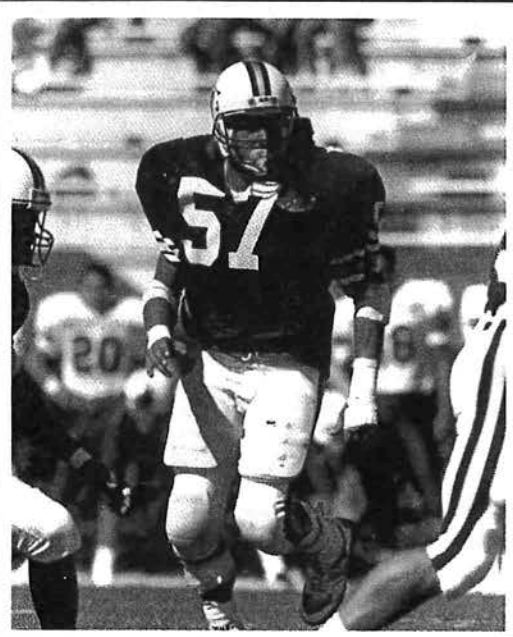


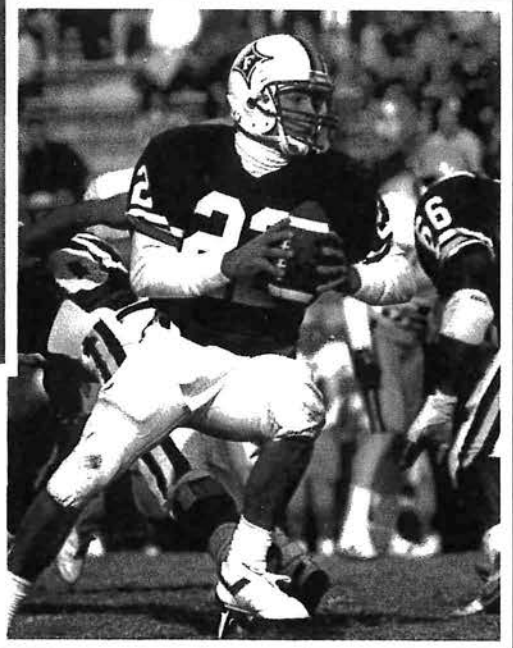

IN MEMORY

On March 16, 1990, Furman University lost one of its true athletic greats in Lyles Alley. A native of Spartanburg and 1933 graduate of Furman, where he played all sports with equal brilliance, Alley devoted much of his life to the university, serving as head basketball coach from 1946-49; 1951-66 and as director of athletics from 1956-75. Furman's all-time winningest basketball coach, Alley was inducted into South Carolina's Athletic Hall-of-Fame in 1967 and was a charter inductee into the Furman Athletic Hall-of-Fame in 1981.

"As a coach, administrator, and person, coach Alley was greatly admired and respected by everyone he worked with," said athletic director Ray Parlier. "He was like a father to the many players, coaches, and staff who knew him, and a true gentleman in every sense. Coach Alley was what I would call the ideal ambassador for Furman University."

In honor of Alley, Furman University has established a scholarship in his name, and the athletic department has instituted The Lyles Alley Coach-of-the-Year Award, to be given annually to a coach on the Furman staff who best exhibits the character and sense of fair play that Alley himself demonstrated.

THE 1980s — A DECADE OF DOMINANCE



**Aside from the 1920s, when W.L. Laval and T.B. Amis' Purple Hurricane posted a 73-26-3 record and won six state championships, no decade has yielded more success or acclaim in Furman football history than the 1980s, when the Paladins posted a 95-25-4 record and won seven of the school's eight Southern Conference championships.

**In winning seven Southern Conference titles (1980-81-82-83-85-88-89) in the 1980s, Furman fashioned the most successful decade of any football program in the Southern Conference's 69-year history. Duke's five championships in the 1930s (1933-35-36-38-39) and West Virginia's five crowns in the 1950s (1953-54-55-56-58) marked the best decade performances of any conference school prior to Furman's run of success in the 1980s.

**Nationally Furman ranked second in winning percentage and victories during the 1980s. Georgia Southern, a member of NCAA I-AA since 1984 and holder of an 83-22-1 record over the past eight seasons, is the only school to have registered a higher winning percentage (.788) than Furman (.782); and Eastern Kentucky, with a 97-27-2 record, is the lone member of NCAA I-AA to have won more games.

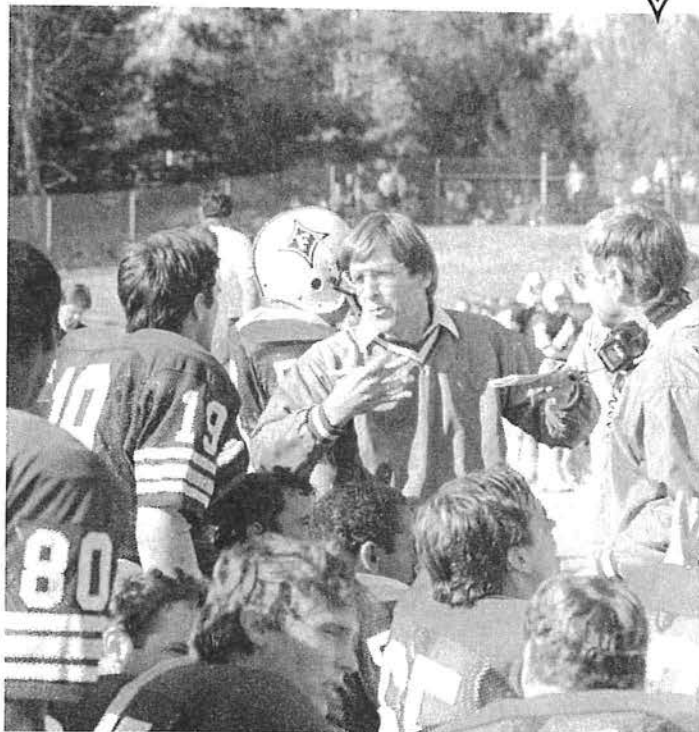
**Against the Southern Conference in the 1980s Furman posted a 54-12-2 record and .808 winning percentage, the best marks among league schools. Appalachian State (42-25-3, .621) ranked second to Furman in terms of wins and winning percentage followed by Tennessee-Chattanooga (39-24-2, .615), Western Carolina (30-32-4, .484), Marshall (29-36-2, .447), The Citadel (23-37-3, .388), East Tennessee State (20-46, .303), and Virginia Military (14-39-4, .280).

**In the 1980s Furman ran up a 23-6-1 record against South Carolina opposition and 95-25-4 overall mark, the best among all South Carolina schools.

**The 1980s saw Furman produce a league leading 65 first team All-Southern Conference players. Western Carolina with 41 rank-

ed second followed by Tennessee-Chattanooga (40), Appalachian State (33), The Citadel (22), Marshall (21), Virginia Military (14), and East Tennessee State (10).

**Of the 90 Southern Conference individual and team statistical championships claimed by Furman since 1954, 55 came during the 1980s.

**In the 1980s Furman tied or established new records in 88 of 132 individual single game, season, and career statistical categories.

**The longest winning streak (12 games) and longest home winning streak (18 games) in Furman football history were set in the 1980s. Furman's 12 game winning streak came exclusively during the 1989 season, and the 18-game home success run covered three seasons (1987-89).

**Furman led all of NCAA I-AA in rushing offense in the 1980s, averaging over 269.32 yards per game. The Paladins also ranked in the top ten nationally in scoring offense (29.34), total offense (409.96), scoring defense (14.17), rushing defense (123.39), and total defense (284.72).

**Against NCAA I-A opposition in the 1980s, among which were four nationally-ranked teams, Furman posted a 4-6-1 record. The wins came over South Carolina (28-23) in 1982, Georgia Tech (17-14) in 1983, and North Carolina State in both 1984 (34-30) and 1985 (42-20). The Paladins' tie came in 1986 against Georgia Tech (17-17). The four losses to NCAA I-A ranked teams came to North Carolina (18th, 35-13) in 1980, Florida State (4th, 41-10) in 1987, and Clemson in 1988 (3rd, 23-3) and 1989 (12th, 30-0).

**Beginning with Tim Sorrells in 1980 and ending with Frankie DeBusk in 1989, Furman produced seven All-Southern Conference quarterbacks in the 1980s, including four first team selections in Sorrells (1981), David Charpia (1983), Bobby Lamb (1985), and DeBusk (1989).

**Beginning with Bruce Gheesling in 1980 and ending with Chris Roper and Kevin Kendrick in 1989, Furman produced at least one first team All-Southern Conference linebacker every year, except 1985, and 10 first team selections during the 1980s. They include: Gheesling (1980 & '81), Billy Hall (1982), Buck Coatney (1983), Rock Hurst (1984), Darryl Gardner (1986 & '87), Jeff Blankenship (1988), Roper (1989), and Kendrick (1989).

**In the 1980s Furman tailback Stanford Jennings became the only three-time Southern Conference Player-of-the-Year honoree in league history when he captured the award in 1981, '82, and '83. In all, four Furman players captured Southern Conference Player-of-the-Year awards six times during the 1980s, including Jennings (1981, '82, & '83), QB Bobby Lamb (1985), LB Jeff Blankenship (1988), and DE Kelly Fletcher (1989).

**Of the 12 All-Americans Furman has fielded in its 84-year football history, 10 were produced during the 1980s, including LB Bruce Gheesling (1981), CB Ernest Gibson (1982 & '83), OG Dan Sleet (1983), TB Stanford Jennings (1983), LB Rock Hurst (1984), OG Alex Albert (1987), OT Fe Cowan (1988), LB Jeff Blankenship (1988), DE Kelly Fletcher (1989), and DE Chris Roper (1989). Also, the school's only two consensus All-Americans, LB Jeff Blankenship (1988) and DE Kelly Fletcher (1989), were products of the Furman program in the 1980s.

**In the 1980s, Furman players captured the Southern Conference Jacobs Blocking Award six times. They include OT Charlie Anderson (1980 & '81); OG Mike Coleman (1982); FB Dinky Williams (1984); C Gene Reeder (1985); and FB Kennet Goldsmith (1988).

**In the 1980s Furman produced seven of the school's eight GTE-Academic All-Americans, including four first team selections in TB Brian Jager (1985), DE Kelly Fletcher (1988 & '89), and LB Chris Roper (1989). In 1989 Furman and the University of Nebraska were the only two schools nationwide to have two first team GTE Academic All-Americans.

**Of Furman's six NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship recipients, five were recognized during the 1980s. They include: Charlie Anderson (1981 - Medicine); Ernest Gibson (1983 - Law); Brian Jager (1985 - Medicine); Steve Squire (1986 - Medicine); and Chris Roper (1989 - Engineering).



The crowning achievement of the greatest decade in Furman football history came in 1988 when the Paladins went 13-2 and captured the NCAA I-AA national championship.

FURMAN FOOTBALL GRADUATION RATES



(1986-90)

Its success on the football field well documented and underlined with a 95-25-4 record and seven Southern Conference championships in the 1980s, Furman University's outstanding record of athletic achievement takes on greater significance when considering the graduation rates of its student-athletes.

Under head coach Jimmy Satterfield, Furman University's football program from 1986-90 saw 69.3 percent of its recruits (scholarship players and walk-ons) graduate within a five-year period. That's a higher graduation rate than the institution's combined male and female non-athletic body which, during the same period, registered an overall five-year graduation rate of 69.1 percent. The numbers for Furman's scholarship student-athletes are even more impressive as 87 of 112 (77.6 percent) players signed by Furman from 1981-85 graduated within a five-year period. Non-scholarship players during that same period achieved a 56.3 percent graduation rate as 40 of 71 walk-ons earned their degrees within five years. Combined 127 of 183 football recruits from 1981-85 graduated from Furman within five years, and of the 56 who did not, one required six years to graduate, 37 left in good academic standing, and 18 withdrew from school

in poor academic standing as defined by the university's registrar.

"In addition to our athletic success, a big point of pride in our football program are the graduation rates of our student-athletes," notes Director of Athletics Ray Parlier. "We are dedicated to football success at Furman, but at the same time our coaches and staff are deeply committed to the overall objective and mission of the university — that of helping our student-athletes obtain a quality, liberal arts education. I think these figures show the commitment to education of our university, staff, and coaches, while also reinforcing our firm belief that success can be achieved in athletics in the face of a rigorous and demanding academic curriculum."

Furman's 1989 football season was successful in many regards, from its 12-2 record and Southern Conference football championship to the Furman Bookend Club, implemented last year and set to continue this fall in an effort to get area school children from grades kindergarten through 12 interested in reading. MEDIA INFORMATION



PRESS BOX: Furman working press facilities are located atop the home stands at Paladin Stadium. The fourth level is reserved for radio, and the fifth level houses space for sportswriters, home and visiting coaches, public address, home and visiting game film crews, and statistical crews. The top (roof) level is reserved for television. The fourth and fifth levels are serviced by elevator and stairs, while the roof level is accessible by stairs only. Only working press will be admitted to these three levels.

PRESS PASSES: All requests for working press credentials should be directed to the sports information director. Passes will be mailed as soon as possible after a request has been filed. Passes not furnished by return mail must be picked up in person at the 'Press Will-Call' window, located on the ground floor of the press tower.

BROADCAST RIGHTS: Permission to broadcast must be secured at least two weeks in advance from the sports information director. Furman University operates a 'trade-out' voice coupler for Southern Conference teams and is available to non-conference teams for \$50 payable before the broadcast begins. Prior arrangements must be made for the phone. Each station will be allocated a booth and four passes on the fourth level of the press box.

SCOUTING: Passes for scouting purposes should be requested as far in advance as possible. Each organization will be allocated one seat on a space available basis.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers must secure sideline passes from the sports information director and adhere to a working area designated as "any area along the sidelines (except between the 30-yard lines) and beyond the end zones."

PARKING: Requests for parking should be made as early as possible. Media parking is located in Lot E, adjacent to the press tower.

SERVICES: Game programs, complete statistics, pre-game information, running play-by-play, post-game coaches' quotes, and refreshments are provided at every Furman home game. Four telephones and a fax machine will be available throughout the day. Post-game interviews can be conducted both on the field and in the locker rooms at the north end of the stadium. A 10-minute 'cooling-off' period will be observed before the locker rooms of both teams will be opened to the press.

MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE: Coach Jimmy Satterfield hosts an informal weekly press conference each Monday before a Saturday game at the Furman Football Office beginning at 10:45 a.m.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: The best time to interview players in person is before practice, preferably between 2:00 and 3:00 p.m. Phone interviews will be arranged at the player's convenience, but it is asked that all player interviews (in-person or via-phone) be arranged through Hunter Reid in the sports information office at (803) 294-2061.

COACHES' INTERVIEWS: The best time to interview Coach Satterfield and or any member of the football coaching staff is between 11:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon Tuesday - Thursday and between 2:30 p.m. and 3:00 p.m. Monday - Thursday. Please call Hunter Reid (803) 294-2061 to arrange all coaches' interviews.

The Furman Radio Network continues to grow as this fall the university begins a new association with WZLI-FM, a 100,000-watt, Toccoa, Georgia,

based station that will serve as the originating station for all Furman broadcasts.

WZLI's signal will carry the Furman message into portions of four southeastern states, reaching not only upstate South Carolina and North Georgia, but also western North Carolina and southeastern Tennessee. Drivers on interstate 85 will be able to hear Paladin football and basketball from Spartanburg to Atlanta. Complementing WZLI in South Carolina will be a host of stations across the state, making Furman broadcasts available to nearly six million people.

Back for his third season as the play-by-play "Voice of the Paladins" is Doug Holliday, a full-time athletic department employee who serves the university as Director of Broadcasting. A native of Anderson and graduate of the University of South Carolina, Holliday, 30, has worked closely with Furman's football and basketball programs over the past five seasons, serving as both color commentator and play-by-play analyst. Holliday's resume includes a stint at WLBG-AM in Laurens, where he served as play-by-play voice for Laurens High School football, baseball, and basketball. Holliday is married to the former Jane Simpson of Laurens and has one child, Andrew, 2.

Joining Holliday as color analyst on both football and basketball broadcasts will be veteran upstate sportscaster Scott Shannon. Shannon, beginning his second year with

Furman, is a producer at WFBC-AM in Greenville and hosts the popular weekday afternoon sports talk show, "Scott Shannon Sportsline". Shannon previously worked with Clemson radio broadcasts as color analyst from 1972-77 and during the Tigers' national championship season in 1981. He has also served as play-by-play voice of T.L. Hanna and Westside High School football and basketball, and Anderson Junior College basketball.

WZLI will also produce a tailgate show and college football scoreboard this fall to complement the Furman broadcasts.

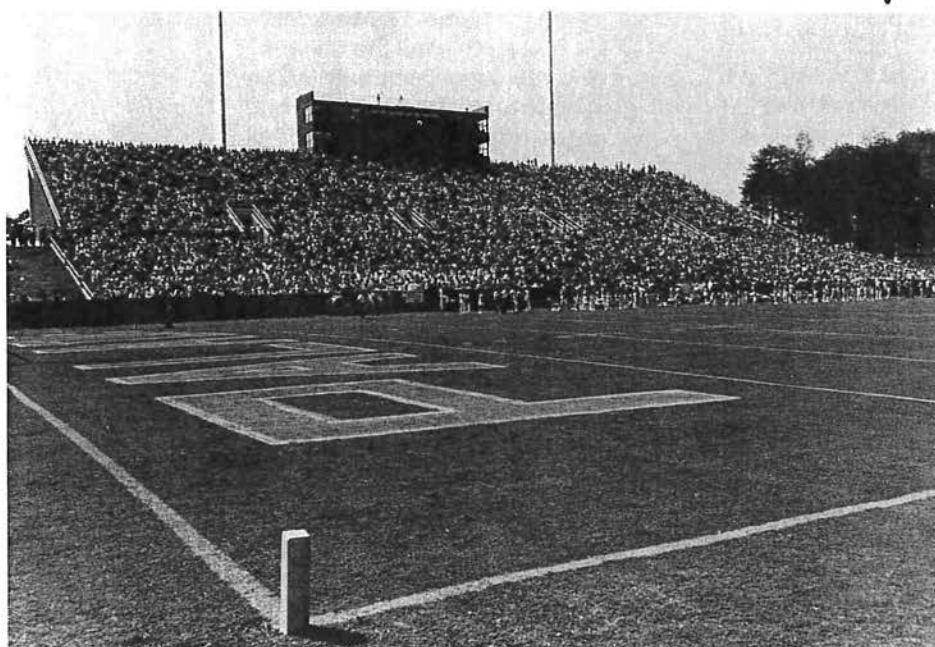
PALADIN STADIUM



Furman's Paladin Stadium, nestled beautifully on campus with a scenic view of Paris Mountain, is the football home of the Paladins, having opened in 1981 to replace Sitrine Stadium, which served as the site of Furman football for 45 years.

The stadium, which now seats 16,000 following an addition of 2,800 seats prior to the 1985 season, is the third such facility for the Paladins since 1919. Manly Field, completed in that year, served as the home of Furman football until 1936 when Furman moved the site of its home football contests to then-newly constructed Sitrine Stadium. The first game played in Sitrine Stadium — a 14-13 Furman win over Davidson — was the sixth game of the year for Furman during the 1936 season. In 1980 Furman closed its association with Sitrine Stadium with a 28-15 victory over arch-rival The Citadel to win its first outright Southern Conference Championship.

Furman opened Paladin Stadium in the same fashion it did Manly and Sitrine, winning the first game played within its confines. The Paladins defeated East Tennessee State 21-0 in the stadium's inaugural contest and have gone on to record a 52-10 home record (.838) since 1981. In six of the nine years since opening, Paladin Stadium has served as the home of



Southern Conference champions.

In 1985 the stadium's field was named Eugene Stone Field, in honor of the support of Furman benefactor Eugene Stone, who was directly responsible for the additional seats added to the stadium prior to the 1985 season.

Fulfilling its primary function as home of Furman football, Paladin Stadium is also used for other activities, including graduation and concerts. In August the stadium will be the site of a concert by the hit group "New

Kids On The Block" with an expected draw of 28,000 fans.

From its initial grading to completion, Paladin Stadium took two years to be realized at a cost of approximately \$2 million. Construction was handled by Farley Construction of Columbia, SC.

The playing field is hybrid Bermuda and landscaping at the stadium is in line with the design and architecture of the entire university.

An Emerging Economic Force In The New South

From the time it was started as a trading post and grist mill late in the 18th century, Greenville has been a center of business and industry.

Today, Greenville County is home to a range of Fortune 500 industries, as well as a growing market for international companies. FluorDaniel, CRS Sirrinc, Dunlop Sports, PYA/Monarch, Phillips Fibers, Metropolitan Life, and others.

What makes Greenville the focal point of a growing regional economy and the business capital of South Carolina is a favorable investment climate built on positive public-private sector relations, a strong work ethic, a skilled and highly trainable workforce, and the excellent quality of life that only the Upstate region can offer.

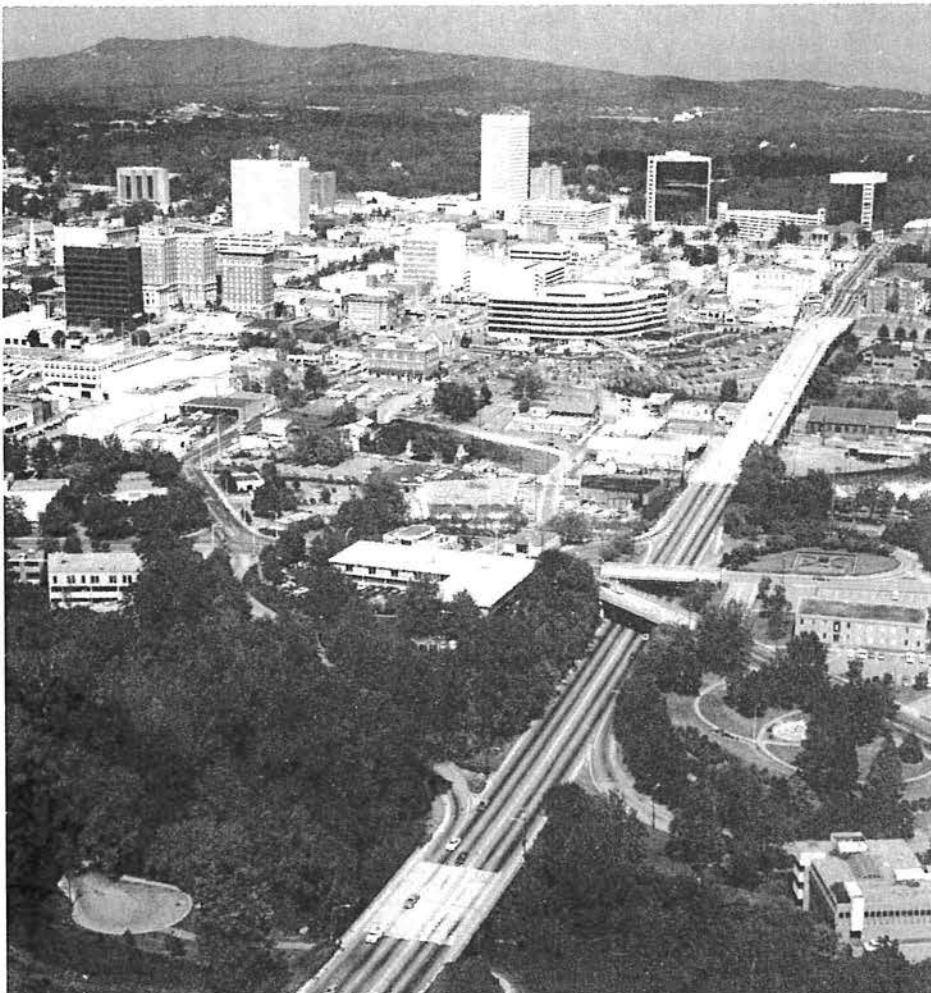
Commitment to the community's development is another key to Greenville's success. Dozens of companies and scores of individuals combined to raise over \$30 million for the Center for

the Performing Arts, now under construction in downtown Greenville. The fact that support for other charities and community organizations also grew at the same time is indicative of the commitment Greenvillians have to both community and economic growth.

Greenville's colorful history had its beginnings with the Cherokee Indians, who occupied most of the beautiful Blue Ridge foothills until 1777, when a treaty was signed giving white men access to it. In 1786 "Greenville" County, probably named for Revolutionary War General Nathaniel Greene, was chartered, and in 1831 the small village of Greenville was officially chartered.

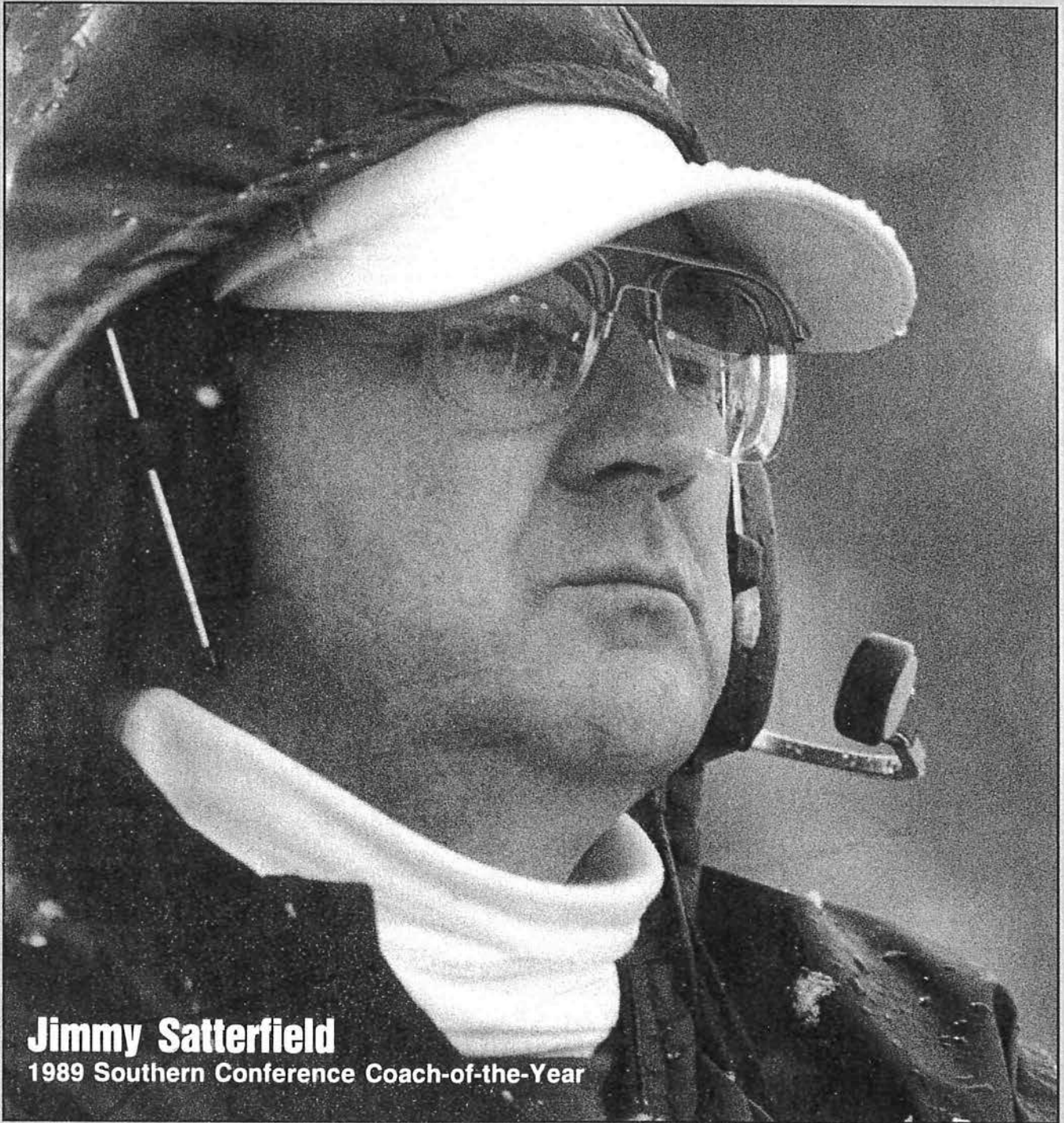
The county's narrow, rushing streams provided water power for cotton mills as early as 1820, but Greenville was primarily a resort for low country planters in the ante-bellum period.

The textile industry began to flourish after reconstruction, with the mills and mill villages surrounding the western edge of the city. In 1915, Greenville held its first Textile Exposition, and soon became known as the "Textile Center of the South." Since that time, the area's economy has grown significantly and has become more diverse, thus helping Greenville take its position as an emerging economic force in the new south.

1989 Southern Conference Coach-of-the-Year



HEAD COACH



The only coach to ever lead the school to a national football championship and a key figure on a coaching staff that directed Furman to a 95-25-4 record and seven Southern Conference championships during the 1980s, Jimmy Satterfield in four seasons as head coach has solidified Furman as one of the nation's best run, most successful football programs.

Now in his 17th season of service to Furman University, Satterfield, in his short tenure as head coach, has already taken Furman to the pinnacle of achievement on the gridiron. His 1988 team, picked by many to finish no higher than fourth in the Southern Conference, recorded a school-best, 13-2 mark en route to a Southern Conference championship and NCAA I-AA national title. Last year Furman followed up its success in 1988 by going 12-2, winning its second straight Southern Conference crown, and making its third playoff appearance under Satterfield before bowing out in the semifinals. Satterfield's four-year head coaching record stands at 39-11-2, and his .769 winning percentage is tops among Furman coaches.

Honored at the conference, state, and national levels for his coaching brilliance, Furman's head coach was cited as Southern Conference Coach-of-the-Year last year after Furman posted a perfect 7-0 mark against the league, winning by an average margin of 21.8 points per game. Furman's 12-2 finish in 1989, which includes a school record 12 straight wins, also earned Satterfield his third South Carolina Coach-of-the-Year scroll in four years as selected by the state's sportswriters, and first Greenville Lions Club Citizen-of-the-Year honor.

In 1988, following Furman's national championship season, Satterfield was cited as South Carolina's Coach-of-the-Year by both the state sportswriters and Columbia Touchdown Club; honored by his peers as American Football Coaches' Association-Kodak I-AA Coach-of-the-Year; and tabbed as national I-AA coach-of-the-Year by both the Football News and Chevrolet. On top of the coaching accolades, Satterfield received from Governor Carroll Campbell The Order of the Palmetto, the highest honor that can be bestowed on a citizen by the state.

As an assistant coach, offensive coordinator, and now head coach of Furman, Jimmy Satterfield has a full understanding of the school's athletic mission: to compete successfully within a framework of fair play and honesty while stressing academic achievement. In that regard Furman has carried a tall banner, proving that athletic success can be achieved within a rigid, demanding academic environment.

Behind Satterfield's philosophy on academic and athletic achievement are numbers to support his commitment. Of the 69 senior football players who have completed their fourth year of eligibility since 1986, 63 have graduated and the remaining six are still in school. From 1986-90 the overall graduation rate for all members of Furman's football program, including scholarship players and walk-ons, was 69.4 percent, a figure higher than the university's non-athlete, five-year graduation rate (69.1 percent) during the same period. And finally, during Satterfield's tenure as head coach, Furman has produced five GTE-Academic All-Americans, three Na-

tional Football Foundation and Hall-of-Fame Scholar Athletes, two NCAA Post-Graduate Scholars, and 60 Southern Conference Academic Honor Roll players — the most of any league school.

His teams' success well documented, Satterfield record in terms of player development is as bright as his players' classroom credentials. From 1986-89, Furman produced 35 All-Southern Conference performers, five All-Americans, two Southern Conference Defensive Players-of-the-Year, and one national defensive player-of-the-year.

That track record — one of accomplishment on the field and in the academic arena — is an obvious point of pride to Satterfield and his coaching staff.

"We've always believed that if we recruit good students and good people, we could be successful both academically and athletically," Satterfield says. "What we've been able to accomplish at Furman over the last 17 years is a source of pride not only for all the coaches who've worked here but for all the players who have made it happen and the fans who have supported us."

Having come to Furman in 1973 as an assistant under Art Baker, Satterfield began an association with the university for a period that can easily be described as the most successful in Furman football history. In 1978 he was named offensive coordinator under then-new head coach Dick Sheridan. That year saw Furman notch its first-ever Southern Conference championship with an 8-3 record — the best mark for a Furman team in

nearly a decade.

That was only the beginning.

Over the next seven seasons Furman dominated the Southern Conference, winning five league crowns and moving Paladin football to a level never before seen by the school's faithful. In 1985, Satterfield's last season as offensive coordinator, Furman rolled up a 12-2 mark and finished as national runner-up.

As an offensive coordinator and head coach, Satterfield has kept Furman at the forefront of NCAA I-AA thanks in part to high-powered offenses of which he is known for directing. In the 1980s Furman, with its exciting, option-style attack, ranked as the nation's top rushing team, averaging better than 260 yards per game and producing six 1,000-yard rushers. In addition six Paladin players were cited as Southern Conference Players-of-the-Year in the 1980s, including tailback Stanford Jennings (1980-83), the only player in league history to gain player-of-the-year accolades three times. A quick glance at the Furman record book confirms the dominance as a vast majority of the school's individual and team offensive records have been set during Satterfield's tenure.

A 1962 graduate of the University of South Carolina from which he later earned a master's degree in education, Satterfield began his coaching career at Columbia's Eau Claire High School, working alongside coaches such as Dick Sheridan, Art Baker, and Steve Robertson, who, like Satterfield, have gone on to become successful, highly-respected members of the collegiate coaching profession. Named head coach and athletic director in 1968, he posted a 30-5-1 record over the next three seasons, leading Eau Claire to three conference championships and the 1970 Upper State crown. It was in 1970 that Satterfield gained his first honor as a head coach as he was named South Carolina Coach-of-the-Year and picked to coach the South Carolina Shrine Bowl team.

Moving to nearby Irmo High School in 1971, he helped mold the Yellow Jackets into one of the state's premier football powers by going 19-4 in two seasons and capturing two conference championships. Counting his stints as both Irmo and Eau Claire, Satterfield posted a record of 49-9-1.

A native of Lancaster, South Carolina, he is married to the former Ann Funderburk, also of Lancaster. They have three children; Shaun, Lee, and Sydney Satterfield-Garrett.

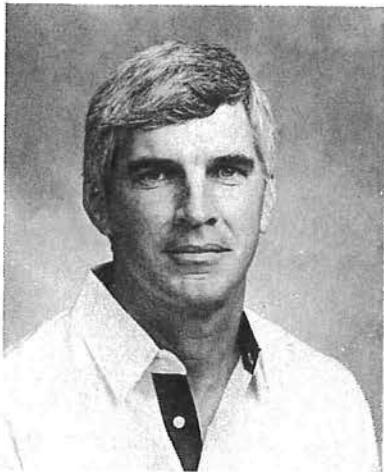

ASSISTANT COACHES



BOBBY JOHNSON

Assistant Head Coach/Defensive Coordinator/Defensive Backs



Apart from head coach Jimmy Satterfield's 16 years of service to Paladin football, no other coach on the Paladin staff can match Bobby Johnson's tenure at Furman, which now covers 14 seasons.

A former Atlantic Coast Conference all-academic performer at Clemson University, Johnson begins his eighth year as Furman's defensive coordinator, a position he has held since 1983.

Over the past seven years Johnson

has firmly established a reputation as one of the premier defensive minds in the country. A year ago Johnson's Paladin defensive unit helped Furman notch a 12-2 record and second consecutive Southern Conference title by leading the league and ranking high nationally in rushing defense, total defense, and scoring defense. In 1988, Furman's defense posted four shutouts, led the nation in scoring defense, and ranked second nationally in rushing defense and scoring defense, thereby helping the Paladins go 13-2 and capture the NCAA I-AA national championship.

Since being named defensive coordinator in 1983, Johnson's defenses have helped Furman roll up a 69-18-3 record, win four Southern Conference titles, and finish in the nation's Top-20 six times. During that period Furman has paced the Southern Conference in rushing defense six times, scoring defense four times, total defense three times, and passing defense once. In addition, during Johnson's tenure as defensive coordinator, Furman has produced two Southern Conference

Defensive Players-of-the-Year, 21 first team all-conference performers, and six All-Americans.

Johnson came to Furman in 1976 as an assistant under Art Baker and remained for four years before going to Clemson for one year. He returned to Furman in 1981 under Dick Sheridan.

In addition to his on-the-field duties, Johnson also coordinates player admissions, financial aid, housing, and academics.

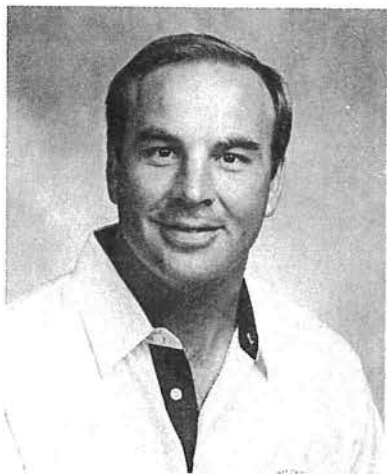
A native of Columbia, he holds the distinction of having played under present head coach Jimmy Satterfield, former head coach Dick Sheridan, and former assistant Steve Robertson at one time or another during his prep career. He was named South Carolina Class AAAA Lineman-of-the-Year at Eau Claire High School and played in the 1968 Shrine Bowl game.

Johnson enrolled at Clemson in 1969 and was a four-year starter at wide receiver and cornerback for the Tigers before graduating in 1973.

He earned his master's degree at Furman and is married to the former Catherine Bonner of Charleston, South Carolina.

STEVE WILSON

Linebackers/Strength Coordinator



Heading up the Paladin linebackers will be Steve Wilson, who is now in his fifth season on the Furman coaching staff.

In 1989 Wilson's linebacking duo of Kevin Kendrick and Kota Suttle ranked as one of the best in the Southern Conference and was a major factor in Furman going 12-2 and winning its second straight conference champion-

ship. Kendrick, a junior, earned first team All-Southern Conference honors after rolling up 177 tackles a year ago. Suttle, a starter in each of the Paladins' 14 games in 1989, enjoyed a brilliant freshman season by leading Furman in tackles with 180. Combined, Kendrick and Suttle played a key role in Furman's defense, which led the Southern Conference and ranked high nationally in rushing defense, total defense, and scoring defense in 1989.

In all Wilson has coached five All-Southern Conference linebackers since coming to Furman in 1986, including consensus All-American Jeff Blankenship, who notched a school record 235 tackles in 1988 to lead the Paladins to a 13-2 record and NCAA I-AA national championship.

A 1977 Furman graduate, Wilson returned to his alma mater in 1986 following a three-year stint as an assistant coach and defensive coordinator at Mars Hill (NC) College. While there, Wilson assisted in the revitalization of

a struggling Lion football program, and in 1985 he helped direct Mars Hill to an 8-3 record and its first-ever outright South Atlantic Conference championship.

A Gainesville, Georgia, product, Wilson starred for three years in football while playing both guard and tight end at Gainesville High School. His football career did not end in high school as he started for four seasons at linebacker at Furman, playing for Paladin mentor Art Baker. As a senior, Wilson was the recipient of the Art Baker Christian Award and president of the school's chapter of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA).

In 1980, he assumed an assistant coaching position at Buford (GA) High School following a two-year stint in private business.

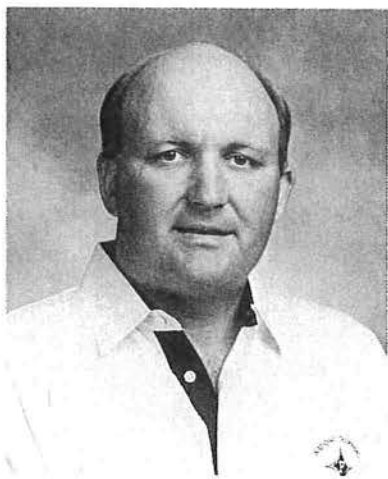
Wilson also heads up the Furman strength program in addition to his primary coaching responsibilities.

He and his wife, Angie, formerly of Gainesville, Georgia, have a son, Daniel, 2.

ASSISTANT COACHES



JIMMY NEAL Defensive Line



Jimmy Neal, a Paladin standout in the mid 1970s and former head coach at nearby Berea High School, enters his fifth year as an assistant coach at Furman University.

After heading up Furman's offensive line his first two seasons, Neal's responsibility shifted to the defensive line in 1988. There, in his first season of work, Neal directed a spectacular performance, taking a unit that returned no starters from the 1987 season and molding it into the league's best

as evidenced by Furman going 13-2 and winning the NCAA I-AA national championship with the country's top defense.

In 1989 Furman was recognized as having the best defensive line in the Southern Conference as two of Neal's three starters, defensive tackle Brian Pitts and nose guard Allen Edwards, were first team all-conference selections. Together, along with the rest of the Paladin defense, Furman, for the second consecutive year, won the Southern Conference and paced the league and ranked high nationally in rushing defense, total defense, and scoring defense.

Neal played linebacker and lettered all four years under former Paladin mentor Art Baker from 1974-77. He served as captain of the 1977 Paladin squad and graduated in 1978 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in political science.

Following graduation he received an MAT degree in physical education from the University of South Carolina in 1980 while serving as a part-time football coach at Newberry College.

CLAY HENDRIX Offensive Line



Highly respected as a player and now as a coach, former Paladin standout Clay Hendrix is in his third year as coach of Furman's offensive line.

Last year, in only his second season on the Furman staff, Hendrix's offensive line contributed heavily to the team's second consecutive Southern Conference championship by powering a Paladin ground game that scored

a league high 41 touchdowns and averaged 249.7 yards per game. Two of Hendrix's players, center Steve Duggan and guard David Adams, were first team all-conference selections. In addition, Duggan was cited as the state's top blocker a year ago, earning the prestigious Jacobs Blocking Award.

The performance of Furman's offensive line in 1989 followed a brilliant 1988 campaign that saw a Paladin offensive line, with two first team All-Southern Conference performers, help lead Furman to a school-best, 13-2 record, Southern Conference championship, and NCAA I-AA national title. In all since joining the Paladin staff, Hendrix has helped Furman record a 25-4 record.

A 1986 graduate of Furman with a degree in health and physical education, Hendrix was a three-year starter at offensive guard under former head coach Dick Sheridan and key reason behind Furman's success from 1982-

From there, Neal moved back to the Greenville area to assume assistant coaching duties at Wade Hampton High School for two years. After serving as an assistant at Camden High School in 1982 under Billy Ammons, Neal joined former Furman assistant Buddy Jennings' staff at Laurens High School and, while serving as ends and linebackers coach, helped the Raiders capture two class AAAA Division II state championships in 1983-84.

It was following the 1984 season that Neal accepted his first head coaching position at Berea High School, where he guided the Bulldogs to a 4-6 record after a 2-8 campaign in 1984.

A native of Camden, Neal was a three sport letterman in football, baseball, and basketball at Camden High School.

In addition to his coaching duties, he is responsible for overseeing the team's managers and coordinating the purchase of equipment.

Neal is married to the former Nancy Wise of Lugoff, South Carolina.

85, when the Paladins rolled up a 39-10-1 record and produced four consecutive 1,000-yard rushers. Hendrix also played on three Southern Conference championship teams and four nationally-ranked squads during that span, including the school's 12-2 national runner-up team in 1985.

Named to the all-state team in 1985, Hendrix also received the team's Robert B. King Award that season in recognition of his loyalty and unselfishness.

Following graduation from Furman, the young coach joined Dick Sheridan's coaching staff at North Carolina State as a graduate assistant, a position he held for two seasons before returning to Furman in January of 1988.

In addition to his duties as offensive line coach, Hendrix also serves as assistant strength coach.

A former standout at Commerce (GA) High School, Hendrix, 26, is a bachelor.

ASSISTANT COACHES



TOMMY MARSHALL

Defensive Ends/Special Teams/Specialists



Tommy Marshall is now in his fifth season on the Furman staff and second as coach of the Paladin defensive ends following three seasons of work with the tight ends.

In 1989 Marshall had the distinction of coaching a pair of All-America defensive ends in Kelly Fletcher and Chris Roper, two of the most heralded players in Furman football history. Besides earning consensus All-America honors, Fletcher was named Southern Conference and South

Carolina Defensive Player-of-the-Year after recording a school record 19 quarterback sacks in 1989. Roper was a first team **Football News** All-America pick and recipient of several prestigious post-graduate scholarships. In addition, Fletcher and Roper were first team GTE Academic All-America choices. Their play helped Furman win its second consecutive Southern Conference title and lead the league and rank high nationally in rushing defense, total defense, and scoring defense.

Marshall, a 1976 Furman graduate, joined the Paladin staff in 1986 after serving one year as assistant head coach and defensive backfield coach at Mars Hill (NC) College.

He began his coaching career at Redan (GA) High School, serving as the Raiders' defensive coordinator from 1977 to 1980.

From there Marshall took over as head coach at Walton High School in Marietta, where the Raiders there had never experienced a winning year. Walton went 2-8 in 1980 but then made

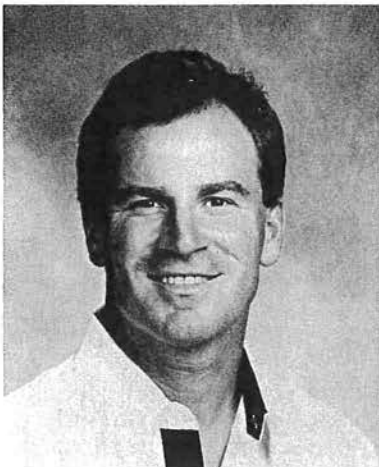
four straight trips to the state playoffs. During that span, Marshall was named region coach-of-the-year three times.

As a player, he was a three-year starter at Furman, playing both defensive end and strong safety during his Paladin career. He earned honorable mention All-Southern Conference honors twice; was Furman's Most Valuable Defensive Lineman in 1974; and was awarded the Art Baker Christian Award that season. He was captain of the '76 Furman team and was named to the 1976 Churchmen's All-America team. Marshall was tabbed to Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities and was also president of Furman's chapter of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes Chapter (FCA), an organization he continues to serve today.

The assistant coach, who holds a master's degree from Georgia State University, married his Peachtree High School sweetheart, Dana Webb, also of Atlanta. The Marshalls have two children: Stacy, 10, and Danny, 8.

BRUCE FOWLER

Receivers/Passing Game



An experienced coach familiar with the Furman system, Bruce Fowler is now in his fifth year as coach of the Furman passing game and receiving corps after joining Jimmy Satterfield's staff in 1986.

Last year Fowler's receivers emerged as some of the best in the Southern

Conference as tight end Greg Key earned All-Southern Conference recognition and flanker Brad Stephens landed second team all-conference accolades. Their presence, along with other experienced Paladin receivers, gave Furman the league's most balanced and explosive offense as the Paladins led the Southern Conference in total offense and scoring offense.

A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, Fowler came to Furman as a student in 1977 and played cornerback for four years under former Paladin coaches Art Baker and Dick Sheridan. As a starter for two seasons he played on Furman's first Southern Conference championship squad in 1978 and the 1980 league championship team. The young coach led Furman in interceptions in 1979, when the Paladins won five out of their last six games after a slow start. He graduated in 1981 with

a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education.

Fowler's tenure at Furman is not restricted to his days as a player. In 1984 he accepted a graduate assistant position on the Furman staff, working directly with the Paladin receiving corps.

Before returning to Furman, Fowler worked as an assistant football coach and head track coach at Wren High School in Piedmont, South Carolina, from 1981-83.

He played his high school football at Cincinnati's Mariemont High School, lettering three years and winning all-conference honors as a defensive back his senior year.

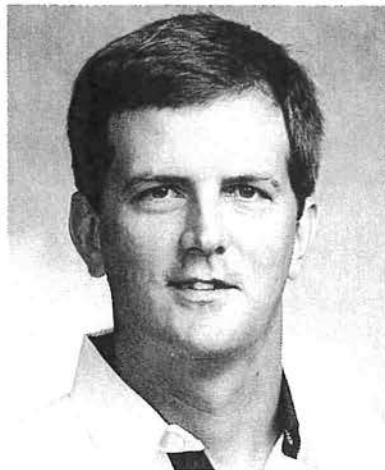
Fowler, who recently completed work on a master's degree in education from Furman, is married to the former Lindy Gilman of Ocala, Florida.

TIM SORRELLS

Offensive Backs



Former Paladin quarterback great Tim Sorrells is now in his fifth year as coach of Furman's offensive backs.

In 1989, in his first season of exclusive work with the team's running backs, Sorrells directed the emergence of tailback Carl Tremble, one of the premier runners in the Southern Conference. After a knee injury sidelined regular starter Bobby Daughtery

at midseason, Tremble rushed for a majority of his team-leading 987 yards, the most ever by a Paladin freshman.

Prior to the 1989 season Sorrells also worked with Furman's quarterbacks, playing a key role in the development of All-Southern Conference signal caller Frankie DeBusk, who in 1988 led Furman to a 13-2 record and NCAA I-AA national championship.

A native of Greeneville, Tennessee, Sorrells came to Furman in 1977 after a fine prep career at Jefferson County (TN) High School, where he was an all-state quarterback and all-conference pick in both tennis and basketball.

As a quarterback at Furman, Sorrells was twice named All-Southern Conference after leading the Paladins to three conference crowns in 1978, '80, and '81. His stint as a signal caller extended the school's string of producing highly successful quarterbacks, a string that began with David White-

hurst in the 1970's and one that has continued in the 80's with David Charpia, Bobby Lamb, and Frankie DeBusk.

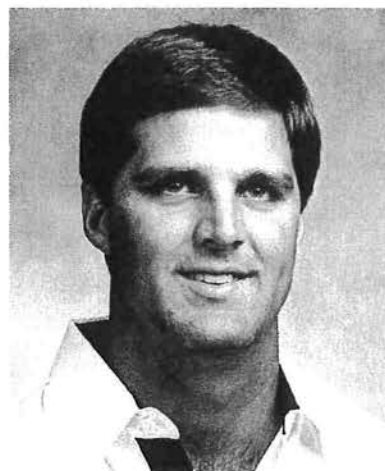
Sorrells received his undergraduate degree in physical education in 1981. He remained at Furman as a graduate assistant coach, helping the Paladins claim the 1982 Southern Conference championship while working on his master's degree in physical education, which he received in 1983.

From the ranks of college graduate assistant coach, Sorrells took his first full-time coaching job at the high school level as an assistant at Rhea County (TN) High School. 1985 saw Rhea County finish as a Class AAA state runnerup.

Married to the former Tracy Ballew of Spartanburg, the Sorrells' have two sons, Caleb, age 5, and Jordan, age 4, and a daughter, Emma, born February 16.

BOBBY LAMB

Quarterbacks/Junior Varsity Coach/Recruiting Coordinator



One of the greatest players to ever play at Furman, Bobby Lamb is now in his fifth year as a coach on the Furman staff, having coached both the Paladin defensive ends and quarterbacks during his tenure at his alma mater.

Last year, in his first season of work with Furman's quarterbacks, Lamb

coached All-Southern Conference quarterback Frankie DeBusk, who finished the season ranked fifth among passers in NCAA I-AA, thereby extending the Paladins' tradition of annually producing some of the nation's top rated quarterbacks.

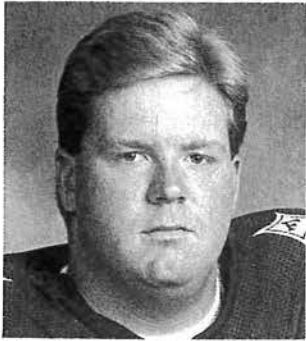
Prior to 1989, Lamb coached Furman's defensive ends, a group that played a key role in Furman's drive to a 13-2 record and NCAA I-AA national championship in 1988.

A native of Commerce, Georgia, Lamb came to Furman in the fall of 1982 after fashioning a brilliant high school career at Commerce High School playing for his father, Ray Lamb. As a prep he was named by the **Atlanta Journal-Constitution** as its AA Back-of-the-Year after leading Commerce to a 1981 AA state championship and 13-1-1 record.

At Furman the brilliance continued as Lamb helped lead Furman to two Southern Conference championships, including a 12-2 national runner-up finish in 1985. That season saw the dynamic quarterback lead the entire nation in passing efficiency with a 171.20 rating and earn Southern Conference Player-of-the-Year honors as well as South Carolina Amateur Athlete-of-the-Year and Carolinas Athlete-of-the-Year recognition. In all he holds 14 school records, including most yards passing in a season (2,264) and career (4,594), and most touchdowns passing in a season (24) and career (47).

Lamb, 27, is a newlywed, having married the former Allyson Acker of Greenville on July 22, 1989.

DAVID ADAMS

David Adams, a 1989 first team All-Southern Conference choice and starter at offensive guard on Furman's 13-2, 1988 NCAA I-AA national championship team, is now in his first year as a graduate assistant coach on the Paladin staff. Holder of a bachelor's degree in business administration, which he received this past spring, Adams, a native of Dalton, Georgia, is now pursuing a master's degree in business administration. He will assist Clay Hendrix in coaching the Paladin offensive line.



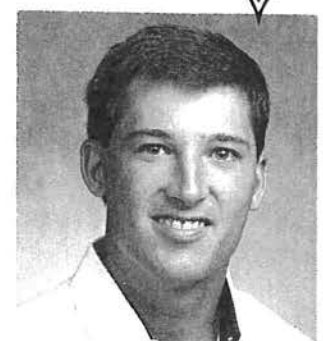
BRIAN ALLISON

GEORGE QUARLES

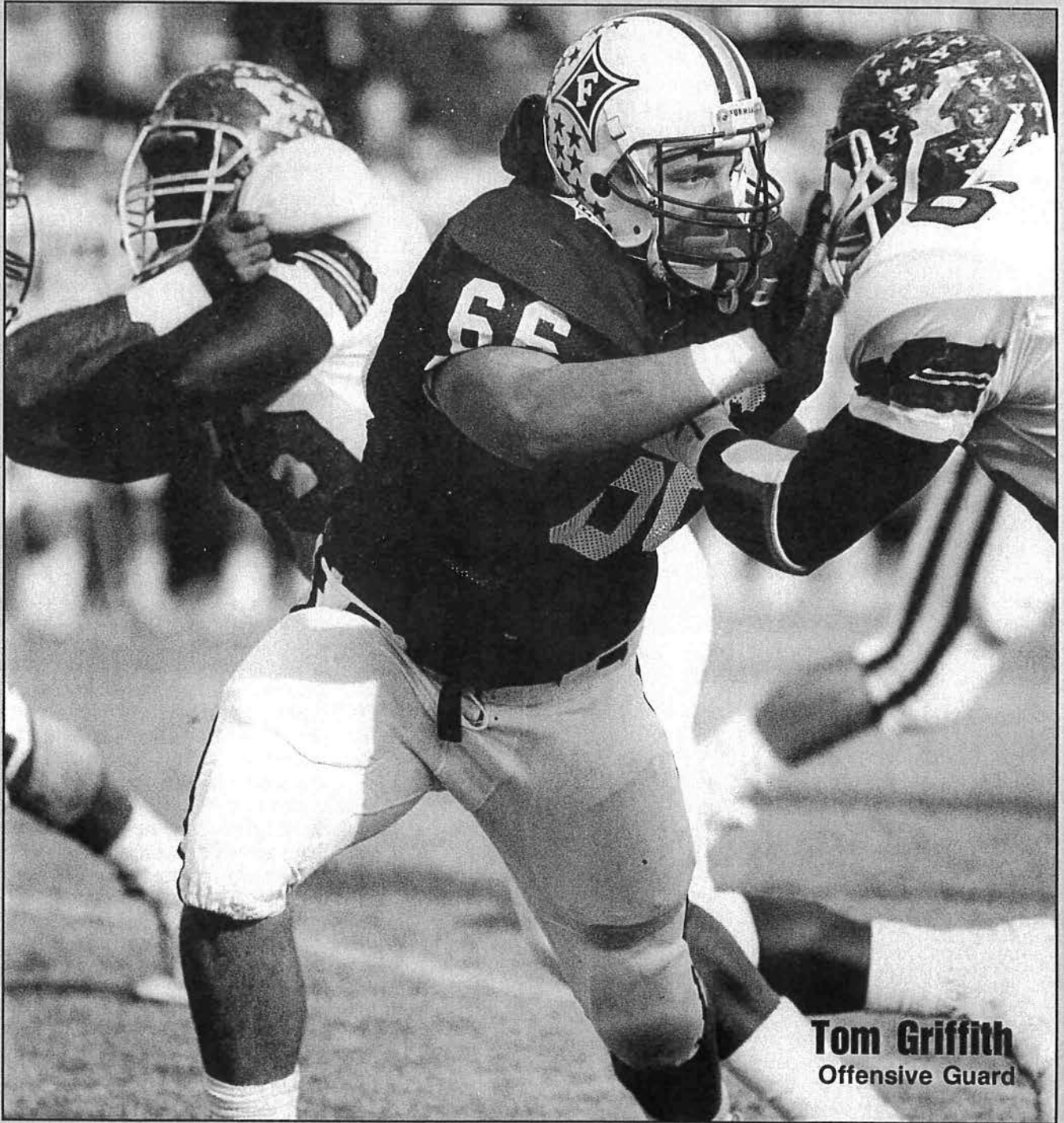

THE OUTLOOK



When it comes to football, few programs in the country enjoyed as much success in the 1980s as the Furman Paladins. Proud owners of a 95-25-4 overall record, six Southern Conference championships, six playoff appearances, and an NCAA I-AA national championship since 1980, Furman followers hope the 1990s, and in particular the 1990 season, yield the same type of success.

With 15 starters, 49 lettermen, and a coaching staff returning intact off a team that last year won a school record 12 straight games en route to a 12-2 season and Southern Conference championship, Furman, despite head coach Jimmy Satterfield's tempered outlook and the loss of several key performers, appears to again have the muscle to contend for a league championship and a bid into the NCAA I-AA playoffs.

"We have several starters and experienced players coming back, and that's good, but you just don't lose

players like Kelly Fletcher, Chris Roper, Brian Pitts, Pat Turner, and David Adams and not drop a notch," said Satterfield. "Those players were starters on two conference championship teams and our national championship squad. What they gave us on the field went beyond statistics. At their respective positions, and as leaders, they were some of the best we've ever had."

In addition to finding replacements for several graduated stars, among which were two All-Americans and five first team All-Southern Conference performers, Satterfield is quick to point out the difficulty of Furman's schedule this fall, which, in addition to hungry Southern Conference foes, boasts Southeastern Conference member Florida, 1989 NCAA I-AA playoff participant William & Mary, and an improved South Carolina State.

"South Carolina State played us to the wire last year, and going on the road against Tennessee-Chattanooga,

Florida, and Marshall early in the season should be enough to keep anybody from thinking about post-season play. We've also got William & Mary at their place, Appalachian State in Boone, and East Tennessee State away. That's a very tough schedule for our program and one that will require a hunger on the part of our players and coaches that we've never before experienced."

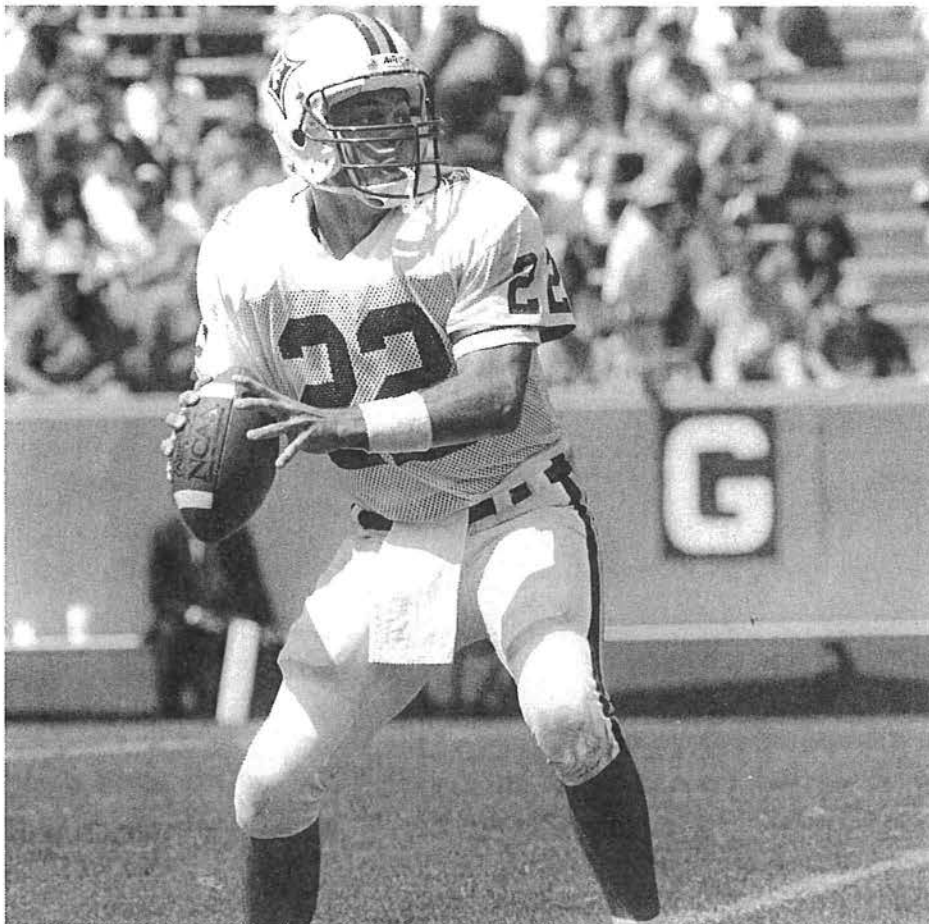

Lethal was the best way to describe Furman's offense in 1989. In what oftentimes resembled poison for the opposition a year ago, Furman's offense displayed impressive balance and early strike capabilities that, when coupled with the Paladins' rock solid defense, made the outcome of several games a foregone conclusion by halftime. A strong running game (249.7 ypg) and efficient passing attack (144.6 ypg) were trademarks of the Paladin offense in 1989, an offense that over the course of 11 regular season games outscored the opposition 113-13 in the first quarter and 219-66 in the first half. With nine starters and 22 lettermen returning off last year's unit, Furman's offense, which sports proven ability at virtually every position, promises to again produce an abundance of points and excitement this fall.

OFFENSIVE LINE

A year ago Furman ranked second to The Citadel in the Southern Conference and ninth nationally in rushing offense, but when it came to effectiveness, the Paladin ground game, which registered a conference high 41 touchdowns and 5.13 yards per rush, was by far the league's best. The story should be much the same this fall

given the fact the Paladins return four of five starters along the offensive front, including three viable All-Southern Conference candidates.

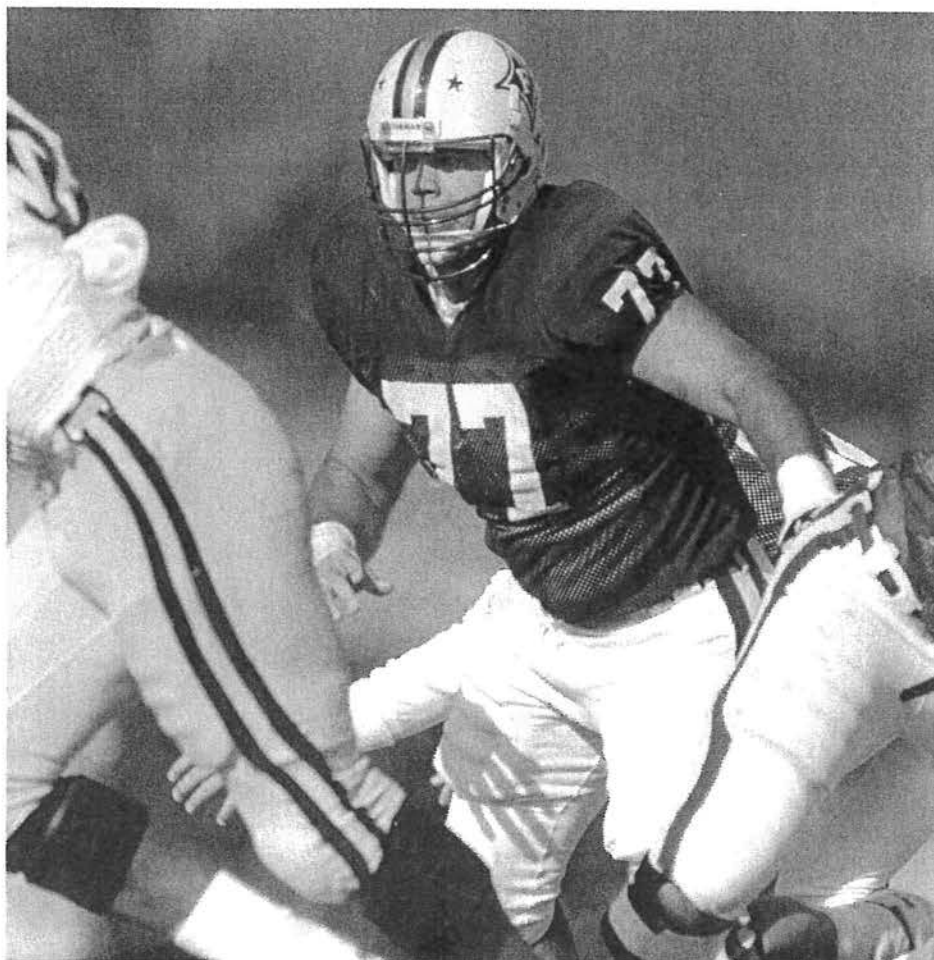

Heading up Furman's talented and experienced offensive line — one that sports one senior and four juniors — will be center **Steve Duggan (6-2, 250, Sr.)**, a two-time All-Southern Conference choice and 1989 All-South Carolina pick. A two-year starter and winner of the prestigious Jacobs Blocking Award in South Carolina last year, Duggan, a definite All-America candidate, is considered by the coaching staff to be one of the finest centers to ever play at Furman. An accomplished soccer player with excellent quickness, strength, and range, Duggan missed four games with a knee injury but returned to action in the playoffs and is in fine shape heading into the 1990 campaign. Backing him up will be promising newcomer **B.J. Estes (6-5, 253, So.)**, an excellent athlete and player with solid potential.

The departure of All-Southern Conference guard David Adams has forced offensive line coach Clay Hendrix to move **Tom Griffith (6-2, 247, Jr.)** from right tackle to left guard. A starter at tackle in each of Furman's 14 games last year, Griffith, a two-year letterman who rates as one of Furman's most versatile performers and top pass blockers, proved to be very steady in

his first full season of front line duty, registering 13 winning performances and taking part in 746 plays. Expected to receive action as a backup at left guard is **Jon Heusinger (6-1, 235, So.)**.

Left tackle **Kyle Lowery (6-3, 259, Jr.)** returns after a brilliant sophomore season that saw him tally 11 winning performances and two exceptional grades in 14 starts. Sporting excellent size and mobility, Lowery, a two-year letterman who ranks alongside Duggan in terms of overall ability, last season emerged as one of the Southern Conference's top tackles and should contend for all-conference honors this fall. **Eric Duffy (6-4, 251, Sr.)** gives Furman an experienced reserve at left tackle.

Joining Steve Duggan and Kyle Lowery in forming the cream of Furman's offensive line will be right guard **Eric Walter (6-2, 223, Jr.)**, a two-year starter and all-conference hopeful who has consistently posted some of Furman's best grades over the past two seasons. In 1989 Walter notched a team high 779 plays and five exceptional performances. Small in stature

when compared to Furman's other offensive linemen, Walter makes up for his lack of size with outstanding technique, execution, and strength. **Chad Will (6-3, 210, Sr.)** and **Fred Sturgis (6-1, 237, So.)** are locked in a duel for Walter's relief duty.

The switch of right tackle Tom Griffith to left guard was made easier by the emergence last season of **Clay Tiedeman (6-3, 246, Jr.)** as a quality performer at tackle. Tiedeman, a Rock Hill native and former Shrine Bowl participant, registered 210 plays last season as a reserve and was impressive to the point that he has been deemed too valuable to keep out of the starting lineup this fall. **Brian Anderson (6-0, 238, Jr.)**, who a year ago saw action at guard before a knee injury sidelined him at midseason, was moved to tackle in the spring and will backup Tiedeman this year.

TIGHT ENDS

Next to the defensive end slots, no area in the Furman program was hit harder by graduation than tight end, where the Paladins lost All-Southern

Conference Greg Key, last year's leading receiver (28 receptions, 444 yards, 5 TDs), and Robbie Love. The good news, though, is **Paul Siffri (6-4, 245, Jr.)** is back after a fine sophomore season that saw him collect 13 receptions for 275 yards and one touchdown. Although Key was the focal point in Furman's tight end corps last year, it was Siffri who started in 12 of 14 games in 1989 because of his size and blocking ability, which oftentimes proved deadly in Furman's potent option attack. His return also bodes well for the Paladin passing game, which annually utilizes the tight end as well as any college program in the country.

Behind Siffri the picture is not as bright in terms of experience as Furman has **Tate Waters (6-4, 230, So.)** and **Edward Drinkard (6-1, 221, So.)**, both of whom will be looking for their first taste of action this year.

WIDE RECEIVERS

In 1988, the year Furman won its national championship, the team's wide receivers accounted for just one touchdown in a 15-game season. Last year the touchdown figure climbed to seven. This fall, with both starters and the unit's top two reserves coming back, Furman's passing game promises to be among the best in the league as the Paladins sport both experience and speed at the split end and flanker slots.

Flanker **Brad Stephens (5-8, 159, Sr.)**, a two-year starter and coaches'

All-Southern Conference pick last year, returns after a solid junior season that saw him nab 19 passes for 407 yards and four touchdowns. Deceptively quick and strong, Stephens teams with **John Whitmire (5-11, 180, Jr.)** to give Furman a pair of experienced wideouts. Last year Whitmire, a converted quarterback and slippery runner, played well in his first season at receiver, catching seven passes for 71 yards.

Split end **Donald Lipscomb (5-10, 162, Jr.)**, like Stephens, has plenty of experience and a big play reputation. A starter in every game last year, Lipscomb registered 17 receptions for 327 yards and a touchdown in 1989. His presence adds to the strength of Furman's receiving corps as does **Don Clardy (5-11, 176, Sr.)**, who enters the fall as Lipscomb's backup. Clardy, Furman's best blocking receiver, was on the receiving end of 11 Furman passes in 1989, totaling 197 yards and a touchdown.

QUARTERBACKS

Much of Furman's success in the 1980s was due to its ability to field quarterbacks capable of producing more than the usual overrated, big passing yardage numbers. As total field generals, Tim Sorrells, David Charpia, Bobby Lamb, and the latest phenom, **Frankie DeBusk (6-2, 201, Sr.)** proved to be — above all else — winners who could operate Furman's balanced offense with stinging efficiency. Their ability as runners, passers,

and decision makers is probably best summarized by the fact that from 1980-89 Furman quarterbacks earned All-Southern Conference accolades seven times, the latest of which came last year when DeBusk took home first team all-conference honors after a brilliant junior season.

In 1989 DeBusk firmly established himself as one the nation's top quarterbacks before a knee injury in first round playoff action halted his outstanding season. Prior to his exit, DeBusk posted All-America-type numbers, among which were 100 completions and just two interceptions in 182 attempts, a 54.6% completion percentage, 13 passing touchdowns, 1,726 passing yards, the nation's fourth best passing efficiency rating (156.01), nine rushing touchdowns, 2,000 yards in total offense, and 22 touchdown responsibilities. More importantly, though, DeBusk, who played in just three fourth quarters in 1989, directed Furman to its second consecutive Southern Conference championship, helping the Paladins win seven league contests by an average margin of 21.8 points per game. In addition the Greeneville, Tennessee, native led Furman to 11 of a school record 12 straight victories and improved his record as a starter to 22-2, a mark that also includes a national championship. Beyond all the statistics, DeBusk last year proved to be most deadly at the line of scrimmage before the snap of the ball, reading defenses and calling plays that oftentimes made the difference between a four yard pickup and a big play. Oftentimes underappreciated, it is his ability as a playcaller, passer, and runner that make him an All-America candidate this fall.

Much of Furman's potential success in 1990 will hinge on DeBusk staying healthy, because behind him the Paladins have two quarterbacks with no real varsity experience. Highly regarded **Hugh Swilling (6-2, 188, Fr.)** underwent wrist surgery last year and did not appear in a game, and **Damon Bradley (6-3, 191, Fr.)** appeared in only one contest in 1989 before a knee injury and surgery sidelined him.

RUNNING BACKS

Furman's backfield, while down in terms of experienced depth from a year ago, is nevertheless talented and more than capable of keeping alive the Paladins' tradition of producing dominating, ball-control ground attacks.

Next to left guard, the only other offensive slot the Paladins will be looking for a new starter is fullback, where the versatile Dwight Sterling has graduated. Expected to move into a starting role is **Billy Stockdale (5-9, 217, Sr.)**, a player with experience as a part-time starter who last year rushed for 408 yards and five touchdowns while averaging an excellent 6.4 yards per carry. A strong inside runner, Stockdale must still prove he can handle the important blocking duties that are expected of Furman fullbacks. A battle for reserve duty at fullback is being waged by **Brian Pressnall (5-10, 235, So.)** and **Ron Sherwood (5-11, 209, Sr.)**.

At tailback Furman sports a rising star in **Carl Tremble (5-10, 195, So.)**, a hard-nosed runner with excellent speed and tackle-breaking ability. In 1989 Tremble burst on the scene at midseason following a career-ending knee injury to Bobby Daugherty and in just seven starts rushed for a majority of his 987 yards and nine touchdowns while also averaging 5.8 yards per carry. The most prolific freshman ground gainer in Furman football history, Tremble, according to the coaching staff, gives the Paladins a legitimate all-conference caliber running back and most talented tailback since Robbie Gardner (1982-86), the school's second all-time leading rusher (3,213 yards).

Bidding to see plenty of action at tailback as well are **Billy Whitley (5-10, 183, So.)** and **Rod Green (5-8, 194, Fr.)**, two speedy runners who will get their first taste of varsity action this year.

Under the direction of Bobby Johnson, Furman defensive units since 1986 have consistently topped the Southern Conference in nearly every statistical category and ranked among the best in NCAA I-AA. During that four-year span, the Paladin stop troops paced the conference in rushing defense four times, total defense and scoring defense three times, and passing defense once. In addition, the Paladins from 1986-89 produced 15 first team All-Southern Conference defensive performers and two Southern Conference Defensive Players-of-the-Year. What that's

translated into is a 39-11-2 record, two conference championships, and a national championship over the last four years. The question coming from the Furman camp this fall is can Johnson coax another superb performance from a defense that returns six starters? Given the Furman coach's track record and reputation as a defensive mastermind, chances are the Paladins, despite losing five key performers and two All-American defensive ends, will remain strong defensively in 1990.

DEFENSIVE LINE

The heart and soul of Furman's outstanding defensive work the last two seasons has been its defensive line, which has been rock solid against both the run and the pass. The leader of the unit a year ago, cat-quick All-Southern Conference tackle Brian Pitts (79 tackles, 5 sacks), has graduated but returning as starters are **Allen Edwards (6-0, 246, Jr.)** and **Dean Williams (6-1, 232, Sr.)**.



Sophomore tailback Carl Tremble emerged last season as a premier runner, totaling 987 yards and nine touchdowns to become the most prolific freshman back in Furman history.

A first team coaches All-Southern Conference pick in 1989, Edwards gives Furman a dominant nose guard who plays both the run and pass exceptionally well. Strong as well as quick, Edwards, the unsung hero in Furman's 1988 national championship victory over Georgia Southern, was credited with 77 tackles and 11 tackles-for-loss a year ago in his first full season of starting duty. Flanking him at right tackle will be Williams, a rugged competitor and all-conference hopeful who last year established himself as a solid pass rusher with 58 tackles and 11 quarterback sacks.

At nose guard and right tackle Furman will be able to substitute with experienced players as **Frank Sutton (6-0, 237, Jr.)** and **Jeff Sanders (6-2, 233, Jr.)** return. Sutton played in 12 games last year and recorded 23 tackles while Sanders totaled 37 stops over the course of Furman's 14-game season.

The only change from last year in the defensive interior line will occur at left tackle, where **Clint Crocker (6-3, 225, So.)** is set to take over for Brian Pitts. Crocker tallied 15 tackles and two sacks in 13 games as a freshman, and is considered a very consistent performer. He will be backed up by **Patrick McGowan (6-4, 240, So.)**.

DEFENSIVE ENDS

In what clearly ranks as Furman's biggest question mark entering the 1990 season, the Paladins face the unenviable task of finding replacements for graduated All-America defensive ends Kelly Fletcher and Chris Roper.

Known as "The Furman Bookends",



A strong, compact player and All-Southern Conference choice a year ago, junior nose guard Allen Edwards should help Furman's defense remain among the nation's best this fall.

Roper and Fletcher ranked as two of the best defensive ends to ever wear the purple and white. Between them a year ago the duo accounted for 300 tackles, 25 tackles-for-loss, 23 sacks, two interceptions, and six pass deflections. On top of that the two were GTE first team Academic All-America picks and thinkers on the field whose instincts were among their most impressive attributes as players. A consensus All-America pick last year and Furman's all-time leader in quarterback sacks (35.5), Fletcher was named Southern Conference Defensive Player-of-the-Year and South Carolina Defensive Player-of-the-Year in 1989. Roper, the recipient of all-conference, all-state, and **Football News** All-America honors last year, was also awarded a prestigious NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship and will enroll in Duke University's school of nuclear physics this fall.

Expected to step in for Fletcher at the rush end position is **Mike Bobrov-**

sky (6-4, 222, Sr.), who last year totaled 21 tackles and a quarterback sack in 14 games. **Craig Morris (6-1, 221, Jr.)** is slated as Bobrovsky's backup this fall.

At drop end **Corey Holden (6-3, 217, Jr.)**, a two-year letterman, will join the starting lineup after leading Furman with four fumble recoveries a year ago. A special teams stalwart the last two seasons, Holden also notched 27 tackles in 1989. **Venton Bell (6-3, 208, Jr.)** emerged from spring practice as Holden's reserve at drop end.

LINEBACKERS

Just as at quarterback, Furman has developed a tradition of producing some of the league's best linebackers, having fielded ten first team All-Southern Conference and four All-America linebackers since 1980. That tradition will more than likely grow this year with the return of starters **Kevin Kendrick (6-0, 202, Sr.)** and **Kota Suttle (6-2, 216, So.)**.



A three-year starter, senior linebacker Kevin Kendrick ranks second on the school's all-time tackle charts with 395 stops.

Entering his third season as a starter, Kevin Kendrick, the Paladins' weakside linebacker who last year earned first team all-conference honors, sports more game experience than any player in the Furman program. Small but quick, Kendrick has registered 395 tackles in his career and now ranks second on the school's all-time tackle charts behind former great Jeff Blankenship. Equally adept at playing the run and pass, the veteran Paladin linebacker is considered a big key to Furman's 1990 campaign.

Named along with Carl Tremble as Furman's Freshman-of-the-Year in 1989, Kota Suttle gives the Paladins another excellent tackler with outstanding range and quickness. A year

ago Suttle started in every game and paced Furman in tackles with 180. Forced to sit out spring practice with a broken nose, Suttle in terms of overall ability has the potential to be one of the school's all-time bests according to the Furman coaching staff.

Over the past two years Furman counted little experienced depth in its linebacking corps. The situation may be somewhat improved this year with the return of **Steve Norris (6-2, 205, Jr.)** and **Bill Ballard (6-1, 212, Jr.)**, both of whom saw ample playing time a year ago.

SECONDARY

A direct beneficiary of a strong pass rush that over the last two seasons tallied 97 quarterback sacks, the Furman secondary was touched by graduation, losing All-Southern Conference cornerback Pat Turner and free safety William Hall. There appears, however, to be enough returning talent and experience to enable the Paladin defensive backfield to overcome the loss and remain strong this fall.

At left cornerback a battle is being waged between **Dan Smallwood (5-8, 180, Sr.)** and **Jason Grant (6-0, 168, So.)** for the starting nod. Smallwood started in each of Furman's 14 games a year ago and totaled three interceptions and eight pass deflections. Credited with 12 tackles in his inaugural season, Grant moved into the picture as a potential starter following a solid spring practice.

Projected to step in for Pat Turner at right cornerback is either **Mike Jones (6-0, 183, Sr.)**, a two-year letterwinner, or the highly-regarded **Daryl Rogers (5-8, 175, So.)**, who last year

saw action as a reserve at strong safety. Veteran **Jerry Booker (5-10, 179, Sr.)** could also be a factor at cornerback if persistent back problems subside.

Taylor Quarles (5-10, 169, Jr.) is back at strong safety after an impressive sophomore season. Pushed into the starting lineup against Virginia Military, the hard-hitting Quarles responded by totaling 62 tackles and nine pass deflections in 11 starts a year ago. He will be backed up by **Jeff Coleman (5-10, 195, So.)**, another one of Furman's fine, young defensive back prospects.

The departure of three-year starter William Hall will make room for **Ivan Johnson (6-1, 194, Jr.)** at free safety. Johnson, who sat out last year for disciplinary reasons, saw extensive action at strong safety in Furman's 1988 national championship season, recording 33 tackles and three pass deflections. **Mike Ratcliff (6-1, 200, Jr.)** gives Furman an experienced, quality backup at free safety.

SPECIALISTS

Although Furman lost its all-time kick scoring leader Mike Wood (225 points) to graduation, the Paladins return two of their three principal special teams players in punter **Bruce Leicht (6-2, 168, Jr.)** and placekicker **Glen Connally (6-3, 205, Sr.)**.

Leicht, a 1988 second team All-Southern Conference pick, started slow a year ago but came on strong to finish third in the conference in punting with a 38.8 yards per kick average. Connally, meanwhile, is hoping to bounce back from a disappointing junior season that saw him convert on just 12-of-21 field goal attempts. In addition to field goal chores, he will also be looked to for extra point duty, which Wood handled a year ago.

The team's top long snapper, **Alden Milam (6-3, 180, Jr.)** is back after a flawless season of work in 1989, and Furman has two quality, experienced holders returning in flanker **Brad Stephens (5-8, 159, Sr.)** and strong safety **Ivan Johnson (6-1, 194, Jr.)**.

Although subject to change in pre-season camp, the Paladins have an effective punt return specialist in **Don Clardy (5-11, 176, Sr.)** and kickoff return man in **Daryl Rogers (5-8, 175, So.)**. Clardy averaged a solid 7.8 yards per return on 24 attempts a year ago, and Rogers, who possesses excellent speed, tallied 23.0 yards per return on 20 kickoff return attempts in 1989.

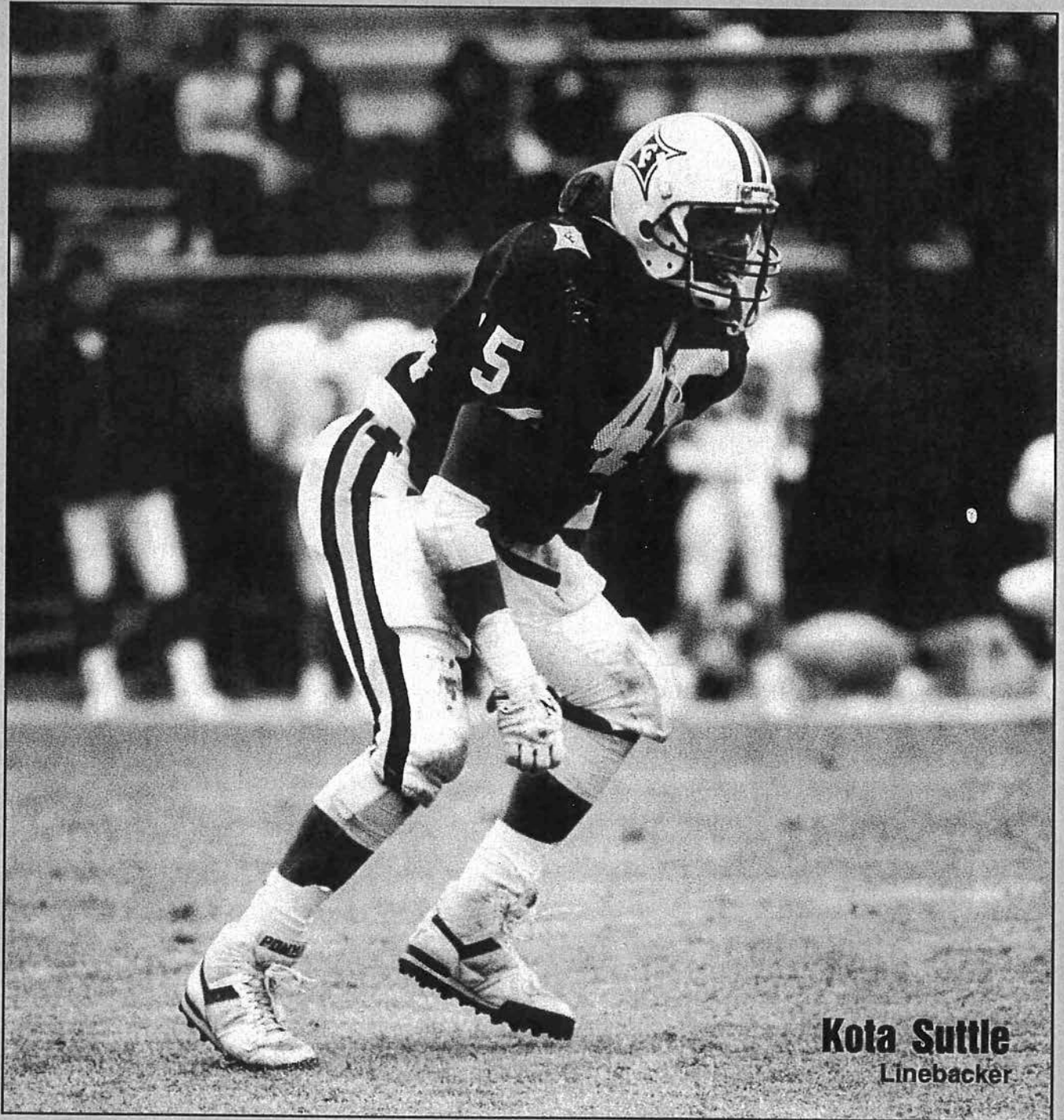
