953 and is one of the most loyal Paladin sports fans.

A native of Lanett, Ala., Dr. Bonner received his B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of Alabama and his Ph.D. from the University of North Carolina.

Prior to coming to Furman, Dr. Bonner taught at the University of Alabama, was head of the English department of the Marietta, Ga. High School, and was a graduate instructor at North Carolina.

FURMAN FACTS

- Furman University is a private, coeducational college of liberal arts located in Greenville, S. C. Founded in 1826, and located on its present campus in 1958, the University is partially supported by the South Carolina Baptist Convention.
- The University is located on a 750-acre wooded campus six miles north of the city. Campus facilities and activities include a 30-acre lake for swimming, boating, and fishing, an 18-hole golf course, 20 tennis courts, a playhouse for experimental drama, a 2,000 seat auditorium, physical activities center, an athletic building, seven playing fields, a movie series, a lecture series, and a fine arts series.
- Furman offers the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Science degrees. The graduate division awards the Master of Arts degree with a major in education and the Master of Science degree with a major in chemistry. A Master of Business Education degree is offered jointly by Furman's Department of Business Administration and the Clemson University College of Industrial Management and Textile Science.
- The James B. Duke Library, fully air-conditioned, houses over 215,000 volumes. More than 1,250 periodicals are received regularly and the microfilm and record collections are extensive. New books are now being acquired at the rate of approximately 10,000 per year.
- The faculty, 70 per cent of whom hold earned doctoral degrees, consists of 138 full-time and 9 part-time professors. The student-faculty ratio of 16:1 allows for individual attention and personal relationships.
- Enrollment during the 1974-75 academic year was 2,301 with students from 33 states in the United States and six foreign countries in attendance.
- The Furman University physical plant is valued at over \$29,000,000. Twenty-one major buildings have been completed. Buildings for music and the visual arts will be begun shortly.
- Buildings are reinforced concrete, faced with handmade Virginia brick. The contemporary Williamsburg colonial architecture captures much of the flavor of the Old South, adapted to modern needs and usage.
- Furman is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the Southern University Conference, the Association of American Colleges and the South Carolina Association of Colleges. It is on the approved list of the American Association of University Women and the American Chemical Society and is a member of the National Association of Schools of Music.

JOHN WEST, M. Ed.

Director of Athletics



John C. West succeeded Lyles Alley in June as director of athletics at Furman University after serving for three years as associate athletic director.

Upon being named athletic director, West said: "I consider this to be one of the greatest opportunities and challenges of my life. The opportunity to serve the university at a time when we face an economic crisis in intercollegiate athletics becomes an even greater challenge."

During his tenure as associate AD, West had established himself as one of the top young administrators. Through his promotional efforts, Furman football attendance had reached an all-time high.

Before concentrating his efforts on the administrative end of athletics, West was one of the nation's most successful track coaches at Furman and the University of South Carolina.

The Memphis, Tenn., native coached the Paladin track teams to unprecedented heights during the mid-sixties before going to the University of South Carolina in 1968. His 1971 team at South Carolina had the first undefeated dual season in the history of the University with a perfect 6-0 record including a victory in the prestigious Penn Relays.

West attended Louisiana State University and graduated from East Texas State University, where he was one of the nation's fastest sprinters with a 9.4 clocking in the 100-yard dash.

A much sought-after banquet speaker and member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, West holds a Master's degree in Education from Memphis State University, and he coached at Fraysure High School (Memphis) and Union University (Jackson, Tenn.) before coming to Furman.

West married the former Charlotte Dickerson of Greenville, Tex., and they have three children, DeAnn, 15, John, 13, and Elizabeth, 11.

ART BAKER, B.A.

Head Coach



The kind of comments that Coach Arthur Wellington Baker inspires from his players goes something like this:

"I've played under a lot of coaching staffs, but I don't believe that I've been under one as fine as the one we have here," says one player.

"Playing for Coach Baker has been the best experience of my life," says another.

"This coaching staff is easy to respect and that makes football fun," adds yet another.

In two years at Furman, Art Baker has established himself as an admired and respected football coach, not only by his players and fellow coaches but by the average fellow in the large cities and small towns throughout South Carolina. An avid off-season speaker and banquet-goer — he attended 150 functions during the past year — there are not many trails in the state which have not been covered by Baker's tracks.

He approaches his football program in a similar, thorough manner. His players have accepted a hard-work brand of football . . . always running on and off the field . . . sacrificing . . . being "good sports" . . . always hustling. Baker has rules for his football team and, yes, they are unpopular with some people. But the rules are amazingly team-oriented and they have worked. The Furman program has attracted the type of athlete that succeeds not only on the football field but in the classroom and in society as well. Eighty per cent of Baker's first two recruiting classes are still in the program, even in the face of the school's strict academic requirements.

Some of what Baker expects from his players is (1) that there is to be no profanity on the field or anywhere else; (2) team members are not allowed even the class cuts that the university allows; (3) there is to be no use of alcohol, no smoking and no drugs; (4) curfews will exist even after football season is over; (5) hair cuts are to be neat and subject to coaches' approval; (6) all coaches are to be addressed as "sir"; (7) attendance in church is encouraged.

In turn, there exists among the staff a real and sincere effort to meet the needs of each player. For instance, the players enjoy home-cooked meals in the coaches' homes on several occasions during the year.

In Baker's first season at the helm in 1973 — rules and all, the new Paladins were an instant success. They turned a 2-9 record the year before into a 7-4 mark and were named the Dunkel Rating's Most Improved Football Team of 1973. Baker himself was named Southern Conference Co-Coach of the Year, Columbia Touchdown Club Co-Coach of the Year and Churchman's Hall of Fame National Coach of the Year.

The Paladins were 5-6 in Baker's second season to give him a 12-10 career record, but his "program based on character" has just started to catch hold at Furman.

The Baker Philosophy:

"Our program is based on character. Without it, it is impossible to win. Discipline is at a premium at this time in our country, but our football team will have discipline. Players have to learn to conform to certain standards for the good of the team. Most of our rules are for the good of the individual as well as the team.

"I feel like one of the most important parts of our program is the respect, love and loyalty that we have for one another. Unselfishness is the basis on which our staff was hired and our players recruited.

"I will not try to force a player against any religious or non-religious beliefs that he has personally, but when each of our men is recruited he is told of our desire to see him in church on Sunday and of his becoming a part of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes."

For Art Baker, the sweetness of success in his initial season of collegiate head coaching had special significance because he had waited so long for what he regarded as the "right opportunity."

After an outstanding prep and collegiate athletic career at Edmunds High School and Presbyterian College, Baker began his long coaching career at tiny McColl High School, where he was a one-man staff. Two years later he moved to Newberry High School, and in 1959, was named head football coach at Eau Claire High School in Columbia, S. C.

With a staff consisting of most of his current college assistants, the Sumter, S. C., native, quickly molded the Shamrocks into one of the state's foremost prep powers. From 1959-1964 Eau Claire compiled a 43-16-4 record, finishing as runner-up in the state on two occasions. Three times (1959-60-63), Baker was selected as Coach of the Year in Columbia and in 1963, he was chosen to coach the Palmetto State team in the Shrine Bowl.

Baker's success caught the eye of veteran Clemson mentor Frank Howard and in 1965 he received his first taste of college coaching as head freshman coach for the Tigers. After guiding the Clemson freshmen to their first undefeated season in 20 years, Baker was appointed offensive backfield coach on the varsity level in 1966 and remained on the Tiger staff until 1969 when he went to Texas Tech as an assistant to Jim Carlen.

Here too, Baker followed his pattern of immediate success as he played a major role in the Red Raiders' surprising 8-3 season in 1970, good enough to earn a trip to the Sun Bowl. A 4-7 slump followed in '71, but during Baker's last campaign with Carlen, Texas Tech again went 8-3 and earned another bid to the Sun Bowl.

The character of Baker's football program for Furman is simply an extension of the way in which he lives his own life. A very active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Baker's calendar is filled during the off-season with speaking engagements at local churches, athletic banquets, and youth organizations.

Baker is married to the former Julia Edith Edens and they have four children — Artie, 20, Kim 19, Ryan, 12, and Curtis, 10.

JIMMY SATTERFIELD, M.A. — Assistant Coach



Jimmy Satterfield is in his third season at Furman as coach of the offensive backfield.

He came to the Paladins after compiling one of the most outstanding records in South Carolina high school history. During his five seasons as head coach at Eau Claire and Irmo High Schools, Satterfield put together a record of 49-4-1. During that period his team won five conference championships and one Upper State title. When Eau Claire won the Upper State crown in 1970, Satterfield, who also served as Shrine Bowl coach, was named South Carolina 3-A High School Coach of the Year.

A native of Lancaster, S. C., Satterfield graduated from the University of South Carolina in 1962. He immediately joined the Eau Claire staff where he served as an assistant coach under Art Baker. In 1968, he was named head coach at Eau Claire, where he remained until going to Irmo in 1971.

Satterfield earned his Master's Degree in Education from South Carolina. He is married to the former Sara Ann Funderburk and they have three children, Shaun, 11, Sidney, 9, and Lee, 8.

DICK SHERIDAN, M.A. — Assistant Coach



After molding an inexperienced offensive line into one of the best in the Southern Conference last year, Dick Sheridan has been put in charge of the receiving corps this season.

Another former South Carolina High School Coach of the Year, Dick Sheridan rejoined Coach Baker in 1973 after compiling a 37-8-1 mark in his four years as a prep head coach. The highlight of his impressive coaching career came in 1971 when Sheridan took Orangeburg-Wilkinson to a 13-0 record and the state 4-A championship. That team was also ranked 12th in the nation and Sheridan was tabbed Coach of the Year.

A 1964 graduate of the University of South Carolina, Sheridan joined Baker at Eau Claire in 1964 and remained there as an assistant football and head basketball coach until 1969. He was named head football coach at Orangeburg in 1969 and remained there three seasons before going to Airport High in 1972. In his final three head coaching seasons, Sheridan teams were 32-3 and won more games during that period than any other team in the state.

A native of North Augusta, S. C., Sheridan and his wife Brenda have two sons, Bobby, 9, and Jon, 7.

STEVE ROBERTSON, B.A. — Assistant Coach



After serving as defensive end coach the past two seasons, Steve Robertson has been placed in charge of the linebackers as well as being the defensive coordinator.

Robertson came to Furman in 1973 from Newberry College, where he had served as defensive coordinator since 1968. Before joining the Indian staff, Robertson spent eight years at Eau Claire High School as an assistant and then head football coach. He joined the Shamrocks in 1959 as an assistant to Coach Baker and assumed the head coaching duties in 1965 when Baker accepted the freshman coaching position at Clemson.

In 1967, Robertson guided Eau Claire to the 3-A state championship and was named South Carolina Coach of the Year. His three-year record at Eau Claire was 28-4-1. A native of Greer, S. C., Robertson graduated from Newberry after earning all-state and all-conference honors for the Indians. He is married to the former Linda Gossett, and they have two children, Ron, 8, and Robin, 5.

BRUCE JOHNSON, B.A. — Assistant Coach



Bruce Johnson, at 28 the youngest coach on the Paladin staff, is in his first season at Furman yet he has perhaps the biggest responsibility — rebuilding the defensive backfield.

Johnson came to Furman in the middle of spring practice from North Carolina State University, where he had worked with the offensive backfield which averaged over 400 yards a game in total offense in 1974. Prior to that he was the defensive coordinator at High Point (N. C.) Andrews High, where the team recorded eight shutouts in the 1973 season en route to a 10-1 record. He began his coaching career at Reidsville (N. C.) High in 1970 where he was an assistant for three years and saw the team win the 1970 state championship with a 12-0-1 record.

A native of Reidsville, Johnson lettered three years as a defensive end at Wofford College, and he co-captained the 1969 team that had a 9-2 record. He was honorable mention all-state his last two years at Wofford and was also a letterman on the track team. A bachelor who enjoys golfing and camping, Johnson is currently working on his Master's Degree in Education.

TIM MOORE, M.A. — Assistant Coach



A newcomer to the Furman staff, Tim Moore is getting his first taste of college coaching after four years as an assistant high school coach. He is in charge of the Paladin offensive line.

Moore served as line coach at Barmwell High in 1973 and 1974 and prior to that was the offensive line coach at Lower Richland for two years. Lower Richland was ranked as the No. 1 team in the state in 1972 by the UPI coaches poll. At LR Moore also coached the baseball team to a 31-16 two-year record.

A 1971 graduate of the University of South Carolina, Moore earned his Master's Degree in Physical Education from USC in 1974. He served in the army from 1967-69.

A native of Barmwell, S. C., Moore played in the 1964 North-South All-Star Game as a senior at Barmwell High. He is married to the former Scottie Turner and they have a son, Richie, 2.

JAY SHOOP, B.S. — Trainer



Jay Shoop has become one of the most indispensable members of the Furman family since his arrival in 1970. A graduate of East Tennessee State, where he earned a double major in health and physical education, Shoop has rapidly become one of the top trainers in the South.

The Wise, Va., native has a thorough background in physical training, serving as assistant trainer at East Tennessee for three years. He has also worked in five summer training camps with the NFL, Atlanta Falcons and one summer with the Detroit Tiger baseball farm club at Bristol, Va.

Shoop maintains an up-to-date training room, and is always available to Furman athletes from his campus apartment. In addition to serving as trainer for the entire athletic department, Shoop oversees four student trainers and handles all travel arrangements in football and basketball.

When not tied up with training responsibilities, Shoop enjoys golf and is active in local church work. He is married to the former Anne Brockman.

DR. DAYTON RIDDLE, M.D.

Team Physician



A Furman graduate, who had the honor of graduating at the top of his class, Dr. Riddle serves unselfishly as the team physician for the Paladins athletic squads.

Riddle is a native of Greenville, S. C., and attended Greenville High School before entering Furman. Following his graduation from Furman, he attended the Medical College of South Carolina.

An orthopedic surgeon, Riddle did his residence work at the Medical College. He then was in the Navy and served as team physician for the U. S. Naval Academy during the Middles' Orange and Cotton Bowl appearances in the sixties. He served the Midshipmen while Dallas Cowboys' quarterback Roger Staubach was signal-caller for Navy.

Although now maintaining his own practice, Riddle continues to take an avid interest in Furman, and serves the athletic program with a tireless effort.

GRADUATE ASSISTANTS

ERIC HYMAN - A former All-Atlantic Coast Conference performer for the University of North Carolina, Hyman is in his third year on the Furman staff. He works with the defensive line. A native of Alexandria, Va., Hyman played on three ACC championship teams during his career with the Tar Heels and was an All-South selection as a senior. He was chosen to play in the 1973 Hula Bowl and was drafted by the New Orleans Saints as a defensive tackle. A history and education major, Hyman enjoys reading and tennis as hobbies. He and his wife Pauline have no children.



EDDIE WILLIAMSON - Williamson is in his second year as a graduate assistant, and he works with the defensive ends. A former Davidson football player, he was a three-year starter at linebacker for the Wildcats and was captain of the team his senior year. A native of Pendleton, S. C., Williamson majored in political science at Davidson and is currently working on his Master's in education administration. At Davidson, Williamson was president of Phi Gamma Delta Fraternity and president of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. He was also a member of Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities.



MIKE SHELTON - The only former Furman player on the staff, Shelton is in his second season with the Paladins. He works with the receivers. Shelton, who possesses an outstanding offensive football mind, completed 49.8 per cent of his passes as a quarterback at Furman, including 63.6 per cent as a senior. A native of Kingsport, Tenn., he was an all-state quarterback at Doby-Bennett High School. Shelton majored in political science at Furman and is currently working on his Master's degree in education. He plans a coaching and teaching career.



DAVE HARPER - Former Davidson quarterback Dave Harper, in his first year with the Paladins, will work with the offensive backs and the secondary. A native of Stone Mountain, Ga., Harper passed for over 3300 yards and 22 touchdowns during his three-year career at Davidson (1972-74) while completing 50 per cent of his tosses. His big year came as a junior when he led the Southern Conference in passing, ranking third nationally. Also during his junior season, he completed 37 passes in a game against William & Mary, a feat which has been surpassed by only two other players in college football history.



1975 OUTLOOK

Any football team which has 16 starters and 39 lettermen returning would appear to have a successful season in sight. But don't make any predictions to Furman Coach Art Baker. He knows what it is like to be fooled by pre-season talk.

In 1972, the season before Baker's arrival at Furman, the Paladins had a 2-9 record. Given little chance to improve upon that mark, the successful, young coach turned the team into a 7-4 winner in his very first season. Then, with most of his original team back the following year — last year — Baker saw his Paladins fall to 5-6.

The two unlikely years that he has had at the school is why Baker does not entertain thoughts of Furman taking its first-ever Southern Conference football championship.

"We played so many games that could have gone either way last year," said the personable head coach, whose team lost three games by a touchdown or less. "And then we weren't able to use the element of surprise that we were so successful with two years ago . . . everyone was ready for us.

"I think we got away from basic fundamentals at times last year," he added, "so we stressed blocking, tackling and execution in spring practice. Another thing we have to do is develop a more versatile offense."

Baker admits that the Paladin offense was a bit stale at times last year. Consider the following items:

(1) *Unable to break the long play last year, Furman's longest touchdown of any kind was a 46-yard pass play; the year before there had been eight TD's of 50 yards or more;* (2) *further demonstrating the lack of big-play punch, the longest run from scrimmage in 1974 was just 45 yards and that was provided by a punter;* (3) *whereas the Paladins had averaged scoring 23 points a game two years ago, last season they averaged less than 12;* (4) *last year Furman fumbled an average of four times a game, losing three.*

All was not bad, though. Furman was fourth in total offense in the Southern Conference, averaging 312 yards a game. And Furman did lead the league in defense, allowing just 257 yards per contest (13th in the nation).

The defensive backfield, which ranked third nationally in pass defense last year, will be a critical area to watch. Not only are two starters gone from last year, but a rookie coach, Bruce Johnson, joined the staff in the middle of spring practice to take charge of the secondary.

Otherwise, the Paladins are not short on talent. The entire offensive backfield returns, as does most of the offensive line and most of the defensive line. The only problem that could develop in these areas would be a shortage of top-notch back-ups.

In their recruiting efforts, Baker and his staff concentrated heavily on big, strong linemen, and they think they got some good ones. However, Baker is hoping that he will not have to depend on the number of freshmen he used in his first two years.

"I hope our program has progressed to the point where we won't have to expect freshmen to come in and start," he says. "We have some good freshmen, I believe, but when you get to where you depend on them, your program is not as far along as it should be."

COACH BAKER LOOKS AT THE PALADINS

STRENGTHS: We have experience at all defensive front and offensive line and quarterback positions. David Whitehurst had a fine spring at quarterback and seems to have completely recovered from the ankle injury which caused him to miss nearly five full games last year. If he stays healthy in 1975, he could be one of the best around. Newcomer Dick Wier, a tailback, promises to bring a new excitement to our offense. The defensive front, led by all-conference candidate Larry Anderson at line-backer, is quick and aggressive and should provide many exciting moments for Furman fans.

WEAKNESSES: The most glaring weakness is in the secondary where we have been the strongest for the last two years (finishing 3rd nationally in '74). Curtis Boyd and Mark Mosher are returning starters but we lost Vince Perone and Jimmy Griffin. "Depth" would be a second problem, especially at quarterback and the receiving positions. We are also going to have to find a punter. John Nichols did punt in one game last year and freshman Jimmy Kiser was an outstanding high school punter.

SPRING PRACTICE SURPRISES: There weren't too many surprises during our spring drills. Generally, our spirit was improved. There was quite a bit of improvement by returning starters such as David Whitehurst, Ike Simpson and Harry King on offense and Tony Cox, Frank Moses, Dolphus Carter and Larry Anderson on defense. Dick Wier was a pleasant surprise at tailback, as were Tommy Southard at flanker and Mark Gordon and Rick Perry at corner-back. Mike Gibbs probably made the most improvement of any offensive lineman. We were also pleased with the progress of sophomores Bobby Church and Brette Simmons and transfer Angus Poole.

OVERALL OUTLOOK: Cautious! After much was expected of the Paladins last year, we finished with a disappointing 5-6 record. Now, the coaching staff is hesitant to take such a bright outlook. There are too many critical areas of concern. Depth, the secondary and the kicking game pose problems. However, our team seemed to have an attitude of renewed aggressiveness and confidence during spring practice. Also, for the first time, we don't have to depend on freshmen to play in the starting lineup, although it appears some incoming freshmen will make serious bids for starting jobs.

FRESHMEN: Each year we have to decide on priorities in our recruiting. This year we decided that we were short on big linemen. Even though the crop was not as plentiful as in other years, we did come up with what we consider an outstanding group of linemen. We signed 16 linemen all over 6'0". We look for a top quarterback every year and we felt fortunate in signing Jimmy Kiser, an outstanding athlete from Northwestern High in Rock Hill. A couple of other quarterbacks — Jay Corey of Albany, Ga. and Greg Laetsch from Asheville, N. C. — are both outstanding but will probably be used at other positions. Speed is always essential and David Kelly (4.5), Russell Cambrell (4.6), Mark Stowers (4.5), Kent Woerner (4.7) and Kiser (4.6) should all provide needed swiftness. Around 12 of our signees represented Furman in all-star games during the summer.

LAST YEAR: Disappointing! Weird! Mysterious! It was just a long year . . . from the first game, where we out-gained and out-played conference champion VMI but also out-fumbled them (fumbling eight, losing five), to the last game at Wake Forest, where it ended with what appeared to be a winning Furman score only to have a pass dropped in the end zone. We lost four games virtually on our last offensive play of the game. This coupled with a rash of injuries to key personnel hampered our efforts in '74.

THE SOUTHERN CONFERENCE: The conference appears to me to be "up for grabs." VMI returns a strong team along with momentum and confidence. Look for East Carolina, William & Mary, Appalachian State and The Citadel all to be better. Richmond certainly will want its last year in the Southern Conference to be a good one. Our ball club will be questionable, depending largely on keeping some key people healthy. To use the old cliché, any team in the conference will be capable of beating any other and it should make for a great year in Southern Conference football.

A CLOSER LOOK AT THE PALADINS

OFFENSIVE BACKFIELD — Offensively the picture is a bright one and the backfield is the main reason why. Everyone returns, including All-Southern Conference quarterback candidate David Whitehurst. Whitehurst had an off-year in '74 because of an ankle injury, but that is behind him now. Back-up signal-callers are untested, however. Fullback Ike Simpson, who rushed for nearly 400 yards despite missing four full games, is No. 1 in pre-season, although Harry King will battle him. Tailback is "one of the strongest positions on the team," according to Coach Baker. Last year's leading rusher, Larry Robinson, will handle that position, but transfer Dick Wier may actually be the best runner on the team. Warning: Don't count Wier out. Also in the tailback picture is dependable Andy Goss. "Offensively the big thing is to keep Whitehurst and Simpson healthy," says Baker. "They both missed games with leg injuries last year. Behind Whitehurst we are inexperienced, but King will help strengthen the full-back position."

OFFENSIVE LINE — Except for one position the offensive line has every starter returning. John Forbes, an honorable-mention all-conference choice last year, will fill the left guard slot, but the right side is open due to the loss of Mark Schmidt. Lettermen Tim Kennedy and Larry Stewart, the latter a converted tackle, will both see a great deal of playing time in Schmidt's spot. Jeff Holcomb, honorable-mention all-conference, and Mike Gibbs are solid candidates to start at tackle, but sophomore Ken Cadle, who played as much as anyone last year, will not be pushed aside. Both centers return in Robbie Caldwell and John Graham. Caldwell started every game and is the steady force on the line.

RECEIVERS — Receiver coach Dick Sheridan will employ a combination of either twin tight ends and one wide receiver or two wide receivers and a tight end. Brette Simmons, last year's top freshman, and junior college transfer Angus Poole are quality tight ends. At the wide receiver position, sophomore Tommy Southard made an excellent transition from defensive back in the spring. Kenny Middleton and Paul Carapellotti also have plenty of experience here.

DEFENSIVE LINE — One of the major strengths of the team is the defensive line where, Baker says, "for the first time since I have been here we have experience back at every position." At tackle, the Paladins are two-deep in lettermen, with three of the performers being considered regulars. Tony Cox is a two-year starter at right tackle, but he will have a battle on his hands with Bruce Williamson and sophomore Bobby Church to see who gets the right to start. Mike Sanders appears ready to give good back-up help. Sophomore Frank Moses had an excellent season at nose guard in '74, and he will be hard to unseat. The only position along the defensive front which lost a starter was end, where all-conference Bill Anderson graduated. However, Tommy Marshall is a returning starter on the right side, and Dolphus Carter, who played enough to be considered a regular, will replace Anderson.

LINEBACKER — All-Conference calibre linebackers return in Larry Anderson, the team's leading tackler last year, and Steve Wilson. Anderson was named last season's top Furman defensive player, and he will play strong-side linebacker. Wilson, the weakside linebacker, spent a great deal of last season with a nagging back injury and missed a couple of games with the ailment. Depth looks good here with sophomore Jeff Rutkowski and Donnie Byerly, both of whom played a lot last year.

SECONDARY — Without a doubt, this is the critical area. Furman was third in the nation in pass defense in '74, but two primary ingredients of the secondary are gone: all-conference cornerback Vince Perone and strong safety Jimmy Griffin. There is also a new secondary coach in Bruce Johnson. Cornerback Mark Mosher and free safety Curtis Boyd, the only returning starters, will be depended on for leadership. Others who will be counted on heavily are junior college transfer Mark Gordon and sophomores Rick Perry, Mark Bowers, Larry Kuykendall and Rick Erickson. It's likely that freshmen will see playing time here.

OFFICIAL SCORES

Furman University had student football teams of a somewhat unorganized nature before 1900. Harold Classen's Encyclopedia of Football lists an 1891 game in which Duke defeated Furman 96-0. Also, the University of South Carolina football brochure records a game in 1895 in which the Paladins were defeated by a score of 14-10 and Clemson lists its first football victory as a 14-6 win over Furman in 1896. The first schedule (and results) that recent research has revealed was in 1902. Down through the years football has been an important part of the Furman athletic program, and indeed, of the University itself. Of necessity, there have been two periods when football was not played. No inter-collegiate games were played from 1903 through 1912—because of University administrative action—and no games were played during World War II.

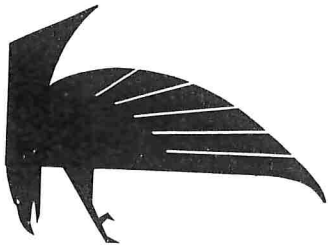

FURMAN AND THE FALCONS



Furman University has been the pre-season home of the Atlanta Falcons of the National Football League for the past five summers. The Falcons, led by Coach Marion Campbell, use the Furman athletic facilities and the dormitories for their pre-season training camp.

Prior to moving to the beautiful Furman campus—a 2½-hour drive from Atlanta, the Falcons trained at East Tennessee State University in Johnson City, Tenn., and at Black Mountain, N. C.

When the Falcons made the move to Furman, club president Frank Wall said, "We feel the facilities at Furman and its comparative short distance from Atlanta will work out better not only for our players and staff, but for the many fans who wish to visit the camp." Wall's foresight proved accurate, as fans and media from throughout the Southeast have flocked to Furman to view the South's first major professional football franchise.

The Falcons feature two of the top defensive players in football in end Claude Humphries and veteran linebacker Tommy Nobis. In addition, Atlanta has quarterback Steve Bartkowski — the NFL's No. 1 draft choice — and Furman's own Vince Perone, who is attempting to make the team as a defensive back and kick returner.

THE PALADIN CLUB

The Paladin Club is an organization of alumni and friends of Furman University. It exists for the primary purpose of elevating athletics through contributions to its scholarship programs.

While there are important tangible benefits such as priority on season football and basketball tickets, informative periodicals, special parking at home games, and golf course privileges (depending upon level of membership), the most rewarding benefit is the feeling of satisfaction that members derive from knowing they are helping worthy student athletes achieve a college education. Anyone can become a Paladin Club member by making a contribution of \$20 or more.

The Paladin Club has grown to over 1,400 members, who last fiscal year contributed over \$165,000 to help Furman achieve its goal of continuing excellence in athletics.

Six different types of memberships are available in the organization with special privileges attached to each category. Members who give \$1,000 or more are members of the Scholarship Donor class; \$500-\$999 donors are Tower Club members; \$250-\$499 contributors are called Bellingers; \$100-\$249 members are in the Century Club; \$50-\$99 members are termed Pace-setters; and \$20-\$49 donors are Paladin Club members.

Kirby Holland, 34, was named executive director of the Paladin Club in July. A graduate of Knox College in Galesburg, Ill., where he lettered in football, wrestling and track, Holland obtained an MS degree in Journalism from the University of Illinois. He had served as director of public relations at Knox before coming to Furman.

Louis Williams, class of 1949, is currently serving as president of the Paladin Club. Randy Blackwell is vice-president and Bill James is secretary-treasurer.
