**DR. JOHN L.
PLYLER
PRESIDENT**

Dr. John Laney Plyler, Furman's President for twenty-three years, is an enthusiastic basketball fan. He has known personally virtually every member of the Furman basketball teams during his Presidency.

Dr. Plyler's leadership has been chiefly responsible for the movement of the University to a new \$22,000,000 campus. Included on the campus is a new gymnasium which is far superior to the former athletic and physical education plant. Although the campus is not yet complete, the impressive buildings already standing are symbols of Dr. Plyler's accomplishments during his tenure.

Dr. Plyler was graduated from Furman in 1913. He was a teacher and an athletic coach at Greenville High for three years. During World War I he served his country as an officer in the army.

After the war Dr. Plyler earned the LL.B. degree at Harvard University and began the practice of law in Greenville. He was chosen Judge of the Greenville County Court in 1935. After he had been re-elected for a second term, friends persuaded him to accept the position of President of Furman University.

In 1939 Dr. Plyler was awarded the L.L.D. degree by Erskine College and in 1953 by Wofford College. He was awarded the Litt. D. degree in 1954 by Furman University. Dr. Plyler served as President of the South Carolina Association of Colleges in 1951-52. In April, 1959, he was elected President of the Southern University Conference.

Dr. Plyler is interested in all intercollegiate and intramural athletics. He is convinced of the immense value of competitive sports in the overall development of college students and under his capable leadership Furman is conducting a sound and well-rounded program of athletics.



LYLES ALLEY

Director Of Athletics

The name Lyles Alley has become synonymous with championship basketball for the past fifteen years and now as he approaches the sixteenth season as head coach at Furman, the cage experts feel he may be fielding another giant-killing team.

Coach Alley begins his sixth season as Director of Athletics and Paladin Club executive in February, 1962. The congenial head of Furman's intercollegiate athletic program became head coach for the first season after World War II, 1945-46. He has coached every season since then except the one of 1949-50, when he was on leave of absence to get his master's degree at Columbia University.

Alley's teams have won 192 games, lost 183 in the past fifteen years. Three successive times his teams were the national major college scoring champions, setting records each year. The most famed seasons were 1953 through 1956. In '53 the Paladins set their first scoring record. In 1954 his star, Frank Selvy was named the college player of the year and in 1955 Darrell Floyd made the first team associated press All-America two consecutive years.

Climaxing the 1956 season was Alley's selection as coach of the East Team in the East-West Shrine game at Kansas City. Other highlights have been the naming of his 1951-52 team as the best improved in the nation and recipient of the U. S. Rubber Company award for that honor.

Before coming to Furman as a coach, he coached textile and high school sports in the Greenville area, was basketball coach at Miami Senior High and was a lieutenant in the Navy during World War II.

Coach Alley was graduated from Furman in 1933, after winning a total of 12 letters in football, basketball, baseball and track. He was named the most valuable player of the Furman football team his senior year.

His attractive wife, Jackie, daughter Judy, 17 and son Buster, now a sophomore at Furman, are faithful Paladin followers who will be watching with keen interest the forthcoming exciting 1962 campaign.



FURMAN HISTORY

Furman University traces its origin to "The Furman Academy and Theological Institution," authorized in 1825 by the South Carolina State Baptist Convention. The new institution, organized in 1826, opened its doors in Edgefield in 1827. Inspiration for its establishment came primarily from Dr. Richard Furman, under whose leadership the State Baptist Convention was organized in 1821 with a seminary of learning as a major objective.

The South's oldest Baptist institution of higher learning, Furman has been operated by the South Carolina Baptist Convention since its beginning and now receives substantial financial support from the Convention both for current operations and for building needs. A board of 25 Trustees, named five each year by the Convention for five-year terms, governs the institution.

Dr. James Clement Furman, son of Dr. Richard Furman, was elected in 1844 to the position of senior professor, a post similar to that of president. His coming brought more vigor and a larger vision to the institution. Courses were arranged to cover three years and the name changed to "The Furman Theological Seminary."

In 1850 the State Convention authorized the Furman removal to Greenville from Winnsboro with the institution chartered as "The Furman University." Greenville was then a small town of about 1,300 people. A wooded hill overlooking the town became the campus site—a location which would be surrounded by dense business and residential areas in less than a century.

Dr. James C. Furman became in 1859 the first man to hold the title of President of the University. His administration was interrupted as the University closed from 1862 until 1866 because of the War Between The States.

Presidents in addition to Dr. Furman have been Dr. Charles Manly, Dr. A. P. Montague, Dr. E. M. Poteat, Dr. W. J. McGlothlin, Dr. B. E. Geer, and Dr. John L. Plyler. President Plyler, who began his duties in 1939, has served longer as president than any predecessors except Dr. Furman.

In 1950 the Trustees purchased a tract of land five miles north of downtown Greenville. Construction began on the new campus in October, 1954. When completed, this campus will include more than 20 major buildings and will enable the University to serve at least 2,000 students. The new campus occupies a beautifully designed area on a 1,200 acre tract owned by the University.

"A Greater Furman of a Greater Tomorrow" expresses a current aim deeply rooted in the performance of the past. History repeats itself in the progress of Furman through an ever-increasing service.

PREVIEW

BY LYLES ALLEY

The prospects for this year are encouraging. Tom Conard is the only graduating senior. However, Jerry Smith, Gerald Glur, Randy Blackwell, John Vickers and Charlie Jennings will return as juniors. Jerry Smith won all conference honors and led the team in scoring with a 22.6 average. John Vickers played well in the tournament and may develop into the big rebounder and scorer that we need at center. If Glur improves on his scoring and continues to improve on his fine rebounding and defensive ability, he will be a tremendous asset.

John Lemmond, a 6'7" center from Charlotte, N. C., looks promising and will give Vickers a real battle for the starting position. Leroy Peacock, a 5'9" guard from Morristown, New Jersey, is a good shooter and ball handler. He will give us added strength at guard and might win a regular place. David Selvy is a good shooter but needs to improve on his ball handling and defensive play. He plays forward and guard.

We have as much potential in the personnel returning as we did when Frank Selvy and Nield Gordon led the returnees in 1953.

All-Southern Conference Jerry Smith is back as a junior and along with Gerald Glur, appear as the most likely starters this early in pre-season practice predictions. Glur led the Paladins in rebounds the past season with 328 (12.6 per game) with Smith was the big gun offensively with 589 points for the year (22.6).

Smith and Glur at forwards, John Vickers (6-7, 195) and John Lemmond (6-7, 210) the two center candidates and Charles Jennings, Randy Blackwell and Bobby Pinson, all guard lettermen, have to be considered for starting roles despite the fine group of talented sophs and one transfer student who have designs on a varsity uniform.

The big battle for center is definitely between two "Big Johns", letterman Vickers a junior from Richmond, Kentucky and sophomore John Lemmond, a strapping youngster from Charlotte, North Carolina. Vickers appears the most likely to be in the starting lineup for Furman's opener December 2 against East Tennessee but Lemmond has been pushing hard in practice, especially his rebound action.

Veteran Bobby Pinson, Furman's "lonesome guard" in the '60-'61 campaign, ball-hawk Charlie Jennings and the silent, steady Randy Blackwell will be keeping a wary eye on sophomore Leroy Peacock, a talented prospect from Moorestown, New Jersey. Peacock was one of the standouts on the frosh team last year and cannot be counted this year as a possible starter at guard.

Furman, defending champions in the Poinsettia Classic (Greenville, December 29, 30) will play another representative Southern Conference schedule meeting West Virginia for their first conference foe and ending the season against the Mountaineers.

Furman's shining sophomore whizzed the Paladins in individual scoring, was high scorer in 17 games and topped players of both teams in 13 tilts. His best scoring efforts came in both West Virginia games and the final test against VPI. Smith was high man for both teams in the first game at Morgantown with 33, tallied 32 in the return match, also high for all players. He was the man with the mostest in the final game of the season, Virginia Tech, with 30.

In single-game records Smith led in free throws scored with 14 against West Virginia (January 30) and total points scored: West Virginia (January 8) with 33 and tied with center Tom Conard in most field goals scored: Smith had 12 of 14 against West Virginia on January 8. Jerry was second in rebounding on the Furman

club with 253 (10.1 avg.) . . . One of the better free throw specialists, he got off to a sizzling start with a total of 49 out of 56 in the first six games of the season and a sharp pct. figure of 87.5. Against Georgia Tech he had a perfect night with 12 for 12 and in the first Davidson game he swished 7 for 7. He finished the year with 189 of 242 and 78.1 from the charity line.

JERRY SMITH, KENTUCKY THOROUGHBRED

"All the thoroughbreds from Kentucky are not race horses," explains veteran Furman basketball coach Lyles Alley when All-Conference star Jerry Smith is discussed.

"If I were permitted a few definitions of the word, Jerry certainly has the grace, elegance and I might add, some of the high-spiritedness characteristic of thoroughbreds."

Smith, a 6-2 185 pound junior (offensive guard, defensive forward) from Corbin, Kentucky, has been likened to another Furman great of yesteryear, the fabulous Frank Selvy, also from Corbin. Oldtimers who shared in the success story of Selvy (All-American 1954 . . . First Team unanimous choice all wire services, 1953, consensus second team All-America) say it is too early for a comparison of the two and Smith himself shies away from any talk with even the faintest hint of All-anything.

Jerry finished third in scoring last season in the Southern loop and bids to be in the select circle of All-Conference stars again in the 1961-62 race.

His hard-driving style often gets him into trouble under the hoop but Jerry loves the close in play and will twist through a maze of arms and legs for many of his two-pointers. In start contrast, Jerry will bang away from the 30-foot mark with equal devastation. "About all he needs is a soft jumper at the lane," muses Alley, "but even around the key he is very smooth."

The aggressiveness, scoring ability and defensive talents make Jerry Smith one of the prize Paladins in the Furman fold this season.

A new and prosperous era has begun for Furman basketball . . . and there is something about Jerry Smith remindful of another Corbin, Kentucky youngster that has excited Furman fans as no player has since the days of Fabulous Frank.

One of the most promising basketball players at Furman since the days of Frank Selvy and Darrell Floyd, Jerry Smith is well on his way to a prominent position in the annals of Furman cage history.

Like his All-American predecessors, Smith is not only a great shooter but has proven his worth as an all-round player of unusual and gifted ability. Jerry has lived up to advance press notices with a sizzling scoring drive that has netted 426 points in 19 games and a 22.4 average. He is averaging 10.7 rebounds per game and has been the spark-plug of the Paladin offense, driving for the bucket relentlessly throughout a game. Smith is a fierce competitor as his opponents will attest and two of his best performances came against West Virginia. The two outings against the Mountaineers were his best games of the season. At Morgantown January 7 Smith scored 33 points, his single-game high of the year and against the Blue and Gold at Greenville January 30 he came up with another stellar performance, garnering 32 points.

Veteran Coach Lyles Alley, who fondly recalls the days when another Corbin, Kentucky youngster was gracing the Furman boards, calls Smith "a great asset to a team, a scoring threat anywhere on the floor, a good defensive man and a keen competitor."

We feel Jerry Smith is deserving of your vote in the All-Southern Conference balloting for the 1960-61 season.

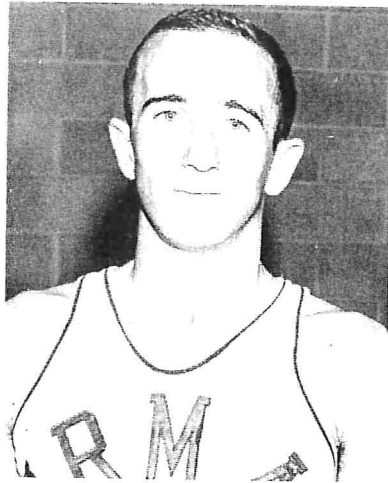

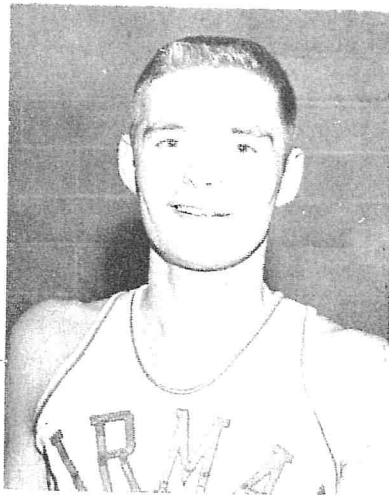


PROFILES 1961 - 62



(30) **BILLY TURRENTINE**, guard, 6-1, 170, junior, 20, Greenville, S. C.

Billy is one of the hardest workers on the squad who earned a spot on the Paladin frosh his first year. He played relatively little high school basketball and has come a long way. He will be used mainly on zone presses and man-to-man presses.



(34) **PAUL GOBEL**, guard, 6-0, 170, senior, 22, Chicago Heights, Illinois

Transfer from Lake Forest College, Lake Forest, Illinois. Would play a lot of basketball except for the fact that he is a senior and has not had any college experience except for a half semester last year. He became eligible in the second semester and appeared in only five games. A good practice player who gives one hundred per cent during the strenuous hours of daily workouts. Will be a front line replacement for either guard which will strengthen that department.

(35) **LES HEICHER**, forward, 6-3, 175, sophomore, 19, Bladensburg, Maryland
 High school coach was former Furman player, Allan Kyber. Was a member of Bladensburg High School State Championship team. Has the potential to be a fine basketball player with good speed, a fine shooter and rebounder. Could play either forward or guard on Paladin offense. Physical education major who hopes to enter the coaching profession.

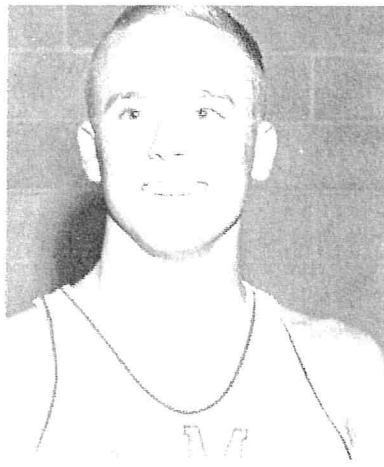


(40) **CHARLIE JENNINGS**, guard, 5-10, 160, sophomore, Columbia, S. C.
 A year ago as a frosh, Jennings was hardly considered among the top prospects which included Smith and Glur, Kentucky aces. Charlie lost out early this season, sidelined by an ankle injury and was not a starter as of December 1. He came on strong, shook off the injury and has proved to be one of the best defensive ball players on the club. In the last game before the semester exam "break" Jennings got his first starting assignment in the Citadel game. He held Cadet Dick Jones to six points in the first half. In the Poinsettia Classic final against the Bulldogs, Jennings cooled Jones in a terrific defensive job, allowing the blue and white guard just one field goal. The 5-10 soph is the ball-hawk of the team, appeared in 22 games—42.3 on FG shooting, connected on 17 of 29 from the free throw line for 58.6.



(41) **DAVID SELVY**, guard, 6-2, 175, sophomore, 19, Corbin, Kentucky
 Brother of Furman All-American Frank Selvy who has a lot of the characteristics and mannerisms of his brother. Was second leading scorer on the freshman team and second leading rebounder. Played forward and center in high school and was used as a guard last year. Will be used both as a forward and guard on this year's varsity team. One of the best shooters on the team from anywhere on the floor but needs to improve his ball handling to become a complete all-round performer. Selvy was a much sought after college prospect after winning regional honors in Kentucky. Ambition has always been to attend Furman and to follow in the footsteps of his brother Frank. Has the ability, attitude and desire to do so. David comes from a basketball playing family in Corbin and has two younger brothers eager to carry on the Selvy tradition in the sport.





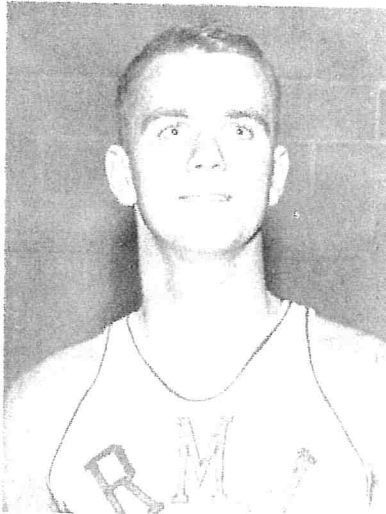
(42) **RANDY BLACKWELL**, guard, 6-2, 170, sophomore, 19, Greensboro, N. C.

Pre-season forecast on Blackwell had him pegged as the best percentage shooter on the team. He almost came through for the experts and for a time, was shooting around the 50 percent mark. A steady, unexcitable player, Randy played in 23 games, was a starter most of the season. In double figures six games—123 points for the year (5.3)—42.4 FG percentage and he hit 17 of 23 from the free throw line for a 73.9 pct. Showed steady improvement on defense and can be counted on to stay calm and unruffled during the most critical situation. Nice soft jump shot, effective from the corner or top of key.



(43) **LEROY PEACOCK**, guard, 5-10, 160 sophomore, 19, Maple Shade, New Jersey

One of the most exciting little men to attend Furman in many a year. Will probably be starting guard with veteran Bobby Pinson. Has a tremendous outside jump shot and will drive to the basket when opportunity arrives. Led freshman team in scoring and on occasions had forty points plus nights. Has good speed and a real hustler who prides himself on his defense. A good man who can lead the fast break either as the middle man or layup man from the side. If he can overcome his moodiness, will be one of Furman's better cagers. Very popular among his team-mates and a good student. Played on two state championship teams in New Jersey and one runner-up team. Was All-State New Jersey his senior year at Moorestown High.

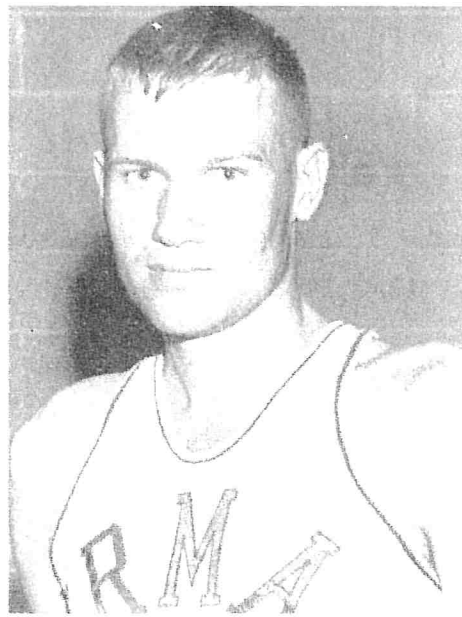


(45) **BOBBY PINSON**, guard, 6-1, 180, senior, 21, Henderson, Ky.

Against Wofford College, December 10, Pinson was unveiled as Furman's "lonesome guard" of the 1960-61 season. A regular last year, Pinson for the second consecutive campaign, played in all season contests. Improved his FG percentage and scoring total as well, this year. Shot 9.8 in the '59-'60 year with 244 point total. Final stats of the present season show Pinson with 250 points (10.2) with the highest field goal percentage on the team — 51.9. He hit 101 in 196 attempts. The only holdover at guard from the previous season, Pinson has been a tried and true performer. . . . was leading scorer in the championship game against The Citadel in the Poinsettia Classic.

(51) **DON FRYE**, forward, 6-4, 185, sophomore, 20, Monticello, Kentucky

Was the number two ranked high school player from the state of Kentucky during the year of 1959. Was All-State, All-Tournament, and captain of Monticello's runnerup State Championship team. Will be eligible second semester and could move into a starting forward position. A tremendous defensive player, a good shooter, driver, not fast but quickness will fool many an opponent. Another one of the real fine basketball prospects on the way up, in contention for varsity action this year and will give the Paladins much more strength for the stretch drive to the conference tournament.



(52) **BOB HILL**, forward, 6-5, 210, sophomore, 19, Opelika, Alabama

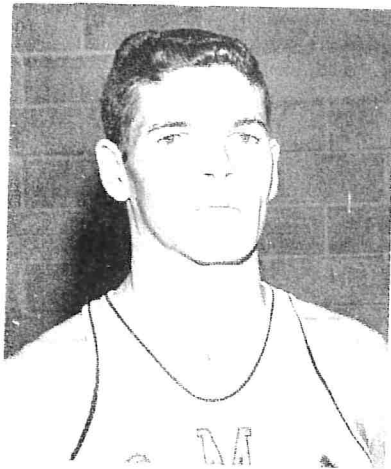
Was one of the outstanding high school prepsters in the state of Alabama, both in football and basketball. Father, Bert Hill, was one of the all-time great athletes of Duke University and a member of Coach Alley's Southern Textile Championship team. Bob is a pre-med student and a member of SAE fraternity. Was starting forward on freshman team and used his height and weight to good advantage. A big rough boy who could play an important role as a front line reserve.



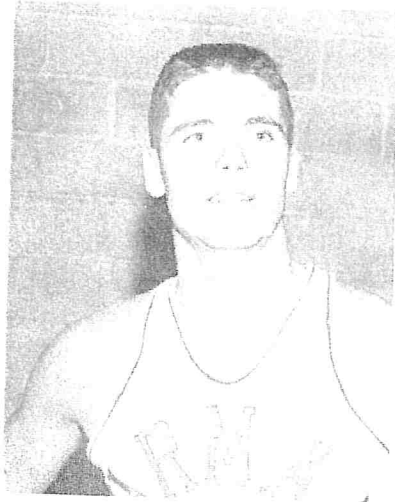
(53) **JOHN VICKERS**, center, 6-7, 200, junior, 20, Richmond, Ky.

Improved as a sophomore and will be starting center. Had 47.7 shooting average from floor and 63 rebounds for first year's varsity season. Appeared in twenty of the twenty-six games during the 1960-61 campaign. Has tremendous attitude and desire, the type of player every coach enjoys working with. Came of age during the William and Mary game in the Southern Conference tournament last March when Gerald Glur was sidelined with fouls. If he can duplicate performance game by game this year Furman will be improved at the all-important center position. Has improved his defense, a good jump shooter and has a fine hook shot. . . . from both left or right hand side. Won letter as a sophomore. . . .





(54) **JOHN LEMMOND**, center, 6-7, 205, sophomore, 19, Charlotte, N. C. Big, strong, perfect build for college center and needs only experience to be a great basketball player. Chris Smith of VPI, All-Conference center, said of Lemmond, "The best looking freshman center he had seen this past season." Smith saw Lemmond in action during the VPI-Furman preliminary at Greenville last February. Lemmond will alternate at center with Vickers which will give Furman two big centers, an important depth factor, this year. Two rangy centers will give Furman a stronger position in the coming season. Lemmond was the leading rebounder on the frosh team last year, averaging close to twenty per game. One of his best games was against Anderson Junior College when he grabbed thirty rebounds.



(55) **GERALD GLUR**, forward, 6-5, 200, sophomore, 19, Louisville, Ky. If there ever was a potentially great Paladin in the making, it is Gerald Glur, the raw-boned Louisville soph who looked better with each passing game. Averaged 20 points and 22 rebounds per game as a frosh and lived up to advance predictions that he could out-rebound taller players. . . . led the team in this department with 323 for the year for an average of 12.9 per game. One of his most sensational nights came in the second game against South Carolina. Glur did everything but referee the game, pulling down rebounds from both boards, stealing the ball, driving for layups (he was the leading scorer with 22) in a crowd-pleasing performance when he was definitely the best man on the court. His competitive spirit and even-tempered disposition make him a real "clutch" player. Glur was the third highest scorer this year with 266, an average of 10.6 per game. He had a 58.4 FT pct. and filled the basket 107 times in 232 tries.

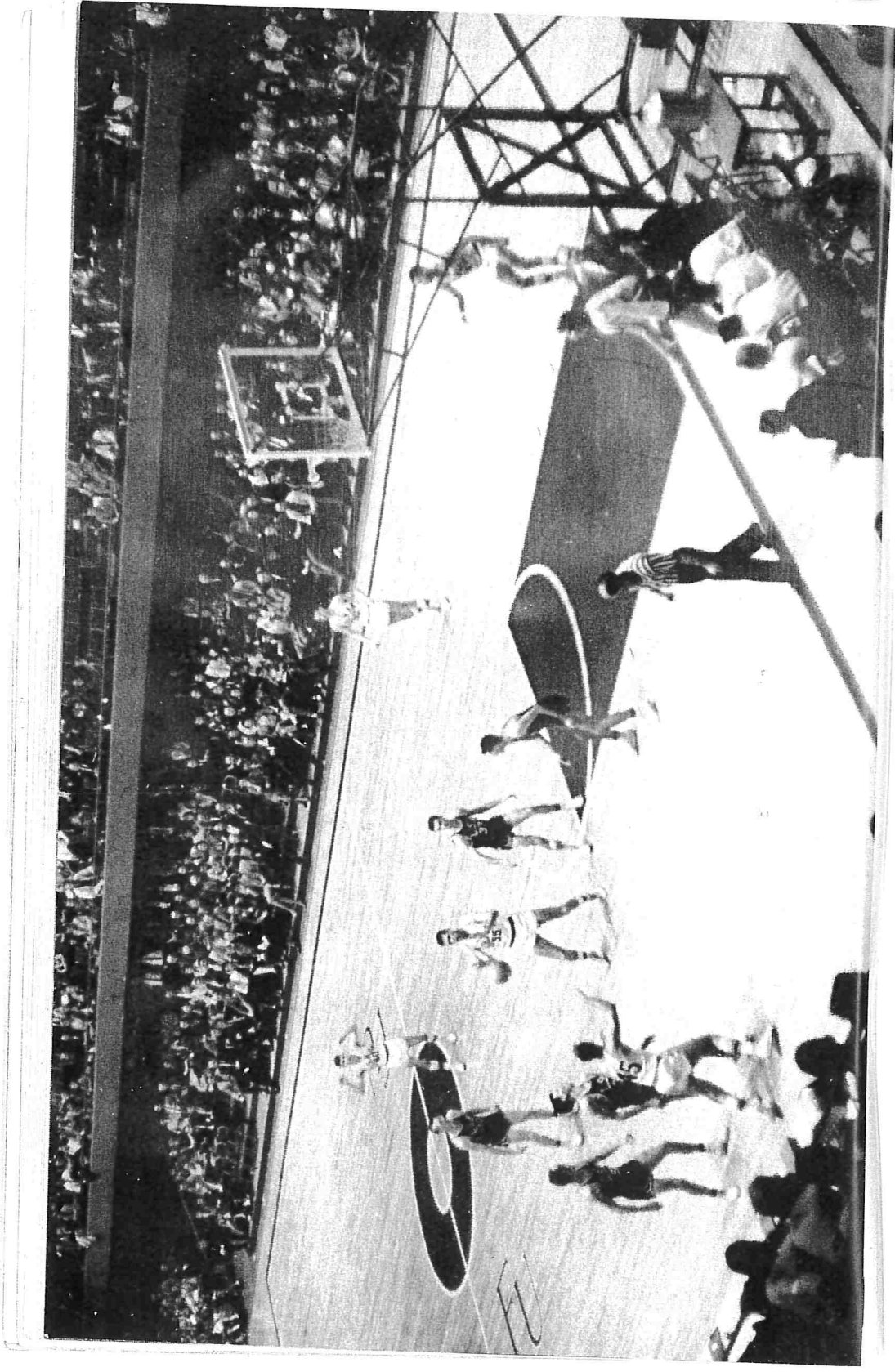

POINSETTIA CLASSIC

Defending champions Furman, winners of the second annual Poinsettia Classic last year, host another fine field this winter which includes Georgia Tech, Clemson and Arkansas.

This young tournament, rapidly gaining recognition and prestige, enjoyed a successful staging last year under the capable guidance and direction of Harry Coggins, chairman of the Sports Committee of the Greenville Chamber of Commerce, under whose sponsorship many of the outstanding teams in the country have appeared in Greenville in the past.

The tournament will be played in the imposing Greenville Memorial Auditorium, a 6,000 capacity (for basketball) arena which opened its doors for the first time in 1958.

In last year's Poinsettia, Greenville Auditorium fans witnessed a three-overtime LSU-Furman game the first night, then had to do it all over again in the championship round when the Paladins went into a double overtime to take the title over The Citadel, 62-56. The LSU heart-stopper was 56-55.

The addition of Georgia Tech, one of the perennial contenders in the Southeastern Conference and Arkansas, for years a power in the Southwest, gives this year's Poinsettia representation from two of the respected basketball regions in the country.

FURMAN'S MODERN HISTORY



Furman's postwar basketball teams have been noted for their scoring ability and their super individual stars, and few persons are acquainted with the fact that the Paladins, in the meantime, have won 203 games playing in one of the country's toughest leagues.

In the 16 seasons since World War Two, Furman has won 203 collegiate games and lost 192. Lyles Alley has coached all of the teams but one. During the 1949-50 season, Alley was on leave of absence and Melvin Bell coached the team. The record that year was 9 victories and 12 defeats. During the seasons Alley has coached, the team record was 194 victories, 180 losses.

Furman was the NCAA major college scoring champion in 1953 (90.2) in 1954 (91.7) and 1955 (95.3). Each of those records, at the time, were all time collegiate scoring records. Morehead State set a record of 95.9 in 1956 that still stands.

Furman has been to the Southern Conference Tournament ten times, having to win a berth each year. Furman's highest finish in the conference was second in 1954.

FRANK SELVY

Frank Selvy was swept under the national limelight in the 1952-53 season when he averaged 29.5 points a game to become the greatest scorer of all the major college basketball players. This was in his junior year, his second season on a varsity basketball team.

For the three years as a varsity player, his average per game was 32.5. In his senior year, he was All-American in everybody's books: Associated Press, United Press, INS, NEA, and Collier's. Selvy made All-Conference and All-State each year he played. He was All-Tournament and played with the East in the annual East-West game.

For Frank Selvy and Furman University, the year 1953-54 was a golden season. The final mark was 20-9. The Paladins won twelve and lost none in the state.

When Frank Selvy graduated from Furman he owned 22 national records. That final year he scored at a 41.7 pace, one that has not been matched. He scored 50 or more points on eight occasions and had 2,538 points in three years.

DARRELL FLOYD

Named to the 1955 first team All-America of Associated Press and Helms Foundation. Named on second team All-America of United Press. Selected as Southern Conference Basketball Player of the Year and Southern Conference Athlete of the Year.

As a junior he averaged 35.9 points per game, the second highest average ever posted, exceeded only by the 41.7 average of his 1953-54 teammate, Frank Selvy.

Of the top 17 individual scoring performances in major college basketball history, Floyd has given three. His 67 points against Morehead State, 56 against Clemson and 53 against William and Mary, all during 1955, rank third, 12th and 17th.

Senior year, 1956, Floyd was 1st team All-America AP, UP, Helms Hall, Converse Yearbook; 2nd Team All-America Colliers.

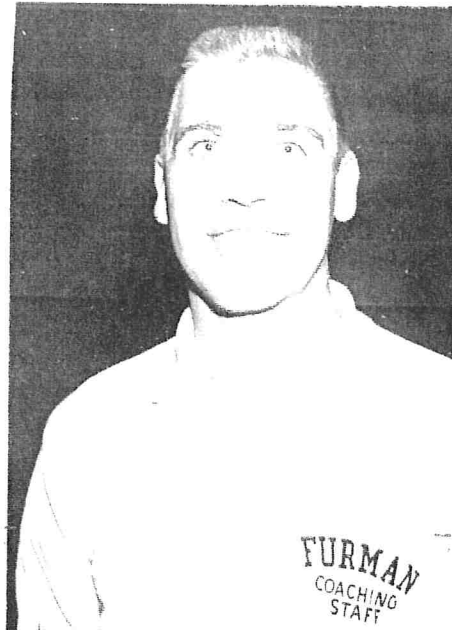


FRESHMAN OUTLOOK

NEW RULES 1961-62

Three new rules will be in effect when the college basketball season opens.

The changes were recommended by the National Association of Basketball Coaches and adopted by the National Basketball Committee of the U. S. and Canada, last March.

They will:

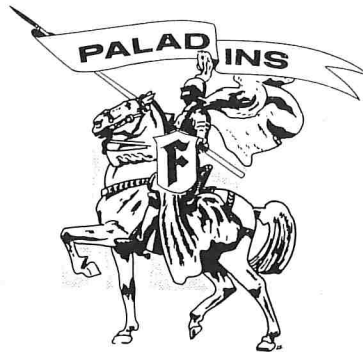
1. Eliminate free throws when a foul is called against a player on offense and in control of the ball. The fouled team will be given possession of the ball out of bounds as is now done in the professional leagues.

2. Stop the clock after every violation in order to give coaches greater opportunity to make substitutions. A substitute can enter the game on any violation as long as he is at the scorer's table ready to enter the game. A player cannot come off the bench and on to the playing floor as has been the procedure in the past. The timer will sound the horn, the referee will stop the clock and signal for the player to enter the game.

In previous years, a substitute could enter only when there was a dead ball and the clock stopped.

3. Create a neutral and buffer zone along the free throw lane to separate the first and second players by a foot when they line up for free throws. The rule makers felt this would tend to lessen shoving.

In other changes, the Rules Committee legalized coaching from the sidelines but instructed officials to penalize coaches or players on the bench who persist in stomping, tossing towels or committing other acts considered unsportsmanlike. Referees are reminded they may also clear the bench, if deemed necessary.



The Furman basketball team, named "Paladins" by the late J. Carter (Scoop) Latimer, former sports editor of the Greenville News, was the only athletic organization bearing that name until the faculty and trustees approved the idea unanimously giving all varsity and freshmen athletic squads the identical name beginning with the fall football season of 1961.

The Furman Paladins will have the shooting power and if the rebound strength improves as the season progresses, the purple and white will be in the race for more top honors in '61-62.
