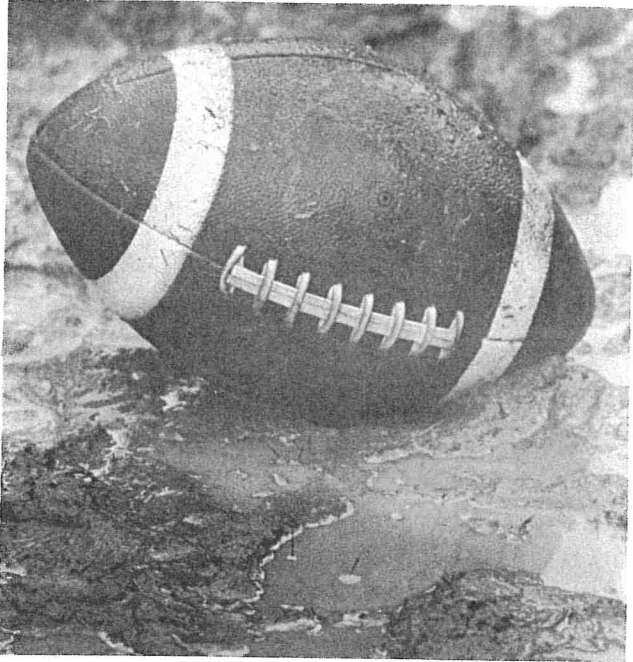

INTRODUCING FURMAN

Furman University is widely known as one of the finest educational facilities in the South, aspiring academic excellence under Christian influences.

Authorized by the South Carolina Baptist Convention of 1825, Furman was established as an academy and theological institution in Edgefield, South Carolina. For a short period of time it enjoyed a residency in the High Hills of Santee and Winnsboro before moving to Greenville, where in 1850, it was chartered "The Furman University."

The University is fortunate in its location five miles north of Greenville. The new campus occupies a beautifully designed area of a 750-acre tract owned by the University. Many of the buildings are situated close to a 30-acre lake.

A member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, Furman offers courses leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Arts in Music, Master of Arts and Master of Science.

Furman now has over 16,000 alumni, including some of the nation's leading scholars, doctors and lawyers. Dr. Charles Townes, who was awarded the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1964, is a graduate of Furman as is Max Steele, who won the Harper Novel Prize for his novel *Debby*.

Bob Stillwell, who was captain of the 1966 football team, was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship following his graduation. Larry Estridge, student body president for 1966, was given the Hughes Perpetual Trophy as the nation's outstanding ROTC participant in 1967.

The number of Furman's full-time faculty members has grown from 93 in 1964-65 to 113 in 1969-70 with 75 per cent having a doctor's degree.

When the campus is completed there will be more than 20 major buildings with the University being able to serve some 2,500 students.

The President:

DR. GORDON W. BLACKWELL



On Feb. 1, 1965, Furman University welcomed Dr. Gordon W. Blackwell as its eighth president.

Known throughout the South as one of the most distinguished administrators, educators, authors and social scientists, Dr. Blackwell has guided Furman to gratifying success in many areas. He has devoted his many talents to the improvement of Furman on the local, state and national scene and his administration strives for excellence in all fields.

Dr. Blackwell launched his career as an educator at Furman where he graduated summa cum laude in 1932. He had a brilliant record at Furman as a scholar, athlete and student leader. He was captain and No. 1 man on the tennis team for three years, president of the band, president of his fraternity and student magazine editor.

Furman was also the scene where Dr. Blackwell began a teaching career serving as Professor and Chairman of the Sociology Department from 1937 to 1941. He received his M. A. degree from the University of North Carolina and his Ph. D. degree from Harvard University.

Before becoming Furman president, Dr. Blackwell served in the same capacity at Florida State University for four and one-half years. He has also served as Chancellor of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina for three and one-half years.

Born in Timmonsville, S. C., Dr. Blackwell is married to the former Elizabeth Blair Lyles. Sons, Gordon and Randy, are Furman graduates and were Furman varsity basketball team members.

The Athletic Director:

J. LYLES ALLEY



Lyles Alley spent 20 years of his life directing Furman's basketball fortunes. During that tenure, Alley became known as "Mr. Basketball" lifting the Paladins into national limelight.

On Nov. 23, 1966, Alley left the game he so dearly loved to assume the duties of fulltime Athletic Director. Under his guidance, Furman has reached its greatest peak and the future looks even brighter.

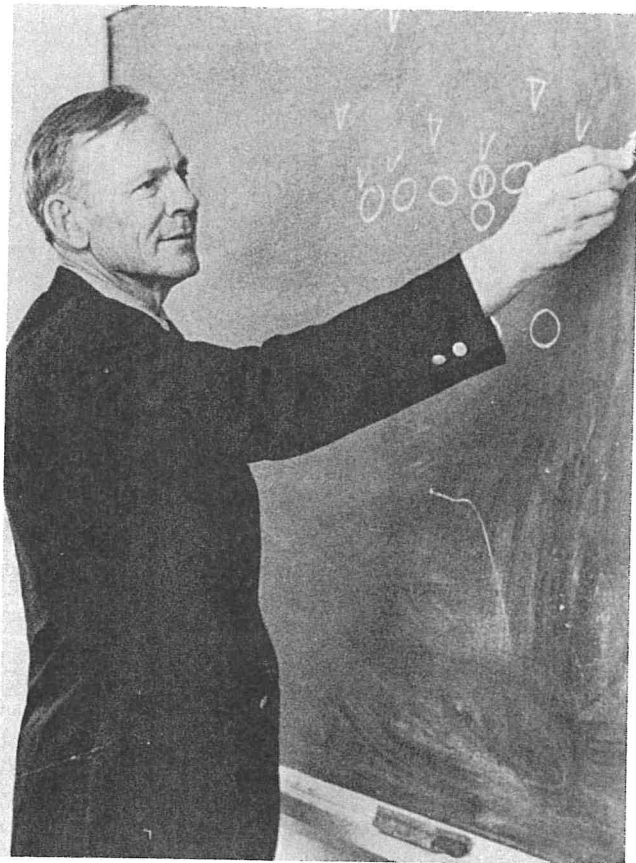
The Paladins have a good athletic year during 1969-70, but the best seems to be just over the horizon. The continued fine performances by the golf, tennis, baseball and track team plus the upgrading of football and basketball make Furman an institution with a rosy athletic outlook.

Alley is not a stranger to the AD's position. In 1957, Alley doubled as basketball coach and Athletic Director and continued the dual position until he became fulltime AD in '66.

Alley has developed many fine basketball players and athletes such as Frank Selvy, Darrell Floyd, Nield Gordon, Jerry Smith, Gerald Glur, Bryon Pinson, Fred Fraley and Effie Evington.

Alley's teams were national scoring champions, 1953-1956, setting records each time. He produced Furman's first All-Americans, Selvy in '54 and Floyd in '56.

Alley was a star athlete at Furman in the early '30's. He won 12 letters in basketball, football, baseball and track. He was the most valuable football player during senior year in 1933.



PLANNING FURMAN'S FUTURE

The future of Furman football appears to be extremely bright. Under the guidance of head coach Bob King, the Furman football program is being upgraded with the addition of more grid scholarships, the signing of fine junior college players and the intense recruiting for the cream of the nation's high school football talent.

"It appears to me that we have a number of things that should make us optimistic about the future," commented King. "We firmly believe that our entire athletic program, not only football, is on the upswing. We at Furman are looking forward to the future with new enthusiasm."

The Head Coach:

ROBERT B. (BOB) KING

Bob King, the dean of Southern Conference coaches, is entering his 13th year as head coach of the Furman Paladins.

Although King has 12 years behind him at Furman, he still possesses the enthusiasm and love for the game of football as though he were a rookie mentor.

King is touted as one of the most popular and accomplished athletes to ever graduate from Furman. King's eternal optimism rubs off on his associates and assistant coaches year after year.

King became head coach at his alma mater in Dec. 1957, after serving 11 years as one of the most valued assistants in the Big Ten at the University of Illinois. Since then, he has produced some of the most exciting moments in Furman football history and has long been one of Greenville, S. C.'s most outstanding citizens.

He has twice been named South Carolina Coach of the Year, in 1961 and 1963, when his teams compiled 7-3-0 records.

King was an assistant at Furman for five years (1937-41) and coached at Chapel Hill Pre-Flight School while in the Navy. From 1947 until 1957, King was an Illinois assistant.

While at Furman, King was one of the school's most outstanding and versatile athletes lettering in football, basketball and track. He was named All-State and All-Southern as a football end in 1936.

In 1942, King volunteered for the U. S. Navy and earned the rank of lieutenant before leaving the ranks in 1946. He is married to the former Gladys Mason of Greenville.

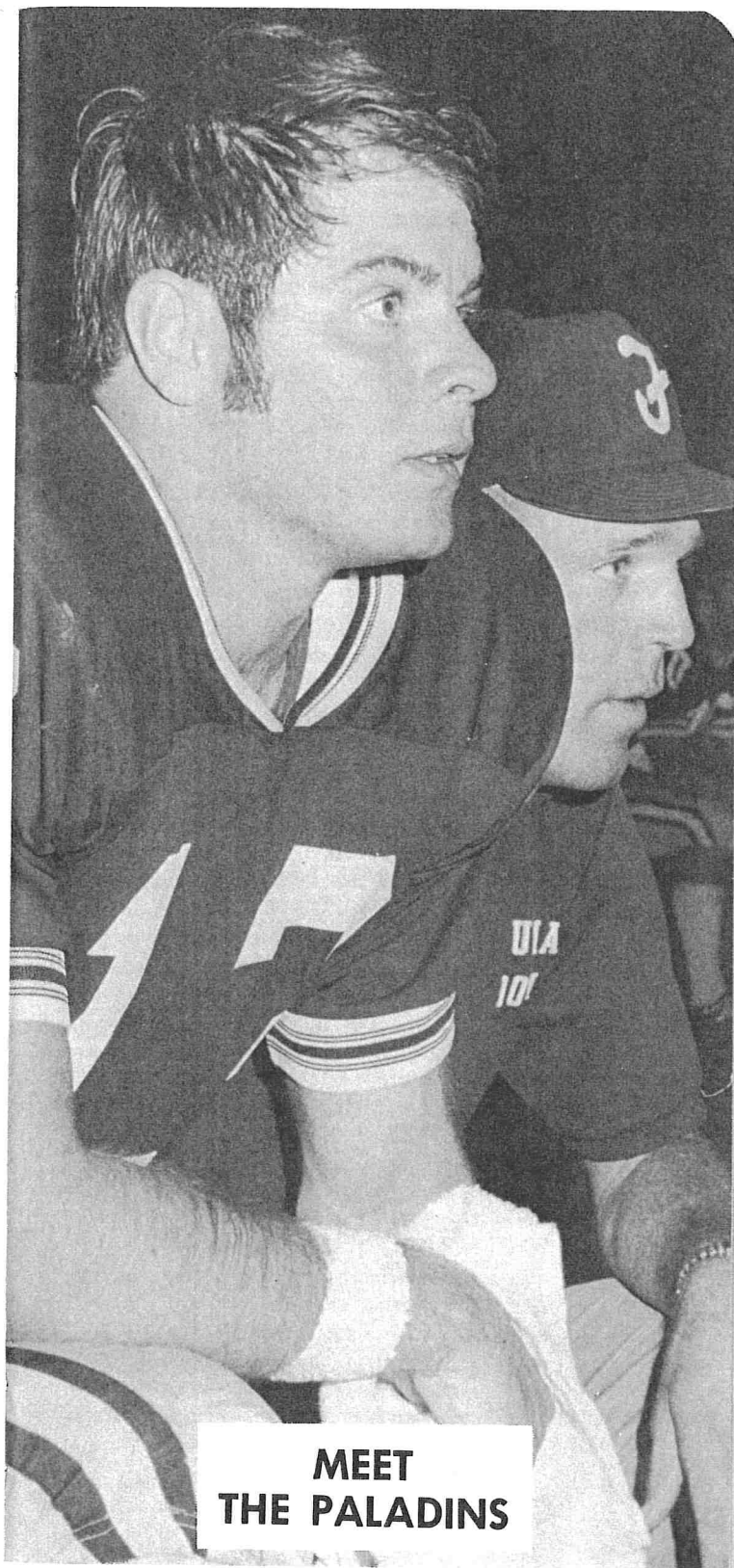

DON CALHOUN



"It will certainly be a shame if Don Calhoun doesn't make the All-Southern Conference team this year," commented a member of the Furman football coaching staff. "He probably should have made it last year."

Calhoun, a 6-1, 175-pound safety had the credentials last season by intercepting seven enemy passes. The senior Paladin back has spent his career shifting from safety to quarterback, but it looks as though he has found a home in

the defensive secondary.

Calhoun's seven interceptions tied a school record set by Tony Carmignani (1961) for most interceptions in a season.

CLEVE HIGHTOWER



Cleve Hightower is another in the long line of fine Furman quarterbacks such as Billy Canty, Billy Baker and Clyde Hewell.

The 5-9 southpaw-throwing Hightower proved last year he can throw with the best of quarterbacks, past or present.

A backup signal-caller to Hewell in 1968, Hightower saw some action and then began splitting his time between flanker and quarterback early last season before taking over for good.

Hightower etched his name into the Furman record books five times and into the conference books once. His 67 pass attempts against Wofford was a new SC league standard.

BYRON TROTTER



Offensive end Byron Trotter has the leadership and athletic ability to be a fine tri-captain. Ask the many defensive backs from opposing teams who have tried to cover the elusive Trotter.

In two varsity seasons, the 6-foot Trotter has caught 66 passes for 764 and led the Paladins in receiving last year with 38 catches for 421 yards and two touchdowns.

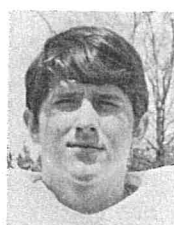
Trotter is not only a fine pass receiver, but is rated as a strong blocker.

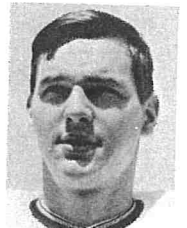
CENTERS

PALADIN OUTLOOK

The air should be filled with footballs during the 1970 season for the Furman Paladins. Quarterback Cleve Hightower and the Paladins' top four receivers from last season return to the offensive unit.

Paladin head coach Bob King is hoping Hightower will play the entire season the same way he closed out the 1969 year.

In Hightower's last three games of the '69 season, the southpaw-throwing Hightower completed 69 of 133 passes for 963 yards to finish the season with 105 completions in 238 attempts for 1,404 yards and nine touchdowns. During the final game of the season against Wofford, Hightower set a new school and Southern Conference record with 67 attempts.

End Byron Trotter returns for his senior year after catching 38 passes for 421 yards last year. Also returning are Pat Carroll (33 for 426 yards), Philip Howle (16 for 262 yards) and Mike Fabian (14 for 290 yards).

Carroll has seen action as a running back and will probably get an opportunity to carry the ball from scrimmage again this season.

The Paladins lost their top running back from last season when sophomore George Vaughn did not return to school after the second term of school.

A replacement for Vaughn could come in the form of sophomore Wayne Turner who was a starter for the freshman team last season.

Ben Maddox and Steve Warren, offensive guard starters last season, return along with Ron Strickland at tackle. Strickland is recovering from knee surgery, but should be ready for the '70 season.

Holes at one offensive tackle and center must also be filled.

On the defensive side, linebacker Chuck Cross returns to close out a brilliant Paladin career. Cross has been the top defender for the Paladins the past two seasons.

The Paladins are excited about sophomore linebacker Ivey Stewart who was a standout as a freshman. The 6-0, 185-pounder could be one of the best linebackers to ever play for the Paladins.

Chester Willis and Ed Kate return to the defensive line while tri-captain Don Calhoun will anchor the secondary. Calhoun, along with Hightower and Trotter, will captain the Paladins. He intercepted seven passes last season from his safety position.

The Paladins will have several sophomores who will play an important role in Furman's success this season.

Stewart, Jimmy Hagelthorn, David Shi and Marvin Mills could all become starters on defense.

Hagelthorn is almost a cinch to open in the defensive backfield while Shi could open at one defensive end slot.

Mills has a shot at a defensive guard spot.

Turner and talented Rodney Acker could open on the offensive unit. Acker is a local lad who could develop into a fine flanker. At 6-4, he has height and also speed to become a good pass receiver.

"We think we have some fine sophomore prospects," commented King. "A lot of them could be playing for us this year."

1970 BABY PALADIN OUTLOOK

With the Furman football program being upgraded, the freshman team will consist of some of the finest first-year talent it has had in recent years.

Tutoring the Baby Paladins this season will be Woody Dillard and Billy Turner, a pair of graduate students. Dillard played his high school football at York (S. C.) High School while Turner was an assistant coach at Commerce (Ga.) High along with varsity assistant, Hayden Hays. Turner recently was released from the service where he served two years.

The state of Georgia, which has given Furman some of its best talent in recent years, has contributed 11 of its native sons for the 1970 Baby Paladin squad.

Warren is also considered a fine student and leader.

Eddie Lattimore of Fort Mill, S. C. comes to Furman with outstanding credentials from Fort Mill High.

Lattimore, a 6-3, 190-pound end, will probably be a defensive end candidate for the Baby Paladins. Lattimore won all-conference laurels as a defender at Fort Mill.

In an effort to shore up a weak kicking game in the past, the Paladins came up with little Alan Standiford.

Standiford is a 5-5, 140-pounder, soaking wet, who is a place-kicker. Standiford is a soccer-style booter and is touted as a kicker who can boom the ball through the uprights from a good distance.

Standiford attended Northeast High School in Pinellas Park, Fla.

The Baby Paladins will depend largely on their interior linemen for offensive power.

Danny Utley (6-2, 235), Terry McIntosh (6-1, 200), Lee Fredrickson (6-2, 215) and Horrocks are a few of the interior linemen who could figure very heavily in the Paladins' varsity future.

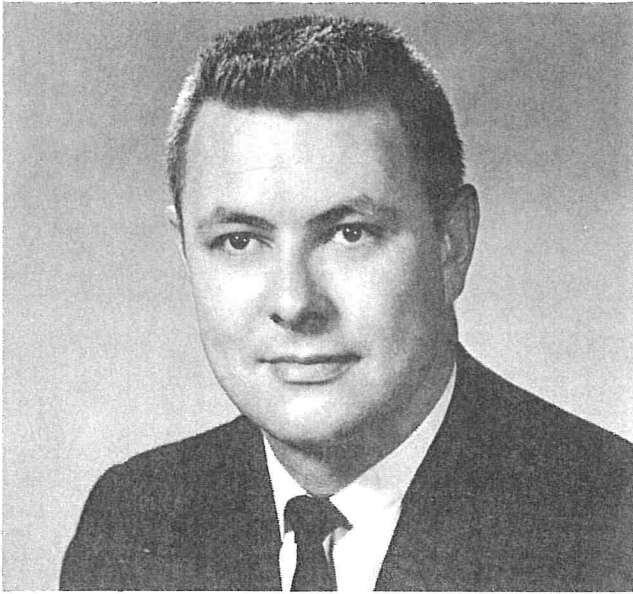

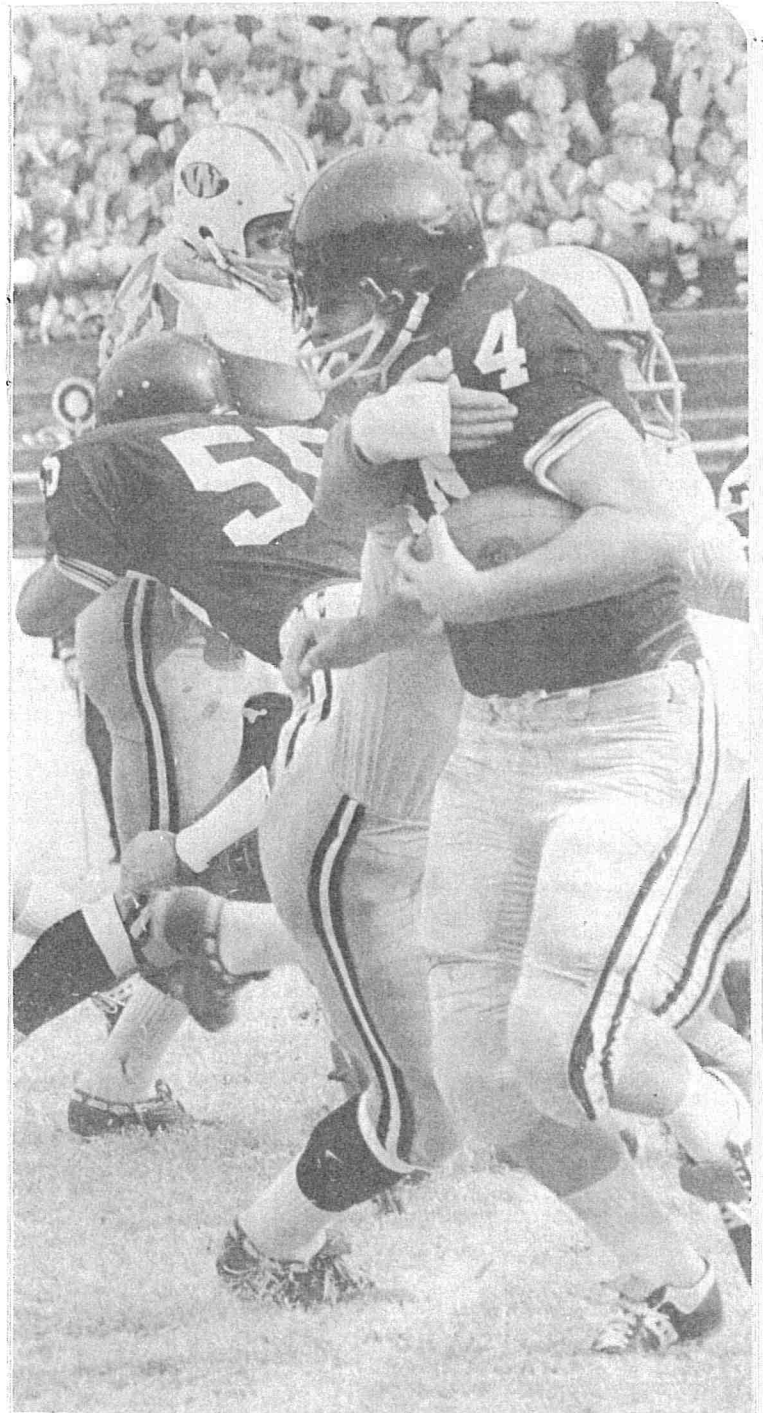

The kicking game is another plus, with placekicking specialist Don Cupit and punter Jim Bailey. In addition, blue-chip sophomores and defensive back Jim Ingram will help the Keydet cause in 1970. OFFICIAL SCORES

Furman University had student football teams of a somewhat unorganized nature before 1900. Harold Claassen's Encyclopedia of Football lists an 1891 game in which Duke defeated Furman 96-0. Also, the University of South Carolina football brochure records a game in 1895 in which the Paladins were defeated by a score of 14-10 and Clemson lists its first football victory as a 14-6 win over Furman in 1896. The first schedule (and results) that recent research has revealed was in 1902. Down through the years football has been an important part of the Furman athletic program, and indeed, of the University itself. Of necessity, there have been two periods when football was not played. No inter-collegiate games were played from 1903 through 1912 — because of University administrative action — and no games were played during World War II.
