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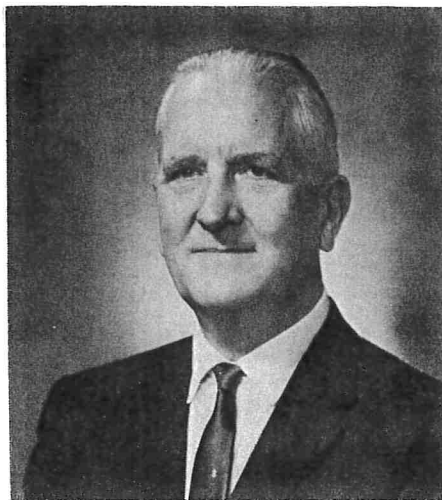
## **DR. JOHN L. PLYLER, President**

Dr. John L. Plyler, Furman University's president since 1939, is now in his 25th year. His term of office has been marked by tremendous physical and academic growth on the Furman campus. He has been president longer than any of his predecessors.

Dr. Plyler's leadership has been largely responsible for Furman's being on a new multi-million dollar campus. Founded in 1826, Furman has been located in Greenville, S. C., since 1851. When the cramped up-town campus became over-crowded, Furman's trustees and administration decided to move to a new location. A beautiful site just five miles from the heart of Greenville was chosen and in 1958 the campus of 1,200 acres was opened. The move was completed in 1960. Dr. Plyler has been instrumental in all this.

President Plyler's interest in athletics is well-known. He was graduated from Furman in 1913 and was a teacher and coach at Greenville High School for several years. He served as an officer in the U. S. Army and later earned his law degree at Harvard University. When named as Furman's president he was Greenville County judge.

Dr. Plyler is interested in Furman's total athletic program, both intercollegiate and intramural. Convinced of the value of competitive sports and athletic skills in the total development of the student, President Plyler is Furman's number one sports fan. Dr. Plyler, a former Furman baseball pitcher, and his family are at all Paladin sports events.



## **DR. GEORGE CHRISTENBERRY Administrative Director**

Dr. George A. Christenberry, Jr., is Furman University's administrative director. A Furman graduate of 1936, Dr. Christenberry, like President Plyler, is a native of Greenville County.

Dr. Christenberry is a veteran of the U. S. Navy and in the post World War II years was a professor of biology at Furman. Later he was named dean of men at Furman before going to Rome, Ga., as presi-

dent of Shorter College.

He returned to Furman as administrative director in 1958 and has been instrumental in the development of the campus and the University.

A former Furman football player, Dr. Christenberry is typical of the supporters on the Furman faculty and administration that Furman athletic teams boast. He is present, along with his family, at all sports events of the Paladins.



## HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY

Furman University is known everywhere as the oldest Baptist college in the South. This co-educational liberal arts university was founded in 1826 as The Furman Academy and Theological Institution, being authorized by the South Carolina Baptist Convention in 1825.

First home of the University was in Edgefield, S. C. Inspiration for its establishment came from a small group of patriotic and religious leaders of the South. One of these was Dr. Richard Furman for whom the school was named. Descendants of Dr. Furman have played active roles with the University ever since.

Furman has been operated by the S. C. Baptist Convention since its beginning and has grown into one of the foremost educational institutions of the nation. A board of 25 trustees, named five each year for five-year terms, governs the University.

Since that modest beginning, Furman has had several locations. But in 1851 Furman moved to Greenville and has been a part of the blossoming Piedmont city ever since. It was that year that Furman was chartered as The Furman University in a village of 1,300. Now Furman has 1,450 students and Greenville's suburban area includes nearly 200,000 inhabitants.

Owning two campuses in downtown Greenville in the 1940's and 1950's, the University found itself without growing space. Both sites were small and insufficient for growth. In 1950 the trustees purchased 1,200 acres near Paris Mountain five miles north of the city. In 1958 about half of the modern buildings, made with Virginia hand-made bricks in a modified-colonial architecture, were completed. In 1961 the move from the city was completed. Plans go on to complete the \$25,000,000 campus with the finest of educational facilities in the South.

## PREVIEWING THE PALADINS WITH COACH LYLES ALLEY

Our teams at Furman for the past few years have been noted for their speed and scoring ability. For several years during the 1950's the Paladins were national scoring champions and the average of 95.3 established in the 1954-55 season still ranks as one of the all-time highs among NCAA teams.

Basketball fans, though, have noted through the past two or three seasons a trend toward a slower type of basketball. The fast, high-scoring type game offers many thrills for the spectator, but it does not offer as much fundamental basketball. The slower, more deliberate game gives the spectator a chance to recognize good defense as well as good offense, and gives the opportunity to keep up with the action.

As all devoted basketball fans realize, the kind of basketball played by a team is dictated by the kind of players the coaches have to work with. This year at Furman we hope to be playing a slower, surer, better defensive kind of game. We are going to concentrate on making the good shot and being keen on defense. We believe we will have a better opportunity to win with this strategy.

Losing good scorers, rebounders, and all-around players like Jerry Smith, Gerald Glur, Randy Blackwell, and John Vickers would hurt any team. Therefore, we must take the players we have and adjust our offensive and defensive strategy.

The loss of Glur, Smith, and Vickers left us without any real rebounding strength. Center Jack Halford (6-7) got his share last year, but right now the only help he will have comes from 6-5 Norm Schaffer and 6-4 Don Frye. These boys will have to carry the load in that department since they are the biggest men.

Frye, a senior forward, is also being counted on to come through as a top scorer. Don scored at an average of 11.4 last season as a junior and he and Leroy Peacock should score a good many points for us. Leroy, a senior guard who is the leading returning scorer with an average last year of 14.3, had an operation on his bad knee and we hope he will be able to go full strength this season. If he can run as he used to, he will certainly be a top play-maker and point man.

Looking over the rest of the team, we are counting on David Selvy, David Blyler, Worth Oelschlager, Charlie Jennings, and Les Heicher to play many games for us. This group of boys sat out last season and we expect them to move in to challenge for starting positions on the team. Selvy, Jennings, and Heicher have played varsity basketball before, but Blyler and Oelschlager played only as freshmen two seasons ago. With concentration on ball-handling and defensive playing, all of them could help us.

Billy Turrentine, Pete Feil, and Wendell Lee are also scrapping for places on the team. Billy, a Greenville boy, is a senior, Feil is a sophomore, and Lee is a transfer from North Greenville Junior College.

Glancing over the Southern Conference race, we have to say that Furman is perhaps the only team that hasn't improved over last season. We anticipate tough games with all teams we play, and will do the best we can.

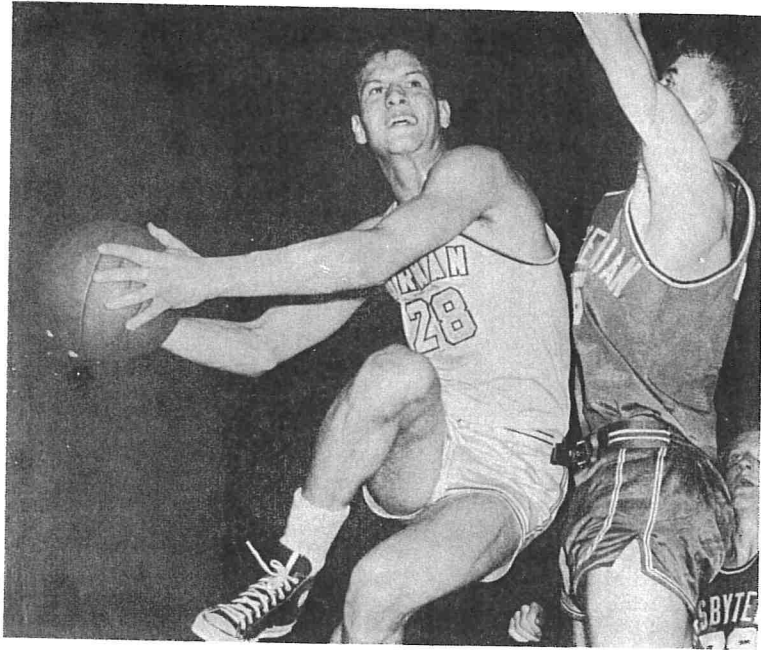

type game and good defensive playing that we used successfully a few years back.

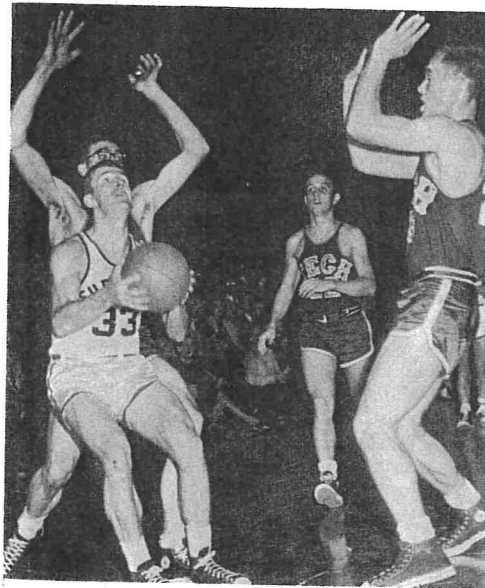

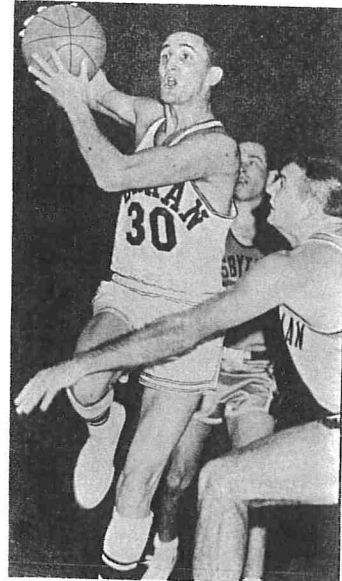

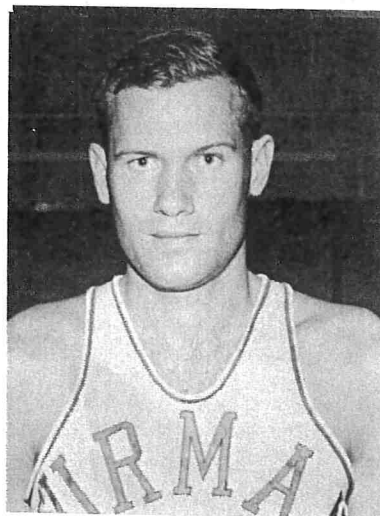

## PALADIN PROFILES

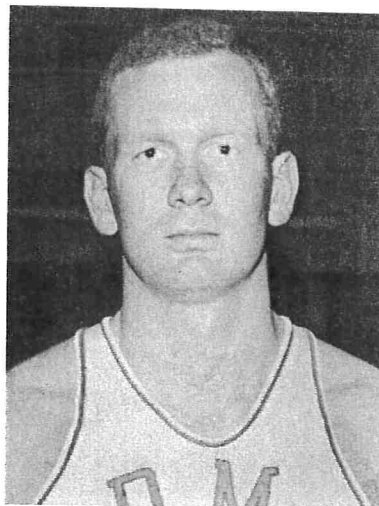
### DON FRYE

Don Frye is an easy-going forward, now in his senior year. Don scored 309 points for Furman last season, an average of 11.3 per game. He begins this season as one of Furman's true veterans, having started since he was a sophomore. Don also picked off 177 rebounds last season in 28 games, second only to Gerald Glur on the Paladin squad. Don stands 6-4, weighs 185, and his home is Monticello, Ky.



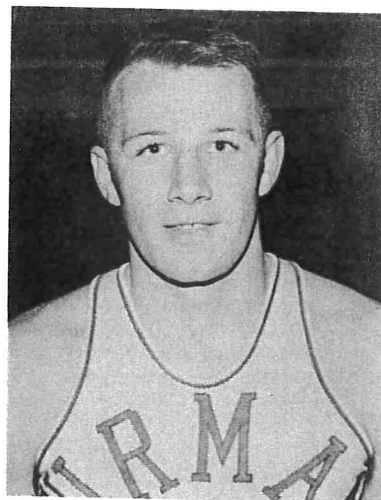
### JACK HALFORD

Senior center Jack Halford is Furman's tallest man at 6-7. He packs 205 pounds on his frame and can pack a mean wallop on the boards. This red-head scored some vital points for the Paladins last season, coming through with important goals particularly in the win over George Washington in the first round of the Southern Conference Tournament. Jack had 124 rebounds last season and is being counted on for more this year. He is from Columbia, S. C.



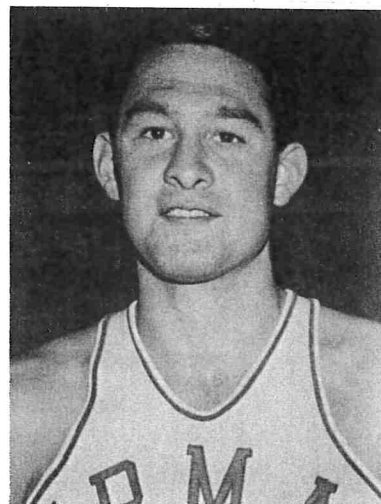
### LEROY PEACOCK

A quick, ball-hawking guard, Leroy Peacock served notice as a sophomore that he would play a lot of basketball for Furman. He has been a starter for two seasons already, and now as a senior, he is being counted on to be a play-maker and point-maker for the team. He averaged 14.3 points per game last season. He is fast and aggressive, and if an injured knee recovers sufficiently Leroy should have a fine year. He calls Maple Shade, N. J., his hometown.



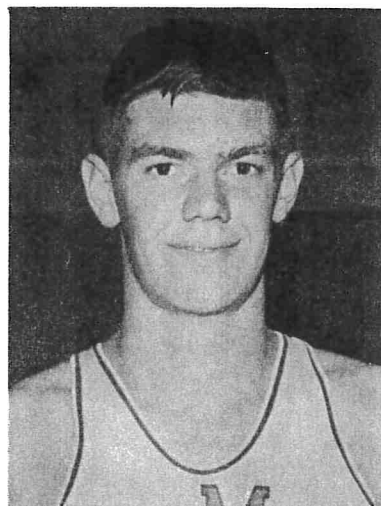
### DAVID BLYLER

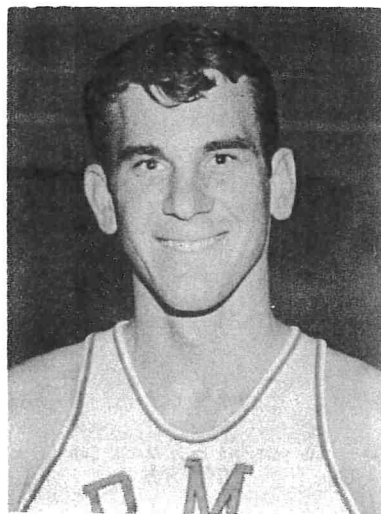
### PETE FEIL

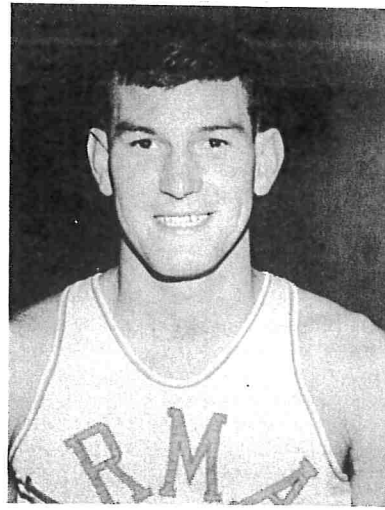
### LES HEICHER

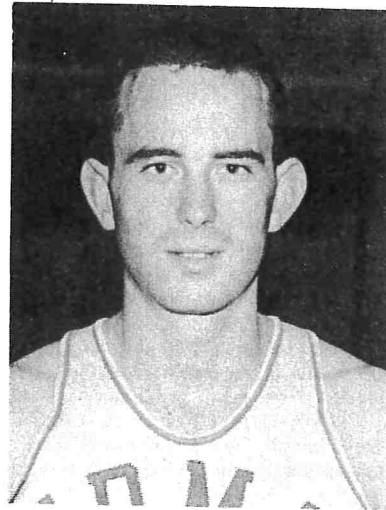
### CHARLIE JENNINGS

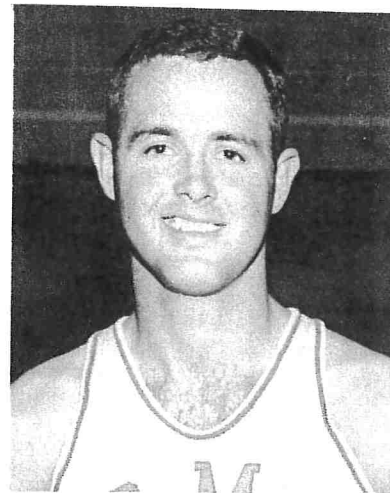
### WENDELL LEE

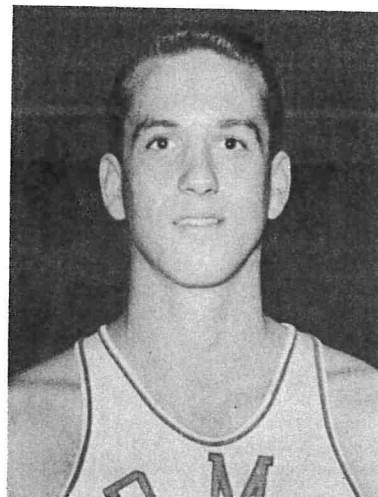
### WORTH OELSCHLAGER

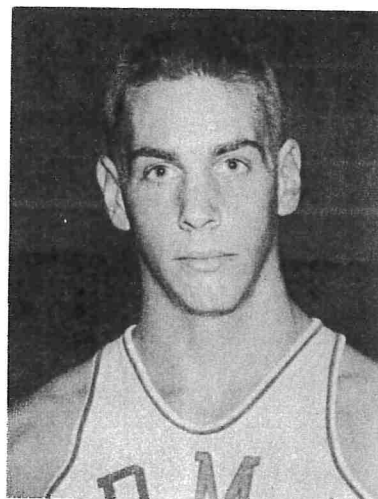
### DAVID SELVY

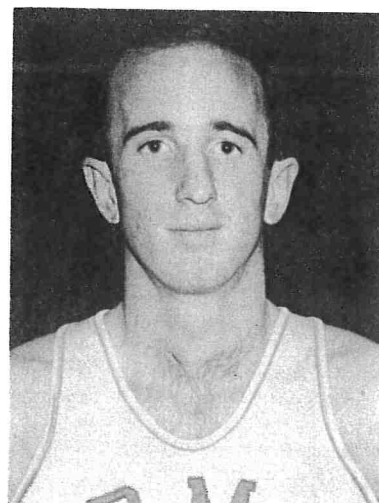
### NORMAN SCHAFFER

## SKETCHES OF THE OPPONENTS



### WEST VIRGINIA MOUNTAINEERS

West Virginia's Mountaineers begin the basketball season without an All-American for the first time in many seasons. The Mounties however, are still ranked at the top of the Southern Conference heap, and few people would be surprised to see them win the title again.

Coach George King lost four lettermen, but has good replacements in Ricky Ray (6-0), Buddy Quertinmont (6-3), Bill Ryczaj (6-6), and Mike Barger (6-4). Lettermen returning include Tom Lowry (6-8), Mike Wolfe (6-5), Bill Maphis (6-4), Marty Lentz (6-7), and Don Weir (6-0). The home court of the Mountaineers in Morgantown, W. Va., seats 6,000. School enrollment is 8,655, and school colors are Old Gold and Blue. Assistant coach is Bob Lochmueller. Athletic Director is Robert N. Brown. Located in Morgantown, W. Va.

### GEORGIA TECH YELLOW JACKETS

Georgia Tech's Yellow Jackets are likely to start a veteran lineup including Jim Caldwell (6-9), R. D. Craddock, Ron Scharf, John Herbert, and Jimmy Tumlin. A sophomore, Mike Stenftenagel, who had an average of 19.3 as a freshman, may earn a starting role.

Georgia Tech Coach Whack Hyder will have several returnees from the team that tripped Furman 80-79 in overtime last season. Caldwell scored six of ten overtime points and had 15 for the game.

The Southeastern Conference team plays its home games in Alexander Memorial Coliseum, seating capacity 7,000. Athletic Director is Bobby Dodd. Located in Atlanta, Ga.

## **WOFFORD COLLEGE TERRIERS**

Coach Gene Alexander expects to have several veterans back to lead the Wofford Terriers of Spartanburg, S. C. George Lyons (6-3) was all-state last year as a sophomore and Alexander sees an improved Lyons for this season. Teaming with Lyons will be lettermen Harvey Tankersley, Bill Wade, Buddy Mayes, and Orville Crabtree.

Junior college transfer Danny Broome (6-3) is also expected to help the Terriers. Freshmen on the varsity include William Pegram (6-7), Frank Talley (6-6), and Robert Cochran (6-3).

Home games for the Terriers are played on the campus in Andrews Field House. School colors are Gold and Black, and enrollment is 950. Athletic Director is Conley Snidow. Independent.

## **UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH CAROLINA GAMECOCKS**

Coach Chuck Noe puts more height on the line this season as he fields the 1963-64 USC team. Junior college transfer Jim Fox (6-8½), soph John Schroeder (6-6½), and letterman John Corsage (6-6) are the big men. Lettermen Ronnie Collins and Bill Yarborough (both 6-3) are back to lead the Gamecocks in their senior year. Guards Terry Lucansky and Jimmy Collins are also back as seniors.

Noe is also expected to make use of Rick Grich, Jerry White, and Paul Dickson. The Gamecocks will participate in two tournaments, the Vanderbilt Invitational December 27-28, and the Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament in March. USC games are played on its Columbia, S. C., campus. Student enrollment is 6,000 and the school colors are Garnet and Black. Marvin Bass is Athletic Director. Atlantic Coast Conference.

## **GEORGE WASHINGTON COLONIALS**

Coach Bill Reinhart of George Washington University is optimistic about the 1963-64 season. He has seven lettermen and three transfer student on hand.

Kenny Legins (6-5) and Joe Adamitis (6-8) are two lettermen that bring a gleam to Reinhart's eyes. Both are excellent rebounders. Other lettermen are Mark Clark, Eddie Farrell, Dave Sparks, Ric Duques, and Phil Aruscavagé. The transfers are Harvey Mallis, Harry Burchette, and Irv Dieterle.

Athletic Director at GW is Robert K. Faris and home games are played at the Ft. Myer Gym, capacity 3,700. GW enrollment is 10,000 and colors are Buff and White. The Southern Conference school is located in Washington, D. C.

## **WILLIAM AND MARY INDIANS**

Coach Bill Chambers calls eight sophomores the key to success at the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Va.

Whether or not they can quickly develop into experienced ball players will determine the script at W&M. Veterans Dave Hunter (a lefty), Martin Morris (6-6), and Jim Roy have a head start at three spots on the first unit.

Hugh Miller (6-6) is being counted on also, and the eight sophs are trying for the varsity — including Dave Popplewell, top performer on the frosh unit last season.

William and Mary colors are Green, Gold, and Silver. School enrollment is 2,700 and home games are played at Blow Gymnasium, capacity 2,500. Lester Hooker is Athletic Director. Southern Conference.

## **VIRGINIA MILITARY INSTITUTE KEYDETS**

Coach Weenie Miller's Keydets of Lexington, Va., will be an improved team this season. High hopes are held for Bill Blair (6-3), a fine shooter, Joe Kruszewski, Jeff Gausepohl, John Prosser, and Bobby Watson (6-7). These five are all lettermen and provide Miller with a good nucleus.

Seven sophomores give promise of good depth on the squad. Top sophs should be Charlie Schmaus, already touted as one of VMI's greatest, and Jim Guy (6-6).

Enrollment at VMI is 1,050 and school colors are Red, White, and Yellow. Athletic Director is C. L. Ellington. Home games are played at the VMI Fieldhouse, capacity 3,000. Southern Conference.

## **DAVIDSON COLLEGE WILDCATS**

Davidson College, coached by Lefty Diesell, probably has the best basketball team in its history. The talented Wildcats should be one of the strongest teams in the South. Led by Fred Hetzel (6-9), a junior who sets Davidson records practically every time he plays, Davidson should have command of the boards in most of its games.

Senior Terry Holland (6-7) is being counted on as a team leader. The Wildcats also have capable help from Barry Teague, Charlie Marcon, Don Davidson, Bill Beerman, Paul Briggs (6-5), and three fine sophs — Dick Snyder (6-5), Ronnie Stone, and Cam Harkness.

Athletic Director at the Davidson, N. C., school is Dr. Tom Scott. School enrollment is 1,000 and colors are Red and Black. Home games are played at Johnston Gym on campus, capacity 3,200. Southern Conference.

## WAKE FOREST DEACONS

Coach Horace (Bones) McKinney has three regulars from last year's fine season back. He is counting on Frank Christie (6-4), Richard Carmichael (6-5), and Butch Hassell (5-11) to lead the way along with three other lettermen — Ronny Watts (6-6), Brad Brooks (6-7), and Richard Herring (6-5).

Seven sophomores will also be out for berths on the team, as will three non-lettermen returnees. Watts, Christie, Hassell, and Carmichael should make the first unit. Watts is a tough rebounder.

Athletic Director for the Winston-Salem, N. C., school is W. H. Gibson. Enrollment is 3,000. The colors are Old Gold and Black. Games are played in Memorial Coliseum, capacity 8,200. Atlantic Coast Conference.

## VIRGINIA TECH GOBBLERS

The Gobblers of Bill Matthews have six lettermen returning along with the best crop of sophomores in the school's history. This makes for a promising outlook on the 1963-64 season. The sophs will provide valuable help in team speed and rebounding — a combination that spells solid bench strength.

Howard Pardue (6-6½), Frank Alvis, Barry Benfield (6-8), Bobby Vicars (6-4), Homer McCoy (6-5), and A. T. Walthall are the vets. Some real punch is expected from sophs John Wetzel (6-4), John Whitesell (6-7), Tom Whitehead (6-6), Fred Medley (6-9), Paul Long, and Jerry Neighbors.

Virginia Tech is located in Blacksburg, Va., and home games are played at the Virginia Tech Coliseum, capacity 10,000. Enrollment is 5,900 and colors are Orange and Maroon. Athletic Director is Frank Moseley. Southern Conference.

## UNIVERSITY OF RICHMOND SPIDERS

Lewis Mills enters his first year as Richmond's head coach with a lot of "ifs". John Telepo (6-4), Buddy Enck, and Tom Tenwick (6-4) head the returnees. If they continue to improve, says Mills, and if some sophs come through, there could be some improvement over last season's 7-18.

George Atwell (6-8) returns to action after a bout with the books. Soph Pete Eldredge (6-5) should also help with rebounding. Ross Welsh, Larry Weathers, Larry Hockman, are the sophs to watch.

School enrollment is 5,500 and colors are Red and Blue. Games are played in the Richmond Arena, capacity 5,000. Athletic Director is Malcolm Pitt. Southern Conference.

## **THE CITADEL BULLDOGS**

Outlook for the Charleston, S. C., team is — more height and more speed, plus added experience. Coach Mel Thompson has seven lettermen back plus three outstanding sophomore prospects.

The lettermen include Bob Kiggans (6-4), Wayne Isaacs (6-5), Bill Machorek (6-4), George Metkiff (6-5), Dick Martini (6-6), Mike West, and Larry Hitchcock. Thompson looks to sophs Wig Baumann (6-3), Clem Hartley (6-5), and Jim McCurdy (6-5) for a lot of help. Martini was the team's leading scorer and rebounding last season as a sophomore.

The Bulldogs are certain to improve their 3-19 mark of last season. Enrollment is 2,000 and colors are Blue and White. Home court is Citadel Armory, capacity 5,000. Athletic Director is Edward L. Teague, Jr. Southern Conference.

## **CLEMSON COLLEGE TIGERS**

Coach Bobby Roberts has a good group of seniors that could give Clemson its first winning season since 1951-52. The Tigers last season lost several close games, and won some spine-tinglers also.

Leading the team will be Jim Brennan (6-3), last year's top scorer. Slated to see a lot of action are Donnie Mahaffey (6-8), Gary Burnisky (6-6), Woody Morgan (6-7), Manning Privette (6-8), Nick Milasnovich, Mike Bohonak, and Rudy Antoncic (6-4). All but Antoncic are seniors. Gary Helms (6-4), Tom Cochran (6-5), and Ken Gardner (6-5) are three highly respected sophomores.

Clemson's homes games are played in the Clemson Field House. School enrollment is more than 4,000 and colors are Orange and Black. Frank Howard is Athletic Director. Atlantic Coast Conference.

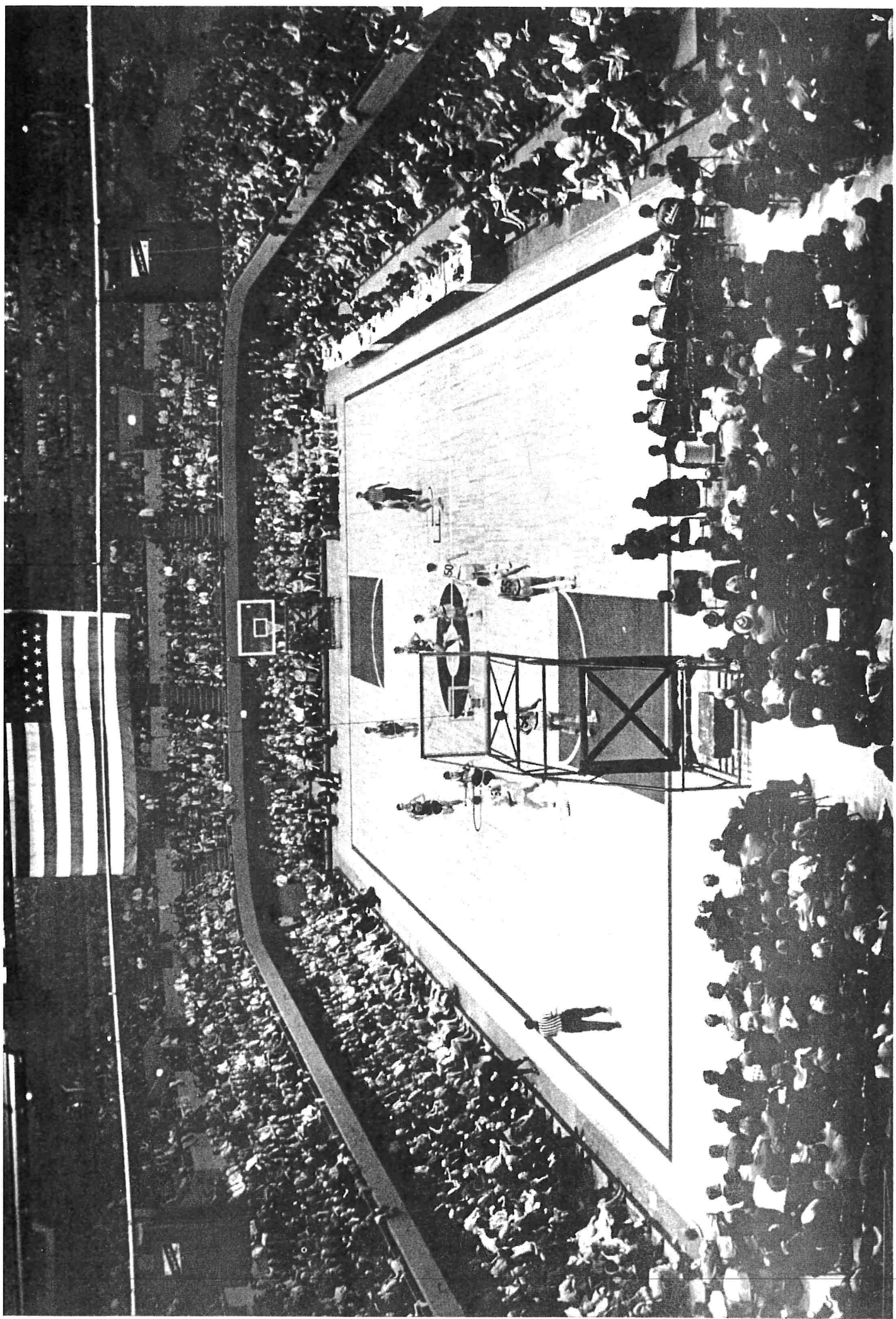
## **FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY SEMINOLES**

Florida State Coach Bud Kennedy has seven lettermen returning to action this season. The Seminoles will have one of their biggest and fastest teams.

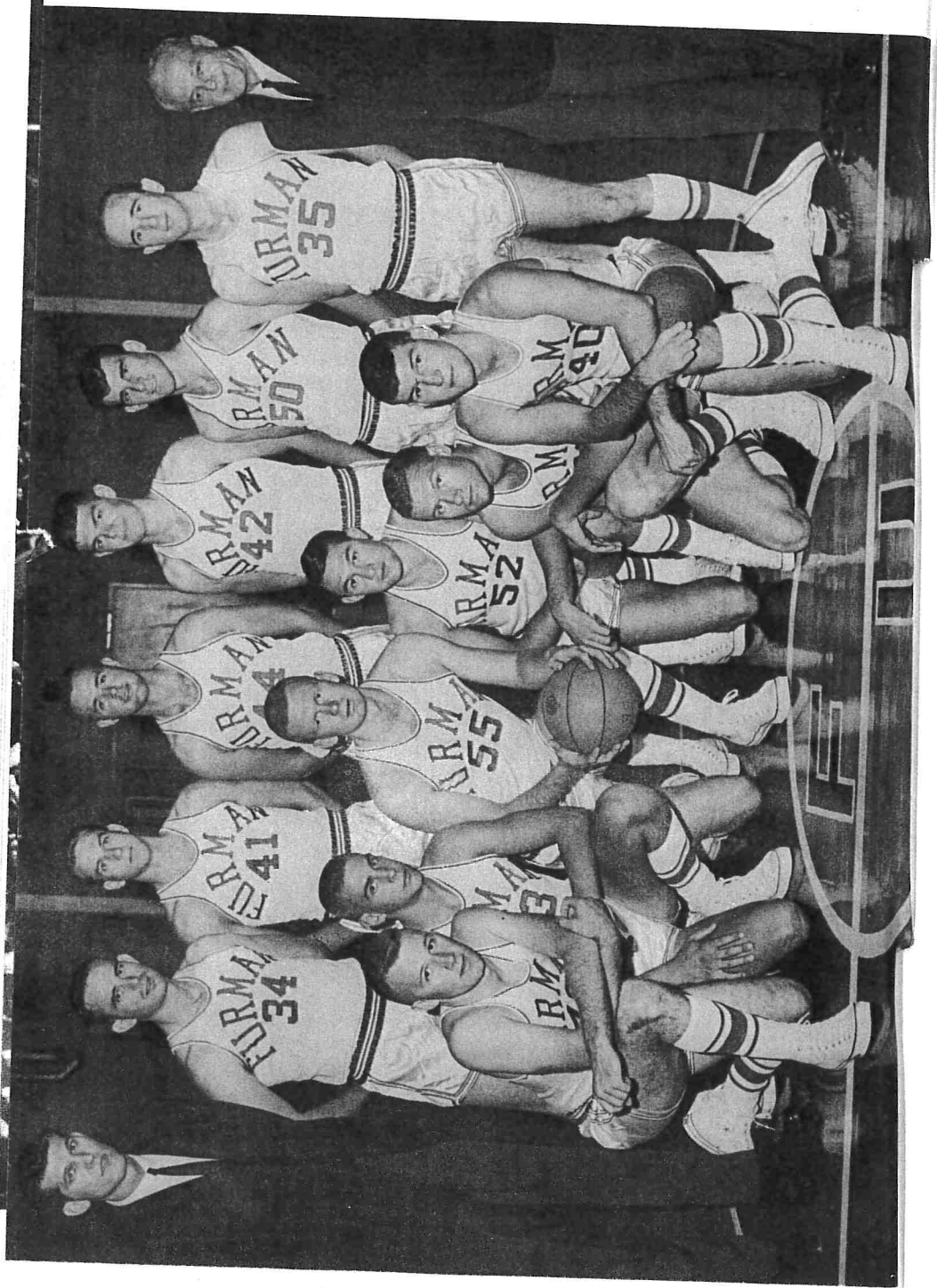
The team will be built around Jerry Shirley (6-5 and Pete Rogers (6-4). Four starters from last year are back, but an influx of good sophomores will help a great deal.

## FURMAN AND ITS ALL-AMERICANS

Basketball has come a long way at Furman University since the ball was first bounced on the campus back in 1905. That year there was a campus team, coached by Professor W. M. Steele, but no records are available of any game results.

The first official records on hand indicate that W. L. Laval fielded Furman's intercollegiate team in 1916. After Coach Laval's final year in 1927, he was succeeded by A. W. Norman, Dizzy McLeod, Flucie Stewart, Bob Smith, and finally Lyles Alley. Melvin Bell coached one year while Alley was on leave of absence in 1949-50.

In the 1920's and 1930's, Furman had one of the strongest teams in the South. Norman's team was 20-5 in 1927-28, and McLeod's five-year record (1928-33) was 69-24. There were several state titles in those years.

Coach Alley brought basketball prominence back to Furman in the 1950's. The war years and post-war doldrums had hit the University's athletic program hard.

But beginning in 1951-52—things started looking up. In 1952-53, Furman had the nation's top scorer in Frank Selvy, an ace from Corbin, Kentucky, who is now with the Los Angeles Lakers. Another Furman player was in the top ten that year in Nield Gordon—with a 24-plus average. Selvy's was 29.5. Selvy repeated in his senior year, 1953-54, setting an all-time mark of 41.7, and setting many more.

Following Selvy, in fact, playing with him for one season, was a North Carolinian named Darrell Floyd. He was scoring champion for two years just as Selvy was, and was All-American for two years. Selvy was All-American his senior year, and consensus second-team AA his junior year.

The names of these two players, and the Furman team name, appear many times in the 1964 edition of the "Official Collegiate Basketball Guide."

As Coach Alley enters his 18th year, his record at Furman is 225 wins and 219 losses.

## ORIGIN OF THE PALADIN

Furman University athletic teams were known by different names until the 1960 season. The baseball team was "Hornets," the football team "Hurricanes," and the basketball team "Paladins."

The basketball team was dubbed "Paladins" by a Greenville sportswriter in the 1930's and the name stuck. When it was decided in 1960 to consolidate all athletic teams under one name, the popular choice was "Paladins."

According to legend, Paladin is derived from the name of Count Palatine, one of the 12 knights who comprised the bodyguard and inner circle of Emperor Charlemagne. Thus, a knight, The Paladin, rides as Furman's living symbol upon a white thoroughbred stallion, outfitted in full knight's regalia.

## COACHES WHO PLAYED AT FURMAN

Through the years Furman University's athletic program has turned out many good teachers and coaches in all sports. Many of these are still active as high school or college basketball coaches. Foremost in the group, of course, is Furman's own head coach and athletic director, Lyles Alley, who earned letters in basketball, football, baseball, and track at Furman.

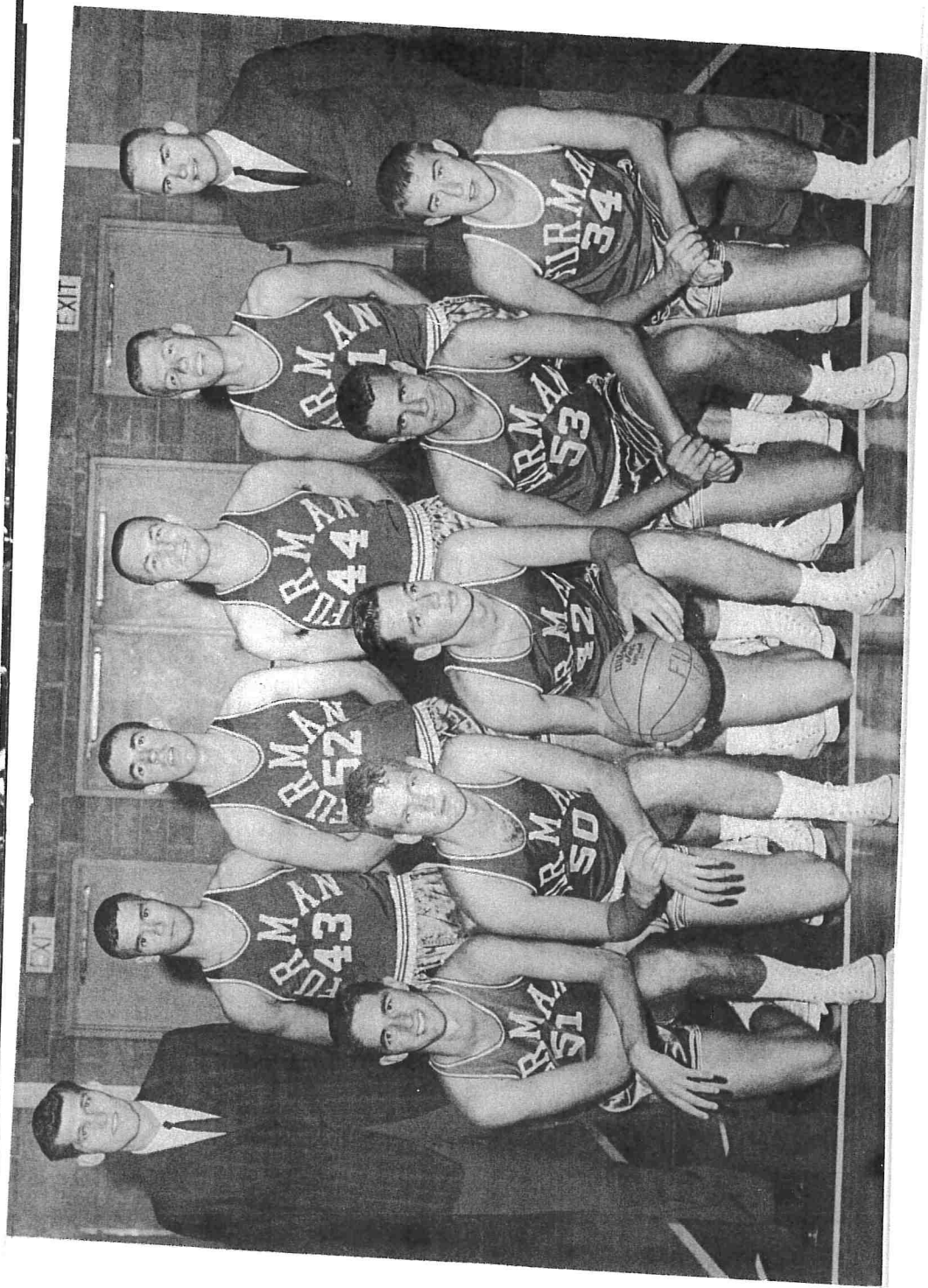

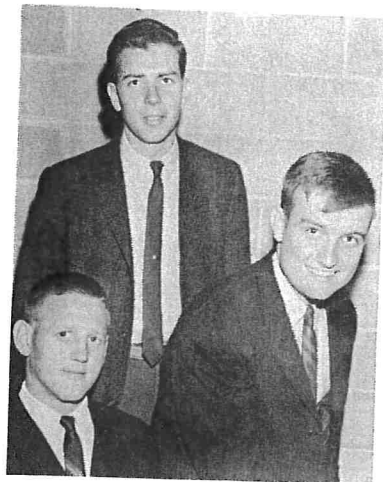

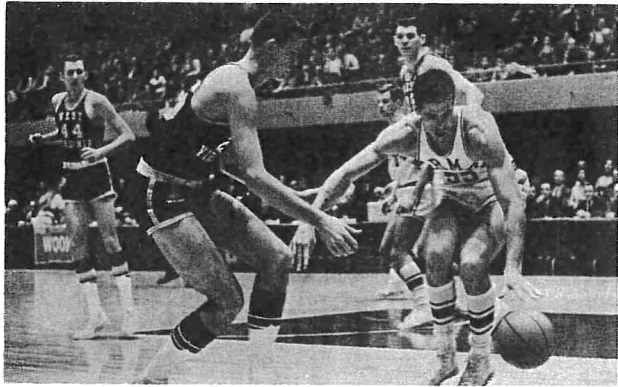
