Dr. John Laney Plyer, now in his 17th year as president of his alma mater, was graduated from Furman in 1913 with magna cum laude honors. He served for three years as a teacher and coach at Greenville High where he produced a state-championship basketball team.

Dr. Plyer rose from private to the rank of second lieutenant as a volunteer in World War I. After the war, he received an LL.B. from Harvard and began the practice of law in Greenville. In 1935, he was chosen Judge of the Greenville County Court. He had been re-elected for a second term when friends persuaded him to become president of Furman.

Under his administration the faculty has been greatly increased in size and academic training and the University has been admitted to the Southern University Conference, the Association of American Colleges, and is now on the approved list of the Association of American Universities and of the American Association of University Women.

In 1948 he served as president of the South Carolina Baptist Convention. Erskine College honored him in 1939 with the LL.D. degree, and in 1953 he received the LL.D. degree from Wofford College. In 1946-47 he was vice-chairman of Church-Related Colleges in the Southeast and, in 1951-52, president of the South Carolina Association of Colleges. As a member of an 11-man national committee of college presidents named in 1951, he helped work out recommendations on college football which were widely adopted.

Perhaps his greatest contribution thus far has been his leadership in planning and promoting the forthcoming removal of Furman to a new 1,100-acre campus five miles north of the present location.

THE COACHES

HOMER B. HOBBS

Head Football Coach

Homer B. Hobbs will launch his career as a head coach with the beginning of the 1955 season at Furman, and although he is a newcomer to the head coaching ranks, the steps which Hobbs used to get there were made of football concrete.

For Hobbs, it is a return to his native state after football travels that have carried him through four conspicuous college years, two years as a professional lineman and four years as a college assistant coach.

Before coming to Furman, Hobbs was line coach at Navy for three seasons. His work there was climaxed on January 1, 1955, when Navy won the Sugar Bowl game and Hobbs line charges held their opposition scoreless.

His three seasons at Navy as an assistant to Head Coach Eddie Erdelatz gave him an association with one of the most respected and successful coaches on the college scene today.

Hobbs' other year as an assistant was with Head Coach Shug Jordan at Auburn, in what has proved the beginning of Auburn's rise to the role of a nationally respected football powerhouse.

The new Furman coach was born in Lexington, S. C., and played high school football there from 1937 through 1940. The University of Georgia beckoned upon his graduation and Hobbs played there as a freshman in the 1941 season, a year which saw Georgia earn an invitation to the Orange Bowl.

World War II interrupted Hobbs' collegiate play for three seasons. He served in the Navy, including two years in the Pacific Theater.

Hobbs returned to Georgia for the 1946 season and Georgia made its way to the Sugar Bowl at its end. The Bull Dogs went to the Gator Bowl his junior year and back to the Orange Bowl his senior year. Hobbs was named as a guard on the All-Southeastern Conference team his senior year.

From Georgia, Hobbs went to the San Francisco '49ers professional team. There he played under Coach Erdelatz, an association which was later to take Hobbs to his Navy line coaching job.

Hobbs also played the 1950 season with San Francisco and joined the Auburn staff in February, 1951.

Success has paralleled all of Hobbs' football affiliations. Georgia's four trips to bowl games in his four playing years; Auburn's steady rise to power which began in his season there; and Navy's highly successful seasons while he coached there have Furman hopes burning that their program too is set for a return to the lime-light.

JOHNNY GRIFFITH

Assistant Coach

Johnny Griffith comes to Furman with the reputation as a coach of championship football teams. The reputation was earned as South Georgia Junior College went to four straight bowls while he was coach there, and won three of them.

Immediately before coming to Furman in January 1955, Griffith was assistant freshman coach at his alma mater, the University of Georgia.

He was an all-American Junior College halfback at South Georgia in 1947, attending school there after playing with the University of Georgia's Sugar Bowl team in January 1947.

He spent his last two collegiate years at Georgia, graduating in 1949 after helping the coaching staff for his final two school years. John holds the record for the longest run in Georgia's history, a trip of 89 yards in 1946. Ironically, it came against Furman.

BILLY HENDERSON

Assistant Coach

Henderson, a former University of Georgia halfback, joins two former Georgia teammates on the Furman staff. Before coming to Furman, he was a high school coach for four seasons, coaching both baseball and football. For the two years prior to his coming to Furman, he was assistant at Athens, coming there after two seasons at assistant at Jefferson High, Jefferson, Georgia.

Henderson played at Georgia in 1946-47-48-49, winning four letters as a halfback. Georgia went to three bowls in his first three years there.

Henderson graduated in 1950 as an education major and played baseball with the South Atlantic League Macon Peaches in the summer of 1950 and 1951. He also won four letters in baseball while at Georgia and was named to the All-Southeastern Conference baseball team.

Henderson is a native of Macon, Ga., and played high school football for Lanier High in Macon. In 1945, he scored 150 points to set what still stands as the class AA high school scoring record for the state, held by the late Clint Castleberry until Henderson broke it.

ERNEST W. NEAL

Assistant Coach

Ernie Neal is combining his studies at Furman for a master of arts degree with his assistance to the football coaching staff.

His own very promising college football career as an end was cut short after two seasons because of a knee injury that forced him to miss playing his final two years as an undergraduate at Furman.

Ernie played with the freshman team in 1948 and became a regular in his first year of varsity eligibility in 1949. He graduated from Furman in 1952.

Neal began his coaching career in the fall of 1952 at Woodruff High School. He was in the Army from May 1953 until February 1955, when he returned to Furman to study and assist with the football program.

His high school football was played at his native Kershaw High.

VINCE J. PERONI

Assistant Coach

Vince Peroni is giving time off from his private business in Greenville to be a member of the football coaching staff. He joined the staff in the winter of 1954-55 and aided with spring training last year.

He is counted on for big help in the line coaching department. Vince was an All-Southern guard for the 1953 season, graduating from Furman in 1954.

He won letters for the 1949 and 1950 seasons, did two years in the Marine Corps, then won two more letters in the 1952 and 1953 seasons. He was alternate captain for the 1953 season.

Peroni was born in Hackensack, N. J., and played high school football there. He played football as a Marine at Quantico, Va., during the 1951 season.

CHARLES JOHNSON

Administrative Aide for Football

Charley Johnson returns to the scene of his college football days as an administrator in the football program. His achievements while at Furman from 1946 through 1950 gave Charley a good background in both football and administration.

He won four letters as a halfback and was president of the student body his senior year. He was also alternate captain of the football team as a senior.

Johnson played high school football at Simpsonville and Greenville High. He was a halfback for Furman during the seasons of 1946-47-48-49, winning letters all four years.

After graduating in 1950, he became head coach at Simpsonville and remained there through five seasons. His 1954 team was a semifinalist in the state class B playoffs.

Included among his duties at Furman is the organization of football supply clubs over the state, responsibility for the ticket office and supervisory responsibility for the football publicity program.

R. LEWIS MARTIN

Trainer

A football team is no better than its physical condition many coaches have said, and the physical condition of Furman's athletic teams is in the experienced hands of Lewis (Doc) Martin.

Martin joined the Furman staff in February 1955, coming from his position as assistant trainer at the University of Georgia.

Doc began his trainer's career in his native Atlanta. He was trainer for O'Keefe High for five years, going to the University of Georgia in January 1952. He monitored the conditioning of Georgia's athletes for three years.

LYLES ALLEY
Basketball Coach

Lyles Alley's Furman basketball teams have set all-time national scoring records for three straight seasons, a feat that is unparelled in collegiate cage history.

As one of the most oft-discussed teams in the country, his Paladins averaged successively 90.2, 91.7 and 95.3 points a game for the 1953-54-55 seasons.

Twice in two seasons, Alley has produced two first team All-Americans; Frank Selvy in 1954 and Darrell Floyd in 1955. Both hold individual scoring records in one or more departments.

Alley is a 1933 graduate of Furman. He won letters in football, basketball, baseball and track. He began coaching at Furman in 1945 and is also a professor on the physical education staff.

WILLIAM R. (BILL) KERR
Assistant Basketball & Baseball Coach

Bill Kerr will be in his third year as assistant basketball and baseball coach during the 1955-56 school session.

He had a rather auspicious start with his freshman team in the 1953-54 season. His basketball yearlings won 22 games without defeat and scored over 100 points in nine of their games. His basketball team of last season won 17, lost five.

Kerr was a four-letter-man in both basketball and baseball while at Furman. He was on the all-state baseball team in 1950, the year he graduated.

A native Greenvillian, he played at Greenville High before coming to Furman. He was in the Marine Corps from August 1951 until August 1953, when he joined the coaching staff. He assisted the football coaching staff in the fall of 1954.

IN EACH YEAR

Furman University will join the small but growing group of "new look" teams in the 1955 season. There are probably more things to support the new look tag at Furman than at most places.

For one thing, the Hurricane will be under an entirely new coaching staff, headed by Homer B. Hobbs. Hobbs was line coach at Navy last season and joined Furman immediately after Navy's Sugar Bowl triumph.

To assist him, Hobbs brought in two former Georgia teammates, Johnny Griffith and Bill Henderson. Interestingly enough, all three played starring roles in Georgia's 70-7 conquest of Furman. Also aiding will be former Furman guard Vince Peroni, Charley Johnson, former Furman Halfback and Ernie Neal, former Furman End.

The fall scene was previewed in the spring, when the coaching staff installed the fundamentals of its new offense, the split "T".

It will include the split-T, other variations of the "T" and the famed belly series which enjoyed great success at Georgia Tech and Navy.

Joining the new coaching staff and new offense will be some new personnel to run it. About thirty freshmen, who will be eligible for varsity play again this season under present Southern Conference rules, are expected to join the Hurrican Squad.

Although there are ten returning lettermen, the '55 season has already been designated as building year by the coaches. It is the hope of Furman followers that beginning in the coming season, Furman will be on its way back to its pre-war football status.

Of the fifteen lettermen who return, seven of them are backs, and it is in the backfield that Furman's '55 strength lies. Led by All-Southern halfback John Popson, the starting backfield for Furman's last three games of the 1954 season returns intact with the exception of Joe Appello.

That includes quarterback Jim Boyle, halfbacks Popson and fullback Bob Dellinger. Actually, seven of the top eight backs of last year return, which includes lettermen halfbacks Bill Petty and Jerry Penland, and fullback Jimmy Grant.

The sole departing member of last year's top eight backs is '54 captain Ted Yakimowicz. Moving up for his first eligible year is quarterback candidate Kenny Herron, a transfer who will present a serious challenge to veteran starter Boyle.

Countering the optimism about the Hurricane backs is a pronounced pessimism about its line. The only returning regular is tackle Dave Young. There are others who played some ball last year, numbering eleven lettermen in all, but the line still poses the number one problem.

The 10-game schedule is a tough one. Odds against victory in six of them will be heavy. Army, South Car-

olina, Auburn, N. C. State, Florida State and Clemson will all be favorites against the Hurricane. Of its four other opponents, Furman lost to one last season, so the Newberry, Wofford, Citadel and Davidson games promise no cushion.

Outstanding Performers

JOHN POPSON—An all-southern halfback last season, and is one of Furman's best running backs in years. He is 6' tall, weighs 190, and is a senior. John, a Sawyerville, Pa., native, led the 1954 team in scoring with 54 points. Popson's chief asset is his shiftiness although he is not far beyond the 10 second mark in running the 100 yard dash.

JIM BOYLE—A senior quarterback from Florence, S. C. This will be his second season of running the Hurricane team, and he will be going after his fourth football letter, having lettered his freshman, sophomore, and junior years. He will have to be at his best however as there will be stiff competition from Kenneth Herron and several outstanding freshmen quarterbacks.

DAVE YOUNG—A 21 year-old senior from Asheville, N. C. Has waited three years for a crack at the starting position, and should prove to be Furman's outstanding lineman for 1955. He was elected line captain by his teammates during spring practice. Dave may be one of the top linemen in the Conference.

GUS PRINGELS—A senior halfback from Sumter, S. C. For three years Gus was used as a kicking specialist and playing some at quarterback. He was shifted to halfback by the new coaching staff and proved to be the surprise of the spring drills. In the spring game, he rushed for 78 yards in the first half before having to leave the game due to a leg injury.

SIDNEY MADDOX, 20, 6-3, 180, Junior, LaGrange, Ga. One of the only two returning lettermen at the end position. A good defender and promising pass-receiver, being counted on as a starter.

DICK PFIEFER, 19, 6-2, 205, Sophomore, Hasbrouck Heights, New Jersey. Letter winner as freshman, being counted on as a running mate to Maddox as a starter at end.

THOMAS AVERY, 18, 6-1, 180, Freshman, Americus, Ga. Considered an outstanding prospect and may see considerable action this year.

JERRY BLACK, 18, 6-2, 200, Freshman, Clarkesville, Ga. An all-state at Clarkesville High School last year, considered an outstanding prospect of professional baseball as a pitcher.

MAYNARD CHAMBERS, 17, 6-2, 195, Freshman, Sandersville, Ga. Four letter athlete at Sandersville High School, being counted on to see relief duty this year.

AGNEW PEACOCK, 19, 6-1, 190, Freshman, Athens, Ga. Considered number one prospect in Georgia 1954, all-state and honorable mention all-southern. May push Maddox or Pfiefer for starting position.

SONNY POSS, 18, 6-5, 190, Freshman, Thompson, Ga. All-state end, set high school track record in High jump 6' 3 $\frac{3}{4}$ ", brother of Dexter Poss, former Georgia end. Also outstanding basketball performer.

TACKLES

ANDY BIELECKI, 25, 6, 220, Senior, East Rutherford, New Jersey. Considered an outstanding tackle in Spring game—the hustling type whose spirit is necessary to the team, played football as a Marine.

JULIAN FREEMAN, 20, 6-2, 210, Junior, La-Grange, Ga. In a three-way battle for starting position with Bielecki and Young.

DAVE YOUNG, 21, 6, 210, Senior, Asheville, N. C. Has lettered three seasons as a reserved tackle—has the experience and hustle to be a first string performer at the tackle position. Dave is the line captain.

BUDDY BOONE, 17, 6-2, 195, Freshman, Athens, Ga. Great possibilities for the future, played only one year of high school ball.

PAUL GAMBRELL, 18, 6, 195, Freshman, Greenville, S. C. With only three lettermen returning at this position, Gambrell could see considerable duty as a freshman.

ROLYN MASSEY, 18, 6-2, 210, Freshman, Athens, Ga. Believed to be the freshman tackle that was most likely to push the lettermen for the starting position.

LARRY SEAY, 21, 6-1, 200, Senior, Boiling Springs, S. C. A hard steady worker in Spring practice, will play some as reserve.

PAUL CRAVEN, 21, 6-2, 200, Junior, Charleston, S. C. Played some as a reserve last season but still lacks experience.

NICK TZOUVELIKES, 19, 5-9, 190, Sophomore, Greenville, S. C. All-southern guard at Greenville high school, honorable mention for high school All-American. Saw service as a freshman last year, and may wind-up as a starter this year—a good competitor and hustler only returning letterman at this position.

GEORGE ELIADES, 19, 6, 215, Freshman, Washington, D. C. Enrolled in Spring, second semester, and participated in spring practice and will be hustling for a starting position.

GEORGE HARRISON, 19, 6, 200, Freshman, Phoenix City, Ala. Will see considerable duty due to lack of experience at this position.

JOHN KITIK, 19, 5-10, 190, Freshman, Seymour, Conn. Has a year of prep school at Camden Academy and being counted on for considerable play.

CHARLES TRIBBLE, 18, 5-11, 224, Freshman, Atlanta, Ga. Honorable mention as all-state at O'Keefe High School, another freshman that may see relief duty.

RONNIE BROWN, 19, 5-11, 210, Freshman, Athens, Ga. Brown also has a year of prep school and is considered top-flight contender as starting position.

EUGENE PHILLIPS, 18, 5-11, 200, Freshman, Sandersville, Ga. An all-state performer at Sandersville High School. His high school coach considers him the finest line prospect in several years.

BOBBY JENNINGS, 21, 6-1, 190, Junior, Columbia, S. C. Former fullback, shifted to center spring practice, could be number one center this year.

EMIL RUEGNER, 19, 6-2, 210, Sophomore, Union, New Jersey. Shifted from tackle in spring practice, may push Jennings for starting position.

BUDDY WALTON, 18, 5-11, 195, Freshman, Atlanta, Ga. With only two lettermen returning at this position, Walton is being counted on for considerable help.

JERRY HILL, 17, 6-3, 210, Freshman, Athens, Ga. A perfect football specimen. Could develop into a top-notch football player. Didn't reach his full potential in high school.

TROY STOKES, 17, 6-1, 195, Freshman, Simpsonville, S. C. Played fullback in high school, will be center at Furman.

JOHN EDGE, 19, 6-1, 195, Junior, Americus, Ga. Junior College transfer with two years' experience of Junior College football at Georgia Military College. Could possibly push two lettermen for a starting position.

QUARTERBACKS

JIMMY BOYLE, 22, 6, 175, Senior, Florence, S. C. Three-time letterman and two-time regular, Boyle passed for 499 yards and completed 35 out of 91 passes, three of which were for touch downs. Will be counted on again as a Senior to lead the 1955 team. He may be pushed however by several outstanding freshmen quarterbacks.

KENNETH HERRON, 19, 6-2, 180, Sophomore, Toccoa, Ga. Ineligible as a transfer last year, may wind up a number one signal caller before the season is over.

FARRELL FARR, 18, 6, 175, Freshman, Atlanta, Ga. Considered the finest freshman quarterback in the Atlanta area and is being counted on for reserve duty this year. Also an outstanding basketball player.

RAY BRYANT, 18, 5-11, 165, Freshman, Forest Park, Ga. Considered the best passer of the freshman group, voted the outstanding player in high school. Also an all-star baseball pitcher.

BOBBY WEAVER, 18, 6-5, 190, Freshman, Thompson, Ga. Made All-American on high school team, considered an outstanding prospect.

CHARLIE MOORE, 17, 5-9, 160, Freshman, Savannah, Ga. Voted outstanding back of the year in the Savannah area and outstanding player by the Savannah quarterback club, also runner-up of the Savannah Amateur Athlete of the year. Also voted outstanding player in the American Legion Region Tournament at Greenwood, S. C. last year. A three-letter winner in high school.

HALFBACKS

JOHN POPSON, 22, 6, 190, Senior, Sawyersville, Pa. FURMAN BASKETBALL

A 26-game schedule was announced for the Furman University Basketball Team today, which includes 14 Southern Conference battles, and has as the big trip of the season a three-game swing to New York and Philadelphia.

The schedule given out by Coach Lyles Alley today includes 12 games at home, 12 on the road and two on a neutral floor in which Furman will be the host team.

LaSalle, national champion in 1954 and national runner-up in 1955, returns to Furman's schedule this season in the first of the two games in Philadelphia. The Purples will meet St. Joseph's for the second straight season the following night.

Furman opens this three game swing to the north with a game against New York University in Madison Square Garden Feb. 9, and plays LaSalle and St. Joseph's on the following two nights.

The two games on a neutral floor will be played in the new Charlotte (N. C.) Auditorium. The first will be against Davidson, Dec. 2, with the other against West Virginia Jan. 28. Furman will be the home team for both games, and will also play those two schools on their home floors. The Davidson game will be the first college basketball game in the new arena.

Wofford, West Virginia, and LaSalle are the three teams on the 1955-56 schedule which were not played last season. Texas Tech, Miami, N. C. State and Morehead were teams on the 1955 schedule who will not be played next season.

Furman, national scoring champion for the past three seasons, will meet this schedule with practically all of its 1955 team available again. Only guard Sylvester Wright graduated.

Leading the returnees will be All-American Darrell Floyd, who was the individual scoring leader for the nation last year with a 35.9 average. Furman's team average was 95.3, an all-time record.

Bob Thomas, a 6-7 center, and Fred Fraley, six foot guard, will be back for their third season as regulars. Other returning lettermen are Bob Gaines, Charles Ruth, Alan Kyber and David Railey.

Also figuring prominently in Purple plans for next season are Bill Hanks, a 6-8 junior, and Ed Berryhill, a 6-1 forward who led the freshman team in scoring last year.

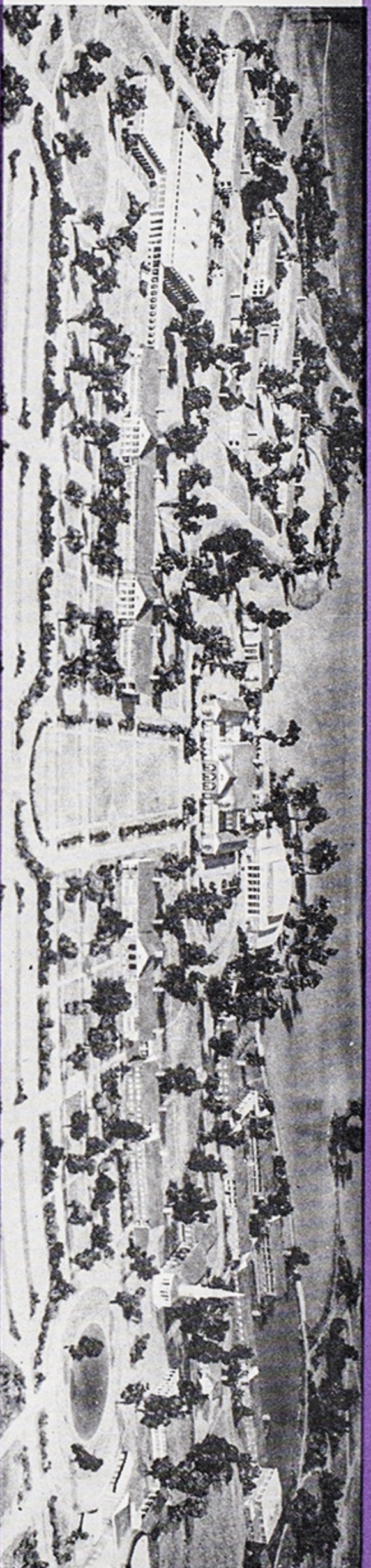
