HURRICANE PROSPECTS FOR '48

It's a brand-new deal on the football front at Furman— everything is new---except the ballplayers. There has been a complete change in the coaching staff, from head coach right on down the line to assistant freshman coach. The system to be used will be different than in the previous two years--a modified single-wing attack replaces the T, which, as head strategist Red Smith puts it "will be better adapted to the material on hand." Finally, it's no secret here on the Furman campus that a new spirit prevails among the football players on this year's squad, a new fighting spirit that was very much in evidence in a rock "em and sock'em spring session that had observers talking hopefully, yet hesitantly, about regaining some of Furman's former football glory. Yes, everything is now all right---everything but the football faces on the squad, and it's still very much of a big question mark as to whether they can produce this year.

Here is what Head Coach Red Smith has to say about it, "Let's just face the cold hard facts. The freshman rule is in this year, as you know. It's practically impossible to add ball players to a team that has won 2 ball games in two years running. Sure the other teams are in the same boat, but you've got to figure that we're already three years behind such clubs as Clemson and South Carolina. Those years that didn't play ball hurt us and we feel it---now. At present we're starting a building program and in a few years we hope to be on a par with any of these other clubs. We're tired of getting pushed around, but it will take time to hold our own".

At this writing the total roster lists 39 men, 14 backs, 3 centers, 7 ends, 7 tackles and 8 guards. Twenty-one of this number are returning lettermen. During the spring practice sessions there were a few definite experiments made in the line-up by Coach Smith that will certainly bear

watching this fall. John Little, fleet-footed Albermarle, N. C. end of last year, is running in the wingback slot. Harry Blanken, the New York 200-lb former fullback, has been converted in a front-running tackle. Fleming Thornton, the Tampa tower of strength at guard, will see action at the other tackle post. Finally, Virgel Roddy, former Parker High gridder who has performed at tackle, is being tried at the pivot post.

Notable newcomers who are scheduled to see action are: Bill Gordon, at guard, Jim Fletcher, at fullback, Bill Anderson, end, and Dewey Stallard at tackle. Gordon, speedy 190 pounder, showed enough scrap during the spring to virtually assure himself a spot in the starting line-up. Fletcher, in displaying his prowess this spring, worked his way up to the number one fullback job. Anderson is rangy and fast--was a hurdler of merit this spring, and shows a great deal of promise. At tackle, Dewey Stallard, rough 200 pounder rounds out the list of newcomers likely to see considerable action.

About the only definite starting assignments in the line will be held down by Big Tom What at right end, Capt. Sonny Byrd, at center and barring injuries, Flemming Thornton at tackle. According to Line Coach Bill Young the rest of the positions are wide open. However the line figures to be the bright spot in the team's offensive this fall. Six gargantuan stalwarts adequately handle the tackle positions, and it's actually a toss-up as to who garners the starting assignments. Fighting it out will be Thornton, Blanken, Gilreath, Kelly, Breazeale, and Stallard, with the first two mentioned holding the inside track to date. Replacements are slim at the flank posts, but first-stringers, Tom Wham and Bob Griffin will throw fear into the hearts of many an ambitious ball-carrier who attempts to sweep their ends. Big Tom Wham garnered All-State honors last year with his stellar play and this year promises to be his biggest season, pointing for All-Southern as well as national honors. A team player if there ever

was one, a coach's delight with his slashing sixty-minute style of play, "The Wall" Wham has his eye on a career in professional football after his collegiate chores are completed.

There's a wide open scrap for the middle of the line jobs , with the capable last year's regular, Corky McCorkle, and Big Bill Gordon holding the upper hand. Not far behind come George Harrison, Lewis Stepp and George Aiken. At center, the aggressive, spirited and extremely capable captain of this year's football edition, George "Sonny" Byrd holds sway. One of the bright lights of last year's otherwise dim attack, Byrd's stout defensive play is counted on heavily. Evington and Roddy, center replacements are big question marks right now.

The backfield again poses the big problem. For the past two years the backfield has been conspicuous by the absence of a break-away runner, in addition to a mediocre passing attack. Despite the return of 14 backs to the line-up, prospects are not, by any stretch of the imagination, too bright. John Little, last year's speedy end is being tried at wing-back in an effort for more speed. The steady, but not spectacular George Pruitt, may come into his own this year in his job as chief signal-caller. Charlie Thomas, and Henry Tezza, former Spartanburg speedster, may prove to be the spark in the attack. The already none-too-garrulous George Cafego, new backfield coach, climbs even further into his shell when the backfield situation is mentioned, because there are just too many "ifs" present to speak with any degree of certainty. Here's a tip-off on the backfield progress....when Cafego gets to chattering you can bet that things are looking up.

THE HURRICANE COACHING STAFF

HERMAN E. "RED" SMITH - Head Coach

Furman's football destinies this year will be guided by another one of its athletic greats, in keeping with the traditional policy of the University. That man is the genial and popular Red Smith last year's line coach. The task of rebuilding a squad that won only two games in each of the past two years is a tremendous one, and no one realizes that fact more strongly than big Red himself. However, with some 20-odd years of coaching experience behind him, Smith has pitched in with such determination and fervor, that the spirit is beginning to catch on, and even some of the die-hards are nodding their heads and saying that maybe Red is the man that can turn the trick of a winning ball club. Possessed with a keen sense of humor, an imaginative as well as inventive mind, as attests his patent on a new shoulder pad, Smith, as the saying goes, has "been around", and knows what the score is. A three-letter man at Furman, the versatile Red won athletic honors by being picked on the All-SIAA team in 1925 as a tackle, was an All-State basketball selection in 1924 and 1925 as well as garnering three letters in track for his accomplishments in heaving the javelin and discus. Beginning his coaching career in Gaffney where he produced two undefeated teams, Smith shifted to Hampton-Sydney, where as director of physical education, varsity line coach and head track coach, he stayed from 1929 to 1935, then going to the Citadel in the capacity of director of intramurals, line coach, baseball and basketball head for the period of two years. Returning to Hampton-Sydney as Director of Athletics and head football coach, Red stayed until 1942, when Uncle Sam beckoned. He closed out his career in the Navy with the rank of Commander, after having served as an athletic officer and director at several bases including the pre-flight school at Chapel Hill, N. C. and finishing as head coach at the Pensacola Naval Air Station, where his undefeated football team of 1946 won for him the title of "service coach of the year."

Coach Smith is a family man. He married the former Helen Brabham of Manning, S. C., and he and the beautiful Mrs. Smith have a son, Edward, age 5.

In adroitly handling his current football "hot potato", with apparent asbestos fingers, Smith, a keen student of organization, has aligned himself with a capable staff designed to do more than its share in attempting to LIFT Furman out of its football doldrums.

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GEORGE (BAD NEWS) CAFEGO- Backfield Coach

Cafego is one of the most fabulous figures in the illustrious football history of the University of Tennessee. He was a member of two All-Southeastern teams and in 1938 and 1939 seasons was named on at least five All-American clubs, including the Associated Press, Paramount News, Liberty, Saturday Evening Post and the Kate Smith radio show. Coach Bob Neyland, master strategist of Tennessee's football fortunes for many years, calls Cafego the smartest back he has ever coached, which is high praise indeed. At the completion of this collegiate career, he took a rather strong fling at professional football, seeing service with such teams as the Brooklyn Dodgers, under Jock Sutherland, the Chicago Bears, the Washington Redskins, and the Boston Yanks. Sandwiched in between those times was a two-year stint in the Army. Plagued continually with a bad knee, received in his last collegiate game against the Citadel, Cafego finally retired from playing active ball in 1945, and turned his eye toward coaching. Serving as an assistant for several years in spring drills at Tennessee under both John Barnhill and Gen. Neyland he accepted Red Smith's offer to come to Furman. In the short time that he has been on the campus, Cafego has already made a favorable impression. He has just that football savvy and know how, and a natural knack of getting it across to his men. Known to all the men, GI's included, as a "regular Joe", he has gained much admiration for his friendliness, as well as respect for his football knowledge. Well versed in the intricacies of the single-wing, Cafego may prove

to be the necessary stimulus to inspire this years backfield to superior heights, by his unassuming but effective leadership.

WILLIAM YOUNG - Line Coach

When spring practice rolled around this year, a newcomer, a jovial giant of a man who tips the Fairbanks at a mere 259 lbs, in the person of one Big Bill Young was on hand to take over the chores as line coach. To say that he made a good impression would be putting it mildly. The personable and likeable big fellow abounds with drive and enthusiasm and his constant chatter spiced with caustic witticisms, keeps his huckies constantly hustling--and they go for it.

Coach Young was one of Frank Thomas' star tackles at the University of Alabama in 1933 through 1936, and continued his football education as a first-string tackle with the Washington Redskins for seven years. Even in his three years of service in the Navy, he managed to get in a year's football with a service team in Honolulu, under Jack White, now backfield coach of the New York football Yankees, with Charlie Justice, North Carolina's ace as one of his team-mates. Upon his discharge from the Navy, he returned to the Redskins and played in 1946, after which he hung up his playing togs to accept a post with the athletic department of his Alma Mater, Alabama, as one of the chief talent scouts, a "natural" for him to be sure. At his point Red Smith's search to get "the best man available" gave the nod to Big Bill and he accepted "the fine opportunity", as he puts it, to come to Furman----a decision which has pleased everyone concerned.

Young's agility afoot belies his ponderous physical proportions, and the word is that this fall he'll be out there knocking with his men. He's a stickler for strict physical conditioning, and its a foregone conclusion that there will be a definite emphasis in this direction come September. An ardent golfer, Bill shoots in the low 80's with an occasional drop in the 70 bracket, and has also been known to play a fair game of badminton.

Despite his natural optimism, Coach Young refuses to go out on a limb on any predictions this year. "But I'll tell you one thing though," he will say, "I don't know how many ball games we'll win this year, but you can bet your boots we'll have a fightin' ball team". He means it, too, because that's the kind of guy Bill Young is--and he'll go places--just watch.

J. LYLES ALLEY - Freshman Coach

The return of the freshman rule in the Southern Conference finds Furman's freshmen squad being handled by the diminutive and dynamic Lyles Alley, who in addition is head mentor of the varsity baseball and basketball teams. A Furman graduate of 1933, Coach Alley was a four-letter man, in baseball, basketball, track and football. In 1932 he was chosen as the Most Valuable Player of that year's football team. As a dash man in track, he won the State Championship in the 100 yard that same year.

His coaching career follows: Head Coach at Taylors, S. C. high school ; Athletic Director of Pacific Mills at Lyman, S. C.; Athletic Director at Southern Bleachery, Taylors; from 1940 to 1942 as assistant and then head football coach at Miami high in Florida. His 1942 teams was undefeated, and numbered among his players were two men who achieved stardom later at Army and Navy, respectively, Arnold Tucker and Bruce Smith; a three-year tour of duty as Athletic Officer in the Navy in the Hamilton program; returned to Furman in 1945 as head basketball and baseball coach..his 1948 baseball squad winning the State Championship.

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JAMES R. (PREACHER) MCQUEEN - Assistant Freshman Coach

The big, personable "Preacher" begins his coaching career as Coach Alley's assistant after a brilliant gridiron record at Furman, which culminated in his selection on the All-State team of 1947, at the tackle position. In addition he served as team captain of last year's luckless football campaign. One of the most popular figures on the campus, McQueen was a first sergeant in the recent war, with 38 months of his total service being spent overseas, and his present job carries with it the well-wishes of his numerous friends.

H. R. (RED) DOBSON - Athletic Director

The man responsible for the operation of Furman's physical education and athletic set-up is the well-known, popular and inimitable Hubert F. (Red) Dobson. As a student at Furman in the early '20's, he received just about all the honors it was possible to earn for his athletic achievements. A tireless, energetic and enthusiastic worker, Mr. Dobson enjoyed a most enviable record in his coaching career, in all sports, covering a 20-year span at Spartanburg high school. His ceaseless efforts since coming to Furman, in 1946, toward rehabilitating the overall athletic and physical education set-up, has won him much admiration. Holder of a Master's degree in physical education from Teacher's College of Columbia, he is as sincerely concerned with an adequate athletic program for all and improvement of Furman's athletic facilities as he is in seeing a winning football team on the field.

In addition to his duties as athletic director at Furman, Mr. Dobson is also director of Camp Pinnacle in Hendersonville, N. C. during the summer months. He has been associated with Camp Pinnacle work since he founded it in 1926.
