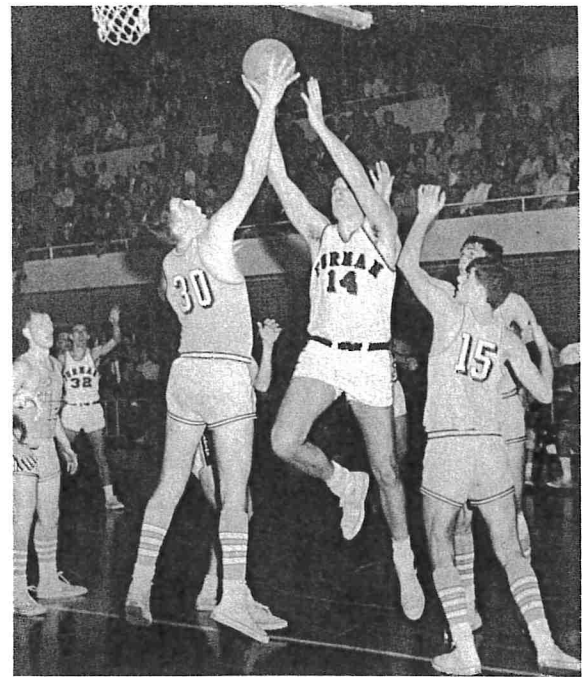

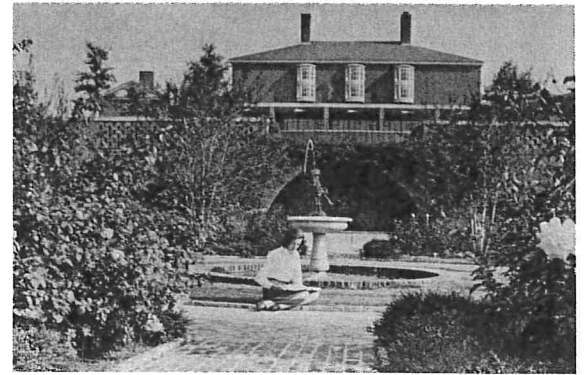

INTRODUCING FURMAN



Furman University is widely known as one of the finest educational facilities in the South, aspiring academic excellence under Christian influences.

Authorized by the South Carolina Baptist Convention of 1825, Furman was established as an academy and theological institution in Edgefield, South Carolina. For a short period of time it enjoyed a residency in the High Hills of Santee and Winnsboro before moving to Greenville, where in 1850 it was chartered "The Furman University."

The University is fortunate in its location five miles north of Greenville. The new campus occupies a beautifully designed area on a 750-acre tract owned by the University. Many of the buildings are situated close to a 30-acre lake.

A member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, Furman offers courses leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Arts in Music, Master of Arts and Master of Science.

Furman now has over 16,000 alumni, including some of the nation's leading scholars, doctors and lawyers. Dr. Charles Townes, who was awarded the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1964, is a graduate of Furman as is Max Steele, who won the Harper Novel Prize for his novel *Debby*.

Bob Stillwell, who was captain of the 1966 football team, was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship following his graduation. Larry Estridge, student body president for 1966, was given the Hughes Perpetual Trophy as the nation's outstanding ROTC participant in 1967.

The number of Furman's full-time faculty members has grown from 93 in 1964-65 to 106 in 1967-68 with 75 per cent having a doctor's degree.

When the campus is completed there will be more than 20 major buildings with the University being able to serve some 2,500 students.

The President:

DR. GORDON W. BLACKWELL



Dr. Gordon W. Blackwell, one of the South's most distinguished administrators, educators, authors and social scientists, was elected the eighth president of Furman University July 29, 1964.

Under his leadership, Furman has made gigantic strides in many areas. He has devoted his many talents to the improvement of Furman on the local, state and national scene and his administration strives for excellence in every field of endeavor.

Dr. Blackwell's career as an educator began at Furman, where he graduated summa cum laude in 1932. His record at Furman was one of a brilliant scholar, an outstanding athlete and a student leader. He was captain of the tennis team for three years, president of the band and editor of the student magazine.

Dr. Blackwell's teaching career also started at Furman, where he served as Professor and Chairman of the Sociology Department from 1937 to 1941. He received his M.A. degree from the University of North Carolina and earned his Ph.D. degree at Harvard University.

Before coming to Furman, Dr. Blackwell was president at Florida State University for four and one-half years. He has also served as Chancellor of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina for three and one-half years.

Dr. Blackwell was born in Timmonsville, S. C., and is married to the former Elizabeth Blair Lyles. His two sons, Gordon and Randy, are Furman graduates and were members of the Furman varsity basketball team.

The Athletic Director:

J. LYLES ALLEY



On November 23, 1966, Furman University lost a basketball coach, but gained a full-time Athletic Director. And it is a name that has brought national recognition to Furman over several years—J. Lyles Alley.

For 20 years, Alley directed the Paladins' basketball fortunes and earned the reputation of "Mr. Basketball" in bringing Furman into national limelight.

Now, he has relinquished his coaching duties to give his full-time attention as Athletic Director and the responsibility of guiding the entire Furman athletic program.

The job of Athletic Director, however, isn't a strange position for Alley. In addition to serving as basketball coach, he has also doubled as AD for the past ten years.

Alley's list of accomplishments are many and the stars he has coached would fill a gymnasium. The names of Frank Selvy, Darrell Floyd, Nield Gordon, Jerry Smith, Gerald Glur, Bryon Pinson, Fred Fraley and Effie Evington are only a few he has helped develop.

From 1953 through 1956, Alley's teams were the national major college scoring champions, setting records each time. For the 1951-52 season, Furman was awarded the U. S. Rubber Company's trophy as the most improved team in the nation.

He also produced Furman's first All-Americans with Frank Selvy earning the award in 1954 and Darrell Floyd in 1955 and 1956.

Alley, himself, was a star athlete at Furman in the early '30's. He won 12 letters in basketball, football, baseball and track. He was voted the most valuable football player during his senior year in 1933.

BASKETBALL STAFF

FRANK SELVY Head Basketball Coach



The name Frank Selvy is already a legend at Furman University and he is fast establishing himself as one of the top coaches in the Southern Conference.

He returned to his alma mater in 1964 as an assistant to Lyles Alley and was appointed head coach in the fall of 1966. In his first year, he compiled a 9-15 record, but to many it was a successful sendoff for the young coach.

Selvy has been acclaimed as one of the most popular and accomplished athletic figures ever to graduate from Furman. Not only was he an outstanding athletic figure, but also a student leader.

He is most remembered as Furman's first bona fide All-America, but while a student was also president of his senior class, student of the year in 1964, named to the national Who's Who and a member of the Blue Key national honor society.

When Selvy graduated in 1954, statisticians had to revamp their record books for in four years he had broken practically every existing record, many of which he still holds today. At graduation he held 22 national major-college marks.

For nine years following his collegiate career, he was a professional star with the St. Louis Hawks, the Minneapolis and Los Angeles Lakers, taking time out for a two-year stint in the army. While a professional, he played in two NBA All-Star games.

Probably his best known feat was the scoring of 100 points against Newberry College in 1954. The record stands today as a NCAA standard as does his 41.7 scoring average during his senior year.

ALAN LeFORCE Assistant Coach



Alan LeForce is the latest addition to the basketball staff, coming to Furman in August, 1967. His primary responsibilities will be head freshman coach and varsity assistant plus recruiting.

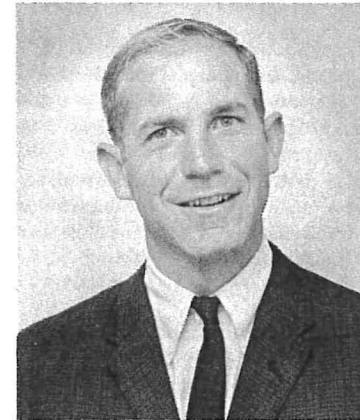
LeForce comes to Furman from Williamsburg High School, Ky., where he was head coach for eight years. While at Williamsburg, he had a record of 89-72. He was selected coach of the year in the South-

eastern Conference in 1961 and 1963.

He is a 1961 graduate of Cumberland College. While in college, he lettered three years in basketball, three years in track, three years in baseball and one year in football.

LeForce also served as an assistant varsity coach and recruiter in basketball while at Cumberland College for one year.

PAUL SCARPA Assistant Coach



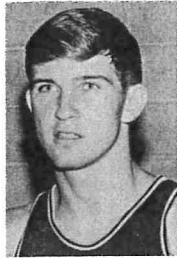
Coach Paul Scarpa arrived on the Furman scene a year ago to devote his efforts to the freshman team and to recruiting. Scarpa comes to Furman after spending the past two years as tennis coach at the Naval Academy. One of the best amateur tennis players to come out of his native Charleston, S.C., Paul won the Eastern Intercollegiate singles and doubles championship while playing for Florida State.

During his collegiate career, he also won the South Carolina junior and men's amateur tournament.

For the past four summers Scarpa has ably served as tennis professional at the Greenville Country Club. In 1962-63 after graduation from Florida State, he stayed on as coach and instructor in the physical education department, then moved to Annapolis.

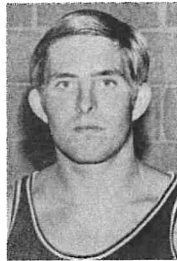
MEET THE PALADINS

- 12 Butch Bozarth, 6-1, 175, junior, guard, Louisville, Ky.**



Bozarth is a transfer from Oklahoma Military where he averaged 17 points a game as a sophomore. He is considered a top ball handler, hard working defensive player and adequate shooter. He could very well open the season as a starting guard. He has good speed and quickness. Bozarth is a history major and plans a career in coaching following graduation. One of the key players in the backcourt this season.

- 51 Jim Daly, 6-5, 205, sophomore, forward or center, Bowie, Md.**



Daly moves from last year's freshman team, where he averaged 15 points a game and 11 rebounds. He is a fine jumper and good inside shooter. He has been working hard to increase quickness and will definitely see plenty of duty this season at either forward or center. He is strong on the inside and will be a big help to the Paladins on the backboards. Should see plenty of action during 1967-68.

- 24 Carl Erkenbrecher, 6-7, 215, junior, center, Cincinnati, Ohio**



Erkenbrecher saw little action as a sophomore, but did play in 12 games. He has developed considerably since coming to Furman and will be used as a backup man this season for Don Webster at center. He is the tallest player on the varsity and has made big strides in his rebounding. As a freshman, he was the team's leading rebounder and a top defensive player.

- 22 Dick Esleeck, 6-1, 180, junior, guard, Portsmouth, Va.**



Esleeck developed into a fine player during his sophomore season and finished the year with a 13.1 scoring average. During the final games a year ago, he averaged well over 20 points a game. He is expected to be the offensive quarterback and will also carry a big part of the scoring. He has lost 20 pounds from a year ago and is considered a top candidate for post-season honors.

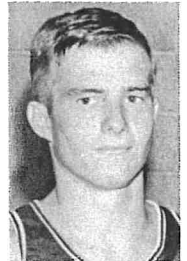
MEET THE PALADINS

- 44 Wes Graves, 5-9, 165, junior, guard, Greensboro, N. C.**



Graves is a very hard working guard who makes up for his lack in size with a lot of determination. He came to Furman on a football scholarship, but decided to give basketball a try. He works very hard on defense and is a good outside shooter. He was hampered most of last season with a broken jaw. In addition to basketball, Graves is also an outstanding member of the Paladins' golf team.

- 11 Charlie Greer, 6-1, 175, sophomore, guard, Falls Church, Va.**



Greer is one of the hardest working defensive players on the team and has made big strides from a year ago. He was one of the top reserves on last year's outstanding freshman team and finished the year with a nine-point scoring average. He is trying to elevate his offensive play and will be one of the top reserves this season. He has a lot of desire and could develop into a top defensive player.

- 31 Bill Heffelfinger, 6-6, 210, sophomore, forward, Owensboro, Ky.**



Heffelfinger led last year's freshman in every department, averaging 21 points a game and 15 rebounds. He also hit 50 per cent of his shots from the floor. He is expected to be a starting forward and is a fine outside shooter. He is also strong enough to go on the inside to be a big help on the boards and inside scoring. One of the key players for the Paladins this season.

- 34 Don James, 6-2, 180, sophomore guard or forward, Atlanta, Ga.**



James is a real scrapping forward with a lot of determination. He could also see some duty this year at guard. He was a member of last year's freshman team, where he averaged six points a game. He will give relief at either forward this year and is considered very strong for his size. He is also a threat with his shooting from the inside or outside.

32 Steve McCammon, 5-10, 150, sophomore, guard, Greensburg, Ind.



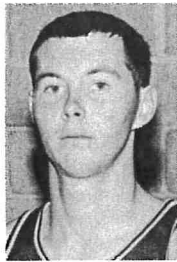
McCammon is probably the quickest player on the team and a top contender for one of the starting guard spots this season. He was second in scoring on last year's freshman team with a 15.3 average. He has fine speed and is a good ball handler and an excellent outside shooter. McCammon is also president of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes at Furman.

14 Don Webster, 6-6, 215, senior, center, Auburn, Maine



Webster is the only senior on the team and a top candidate for post season honors. He will be moved back to center, where he landed second team All-Conference honors as a sophomore. Last year, he scored at a 16.2 pace and was the team's top rebounder with a 10.4 average. He has led the team in rebounds during his two years at Furman and has been one of the top scorers.

55 David Whitener, 6-6, 190, sophomore, forward, Hickory, N. C.



Whitener transferred from North Greenville Junior College, where he landed All-Conference honors at center. Last year he averaged 22 points and 16 rebounds. He will be moved to forward at Furman, where he is expected to land a starting spot. He has excellent speed and quickness for a big man and a fine shooter. Could be the best rebounder on the team.

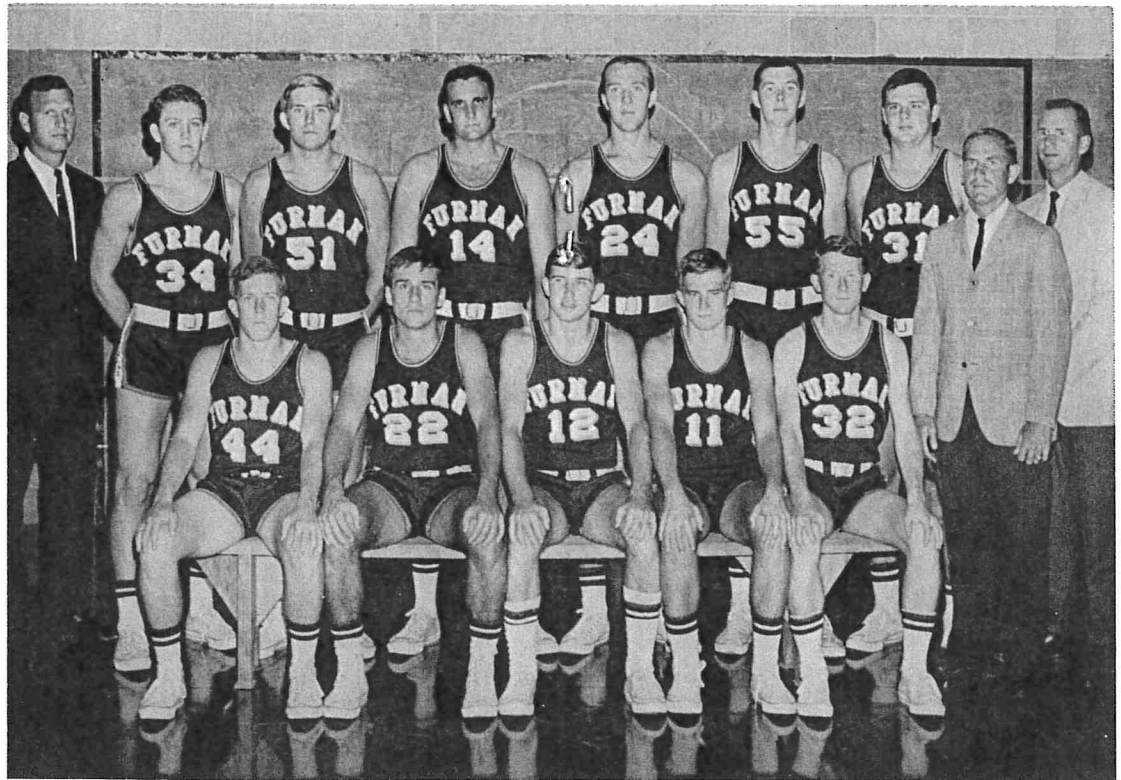

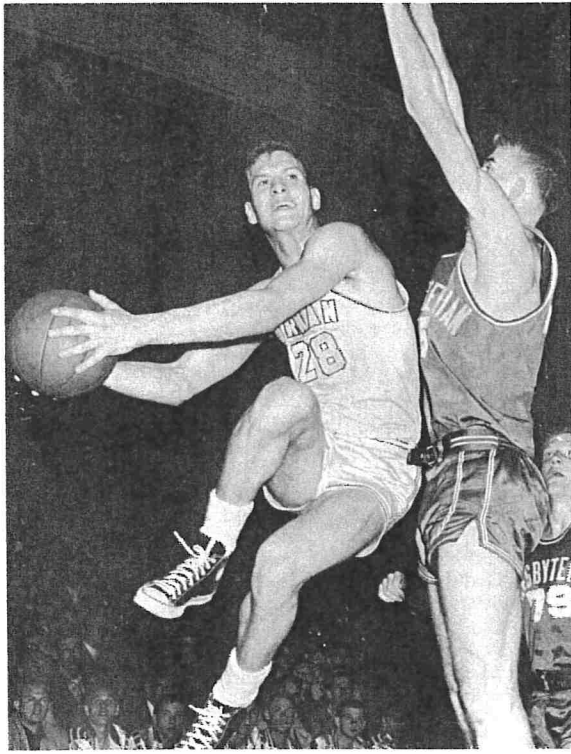

ALL-AMERICA FRANK SELVY



When Frank Selvy graduated from Furman, he had smashed practically every existing record in the NCAA book, including many which still stand today.

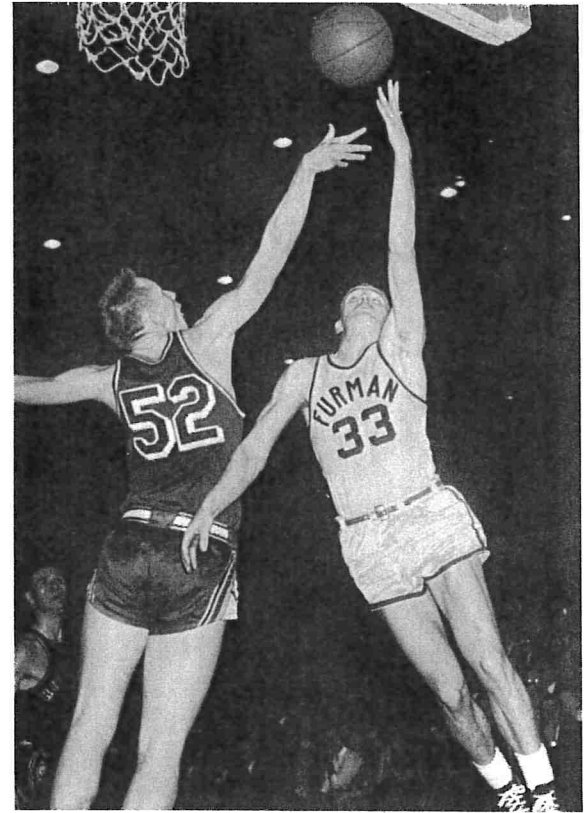
As a sophomore, he was named to the third team Converse All-America team, but by his senior year he was named to every All-America team in the nation. In 1954, he was selected as the UPI Player of the Year.

The feat which Selvy is the most remembered for while at Furman came in November of 1954 when he scored 100 points while playing against Newberry College. The record stands today as the NCAA standard.

Another mark which Selvy still holds is the top single game average which he established in 1954 while scoring at the blistering pace of 41.7 points a game.

During his career at Furman, he scored 2,587 points for a 32.5 average, which ranks him second in the nation behind Oscar Robertson. His two-year average of 36.1 is still a national record.

ALL-AMERICA DARRELL FLOYD



Darrell Floyd's remarkable career at Furman started when he was only a sophomore playing with senior Frank Selvy. The two combined to give the Paladins' one of the greatest one-two punches in history as they averaged 66 points a game between them.

When Selvy graduated, Floyd continued Furman's scoring tradition by leading the nation in scoring for two years and being named All-America in 1955 and 1956.

During his career, Floyd registered three of the top 17 all-time one game performances with 67 points against Morehead State, 56 against Clemson and 53 against William and Mary.

His two year scoring average stands at 34.8 while his career average is 32.1. While at Furman, he scored a total of 2,281 points.

Floyd was also named the Southern Conference Athlete of the Year in 1955 and 1956 in addition to being the South Carolina Player of the Year during the same two seasons.

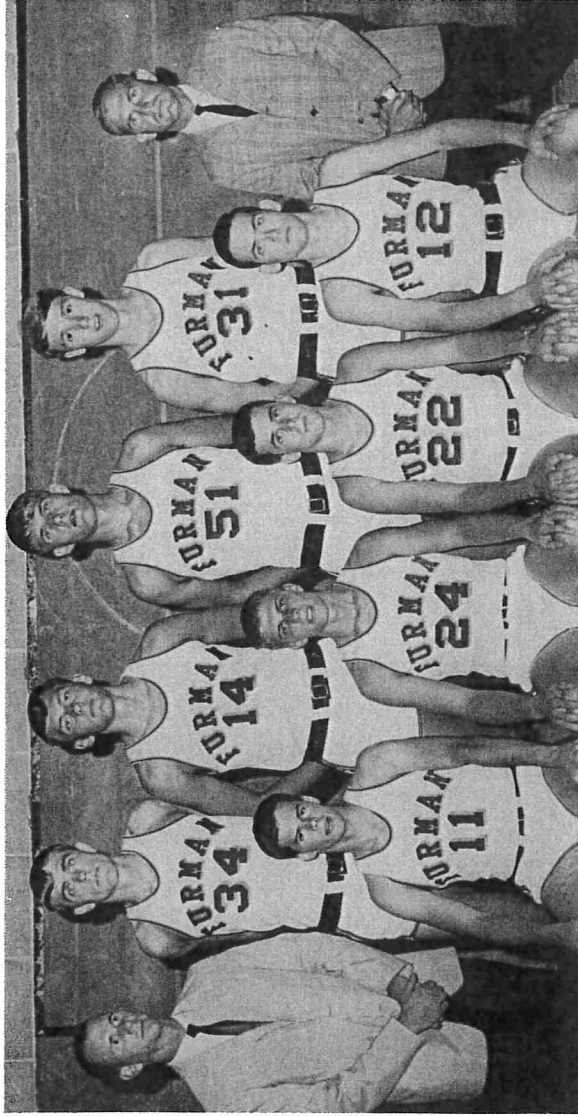
