1980 FURMAN PRACTICE PLANS & FACILITIES

PRESEASON CAMP REPORTING DATES — Freshmen will report on Tuesday, August 12 and the first practice for newcomers will be Wednesday, August 13. Upperclassmen will report for workouts on Saturday, August 16. The first practice with all players will be Monday, August 19.

PRESEASON CAMP PRACTICE SCHEDULE — The Paladins will hold a two-a-day workout during the first two weeks of fall camp, August 18 - August 30. Beginning Sept. 1, The Paladins will practice once per day through the rest of the 1980 season.

FURMAN PRACTICE FACILITIES — The Paladins will use three practice fields during August camp. All practice fields are adjacent to the Herman W. Lay Physical Activities Center on the west end of the Furman campus. During the season, the Paladins will use the two upper fields for workouts. All fields are served by an underground sprinkler system and under the watchful eye and care of Hubert Gardner of the Furman University Physical Plant. The football office would like to thank Mr. Gardner for his attention and care of the practice facilities. Also, a filming tower is located atop the PAC and allows the coaching staff and team to film and videotape practice sessions.

PHOTO & INTERVIEW DAY

Furman's 1980 Photo and Interview Day for the media is scheduled for Thursday, August 28. The session will begin at noon with lunch across from the athletic department, above the baseball field. Coach Sheridan and his staff will attend the luncheon and answer any questions you may have about the 1980 season. All players will be available for interviews after lunch. Afterwards, the team will be in full uniform for team pictures. Also, we hope to show the media the construction work being done on Furman's new football stadium, slated for completion for the 1981 season.

PLAYER INTERVIEW POLICY

The sports information office and football coaching staff are eager to assist the media with player interviews. To help in this endeavor it is requested that the media contact the sports information office for all player interviews. The sports information office will arrange interviews at places and times convenient to both parties. The media's cooperation with this will be appreciated.

MEDIA INFORMATION

PRESS BOX: Furman's working facilities are located atop Sirmine Stadium and include three levels for media accommodations. The roof of the press box is used for film crews. The second level is reserved for radio, television and scouts. The first level is limited to working press and game statistics.

PRESS PASSES: All applications for press passes should be directed to the Sports Information Director and are issued on an individual game basis. Credentials should be requested as early as possible. Passes not furnished by return mail must be picked up in person at the "Will-Call" window.

BROADCAST: Permission to broadcast rights must be secured at least two weeks in advance from the Sports Information Director. Line installations are ordered by the individual station through their local telephone companies. Each station is allocated a booth and three passes.

SCOUTING: Passes for scouting purposes must be requested at least two weeks in advance from the Sports Information Director. Two seats are allocated to each organization. Because of limited space, schools which Furman and its opponents will be playing the following week will be seated in the box. Others will have to be seated in the stands.

SERVICES: Programs, complete statistics, running play-by-play accounts, and post game quotes are provided at every Paladin contest. Two telephones are available and a telecopier will be on hand on a first come basis. Sandwiches, coffee and soft drinks are served in the press box.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Field passes are limited to working press photographers only. Photographers may work on the photo deck or on either sideline (except between the 35 yard lines) and beyond the end zones. Pass requests should be made at least two weeks in advance to the Sports Information Director.

PARKING: Limited parking space is available behind the press box for members of the media on a first come basis.

PALADINS ON RADIO 1980

Bill Hogan and Greg Laetsch will handle the play-by-play and color commentary on the Furman Football Radio Network to be heard on WGXL-FM this season. Stereo 100 will carry every Paladin game home and away.

Hogan, a native of Iowa, has been the voice of Furman football since 1978 and also serves as play-by-play announcer for the basketball Paladins. Hogan has been in radio since his graduation from Mount St. Mary's College in Emmitsburg, Md., in 1948. He has owned WLBG Radio since 1955, and brings 23 years of sports broadcasting experience to the Furman radio team. He has twice been selected South Carolina Sportscaster of the Year. Last year he was chosen to broadcast the Shrine Bowl for the second time in his career.

Laetsch is entering his first season providing expert commentary on the Paladin broadcasts. He is a 1979 Furman graduate and an Asheville native. A three-year letterman at receiver, Laetsch was signed as a free agent by the Seattle Seahawks in 1978. He is also the last Paladin receiver to catch passes for over 100-yards in a game. Laetsch was also selected to play in the Canadian-American Bowl. He is presently an account executive with Smith Barney, Harris Upham & Co., of Greenville.

SPORTS INFORMATION DIRECTOR RICK COVINGTON



Rick Covington is in his third year as sports information director at Furman University. A native of Georgetown, Ky., he came to Greenville following a one-year stint at Fort Hays (Kan.) State University. Prior to going to Fort Hays, he served as assistant SID at Morehead (Ky.) State University. Rick holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Morehead State. He is married to the former Betty Wilson, also of Georgetown.

1980 OUTLOOK

Furman University Head Football Coach Dick Sheridan begins his third year at the helm and welcomes 48 lettermen, including 13 starters, for the 1980 campaign.

The Paladins finished with a 5-6 record last season and captured 4th place in the Southern Conference with a 4-3 mark.

Offensively, Furman will miss the services of 14 lettermen, six in the interior line. Four of those six were starters in 1979. Also departed from last season's squad are four offensive backs, three receivers and a placekicker.

Furman losses on defense number five lettermen and two starters among them.

Although Sheridan has a number of lettermen returning, many of those players suffered injuries during the past year and will be counted on heavily this fall. Sheridan feels the degree of success the Paladins can achieve in 1980 will depend on quickly those players can rehabilitate themselves and be able to reach a 100 percent performance.

SCHEDULE

The Paladins will face all seven Southern Conference foes this season, with only two making the trip to Greenville and Sirmine Stadium. Both league visitors will be from the military. Virginia Military will take on the Paladins on Sept. 27 and Furman will host arch-rival The Citadel in the season finale on Nov. 22.

Outside the conference, the Paladins will play long-time foes Davidson, Presbyterian and Wofford. Furman and North Carolina tangle in the season opener in Chapel Hill on Sept. 6.

OFFENSIVE BACKFIELD

Tailback will be a deep position this fall, Furman will have last season's top two ground gainers back in Mike Glenn (5-11, 195, Jr.) and Brothel Cole (5-11, 170, Jr.). Glenn also led the Paladins in scoring in 1979. Ricky Hall (5-11, 190, So.) returns after being red-shirted last year with a knee injury, along with Stephen White (5-11, 185, So.). Furman will also have Bobby Andrews (5-8, 152, So.) providing depth at tailback.

Steve Bishop (5-11, 195, Sr.) and Mark Taylor (5-11, 205, Sr.), along with Jimmy Beddingfield (6-1, 200, So.) return at the fullback spot. Bishop serves as co-captain this season.

At quarterback, Tim Sorrells (6-0, 175, Jr.) returns after starting the latter part of the season. Jeff Johnson (5-9, 165, Jr.), Todd Neal (5-9, 160, So.) and incoming freshmen are expected to compete for varsity spots.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Charlie Anderson (6-2, 230, Jr.) returns as a starter at tackle. Steve Lloyd (6-2, 225, Jr.) returns after seeing a great deal of action last season. Also expected to vie for the tackle position will be Tom Morrish (6-2, 220, Sr.), Brian Barnett (6-2, 225, So.), Jeff Washington (6-1, 250, So.), Paul Foster (6-2, 226, So.) and Mark Mitchell (6-3, 225, So.). Tackle will be a new position for both Washington and Mitchell, who were moved from the defensive line. Barnett missed spring workouts with a knee injury.

The guard spots will be manned by David Braschler (6-2, 215, Jr.), Dan Sleet (6-2, 230, So.), Mike Coleman (6-0, 220, So.), Hollis Barton (5-11, 215, Jr.) and Floyd Swilley (5-11, 215, Sr.). Braschler and Coleman did not go through spring practice due to injuries.

Bart Heres (6-2, 225, So.), Briggs Traylor (6-1, 205, So.) and Tony Campbell (5-11, 215, So.) will battle for the center spot on this year's squad.

RECEIVERS

Tight end will be an experienced position for Furman in 1980. Terry Clark (6-4, 220, Jr.), Zach Kelehear (6-5, 220, Sr.) and Byron Lee (6-0, 195, Jr.) all return with valuable experience. John Johnson (6-3, 215, So.), who doubles as the Paladin punter and Kenny Rodriguez (6-1, 205, So.) will compete for duty at the tight end spot.

Mark Grainger (5-10, 175, Sr.) is back along with Billy Risher (5-11, 170, So.) and Dennis Wright (5-10, 165, So.) at wide receiver. Shawn Flanagan (6-2, 160, So.) will also compete for a job at this receiver spot.

DEFENSIVE LINE

The defensive line will have the most experience of any position for the Paladins this season. Sheridan will look for leadership from this area. Returning within the defensive front is two-time honorable mention all-America pick Kevin Morgan (6-1, 230, Sr.). Also on hand will be David Lyle (6-4, 235, Sr.), Jerry Scott (6-2, 221, Sr.), Ansel Matthews (6-6, 255, Sr.), Scott Kimche (6-2, 225, Jr.), Steve Mazur (6-4, 220, So.), Matt Ruffing (6-5, 235, So.), Mark Dameron (6-3, 215, So.) and Felix Andrews (6-2, 225, So.), to make this a very deep position for Furman in 1980. Lyle, who served as co-captain last season, missed all of the 1979 campaign and spring drills due to a knee injury. For Scott, this is a new position for the former all-league line-backer.

DEFENSIVE ENDS & LINEBACKERS

Returning at defensive end is all-South Carolina and all-Southern Conference performer Jeff Snipes (6-1, 215, Sr.). Tim Partridge (6-3, 215, Jr.) is back, along with Calvin Harkless (6-0, 195, Sr.), Steve Garrison (6-2, 190, Jr.), Kevin Quinlan (6-3, 195, So.), and David Allsopp (6-1, 190, So.). Partridge missed spring workouts due to injury, while defensive end will be a

new position for Harkless, who moved over from offense. Garrison is the Paladin long-snapper for punts and kicking placements.

Bruce Gheesling (6-0, 200, Jr.) returns after earning all-league and honorable mention all-America honors last season. Steve O'Neill (6-1, 205, Jr.), Billy Hall (6-0, 210, So.) and Eddie Allsopp (6-1, 195, Jr.) return at linebacker. Allsopp missed all of 1979 and did not participate in off-season workouts due to injury.

SECONDARY

Chris Buono (6-0, 185, Sr.) heads the list of returning defensive back for 1980. Joining Buono at strong safety are Paul Sorrells (5-11, 165, Sr.) and Steve Walburn (6-2, 171, So.). At free safety, the Paladins return Brent Sanders (6-2, 185, Jr.), Verlon Rhodes (6-2, 180, So.) and Chris Nixon (6-2, 185, So.). Transfer Terry Smith (5-11, 180, Jr.) will also vie for a free safety spot. Cornerbacks will be found in Bruce Fowler (5-9, 160, Sr.), Gib McEachran (5-11, 165, So.), Ernest Gibson (5-9, 175, Fr.), Jeff Burke (5-11, 175, Jr.), John Zemina (6-0, 177, So.) and Rocky Purvis (5-11, 162, So.). Gibson was red-shirted last season because of injury.

KICKING SPECIALISTS

Gone is record-setting placekicker Keith Potter, Handling the kicking duties this year will be Tim Tanguay (5-11, 170, So.) and Dennis Wright (5-10, 165, So.). Punter John Johnson (6-3, 215, So.) returns and will get competition from Chris Horton (6-0, 190, Jr.). Garrison will handle the long snaps and David Middleton (6-3, 220, Sr.) will provide depth at that spot.

LOSSES TO INJURY

Defensive backs Bill Freeman (5-9, 165, Sr.) and Randy Sansom (6-1, 180, Jr.) will not be able to compete this fall due to injuries suffered during their careers. Gone also by way of injury on defense is Robert Anders (6-0, 190, So.) at defensive end.

INTERVIEW WITH FURMAN HEAD COACH DICK SHERIDAN

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is an interview with Sheridan concerning the Paladins' prospects this fall. Please use any part at will.

- Q. As you get set for the 1980 season and the season opener at North Carolina, what are your biggest concerns going into August camp?**
- A. We graduated six offensive linemen last season and four of those seniors were starters. We will be young and inexperienced in this critical area. We are also concerned about depth at almost every position, but quarterback is of particular concern because Tim Sorrells is the only returning player there with any varsity experience at all.
- Q. How do you feel about the past two recruiting classes the Paladins have had?**
- A. We are pleased with last year's freshmen and if they continue to improve, we believe that this group of players, as juniors and seniors, can form the nucleus of championship caliber teams. The incoming class is, of course, much more difficult to evaluate but we are also optimistic about their future contributions.
- Q. What changes will be made in the Paladins' offense and defense for 1980?**
- A. From a technical point of view, any changes on offense would be very minor. We hope to change the disastrous turnover rate we experienced in the first half of last season. Defensively, the most important changes will be in personnel shifts from one position to another in an effort to get our best athletes in the starting lineup.
- Q. What improvement can you expect in 1980?**
- A. As mentioned earlier, we must improve our consistency and eliminate the errors we made in the 1979 season. We will still be very young on offense and this means a lot of hard work to reach the level of consistency it takes to win championships. Defensively, we worked hard in spring practice to rebuild the toughness, pride and consistent performance that it will take for us to play championship defense. Our players and coaches are committed to improvement in every phase of the game.
- Q. What questions were answered or new problem areas found in spring drills?**
- A. On defense, we moved players around quite a bit and experimented with various combinations. We believe we were able to answer some basic questions concerning personnel in spring practice. On offense, our primary questions involved our offensive line and because of injuries, we are still not sure what will be our best combination in this important area. As always, the season will answer the questions and expose the problems.
- Q. What are some of your reflections as head football coach at Furman?**
- A. Well, in my eight years at Furman, including the past two as head coach, everyone here has worked hard to improve our program. We will continue to work hard to have the best program in the Southern Conference and make Furman a consistent contender in the conference. We were disappointed in our record last season, but we were a fumble and a point from repeating as Southern Conference Champions. We are playing competitive football and we are striving to reach the next plateau. That is consistency — consistency in recruiting, execution, and in our overall program.

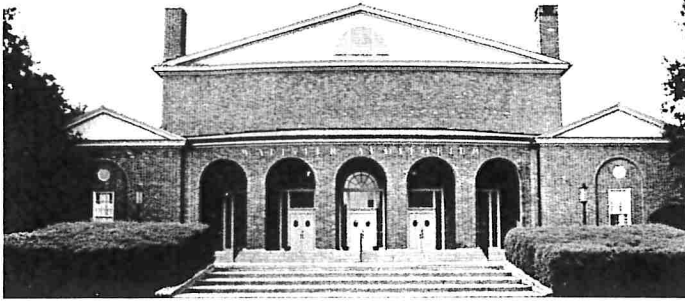

FURMAN UNIVERSITY

Furman University traces its origin to The Furman Academy and Theological Institution authorized in 1925 by the South Carolina Baptist State Convention and opened in 1827 at Edgefield, South Carolina. In 1850 it was chartered Furman University, and over the years has firmly established itself as one of the nation's leading private institutions.

The University is located on a 750-acre wooded campus six miles north of Greenville, and its campus acclaimed one of the most beautiful in the nation. Campus facilities and activities include a 30-acre lake for swimming, boating, and fishing, an 18-hole golf course, 20 tennis courts, a playhouse for experimental drama, a 2,000-seat auditorium, physical activities center, an athletic building and eight playing fields.

Buildings are reinforced concrete, faced with handmade Virginia brick. The contemporary Williamsburg colonial architecture captures much of the flavor of the Old South, adapted to modern needs and usage. The Furman University physical plant is valued at over \$35,000,000 with 22 major buildings completed.

In addition to physical beauty, Furman enjoys an academic reputation which stretches across the nation. The faculty, 86 percent of whom hold earned doctoral degrees, consists of 138 full-time and 42 part-time professors. The student-faculty ratio of 15:1 allows for individual attention and personal relationships.

The James B. Duke Library, fully air-conditioned, houses over 250,000 volumes. More than 1,500 periodicals are received regularly and the microfilm and record collections are extensive.

Degrees are offered in a wide variety of fields including the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Music, and Bachelor of Science degrees. The graduate division awards the Master of Arts degree with a major in education and the Master of Science degree with a major in chemistry. A Master of Business Administration degree is offered jointly by Furman's Department of Business Administration and the Clemson University College of Industrial Management and Textile Science.

Furman is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the Southern University Conference, the Association of American Colleges and the South Carolina Association of Colleges. It is on the approved list of the American Association of University Women and the American Chemical Society, and is a member of the National Association of Schools of Music.

During his tenure as President of Furman University, Dr. John E. Johns has become one of the best friends of the athletic program. Dr. Johns, an avid golfer, takes an interest in all athletic pursuits at Furman and often follows the Paladin basketball and football teams on the road.

DR. JOHN E. JOHNS PRESIDENT



Johns was president of Stetson University in DeLand, Fla., before returning to Furman, his alma mater, in 1976. He is a 1947 Furman graduate.

Johns had been a member of the Stetson faculty and staff since 1948 before assuming the position of president in 1970. He achieved the rank of full professor in the Department of History and Political Science and served as department chairman. Dr. Johns became business manager at Stetson in 1963 until he was named Vice-President for Finance in 1968.

A native of Ozark, Alabama, Johns is the author of *Florida During the Civil War*, the state's official publication for its Centennial. He has written articles for *Encyclopedia Britannica*, *Jefferson Encyclopedia*, *The Mississippi Valley Historical Review*, and *Florida Historical Quarterly*.

Johns was a World War II Army Air Corps pilot from 1942-1945, and received the Distinguished Flying Cross.

He graduated cum laude from Furman, receiving the Bradshaw-Feaster Medal for General Excellence. He earned the M.A., and Ph.D. degrees from the University of North Carolina. He has been

awarded honorary degrees in literature and the humanities by Rollins College, William Jewell College, Furman and Stetson.

Johns is married to the former Martha Mauney of Shelby, N.C., also a 1947 Furman graduate. Mrs. Johns has been recognized for service to her community and state and for valuable contributions to higher education. The Johns have three sons, John, Jr.; Steven; Marcus.

DR. FRANCIS W. BONNER VICE PRESIDENT AND PROVOST



Dr. Francis Bonner, who has been Faculty Chairman of Athletics since 1968, came to Furman as Associate Professor of English in 1949. Since 1953, he has been both teacher and administrator, serving consecutively as Dean of the Men's College, Dean of the University, Vice President, and since 1972 as Vice President and Provost. He is chairman of the University's Committee on Athletics and served six years as President of the Southern Conference, an unprecedented length of tenure in that office. He presently serves on the Division I Steering Committee of the NCAA and on the Executive Committee of the Southern Conference.

A native of Alabama, Dr. Bonner earned the B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of Alabama, and Ph.D. degree from the University of North Carolina and did post-doctoral study and research at Harvard. His field is English, with concentration on Chaucer and the medieval period. He is one of the most loyal and enthusiastic Paladin sport fans.

He and his wife, Nilouise, have a daughter and a son.



DUTCH BAUGHMAN
 Director of Athletics

Dale Thomas "Dutch" Baughman is in his second year as Director of Athletics at Furman. The Columbus, Ohio native came to Furman in 1979 following two years as Assistant Athletic Director at Northwestern University.

"Dutch" owns an impressive slate of credentials as an athlete, coach and administrator. "He is thoroughly knowledgeable about every aspect of athletic administration including promotion, fund raising, scheduling and the many other duties he will have," said Furman President John E. Johns, in announcing Baughman's appointment. "He is energetic, enthusiastic and has a reputation for hard work."

Baughman holds Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Ohio State University. He has also completed all doctoral work except the dissertation in athletic administration at Ohio State.

Prior to going to Northwestern, "Dutch" served as an administrative assistant and athletic counselor at OSU. Before that position, he served as a graduate assistant on the Buckeye football staff.

A former Marine Captain, Baughman played football, lacrosse and wrestled at the Columbus school.

Denny Hoobler, Associate Director of Athletics, is also in his second year at Furman.

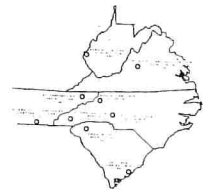
Hoobler, a native of Carrollton, Ohio, prior to arriving at Furman, worked with the Athletic Business and Ticket Offices at Ohio State University.

Furman University is a member of the Southern Conference, one of the nation's oldest intercollegiate athletic conferences. The nine-team league is composed of members — Appalachian State, The Citadel, Davidson, East Tennessee State, Furman, Marshall, Tennessee-Chattanooga, Virginia Military Institute, and Western Carolina.

The Southern Conference was formed in 1921 at a meeting of 15 institutions in Atlanta, Georgia. The league initially was known as the Southern Intercollegiate Conference and the following 12 schools were charter members: Alabama, Auburn, Clemson, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi State, Tennessee, Virginia, Virginia Tech, and Washington & Lee.

The growth of the SIC was rapid and, within a year, Florida, LSU, Mississippi, South Carolina, Tulane, and Vanderbilt were added.

In 1923, the league was officially renamed the Southern Conference. Through the years, other schools were admitted but, in 1932, 13 of the 21 members left the conference to form the Southeastern Conference.

In February 1936, Furman was one of six new members admitted to the Southern Conference, including current members Davidson and The Citadel. In 1953, there was another mass exodus of schools from the league to form the Atlantic Coast Conference.

The Southern Conference declares champions in 12 different sports, nine being decided by tournament play. Tournaments have been a popular and profitable method of determining the champions, particularly in basketball, as evidenced by the past four year's tournaments in Roanoke, Virginia, which have been immensely successful. Southern Conference champions in basketball, baseball, and wrestling automatically qualify for participation in NCAA national tournaments. All members of the conference possess NCAA Division I status.

Kenneth Germann is the commissioner of the Southern Conference. Dallas Shirley serves as assistant to the Commissioner, and supervisor of officials. John Geis directs the service bureau. Furman University Vice President Francis W. Bonner served as president of the conference for six years.

The conference annually awards the Commissioner's Cup to the university which accumulates the greatest number of points in championship competition throughout the year.

DICK SHERIDAN - Head Football Coach



Now in his third season as head football coach at Furman University, Dick Sheridan has established himself as one of the nation's outstanding young coaches.

Named to the position in February of 1978, Sheridan has guided Furman to 8-3 and 5-6 records for a combined 13-9 mark. His first season, 1978, saw him guide the Paladins to their first-ever Southern Conference title with a 4-1 league mark. The record was the best in eight seasons and only the second time since 1935 Furman had won eight games. It also earned Sheridan Southern Conference coach-of-the-year honors and Columbia Touchdown Club coach-of-the-year laurels. The 1978 squad ranked in the top 14 in the nation in three offensive categories and topped the conference in several departments.

Last year Sheridan guided Furman to a 5-6 record, including a 4-3 mark in the Southern Conference. The Paladins lost their first five contests, only to come back and win five of the final six. The lone loss in the final six was a 21-20 defeat by Virginia Military in Lexington, preventing an undefeated second half of the season. The following week the Paladins defeated Davidson, 63-55, to set an NCAA record for most points scored in game by two teams (118).

Sheridan came to Furman in 1973 as an assistant to Art Baker. He served five seasons as

Furman's offensive coordinator before assuming the head coaching duties.

The North Augusta, S.C., native joined the coaching staff at Eau Claire High School in 1964 and remained there as assistant football coach and head basketball coach until 1969. In three seasons as head basketball coach, his teams produced two conference championships and made the state "final four" twice, finishing runner-up in 1969. He then assumed the head football duties at Orangeburg-Wilkinson High for three seasons, where his 1971 squad finished with a 13-0 record and the State AAAA title. The team ranked 12th in the nation and Sheridan was tabbed for South Carolina coach-of-the-year honors.

He then moved to Airport High, in West Columbia, S.C., in 1972, before joining the Furman coaching staff. In his final three seasons as head coach, his teams posted a 32-3 won-loss record and won more games during that period than any other team in the state. His four-year high school head coaching record was an amazing 37-8-1.

Sheridan's coaching philosophy at Furman: "Our goal is to have the best football program in the Southern Conference. We will do our best to produce consistently successful teams that will represent Furman University with class and with an obvious desire to excel."

He and his wife Brenda have two sons: Bobby and Jon. A 1964 graduate of South Carolina, Sheridan earned a Masters of Education from USC in 1969.

STEVE ROBERTSON - Defensive Coordinator

Steve Robertson enters his eighth year on the Paladin staff.

Robertson serves as defensive coordinator and administrative assistant for the football program. He also coaches the defensive ends.

As administrative assistant, Steve is responsible for assisting teams with their travel arrangements, liaison between Furman and the pro scouts, and coordinates banquets, awards, and game organization.

Robertson came to Furman in 1973 from Newberry College, where he had served as defensive coordinator since 1968. Prior to that, he spent eight years at Eau Claire High School as assistant and head football coach. He joined the Shamrocks in 1959 and assumed the head coaching duties in 1965.

A former South Carolina High School Coach of the Year, Robertson guided Eau Claire to a 3-A State title in 1967. His three year record at the school was 28-4-1.

Coach Robertson's recruiting area includes southwestern South Carolina, northeastern Georgia and the Jacksonville area of Florida. He also maintains correspondence with schools in New Jersey.

A native of Greer, S.C., Robertson graduated from Newberry after earning All-State and All-Conference honors. He and his wife Linda have two children, Ron and Robin.



JIMMY SATTERFIELD - Offensive Coordinator

Jimmy Satterfield will again serve the Paladins as offensive coordinator as he begins his eighth season on the Furman staff.

This fall will also mark his eighth year as offensive backfield coach.

In addition to his coaching duties, the 1962 South Carolina graduate coordinates the Paladins recruiting effort, the acquisition of equipment, coordinates all the off-season program, and the Furman football camp.

Satterfield came to Furman in 1973 following a highly successful high school coaching tenure. In five seasons at Eau Claire and Irmo High Schools, Satterfield compiled a 47-9-1 won-loss slate. During that period his team won five conference championships and one Upper State title. In 1970, when Eau Claire captured the Upper State crown, he was named South Carolina High School Coach of the Year and also served as Shrine Bowl coach.

Satterfield, who formerly operated an all-sports camp, Camp Indian Valley, near Swansea, S.C., joined the Eau Claire staff following graduation from USC and assumed head coaching responsibilities in 1968. He remained there until going to Irmo in 1971.

Coach Satterfield's primary recruiting responsibilities include northwestern South Carolina and the Greenville area, and northwestern Georgia.

A Lancaster, S.C. native, Satterfield holds a master's degree in education from South Carolina. He and his wife, Ann, have three children, Shaun, Sidney and Lee.



KEN PETTUS - Linebackers

Ken Pettus begins his fifth season at Furman and will direct the linebackers this fall. Pettus returned to the coaching staff in 1978, after having served in 1973 and 1974.

In addition to his coaching duties, he supervises the weight program and coordinates the Furman football radio network, as well as organizing the football managers.

A former small college all-America selection at Newberry College, Pettus was named the Carolinas Conference Lineman of the Year as a junior and was chosen all-state in his senior season.

He received all-America, all-state and all-South honors for Slick Moore at Greenville High School.

Recruiting responsibilities for Pettus include Atlanta to Chattanooga and northern Florida, from Lake City to Melbourne. He also recruits Birmingham and maintains correspondence with high schools in Pennsylvania.

Pettus has a master's degree in education from Furman and is married to the former Jan Griffin of Gainesville, Florida.

BUDDY JENNINGS - Defensive Backs

Buddy Jennings enters his first season on the Furman staff and will handle the coaching of the defensive backfield.

He will also coordinate player admissions, financial aid, academics and housing for Paladin gridders.

A former split end at Furman, Jennings was a two-year baseball letterman for the Paladins, topping the club in hitting in 1966 and serving as team captain in 1967. He was graduated from Furman in 1968.

He spent three seasons as assistant coach at Berea High, assuming the head coaching duties from 1971-74. He then went to Hanahan High for three seasons as head coach. From Hanahan, Jennings took over the program at Chester and has held that post for the past two years.

During the 1974 season, the Laurens native served as graduate assistant on the Furman staff. Recruiting responsibilities will find Jennings in southeastern South Carolina, from Columbia to Charleston, south to Beaufort, plus the Aiken and Augusta areas. He also will cover the Knoxville area and greater Miami.

The graduate of Honea Path High School holds a master's degree in secondary administration from Clemson and is married to the former Janet Cann of Greenville.

ERIC HYMAN - Defensive Line

Eric Hyman is one of four Paladin coaches beginning his eighth year at Furman. He will direct the defensive line again this season.

The 1973 North Carolina graduate serves as film coordinator and is responsible for the film exchange between teams. He is also in charge of recruiting visits by interested student-athletes during the season.

A former all-ACC performer on the defensive line, he was a member of two conference championship teams and played in two bowl games. Hyman was also selected all-South as a senior and was tabbed for the 1973 Hula Bowl.

Western North Carolina, from Charlotte to the Tennessee line falls into his recruiting responsibilities as well as northern Virginia and some of the Greenville area.

A native of Alexandria, Va., Hyman holds a masters degree in education from Furman. He and his wife Pauline have a son, Ryan Cartwright.

Ted Cain begins his fourth season on the Furman grid staff. His coaching responsibility will be the Paladin receivers.

SIRRINE STADIUM

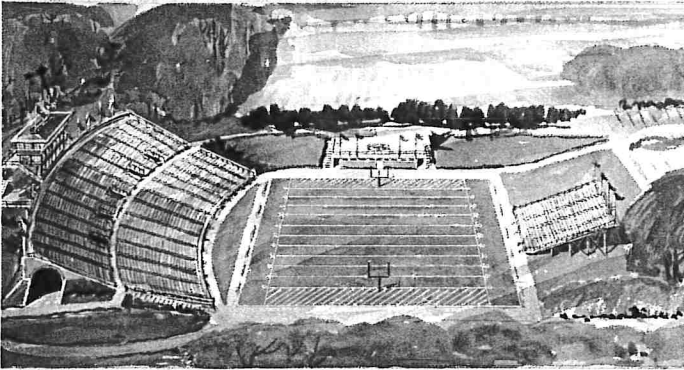
Since 1937, Sitrine Stadium has been the home of Furman University Football.

With a capacity of 13,600, the stadium possesses a natural turf of Bermuda grass. It is also the last structure of the old campus, before the University moved to its present location in 1958.

Restrooms, concession areas and half-time houses are located within the stadium.

Furman also offers such services as a lost-and-found, located at the lower level of the press box; an ambulance service, located at the North end of the stadium; a first aid station manned by the Greenville Chapter of the Red Cross at the South end zone behind the scoreboard; a pay telephone on the West side of the stadium; stadium doctors in both East and West grandstands; and doctors anticipating emergency calls during the game can notify the press box at the lower level.

The press box is located atop the West grandstand and has accommodations for writers and statisticians, radio and television, scouts and film crews.

FURMAN'S NEW FOOTBALL HOME

In May, the Board of Trustees of Furman University approved to give President Johns and the board's Executive Committee the go-ahead to authorize the construction of an on-campus football stadium.

The pre-stressed structure will be built in three phases. Construction will be by Farley Construction Company of Columbia, S.C.

Phase 1 calls for the home half of the stadium to be built, with seating capacity in excess of 10,000. A press box is also included in Phase 1 plans. The ground level of the press box will house concession and restroom facilities. The top two levels will service press, radio and television game coverage.

Phases 2 and 3 will be constructed at the discretion of Furman University officials. Those plans include visiting team seating and dressing rooms and training facilities.

Phase 1 is slated for completion in time for the 1981 season.



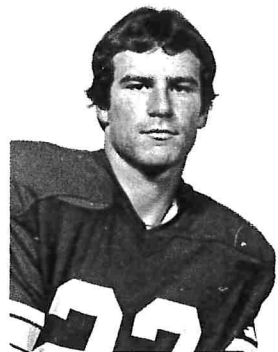

ORIGIN OF THE PALADIN

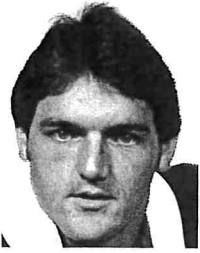
Furman University athletic teams were known by different names until the 1961 school year. The baseball team was "Hornets," the football team "Hurricanes," and the basketball team "Paladins."

The basketball team was dubbed "Paladins" by a Greenville sportswriter in the 1930's and the name stuck. By vote of the student body, all Furman athletic teams became the "Paladins" on September 15, 1961.

"Paladin" is derived from the Count Palatine, one of the twelve knights who comprised the bodyguard and inner circle of Emperor Charlemagne.

THREE 100-YARD RUSHERS IN A SINGLE GAME

Brothel Cole, Steve Bishop and Mike Glenn became the first Paladins to each rush over 100-yards in a single game. They accomplished the feat in 1979 versus The Citadel in Charleston. Cole gained 137 yards on 14 attempts, with Bishop carrying 14 times for 101. Glenn rushed for 100 on 26 carries.
