1988 MEDIA GUIDE

The 1988 Furman Football Media Guide was designed and written by Hunter Reid. Editorial assistance was provided by Frances Riley, David Baillie, and Doug Holliday. MEDIA INFORMATION

PRESS BOX: Furman working press facilities are located atop the home stands at Paladin Stadium. The fourth level is reserved for radio, and the fifth level houses space for sportswriters, home and visiting coaches, public address, home and visiting game film crews, and statistical crews. The top (roof) level is reserved for television. The fourth and fifth levels are serviced by elevator and stairs, while the roof level is accessible by stairs only. Only working press will be admitted to these three levels - no spouses or children allowed.

PRESS PASSES: All requests for working press credentials should be directed to the Sports Information Director. Passes will be mailed as soon as possible after a request has been filed. Passes not furnished by return mail must be picked up in person at the 'Press Will-Call' window, located on the ground floor of the press tower.

BROADCAST RIGHTS: Permission to broadcast must be secured at least two weeks in advance from the Sports Information Director. Furman University operates a 'trade-out' voice coupler for Southern Conference teams and is available to non-conference teams for \$50 payable before the broadcast begins. Prior arrangements must be made for the phone. Each station will be allocated a booth and four passes on the fourth level of the press box.

SCOUTING: Passes for scouting purposes should be requested as far in advance as possible. Each organization will be allocated one seat on a space available basis.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers must secure sideline passes from the Sports Information Director and adhere to a working area designated as "any area along the sidelines (except between the 30-yard lines) and beyond the end zones."

PARKING: Requests for parking should be made as early as possible. Media parking is located in lot E, adjacent to the press tower.

SERVICES: Game programs, complete statistics, pre-game information, running play-by-play, post-game coaches' quotes, and refreshments are provided at every Furman home game. Four telephones and a telecopier will be available throughout the day. Post-game interviews can be conducted both on the field and in the locker rooms at the north end of the stadium. A 10-minute 'cooling-off' period will be observed before the locker rooms of both teams will be opened to the press.

MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE: Coach Jimmy Satterfield hosts an informal weekly press conference each Monday before a Saturday game at Vince Perone's off Antrim Drive in Greenville beginning at 10:45 a.m.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: The best time to interview players in person is before practice, preferably between 2:00 and 3:00 p.m. Phone interviews will be arranged at the player's convenience, but it is asked that all player interviews (in-person or via-phone) be arranged through Hunter Reid in the sports information office at (803) 294-2061.

COACHES' INTERVIEWS: The best time to interview Coach Satterfield and or any member of the football coaching staff is between 11:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon Tuesday - Thursday and between 1:00 p.m. and 2:00 p.m. Monday - Thursday. Please call Hunter Reid (803) 294-2061 to arrange all coaches' interviews.

FURMAN RADIO

Furman University Paladin football is primed for another exciting season, and now Paladin radio broadcasts can be heard throughout most of South Carolina through the school's expanded network.

Set to originate on Greenville radio station **WSSL-AM (1440)**, Furman football and basketball broadcasts can be heard along a 12-station network, covering such Palmetto markets as Anderson, Spartanburg, Columbia, Myrtle Beach, Lancaster, Florence and Charleston, in addition to Greenville.

This fall **Doug Holliday** begins his first season as "Voice of the Paladins" after a one-year stint as color commentator for the school's football program and three seasons of work with Butch Estes' Paladin basketball program.

A native of Anderson and 1982 graduate of the University of South Carolina, Holliday, 27, had previously been associated with WLBG radio station in Laurens, serving as news and sports director, and as play-by-play man for Laurens High School football, basketball, and baseball broadcasts.

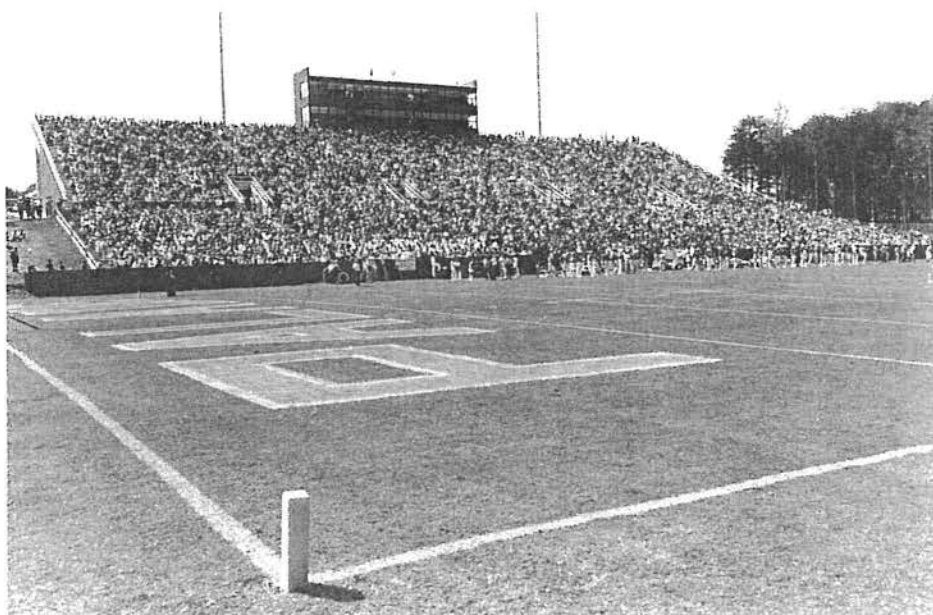

PALADIN STADIUM

Furman's Paladin Stadium, nestled beautifully on the campus with a scenic view of Paris Mountain, is the football home of the Paladins, having opened in 1981 to replace Surrine Stadium, which served as the site of Furman football for 45 years.

The stadium, which now seats 16,000 following an addition of 2,800 seats prior to the 1985 season, is the third such facility for the Paladins since 1919. Manly Field, completed in that year, served as the home of Furman football until 1936 when Furman moved the site of its home football contests to then-newly constructed Surrine Stadium. The first game played in Surrine Stadium - a 14-13 Furman win over Davidson - was the sixth game of the year for Furman during the 1936 season. In 1980 Furman closed its association with Surrine Stadium with a 28-15 victory over arch-rival The Citadel to win its first outright Southern Conference Championship.

Furman opened Paladin Stadium in the same fashion it did Manly and Surrine, winning the first game played within its confines. The Paladins defeated East Tennessee State 21-0 in the stadium's inaugural contest and



have gone on to record a 36-9 home record (.800) since 1981. In four of the seven years since opening, Paladin Stadium has served as the home of Southern Conference champions.

In 1985 the stadium's field was named Eugene Stone Field, in honor of the support of Furman benefactor Eugene Stone, who was directly responsible for the additional seats added to the stadium prior to the 1985 season.

From its initial grading to completion, Paladin Stadium took two years to be realized at a cost of approximately \$2 million. Construction was handled by Farley Construction of Columbia, SC.

The playing field is hybrid Bermuda and landscaping at the stadium is in line with the design and architecture of the entire university.

An Emerging Economic Force In The New South

From the time it was started as a trading post and grist mill late in the 18th century, Greenville has been a center of business and industry.

Today, Greenville County is home to a range of Fortune 500 industries, as well as a growing market for international companies. Since 1970, over 150 new industrial concerns have located operations here - including some world-wide leaders in their respective industries. Among them are Digital Equipment Corporation, Bausch & Lomb, Lockheed, 3M, Michelin, Lucas Industries, Reliance Electric, Avco, Amoco Performance Products, W.W. Grainger, Cincinnati Milacron,

FluorDaniel, CRS Sirrinc, Dunlop Sports, PYA/Monarch, Phillips Fibers, Metropolitan Life, and others.

What makes Greenville the focal point of a growing regional economy and the business capital of South Carolina is a favorable investment climate built on positive public-private sector relations, a strong work ethic, a skilled and highly trainable workforce, and the excellent quality of life that only the Upstate region can offer.

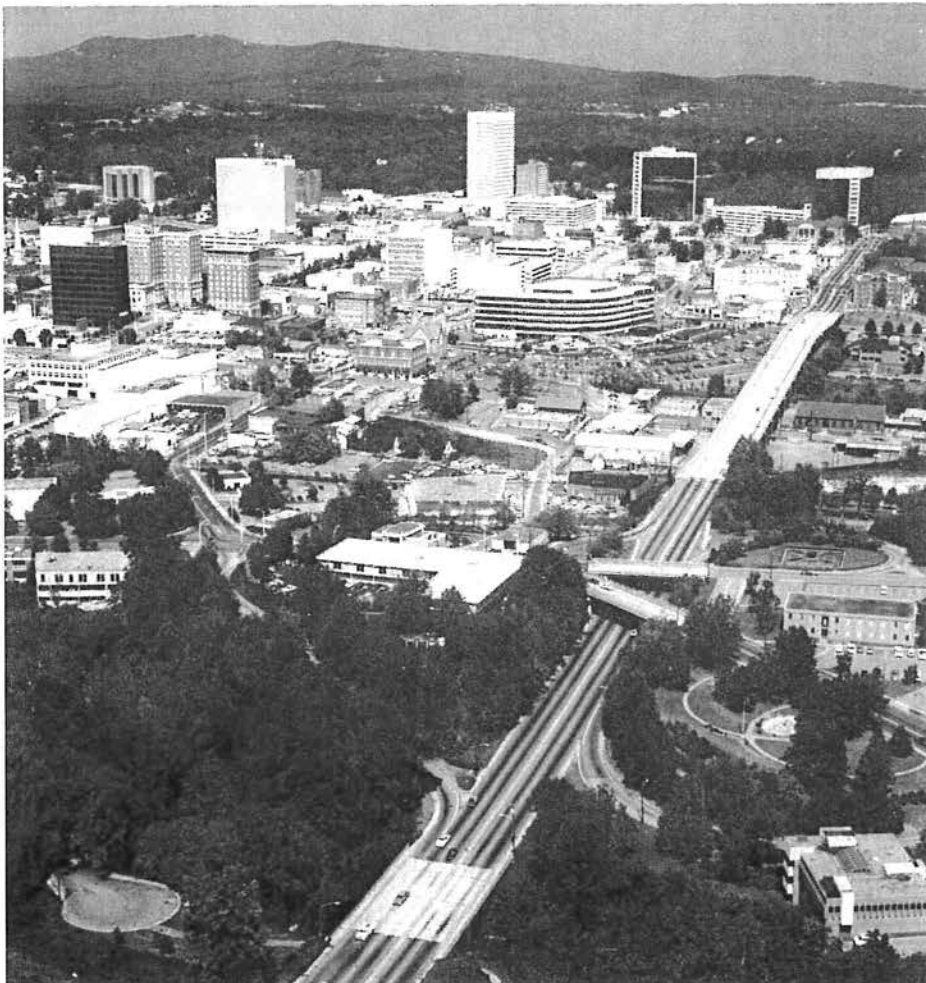
Commitment to the community's development is another key to Greenville's success. Dozens of companies and scores of individuals combined to raise over \$30 million for the Center for

the Performing Arts, now under construction in downtown Greenville. The fact that support for other charities and community organizations also grew at the same time is indicative of the commitment Greenvillians have to both community and economic growth.

Greenville's colorful history had its beginnings with the Cherokee Indians, who occupied most of the beautiful Blue Ridge foothills until 1777, when a treaty was signed giving white men access to it. In 1786 "Greenville" County, probably named for Revolutionary War General Nathaniel Greene, was chartered, and in 1831 the small village of Greenville was officially chartered.

The county's narrow, rushing streams provided water power for cotton mills as early as 1820, but Greenville was primarily a resort for low country planters in the ante-bellum period.

The textile industry began to flourish after reconstruction, with the mills and mill villages surrounding the western edge of the city. In 1915, Greenville held its first Textile Exposition, and soon became known as the "Textile Center of the South." Since that time, the area's economy has grown significantly and has become more diverse, thus helping Greenville take its position as an emerging economic force in the new south.

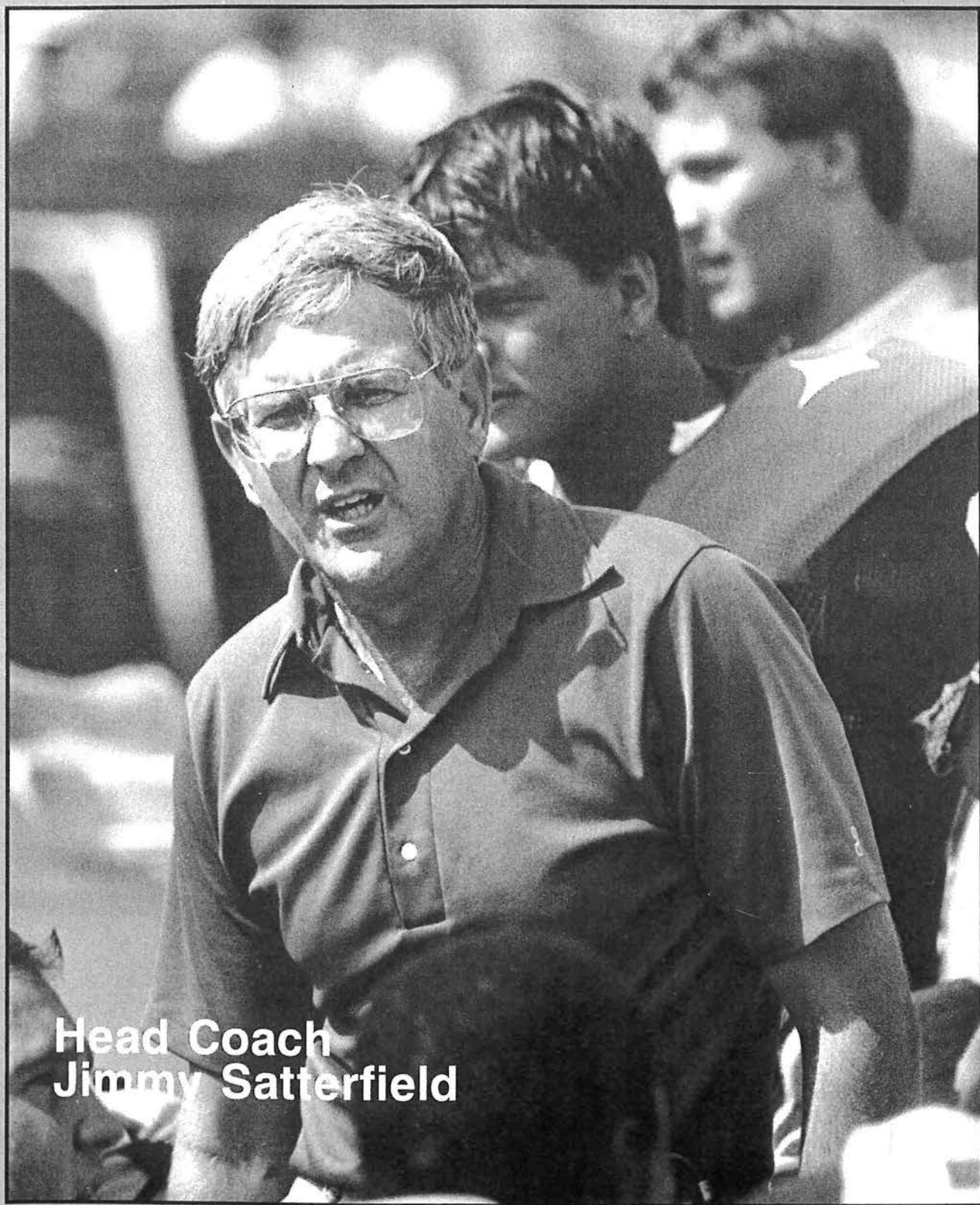

HEAD COACH

Now entering his 15th year of service to Furman University, Jimmy Satterfield as an assistant and now as a head coach has played a key role in the establishment of the school's nationally-recognized football program and the overall excellence that is associated with it.

In his two years as head mentor at Furman, Satterfield has directed the Paladins to a 14-7-2 mark, including last year's 7-4 showing. In 1986, his first year, Furman went 7-3-2 and finished the season ranked 15th in the nation in NCAA I-AA after advancing to the national playoffs, the school's fourth post-season appearance since 1982.

In addition to carrying on the school's outstanding football tradition, Satterfield has made sure that Furman has continued to be successful in its most important mission - producing graduates. Of the 48 student-athletes who have completed their fourth year of eligibility over the last two seasons, 38 (79%) have graduated as of June 1, 1988. Of the remaining ten, seven are due to graduate this summer and three will finish at Christmas.

That track record - one of accomplishment on the field and in the academic arena - is an obvious point of pride to Satterfield and the Furman coaching staff.

"We've always believed that if we recruit good students and good people, we could be successful both academically and athletically," Satterfield says. "The fact that we have accomplished this at Furman over the last 15 years is a source of pride not only for the coaches but also for our players and fans.

"We feel its important and true measure of excellence when our players are honored for their work in the classroom. When outstanding players like Steve Squire and Tim Stepp earn academic all-conference and academic All-America honors, we consider that just as noteworthy as a player gaining all-conference or all-state recognition."

Having come to Furman in 1973 as an assistant under Art Baker, Satterfield began an association with the university during a period that can be easily described as the most productive in Paladin football history. In 1978 he was named offensive coordinator under then-new head coach Dick Sheridan. That year saw Furman notch its first Southern Conference Championship with an 8-3 record - the best mark for a Paladin team in nearly a decade.

That was only the beginning.

Over the next seven seasons Furman dominated the Southern Con-

ference, winning five league crowns and moving Paladin football to a level never before seen by the school's faithful. In 1985 Furman reached the pinnacle of success with a 12-2 record and Southern Conference Championship, only to be denied a national championship following a 44-42 setback at the hands of Georgia Southern in the NCAA I-AA title game.

Many factors have led to the school's success on the football field over the last nine years and one of those has been a Paladin offense - directed by Satterfield - that has been as exciting as any in the country. Since 1980, the Paladins have ranked among the nation's best in rushing offense, averaging better than 260 yards per game. That powerful option-style ground attack has produced six 1,000-yard Paladin rushers and four Southern Conference Players-of-the-Year since 1981. A quick glance at the Furman record book confirms the dominance as a majority of the school's individual and team offensive records have been set during Satterfield's tenure.

A 1962 graduate of the University of South Carolina from which he later earned a master's degree in education, Satterfield began his coaching career at Columbia's Eau Claire High

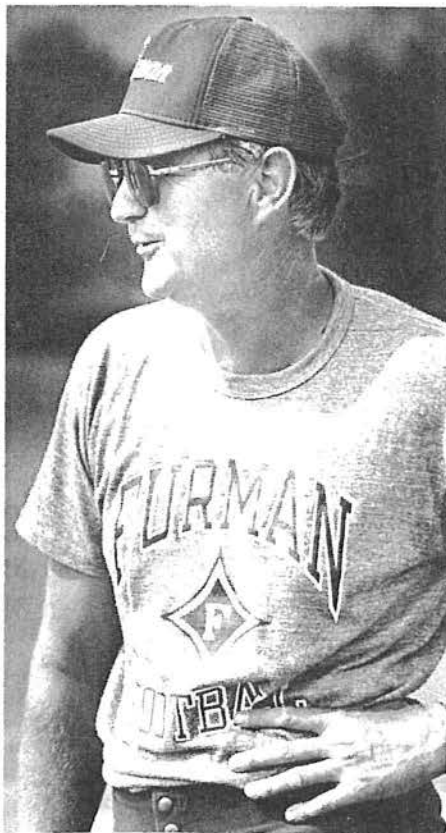

School, serving as an assistant football and basketball coach and head track coach. Named head coach and athletic director in 1968, he posted a 30-5-1 record over the next three seasons, leading Eau Claire to three conference championships and the 1970 Upper State crown. He was tabbed South Carolina Coach-of-the-Year in 1970 and also coached the South Carolina Shrine Bowl team that year.

Moving to Irmo High School in 1971, he helped mold the Yellow Jackets into one of the state's premier football powers by going 19-4 in two seasons and capturing two conference championships. Counting his stints at both Irmo and Eau Claire, Satterfield posted a remarkable record of 49-9-1.

In the summer Satterfield directs highly acclaimed camps for quarterbacks and receivers, offensive linemen, and kickers and punters, annually attracting some of the area's top young talent.

A native of Lancaster, South Carolina, he is married to the former Ann Funderburk, also of Lancaster. They have three children: Shaun, Lee, and Sydney Satterfield-Garrett.

Tommy Marshall is now in his third season as coach of the team's tight ends and special teams at Furman University. In addition, this year he takes over as coach of the squad's punters and kickers, replacing Whitey Kendall, who retired at the end of the 1987 season.

Marshall, a 1976 Furman graduate, joined the Paladin staff in 1986 after serving one year as assistant head coach and defensive backfield coach at Mars Hill (NC) College. The Lions of

the NAIA's South Atlantic Conference were nationally-ranked for most of the 1985 season and posted an 8-3 mark, winning the league title.

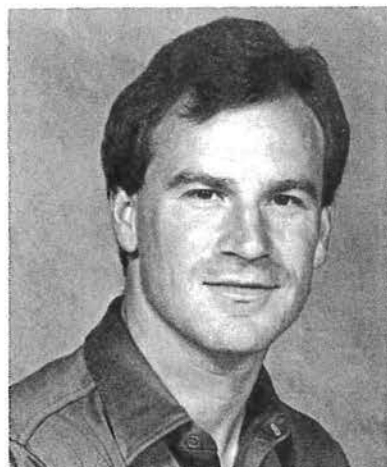
Before entering the collegiate coaching ranks, Marshall was involved with a couple of outstanding high school programs in Georgia. He began his coaching career at Redan High School, serving as the Raiders' defensive coordinator from 1977 to 1980. During his three seasons there, Redan posted marks of 7-2, 7-3, and then went 14-1 and won the state AAA championship in 1979.

Marshall then took over as head coach at Walton High School in Marietta, where the Raiders there had never experienced a winning year. Walton went 2-8 in 1980 but then turned things around to make four straight trips to the state playoffs following regular season marks of 9-1, 9-1, and 7-3, and 7-3. During that span, Marshall was named region Coach-of-the-Year three

times.

As a player, he was a three-year starter at Furman, playing both defensive end and strong safety during his Paladin career. He earned honorable mention All-Southern Conference honors twice; was Furman's Most Valuable Defensive Lineman in 1974; and was awarded the Art Baker Christian Award that season. He was captain of the '76 Furman team and was named to the 1976 Churchmen's All-America team. Marshall was tabbed to Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities and was also president of Furman's chapter of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes Chapter (FCA), an organization he continues to serve today.

The assistant coach, who holds a master's degree from Georgia State University, married his Peachtree High School sweetheart, Dana Webb, also of Atlanta. The Marshalls have two children: Stacy, 8, and Danny, 6.

The young coach led Furman in interceptions in 1979, when the Paladins won five out of their last six games after a slow start. He graduated in 1981 with Bachelor of Science degree in physical education.

Fowler's tenure at Furman is not restricted to his days as a player. In 1984 he accepted a graduate assistant position on the Furman staff, working

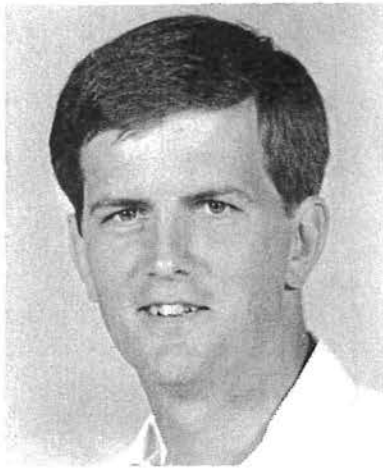
directly with the Paladin receiving corps.

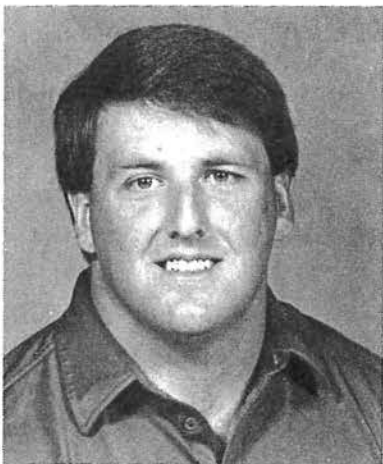

He remained at Furman as a graduate assistant coach, helping the Paladins claim the 1982 Southern Conference Championship while working on his master's degree in physical education, which he re-

From the ranks of college graduate assistant coach, Sorrells took his first full-time coaching job at the high school level as an assistant at Rhea County (TN) High School. 1985 saw Rhea County finish as a Class AAA state runnerup.

Named to the Furman staff in 1986, Sorrells, along with receivers coach Bruce Fowler, coordinates the Furman passing game.

Married to the former Tracy Ballew of Spartanburg, the Sorrells' have two sons, Caleb, age 3, and Jordan, age 2.



Highly respected as a player and now as a coach, former Paladin standout Clay Hendrix is in his first year as coach of Furman's offensive line.

A 1986 graduate of Furman with a degree in health and physical education, Hendrix was a three-year starter at offensive guard under former head coach Dick Sheridan and key reason behind Furman's success from 1982-85, when the Paladins rolled up

line coach, Hendrix also serves as assistant strength coach and helps coordinate all on-campus visits made by Furman recruits.

A former standout at Commerce (GA) High School, Hendrix, 24, is a bachelor.

Neal played linebacker and lettered all four years under former Paladin mentor Art Baker from 1974-77. He served as captain of the 1977 Paladin squad and graduated in 1978 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in political science.

Following graduation he received an MAT degree in physical education from the University of South Carolina in 1980 while serving as a part-time football coach at Newberry College.

From there, Neal moved back to the Greenville area to assume assistant coaching duties at Wade Hampton High School for two years (1980-81). After serving as an assistant at Camden High School in 1981 under Billy Ammons, Neal joined former Furman assistant Buddy Jennings' staff at Laurens High School, and while ser-

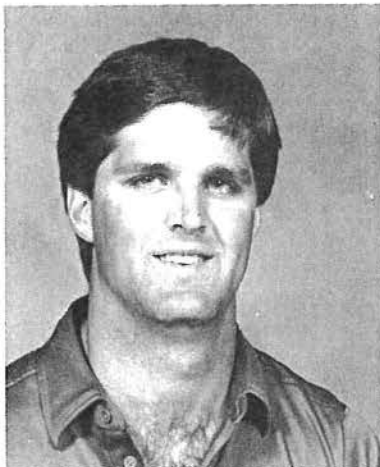
ving as ends and linebackers coach, helped the Raiders capture two Class AAAA Division II state championships in 1983-84.

one year after graduating from Furman in 1986 with a degree in physical education. Last season he coached the team's quarterbacks.

A native of Commerce, Georgia, Lamb came to Furman in the fall of 1982 after fashioning a brilliant high school career at Commerce High School playing for his father, Ray Lamb. As a prep, he was named by the **Atlanta Journal-Constitution** as its AA Back-of-the-Year after leading Commerce to a 1981 AA state championship and 13-1-1 record.

At Furman the brilliance continued as Lamb helped lead Furman to two Southern Conference Championships, including a school-best, 12-2 national

runnerup finish in 1985. That season saw the dynamic quarterback lead the entire nation in passing efficiency with a 171.20 rating and earn Southern Conference Player-of-the-Year honors as well as South Carolina Amateur Athlete-of-the-Year and Carolinas Athlete-of-the-Year recognition. In all he holds 14 school records, including most yards passing in a season (2,264), and career (4,594), and most touchdowns passing in a season (24) and career (47).

Lamb, 24, is a bachelor.

Last year he directed one of the league's best linebacking duos in Darryl Gardner, a two-time all-conference pick, and Jeff Blankenship, another all-league choice who is expected to be one of the most dominant players in the conference this season.

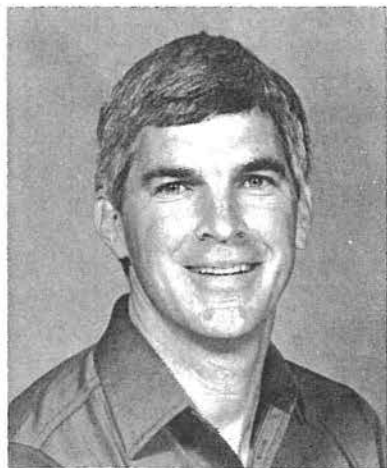
A Gainesville, Georgia, product, Wilson starred for three years in football while playing both guard and tight

In 1980, he assumed an assistant coaching position at Buford (GA) High School following a two-year stint in private business.

Wilson also heads up the Furman strength program in addition to his primary coaching responsibilities.

He and his wife, Angie, formerly of Gainesville, Georgia, have a son, Daniel, who was born in January.



Apart from head coach Jimmy Satterfield's 15 years of service to Paladin football, no other coach on the Paladin staff can match Bobby Johnson's tenure at Furman, which now covers 12 seasons.

A former Atlantic Coast Conference all-academic performer at Clemson University, Johnson begins his sixth year as Furman's defensive coordinator, a position he has held since 1982. And while much of Furman's

success over the last few years can be easily traced to powerful offensive attacks, much of the credit must go to Paladin defensive units, which Johnson has directed.

Last year Furman ranked high in the Southern Conference in rushing defense and scoring defense, thus continuing a trend of strong defensive performances turned in by Johnson-coached units. In 1985 Johnson's troops picked off a Southern Conference record 29 passes, a mark that was equaled in 1986 when Furman led the league in three important defensive categories: rushing defense, passing defense, and scoring defense.

Johnson came to Furman in 1976 as an assistant under Art Baker and remained for four years before going to Clemson for one year. He returned to Furman in 1981 under Dick Sheridan.

In addition to his on-the-field duties, Johnson also coordinates player ad-

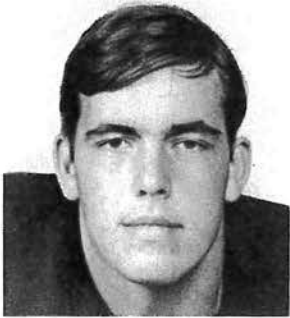
missions, financial aid, housing, and academics.

A native of Columbia, he holds the distinction of having played under present head coach Jimmy Satterfield, former head coach Dick Sheridan, and assistant Steve Robertson at one time or another during his prep career. He was named South Carolina Class AAAA Lineman-of-the-Year at Eau Claire High School and played in the 1968 Shrine Bowl game. Besides starring in football, he also was a standout basketball and baseball player in high school.

Johnson enrolled at Clemson in 1969 and was a four-year starter at wide receiver and cornerback for the Tigers before graduating in 1973.

He earned his master's degree at Furman and is married to the former Catherine Bonner of Charleston, South Carolina.

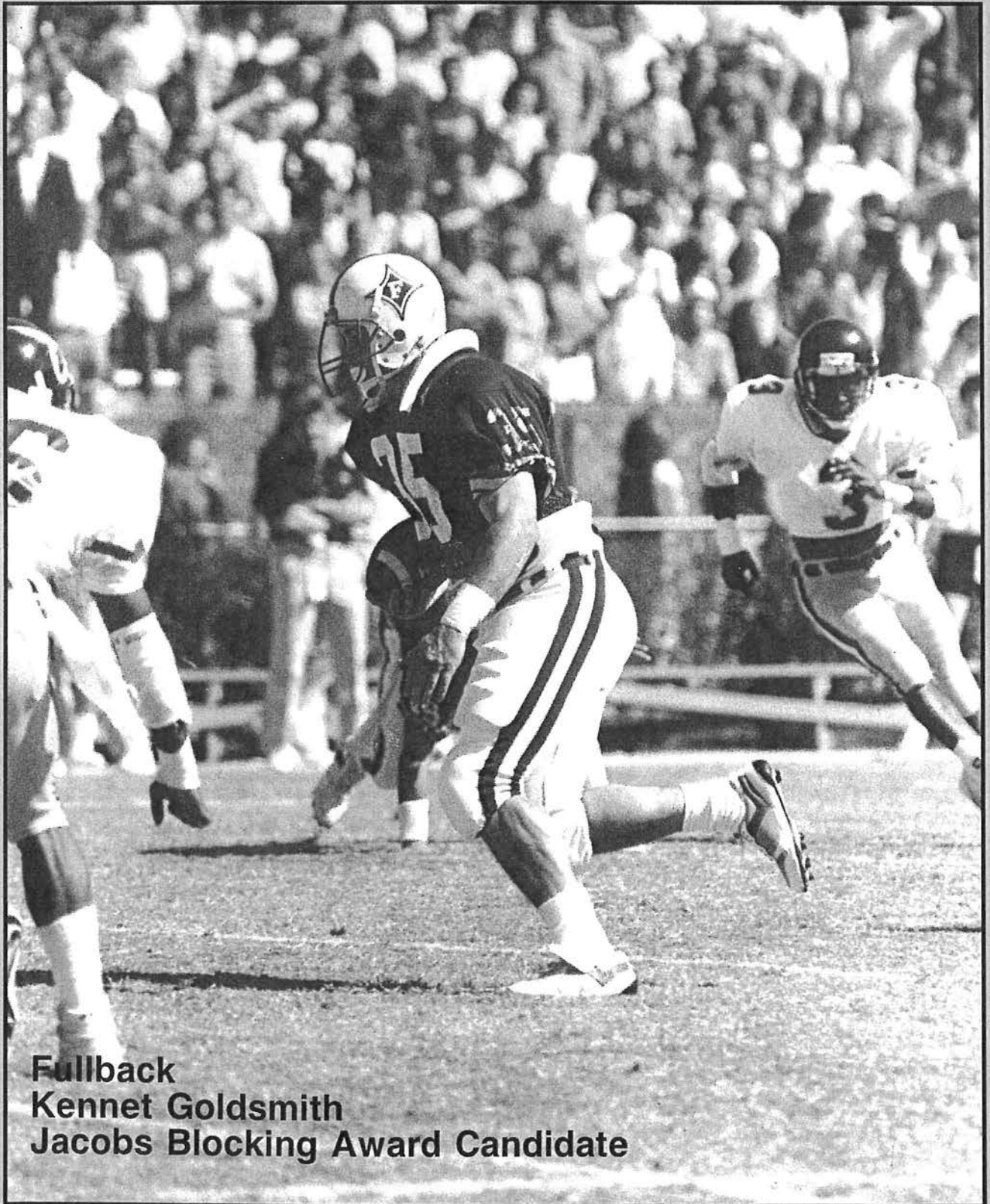

THE OUTLOOK

As the 1988 football season approaches, Furman University head coach Jimmy Satterfield's assessment of his squad's prospects reflects both a spirit of realism and a touch of optimism.

For a coach who has been in the profession 26 years, 16 of which have been at the Greenville school, a conservative approach is only fitting.

"We lost 31 seniors and 16 starters off a team that finished 7-4 and was playing really good ball at the end of the year. It will be tough to bounce back given that fact, but we are very excited about this year's team and our backfield, which probably sports more talent and speed than we've had here

in quite some time."

In addressing his team's anticipated weaknesses and strengths, the Paladin coach knows that graduation took a heavy toll along the Paladin defensive front, in the receiving corps, and at quarterback. But to buoy any sinking feelings, Satterfield points out that the secondary looks strong and that both starters, plus two key reserves, return in the Paladin backfield.

All told, it should be an interesting year for Paladin fans, who have witnessed the purple and white win five Southern Conference championships and run up a 70-21-4 record since 1980.

A big reason for Furman's success under former head coach Dick Sheridan (1978-85) and current head mentor Jimmy Satterfield, who served as offensive coordinator under Sheridan, has been the team's ability to move the football and put points on the scoreboard. Having averaged just over 263.0 yards per game rushing and 408.0 yards per game in total offense over the last eight seasons, Furman has established a reputation as one of the nation's premier offensive teams. Throw in the fact that the Paladins have scored an average of 29.7 points per game during that span and it's easy to see why Furman has been one of the top teams in NCAA I-AA over the last several years.

Whether or not the Paladins can match those offensive numbers this fall remains to be seen. With only four starters back off last year's squad and a new quarterback on order, that could be a difficult assignment, but it appears enough experience returns in the offensive line and in the backfield to at least guarantee the Paladins will again field another potent rushing attack.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Often admired for its mastery of fundamentals; strength, and ability to power Furman's explosive rushing attack despite a general lack of outstanding size and quickness, the Paladin offensive front is again shaping up

like past units, which have given the school six 1,000-yard rushers since 1981.

This year first-year offensive line coach Clay Hendrix, himself a recent standout offensive guard at Furman, heads up a Paladin offensive line that is expected to be a source of strength with two starters and six lettermen returning from last year.

Topping the list is right tackle **Fe Cowan (6-0, 245, Sr.)**, an All-Southern Conference first-team pick in 1987 and perhaps the team's most consistent blocker. Injured in Furman's last game of the year against The Citadel, he was not 100% in the spring but should be ready to go this fall. Backing him up and expected to see plenty of action will be **David Cobb (6-5, 245, Jr.)**.

Elton Bailey (5-11, 220, Sr.) will again get the nod at right guard after a very impressive junior season. Expected to contend for all-conference honors this year, he ranks as the quickest lineman on the offensive front. Together with Cowan the two veterans give the right side of Furman's offensive line plenty of experience, an asset that has not been overlooked by head coach Jimmy Satterfield.

"Elton and Fe are solid performers and good leaders. They're both very strong physically and fundamentally very sound. We'll need steady play from them this fall because of the new players we'll have there this year."

about are not altogether inexperienced, and several played key roles last year as part-time starters for veterans who were limited because of injuries.

At center, a battle is being waged between **Bill Foster (6-1, 230, Jr.)** and **Steve Duggan (6-2, 241, So.)**. Physically very strong, Foster lettered a year ago as a reserve for the graduated Bobby Kelly. Perhaps the team's most versatile lineman, Duggan, who was Furman's Freshman-of-the-Year in 1987, can play center, guard, or tackle, a position he saw duty at a year ago. His size and athletic ability are factors that impress Hendrix and Satterfield.

David Adams (5-11, 232, Jr.) saw some action a year ago and is the leading candidate to take over at left guard for departed third-team Associated Press All-American Alex

Albert. Adams personifies the typical Furman offensive lineman, making up for lack of overall size with smarts and strength. Backing him up will be **Eric Walter (6-0, 223, So.)**, who was impressive after moving over from defensive end midway through spring practice.

The left tackle slot will be manned by either **Ed Patterson (6-2, 245, Sr.)**, who started in several games a year ago after a knee injury cut short veteran Mark Brown's season, or the team's biggest player, **Ken Berry (6-4, 258, Jr.)**, who has shown a lot of promise since moving from center to tackle last year.

RECEIVERS

When a coach counts only two lettermen and five career receptions among his entire returning receiving

corps, most fans would conclude that a rebuilding job is in order.

That's the case this year with coach Bruce Fowler, whose receiving corps was hit hard by graduation. To be more specific, Fowler lost his top four receivers and a total of 12 years of varsity experience. In addition, besides having to operate with a new quarterback, the probable replacements at split end and flanker have a combined total of two varsity letters. Nevertheless, Fowler and head coach Jimmy Satterfield believe that the talent is there for the Paladins to be very good.

Of the "veterans" split end **George Quarles (6-1, 190, Sr.)** has the most experience. The native of Jefferson

City, TN, caught three passes a year ago and is a fine athlete and blocker. He will be pushed for playing time by speedster **Don Clardy (5-10, 163, So.)**, a former high school teammate of quarterback candidate Frankie DeBusk, and the improving **Curtis Barrineau (5-8, 150, Jr.)**.

One of only three freshman to make Furman's travel squad a year ago, **Brad Stephens (5-9, 160, So.)** is locked in a battle with **Venton Bell (6-3, 193, Fr.)** for the starting role at flanker. Stephens caught two passes last year, including one for a touchdown against Davidson. Bell, who redshirted last year after sustaining a knee injury in the early going, also missed all of spring practice with a fractured thumb. His size, speed, and overall lack of experience of the other Paladin receivers make him a candidate for the starting job despite his lack of action and practice time.

A host of others will vie for backup duty at both split end and flanker, and also expected to get a good look are outstanding newcomers **Donald Lipscomb (5-10, 170, Fr.)** from Gaffney and Sumter product **Freddie Burns (5-11, 170, Fr.)**.

The important tight end position was also affected by graduation, and for coach Tommy Marshall, finding quality replacements for two-year starter Bill Duncan, one of the best blocking tight ends to ever play at Furman, and Tim Fox could be difficult.

In line to start is **Keith Swilling (6-0, 219, Sr.)**, a player Marshall rates as having superb hands. **Greg Key (6-3, 220, Jr.)** has moved into the backup position after a good spring.

QUARTERBACKS

Unlike last year when Furman entered the fall with its quarterback situation firmly decided, head coach Jimmy Satterfield rates the duel between **Patrick Baynes (6-0, 190, Jr.)** and **Frankie DeBusk (6-0, 189, So.)** a tossup.

From an experience standpoint neither Baynes nor DeBusk has seen a lot of action, but that doesn't seem to bother Satterfield, who over the years has played a key role in the development of such former standouts

as David Whitehurst, David Henderson, Tim Sorrells, David Charpia, and Bobby Lamb.

"Patrick and Frankie both had good spring practices, and we're confident that either one of them can get the job done," Satterfield says. "We won't make a decision on who will start until the fall."

Baynes, who has thrown only three passes in his Paladin career, redshirted last year after sustaining a shoulder injury in junior varsity action.

DeBusk, the victim of a freak accident that resulted in a broken ankle the day after he completed 9 of 12 passes for 138 yards and three touchdowns against Davidson, is considered a top-notch prospect by Furman's coaching staff. His quickness as a runner is an asset that Satterfield rates as a big plus in Furman's option-style offense, and his strong arm is an added bonus that could help Furman overcome its lack of experience in the receiving corps.

RUNNINGBACKS

Talk about the Paladin backfield and Jimmy Satterfield's face brightens considerably. That's because Furman, which depends heavily on its ability to rush the football, probably sports more overall talent and depth at the fullback and tailback slots than has ever before been seen at the Greenville school.

Starting at fullback, Furman will field the Southern Conference's premier blocker in **Kennet Goldsmith (6-1, 225, Sr.)**, a three-year starter and leading candidate to win the league's Jacobs Blocking Trophy. A punishing front man for Furman's option attack, Goldsmith, who now has rushed for 1,127 yards in his career after adding 505 yards and five touchdowns last year, is considered one of the team's most dominant players. That's because last season he graded out over a 2.00 - an "exceptional" grade -

on seven occasions and recorded the highest grade ever by a Furman runningback when he garnered a 2.30 in a 38-0 win over VMI. In that game, Goldsmith broke eight tackles and was credited with six knockdowns and two rhino blocks, which is considered the ultimate block.

Head coach Jimmy Satterfield doesn't hide his feelings about his star fullback when he says: "Our offense is centered around Kennet Goldsmith, who we consider the best fullback to ever play at Furman University."

Backing up Goldsmith will be **Billy Stockdale (5-9, 215, So.)** and **Tim Stancil (6-0, 225, So.)**, both of whom saw some action a year ago.

In **Dwight Sterling (6-1, 210, Jr.)**, **Bobby Daugherty (5-8, 180, So.)**, and **John Bagwell (5-10, 210, Sr.)**, Furman has three quality tailbacks with proven ability, an asset that gives the Paladins probably the deepest and most talented backfield in the Southern Conference.

One of the team's most versatile players, Dwight Sterling made the most of an opportunity at the end of the 1987 season by rushing for 126 yards against nationally second-ranked Florida State and 135 yards in a season-ending 58-13 win over The Citadel. In addition to sporting good speed, Sterling has the ability to shed tacklers as witnessed by his 18 broken tackles against Florida State, eight of which came on one play. A tremendous athlete, Sterling played nose guard as a freshman and recorded 30 tackles.

Bobby Daugherty returns to the Paladin fold after missing all of last season with a knee injury sustained five games into the 1986 season.



Tailback John Bagwell, a 1987 All-Southern Conference pick, led Furman in rushing last year with 844 yards and was also the team's leading receiver with 29 receptions.

Before the injury Daugherty had proven to be a lethal weapon in the Furman offense, rushing for 257 yards as a backup to former all-conference tailback Robbie Gardner. A strong spring practice was a good sign for the Swannanoa, NC, native, who has the squad's best running instincts.

John Bagwell, an all-conference performer in 1987 after rushing for 844 yards and eight touchdowns, is also back to add muscle to the Paladin backfield. Against Marshall, he rushed for a career-high 213 yards, scored four touchdowns, and threw for another score in a 42-36 win over the eventual NCAA I-AA national runnerup Herd. He's also a fine receiver out of the backfield as his team-leading 29 receptions last year indicates.

Richie Harris (5-11, 185, Jr.) could also be a factor at tailback as could **Angelo Richardson (5-7, 178, Sr.)**.

Over the past couple of seasons, defensive coordinator Bobby Johnson has presided over two of the strongest defensive units to ever play at Furman

University. In three key categories - rushing defense, passing defense, and scoring defense - Furman has put up some impressive figures, and that, in large measure, has been due to the presence of players such as linebacker Darryl Gardner, nose guard Phillip Ferguson, tackles Brian Allison and Al Peterson, ends Tim Stepp and Kelly Smith, and strong safety Russell Rush.

All of those players have now graduated, and with only three starters returning off last year's squad, Furman may find it tough to maintain its reputation as a defensive power in 1988.

DEFENSIVE LINE

Next to the Paladin receiving corps, no other area on Furman's squad lost more talent to graduation than the defensive front. All five starters, including two-time all-conference nose guard Phillip Ferguson and key defensive ends Tim Stepp and Kelly Smith, have graduated, and that has raised some serious questions as to how good the Paladins will be this fall.

As first-year defensive line coach Jimmy Neal surveys his personnel, he finds several players with experience and promise but no one dominant lineman among the bunch. Also, the Paladin defensive interior line is generally smaller than in years past, and that is a concern, especially given the fact that even within the Southern Conference size is becoming more of a factor.

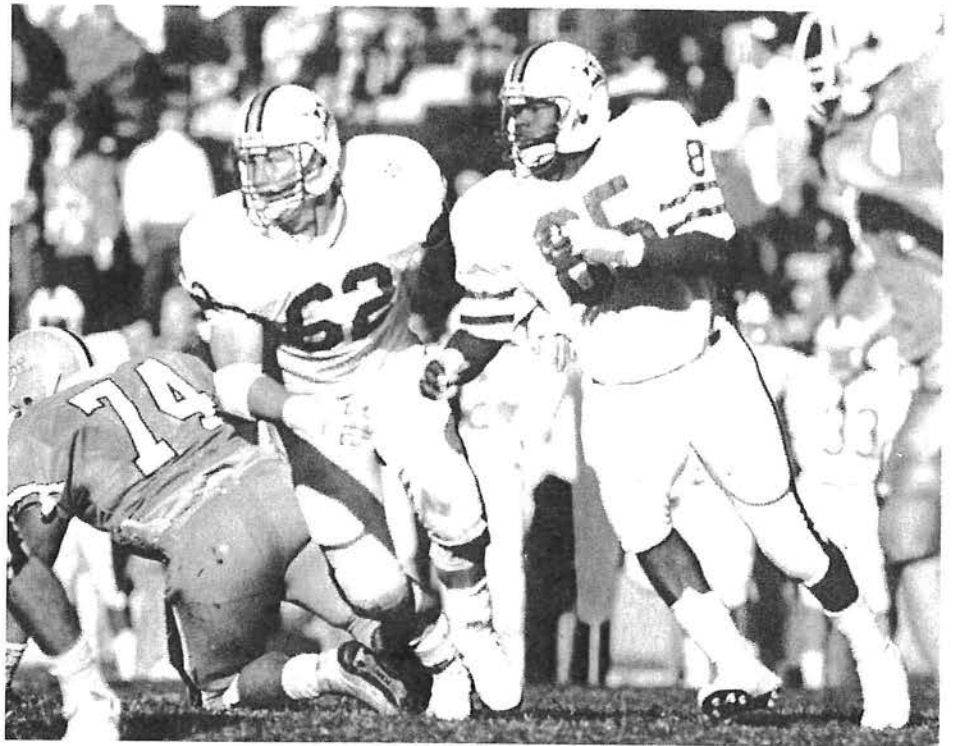

stops and two sacks. He will be spelled by **Sammy Walker (6-2, 246, So.)**, a player with a lot of promise who played very little in 1987 after sustaining an injury in the early going.

Finding someone to fill the void created by the loss of nose guard Phillip Ferguson is a tall order, but the leading candidate to take over is **Wayne Burr (6-1, 233, Sr.)**, a two-year letterman who recorded 21 stops a year ago. A reserve at nose guard could likely come from the freshman class says Neal, although **Dean Williams (6-2, 235, So.)**, a late convert from center in spring practice, or **Russell Patterson (5-10, 235, So.)** could be heard from.

At right defensive tackle, a duel is brewing between **Jeff Sanders (6-2, 220, So.)**, Furman's Junior Varsity Defensive Player-of-the-Year in 1987, and **Paul Craven (6-3, 230, Sr.)**. Sanders joined the battle for the starting job with a very impressive spring and because of an injury to Craven, which severely limited his participation in spring drills.

DEFENSIVE ENDS

Like Neal's interior line, linebacker coach Steve Wilson will field an entirely new cast this fall following the graduation of his top four

performers.

Chris Roper (6-1, 202, Jr.) is the leading candidate to assume the duties at drop end. Called "a clone of Tim Stepp and Kelly Smith" by head coach Jimmy Satterfield, Roper relies on smarts, heart, and hardnosed play to get the job done. One of the team's top students (3.46 GPA), he totaled 29 tackles a year ago. Backing him up will be **Craig McLaughlin (6-0, 195, Jr.)**, another fine student but one who has little experience.

The rush end post, in the capable hands of Adrian Despres last year, will probably be manned by **Kelly Fletcher (6-3, 212, Jr.)** this fall. Although he lettered in 1987, Fletcher was credited with only six tackles on the season. He will be backed up by **Corey Holden (6-0, 212, So.)** and **Joey Biddy (6-0, 217, Jr.)**, both of whom have little experience.

LINEBACKERS

Having fielded five first-team All-Southern Conference linebackers since 1982, Furman's tradition of producing top-notch defenders is well documented. This year the trend should continue with the return of three-year starter **Jeff Blankenship (6-1, 227, Sr.)** at the strong side post.

Ranked alongside senior fullback Kennet Goldsmith as one of the team's top players, Blankenship earned second-team all-conference honors last year after recording 144 tackles and six hits for losses. An extremely tough player, he possesses all the qualities a coach looks for in a linebacker: he plays smart; he's a strong leader; he's dependable; and he's always around the football. A former team Freshman-of-the-Year choice, Blankenship now has 345 career tackles and is amazingly only 44 stops short of becoming the school's all-time leading tackler.

Expected to join the starting ranks alongside Blankenship at the weak

side post will be **Kevin Kendrick (6-0, 209, So.)**, a solid player who fashioned a good spring after collecting 34 tackles in 1987. His backup will be either **Bill Ballard (6-0, 214, So.)** or **Andy Shattuck (5-11, 192, Jr.)**.

SECONDARY

Secondary coach Bobby Johnson likes the way his air defense is taking shape, and that's understandable when considering he has two established starters and seven lettermen returning off a unit that showed consistent improvement throughout the 1987 campaign.

Heading the Paladin secondary is left cornerback **Julius Dixon (5-10, 170, Sr.)**, a second-team all-conference choice a year ago. Very athletic and a track star at Furman, Dixon totaled 29 tackles and a team-leading three interceptions last year. He will be backed up by **Jerry Booker (5-10, 180, Jr.)**, another strong performer Johnson will not hesitate to use.

At right cornerback **Pat Turner (5-9, 171, Jr.)**, who missed several games last year after suffering a lacerated kidney at midseason, appears to be the leading candidate to take over the starting job created by the switching of veteran **Cherod Webber (6-0, 200, Sr.)** to strong safety. Receiving Turner's relief work at right corner will

be **Mike Jones (6-0, 190, So.)**.

William Hall (6-2, 185, Jr.), a late-season bloomer following an injury to Mike Wilson in 1987, should get the nod at free safety. In three starts a year ago, Hall collected 12 tackles and had one interception, which he returned 31 yards for a touchdown in a 38-0 win over VMI. 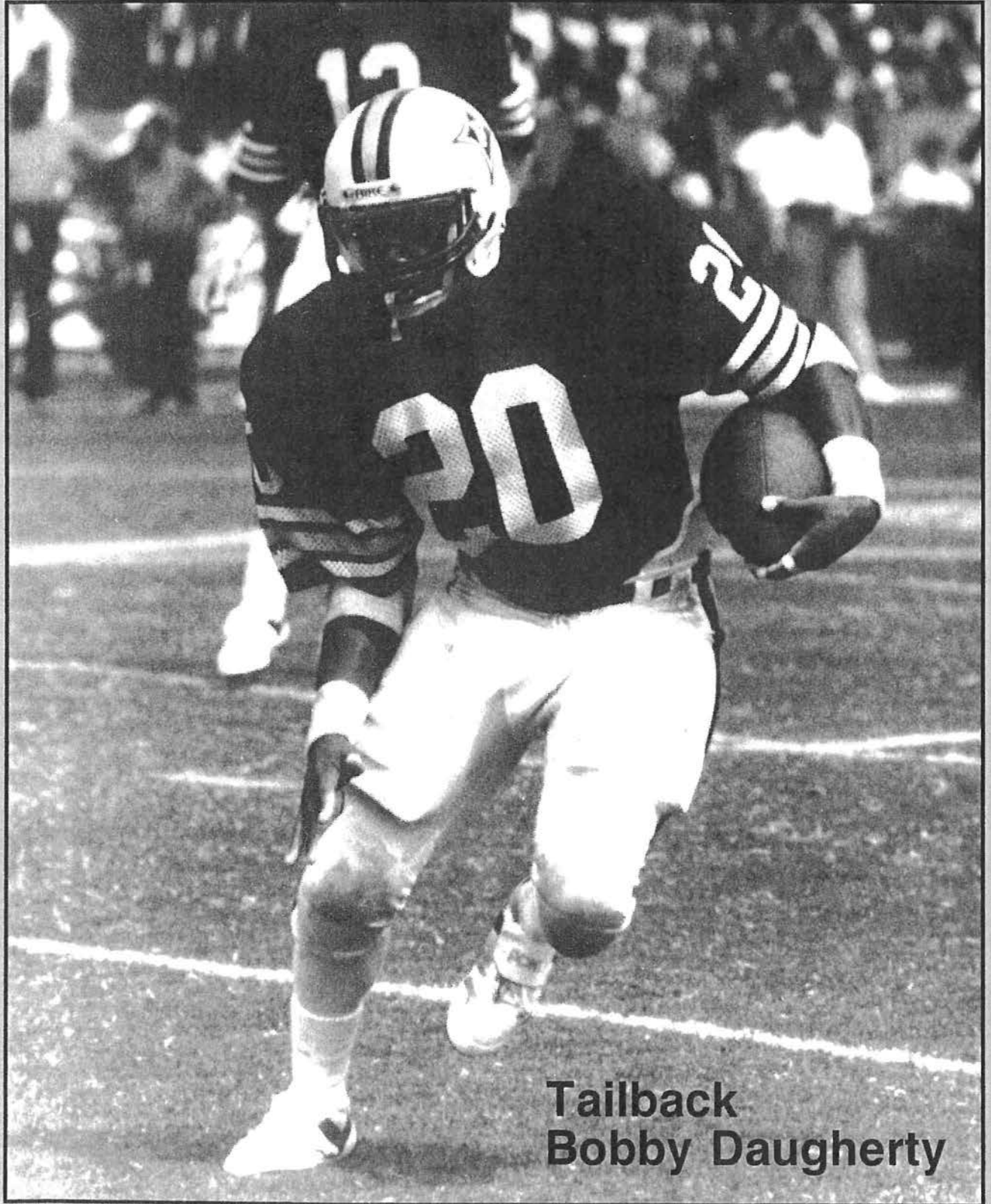
